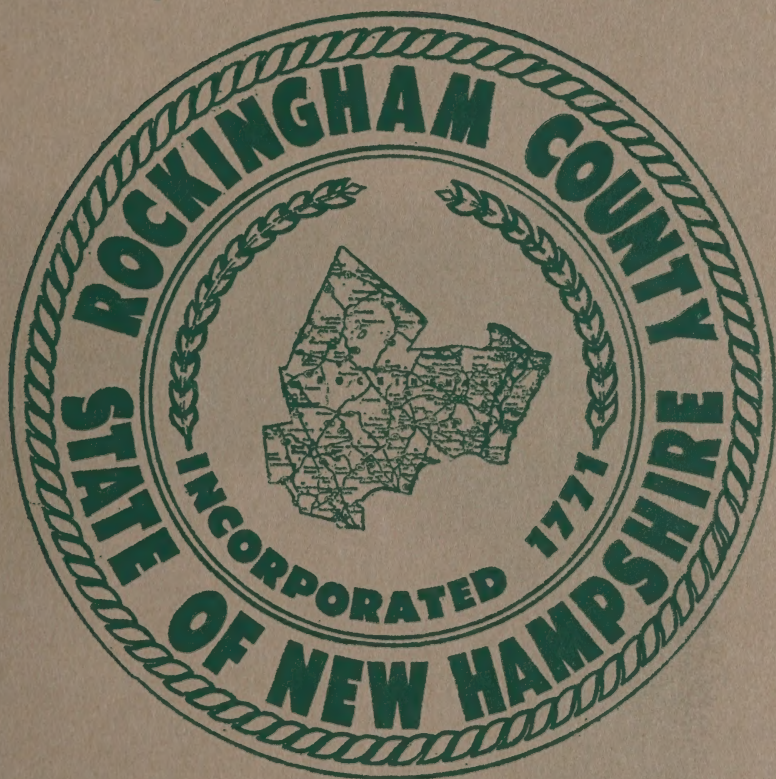


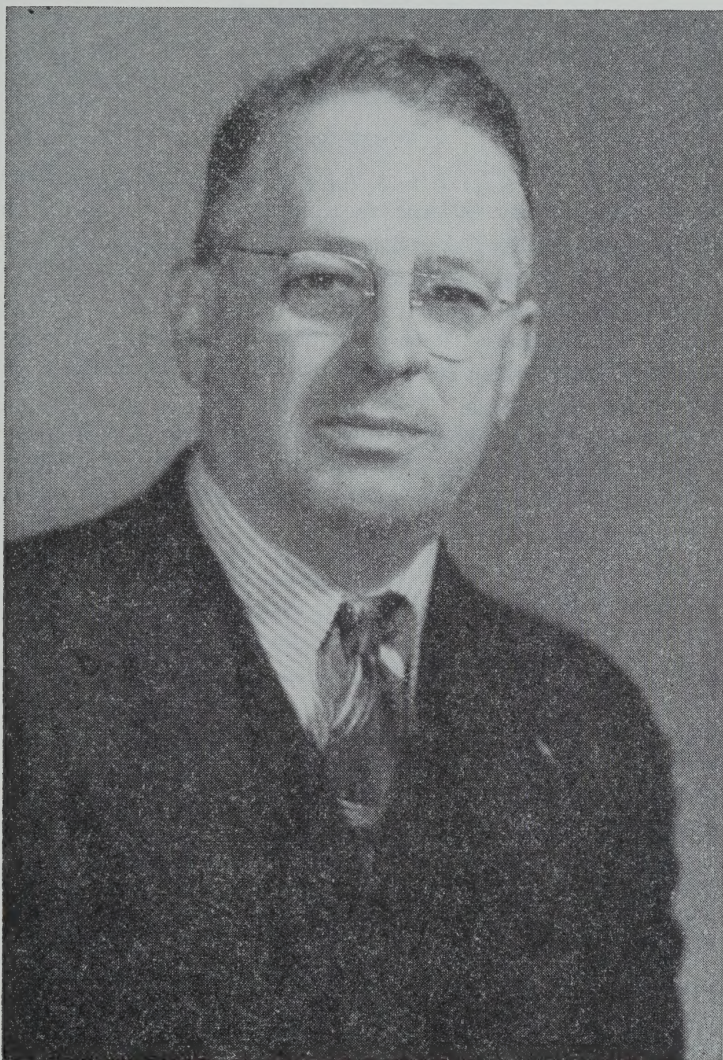

ROCKINGHAM COUNTY DELEGATION

Organization Meeting

January 12, 1961

State House, Concord, N. H.

A meeting of the Rockingham County Delegation was called to order by the Chairman Mr. Douglass Hunter at 12:00 noon on Thursday, Jan. 12, 1961 in Room 100 for the purpose of organization.

50 Representatives and 3 Delegates answered the roll call and the chairman declared a quorum was present. The procedure for the election was outlined by Mr. Hunter. Mr. Bowles of Portsmouth placed in nomination the name of Mr. H. F. Shepherd of Londonderry as Chairman of the Delegation. The nomination was seconded by Mr. Murch. Upon motions duly made the nominations were closed and the clerk instructed to cast one ballot for Mr. Shepherd. He was declared elected for the ensuing two years.

The chairman then called for nominations for a clerk. Miss Doris Spollett, seconded by Mrs. Greene placed in nomination the name of Edna B. Weeks of Greenland. Mrs. Weeks presented the name of Mrs. Marjorie Roulston of Salem. This nomination was seconded by Mrs. Edna White. The voting was by ballot resulting in 39 votes cast for Mrs. Weeks and 13 for Mrs. Roulston. Mrs. Weeks was declared elected.

Mr. Hunter and Mrs. Palmer then retired from their respective positions with expressions of gratitude for cooperation received from the members of the delegation and thanks for the opportunity to have served as a county officer.

Mr. Shepherd recognized Mr. McDaniel who moved that the Executive Board be appointed by the Chairman. One vote was in opposition to this motion, a majority voted in the affirmative.

Mr. Bowles moved that Rockingham County have a Vice Chairman and that C. Cecil Dame be nominated to be Vice Chairman. This motion for nomination was amended by Mr. Sanborn to state that the Vice Chairman shall be an ex officio member of the Executive Committee. With proper procedure this amendment was approved. C. Cecil Dame elected by a show of hands, and declared to be the Vice Chairman for the ensuing two years.

Named to the Executive Committee were: Hunter, Palmer, Gay, Spollett of Hampstead, Osborne, Eastman, Peever, McDaniel, Sewall.

The meeting of the delegation adjourned and a meeting of the Executive Committee was held. The Board voted to allow the County Commissioners to borrow up to and not exceeding \$600,000. for expenses during the year 1961.

The meeting adjourned.

Public Hearing

Rockingham County Delegation
Wed., Feb. 1, 1961, Room 100
State House, Concord, N. H.

A meeting of the Rockingham County Delegation was called at the time and place above mentioned for the

purpose of holding a public hearing on H.B. 54 An Act designating the house of correction in Rockingham county as a jail.

45 members of the committee were present. The chairman opened the meeting and then requested the Vice-chairman to preside for the rest of the hearing.

Mr. Shepherd the sponsor of the bill spoke in its favor. Mr. George Sampson, County Sheriff, explained that in effect the house of correction at Brentwood had been used as a jail for a year. The procedure had worked very well and had proved to be economical.

Mr. Bowles asked questions concerning finances and the necessity of structural changes. Mr. Wylie questioned the security. Mr. Osborne asked about persons being held for trial being used as workers. Questions were also asked by Mr. Ingraham, Strafford, Sewall. Mr. Hislop asked if it necessitates an increase in personnel and how costs in Brentwood compare with costs in Manchester. Mr. Bowles requested a statement of opinion from the Commissioners. Mr. Bartlett spoke in favor of the bill and stated that some capital improvements will be requested whether or not this bill passes. Mr. Twardus spoke in favor. Mr. Larraba explained the legal implications. The other two commissioners spoke in favor.

Executive Session

Mr. White of Derry moved that HB 54 be reported as "Ought to Pass". Mr. Hunter moved to amend by making the bill effective on passage rather than 60 days after. Both the amendment and the original motion were un-animously adopted.

On motion by Mr. Wylie the meeting adjourned.

Executive Committee

Having been duly notified, the Executive Committee met at the time and place above mentioned to consider the proposed county budget for 1961.

Present were: Mr. Douglass Hunter, Chairman of Exec. Comm., Mr. Howell Shepherd, Chairman of County Delegation, Miss Doris Spollett, Mrs. Palmer, Mrs. Weeks, Mr. Gay, Osborne, McDaniel, Sewall, Dame, and Eastman. Also present were Commissioners Brown, Fuller and Bartlett with their Secretary Mrs. Gladys McCoy.

This first budget request was presented by Mr. Richard Kelley, East Kingston for the Rockingham County Extension Service. He and the County Agricultural Agent, Mr. Edward Upham, were present to answer questions and explain that increment increases had been requested in salaries of agents and office secretaries.

In considering the other items of the budget, Mr. Hunter noted that while the present request of salaries for the Commissioners is \$1,800 each, there is pending legislation to increase this to \$2,500 and a legislative bill also proposes to increase the salary of the County Attorney from \$2,200 to 4,000.

Commissioner Brown spoke in favor of having the sheriff and register of deeds paid by salary not fees.

Sheriff Sampson answered many questions in regard to his department and spoke in favor of having the sheriff paid by salary but not his deputies.

Judge Treat appeared before the committee and spoke in favor of the installation of the proposed new index system at the County Records Building.

Mr. Green expressed no opposition to this installation.

After dinner Mr. Frank Nay appeared before the committee but made no special request for his department.

Mr. Albert Fuller requested an increase in salary for the office girl at Derry.

Mr. William Bartlett displayed plans for a new county building.

Mr. and Mrs. Hilton explained many details of their work. He asked for an extra turnkey for security protection and disclosed the urgent need to replace the 42 toilets in the jail which had been installed in 1911. He gave an affirmative answer to the question, "Would these improvements have been necessary whether or not this House of Correction is designated as a jail?"

On motion made by Mr. Gay, seconded by Mr. Shepherd, the committee then went into executive session with only the members of the Executive Committee and Mrs. McCoy present.

The changes made in the budget requests are as follows: Register of Deeds \$13,500. increase to \$14,500.; Supplies, Photocopy Machine \$5,500. down to \$5,000.; Exeter Court House \$5,500 down to \$5,230.; County Records Building \$5,500 up to \$5,600.; County Extension Service \$29,630.39 down to \$28,000.; and the total amount necessary to be raised by county tax \$637,088.98 down to \$635,788.59 a decrease of \$1,300.39.

On motion by Mr. Osborne it was voted to recommend to the county delegation that all capital expenditures — specifically the installation of the new index system and the necessary replacement at the jail — be done by a bond issue up to \$50,000.

The Executive committee adjourned at 5:10 to meet with the complete delegation on February 27, 1961 at 10:00 A.M.

The meeting of the Rockingham County Convention, of which the membership had been duly notified, was called to order by the chairman, Mr. Shepherd. Prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Wylie, the delegate from Fremont. A salute to the flag was led by Mr. Kimball of Derry. The clerk called the roll. Fifty-two answered.

Present were: Shepherd, Dame, Hunter, Weeks, Barker, Carter, Bowles Casassa, Carkin, Chandler, Clark, Cheney, Collishaw, Cross, Eastman, Driscoll, Felch, Gay, Greene, Griffin, Hackett, Hislop, Keefe, Kimball, Langford, Magoon, McDaniel, Nickerson, Osborne, Palmer, Peever, Persson, Pinkham, Purington, Roulston, Sewall, Stafford, Tufts, Twardus, Vey, Wylie, Barnes, Robinson, Scott of Deerfield, Scott of Derry, Spollett of Chester, Spollett of Hampstead, White of Atkinson, White of Derry, White of Portsmouth (Ward 4), White of Portsmouth (Ward 5), Palmer of Kensington.

Mr. Shepherd then turned the meeting over to Mr. Hunter to preside during the work on the budget. The first seven items were approved with only one opposing voter.

On motion made by Mr. Casassa of Hampton, it was voted that \$10,000. be deleted from item #8 Register of Deeds on the proposed budget with the understanding that this amount would be a part of a bond issue to be suggested later. There was no opposition to this motion.

With only constructive criticism and no opposition, the budget as recommended by the budget committee was accepted by the delegation with the exception of item #25 the County Extension Service which, on motion by Mr. Gay seconded by Mr. Peveer, the original request for \$29,630.39 was reinstated into the budget.

With Mr. White of Atkinson making the motion, seconded by Mr. Casassa of Hampton, it was voted that

the sum of \$991,894.79 be raised and appropriated by the convention, crediting against this the estimated revenue and surplus of \$364,475.81 and committing the amount of \$627,418.98 to be raised by county tax.

Mr. Hunter then turned the meeting back to Mr. Shepherd for discussion of raising \$50,000. by bond issue. At the request of the chairman Mr. Osborne explained the needs at the jail. On the motion of Mr. Osborne, seconded by Mr. Stafford, it was voted: That the Rockingham County Commissioners be authorized to negotiate for the purchase of a new index system for the Register of Deeds, located in the Records Bldg., Exeter, N. H. and for improvements at the County Jail, located at Brentwood, N. H., and that \$50,000.00 be appropriated for that purpose; that said sum be raised by the sale of County notes or bonds, the matter of form, rate of interest, date of issue, date of payment, and negotiations be left to the discretion of the County Commissioners, and authority to execute and deliver said notes or bonds is hereby given to said County Commissioners subject only to statutory requirements. By request a roll call was taken with 48 voting in the affirmative. There were no negative votes.

A report of the County Commissioners on the proposed new County Building was given by Commissioner Bartlett and proposed plans as drawn by Mr. Miles were displayed. He stated the estimated complete cost was \$925,000.00 with \$20,000. of this having been allocated for the purchase of land.

Mr. Bowles moved that we accept for reference the drawings submitted and the report of the County Commissioners. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dame and voted in the affirmative. Mr. Bowles then moved that the chairman appoint a committee of not less than three members to work with the County Commissioners on the subject of this new county building and report in 1962,

or before if circumstances warrant it, with specific recommendations. Their study to include the three buildings presently owned by the county and the relationship of these, if any, to the new building.

On motion by Mr. Gay, seconded by Mr. Hunter, the meeting adjourned at 2:10 P.M.

Mr. Osborne of Portsmouth, Mr. Collishaw of Exeter, and Mr. Kimball of Derry were named by the Chairman to be members of the committee required in the motion made by Mr. Bowles.

Public Hearing — April 10, 1961
Probate Court Room, 7:30 P.M.
Exeter, N. H.

A public hearing in regard to a \$50,000 bond issue for County Jail improvements and a Filing System for Register of Deeds was held at the time and place above mentioned. Very bad weather was the cause of only seventeen persons being present.

Mr. Osborne spoke in favor of the bond issue. Commissioner Bartlett requested the wording of the motion to be "for the authorization of an appropriation to be raised by the issuance of notes of the County for the purchase of an index system for the Register of Deeds, Records Building, Exeter N. H. at a cost of \$10,000 and for emergency improvements at the County Jail and the County Home, Brentwood, N. H. at a cost of \$40,000."

Mr. Lothrop explained why a second public hearing was necessary since the \$40,000. was not in the budget at the time of the first public hearing. He spoke in opposition to any kind of an issue, either of bonds or notes, but recommended that the County pay off this obligation within this year.

The meeting adjourned at 8:31 P.M.

On April 27th a public hearing on House Bill 189 was held in Room 100 at the State House in Concord, N. H. at 2:40 P.M.

Mr. Gay, sponsor of the bill, spoke in its favor. Also appearing in favor were Judge Thomas Flynn of Portsmouth and Rep. Raimond Bowles. Mr. Bowles recommended that the effective date of the bill be changed to June 1, 1962.

No other person present requesting to be heard, the hearing was closed.

The public hearing on House Bill 110 opened immediately.

Mr. Bowles, the sponsor of this bill, recommended that the effective date be changed to June 1, 1962.

Judge Thomas Flynn spoke in favor of the bill. Rep. William Keefe and Delegate Ralph Sanborn of Hampton Falls appeared in opposition. Rep. Hunter of Hampton made appropriate remarks while speaking neither for nor against the bill. Mr. Bowles and Mr. Sanborn spoke a second time.

The hearing closed.

The public hearing on House Bill 174 opened immediately.

Mr. Osborne, the sponsor, spoke in its favor as did Judge Flynn and Mr. George Sampson, the County Sheriff. Mr. Rae Laraba stated that he had been asked by the Sheriff to draw up this bill and it involved the basic question as to whether or not we change at this time from "fees" to a salary system.

The hearing closed at 3:30 P.M.

The Delegate from Hampton Falls stated that proper notice had not been given to the members of the delegation of this meeting.

The Chairman commented that notice of the public hearing had been properly made and that members of the delegation would be duly notified of any meeting at which executive action would be taken.

The meeting adjourned at 3:40 P.M.

HB 441 an act relative to salary for the register of deeds for Rockingham County.

The Rockingham County delegation met at the time and place mentioned above for the purpose of holding a public hearing on HB 441 and taking executive action on the bills which had a public hearing on April 27.

Rep. Greene of Rye, sponsor of the bill, spoke in its favor and gave an interesting history of the fee system which has been in effect since 1701. Also speaking in favor were: Rep. Bowles, Mr. Ralph Sanborn, and Rep. Hunter who expressed concern for any changes in costs. Rep. Keefe spoke in opposition to the salary named in the bill. Mr. Holland, an attorney from Exeter, spoke in opposition to the bill, pointing his remarks to costs of office and employees which have increased in the past year. Rep. Murch questioned gross and net income figures. Rep. Bowles spoke a second time. The public hearing closed.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

The delegation, which had been duly notified of this meeting, met in executive session immediately following the close of the public hearing. 42 Representatives were present and the following elected Delegates: Barnes of Sandown, Palmer of Kensington, and Sanborn of Hamp-

ton Falls. Consideration was first given to the bond issue for establishing an index system in the office of the Register of Deeds and making necessary improvements at the Jail.

Mr. Gay made a motion which was seconded by Mr. Nickerson that the Rockingham County Commissioners be authorized to negotiate for the purchase of a new index system for the Register of Deeds, located in the Records Building, Exeter, New Hampshire and for improvements at the County Jail, located at Brentwood, New Hampshire, and that \$50,000.00 be appropriated for that purpose; that said sum be raised by the sale of County notes or bonds, the matter of form, rate of interest, date of issue, date of payment, and negotiations be left to the discretion of the County Commissioners and authority to execute and deliver said notes or bonds is hereby given to said County Commissioners subject only to statutory requirements. Mr. Hunter amended this motion by adding the sentence, "The index system is to be installed within one calendar year of this date i.e. May 10, 1962." The amendment was seconded by Mr. Murch and voted affirmatively. The motion as amended was voted unanimously by roll call.

The Representatives were then called into executive session to act on HB 189 an act relating to the salaries of the Rockingham County Commissioners. Mr. Murch moved that the bill be reported as ought to pass with an amendment making the effective date Jan. 1, 1962. The motion was seconded by Mr. Hunter and a roll call vote found 39 members answering in the affirmative and 3 in the negative. The motion carried.

HB 110 an act increasing the salary of the Rockingham County Attorney was next taken under consideration. At this point the clerk of the delegation was called away by the chairman of the Appropriations Committee and Mrs. Mildred Palmer was requested to take her place for the remainder of the meeting.

Mr. Bowles sought to amend the bill to make the effective date Jan. 1, 1963 and to further amend the bill by reducing the amount of salary from \$4000. to \$3600. These amendments were seconded by Mr. Murch. Much discussion ensued and the motion finally voted in the affirmative by the delegation was that the bill should be reported as "Inexpedient to Legislate."

In consideration of HB 174 an act relative to the salary of the sheriff of Rockingham County, Mr. Osborne spoke in favor and moved that it be reported "Ought to Pass". This motion was seconded by Mr. Stafford and was voted in the affirmative by the committee.

In executive session on HB 441 an act relative to salary for the register of deeds for Rockingham County, Mr. Gay moved and it was seconded by Mrs. Griffin that this bill be indefinitely postponed. A roll call found 32 voting "No" and 8 voting "Yes". The motion was lost. Mr. Bowles moved, seconded by Mrs. White, that the bill be layed on the table but this motion was lost. Mr. Waterhouse requested a reconsideration of the motion to lay the bill on the table and upon a motion duly made by Mrs. Spollett, it was voted that HB 441 be "laid on the table for a period not exceeding 30 calendar days".

Rockingham County delegation met in executive session for the purpose of acting on HB 441 which had been tabled on May 10.

Mrs. Greene, sponsor of the bill, spoke in favor of it. Mr. Bowles moved, seconded by Mr. Stafford, that the bill be reported "Ought to Pass".

Speaking in favor of the motion were Mr. Kimball and

Mrs. Cross who stated that a constituent had desired the salary to be \$8500.

Speaking in opposition were: Mr. Gay, Mrs. Palmer, and Mrs. Griffin. Miss Spollett had previously requested that she be registered in opposition to the bill. Mr. Casassa questioned Mr. Bowles as to whether the purpose of the bill was for efficiency or economy.

A vote was taken by a show of hands, 15 voting in favor and 18 voting in opposition. The motion was lost.

The meeting adjourned at 1:12 P.M.

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Rockingham County Delegation was held on July 18 at the County Home in Brentwood with the following in attendance: Gay, Eastman, Weeks, Spollett of Hampstead, Shepherd, Sewall, McDaniels, Palmer, Dame, Osborne.

Due to the illness of the Chairman, the call to the meeting was issued by the County Commissioners and Mr. Shepherd presided at the meeting which was called to order at 10:30 A.M. The purpose of the meeting was to review the expenditures of the County for the first six months of 1961.

It was moved, seconded, and duly passed that the transfer of funds collected on insurance policies on the Exeter and Portsmouth Court Houses be transferred to these respective accounts.

At the request of the Commissioners and on motion by Mr. Gay, it was voted to transfer an amount of \$3500. from the Sheriff and deputies account to the Sheriff sal-

ary account so that the salary of the sheriff will not show a deficit as a result of passage of HB 174.

It was moved, seconded, and passed on motion by Mr. Osborne that revenue received by the County Commissioners be used in the designated departments from which they were originally paid out.

It was reported that \$10,125.90 had been spent on the index system to date and that work on the jail would be completed before any other improvements or repairs are made with any balance of funds which remain.

The business meeting adjourned at 12 noon and the members of the delegation were entertained for dinner. After dinner a tour of the institution was made, noting the improvements which were being made at the jail.

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Rockingham County Delegation was held on October 16, at the County Home in Brentwood. Present were the following members: Hunter, Weeks, Gay, Eastman, Spollett of Hampstead, Sewall, McDaniels, Palmer, Dame and the County Commissioners Brown, Fuller, and Bartlett.

The meeting was called to order at 10:30 by Mr. Hunter. The expenditures for the 3rd quarter and the total of the three quarters of 1961 were carefully considered. It was voted that the Commissioners be allowed to use receipts in payment for any necessary expenses for the remainder of the year.

It was noted that of the \$50,000. which had been voted for the index system and improvements at the jail, \$40,000. had been spent or committed and the Commissioners requested that the remaining \$10,000. be transferred for use on other buildings. Specific recommendations include: a new sterilizer in Mitchell, fixing some additional rooms in Fernald, removing a stairway in Underhill and locating a nurses' station there, and fixing some rooms for help in Carlisle. On motion by Mr. Gay it was voted that the Commissioners could use this \$10,000. on the four buildings as they had designated in their recommendations. There was one opposing vote.

The Committee made a tour of the buildings, examined the improvements already accomplished and the changes as proposed by the Commissioners.

The audit covered the fiscal years ended December 31, 1959 and December 31, 1960. Submitted herewith is the report of this audit including Exhibits as hereafter listed. The report is made up in three sections as follows:

- Section III - Ten Year Statement of Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of County Commissioners, County Treasurer, Clerk of the Superior Court and Superintendent of the County Home and Mitchell Memorial Hospital.

FINANCIAL REPORTS

- December 31, 1958 - December 31, 1959 (Exhibit A)
- December 31, 1959 - December 31, 1960 (Exhibit J)

Comparative Balance Sheets for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1958 - 1959 and December 31, 1959 - 1960 are presented in Exhibits A and J, respectively. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$106,697.88 in 1959, and \$11,863.78 in 1960.

A revenue surplus of \$15,824.87, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$16,163.56, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$31,988.43 in 1960.

ACCOUNTS OF COMMISSIONERS AND TREASURER

An examination was made of all orders issued by the Commissioners and Clerk of the Superior Court during the periods under review. Supporting invoices and payrolls were likewise examined and the classification of expenditures noted. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1960, is indicated in Exhibit N-2.

CLERK OF THE SUPERIOR COURT

The financial accounts and records of the Clerk of the Superior Court of Rockingham County were examined. Court receipts were checked by source, insofar as possible, and found to be properly recorded. Court orders issued by the Clerk were supported by invoices, vouchers and payrolls bearing the approval of a Superior Court Justice.

COUNTY HOME AND HOSPITAL

The accounts and records of the Superintendent of the County Home and the Mitchell Memorial Hospital were examined. Receipts of the Home and Hospital were checked by source through the triplicate receipt forms. All receipts, as recorded in the cash book, were properly accounted for by the Superintendent through deposits in the bank to the credit of the County Treasurer's account.

Classified summary statements of receipts and expenditures of the County Institutions for the years 1959 and 1960 are presented in Exhibits F and O, respectively.

BONDED INDEBTEDNESS

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the County as of December 31, 1960, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit T.

Conclusion:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, a copy of this report or a summary of its findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) should be published in the next annual report of the County. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety, but the publication of Exhibits is optional.

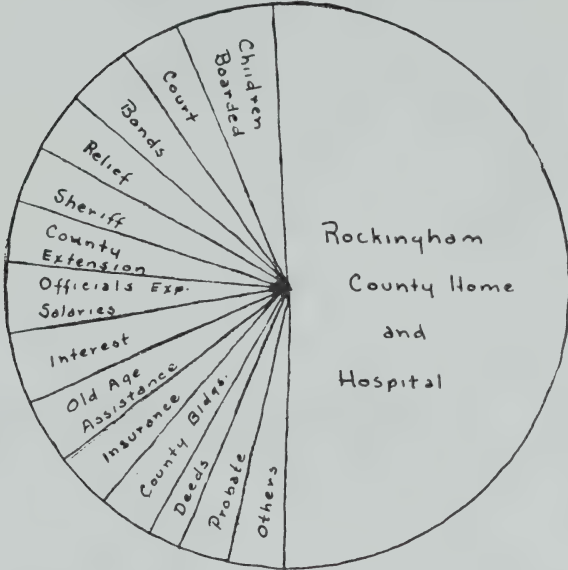

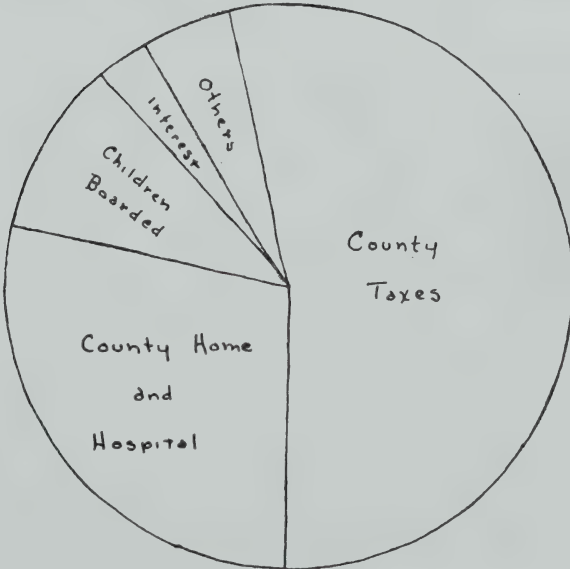

The number of cases reported to and investigated by this Department increased by approximately twenty-five per cent over that of the previous year. The majority of these consisted of breaking, entering and larceny cases of which a large proportion have been cleared and restitution made to the rightful owners. The number of camp and unoccupied dwelling breaks prevalent in the off seasons, showed a slight decrease this past year.

The coverage by radios operating on our frequency now extends throughout nineteen towns within the County, with over fifty mobile units now in operation, these include Department members' cars as well as ambulance and police units owned by the towns.

The operation of the Department cruisers continues to prove an efficient and economical factor in providing transportation of prisoners at a minimum cost, as well as being instantly available in matters of emergency.

We again conclude yet another year of operating within our allotted budget, despite the acquisition of additional equipment by means of which we have been able to further increase our service to the people of the County.

May I at this time express my appreciation to the County Attorney and all law enforcement officials for their continued assistance and cooperation.

REPORT OF COUNTY ATTORNEY - 1961

In this my first year as County Attorney I was met head-on with the full impact of the work assigned to this office. In my estimation case loads and activities handled by the County Attorney are on the up-grade. The population growth is the foremost factor in the present and projected increase in work.

I have found police work in the County to be excellent through the various chiefs of police and their men on the municipal level, to the county level through Sheriff Sampson and his Deputies and the State Police. I have noted and particularly wish to mention the fine inter-group co-operation of these three branches, and their willingness to go all out in overcoming our mutual problems in criminal work.

We started the year 1961 with a heavy docket of felony cases at the January term; the docket decreased with each succeeding term of the Court. At the same time misdemeanor appeal cases are increasing and constitute a major source of the work load, even though the Municipal Courts dispose of a great number of these minor offense cases before they reach the Superior Court level.

This being my first report as Rockingham County Attorney, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Lindsey R. Brigham whose help, even before I took over my duties, accounted for the orderly transition in the change of reins and made it possible for the work to go smoothly throughout.

ROCKINGHAM COUNTY COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE

The year 1961 has seen an increase in your Cooperative Extension work in Rockingham County. The Extension Agents working in the County, covering education in agriculture, home making, forestry and 4-H, are supervised by the State Leaders at the University of New Hampshire as well as by your local Extension Council. The Council is comprised of 13 county people, each phase of Extension work represented by 3 persons and 1 member of the County Delegation. Meeting once a month, the Council keeps abreast of the activities of the agents and of the problems confronting them. Through discussion periods between agents and the Council, the Extension programs for the county are formulated to include professional advice and assistance from University Specialists as well as Agent Leaders in each field.

In the field of individual education, the Extension agents this past year made 2,400 personal visits to people in the county; 1,200 county people came to the Extension Office to obtain information; 2,673 telephone calls were made to dispense information and to answer questions of county people. In the field of general education, 150 news articles were written and released; agents participated in 7 radio programs; 16 television programs were participated in either as principle actors or as directors; 5,868 bulletins were distributed; and 53,614 letters were mailed to persons who had indicated the desire to receive particular information. A total of 1778 days worked were logged by the agents this past year.

I have tried consistently to make the major part of my work as chaplain consist of visits in which I was a friend to those who were in need of my services. I am sure many have learned to love me, and to look forward to my visits, both in the Home, and at the jail.

I have had very few of what might be called conferences, but I have made it a point to be at the Home at least twice a week, and spend the major part of the afternoon there. We have held services every other Sunday with Mrs. Watson acting as Pianist. At times we have visited the Home for a time after such services. I feel sure that these friendly visits with words of comfort, or encouragement have done as much as professional clinical services might accomplish.

At times I have taken a book or magazine to those who are in the Home or the Jail. Since early in the Spring, I have tried to visit the jail once a week, making these visits in the evening when the prisoners would be at leisure. I passed out a supply of gospels, which were given me by an interested friend. The prisoners as a rule were reticent, but I have noted a greater readiness to talk, as I have become better known to the men.

The major part of my time essentially belongs to the church. Since I am new to the work of the chaplain I would welcome any suggestions or advice which might

make me of more usefulness to the Home. I do feel that I have done about all that could be done under the circumstances, but I am always willing to be shown where my services can be of greater value.
