ON THE COVER

Dublin's New Town Barn

For many years Dublin's Highway Department was housed in an old, two-stall barn, with tool shed and salt shed, on the north side of Route 101 at the bend in the road just west of the east end of Old County Road. With barely adequate lighting and heating, no plumbing of any kind, and with water from the highway often covering the floor when it rained, it was an extremely unsuitable place in which to take care of the Town's valuable highway equipment. In recent years, the main building leaned to such a degree that is was difficult to close the doors, and the only thing that kept it from collapsing entirely was the sturdy salt shed attached to one side, filled with salt. Only two pieces of equipment could be stored inside, and there was no room, once in, to work on them.

Faced with this deteriorating situation, and ever more valuable equipment to be protected and serviced, the Town voted at the Town Meeting of March 1972 to borrow a sum not to exceed \$50,000 for the construction of a new Town Barn. The Selectmen, after inspecting several recently built buildings of this type, sent out specifications for what was wanted and invited bids.

Seven bids were received, ranging from \$34,000 to \$55,055, and on April 3, 1972 a contract was awarded to Joel T. Olson of Rindge, the low bidder. The building is constructed of 12" cement block on poured concrete foundations, with cement floor pitched to floor drains. It measures 40 by 100 feet, with a wood trussed, pitched roof with asphalt shingles. Six stalls are provided, with overhead doors, two 12 feet wide by 14 feet high to accomodate large equipment, and the other four doors 12 feet by 12 feet. A small office, bathroom with shower stall, and a storeroom are located at one end. Flourescent lighting throughout, hot air heating and an oil fired hot water heater make it a decent place to work.

The new barn is located on Town-owned land on the north side of Bond's Corner Road, adjacent to the Town Dump. Just back far enough from the road to be inconspicuous but not so far back as to require a long road in, it faces southeast, so that the winter sun will help with front parking area snow removal. There is plenty of space to the side and in back for storage of snowplows, and such equipment.

Some income was realized (\$2,816) from the sale of the former Town Barn property (the buildings must be removed by the new owner by 11-7-73) and the furnace from the old barn. Site preparation, septic tank installation, well, pump, oil tank installation, etc. totaled approximately \$3,400, bringing the toal net cost of the project to \$34,867.05.

Dublin now has a well-designed, well-built Town Barn which it can be proud of, and which should answer the Highway Department's needs for many years to come.

ABSTRACT OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

held at the Town Hall, Dublin, N.H., Tuesday, March 7, 1972

C. Robertson Trowbridge, Moderator, Presiding.

Polls opened at 12:00 Noon to 7:00 P.M. as advertised.

7:00 P.M. Meeting called to order and polls closed. Motion carried to count ballots at end of business meeting. Motion carried to waive reading of warrant articles before proceeding.

Invocation by the Reverend Noel Sokoloff.

2:00 A.M. results announced, oath of office administered.

Finding of articles follows in order:

Anita J. Crowell, Town Clerk

Article 1. Officers elected: Town Clerk, Anita J. Crowell; Town Treasurer, Nellie A. Crossley; Selectman 3 Years, Edward F. Whitney; Tax Collector, Anita J. Crowell; Highway Agent, 1 year, Clarence Babneau; Trustee of Trust Funds, 3 years, Fred C. Brening; Library Trustee 3 years, P. Albert Rajaniemi; Water Commissioner, 3 years, William Gnade; Cemetery Committee, 3 years, Richard B. Scribner; Member Planning Board, 6 years, Edward R. Foote; Member Board of Adjustment, 5 years, John R. Elder; Member Board of Adjustment, 3 years, Ann E. Hutchinson; Conservation Commission (2) 3 years, Shaun Kelly, Jr. and Elizabeth K. Robinson.

Article 2. Officers chosen: Measurer of Wood and Bark, Elliott Allison; Memorial Say Committee, David Elder, Brian Bearden, Robert Blanchette.

- Article 3. Moved that the reports of agents, auditors and committees be accepted as printed. Carried.
- Article 4. Moved that the Town authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Carried.
- Article 5. Moved that the Town authorize the Selectmen to administer and dispose of any real estate acquired by tax deed. Carried.

Article 6. Moved that the Town accept the following trust funds for the perpetual care of cemetery lots: C.J. Leonard \$200.00, Thaddeus Morse \$200.00. Motion carried.

Article 7. Moved that the Town accept the budget as printed in the 1971 Annual Report and that the town raise and appropriate the necessary sums for each item. Carried.

Article 8. Moved that the Town discontinue that portion of Pierce Road from Route 101 to its junction with the Old County Road at the former Dublin Inn, in accordance with R.S.A. 238:1. Carried.

Article 9. Moved that the Town discontinue the Parker Hill Road, so called, from its junction with Route 101 northerly to the Harrisville Line, in accordance with R.S.A. 238:1. Carried.

Article 10. Moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to complete the work of the Dublin Recreation Committee, as outlined by the 1971 Town Meeting directive. Explanation of progress was made by Judson Hale, Chairman. Motion carried. (Manifestly in the affirmative).

Article 11. Moved that the Town vote to combine the office of Town Clerk with the office of Tax Collector, thereby creating a new office of Town Clerk-Tax Collector to be held by one individual, with the term of office of said individual be 3 years, and the first election to the new combined Town Clerk-Tax Collector to be at the town meeting of March 1973. Carried.

Article 12. Moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purchase and installation of a new combined civil defense-fire department gas operated horn to be mounted on the fire station, this project being funded 50% by the Town of Dublin and 50% by the State of New Hampshire. Carried.

Article 13. Moved that the Town vote to designate as "Scenic", under provisions of R.S.A. 253:17 and 18, the following town roads: Burpee, Church, Craig, Dooe, Frothingham, Gerry, Lake, Meryman, Old Chesham, Old County, Old Common, Old Marlborough, Old Troy, Page, Parsons, Pierce, Pound, Snow Hill, Stone Pond, Thorndike Pond, Upper Jaffrey (from intersection of

Windmill Hill to Jaffrey Line), Upper Valley, Valley, Windmill Hill.

Article 14. Moved the Town accept the offer of Mr. & Mrs. Millard Worcester of the use of land owned by them immediately behind the Town Hall, for the purposes of a public skating rink, and that the town accept the offer of Yankee Inc. to bear the cost of clearing said land and the initial costs of establishing said skating rink thereon and that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to cover cost of annual maintenance, lighting, insurance, and any other costs relating thereto. Lucille McDonald acted as Moderator on this article so as to enable Mr. Trowbridge to speak on behalf of Yankee, Inc. Motion Carried.

Article 15. Moved that the Town authorize the Selectmen to appoint a full time police officer, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500 to supplement the police department appropriation voted under article 7 to defray the 1972 salary and expenses of said full time police officer. Motion by Julien McKee to amend motion to raise and appropriate \$6,500 to supplement the police department appropriation. Amendment was carried. Motion as amended carried.

Article 16. Moved that the Town raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$50,000 through authorizing the Selectmen to issue long term notes, for the construction of a new town barn, said sum to be borrowed on a 4% - 15 year note with first year payment of principal and interest totalling \$5,333, and that upon completion of said new barn the town sell the present town barn and sheds and the one (1) acre of land more or less, on which they stand (Map 7, Lot 48) to James C. Robinson of Dublin for \$2,500 subject to agreement that Mr. Robinson will at his own expense tear down and remove the present barn and sheds within a year of date of purchase. Moved by Gordon Hutchinson that the selectmen make a further study of Article 16 and report back at next Special or Regular Town Meeting whichever occurs first. Motion for further study not carried. Original motion carried.

Article 17: Moved that the consideration of this article be passed over at this meeting and brought up for vote of the town at an adjourned town meeting, Friday, June 9, 1972 at 7:30 P.M. at the Town Hall, Carried.

Article 18. Moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to be placed in Capital Reserve for a Solid Waste Disposal System. Carried.

Meeting adjourned at 10:20 P.M. for counting of ballots and to be resumed at 7:30 P.M., June 9, 1972, for Article 17 and any other special items.

ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING

held at the Town Hall, Dublin, N.H., Friday, June 9, 1972.

7:30 P.M. Meeting called to order.

Article 17. Moved by John McKenna that the Town raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$4,201 for Dublin's share of an emergency ambulance service to be provided by the Town of Peterborough. Peterborough's ambulance service was described by Glen Hipple. Motion carried.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 6, 1973 at seven o'clock in the Evening (polls will be open from 12:00 noon to 7:00 p.m.) to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To bring in your ballots for the following offices:

One Year Terms

Town Treasurer, Highway Agent, two (2) members Conservation Commission

Two Year Terms

One (1) member Conservation Commission

Three Year Terms

Town Clerk-Tax Collector, Selectman, Trustee of Trust Funds, Library Trustee, Water Commissioner, One (1) member Cemetery Committee, Two (2) members Conservation Commission.

Article 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

Article 3. To hear Reports of agents, auditors, committees heretofore chosen and to plass any vote relating thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer and dispose of any Real Estate acquired by tax deed.

Article 6. To see if the Town will accept certain Trust Funds as follows:

Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and

appropriate to defray Town charges and for other purposes mentioned in the Town Budget.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the East Valley Road from the barn presently owned by Otto A. Koskela to the Jaffrey Town line, in accordance with R.S.A. 238:1.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of a traffic monitoring radar set for the Police Department.

Article 10. To see whether the Town should dissolve the Recreation Committee. Further, if said vote to dissolve is negative, to see what new instructions, if any, and/or new definitions, if any, the Town should give to the Recreation Committee. And to see what sum of money, if any, should be raised for the 1973 Recreation Committee, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee, in coordination with study committees from other towns, to study the feasibility of a town manager type of government for three or more towns, and to report thereon at the 1974 Town Meeting. R.S.A. Chapter 37 applies. (By Petition)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the regional planning commission, now organized and named the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$561.00 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission for 1973, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$650 to provide Blue Cross, Blue Shield and Major Medical insurance on a single person basis to full time employees of the Highway Department, including the Highway Agent, and to the full time Police Chief.

Article 15. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for painting the exterior of the Town Hall.

Article 16. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to help support the Meeting Place located in the basement of the Town Hall. (By petition)

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to amend the provisions of the Planning and Zoning Ordinance, adopted by the voters of at the Annual Town Meeting of March 12, 1963, as follows:

Amendment

In order to promote the orderly and harmonious development of the Town there shall be a moratorium until April 1, 1974, or until applicable amendments are made to the Town of Dublin Planning and Zoning Ordinance, whichever event occurs first, on the following type of construction or development.

- 1. The construction of any multi-family dwelling, including the construction of any planned unit development, or the conversion of any single-family dwelling unit into a multi-family dwelling unit.
- 2. Any new industrial or commercial use which shall employ more than four people or require over 3,000 square feet of building area.
- 3. Any recreational area, either private or public, intended for commercial purposes consisting of more than two acres or to be used by more than five people.

Variances

Any request for variance must be submitted to the Planning Board for review and the Board of Adjustment for action. (By Petition)

Article 18. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to install eight (8) dry fire hydrants, and move the location of one presently installed, these to be located as follows: Valley Road behind the Norman Davis house; Lower Jaffrey Road near junction with Goldmine Road; Korpi Road at junction with Craig Road; Dublin Lake at Cemetery cove; Dublin Lake at Brown's cove; Old Marlboro Road at Golf Course; Route 101 in vicinity of Tom's Nursery; Upper Jaffrey Road near junction with Snow Hill Road; and relocate hydrant presently on Route 101 at Hayes Pond to Lower Jaffrey Road in vicinity of John Rajaniemi house; or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to purchase one thousand feet (1,000') of fire hose for the Fire Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to reopen the presently abandoned extension of the Dooe Road from the point of its junction with the Valley Road southeasterly to the Peterborough town line, which is now subject to gates and bars as voted at the annual Town Meeting of March 10, 1970, and what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for such road rebuilding project, or take any other action relating thereto. (By Petition)

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance, or take any other action relating thereto:

ORDINANCE FOR THE CONSERVATION AND PROTECTION OF WATERS AND WETLANDS

Section I. Declaration of Purpose and Intent

It is hereby found necessary to regulate and control the utilization and usages of waters, wetlands, and their environs within the Town of Dublin to insure that the only usages which will be permitted are not unduly detrimental to the environment, will promote the general health and welfare through orderly growth and development, are suitable to the demands and needs of the people of the Town and will protect and preserve all waters, wetlands, and their environs, whether public or private, within the Town from despoliation, pollution, and unregulated alterations.

Section II. Definitions

Waters — all lakes, ponds, streams or flowing waters whether year-round or seasonal.

Wetlands — those areas delineated as poorly drained or very poorly drained soils identified in the National Cooperative Soil Survey field sheets completed in 1972 and shown on its field mapping photographic sheets for the Town of Dublin.

Environs — all land within 100 feet of such above-mentioned waters and wetlands.

Planning Board — the duly constituted and appointed Planning Board of the Town of Dublin.

Section III. Construction Prohibited

No building, structure, jetty, bridge, pier, dam or addition to or alterations of any of the foregoing, no excavation, dredging or alteration in existing contours or natural boundaries no depositing, dumping, or discharge of sewage, industrial or any other waste shall be permitted in or on waters, wetlands or their environs as heretofore defined unless and until a permit for the same shall have first been obtained from the Planning Board.

Section IV. Permits

A. Written application for such permits shall be filed with the Planning Board and shall include a complete description of the location and nature of the proposed construction or other work together with the detailed plan of the same drawn to scale by an engineer or land surveyor licensed to do business in the state of New Hampshire, which Plan shall include boundaries, names of owners

of abutting lands, contours, access, and all other pertinent details.

B. Public Hearing. No application for permit shall be granted or denied without a public hearing thereon before the Planning Board, notice of which hearing shall be given to abutters, to persons owning land abutting on the parcel of land affected, the Conservation Commission, and public notice posted in at least two places in the Town, all of which notices to be given not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the date of the public hearing.

C. Issuance of Permit. The Planning Board shall, after such hearing, determine as a matter of record whether or not the granting of such permit will be in accordance with the purposes and intent of this Ordinance and shall make the following findings:

That the granting of the permit will or will not:

- 1. Be detrimental to ground water levels.
- 2. Adversely affect stream channels and their ability to handle runoff waters.
- 3. Will not cause unreasonable soil erosion or reduction in the capacity of the land to hold water so that a dangerous or unhealthy condition may result.
- 4. Will eliminate, depreciate, or obstruct the commerce, recreation and aesthetic enjoyment of the citizens of the Town.
- 5. Disturb and reduce the natural ability of wetlands to absorb flood waters.
- 6. Adversely affect sources or nutrients for finfish, shellfish, and Wildlife of significant value.
- 7. Damage or destroy habitats or reproduction area for plants, fish, and wildlife of importance.
 - 8. Create any hazard to fishing or bathing.

In making these determinations, the Planning Board shall take into account the elevation of the land above sea level, the nature of soils and subsoils and their ability to adequately support waste disposal; the slope of the land and its effect on effluents; the availability of streams for disposal of effluents.

D. The granting or denial of a permit shall take place not later than sixty (60) days from the date of the filing of an application therefor unless the applicant and the Planning Board shall jointly agree to a reasonable extension.

E. Conditions and Bond. The Planning Board may grant a permit subject to any reasonable conditions it wishes to impose in the best interests of the Town of Dublin and may require that a bond be posted with it by the applicant in an amount sufficient to insure full compliance with the terms and conditions of the permit and to

cover the cost of repairing any damage done in conjunction with the work permitted.

F. Revocation of Permit. Any permit may be revoked by the Planning Board at any time for cause. Such revocation shall be sufficient grounds for the party issuing the bond to be required to complete the work to the satisfaction of the Planning Board.

Section V. Existing Uses

All uses which would otherwise be subject to this Ordinance which are in existence at the time of passage of the Ordinance may continue unless and until abandoned for a period of more than six (6) successive months.

Section VI. Enforcement

The Board of Selectmen shall enforce the provisions of this Ordinance in the name of the Town under the penalty provisions or if necessary by seeking injunctive relief.

Section VII. Penalty

The holder of a permit found guilty of violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than \$100 per day for each day such violation shall continue after notice given to the holder by the Board of Selectmen.

Section VIII. Effective Date

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the with-drawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, of the total amount, including interest, available in 1973, estimated at \$11,750, for use as set-off against the budgeted appropriation for "Town Maintenance — Summer and Winter", or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to employ the New Hampshire State Tax Commission to perform a complete reevaluation of all land and buildings in the Town, and to raise and appropriate one half of the cost of the project by taxation in 1973, and to raise and appropriate the remaining required funds in 1974, such reevaluation to start in 1973 and be complete by Town Meeting in 1975, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 25. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Capital Reserve.

REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

In the nine months since our Selectmen appointed me full time Police Chief I have tried to be firm, honest and fair: to protect your lives and property, to keep your affairs confidential, and to serve Dublin people to the best of my ability. I have tried to be available and on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

It gives me a good feeling when I'm called out to catch a bat for a lone woman or to check another's house for prowlers, when she comes home from the movies to find a light, which she doesn't remember having left on.

Of course, I've done more than chase bats and check lights, in the past nine months — that kind of service is as incidental as extra traffic duty for special occasions, issuing warnings or giving assistance to motorists, and the daily checking of closed homes and building sites.

For instance, I appear in court once a week. In nine months the State has collected \$2,299 in fines, resulting from 129 summons for traffic violations — an average of 3 cases a week. (If you see the cruiser in Jaffrey some night, I'm not out joy riding, I have to appear at night court on occasions, too.)

The Dublin Police Department since March 1972 has answered over 1,045 calls entered on the daily log plus several hundred others received in the cruiser and not entered.

Among the items that are listed in my daily log, that consume my time, are complaints investigated and resolved,

62 automobile accidents occurred (involving 17 personal injuries) — 37 in the winter months and 25 from April to October.

In addition to my daily log, pistol permits issued, correspondence with the State Motor Vehicle Department, answering inquiries concerning character references, I fill out a 4 page report to the State and requested insurance company reports on every car accident.

In answer to a petition by Dublin women, a radar unit was leased and installed (at a cost to my budget of \$117) from July 1 to September 6. I felt it was an effective tool in regulating speed and it held the number of accidents to a total of 7 in the two months — a very good record for these two peak traffic months, with the added confusion resulting from the trucks and workmen engaged in widening the road during this time.

Our department has attended several seminars given by the Nashua Vocational Technical College, one by the Cheshire County Sheriff's Office and I attended ambulance service and County Police meetings, as well as a four day course on Police Management given in Concord. As of November 1973, a new Criminal Code will go into effect, making obsolete today's statutes and the department hopes to attend a seminar to study this new Criminal Code.

It has been my feeling that, as a full time officer, making constant unpatterned rounds, I have served as a deterrent to crime. In the nine months we have had only five breaking and enterings that involved larceny. I've learned the habits of the people in town and if, in my rounds, I see a strange car or an unfamiliar face, I am alerted.

My cruiser shows 34,000 miles on its speedometer, which does not represent the additional wear and tear on the engine, resulting from long idling times that occur at the scene of an accident. I anticipate the cruiser should be replaced in 1974. I wish to express my appreciation for the fine job my assistants have done. They have been loyal and faithful in their part-time service. I also would like to express my thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Allison for their continued support in covering the school crossing, in fair weather and foul; for the co-operation I have received from other local and state agencies; to my wife June who has taken many of the hundreds of calls that come into my home, and to local citizens who have taken the time and interest to advise me when they saw something that needed investigation.

DUBLIN DUMP COMMITTEE REPORT

The Committee — thanks largely to the efforts of Molly Ulam — has collected a sizeable amount of literature concerning current methods of solid waste disposal. In addition, individual committee members have had a number of conversations with people directly involved in solid waste disposal in southern New Hampshire. As a result of these investigations, the committee currently believes that either a sanitary landfill or collection and removal by a professional contractor offers the best interim solution to Dublin's trash disposal problem.

There are problems with each method. A sanitary landfill requires a well-drained site, and in the opinion of John Allen of the Soil Conservation Service in Keene and Tom Sweeney of N.H. Department of Health and Welfare, most of the current site is unacceptable. There is, however, a section at the western end of the present dump that appears usable, with an adequate supply of fill at hand. Test borings will have to be made next spring during run-off to determine whether the area is actually well enough drained to meet state requirements. If a landfill is developed in this area some adjacent land will have to be acquired by the town in order to assure that the site will have a reasonably long life. The acquisition, however, need not be very large, because Tom Sweeney estimates that Dublin will use perhaps 1/2 an acre a year in a sanitary landfill; consequently a 5 acre site will last the town about 10 years. It seems that the town's payloader, if equipped with special tires, may be sufficiently heavy to compact the trash that Dublin generates daily.

The Committee has not yet gotten estimates from professional haulers regarding the yearly cost of collecting and removing Dublin's trash. The amount of rubbish involved on a daily or twice-or-thrice-weekly basis is relatively small and the haulage distance rather long. Furthermore, the contractor is likely to have to pay for dumping Dublin trash in another town's landfill and Dublin will have to absorb this cost. Increases in gas and oil prices, and more pollution control equipment are going to increase substantially the cost of trucking over the next decade. Thus professional collection may turn out to be too expensive.

Regardless of the method of trash disposal that the town chooses for 1975, the Committee is exploring ways by which we can establish a collection point for the recycling of cans, glass, and papers at the present dump. This requires the building and maintenance of appropriate bins for the material, and finding some one who will haul it away on a regular basis. Owing to low volume and long distances, the latter is again the problem, and the solution may lie in a regional recycling effort undertaken by a number of surrounding towns, all serviced by the same contractor.

REPORT OF THE DUBLIN FIRE DEPARTMENT

The fire department was called upon 22 times during 1972. Five calls were for mutual aid out of town, four rescue calls (including assistance in search and rescue for lost hiker on Mt. Monadnock), three car accidents to stand by with fire truck, one chimney fire, six building fires. one car fire and three resuscitator calls. It has been a quiet year compared with the last four or five years. However, we must always be prepared for the worst. The men and equipment roust always be ready to respond at a minute's notice. We are called a fire department, but we respond to all emergencies where we are requested.

The firemen have engaged in extensive training during the past year. Several men also attended special training at Meadowood in Fitzwilliam last September. The new reel truck has been a point of great interest all over the country. Several articles complete with photographs have appeared in the leading fire publications throughout the country. The board of State fire underwriters has been favorable impressed after testing the unit last June. Several exact copies have now been built for other departments and are now in service. Numerous others are now being built. It gives us great pleasure to know that we set the standard for other departments in the methods and equipment used for supplying large amounts of water over long distances. Our own truck now carries 3,000 ft. of 4" hose as part of its capacity of 4,200 ft.

New snow tires were placed on the 1964 International this year. These replaced the original equipment tires which are now in the hands of the highway department. This truck was also returned to its manufacturer in Middleboro, Mass. for pump rebuilding during the summer. The 1937 Chevy truck has been placed in inactive service at the highway department garage. It may still be used if necessary. The 1932 Ford pumper (our now forest fire truck) will be replaced next summer by a 1953 Jeep, now on permanent loan to us by the State of N.H. We have a 1953 International on the same loan basis now. We have had this truck since 1967. The 1937 and 1932 trucks just don't fit into today's picture except in an occasional parade! The trucks now in service are a 1949 Ford 500 gal. tank — 500 GPM pump (next to be replaced due to parts availability and age), 1964 International 1,000 gal. tank — 750 GPM pump, 1953 International 1,300 gal. tank — 600 GPM pump and a 1971 International with a 4,200 ft. hose capacity and 750 GPM pump.

Oil burner permits issued during 1972 totaled 21. Since 1955, the State of N.H. has required all new burner installations to be inspected by the local fire chief and a permit issued for its operation. This is now a must to satisfy some insurance companies before a claim may be recognized regarding oil burner explosion or smoke damage resulting from the oil burner.

The traffic light at the top of "Dublin Hill" has been installed so that traffic may be controlled by the Fire Dept. to safely enter equipment onto the busy highway. This task has proven almost impossible during peak traffic periods. Unfortunately, the painting planned for the fire station was not done due to the added expense of the traffic light and pump repairs.

The fire hole funds were spent this year to install a dry hydrant on Church St., repair some leaks in Scribner's pond, and purchase additional hydrants for 1973. It is hoped that this budget may be increased so that the hydrant program can be completed within a reasonable amount of time.

I would like to thank the men of the Dublin Fire Co. for their

continued support. Also, a special thanks to those who choose to support the department by more than taxation. This extra help has purchased that 3,000 ft. of hose plus additional equipment in the past several years alone. The residents and taxpayers also deserve praise for their continued support each year.

While this goes to press, we have received two contributions totaling \$400.00 for the purchase of special rescue equipment. This is a result of the lost hiker on Mt. Monadnock. Many thanks!

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Highway Department had a busy year sanding and plowing from the first of the year into April, and again from November through December.

In early spring we started clearing the site for the new highway barn. The trees were cut, brush burned, and the site graded and prepared for construction. After completion of the building, the yard was graveled and graded.

Summer Maintenance

All dirt roads were graded and gravel placed where needed, and some cross pipe cleaned.

Brush was mowed with tractor along side the roads. More brush was cut on Windmill Hill Road.

Tar was placed on the Valley and Monument Roads and 22,000 feet on the Goldmine Road.

After two long heated debates with landowners, Planning Board, and Conservation Commission, Dooe Road was okayed for construction. Trees were cut and the road widened, some gravel was placed but more is needed, and the drain pipes have to be placed. The drain pipes were ordered and delivered, but due to the late delivery they were unable to be placed.

Dump

The dump was pushed back and burned almost every day and covered with sand when needed. New dump hours went into effect as of December 1st. This means more work to shovel or plow the gate, and more trips to lock and unlock the gates.

At this time I would like to thank the people of Dublin for the new town barn, it was thoughtful of the town to think of the department in this way, it is much appreciated. Also thanks for all the cooperation I have received throughout the past year.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF CEMETERY

1972 was an average year with 10 burials — 5 of these by cremation. Six lots were sold.

Again this year we contracted with the sixth grade at the Consolidated School to rake the leaves for their Camp Union Fund. The weather did not cooperate and only 2/3 of the job was completed. Hopefully in the spring of '73 they will be able to finish and receive the balance of their pay.

After some study by individuals and various town boards, it was decided the best proposal was to expand at the present location on land owned by the cemetery. This land is bounded by Old Pound Road, Route 101 and the present cemetery. Also rather than have a special appropriation to make this land suitable, it was decided to try to do this over a period of years with any surplus money from the regular money appropriated. (This maybe wishful thinking!) Hopefully the planning and beginning of this project might start in 1973.

The cemetery realized \$1,409.60 in income from perpetual care funds invested wisely by the Trustees of the Trust Fund.

Mr. Andrew Elder has given an exhibit case which is a most helpful resource.

In March, the Girl Scouts arranged a most informative display of their creative projects and crafts.

In May, Miss Rowena Sanford exhibited twenty five of her landscape paintings of Dublin and Maine scenes. The Gowing room made an ideal gallery. Over a hundred people viewed the paintings.

Later in May, forty ladies from the Cheshire County Extension Cultural Arts group visited the library on a tour of the area. Mrs. Romeo Fairfield and Mrs. John McKenna served a bountiful tea, the Garden Club provided pots of red geraniums, and with the art exhibit in progress, an opportunity was offered for others to see our library and its facilities.

During 1972 the Dublin Extension group met for three of its meetings open to the public. A recent visitor to Norway spoke on that country. The second meeting was to make terry cloth hand puppets, which were later given at an Easter party for children at the New Hope Center. A third meeting was on landscape design, with a plant exchange.

In June, the library was privileged to exhibit many historical documents loaned by the Dublin Community Church, in celebration

of its bicentennial year. The library added to the collection with pictures and papers it owns.

Films were shown to preschoolers during their school year. In July and August films were shown each Wednesday to throngs of eager children waiting for the door to open long before ten o'clock.

It was my good fortune to be selected among a group of librariens from Maine, Vermont and New Hampshire, to attend an Outreach workshop at the University of New Hampshire for a week in June, all expenses paid! It was an invaluable experience for me and many outreach concepts learned are being applied. An immediate goal is to help enrich the lives of the children by MORE use of their public library.

Many excellent books are given to the library each year. Many of the titles we already own! We are hoping Conval will accept many of these books. Dr. Ross McFarland has given fifty-eight volumes of *National Geographic*, hard cover bound, covering the years 1938 through 1968. We have offered all our single copies, filed by years for the same years to the school.

Most all the town reports are now hard cover bound and available for reference. Mr. Hildreth Allison has given a long paper he has written called *So Well Remembered*, reminiscences of his youth in Dublin. Mrs. E. Pierce has given all her copies of *Dublin Opinion*, incomplete but covering the years 1948, '49, '50. These are in hard cover now. Mrs. Bigelow Crocker of Fitchburg has sent some early papers to us concerning Dublin's early history.

The 1972 lighting project for the stackroom is incomplete, however after consultant advice, the fixtures are now ordered and the electricians are about to move in.

In November a car skidded into the library wall on the northeast corner. Considerable damage resulted which is covered by insurance. When spring comes, and a skilled stonemason is found to make these repairs, the trustees are considering having the mason break an entrance in the same stone wall almost centered. This will do away with the snow-blockades made by the State plow on Route 101. This side entrance will be wide enough to be machine plowed, and a far safer entrance for children and adults during the winter.

Dublin has been changing, and is presently changing. So is the library in concepts, goals and far reaching objectives. It is a constant challenge to the trustees on a limited budget. The trustees-librarian relationship is of one accord. I wish to express my deepest appreciation to them for their loyal support.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT 1972

The Planning Board experienced a very active year with twentyfour business meetings, thirteen subdivision reviews and two scenic road hearings. In March, Richard Hammond took over as Chairman from Robert Krogman who retired after contributing much to the Board.

A Town Planning Questionnaire was distributed and evaluated in May. The general consensus from the majority of respondents was to have Dublin remain essentially as it is, with limited growth and changes.

The Subdivision Regulations were updated and revised after a public hearing.

A working committee was appointed to study the town dump and make recommendations with respect to future federal regulations. Mary H.B. Ulam, William R. Link, John R. Elder and Michael V. Walker are the members.

In November, Robert Allen was elected Chairman.

The Board made a recommendation to the Selectmen to enlarge the cemetery.

In 1973 it is intended that the Board will work with various groups concerning the highway system and any proposed changes.

At town meeting, we will be proposing several amendments to the present Zoning Ordinance. They will constitute a moratorium on certain types of construction, the intent being to allow the Planning Board an opportunity to present land use regulations based on the town's soil maps.

The Planning Board strongly recommends that the town vote to join the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. The advise and assistance made available to us by this Commission would be invaluable in our efforts on land-use regulations.

REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF CIVIL DEFENSE

Civil Defense purchased an excellent "Citizens' Band" multichannel radio in January and installed the unit at the Fire Station. This new system will supplement our other radio systems now in use and could be valuable in case of major power failures.

Under Article 12 of the 1972 Warrant the new Civil Defense — Fire Department gas alarm horn was installed on the Fire Station roof in mid April. The system meets the design requirements and works very well. It is simple, easy to service, and will operate during power failures. This system greatly reduces the electric power load demanded by the old electric siren.

Under this project #NH21-72, approved by the State prior to the purchase date, I have processed a great deal of paperwork, along with Mrs. Crossley's assistance, in order to receive State of New Hampshire matching funds of \$967.50. The Federal auditors are not specifying their requirements and the State has not supplied the data to Dublin. As of this writing, the Town has not received the State's 50% share of the funds.

In the late spring we received a rebuilt 5 kw electric generator for the Civil Defense, and it was immediately placed into service in the Fire Station. It works!

I have submitted my resignation to the Selectmen as Director of Civil Defense. I will assist in the training of a new Director to be appointed by the Selectmen.

1972 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DUBLIN CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission held 24 meetings during 1972. A public meeting was held on Thursday, March 16th during which a film was shown, "So Goes Vermont", loaned by the Vermont Resources Council; and the soil survey maps were displayed and explained by Roy Shook, soil scientist for the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The Scenic Roads article, researched and sponsored by the Commission was accepted during Town meeting on March 7, 1972. A proposal to the Ford Foundation requesting a grant of \$5,000 to aid the Commission in a resources inventory and inventory analysis was refused. A meeting on conservation was held on Tuesday, August 22, 1972 at 8:00 p.m. at the Town Hall, sponsored jointly by the Commission and the Dublin Garden Club. Mrs. Robbins Milbank, chairman of the Nelson Conservation Commission, was the speaker. Resignations from the Commission were accepted with regret from Mrs. Barton Anable, Clarence Babneau and Mrs. James C. Robinson, Mr. Lyndon Pratt was hired on a part time basis as a staff consultant, field worker, to help with clerical work and to act as a liaison between the Commission and the Dublin Planning Board.

The function of the Conservation Commission is basically to gather information for decision making purposes. In order to carry out this function, the Commission has called upon the services of many individuals and organizations. Completion of the soil survey and receipt of the final report and accompanying maps has begun to help greatly. We have at present very useful information on soil types, homesite locations, septic systems, effluent disposal, wetland areas and slopes in the Town. Maps may also be made for any other purpose — for example, foot, horse and snowmobile trails, camping and recreation areas, cemeteries, wildlife areas, etc.

Development of the possibility of a Dublin 101 by-pass prompted the Commission to begin its own study of the Town. This will yield us two ends — a means of determing the logical impact of any development (e.g. the proposed by-pass) and a way to build our inventory of natural resources as is required by law. The study is being done on a sectional basis through informational meetings to which property owners and citizens of the particular area are invited to offer help and advice. So far the northeast portion of the Town has been studied.

As a means of getting more of the information needed, the

Commission put its staff consultant to work to investigate a reasonably inexpensive way to reproduce the 5 soil maps in color for wider distribution within the Town and the State.

A series of joint meetings with the Dublin Women's Club and the Dublin Planning Board has helped greatly in getting across information which the soil maps offer, also for opening up channels of communication between the various town groups.

In other events the Conservation Commission, the Planning Board and the Selectmen jointly initiated a Dump Committee to study the current and foreseeable problems concerning the dump. The Commission accepted an easement on 25 feet of lake frontage on West Lake Rd. near the Dublin Lake boat landing. Other acquisitions and easements are pending action. Also in the faith that much depends on our young people, a contribution of \$70.00 was made to the Camp Union Fund.

In conclusion it would be fitting to say that without the concerned and enthusiastic support of the Townspeople and others we would not have been capable of accomplishing the above. For this we say thanks.

RECREATION COMMITTEE — 1972

1972 was another frustrating year for the Dublin Recreation Committee — but at least it is probably the last one. I say this because we have now turned over every single stone (that we are aware of) in our efforts to acquire the "approximately 375 lake frontage feet with an adjoining two acres of land on Dublin Lake near or adjoining the present Women's Club Beach area to be used...etc." as per the town directives to us of March 1971 and March 1972. Every stone, that is, except eminent domain. And while attorneys have told us that eminent domain could legally be utilized in our situation, we feel such an undertaking would probably be self-defeating to the original purpose that we began with back in 1969.

In my opinion, the key to our success or failure was whether or not we could acquire the lake property of Mrs. Betty Buffum. As the year began, we were still optimistic due to the fact that we had such a desirable and valuable piece of property (belonging to Mrs. Clark) to offer in exchange. We asked Mrs. Buffum to set her own conditions, whatever they might be. There's no need to go into all the negotiation details, special circumstances, meetings, private talks with various involved people, etc., etc., etc. Suffice it to say, that at the end of the summer, we asked Mrs. Buffum to give us a "yes" or "no" in writing and that would be that. It was "no" — and that was that! Incidentally, I have no personal criticism to make in regards to Mrs. Buffum's refusal. Perhaps, under similar circumstances, any one of us would have acted in the same way. It's not easy to move from a place you know and love.

Out next stop was to ask the Women's Club to drop two key conditions under which they had agreed to lease their land to the town as per their vote of June 17, 1971. The two conditions we asked them to drop were: "That the town acquire all the property owned by Mrs. Buffum adjacent to the Dublin Women's Club beach" and "That the town acquire all the property owned by Mrs. Kelly adjacent to Mrs. Buffum."

On October 12, 1972, the Women's Club voted *not* to drop these two conditions. The vote was 11 in favor and 18 against. The majority of those who voted against dropping the two conditions did so because they felt that, without these two properties, the area was of insufficient size to accommodate a town beach.

At this point, we had pretty much run out of alternative courses of action.

At a meeting in November, we decided to ask the Women's Club whether or not they would be interested in picking up where we were forced to leave off. In other words, we decided to ask them to negotiate with the Lake Club and Mrs. Hawkins with the objective being the acquiring of the same property they refused to sanction as a *town* beach in their vote of October 12, 1972.

In November, members of the Recreation Committee and the Women's Club met to discuss this new course of action. Everyone seemed enthusiastic.

Accordingly, on December 31st, 1972, members of the Recreation Committee, the Women's Club, the Lake Club and the Dublin Foundation met to discuss it further. At that time, the following significant points were made: (1) The Recreation Committee indicated it would, as individuals, stand ready to cooperate, serve in advisory capacities on any special Women's Club committees created for this purpose, make available its architectural drawings, engineer's survey plan, its contacts, etc. (2) The Lake Club indicated it would seriously consider making available all or part of its land involved in the original town plan and that it would like to be presented with a Womwn's Club plan for the area as well as a specific request as to what the Women's Club wished. (3) The Dublin Foundation president indicated that it is likely funds would be available to begin developing the area. (4) The Women's Club indicated that it would like a special advisory committee, consisting of some men, to help them launch this new endeavor and that they would have a meeting of their Executive Committee to discuss the matter and designate said advisory committee.

So that is where it stands as of today, January 8, 1973.

Other activities of the '72 Recreation Committee: Acted as liaison between the town and the Lake Club in regard to last fall's opening of the Dublin Golf Course to Dublin residents; helped with the skating, rink; publicized matters to do with the availability of the Dublin Sailing Club and the Dublin Riding and Walking Club to all Dublin residents. All of these things, of course, were not part of our official duties as specified by the last two town meetings. (Perhaps the town would like to change the responsibilities of the Dublin Recreation Committee, and make it a permanent town committee to oversee all recreational aspects of Dublin, as well as search for an entirely different recreation area. Probably its membership would change somewhat under this new role.)

Finally, the Recreation Committee has privately expressed the town's appreciation and thanks to all of those many individuals and

organizations who were willing to sacrifice something in order to have better recreational facilities on Dublin Lake for all Dubliners, particularly the children, present and future. To name just a few: The Dublin Lake Club, its Board of Directors, its presidents, Beekman Pool and, now, David Howe — they were the first to say "yes, we'll help" and they are still saying it; Mrs. Duncan Spencer and Mrs. Mary P. Clark — they were willing to give up land on Dublin Lake so that the Recreation Committee could offer their lots in exchange for lots within the plan (and people said no one would ever give up any land on the lake to the town of Dublin!); The Kellys, Mrs. Buffum and Mrs. Hawkins — for their sincere concern, their time, their earnest soul-searching: The Women's Club, its members, its presidents Lucy McDonald and, now, Eunice Wold — for their time, and effort. Finally, a special thanks to those many who offered much needed help and/or advice along the way. These included, in particular, George Stewart, Mrs. Otis Tenney Russell, Sandy and Rosemary James, Paul Lehmann, and Ruth and Dick Hammond. My personal thanks go to each member of the Recreation Committee. So many meetings, so much time, so much thought, so much hope, so much disappointment. For what? Well...we'll see.

In 1971 the Legislature passed a "Resident" tax bill under which a \$10.00 "Resident Tax" replaces the former Poll Tax of \$2.00 and Special Head Tax of \$5.00.

Under the new law (RSA 72 and 76 as amended by Chapter 476, laws of 1971) a tax of ten dollars (\$10.00), known as the "Resident Tax", shall be assessed on every inhabitant who was at least twenty-one years of age but not yet sixty-five years old as of April 1, 1972. Widows of veterans are exempt from this tax, regardless of age. Veterans are not exempt.






