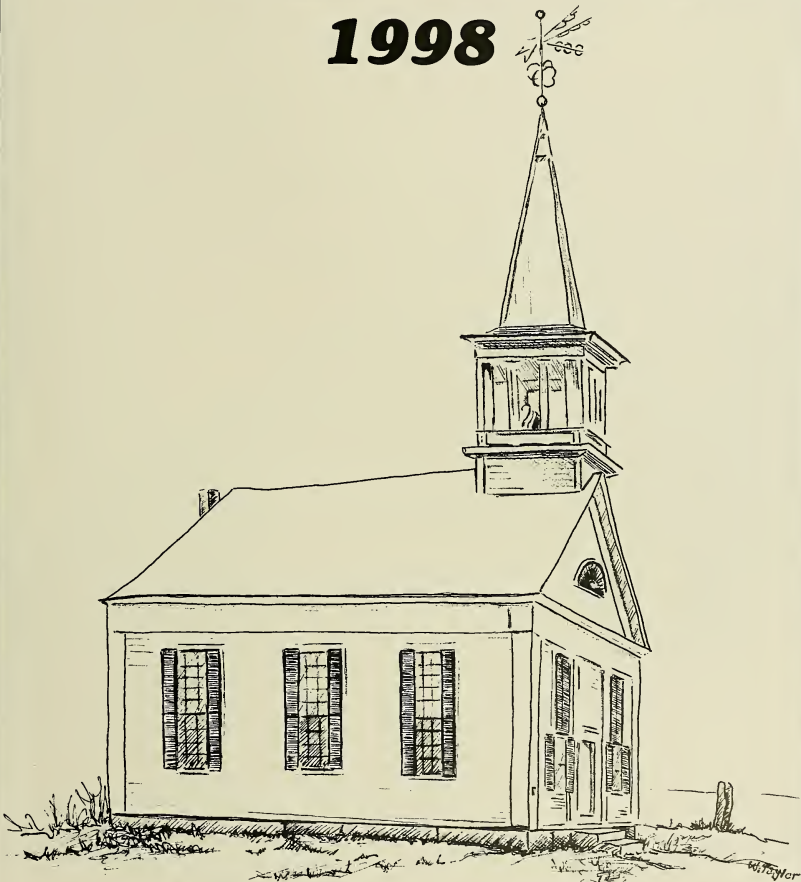

To the inhabitants of the Town of Effingham in the county of Carroll in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs: Polls not to close before 7:00pm. You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Effingham on Tuesday the 9th day of March 1999, next at 11 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subject:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
 - 1 Selectman..... 3 year term
 - 1 Trustee of Trust Funds..... 3 year term
 - 1 Trustee of the Library..... 3 year term
 - 1 Trustee of the Cemetery..... 3 year term
 - 1 Trustee of the Cemetery..... 2 year term
 - 1 Trustee of the Cemetery..... 1 year term
 - 1 Moderator..... 1 year term
 - 1 Budget Committee Member..... 1 year term
 - 2 Budget Committee Member..... 3 year terms
 - 2 Planning Board Members..... 3 year terms

Adjourn meeting as per vote until Saturday, March 13, 1999 at 9 o'clock in the forenoon.

2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of its agents and auditors. **(Majority vote required)**
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00) to be added to the police cruiser and equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7500.00) to be added the Rescue Unit Vehicle and Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20000.00) to be added to the Fire Truck and Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00) for a personal allotment for Effingham Fire Department members. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00) for a personal allotment for Effingham Rescue Squad members. . The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00) to be placed in the existing Emergency Management/Disaster Expendable General Fund Trust. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6000.00) for the repairs and maintenance of town owned bridges. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$11000.00) for roadside clearing, brush cutting and mowing. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. The Budget Committee does not recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

11. To see if the Town will vote raise appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ten Thousand Dollars (\$110,000) for road resurfacing and sealing. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) for road reconstruction. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000) for a complete revaluation and authorize the withdrawal of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. The balance of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) is to come from general taxation. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to be added to the Huntress Bridge Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000) to add to the existing Municipal Buildings Expendable Trust for the purpose of repairing and maintaining all municipal buildings and parking lots. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4800.00) for the engineering services for monitoring the landfill site and One Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$1300.00) for water quality analysis of the landfill site. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

17. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Twenty-Two Dollars (\$422.00) in order for the town to participate in the Lakes Region Planning Commissions' 1999 household hazardous waste collection program. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

18. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000) to treat four (4) town gravel roads, twice each, with pressurized liquefied calcium chloride to help stabilize the gravel and control dust pollution. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Two Thousand Dollars (\$32,000.00) to grade the shoulders of all town paved roads. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

20. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Ten Dollars (\$29,810.00) to hire a full-time, forty hour per week, police officer. Salary to be Twenty-Two Thousand Seventy Dollars (\$22,070.00). Benefits amount to Seven Thousand Seven Hundred Forty Dollars (\$7,740.00). The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

21. If Article 20 is passed, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$6150.00) to increase operating expenses and outfit the full-time police officer with basic issue. Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) for telephone expenses, One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1500.00) for supplies, Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for cruiser expense, Two Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$2,400.00) for officer's basic issue. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Two Hundred Twenty Five Dollars (\$4,225.00) to increase the transfer station hours on Saturday and Sunday year-round to eight and one-half (8 ½) hours per day opening at 8:00am. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00) for the purpose of updating the Master Plan for land use regulations. This is designated as a non-lapsing special warrant article. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

24. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of Four Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$4,100.00) from the General Fund to the Fire Truck and Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. This amount is equal to the sale price of the retired piece of fire equipment. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

25. To see if the Town will vote to transfer One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) from the General Fund to be added to the Fire Truck and Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. One

Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) was from the Town of Parsonsfield in 1998. Petitioned by Richard Thompson and Others. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00) for the purchase and erection of a fireman memorial including two flag poles and related equipment at Effingham Fire Station #2. Petitioned by Richard Thompson and others. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

27. To see if the Town will vote to create an expendable fund trust in accordance with RSA 31:19-A to be known as the Effingham Community Center Expendable Trust, for the purpose of establishing an Effingham Community Center and raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) toward this purpose. The Selectmen would be designated agents to expend. Petitioned by Pat Parker and others. **(Majority vote required)**
28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Seventeen Thousand Fifty Dollars (\$517,050.00) for the ensuing year for general town operations. The Budget Committee does not recommend Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) of the Four Thousand Dollars request for interest on TAN (Tax Anticipation Note). **(Majority vote required)**

SPECIAL WARRANT ARTICLE

30. To see if the Town will vote to establish a portion of Snow Road as a scenic road under RSA 231:157. Boundaries for this scenic designation will begin at the intersection of Colcord Hill Road and Snow Road and continue to the easterly property line of Map 9, Lot 32 (not included). The designated official municipal body to enforce this ordinance shall be the Historic District Commission per RSA 231:158. **(Majority vote required)**
31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Effingham Planning Board
Report for 1998

1998 has been another very busy year for the Planning Board. The Board reviewed applications, inspected sites, and held hearings, and approved subdivisions. Early in the year, after reviewing the results of the previous fall's Master Plan workshop, the Board decided to conduct a survey for the Master Plan so as to get a greater response to this issue. Many extra meetings were held to develop the survey and later to compile the information. Much credit is due to the committee chaired by Vice-Chair Janet Normandeau as well as all Board members. Also a special thanks is due to the Lakes Region Planning Commission for their help in preparing the final printed form of the survey results at no extra cost. In addition to regular business and our ongoing Master Plan work the Board also attended the spring Planning Conference in Concord hosted by the Office of State Planning, three law lectures by the NH Municipal Association and various other regional meetings.

The Board will continue to meet regularly at 7 PM on the first Tuesday of each month. The Board always welcomes the public to these meetings.

EFFINGHAM HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

In 1998, eleven monthly meetings were held during which several Applications for Certificates of Approval were processed. In addition, many other issues of public concern relevant to the District guidelines were studied and evaluated. Overall, our efforts are guided by the knowledge that historic districting is a public process to preserve both the character and the tax base of the community for the public good through the means of preserving and protecting historic resources.

The historic resources in this town are our historic buildings and the natural environment. This heritage is not the result of mere chance, it is the product of thoughtful, informed choices by people in the past motivated with concerns that transcended personal aspirations or needs.

In 1798, the First Parish Church building at Lords Hill was erected to serve the needs of town residents. It is culturally significant, a revered resource and part of the heritage of the town which must be preserved.

In 1898, people in this state were struggling with natural and cultural losses on a vast scale. The response to this crisis began with individual insights and then evolved into a widely-held and powerful vision to preserve and promote the environment and heritage. That year, a conservation and preservation movement began and the attitudes and institutions this generated have continued to exert influence up to the present.

In 1998, people in this state once again organized to build support for increased commitment to conservation of our natural and cultural resources. A broad grassroots coalition founded "Citizens for New Hampshire Land and Community Heritage." The efforts of this group resulted in the state legislature establishing the New Hampshire Land and Community Heritage Commission. During September, this Commission underwrote a statewide poll conducted by the University of New Hampshire which revealed the following collective opinions.

89% consider historic buildings and archaeological sites to be important to the quality of life in New Hampshire

92% consider open spaces are important to the quality of life in New Hampshire

The Effingham Historic District Commission focuses on the preservation of the town's historic heritage. It is pleased with the work accomplished to date on the Town House ballustrades and with the evolving restoration of the Normal School and continues to advocate for the preservation of the First Parish Church building. We are committed to the stewardship of the heritage of the town for the present and the future public good. The Commission meets the second Wednesday of the month at 7:30 P. M. at the Town House.

EFFINGHAM CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Annual Report - 1998

The focus of the Conservation Commission in 1998 has been service to the community.

The spring centerpiece, as always, was Earth Day. The commission sponsored an Earth Day poster contest at the Effingham Elementary School and awarded tee shirts to the winner in each grade. These tee shirts were of a design that embodied the theme that the students presented. Additional shirts were made available for sale as well. All other participants were awarded certificates.

The annual roadside cleanup was held on the last Saturday in April. Despite the drizzly day, enthusiastic volunteers spent the morning removing trash from many roads in town. They were rewarded for their efforts with hot food and drink at an indoor cookout at the Murray Field fire station.

Capitalizing on the zeal of those who volunteered for Earth Day, the Commission initiated the Adopt-a-Road program. Currently twenty families have signed on. They have been given recognition with bumper stickers designating them **Roadside Custodians**.

In March, the Ossipee Watershed maps, donated to the town by the Audubon Society were framed and hung in Town Hall before the Annual Town Meeting, frames and labor donated by the Commission.

The Commission donated scholarship funds to the Effingham Elementary School for students who attended the environmental Summer School held in Maine.

Ongoing throughout the year were site inspections that involved wetlands: Timbering, Province Lake projects and septic systems. One timbering operation had to return to their site for road grading and installing proper waterbars.

In October the Commission sponsored the Pine River Forest cleanup. This was more successful than had been anticipated. Approximately 130 man hours were volunteered to remove more than five and a half tons of debris. This did not include three fifty-five gallon drums of oil that were removed as well. Equipment, trucks and other items such as trash bags, gloves, food and drink were donated by the volunteers. The NH Department of Resources and Economic Development paid the disposal fees. A complete report is available at the information table at Town Hall.

The Conservation Commission meets the first Tuesday of the month at 7:30 PM at Town Hall.

EFFINGHAM VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Effingham Volunteer Fire Department in 1998 had 19 members. We had 12 business meetings, 18 trainings and various work details. Eighty percent of the department is Fire Fighter-1 certified or above as well is Hazmat Awareness and Operational trained. Most members received tetanus shots and also were recertified on their CPR training.

The Effingham Fire Department has completed its new training room. The members are all very pleased with the room and are putting it to good use.

The Effingham Fire Department is still very pleased with 2-E-1. It has performed up to its expectations and beyond.

A private citizen installed an 8 inch dry hydrant to aid the department in Fire Suppression and we are working with Dave Weathers of Conway Conservation on installation and location of the next hydrant. The hydrant at Station #2 has been reconstructed. The hydrants are tested semi-annually. We have replaced all 2 1/2 inch suction hoses with new light weight suction hose. We are also in the progress of updating all personal papers for our members. We are continuing our drivers training program.

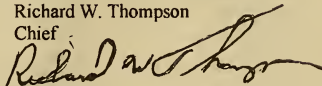

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. Early in 1998 we experienced an ice storm, which caused severe damage to forests of New Hampshire. This damage created a greater potential fire hazard as well as safety hazards to many areas of the state. Your local fire warden and Forest Rangers need your assistance in preventing wildfires in these hard hit areas and throughout the State. If you need assistance or information dealing with ice damaged woodlands, please call 1-800-444-8978.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

**EFFINGHAM RESCUE SQUAD
REPORT FOR 1998**

During 1998, Effingham Rescue gained three new EMT's to add to the strength of our squad. We currently have 1 paramedic, 1 EMT-Intermediate, 9 EMT's and 5 Rescue members with CPR certification. Our EMT-I, Melanie Gattermann, is currently attending paramedic school at Elliot Hospital. Jim Applei has again been elected our Captain and Andrew Hubbard is our President/Head of Service.

During 1998, Effingham Rescue responded to the following calls for assistance:

- 46 Medical Aid
- 11 Motor Vehicle Accidents
- 25 Assist Effingham Fire Department
- 2 Paramedic Intercepts/Mutual Aid Assistance

Of these 84 calls, 19 required ALS (Advanced Life Support) services. Effingham Rescue transported 32 patients, MedStar Ambulance assisted with 13 transports, 5 patients went to the hospital via private vehicle and 32 were non- transports. During the Ice Storm of 1998, our members were out in force checking on the elderly and assisting with road clean-up. Our squad also carefully monitored the summer flooding and directed the evacuation efforts along the Ossipee River in Effingham Falls.

When an emergency does arise, please call 911 and try to remain calm. Your name and street location in Effingham will automatically appear on the dispatcher's computer screen, just in case you are unable to provide this information. Don't worry, we will be able to locate you! Give a clear, precise description of the emergency to the dispatcher and any other pertinent information (breathing status, medical history, etc.) that may help our squad to help you better.

Effingham Rescue has again received many generous donations and cards of thanks - all are most appreciated. Our goal remains the same - to provide quality emergency medical services to the townspeople of Effingham.

LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

LRPC, with a service area covering over 1,200 square miles in Belknap, Carroll, Grafton and Counties, is one of nine regional planning agencies established by state statute. We continued to have a very busy year. Our work program remains diverse with activities such as local planning assistance, circuit rider planning, regional information systems & mapping, transportation planning, economic development, and natural resources planning. We are funded through multiple sources including local dues contributed by member municipalities. LRPC was called upon many times each day to provide local technical advice, and to respond to requests for service. We have also continued to maintain a regular dialogue with those state agencies that depend on us for a linkage to the communities in the Lakes Region. Our goal remains to provide support and leadership to the region, its governments, businesses, and citizens.

A few of our accomplishments over the past year are as follows:

- Co-hosted and organized three public Municipal Law Lectures, a public workshop on excavation taxes, and a workshop on the dollars and sense of conservation open-space zoning. Attended many local meetings for technical planning assistance.
- Initiated a comprehensive outreach effort to identify preferences for areas of local natural, historic, and cultural significance in our 31 communities. Responded to two requests under the Developments of Regional Impact statute.
- Prepared a report on trends in commercial, industrial, and residential development permits in the Lakes Region from 1992 to 1996.
- Approved transportation enhancement projects for consideration by the NH Dept. of Transportation. Completed the first of a two-year Scenic Byway Plan for the Lakes Region Tour. Staffed the Route 16 Corridor Study. Created a video on Access Management using computer simulation.
- Coordinated the 13th annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection (HHW), the largest single day, multi-site collection in New Hampshire. Renewed efforts to include a permanent HHW Collection Center.
- Guided area economic development policy as a board member of the Belknap County Economic Development Council and the Newfound Economic Development Corp.
- Served as the Lakes Region's data clearinghouse for U.S. Census, demographic and statistical data. These data are available to community officials and the public. Updated sections of the regional land use map using geographic information system technology. Responded to requests from all member communities.
- Amended LRPC's Bylaws to ensure that commissioner membership and meetings would include geographic balance throughout the region.
- Represented the region before the International Forum of Coastal Communities on Tourism and the Environment.
- Provided support to the U.S. Americorps staff working with local landowners for water quality and land management. Staffed the Pemigewasset River Local Advisory Committee. Conducted reviews of flood plain ordinances.

REPORT TO THE TOWNS AND CITIES IN DISTRICT ONE

As one of your elected officials, I am honored to report to you as a member of the New Hampshire Executive Council. This five member elected body acts much like a board of directors of your New Hampshire State Government in the Executive Branch.

In my twentieth year representing this District with 98 towns and four cities, there are many changes I've seen and been a part of in the past. My focus in this report to you is toward the future and some suggestions on how you as citizens might be encouraged to participate in the future.

The following are some ideas and suggestions. The Governor and Council have a constitutional and lawful duty to fill dozens of boards and commissions with volunteer citizens. If you are interested in serving one or more of these volunteer posts, please send me your resume at the State House and I'll see that it is passed on to Kathy Goode, Governor Shaheen's liaison to the Executive Council, or you may wish to send them directly to the Governor's Office, State House, 107 North Main Street, Concord, NH 03301.

Other resources available to your town/city/county include 10 million dollars (\$10,000,000) through the Community Development Block Grant program at the **Office of State Planning**. Call Jeff Taylor at 271-215 to see if your town or area qualifies.

Annually there is available some 10 million dollars (\$10,000,000) available through the **New Hampshire Attorney General's Office** for innovative programs for drug and law enforcement, stress programs dealing with youth at risk, assistance to victims, and special programs for victims of domestic violence. For information call Mark Thompson at 271-3658.

Communities may request assistance through the **NH National Guard Army**, General John Blair's Office, for services such as a Drug Detection Dog, Community Presentations on Drug Demand Education and Career Direction Workshops. Telephone number is 225-1200.

The **Office of Emergency Management** at telephone number 1-800-852-3792 is the proper call when an emergency develops in your area such as floods, high winds, oil spills and ice jams.
