

#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Raymond in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Odd Fellows Hall in said Raymond on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To fix compensation for collecting taxes for the year ensuing.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town maintenance including snow.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department including forest fires.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Dudley-Tucker Library.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums for State Highways as recommended by the New Hampshire State Highway Department.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 toward payment of debt.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for tarring.
- 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town dump.
- 14. On request of Earl French and fifteen others, to see if the following article be inserted in the town warrant: "To see if the town will vote to tar Gould street, Dudley street and Gove street, and to raise and appropriate money for the same."
- 15. To transact such other business as may legally come before said meeting.

### REPORT OF ROAD AGENT

To the Citizens of the Town of Raymond:

During this past year we overran our appropriation a little, due mainly to the large amount of snow and icy roads which has necessitated a great deal of plowing and sanding.

We also bought a small grader this year of which we were badly in need. Conditions as they are today make it uncertain as to the amount of fuel oil available for use in caring for the roads. This small grader used behind the truck does a fairly good job and uses less oil.

A few complaints have been made, especially during the last snow storm, as to the reason for not using the tractor more in plowing snow. My records show that the tractor has plowed snow for fifty-eight hours this winter. The tractor goes out to plow as well as the trucks, but is sent out on the back roads such as the Lane Road, Green Road, Harriman Hill Road and Onway Lake Road, where the drifts are deepest and more difficult for the trucks to get through. Where there are no hills and few drifts it is much cheaper to use the truck than the tractor for this reason: A truck will plow snow ten to fifteen miles an hour while the tractor will go only about three miles an hour. If all the roads were done with the tractor, there would be more complaints because it would take so long.

During this winter we have been allowed only eighty-eight gallons of fuel oil for plowing roads. This isn't a very large amount.

I appreciate the cooperation of the selectmen and citizens of the town of Raymond during this past year.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Raymond:

Due to the immediate demands of defense activities the Superintendent's fourteenth annual report is brief.

Your teachers, assisted by an able corps of volunteer citizens, have been engaged for the fifth time during the past twelve months in registering the population for the rationing of fuels and foods.

War conditions and the attendant increase in wage scales have necessitated at least two of the six changes in the staff of teachers.

In June, 1942, Mr. Carroll E. Sanderson of Boscawen was elected to teach Smith-Hughes Agriculture, succeeding Mr. Parker M. Blodgett, who resigned to enter business. Mr. Sanderson received his degree from the University of New Hampshire in 1940. His practice teaching was done in the Walpole High School. Following graduation he was employed one year in the Dean Dairy in Waltham, Massachusetts.

Miss Helen E. Robinson of West Roxbury, Massachusetts, was elected to succeed Miss Mary M. Bobick in the Commercial Department. Miss Robinson is also the physical instructor of girls. Since graduating from Boston University in 1937 she taught five years in the Simonds High School of Warner, and has completed at Boston University four summer sessions of graduate work.

The withdrawal of Mr. Henry J. Hastings to accept the headmaster's position in the Pelham High School necessitated several changes in instruction.

Headmaster Young has been made physical instructor for boys, Mr. Sanderson has been made instructor in General Science, and Mrs. Mary N. Berylson of Eliot, Maine, has been elected to teach mathematics. Mrs. Berylson was graduated from Bates in 1914 and received her Master's Degree from the same institution in 1939. For the past fourteen years Mrs. Berylson has taught in the high school of Eliot, Maine.

Soon after the close of the school year in June, Miss Dorothy A. Connaughton, teacher of English and foreign language, was inducted into the Woman's Auxiliary Army Corps. This vacancy has been filled by the election of Miss Elizabeth Oliver of Pittsfield, Maine. Miss Oliver received her degree from Colby College in 1938 and has taken post-graduate courses at Middlebury College. She taught for two years in the high school of Mattawamkeag, Maine.

Mrs. Lila E. Nutbrown of Berlin was selected to teach grades five and six, replacing Miss Winnifred A. Sullivan, who resigned to accept a school in Massachusetts. Mrs. Nutbrown is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College and has taught several years in the schools of Whitefield and Berlin.

Due to the lack of money and the scarcity of qualified teachers, the Activity Classes, efficiently conducted by Miss Ruth Colby and later by Mrs. Ruth Hastings, were discontinued this year.

Within the month, Mrs. Anne W. Gladysz, teacher in Grades four and five, has been released on account of the serious illness of her husband, now stationed at Camp Shelby, Mississippi. Mrs. Miriam Vining of Raymond is serving as a substitute teacher in these grades.

The report of your enumeration officer for September, 1942, shows 282 pupils enrolled in the twelve

grades of your consolidated school. Of this number 18 were non-resident tuition pupils. Unusual occupational opportunities and restricted transportation have greatly reduced the number of tuition pupils and to some degree the enrollment of resident pupils.

It is a matter of regret that a physical handicap has been imposed on certain school children by the discontinuance of community service in the preparation of hot lunches. Even the penny milk ration, sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Association, has failed to meet our nutritional needs, due to the extreme shortage in the milk supply. Since the war has revealed in our youth, both men and women, the lack of proper and adequate nutrition, it is anticipated that new government agencies, similar to the community service formerly provided by the Works Progress Administration, may soon by available. To obtain such nutritional service a local appropriation for school lunches should be made annually by the school district.

The frequent going and coming of defense workers and members of the armed forces add to the danger from communicable diseases among school children. For this reason the services of school nurses everywhere have become increasingly valuable. During the last year 99 cases of communicable diseases were reported by your school nurse. Physical defects corrected included 124, of which ninety-four were dental corrections, made by Dr. Mayo in a dental clinic sponsored by the local Red Cross and Parent-Teacher Association.

The improvement of buildings, authorized by special district appropriation, included the weather-stripping of all windows of the main building having a western exposure. Such weather-proofing has been thoroughly tested and found most satisfactory during the sub-zero weather of this winter. At such time as

material and labor are again available the similar weather-stripping of all classroom windows in the building would insure a further economy in fuel consumption.

Pursuant with instructions received from the United States Fuel Administration, order was placed on January 4, 1943, for coal grates to replace the present oil burner for which fuel oil is no longer obtainable. Delay in delivery from the foundry has necessitated the closing of schools for a period now exceeding three weeks.

The improvement of grounds for which special appropriation was made by the district, includes the grading and grassing of the front yard, which is now completely surrounded by a cement curb. The extension of ample walks from curb to building lends dignity and convenience to the approach.

During the present winter three defense courses have been conducted for adults. Two courses in the care, repair, and maintenance of farm machinery have been given by Mr. Carroll E. Sanderson, the instructor in agriculture, to groups of fifteen men. Miss Iber Holmes, instructor in home economics, and Mr. Sanderson are now completing a third course in the production, conservation and processing of farm products. This class has a membership of forty men and women.

Music for enjoyment, one of the four aims of music instruction, was demonstrated by the music festival, held in the high school auditorium last spring, and in which all your schools participated. Restricted transportation forbids a similar festival this spring. However, chorus groups will share in the exercises of graduation. Without the assistance of the parents and other citizens, community programs of this nature would fail of their objectives.

To all school officials, teachers, and citizen assistants, who by their services in rationing centers, by their individual and collective support of clinic and nutritional activities, and who by other cooperation in maintaining the efficiency of your schools are contributing to the national defense, there is here expressed the deep appreciation and thanks of your Superintendent.
