

WATER RESERVOIR

The photograph on the opposite page shows the completed dam with water beginning to fill the reservoir basin.

The reservoir is located on the hill approximately one thousand feet north of Church Road, on the old Riddle Farm now owned by Mr. John R. Burleigh. The dam is one hundred feet thick at the base and twenty feet wide at the top, creating a reservoir three hundred feet long, one hundred feet wide at the dam, and thirteen feet deep at the deepest point. It is estimated that the reservoir will impound three quarters of a million gallons of water, which will be available for fire protection for the village, from a hydrant located on Church Road.

Mr. Burleigh surveyed the entire area, supervised and paid for the construction of the dam. The only cost to the Town is the expense of the hydrant, and cost of purchasing and installing the pipe, shut-off valve and fittings, etc. needed to transmit the water from the reservoir to the hydrant. Mr. Burleigh has granted to the Town, an Easement Deed, which will forever permit the Town to lay pipe across his land, make repairs and draw water for fire protection.

The dam is finished and the reservoir is now full. One hundred and sixty feet of ten inch cement-lined pipe has been laid under the dam and shut-off valve placed in the line below the dam. The Town has paid for this out of the appropriation made under Article 18 of the Town Warrant for the year 1949.

The size of the pipe installed was determined by a competent water works engineer who made a thorough study of the entire project, and will provide for several additional hydrants if the Town should decide to install them.

The Town is most grateful for the cooperation of the Manchester Water Works, and the voluntary services of the engineer, Mr. Clarence Ahlgren.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate the sum of \$75 to engage a stenographer to make a transcript of the Town meeting (By Petition)

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriation for same:

- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of the poor, \$3,000.00 for assistance to the aged, and \$1,000.00 for aid to soldiers and their families.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 to rebuild culvert and road over Bowman Brook on Cemetery Road.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes up to the sum of \$15,000.00 if needed.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to expend the full amount of the Capital Reserve Fund towards the purchase of the grader.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,542.90 to complete the purchase of the grader.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 for maintenance of highways and bridges and for the other necessary expenses of the Town.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the Library.
- Article 11. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for care of the clock on the Church.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and approprivate sum of \$932.31 for the construction of Class V highways, the State to contribute \$6,215.40.

- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 for the tarring of Class V highways, under the direction of the Selectmen.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day and patriotic purposes.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$50.00 to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 Communities of this Region, or act in relation thereto.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the care of the New Cemetery; \$25.00 for pumping water for same; \$100.00 for the care of Joppa Cemetery; \$50.00 for the care of the Old Cemetery on the Back River Road; and \$25.00 for the care of the Beals Cemetery.
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the maintenance and replacement of power equipment used in the Town Cemeteries.
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the care of the Town Dump.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to gravel Class V Roads.
- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to pay for the rental on two hydrants.
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for damages and legal expenses including dog damage.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Civil Defense.

- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to be used in cooperation with State and Federal funds, for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the Town.
- Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for interest on temporary loans.
- Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to allow the collector of taxes additional compensation for services in collecting the state head tax and to fix the amount thereof.
- Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the care of the Memorial Plot in front of the Town Hall.
- Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to complete the water reservoir project.
- Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for recreational equipment for the youth of the Town.
- Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$112.50 for the installation of two street lights on Hersey Street, and one street light on Plummer Road at Ruth Street.
- Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the purchase of resuscitator and equipment.
- Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$514.00 for the purchase of two smoke and gas masks.
- Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of seven members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, as

amended, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board members shall consist of one Selectman and six other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Sections 1-15, Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, as amended.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to provide funds for the work of the Planning Board.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following regulation:

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$200.00 in Trust from Florence H. Patten, the interest to be expended for the care of the Samuel H. Patten lot located in the New Bedford Center Cemetery.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to abandon that section of the reclassified Horace Greeley Highway between Station 203+50 and Station 216+00 as shown on plan of Amherst-Bedford F. A. F188(2)F123(4) in the records of the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways.

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to abandon that section of the reclassified Horace-Greeley Highway between Station 72+50 and Station 87+50 and between Station 129+00 and Station 146+00 as shown on plan of Bedford F.A.F123(5) in the records of the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways.

- Article 39. To see if the Town will vote to accept Fourth St. for a distance of 350 ft., 40 ft. wide.
- Article 40. To see if the Town will vote to accept Line Road, 300 ft. by 50 ft. wide.
- Article 41. To see if the Town will vote to accept Plains Road, 300 ft. by 30 ft. wide.
- Article 42. To see if the Town will vote to accept Hersey St. beyond present accepted length to Harriman St. at the Town Line, 50 ft. wide.
- Article 43. To see if the Town will vote to accept Bedford St. for a distance of 350 ft. east of Whittemore St. by 30 ft. wide.
- Article 44. To see if the Town will vote to accept Whittemore St. from Hersey St. to Seebee St., by 50 ft. wide.
- Article 45. To see if the Town will vote to accept Seebee St. for a distance of 450 ft. beyond present accepted length by 30 ft. wide
- Article 46. To see if the Town will vote to accept Savoie St. northerly from Donald St. for a distance of 493 ft. by 50 ft. wide.
- Article 47. To see what action the Town will take regarding the playing of beano under the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised Laws as inserted in Chapter 292 of the Laws of 1949.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDENS

Team Work Will Do The Job:

Team work has won victories from time immemorial for families, towns, cities, states and nations. Team work is the highest form and most democratic example of cooperation. Without team work, America and Americans would never have achieved the greatness that is theirs. We are all aware of its power and appeal. It is no less needed now than in the past.

Team work among those who live, work and recreate in and near woodlands, is vital. There never was a time when our woodlands as a whole were in such precarious condition as they

are now.

Since the hurricane, nearly 900,000 acres of slash have been added to our already sizeable slash problem. If we are to avoid unnecessary trouble with fire in our woodlands area everyone must cooperate — we must have team work. The remedy is a simple one —

You and You and You and You

Must secure the required permit from local forest fire warden before burning.

Must use necessary precautions while burning or smoking in or near woodlands,

Must not throw lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from vehicles moving along highways.

Otherwise you might well contribute to a costly and damaging fire. And don't forget that fire might destroy your own property!

Remember — Only YOU and YOU and YOU can prevent fire!

The Selectmen, Bedford, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:-

A considerable progress has been made during the past year in the planning of Civil Defense for Bedford. Principally, the crystallization of thought resulting from the meeting of many ideas and some experiments during the two years of our work thereon has produced the Civil Defense Plan for Bedford, dated January 1, 1953.

This plan was well enough thought of by the State Director of Civil Defense that he has had it reproduced in Concord and distributed to the Directors of each of our approximately 250 towns in New Hampshire.

The Bedord Plan is believed sound as far as it goes although there can be little doubt that further thought, experience and information will lead to basic modifications from time to time. These, however, will be kept to a minimum as it is conceived that the principal work now necessary lies in the field of elaboration or the supplying of details of procedure. For instance, it is expected that an exceptionally large percentage of school children would accompany any movement of refugees into this area in case of disaster elsewhere in New England. That some method of incorporating them into our school system be thought out and planned for in advance is imperative if confusion, waste of time, effort and money are to be avoided. The possibilities of utilizing existing school buildings more fully, of adapting other structures to school uses, the recruiting of teachers, the prompt obtaining of the necessary school furniture, texts and supplies and, above all, the exploration of the channels through which all this must be financed are problems not to be put off. The securance of food, its transportation and distribution is another of many details that must be worked out.

During the week of December 8-13, 1953, I attended the course of instruction at the National Civil Defense School at Olney, Maryland; this without expense to the town. Although most of the instruction there was devoted to the major target areas, there was much of value given in connection with the

overall picture which includes us. Too, the devoted labors of a sincere, capable, hard working and inspired faculty was very heartening. Not everywhere is Civil Defense taken casually.

Our enrollment in Bedford has materially increased this year, yet many more can be utilized effectively in our various Units. The suport already given has been most gratifying and with its continuance much more can be added to the excellent progress already attained.

ANNUAL REPORT OF BEDFORD SCHOOL BOARD

1952 - 1953

Possibly the most important problem facing your school board during the past year has been the increased attendance in our schools. Most of our classrooms are overcrowded as far as present day desirable standards and the principles of good teaching practices are concerned. We have been coping with this problem for the past three years and have found a temporary solution by the consolidation of classrooms and the complete usage of all available space. It is now very evident that the incoming class in the Fall of this year will again increase our attendance by approximately twenty pupils. The only way we can possibly handle this situation is to increase still farther the overcrowded condition we now have or by building additional classroom space. It is self evident that this building could not be accomplished in time to accommodate the attendance increase by this Fall, therefore, before September 1954 there must be some type of classrooms made available. A thorough study of this fact will have to be made and brought to the attention of the school district in the immediate future.

We are very fortunate in our schools to have teachers of such ability and conscientiousness. This year we were able to secure the services of Mr. Ralph Linton whom we have made principal of the entire school system and who has done much to help us by working out many scholastic problems. In order to maintain the same ratio of wages with our surrounding areas, it has been necessary to increase the salary of our teachers.

The upkeep of our schools has continued so that, with the exception of three which will be done this year, all classrooms have been recently redecorated presenting attractive pleasant surroundings so conducive to the mental well being of the student.

A great deal of credit is due to our janitors for their interest and cooperation in helping to maintain the buildings in good condition and repair. We have asked for a small, well deserved, increase in the janitors' pay for the coming year. We feel that by their efforts our general maintenance costs are kept at a minimum.

The schood lunch program is very satisfactory. The lunches are thoughtfully and tastefully prepared and presented by the cooks under the supervision of Mrs. Smend. Those of you who have visited the schools and seen this program in operation undoubtedly feel as we do about it.

It is gratifying to note the interest in our school problems shown by the Donald Street and Bedford P. T. A. Organizations. It is such cooperation which greatly helps your school board and provides a medium through which they are able to have an interchange of ideas and opinions with the townspeople.

We appreciate the extra time Mr. Hastings, our school superintendant, has spent with the Bedford School Land Committee and his interest and understanding of our school problems.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Bedford School Board:

In submitting my fourth annual report on the condition of your schools it is a real pleasure to be able to report that the past year has been marked by outstanding cooperation from town officials, P.T.A., parents and teachers. This should be the case, because without it a good educational climate cannot be provided. However, in too many districts, the schools have become the scape goat for relieving the many tensions and anxieties that exist today.

The two teachers new to the system, Miss Claudette Jean and Mr. Ralph Linton have proved to be very capable. They have become a real part of the teaching staff and are like the rest of your staff, carrying on the tradition of providing the best education possible for the children. Bedford can well feel proud to boast such a fine group of teachers at a time when many districts are feeling the extreme shortage of good elementary teachers.

Mr. Linton is assuming more and more of the duties normally handled by a principal. As the problems presented by having three schools rather than one central school under his jurisdiction are ironed out, I am sure you will be more and more certain of the wisdom that prompted such a move. Already the effects are beginning to be noticed and favorable reports from parents have been brought to my attention.

The major concern confronting the School District continues to be centered around the problem of how best to provide adequate housing for the increasing enrollment. Your present schools are being maintained excellently but every available room is now being used. There are four rooms with more than 30 pupils to a teacher and one other room housing more than 25 pupils.

Next fall you will be forced to make a decision on whether to try to find another room in town, make a combination second and third grade or keep straight grades and have 37 pupils with the second grade teacher. No alternative is ideal and very serious thought should be given toward formulating a concrete proposal for relief in the very near future. It appears very likely that two years hence at least one more room will become a necessity.

I wish to take this opportunity to publicly thank the members of the Bedford School Board for the help, encouragement, and advice they have given me this past year. I consider it a real privilege to be working with three such fine people.

REPORT OF LAND COMMITTEE

The Committee has had numerous meetings and viewed many different sites. In helping us make a sound decision we called on a representative from the State Office of Education, a Manchester Bank Appraiser and an Architect.

We found that the available sites were even more scarce than we had anticipated. Practically all of the land suitable for building purposes are either too expensive or not available.

After due consideration, the Committee recommends that the land now owned by Albert Hodgman and Arthur Bostwick and adjacent to the Stevens-Buswell School be purchased by the School District for a future School Building and playground use.

This land comprising approximately eight acres, when added to the present school property, will give us adequate area for future expansion.

It is the most economical property we viewed. It is in the geographic center of Town and on a black surfaced road. It would be free from many highway hazards yet conveniently reached by school busses. It could be developed more easily and more economically than the other possible sites.

We trust that the results of our deliberations will meet with the approval of the School District.
