To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House in said Campton on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance of its highways and bridges and make appropriation of the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900 for Campton Cemetery, also to clean up and fence other cemeteries in Town.
- 6. That the sum of \$500 be raised and appropriated for the repairing and painting the fence, and repairing and straightening the gate posts of Campton Cemetery (by petition).
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Memorial Day.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the White Mountain Region Association.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the Campton Volunteer Fire Department.

- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the new Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents and officers heretofore chosen.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

According to State law the polls cannot be closed before 6 P. M.

101 children had the four topical fluoride treatments given at the Fluorine Clinic at Plymouth.

Six children had dental work through the Red Cross.

A hearing aid was purchased by the Campton Red Cross to replace the one loaned the preceding year by the N. H. Hearing Society of Manchester.

Milk was furnished for one family by the Red Cross.

Two pairs of glasses and four vision examinations were given through the Sight Conservation Department of the Public Welfare.

General health habits are emphasized in each school through morning inspection, stories, pictures, games, etc.

Again I take this opportunity to thank the School Board, Supt. Rollins, Teachers, Parents and Children for their help in this program.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS—CAMPTON

The Campton School Board:

My ninth annual report as your superintendent of schools is now submitted for your information and that of citizens of Campton. The report presents a discussion of the major problems before the school district, and such statistical data as may be useful to the people of this town.

At the beginning of the present school year, both rooms at Beebe River had an unusually small number of pupils registered. The Center School had an excessive registration for one teacher to handle, with all grades. The School Board very wisely decided to transport pupils of Grades 6, 7, and 8 from the Center to the Beebe River School. This made the registration in grades 5 to 8 at Beebe, and grades 1 to 5 in the Center School nearly equal. At the same time it brought advantages to the pupils remaining at the Center School that could not otherwise have been enjoyed. Because of fewer grades to instruct, the teacher can do more effective work.

Transportation in Campton is something that varies considerably from year to year. It happens this year that we are incurring much heavier transportation expense than had been planned when our budget was drawn up. A considerable part of increased transportation cost is due to the assignment of children from the Center to Beebe River, but, in my opinion, the benefits received by the children make the expenditure justifiable.

A committee of teachers, consisting of one representative from each school district outside of Plymouth, made a study of report cards, and recommended a revised reporting system for our elementary schools. The new report cards were issued in December covering the first 12 weeks of school. The marking system and the information given about pupils represent a cross section of desires expressed by teachers and parents whom they interviewed. We have tried to

make the reports as comprehensive and informative as possible without making them too complicated. The wishes and suggestions of parents are always welcomed to help us in later changes, should they seem necessary.

Perhaps this is a good time to suggest that the Campton School District ought to begin looking ahead and considering future school needs. We now have six scattered schools employing eight teachers. While those schools are able to accommodate all children living in Campton at the present time, a situation might easily develop where there would not be comfortable accommodations for all children living in the town. If it were possible for all of our children to attend a central school, they would profit from many educational values that are not possible in our present organization. In such a school the same number of teachers could take care of all pupils with a greatly decreased grade load. Four of our teachers are now responsible for four grades each, and the other four are responsible for a maximum of eight grades. The matter of cost is one that must always be seriously considered. The neighboring town of Thornton faces possible building needs, perhaps more urgent than those in Campton. I should like to see a joint committee from Thornton and Campton make a thorough study of school needs, and investigate the feasibility of joint action by both school districts. Such details as location, type and size of school building, transportation, employment of teachers, and division of maintenance and operating costs could be studied and reported back by a committee. As I see it, both towns ought to consider school reorganization. Neither town is probably able financially to undertake a building program alone. Joint action between two towns might enable each one to have better school service and to get for the children better opportunities, which both communities want for their children, but which one cannot afford alone.

Salaries throughout the state, as well as the entire country, show an upward trend. Teachers graduating from teacher training institutions are expecting higher initial salaries each year. This in turn has an affect on the salaries of experienced teachers now in service.

Constantly increasing living costs and tax deductions put those who are on fixed incomes at a disadvantage. While the results of the latest salary survey in New Hampshire are not yet available, it is my belief that salaries throughout Supervisory Union No. 48 are not equal to the state average. We must all be aware of what this situation would mean if replacements became necessary.

The school calendar for 1952-53 is presented in a little more detail than usual. The days of the week when certain holidays occur and the requirements of the State Board of Education that schools must be in session 180 days during a school year, have to be considered in making up a calendar. It is never wise to establish a calendar that does not provide for slightly riore time than the minimum of 180 school days.

While few statistics have been included in this report, it has been thought best to give a limited number. Those that were included may give people of the town information and the answers to some of their questions.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation of the fine cooperation given at all times by the Campton School Board, the loyal and efficient work of the teachers, and the friendliness of pupils in the schools.
