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MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING
LINCOLN, N. H.

The Town Meeting was held in the Lincoln High School Auditorium in Lincoln on Tuesday, March 12, 1963.

The meeting was called to order by Moderator James Maguire at 9:00 A.M.

Before the start of the meeting the following rules were read and it was stated that they would be enforced.

1. Personalities brought into discussion will not be tolerated or allowed.

2. No discussion will be allowed on any article until the article has been acted on by a motion and seconded.

3. Everyone who wishes to speak shall announce if they are speaking for or against the motion. They shall be allowed to speak five (5) minutes on the motion at a time, and nobody will be allowed to speak the second time until everyone who wishes has spoken once.

4. No one shall speak over twice on a motion unless so voted from the floor.

5. All motions or amendments shall be presented in writing or stated clearly so that the clerk may transcribe it and read it back to the body.

6. All discussions shall be subject matter on the articles being presented.

7. After the reading of each Article, the Chair will recognize a member of the Budget Committee for the purpose of making the Budget's recommendation.

Any person refusing to abide by the above rules will be out of order and if, after due warning, they refuse to follow the above rules, they shall be put in custody of the Police upon request of the Moderator.

The Town Warrant was read by Moderator James Maguire.

The polls were declared open, motion by J. MacDonald, seconded G. McGee.

The following articles were acted upon:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Motion by James MacDonald and seconded by George McGee that the polls be open. A vote in the affirmative.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Henry Waldo, Chairman of the Budget Committee, made the recommendation of \$7,200.00.

Motion by James MacDonald and seconded by Joseph Landry to accept the Budget Committee's recommendation.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 3. How much money will be raised for the Police Department.

Henry Waldo made the recommendation of \$5800.00.

Motion by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the sum of \$5800.00 as recommended be accepted.

A vote in the affirmative.

A discussion followed concerning sending our Police Chief to the available State Police Training School.

Motion by Charles Doherty that we raise the recommendation by \$300.00 to finance this training. This makes the budget now \$6100.00.

Seconded by Arthur Asselin.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 4. How much money will be raised for the Fire Department.

Henry Waldo recommended the sum of \$5000.00.

Motion by Edward Clark, seconded by George McGee that we accept the Budget Committee's recommendation.

A vote in the affirmative.

Discussion: Murray Clark asked if the Fire Chief was present. He was not. He then asked if the Assistant Fire Chief was present. He was. Mr. Clark then proceeded to direct questions at him. He asked if all the firemen attended the fires. The Assistant Chief answered that about 90% of them attended the fires. Mr. Clark asked if a list could be made up showing who was in the department and the number of firemen attending fires as well as a list of the fires for statistics.

James MacDonald, Selectman said this would be done. The Fire Chief would be asked to make up a report for the next Town Report with all information necessary for the interest of the people. Mr. MacDonald also stated that the increase in this year's budget was ear-marked for more new hose and the additional increase was to be used for that purpose only.

Article 5. How much money will be raised for the Public Health Department.

A recommendation of \$2950.00 by Mr. Waldo.

Motion made by Esther Smith a sum of \$3950.00 be raised for the Public Health Department. She explained that this additional increase was to be used to raise the Public Health Nurse's salary.

Seconded by George McGee.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 6. How much money will be raised for Town Maintenance.

A recommendation by Mr. Waldo of \$16,000.00 be raised.

Motion by James MacDonald, seconded by Maurice LaBrecque that the recommendation be accepted.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 7. How much money will be raised for Street Lighting.

Mr. Waldo recommended the sum of \$5000.00.

Motion by Edward Clark and seconded by James MacDonald that the recommendation be accepted.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 8. How much money will be raised for Cemeteries.

Recommendation of \$1000.00 by Mr. Waldo.

Motion by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the Budget Committee's recommendation be accepted.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 9. How much money will be raised for Public Library.

The sum of \$1800.00 was recommended by H. Waldo.

Motion by George McGee that the sum of \$2,000.00 be raised. Seconded by Esther Smith, who stated that the increase was due to the insurance coming due this year.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 10. How much money will be raised for Support of Town Poor.

Mr. Waldo made the recommendation of \$6,000.00.

Motion by Maurice LaBrecque that the recommendation be accepted. Seconded by James MacDonald.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 11. How much money will be raised for Old Age Assistance.

Mr. Waldo recommended \$1300.00.

Motion by James MacDonald that this recommendation be accepted.

Seconded by George McGee.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 12. How much money will be raised for Maintenance of the Water Department.

Recommendation by Mr. Waldo of \$45.00.

Motion by Joseph Landry that this recommendation be accepted.

Seconded by George McGee.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 13. How much money will be raised for White Mts. Region Association.

Recommendation by Mr. Waldo of \$556.00.

Motion by Edward Clark that this recommendation be accepted.

Seconded by Henry Waldo.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 14. How much money will be raised for a 4th of July Celebration.

A motion by Roland Bourassa to raise the sum of \$250.00 for the 4th of July Celebration. Seconded by Charles Doherty.

A vote in the affirmative.

This money is to be used for the children and to be under the jurisdiction of the Parks and Playgrounds Recreation Committee.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 and interest to take up Water Bonds due July 1, 1963.

Mr. Waldo made the recommendation of \$1000.00.

Motion by Charles Doherty, seconded by J. Landry to accept the recommendation as made.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$800.00 and interest to take up Town Road Aid note due June 1, 1963.

Mr. Waldo made the recommendation of \$800.00.

Motion by James MacDonald and seconded by Joseph Landry to accept the recommendation.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1200.00 and interest to take up Fire Truck note due March 1, 1964.

Recommendation made by H. Waldo of \$1200.00.

Motion by Joseph Landry, seconded by Guy Hiltz to accept the recommendation.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2400.00 and interest to take up Payloader note due March 1, 1964.

Recommendation made by Henry Waldo in the sum of \$2400.00.

Motion made by George McGee, seconded by Maurice LaBrecque to accept the recommendation as made.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Motion by Henry Waldo, seconded by Charles Doherty to accept the Article as read.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 20. To see how much money will be raised for Civil Defense.

Mr. Waldo made the recommendation of \$300.00.

Motion by James MacDonald, seconded by James Adzarito to accept the recommendation of \$300.00.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 21. To see how much money will be raised for Parks and Playgrounds.

Recommendation by Mr. Waldo to raise the sum of \$2000.00.

A motion by George McGee, seconded by Charles Doherty to accept the recommendation of \$2000.00.

A vote in the affirmative.

M. Patterson asked for a discussion pertaining to using the river for swimming. Mr. Waldo stated it was a very great responsibility and it would mean crossing Company land to get to the river. He said we have quite a problem as far as a place to swim is concerned.

Les Sargent made a motion that we pass over Article 21 and take it up later.

Article 21 will be taken up after Article 42 has been taken up and discussed. Seconded by Esther Smith.

A vote was taken—69 in favor—none opposed.

A Motion by George Hooker, seconded by Arthur Asselin that the Town Meeting be recessed in order to take up the Lincoln School District Meeting at 10:30 A.M. This meeting lasted until 12:00 noon at which time a recess was called and the meeting to be continued at 1:00 P.M. The School District Meeting adjourned at 1:55 P.M.

Motion by George McGee and seconded by Henry Waldo to move out of recess and take up the Town Meeting articles again.

All were in favor.

Article 22. To see how much money will be raised for the Lincoln-Woodstock Chamber of Commerce.

Henry Waldo recommended the sum of \$400.00 be raised.

Motion by Lawrence Woodward, seconded by Murray Clark that this recommendation be accepted.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 23. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$85.79, the State to contribute \$571.96 for T.R.A.

Henry Waldo recommended the sum of \$85.00 be raised.

Motion by George McGee seconded by James MacDonald to accept the recommendation as made.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$800.00 for Social Security Taxes.

Mr. Waldo made the recommendation of \$800.00.

Motion by James MacDonald, seconded by Murray Clark to accept the recommendation.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3000.00 for rent of the Lincoln Garage Building.

Recommendation of \$3000.00 be raised by H. Waldo.

Motion by James MacDonald, seconded by George McGee to accept the recommendation as made.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 26. To see how much money will be raised for Town Dump.

Henry Waldo recommended the sum of \$1200.00 be raised.

Motion by George McGee, seconded by James MacDonald to accept the recommendation as made.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 27. To see how much money will be raised for sidewalk construction.

Henry Waldo recommended the sum of \$1,500.00 be raised.

Motion by George McGee seconded by James MacDonald that the sum of \$1,500.00 be raised for sidewalk construction.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to use from Surplus a sum not to exceed \$2000.00 for the purchase of a new car for the Public Health Department.

Motion by James MacDonald, seconded by Esther Smith to accept the recommendation as made by Henry Waldo of raising the sum of \$2000.00 for this purpose.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 for the Bi-Centennial celebration in 1964.

Recommendation by Mr. Waldo that the sum of \$1000.00 be raised.

Motion by George McGee seconded by James MacDonald to accept the recommendation as stated.

The following resolution was read and included in the motion:

RESOLUTION:

WHEREAS, George the Third, King of England, by the Royal Governor, Benning Wentworth, granted to the proprietors, James Avery and others, a charter to establish the Town of Lincoln on the 31st day of January 1764, and

WHEREAS it is fitting that the people of the Town make suitable and appropriate observance of the 200th anniversary of its incorporation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. During the year 1964 at such time or times as

may be most convenient for the people to attend and participate, a celebration be held in the form of suitable testimonials, memorials, pageant or otherwise appropriate means commemorating the incorporation of the Town.

2. Such celebration be organized and carried out under the direction of a committee of residents whose Chairman is appointed by the Board of Selectmen.

Appropriated and donated funds be expended under the direction of said Committee in such manner and for such purposes as will best contribute to the recognition of the history, development and accomplishments of the Town and its people during the two centuries .

3. All present and former residents, and all other people interested in this community be invited to assist in the planning, preparation and presentation of the commemorative program to the end that the celebration may be completely representative of the traditions of the Town of Lincoln and its people.

ADOPTED by vote of the Town Meeting the 12th day of March 1963.

The above resolution was read by our ex-Governor Sherman Adams.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2000.00 to be set aside in a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new truck when needed.

Motion by James MacDonald, seconded by George McGee to accept the recommendation made by Henry Waldo of \$2000.00.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 31. To see what action the Town will take in regard to authorizing the transfer of the Bog Pond tract of land to the White Mountain National Forest.

Motion by George McGee, seconded by Henry Waldo—I move that the request made by the Lancaster Development Corporation for permission to the United States to acquire the so-called Bog Pond tract for

inclusion in the White Mountain National Forest be disapproved.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 32. To see what action the Town will take in regard to construction of a dam or dams by the Federal Government on the East Branch of the Pemigewasset River.

The following resolution was read by George McGee:

RESOLUTION:

WHEREAS the United States Corps of Engineers, pursuant to Act of Congress, is presently developing additional plans for the control of the flowage of the Pemigewasset River which includes certain projects on the East Branch of said river east of the Townsite of Lincoln, and

WHEREAS further economic development of this community is desirable and in the general interest, and

WHEREAS plans are presently under consideration for the construction and operation of a permanent year round recreational facility to be located within a radius of two miles east of this Townsite which will furnish employment, contribute to the tax base and benefit the economy of this community, now be it

RESOLVED that, although flowage control of the East Branch river through construction of dams and reservoirs is desirable and in the interest of this community, the voters of Lincoln assembled in Town Meeting this 12th day of March 1963 go on record as opposing any such dam or reservoir the construction of which would conflict or interfere with any recreational facility within a radius of two miles from the center of the village of Lincoln.

A motion on the above resolution by George McGee, seconded by James MacDonald.

A vote in the affirmative.

The above was thoroughly discussed and a map showing the proposed dam or dams was shown and described.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$80,000.00 for the purpose of financing and constructing a water works on D.W. Highway and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds, as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Lincoln, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Motion by George McGee, seconded Arthur Asselin to pass over this Article until a later time during the day.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available in the construction of a water system on the D.W. Highway, and pass any vote relating thereto.

George McGee made a motion that we accept the Article as it reads.

Seconded by James MacDonald.

A vote by show of hands was taken—69 in favor—2 opposed.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to file in behalf of the Town an application (in form and manner required by the United States and in conformity with P. L. 560, 83rd Congress) and do whatever else may be required for an advance, not to exceed \$125,000.00, to be made by the United States to the Town of Lincoln to aid in defraying the cost of final report and plan preparation for sewerage and sewage treatment facilities for the Town of Lincoln, and, further, to see if the Town will make the necessary arrangements to provide such additional funds as may be required to defray the cost of preparation of the report and plans.

Motion by George McGee to accept the Article as it reads, seconded by Henry Waldo.

A Vote by show of hands, 49 in favor, 7 opposed.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply, negotiate and do all things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available in the construction of a sewerage disposal system, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Motion by George McGee to accept the Article as read, seconded by Henry Waldo.

A vote in the affirmative, with 50 for and 2 opposed.

Article 37. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to acquire by gift, purchase, power of eminent domain, or otherwise, all necessary land, easements, and rights-of-way required for sewage and industrial waste treatment facilities for Lincoln.

George McGee made a motion to accept the article as read, seconded by Henry Waldo.

A vote by show of hands—52 in favor—none opposed.

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600,000.00, for the purpose of financing and constructing a municipal sewerage disposal system, including sewerage, interceptors, pumping stations, treatment works, and such other related facilities inclusive of land acquisition, easements and rights of way as are required, such sum to be raised by the issuance of not exceeding \$1,600,000.00 in Serial Bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of New Hampshire Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds, as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Lincoln, and pass any vote relating thereto.

A motion by George McGee that Articles 33 and 38 be passed over and brought up and be made a special order of business on May 14th, 1963 at 4:00 P.M. at a special town meeting to be called.

Seconded by Henry Waldo.

A vote by show of hands—52 in favor—none opposed.

Article 39. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 to be paid to the Treasurer of the Lincoln-Woodstock Cooperative School District to defray the share of the Lincoln School District of the \$4,000.00 appropriated under Article 7 and 8 of the warrant of the organization meeting of said Cooperative School District held on June 23, 1962.

Recommendation by Henry Waldo to raise the sum of \$1800.00.

Motion by George McGee, seconded by Robert Russell, to accept the article as read and raise and appropriate the \$1800.00 necessary.

All in favor.

Article 40. To see what action the Town will take in regard to accepting the Lincoln High School property.

Motion by Les Sargent, I move that the Town vote to accept the Lincoln High School building and land as defined in the motion as adopted at the annual Lincoln School District meeting held March 12th, 1963 under Article 6 of the school warrant. Seconded by H. Waldo.

ARTICLE 6—FROM THE SCHOOL WARRANT.

Moved—L. Sargent

Seconded—G. Hooker

“I move that the District authorize the School Board to convey by Quitclaim Deed to the Town of Lincoln for nominal consideration only, the present Lincoln High School and the lot of land on which it stands together with an additional parcel of land fifteen feet

in width parallel to the property line between the high school lot and the grammar school lot and to be taken from said grammar school lot and original, EXCEPTING AND RESERVING, however, to the Lincoln-Woodstock Cooperative School District, the right to occupy and use said property for school purposes without payment of rent until such time as the new secondary school, which is to be erected on the Lincoln Inn property, so called, has been completed and the pupils transferred to said new secondary school; also EXCEPTING AND RESERVING to said Lincoln-Woodstock Cooperative School District, the right to remove all fixtures and personal property listed in the appraisal of equipment heretofore prepared by the State Tax Commission and the State Department of Education or as may be listed in a supplemental appraisal by either or both of said agencies to be made prior to July 1, 1963, and furthermore that all such items shall be removed not later than thirty (30) days following occupancy of the new secondary school; provided, however, that so long as it shall occupy and use said property, said Cooperative School District shall be responsible for all costs of maintenance and operation."

An amendment to the motion by George McGee, seconded by Arthur Asselin, that nothing be done to or with this building until a special town meeting be called for this purpose.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 41. To see that if and when greyhound racing for public exhibition, at which pari-mutuel pools are to be sold, is legalized by the New Hampshire General Court, to see what action the Town of Lincoln will take relative to approving and authorizing the location, construction and operation of a greyhound race track for holding racing meetings in said Town of Lincoln.

Motion by George McGee, seconded by Arthur Asselin to postpone any action on Article 41.

A vote in the affirmative.

Article 42. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Reconsideration of Article 21.

All were in favor.

Motion by Les Sargent, seconded by Martha Patterson.

I move that the sum of \$3500.00 be raised for Parks and Playgrounds; the additional amount of \$1500.00 to be used for support of a day camp program for the children of Lincoln and under the supervision of the Parks and Playgrounds Committee and subject to said committee obtaining swimming facilities for the program.

All were in favor of the motion, a vote in the affirmative.

Moderator James Maguire asked for nominations from the floor to fill vacancies on the Budget Committee.

The following people were nominated from the floor:

Henry Waldo, William Hogan, Walter Gahagan, and Roger Stewart.

Motion by George Hooker that the nominations be closed, seconded by Arthur Asselin.

A vote in the affirmative. The clerk cast one ballot.

The Moderator declared the above people were elected to the Budget Committee, for a term of three years.

Moderator James Maguire chose the following people for a term of one year for the Recreation Committee:

Henry Waldo, Chairman, George McGee, Martha Patterson, George Boyle, and Lorretta Russell.

A RESOLUTION WAS PASSED THAT THIS TOWN MEETING ADJOURN IN HONOR OF MR. EVERETT SMITH WHO WORKED MANY YEARS

 AS A WATER COMMISSIONER FOR THE TOWN OF LINCOLN.

Moved by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that this Town Meeting recess to take up voting, 3:50 P.M.

28. To see if the Town will vote to use from Sur-

plus \$2,000.00 to be set aside in a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new truck when needed.

29. To see if the Town will vote to use from Surplus \$8,000.00 to be applied against the 1964 Tax Rate.

30. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$5,500.00 for Water Works Construction on the Hanson Farm Road and the Roland Bourassa road.

31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600,000.00 for the purpose of financing and constructing a municipal sewage disposal system, including sewerage, interceptors, pumping stations, treatment works, and such other related facilities inclusive of land acquisition, easements and rights of way as are required, such sum to be raised by the issuance of not exceeding \$1,600,000.00 in Serial Bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments Thereto) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and to determine the rate of Interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds, as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Lincoln, and pass any vote relating thereto.

32. To see what action the Town will take with respect to adopting a resolution concerning the Livermore Falls Project as proposed by the United States Army Corps of Engineers and to see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in connection with such resolution.

33. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Lincoln High School property.

34. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$25,000.00 on a 10 year note for Town Road Construction.

35. To see what action the Town will take to authorize the Selectmen to sell or accept such parcels of land as may be in the best interest of the Town.

36. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to acquire from the State of New Hampshire the land and rights to the Lincoln Airport and make it a municipal field.

37. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Total calls made in the area were 1,300 of this number 9 to prenatals; 23 to new mothers; Infants under one month 36; one month to two years 29; preschools 15; communicable disease and suspects 25; medical visits 300; to chronics 430; unclassified, i.e. welfare, clinic connected, etc., 400 and crippled children services 33.

Conferences with State and County case workers 27; workshops and meetings attended 7; school visits in the area totalled 206. Nurses examinations were carried out on 226 Elementary pupils. Two hundred and twenty-one pupils in Senior and Junior High School were given athletic physicals by Dr. Ralph Parker of Franconia. As whooping cough was prevalent in May, Dr. Stenberg advised that a Triple Toxoid Clinic be held for age group six weeks up to eleven years. 260 attended this clinic.

Grades 1-4-8 in the Elementary schools and third year high school pupils were given the Heaf Test for the detection of tuberculosis. As a result of this testing, six chest X-rays were taken.

An extra clinic for Type III Oral Sabin Polio Vaccine was conducted in September. This was for those children and adults who missed last years Type III clinic. Some 90 children and adults attended.

These Clinics along with the Triple Toxoid and the Heaf Test were conducted through the N. H. Department of Health and Welfare and the local Health Services.

A good number of mothers availed themselves of the opportunity to attend the Child Health Clinic in Franconia conducted by Dr. Ralph Parker through the N. H. Department of Health and Welfare.

The Red Cross Mobile Blood Bank paid an extra visit here this year in order to help increase the supply of blood at the Centers which supply the demands of the various hospitals in this area. Forty pints were collected here for which the Blood Program Chairman was most grateful.

The Christmas Project was substantially aided by the Junior and Senior High School students; the Knights of Columbus; Littleton Lodge of Elks; American Legion and the Lincoln-Woodstock Chamber of Commerce. Toys, food and clothing were distributed.

Again we are grateful to the ladies of both communities for their generous help on all projects and to the personnel of all schools who cooperated so fully.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Lincoln for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1963, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Municipal Court and Trustees of Trust Funds.

Financial Statements

**Comparative Balance Sheets—
December 31, 1962-December 31, 1963:
(Exhibit A-1)**

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1962 and December 31, 1963, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$14,784.92 in 1963.

**Analysis of Change in Financial Condition:
(Exhibit A-2)**

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1963, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$6,750.57, plus a revenue surplus of \$5,325.78, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$12,076.35.

**Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures:
(Exhibit B-1)**

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1963, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1963, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit G)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1963, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$9,384.92, from \$4,403.73 to \$13,788.65 in 1963, as shown herewith:

Tax Sales Accounts:

The standard procedure for tax sales accounting should be adopted by the Tax Collector. When the Town buys property at a Collector's sale for delinquent taxes, a check is given to the Collector for the amount of taxes, interest and costs. At that time the amount of

each taxpayer whose property is sold should be credited in the Collector's warrant book and the interest and costs to date of sale also entered therein.

Each individual account sold should then be listed in the "Record of Tax Sales" book, indicating the taxpayer's name, amount of delinquent tax, interest and costs to date of sale and the total amount for which the property was sold.

Subsequently when redemptions are made from the tax sale, the proper accounts should be credited in the "Record of Tax Sales" book, indicating the amount of sale and the interest and costs which accrued between the date of sale and the date of redemption.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Lincoln for their assistance during the course of the audit.
