#### WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

The Polls Will Be Open From 11 A.M. to 7 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Columbia, in the County of Coos, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Columbia Town Hall on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at 7:15 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

<u>Article 1.</u> To vote to bring in ballots for election of Town Officers to be elected by ballot for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers as required.

<u>Article 3.</u> To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50,000.00 for Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,800.00 for extinguishing fires in said Town.

<u>Article 5.</u> To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for standby fire protection to the Town of Stratford.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 to help support the operation of the Colebrook Communications Center.

<u>Article 7.</u> To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 to help support the services of the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 to help support the services of the Vershire Center.

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Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$600.00 for maintenance of Ambulance District A-1 services.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,200.00 for the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital Association to cover medical emergencies.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 for operating expenses and matching funds of the Northern Coos Community Health Association.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for mowing and maintaining cemeteries.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$527.00 for the North Country Council.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$473.00 for support of the Community Outreach Program.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 for the support of the poor.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$75,000.00 for the maintenance of summer roads and bridges.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$30,900 for the maintenance of winter roads.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$27,000.00 for solid waste disposal.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1600.00 for the Colebrook Library.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for appraisal upkeep.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for maintenance of the Tax map.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to open and maintain on a year-round basis that portion of Bungy Road running from Stoddard Road to the Fred Smith property, a distance of approximately 0.5 mile. (By Petition.) Article 23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land or money to be deposited into the conservation fund for the purpose of contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under State and Federal programs, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the State and Federal matching funds for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. Said appropriated or donated funds and State and Federal matching funds may be expended by majority vote of the conservation commission.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of the taxes for the ensuing year and pay such debts out of tax money when same is received.

Article 25. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for State or Federal Funds and to apply for, contract for, and accept aid relative to disasters and incur debts for temporary loans for same should the need arise.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds by sealed bid or public auction, as justice may require.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to engage professional auditors for annual reviews of reports of the town's officers, agents, and selectmen.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to deposit 50% of the revenues collected pursuant to RSA 79-A (the land use change tax) in the conservation fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5 III as authorized by RSA 79-A:25 II.

Article 29. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

- 4. To see if the School District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, receive and expend in the name of the District, such advances, grants - in - aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may be forthcoming from any source in accord with the provisions of RSA 198:20-b.
- 5. To see if the School District will vote to establish an Expendable Trust Fund for tuition, under provisions of RSA 31-19a and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) to be placed in said fund and to authorize the School Board to transfer said amount from the June 30, 1991, Fund Balance (surplus) and further to authorize the School Board as agent to expend.

- 6. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.
- 7. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The Columbia School District Meeting was called to order by Moderator, Margaret Salls at 9:00 p.m.

Article 1: Results of the Columbia School District election held earlier in the day were read as follows:

School T	reasurer	Barbara Killam

Article 2: Edward Poulin moved that the salaries of the School Board and any other Officers or Agents of the District be fixed as set forth in the Annual School Report. Mary Lou Placey seconded the motion which then carried.

Article 3: Roger DeBlois moved that the reports of the Agents, Officers, Auditors and Committees of the Columbia School District, as set forth in the Annual Report of the District, be accepted and placed on file. Ann Hebert seconded the motion and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 4: Edward Poulin moved that the residents of the Columbia School District find the State of New Hampshire to be negligent by failing to fund public education, thus creating an undue burden on the local taxpayer. We request that the State of New Hampshire Legislature begin in earnest to study methods for substantially increasing state aid to education. William Schomburg seconded the motion and the vote was in the affirmative. Article 5: Kenneth Parkhurst moved that the District vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 198:20-b to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action by the School District meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the fiscal year provided further that:

- Such money shall be used for legal purposes for which a School District may appropriate money.
- II. The School Board shall be required to hold a prior public meeting on any action to be taken regarding expenditures of such money.
- III. Such action shall not require the expenditures of other School District funds, and shall
  - IV. Be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of school district moneys.

Lori Berry seconded the motion and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 6: Roger DeBlois moved to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or the United States. Kenneth Parkhurst seconded the motion which then carried.

Article 7: Mary Lou Placy moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$650,780.00 (Six hundred fifty thousand, seven hundred eighty dollars) for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of School District Officials and Agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Edward Poulin, after seconding the motion, asked Perley Davis, Business Administrator, to explain the budget items. The main budget items is the increase of tuition and he stated we have more students in our District. Also, Thomas Oren, Coordinator of Special Services, spoke briefly of the requirements to be met for educationally handicapped children. No further discussion. The vote was in the affirmative.

Article 8: There being no further business Vickie Bunnell made the motion the meeting be adjourned without day or date at 9:45 pm. William Higgins seconded the motion which then carried.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT COLEBROOK & COLUMBIA

Major renovations and repairs to our school facilities were major items for the 1989-90 school year.

It was well into the winter months before exterior walls, brick facing, and windows were replaced at the elementary school building. At the Academy, the formerly designated Vocational Agriculture building was renovated to expand the Industrial Arts area. In the main Academy building, a sprinkler system was installed in the third floor music room and fire doors with magnetic catches were placed in the second floor corridors.

The Colebrook School Board appointed Pamela Bunnell to replace Eric Stohl, who resigned in October after several years of dedicated service. The board's negotiating team spent many hours in an attempt to reach an agreement with the Colebrook Education Association (CEA, NEA/NH). Unfortunately, the parties could not resolve their differences on the issues through the mediation and fact-finding procedures.

Colebrook Elementary School had a new teacher, Tracey Redding teaching social studies and Vickie Taylor was a new Grade 2 teacher in the Primary Building.

Kevin Graham, elementary science teacher, placed fourth in a state-wide computer contest and received a cash award and commendation from Governor Gregg.

Deborah Dionne, Marion Godzyk, Joan Walsh, and Karen Shaffer coached the new elementary Odyssey of the Mind Team to a splendid second place finish in the regional competition which gave the team the opportunity to make a respectable showing in the state meet.

Friends at Colebrook Elementary School (FACES) continued work on many projects and brought several cultural programs to the school and community.

A parent volunteer program was initiated at the primary level and was directed by Mary Lynch, parent member of the School Improvement Team.

Governor Gregg visited the primary school and spoke with the fourth grade students and presented awards to several junior high students.

At the Academy, William Schomburg was named Assistant Principal and Richard Irwin went back to full time teaching while Priscilla McGuire was on a leave of absence.

Through the efforts of Mary Ann Lawton and Robert Unangst, and with the support of Principal Robert Mills, foreign language and science teachers enjoyed an educational trip to Epcot Center in Orlando, Florida.

After three years as Colebrook Elementary School Principal, Stephen LeShane resigned to take a similar position in Lebanon, Maine.

As the report indicates, 1989-90 was a fruitful, busy year. We still face many space problems, particularly at the elementary level and the Colebrook School Board still has renovation plans ready for implementation at the Academy.

Economic conditions locally and State-wide have put some needed improvements on a "hold" status, but we must all work together in a cooperative effort to provide a quality education for our future adult citizens. It is an <u>investment</u> we must give our priority attention.

#### COORDINATOR OF SPECIAL SERVICES

During the 1989-90 school year, the Special Education programs within S A U #7 focused on integrating educationally handicapped students into the regular education classroom. Federal Grant monies were used to hire a consultant to work with regular education teachers in helping them develop effective program strategies. Also, books were purchased through Federal Grant funds for regular education teachers in each of the schools. These books contained methods and techniques of teaching toward various student abilities.

Collaboration between regular educators and special education staff will continue to be a vital component in effective programming for students.

There was continued investigation and application of various alternative means of making education more relevant for some students. Daily Living Skills programs and community-based work study programs were explored to varying degrees in both Pittsburg and Colebrook. In the long run, these programs will need strong community support.

During this past year, we had four staff members pursuing their Special Education certification through an alternative program. These staff members were involved in the Pool Expansion Plan (P E P) program which is fully certified by the State Department of Education. This extensive course of study will provide the necessary skills to enhance the Special Education programs in S A U #7.

We were fortunate in having two exemplary professionals, Polly Joos and Jane Merrithew, provide our students with Speech-Language services and Occupational Therapy services. Their creative and even-mannered approach with students is to be commended. We were also able to provide physical therapy, counseling, and diagnostic services through local and regional agencies. Finally, we need to continue to work toward ways of providing for all children's educational needs without labeling them, categorizing them, and in the long run, belittling their intelligence as human beings. The respect we show toward children at home and at school will reward us ten-fold in the future. The self-esteem we help foster in children should be the only thing "Special" about educators.

#### GUIDANCE COUNSELOR'S REPORT

The 1989-90 school year could best be described as a very busy one for the Guidance Office. Since more than forty percent of counselor time is spent on clerical work, the other diverse responsibilities of a high school guidance office must be worked into the other fifty some-odd-percent of the day. With the exception of individual meetings with Seniors in regard to their post-secondary plans, any individual time for other student concerns is extremely limited.

Career Development at the Junior High was team taught by Heidi Daley and myself and we were able to spend time with both the seventh and the eighth graders. All juniors at the Academy were given the Harrington O'Shea Career Decision Making System to help them with the development of their future plans.

A group was started at the Academy for children of alcoholics and met every other week until the end of the school year.

In the spring, when we did our scheduling for the 1990-91 school year, we were able to add a "C" track to the ninth, tenth, and eleventh grade English curriculum to help our slower learners. We also added another period to the school day hoping to make more options available to students and to ease the scheduling crunch. Both additions will be evaluated at the end of the school year.

#### SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

Although the school nurse works essentially with the well child, school nursing also includes children with acute and chronic illness, injury, handicapping conditions and developmental disabilties.

This year, as in the past, the usual screening procedures were done with appropriate referrals and follow up.

The drug and alcohol curriculum, "Here's Looking At You, 2000" is now being used in all the grades. Children and teachers alike are enjoying and finding the program very worthwhile.

This year a grant for a comprehensive school health curriculum for Grades 1 - 12 was written and accepted. A workshop was held for all teachers in S A U #7 and this program will go into effect this fall.

In general, school nursing this year was uneventful with the customary services provided.

I would like to thank everyone for their help and involvement this year. I would especially like to thank Diana Ouimette, who as a parent volunteer, gave many hours of her time in the school health office.

#### COLEBROOK/COLUMBIA CHAPTER I REPORT

This year 59 children from grades 1-4 received Chapter I supportive reading services.

A review of all collected evaluation data substantiated significant gains in the area of reading comprehension for all students. The projected was at least a 7 NCE gain for 85%. The actual was an 8 NCE gain for 1 student in grade 3 and higher gains for all others. 100% of the Chapter I participants in grades 2-4 made higher gains than those projected.

Criterion referenced interim testing in Gr. 1 indicated mastery of skills with 90% accuracy (readiness-1/2) for 86 percent of those in the program.

All subjective information used to assess student progress and the total Chapter I program reflected a high degree of success.

It was determined that the program was meeting the needs of participating students and no change was indicated concerning instructional methods.

A document describing Parent Involvement Policies and Procedures was written, proposed, and approved by the Colebrook-Columbia Study group December 5, 1989.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Faith Adair, Gail Nugent, Kathy Hannagan, Lindy Falconer, Sandra Jeffers, Peter Hallee, Carol Dinco, Sharon Lane and Principal, Stephen LeShane for all their valuable contributions while serving as Study Group members.

As parents they realized that in order to get the best for and from their children, parents needed to be involved in their activities. They also believed that providing parents with an opportunity to show their children that they felt strongly about education told children that what they spent their school day doing was important. With this in mind, they dedicated the Parent Involvement Policies in expectation of growth in both age groups. Parents logged 260 hours as volunteers in the Chapter I classroom. Their help was extremely influential in stimulating not only individual success for the children, but program success as well. Thank you very much for your caring support.

Again this year "Spring Fling" was a smashing success. The children's creativity in writing and then performing <u>The Stranger</u> for the community was fantastic.

Everyone who became involved in ensuring that Chapter I participants would not only become good readers, but would also gain self-confidence and high esteem should be commended.
