You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Fremont on Tuesday, the eight day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

11. To see what action the Town will take by Ballot on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised laws relating to playing Beano be adopted in Town?"

12. To transact any other business that may be deemed necessary.

To: All property owners in the Town of Fremont.

From: The Selectmen of Fremont.

All property owners in the Town of Fremont are hereby notified of the Provisions of Legislature titled "Motor Vehicle Junk Yards" (R. S. A. Chapter 267 - A)

"Any person having two or more unregistered or old motor vehicles not intended, or in condition, for legal use on the highways, or used parts or used materials taken to-gether includes in bulk two or more vehicles MUST have a Junk Yard license, and in any case must move vehicles, parts or materials not less than 660 feet from the right of way lines of Class I, Class II or Class III Highway not less than 300 feet from the right of way line of Class IV, or Class V or Class VI Highway, and all must be completely fenced or screened from view."

This legislation further provides that after ninety days from its passage (date of enactment, July 7, 1965) a maximum fine of ten dollars a day shall be imposed upon a person for each twenty-four hours or fraction thereof on which he is in violation of this chapter.

The provisions of this legislation will be enforced in the Town of Fremont on or after the first day of April, 1966.

In 1965 we had two courses, one on Scott-Air Pack and the other on Hose and Ladders. The Scott-Air Pack Course paid off in two different times.

The Fire Department is glad to announce that Rescue Markers are now available to be placed on the homes of the Aged, Blind, Bed-ridden and Handicapped citizens in our Community.

The Chief points out that these markers will prove most valuable when Fire Equipment rolls up to a home where such an emblem is displayed. Faster rescues will be possible when our Firemen spot these attractive emblems that are made of Fluorescent Velva-Glow red and black colors so that they may be seen at night when a spotlight is turned on them.

Any residents interested in obtaining the Rescue Markers for themselves or any member of their family, should contact Fire Headquarters; a Fire Officer will then call at the home and place the emblems on the entrance and rear door and on the door and window of the disabled person's room. This service is free of charge.

SUPERINTENDENT REPORT

TO THE CITIZENS OF FREMONT

This past year has been progressing extremely well here in Fremont. The only unusual event took place last February when Fremont held a special district meeting and voted against becoming part of a co-operative school district organization. Newton and Kingston were the only towns to receive a favorable vote and as a result, the Sanborn Regional School District was formed.

Brentwood has since joined the Exeter AREA plan and will eventually be sending all children in grades 7-12 to Exeter. Schools officials of all the neighboring towns have agreed to accept Fremont children on a tuition basis as they have in the past. Therefore, these several changes have not appreciably affected your situation.

Fremont continues to be very fortunate in having the majority of its teachers remaining, especially at a time when teacher turn-over is becoming quite a problem. There were a few changes, however.

Mrs. Eastwood was replaced by Miss Nancy Ryen in Grade 3. Miss Ryen was graduated from Colby College and holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in English. She has also had special training in the teaching of reading for Grades K-3.

Mr. Deady was replaced by Mr. Winston Yelland who holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Tufts College. Mr. Yelland did his practice teaching in Malden, Massachusetts and he also has had special training in the teaching of reading and modern math.

Miss Mary White is our new teacher in Grade 4. Miss White holds a Bachelor of Education degree from Keene

State College and has had considerable advance study as well as many years of teaching experience. She has also had considerable experience in the performing arts.

These three new teachers, along with Mr. Michitson and our regular teachers, make Ellis School one of the best elementary schools in the area.

This report would be incomplete without a few words relative to the new National Elementary and Secondary School Education Act of 1965 (ESEA). This act was the first major legislation of national significance to be enacted by the 89th Congress. Keyed to "poverty", ESEA has five major provision in it.

Title I provides funds to school districts for special programs designed to meet the needs of educationally deprived children in attendance areas with high concentration of low-income families. The amount of grants is based on the number of school age children (5-17) in low-income families in the school district as reported in the 1960 census. Fremont is entitled to receive as much as \$1,663.52 towards the support of an approved project providing, of course,, the school district votes to authorize the school board to accept such aid. If this is done, our first project will be to sponsor a joint "Improvement in Reading" program with Newton and Kingston. This program will be held at Bakie School as this seems to be most centralized.

Title II authorizes distribution of \$100 million to the state for acquisition of library resources, including textbooks and audio-visual materials. This title establishes the Supervisory Union as the acting agent rather than the district as in Title I. Our Union No. 14 was allotted \$6,075.00 and on December 15, 1965, we submitted a proposal to spend the entire amount in order to establish an audio-visual center in the Union. If this project is ultimately approved, these materials will be purchased and

made available on a loan basis, according to the regulations, to any school in our Union.

Title III provides another \$100 million for grants to local school districts for the establishment of supplementary educational centers. An extremely wide range of activities may be authorized under this title. The terms, however, require that the school authorities must cooperate with other educational and cultural interests in the community in working out projects.

Title IV provides money for regional educational research and training facilities. Grants will be awarded to institutions of higher education and the non-profit agencies to undertake programs which will benefit public schools.

Title V makes available \$25 million to strengthen State Departments of Education.

In summary, then, the titles which seem to apply most directly to Fremont are Titles I and II, It is with these that your school board and local school administrators will be primarily concerned.

I wish now to thank all those who have helped to make this, my fourth year as your Superintendent, such a pleasant and educationally rewarding one.
