WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton in the County of Rockingham in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday the 9th day of March next, at Two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Highways and Bridges.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$161.01 necessary to secure State Aid for the improvement of Class V Roads.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Winter Maintenance of Highways.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Interest, Insurance and Town Officers Bonds.
7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Public Welfare.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

10. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate deeded to the Town for non-payment of taxes.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10.00 for Sibley Relief.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for vital statistics and micro-film.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the care of the Common.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Civil Defense.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10.00 for the Health Department.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for the care of the Ball Park.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for miscellaneous purposes.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the use of the Newton Town Dump.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the capital reserve fund.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to dig and fence a water-hole on Main Avenue.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be used for the removal of the dead spruce trees in the Town Cemetery in back of the school.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the Police Department.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for inlaid linoleum for the Kitchen in the Town Hall.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the repair of the roof of the woodshed.

26. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

LIBRARY TRUSTEES REPORT

During 1964 your library continued to move forward toward its objective of furnishing the best possible service to adults and young folk alike. Emphasis was placed on improving the adult fiction collection. The librarian and a trustee again attended the Scheilling Cooperative Book Buying Group Meetings. However, this year we received no State Aid Grant for book purchases.

Mrs. Robert Fraser, librarian, again attended summer school at the University of New Hampshire. She will complete the course in 1965. During the year the librarian was pleased to receive clerical assistance from Mrs. Elwood N. Dixon, Mrs. Horace Cressy, Mrs. James Miller and Mrs. Stratos Janos.

The State Legislature, this year, passed a new library law providing for the creation of Cooperative Library Districts and up to 25 Service Center Libraries. The intent of the law is to upgrade the quality of library service in New Hampshire and to provide us with one of the best in the United States. Key benefits for a small library such as South Hampton are Centralized purchasing and cataloguing, expanded bookmobile and technical consultation service, creation of a common borrower's card useable in any library in the state, and substantial yearly grants-in-aid.

*REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF*

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy — both industrial and recreational — is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The respon-

sibility for adequate fire protection of this great area, 4,350,000 acres, is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.

2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.

3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fire this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of South Hampton in the County of Rockingham, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote upon upon District Affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said South Hampton on Wednesday, March 17, 1965, at Three O'Clock in the afternoon, and to cast ballots from that hour until at least Eight O'Clock in the evening of said day for candidates for the following district offices :

1. Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. Auditors for the ensuing year.

You are also notified to meet at the same place at Eight O'Clock in the evening of the same day to act upon the following subjects :

6. To see what action the District will take relative to the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen.

7. To see if the District will appropriate, in addi-

tion to the original appropriation of \$58,965.15 for 1964-65, a sum of \$4,140 which amount has been authorized as an emergency expenditure by the South Hampton Municipal Budget Committee and the State Department of Education pursuant to RSA 32:10 and authorize the application against this appropriation of any excess revenue which may be received by the School District during the 1964-65 fiscal year so that no additional funds shall be raised by taxation for this purpose.

8. To see if the District will vote to establish a capital reserve fund in accordance with the revised statutes annotated 35:1 to 35:18, as ammended, for the purpose of constructing, reconstructing, and equipping a public school or acquisition of a building to be used as a public school by the District or the acquisition of land for the District.

9. If article (8) is adopted, to see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be placed inthe capital reserve fund created for the purpose of constructinfi reconstructing, and equipping a public school or aquisiton of a building to be used as a public school by the District or the acquisition of a school building site for the District.

10. To see if the District will vote to provide transportation for secondary students from points in South Hampton as the School Board may determine, to the Old Haverhill High School now being used as a secondary school by the town of Amesbury and further to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,200.00 for this purpose or to see what other action the District will take relative to transporting secondary school students.

11. To see if the District will vote to limit the Dis-

trict's obligation for secondary tuition to an amount equal to the tuition being paid by the District for students attending an approved secondary school to which they have been assigned by the School Board.

12. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by the Town; the Budget Committee recommends the sum of \$69,231.06

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

I welcome this opportunity to present my fourth annual report to School Board Members and voters. In this report I shall discuss matters of special interest to voters at this year's Annual District Meeting.

Committee of Eight Continues to Study Union-Wide Problems

Last year's report included considerable discussion of this topic. If one were to review the 1963-64 report it would be noted that last year's planning did result in action in several districts.

The Seabrook School addition is nearing completion and it will provide the needed facilities for increased enrollments. This building project provides a library and a science laboratory as well as seven additional general purpose classrooms. The School Board is planning to employ a librarian so that effective use can be made of that important educational area. Some citizens of Seabrook have expressed the hope that before too long the District will see fit to increase the size of the auditorium-gymnasium, provide their own school lunch program (Seabrook is presently served by the Winnacunnet Lunch Program with the meals and dishes transported daily.) and provide the additional facilities needed to have a well organized physical education program for all elementary pupils.

In Hampton Falls the voters approved sending sixth graders to the Hampton Academy building on a tuition basis. Hampton voters also approved this tui-

tion arrangement for a period not to exceed three years so as to allow further study of district consolidation.

In North Hampton an expanded citizens advisory committee has been continuing to study space problems and this committee working with the School Board has arranged for three specific building proposals to be included in this year's School District Warrant.

At the December joint-board meeting of all school board members within Supervisory Union 21 action was taken to insert an article in the school district warrants of Seabrook, Hampton Falls, Hampton, and North Hampton, which article would make possible the formation of a Cooperative Planning Committee in each district. These four Planning Committees would organize as a Planning Board having the responsibility for studying possible district consolidation to include the development of articles of agreement which could be presented to voters for their approval or disapproval.

Possible District Consolidation

One may reason, since Seabrook has already taken action to build, Rye contemplates action this year, and South Hampton and New Castle are somewhat removed geographically, that any solution advanced would necessarily involve the three Hamptons—North Hampton, Hampton, and Hampton Falls. Seabrook does not have a space problem, but consolidation will be considered by voters because of other benefits which seem significant . . .

The Hampton School District will need to start planning an addition in 1967 with the expectation that space would be available in September of 1969. The

compression is being experienced in grades 1 - 4. North Hampton's compression exists in the upper grades and an addition is needed now.

The three Hamptons (Hampton Falls, Hampton and North Hampton) need to provide additional space to accommodate the increasing numbers of pupils who will be attending public schools within each of the districts. It may be very important to go beyond independent district consideration and give thought to possible ways to jointly solve the space problems for all three districts.

There are significant educational benefits as well as important financial implications. For example, if three districts became one for grades 1 - 8, Hampton might send some elementary students who live near the North Hampton School to that school, and North Hampton could send its Junior High students to Hampton's departmentalized Junior High School which has the facilities needed for a comprehensive Junior High program. This reorganization could make possible greater educational return for the tax dollar invested.

Supplementary Appropriation

This year's budget includes a request for \$4,140.00 to be appropriated in addition to the \$58,965.15 which was appropriated at the March 1964 Annual School District Meeting. The unusual request is required because of the emergency which existed when fire destroyed Amesbury High School and South Hampton's secondary students needed transportation to Haverhill. The old Haverhill High School was reopened for use by the Amesbury School authorities. Actually no more money needs to be raised by taxation for this purpose but the District does need to increase the

appropriation to comply with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law. The reader may wish to note that the \$4,140.00 is shown on both sides of the books, income and expenditures, with the result that no increase is caused in the tax assessment.

This action requiring this additional appropriation has the approval of the Municipal Budget Committee, Joseph W. Crosby, Chairman, and the State Board of Education.

Sweepstakes Revenue

The New Hampshire Sweepstakes Commission distributed approximately \$2,768,000 to New Hampshire school districts and South Hampton received \$2,889.20 on or about December 15, 1964.

The legislation clearly indicates that sweepstakes revenue is to be used "for educational purposes" and there is a considerable disagreement as to whether or not the State Tax Commission should have taken action which in effect caused these funds to reduce the local assessment against taxable property.

I don't propose to discuss all the implications in this report, but there seems to be two thoughts which deserve a reading. First, District A has been going without essential educational services, or supplies, or buildings; perhaps because of insufficient taxable property. This district, District A, should use every cent of sweepstakes income to provide these needed services, supplies or buildings and it is still possible for the voters to use this money providing appropriate action is taken at the March District Meeting.

Let's consider District B — a district with plenty of taxable property where the schools have been blessed with the needed financial support and in all hon-

esty there exists no pressing need. In this second instance sweepstakes revenue would have to go to the District according to the Revised Statutes Annotated 284:21J and it would not seem to me to be in conflict with the statutes if the Tax Commission set the tax rate on the basis of anticipating state funds providing the voters had not designated any special use of the sweepstakes revenue.

This problem will not be carried over into the second year of sweepstakes experience with the same intensity because the income will be anticipated as income to the general fund and the total appropriation will be set with consideration given to the effect this income will have on the tax assessment.

Capital Reserve Fund Proposed

The School Board has included an article in the March School District Warrant which will make it possible for voters to establish a capital reserve fund for the "purpose of constructing, reconstructing, and equipping a public school or acquisition of a building to be used as a public school by the District, or the acquisition of land for the District."

If the fund is established, the voters may transfer sums of money, from time to time, to the fund, which fund will be held in trust by the Trustees of Trust Funds of the Town.

The money transferred to this fund may only be used for the specific purpose stated and only if approved by the voters at an annual district meeting.

The use of sweepstakes revenue for a capital reserve fund may interest voters. It is one way of saving to meet future needs.

Secondary Transportation

A special article, having the approval of the Municipal Budget Committee, brings to a district vote the matter of transportation for secondary students.

It was one thing to expect students to provide their own transportation to Amesbury High School and quite another to require them to make their own separate arrangements to get to Haverhill. It seems to me the change of location requires transportation be provided if secondary education is to be truly available to all students concerned. It is my hope that you will see fit to support this special article.

Tuition Liability

Another special article in the 1965 School District Warrant warns voters of action which may be taken to limit the amount of tuition which will be paid by the District for secondary students.

Action under this article may fix the District's obligation to the tuition rate charged by Amesbury or some other secondary school designated by the School Board for secondary students who reside in South Hampton.

This does not mean that a student may not attend some other approved secondary school but it does mean that the District will only accept the financial responsibility up to the amount charged by Amesbury or some other such school designated by the School Board.

A Regard For Education

Today it is more and more apparent that the quality of one's education in large measure determines a person's earning power as well as the contribution

he can make to his family and to society in general.

We as adults have a responsibility to show through our example the regard we all must have for knowledge, truth, and purposeful living.

I appreciate the opportunity to write on these matters for the education of youth requires our serious consideration .

Thank you for your support of education — it is needed and appreciated.
