TENTATIVE TOWN WARRANT**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Tamworth Town Hall in said Tamworth, on Tuesday, the eighth (8th) day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

4. Town Officers' Salaries. \$2650.00 approved by Finance Committee.

5. Town Officers' Expenses. \$750.00 approved by Finance Committee.

6. Election and Registration Expenses. \$150.00 approved by Finance Committee.

7. Expenses Town Hall and other buildings, including \$25.00 for the Garden Club and painting Town Hall. \$500.00 has been approved by the Finance Committee.

8. Police Department. \$200.00 has been approved by Finance Committee.

9. Fire Department, including Firemen's Insurance and Forest Fires.. \$2000.00 has been approved by the Finance Committee.

10. Printing. \$500.00 has been approved.

11. Insurance and Bonding. \$750.00 has been approved.

12. Civil Defense. \$150.00 has been approved.

13. Health Department including hospitals. \$2100.00 has been approved.

14. Vital Statistics. \$50.00 has been approved.

15. Town Dump. \$500.00 has been approved.

16. Summer Highway Maintenance. \$12,100.00 has been approved. This is broken down as follows: Roads \$4,500.00 — Tarvia \$5,000.00 — Bridges \$2,000.00 — Bushes \$600.00.

17. Winter Maintenance. \$6,500.00 has been approved by the Finance Committee, including salt and sanding, with the further recommendation that no snow be plowed until two inches have accumulated. The Selectmen recommend \$7,500.00 with no special provisions for the amount of snow to be plowed.

18. Street Lighting. \$1,500.00 has been approved.

19. General Expenses of Highway Dept. \$2,000.00 has been approved.

20. Town Road Aid. Town's Share \$860.43 has been approved. (The State's Share is \$5,736.17.)

21. Libraries. \$400.00 has been approved, including the amount required by law.
22. Town Needy. \$2,500.00 has been approved.
23. Old Age Assistance. \$4,500.00 has been approved.
24. Memorial Day. \$50.00 has been approved.
25. Aid to Soldiers and their families. \$100.00 has been approved.
26. Recreation. \$650.00 has been approved. \$300.00 for Tamworth Outing Club and \$350.00 for Red Cross Swimming transportation.
27. Cemeteries. \$500.00 has been approved.
28. Damages and Legal Expenses, including Damage by Dogs. \$75.00 has been approved.
29. Social Security. \$300.00 has been approved.
30. Interest of all kinds. \$500.00 has been approved.
31. Watering Tub. \$5.00 has been approved.
32. Payment on Long Term Note. \$2,000.00 has been approved.
33. County Tax. \$7,500.00 has been approved.
34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$215.00 which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town, for the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the region. Not approved.

35. To see if the Town will vote to approve the appointment by the Finance Committee of a special committee to submit recommendations to the Road Agent about general town highway conditions. Robert Eastwick, Kenneth Wiggin and Walter Fortier have been recommended subject to Town's approval.

36. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the so-called Plant Road No. 99 on state records, and located on the road to Madison from West Ossipee going toward the railroad.

37. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the so-called Knox Road, No. 106 on State Records, and located on the right hand side of the road to Ossipee Lake from West Ossipee.

38. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a part of the town road starting at Herbert Gilman's Homestead up through the middle of his field to Sanger Lot No. 6.

39. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the so-called Tappan Field Road, No. 80 on state records, and starting at the Bemis School in South Tamworth.

40. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a part of the Durrell Road, starting at a point called "Gallop's Turn," to the foot of the hills, or what was the intersection with the Osgood Road very near the Osgood bridge.

41. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the so-called Moores Pond Road.

42. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the purpose of moving the Soldiers' Monument at the school house corner in

Tamworth Village, to a new location on the site of the new school.

43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

44. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any town property acquired through Tax Collector's deed.

45. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time of assessment on April 1st.

46. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting, and to vote at what hour to close the polls.

As we complete the reports for 1954, we hardly wish to linger over them, for anticipation of what the new year will bring, in the form of a new school building and facilities. It means so much to all of us. And yet we know that a retrospect is helpful.

Among the new projects of the year, the classes held with the 7th and 8th grade girls was very much enjoyed. An understanding of home-making was the underlying motive in choice of subjects.

In June, an orientation day for the Fall's first-graders was organized in cooperation with Mrs. Ethel Berry. The day's program included a health check-up of the children with mothers present, as well as a sample of classroom routine. All were enthusiastic over the accomplishments, and we are sure this will become an annual feature.

The continued high number of postural defects among the school children presented a problem for correction. In the Spring, Miss Bullock, a physio-therapist with Crippled Children's services, was persuaded to make a special visit to our school to work with these children. This effort has now grown into the "Treatment Center" held in Ossipee, where all from this area may receive help without the need for a doctor being present.

Appreciation is extended to the Laconia Cerebral Palsy Center for services by its speech therapist, Mr. Landsaw. Four of our children have attended weekly

classes with him for special speech training, with much improvement noted.

At the other extreme of the age scale, we try to give special consideration to our "elder citizens." With Medical Science lengthening the life span by ten to fifteen years, and New Hampshire rating highest with it's ratio of persons over 80, Tamworth has a large responsibility in keeping these folk happy. There is no organized effort along this line, but after all, the small, individual effort counts most.

Howdy Folks. This is your friend smokey the fire prevention bear talking for Earle Remick, your local fire warden. You know how he is always asking you people to take it easy with fire in the woods? Well, he wants you to know that forest fires decreased last year. He knows it did rain some but it was the help of all you people who are giving their time and money and carefulness to prevent this shameful waste of our woodlands. But please remember this folks, forest fires still do a lot of damage each year. And we got to work and work to whittle them down to our size. So when you're around forest areas, crush out cigarettes, hold your match till it's cold, drown your campfire and drown it again. If you have to burn grass or brush or rubbish, ask about the law first, also get your permit from your warden and last, have plenty of help handy. Please remember a permit is required for all open fires whether in an incinerator, or on a piece of plowed ground. Your local forest fire warden will help you in your burning problem and he is as near as your telephone. Please call him.

Each year forest fires destroy enough saw-timber to build all the homes in a city of one-half million people.

Each year forest fires eat up enough saw-timber to make ties for 50,000 miles of railroad tracks.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Tamworth:

During the school year 1953-54 the teachers in the Tamworth School were:

Mrs. Elizabeth Brady	Grades 7 and 8
Mr. Aaron Barnard	Grades 5 and 6
Miss Margaret King	Grades 3 and 4
Mrs. Dorothy Remick	Grade 2
Mrs. Ethel Berry	Grade 1

At the beginning of the year Mr. Harold Gibbs was principal and taught Grades 7 and 8. He resigned early in November and was succeeded by Mrs. Brady, who completed the year. In September the members of the teaching staff returned to their respective positions for the current year. Added to the staff is Principal Ronald Corkum, who came here from Freeport, Maine. Mr. Corkum is a veteran of World War II, a graduate of Farmington Teachers' College, and has had several years of teaching experience. Mr. Corkum takes care of all administrative work, teaches general science and is devoting much of his time to remedial work. The Tamworth School has a staff of very competent teachers, with high professional qualifications, and devoted to the welfare of the children.

During the year 1953-54 the Tamworth School enrolled a total of 177 pupils, with an average daily membership of 162.4. The school opened in September of the current year with 167 pupils. The latest census returns indicate that the number of elementary pupils will remain quite constant until 1959, when larger numbers will enter the first grade.

There were 50 high school pupils enrolled during 1953-54, with an average membership of 48. For the current year there are 58 Tamworth pupils enrolled at

Kennett High School and one each at Fryeburg Academy and Brewster Academy. Nine of these are seniors. The 16 members of the eighth grade are planning on attending high school, which will make a total of approximately 67 high school pupils in 1955-56. The total membership in the four elementary grades, which will be the high school group by September 1958, is 78.

Current rate of high school tuition is \$285.00, and the announced rate for 1955-56 is \$290.00. It should be a source of particular satisfaction to Tamworth citizens that a study of the high school enrollment during the past three years shows that only three pupils have dropped out of school before graduation, other than a very few who left for reasons of health or have moved from town.

The health program under the very capable direction of Mrs. Rosalind Nystedt, R. N., is a very valuable service. The nature and scope of her work is shown by her report which appears elsewhere.

The large numbers of pupils in Grades 1 and 2 made it necessary to rent a room outside of the school building to house one of the grades. It was necessary to continue, for the current year, with the rental of this room, and an additional room for the remedial classes. New furniture had to be purchased for these rooms.

The school lunch program, under the sponsorship of the P. T. A., is serving very fine, nourishing, balanced meals. Early in the year the federal government sponsored an additional milk program which makes it possible for the pupils to obtain an increased number of bottles of milk at a very low price. Reports show that there is a large number of the pupils taking advantage of this opportunity.

It has been my pleasure to work with the School

Board and building committee for over a year on the new school project. Because I have been so closely associated with this group of citizens since its inception, I am probably in a better position than anyone else to appreciate the time and effort this committee has devoted to the project. There have been countless committee meetings of long hours devoted to a very careful study of every aspect of the building project. Professional authorities have been consulted frequently and every problem has been carefully and thoroughly studied before any decision has been made. In addition to attendance of committee meetings, each member has spent much time on duties allocated to him by the committee. Your committee deserves the highest commendation and the appreciation of the community. I know of no better example of civic duty performed admirably and without compensation. A great many other people, too numerous to mention here, contributed of their time and means most generously. The new school building will be a monument to their efforts.

The supply of qualified teachers is so inadequate as to be critical. National authorities have reported that for the current year the country needed 170,000 new teachers, but only 35,000 graduates came out of college prepared to teach. This national situation is reflected in the need and supply ratio in this state. Competent young men and women should be urged to enter the teaching profession.

The fine cooperation of the School Board, teachers, pupils, parents, and citizens is most sincerely appreciated.

REPORT OF THE BUILDING COMMITTEE

This committee is happy to report that the contract for the new school has been awarded to Guthie McCord Company, Freeport, L. I., New York and Pembroke, N. H. Persons interested in getting work on the new school should contact Mr. Peter Guthie at Pembroke at once. Work is scheduled to begin as soon as weather permits, and the contract calls for completion by August 10, 1955.

The artesian well has been drilled to a depth of 291 feet, and at the time the committee ran a test on the flow of water it was impossible to pump more than 60 feet of water out of the well. This should give a flow of something like 18 gallons per minute at the top of the well, and this would be considerably more at the bottom.

We wish to thank the townspeople who gave of their time in clearing the south portion of the grounds. This was a wonderful exhibition of community spirit, and shows what can be done. We also wish to acknowledge the contribution of the Tamworth Foundation for its part in the clearing of the north portion of the land. In all about ten acres have been cleared. As you drive past you can easily see what a wonderful playground this is going to make.

The bond issue was given to the First New Hampshire Corporation, and all of the bonds have been sold.

The School Board in letters to the members of the building committee has asked that the committee continue to serve with it in an advisory capacity. This we are most happy to do.
