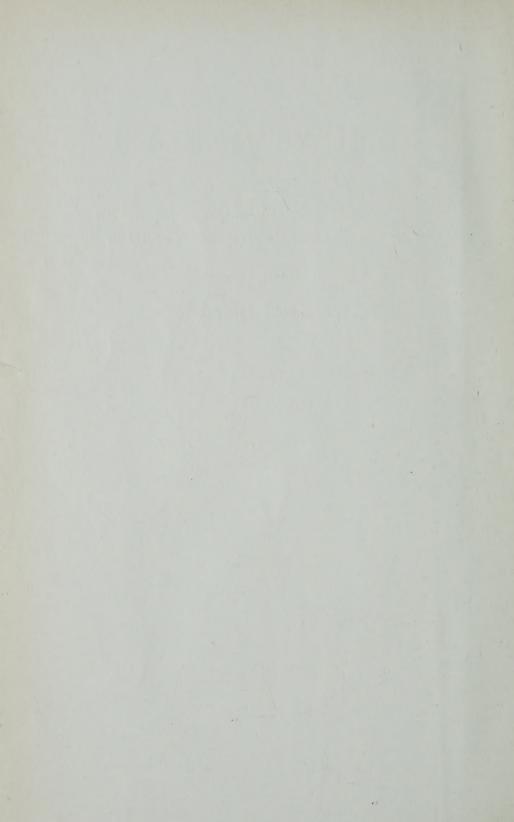

# **TOWN WARRANT**

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sunapee, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at I. O. O. F. Hall, in said Sunapee, on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To elect a Town Clerk for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Auditors, Agents and Committees, or other Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3.  $T_0$  elect one Selectman for three years and all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$4,000 to pay on its bonded debt and \$1,420 for interest on its notes and bonds and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,800 for Town Officers' Salaries, \$700 for Town Officers' Expenses, \$300 for Election and Registration, \$100 for the Municipal Court, \$200 for Repairs and Expenses of Town Buildings, \$900 for the Police Department, \$50 for the Town Dump, \$15 for Vital Statistics, \$2,800 for the Fire Department, \$100 for the Health Department, \$1,800 for the District Nurse Association and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$8,800 for Highways and Bridges, \$3,500 for Road Oil, \$2,000 for Tractor and Roller Maintenance, \$5,000 for Snow Removal and Sanding, \$1,700 for Street Lights and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$305.60 for the Library, \$2,000 for Town Poor, \$400 for the care of its Cemeteries, \$5,500 for the Water Department (including debt and interest), and to set aside from the highway appropriation \$700 for Class V Town Road Aid and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new motor grader, raise or appropriate a sum not to exceed \$6,000 and to issue short term notes for this amount upon such terms and conditions as are for the best interests of the Town and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$170 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other Towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region, said appropriation to be disbursed by the Selectmen.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500 for Recreational Activities and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$400 for White Pine Blister Rust Control and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to elect the following Town Officers by Australian ballot in the future: Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Water Commissioners, Road Agents, Cemetery Commissioners.

Article 14. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the years 1940 and 1941 and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to purchase from Arthur C. Slade a certain parcel of land in Georges Mills, raise money to purchase the same and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to insure town employees and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# **REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER**

Medical science has done much towards eradicating contagious and infectious diseases, many having been fully controlled by inoculations and treatment. Tuberculosis is on the wane and if we all stand together as a state with our influence and money, this disease will soon be wiped out. Only two cases of scarlet fever and one case of measles were cared for during the year. One case of scarlet fever was in a home with five small children, but this case was kept from the rest of the family and being well cared for there was no spreading of the disease. Sunapee is fortunate in having a resident doctor who is a big asset to our health program, and our resident nurse should be given much credit for keeping a watchful eye on our school children and caring for the sick and shut-ins, the poor and needy. Monthly analysis, by the State Board of Health, of our water supplies at Sunapee and Georges Mills have shown no contamination, but in every instance have been reported good. A health officer has many matters called to his attention and duties to perform that should not be mentioned in a report of this nature, but suffice it to say that in forty years of experience it has not all been pleasant sailing, although I have enjoyed making the voyage thus far and ask your cooperation if I continue a short time longer.

In April a skin test for tuberculosis was given to fifty-six high school pupils. This test was made possible by the N. H. Tuberculosis Association, and was given by Dr. Robert Kerr, who was assisted by Miss Cluffie Gobie, County Tuberculosis Nurse. Four pupils showed positive reactions which were followed up with x-rays, and from which there were no positive findings. Such a test, in our ever present fight against tuberculosis is a valuable health assistance to our school children and our community. We should be pleased with findings of this test.

In June a Child Health Conference for pre-school children was sponsored by the State Board of Health. Dr. Munro of Sunapee and Dr. Roe of Newport gave physical examinations to forty children, and fourteen children were inoculated against diphtheria. As in past years the assistance of the ladies of our local organizations and townspeople helped to make this conference successful.

During the past year twenty-two school children had eye examinations. Glasses were obtained for twelve and the remainder were cases which needed rechecking. Two pre-school children, having unusual eye conditions, are receiving treatment.

During the summer six school children and two pre-school children had removal of tonsils and adenoids.

Our contagious disease record for school children for the past year was an exceptionally fortunate one. There occurred one case of scarlet fever and three cases of chicken-pox. The cooperation of parents and teachers was, in a great measure, responsible for this record.

In December one hundred fifty-three school children had their hearing tested and four cases of defective hearing were found, which is an unusually low percentage. The cases of defective hearing will be followed up with the hope of obtaining improvement in hearing acuity. This test was made possible by the State Department of Education.

A complete physical examination was given to one hundred and ten school children by Dr. John Munro in December. This is an objective for which we have been striving in our school health program. A complete record of the examination, showing the defects found and the recommendations offered, has been given to the parents of the children examined. Dr. Harold Lee, an orthopedic specialist, examined the children in whom Dr. Munro found bone defects, such as curvature of the spine, poor posture, weak and flat arches. I would like to stress that the ultimate success of such a splendid physical examination will depend upon the cooperation of the parents in following the corrections recommended and which, in many cases, are imperative to the health of their children. It is our hope to have each school child given a physical examination every other year. Below is a summary of the defects found in the examination this year:

# SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Sunapee School Board:

I herewith submit my sixth annual report as superintendent of schools.

### **Program of Studies**

The final stage in establishing a mechanic arts course in our high school has been reached this year by the introduction of a course in Practical Electricity. This new course treats of the following topics: Magnetism, conductors and insulators, meters, generators, motors, lighting and power circuits, electricity in the automobile, chemical action and the techniques of handling electrical appliances, including ordinary repairs on household equipment. A few tools and supplies have been added to the equipment already provided so that our shop is now very adequately equipped. Eleven boys are taking the course in practical electricity and fourteen in practical mechanics (or general shop). These figures show a great interest in shop work since there are only approximately thirty boys in the high school.

Last summer a large door was cut in the wall of the shop next to the playground to afford entrance for automobiles. This is necessary for the course in automobile mechanics since the boys should get actual practice on a real automobile.

The program of studies of the high school, as well as of grades 7 and 8, is included in this report. Many courses are given in alternate years in order to reduce the teaching load each year. This is the only way that so varied a program can be handled by a limited number of teachers.

#### **Teachers' Meetings**

A series of teachers' meetings was held during the fall term to consider better speech. These meetings were conducted by Prof. Edmund A. Cortez of New Hampshire University through the cooperation of the Division of University Extension. Prof. Cortez most interestingly and effectively described the technique of developing better speech habits.

### Health

The pupils this year had the advantage of a complete physical examination by Dr. John H. Munro, assisted by the school nurse, Miss Elizabeth Donovan. Hearing was tested by means of the audiometer loaned by the State Board of Education. A visiting state official said that the examination in Sunapee was the best in the state. To give such a complete physical check-up to every pupil in school would require more time than is readily available so only those pupils in the even-numbered grades were examined. Each year the even-numbered grades will be examined, so as a child progresses normally through school he will be checked every other year. For normal children this is sufficient. Special cases requiring immediate attention are examined regardless of grade. The audiometer test was given to every child in school.

#### Playground

Through the thoughtful generosity of Hon. John H. Bartlett, Ex-Governor of our state, we have acquired the playground adjacent to the school. Mr. Bartlett has donated this playground to the Sunapee School District and moreover has given a substantial sum to take care of grading the land. This gift is a valuable addition to the school property and is much appreciated.

Last summer the dining-room, and the rooms housing grades 3 and 4, 5 and 6, were redecorated. New front doors were installed on the auditorium.

The school has been conducted harmoniously and efficiently because of the hearty cooperation of all concerned.

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# SCHOOL WARRANT

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District of Sunapee qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the I. O. O. F. Hall in said district on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, 1940, at onethirty o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To choose one or more Auditors and such other Officers and Agents as the voters may judge necessary.

Article 6. To hear and act upon the reports of the School Board, Treasurer, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen.

Article 7. To see if the district will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district as determined by the School Board in its annual report, namely \$19,943.25.

Article 8. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,500.00 to be paid on outstanding bonds and \$1,264.37 to pay interest on outstanding bonds.

Article 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
