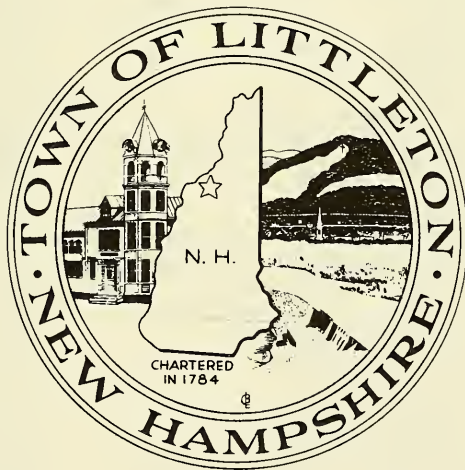
View of Town Littleton as seen from Rte. 93 South — Presidential Range in background.

RESULTS OF THE 1983 LITTLETON WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the eighth day of March, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M. and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School auditorium at 7:00 P.M.) , to act upon the following:

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner of a three-year term, a Town Treasurer for a one-year term, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for three-year terms, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a three-year term, and one Town Clerk for a three-year term. (Ballot vote.)

The following Town officers were elected:

Selectman - Richard L. Hill

Park Commissioner - George A. Santy

Library Trustees - Sharon B. Edgar, Gwendolyn Howe, Mary Sue Kelly

Trustee of Trust Funds - Howard J. Collins, Jr.

Town Clerk - Thelma C. Santy

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) for the purpose of replacing the bridge at Bridge Street and for improvements related thereto, such sum to be raised by the issuance of serial notes and/or bonds in a sum not to exceed Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and/or bonds as needed and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation sale and delivery of such notes and/or bonds as shall be in the best interests of the Town. The total estimated cost of the project is Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00). 80% of which shall be paid for by the federal government, 10% of which shall be paid for by the State of New Hampshire, and 10% of which shall be paid for by the Town.

Article 2 was amended as follows: That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$200,000.00 for the purpose of replacing the Bridge Street bridge at a location as shown on a plan drawn by the Engineering Dept. of the State of New Hampshire and referred to as Scheme C.

Article 2 was voted by secret ballot, the polls remaining open for one hour. As this was a Bond issue, a two-thirds vote was required. The vote was - Yes - 416 - No - 299. As this was not the two-thirds vote required, the article was defeated.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for the purpose of completing preliminary engineering on a proposed access road to South Street.

Selectman Wayne Golden made a motion to pass over Article 3. This was voted to pass over.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Forty-two Thousand Dollars (\$242,000.00) for the purpose of making certain improvements to the Littleton Industrial Park and access thereto and to otherwise make the improvements specified in a certain application for a federal grant in the amount of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000.00) through the Economic Development Authority, such sum to be raised by the issuance of serial notes and/or bonds in a sum not to exceed Two Hundred Forty-two Thousand Dollars (\$242,000.00) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and/or bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes and/or bonds as shall be in the best interests of the Town.

Article 4 was amended as follows: I move that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000.00 for the purpose of making certain improvements to the Littleton Industrial Park and access thereto and to otherwise make the improvements specified in a certain application for a federal grant through the Economic Development Authority, and to take such other action as may be necessary in the best interests of the Town, and also that this be voted on by secret ballot.

This amendment would not be a bond issue, and would not need a two-thirds vote. This was voted by secret ballot. 570 votes were cast. Results: no- 238 yes - 332. Article passed.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to satisfy the purposes specified in the budget as posted.

Selectman Richard Hill made the motion: I move that the Town vote to raise the sum of One Million Three Hundred Ninety-Five Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty-Seven Dollars (\$1,395,757.00) to satisfy the purposes specified in the Town Budget.

This main motion was amended in two areas: \$5,229.00 in the White Mountain Mental Health area, and \$40,000.00 over and above what is now in the salary area of the Budget for town employees, making a new total of \$1,440,986.00. This article, with the amendments, was voted in the affirmative, voice vote.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to elect a Town Constable (Police Chief) pursuant to the provisions of R.S.A. 41:47. The election to be held at the March 1984 Annual Town Meeting.

This motion was soundly defeated.

Article 7. The undersigned residents of Littleton request the Selectmen to place the following question on the warrant for the 1983 Town Meeting. Shall the citizens of Littleton ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the United States Congress to: Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries.

Article 7. This article was defeated.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$11,000.00) for the purpose of subsidizing ambulance services provided by Ross Ambulance Service in the Town of Littleton and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 8 was voted to appropriate \$11,000.00 for Ross Ambulance Service. voice vote.

Article 9. The Town voted to appropriate the sum of \$2,056.00 to purchase one Radar Unit for the Police Department, and to use Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for this purpose.

Article 10. The Town voted to appropriate the sum of \$1,959.00 for the purpose of purchasing one electronic camera for the Police Department, and to use Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for this purpose.

Article 11. The Town voted to appropriate Three Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty-nine Dollars (\$3,739.00) for the purpose of purchasing window quilts for the Library and to use Federal Revenue Funds for this purpose.

Article 12. The Town voted to appropriate \$2,300.00 to paint the outside trim of the Library, and authorized Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for this purpose.

Article 13. The Town voted to appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purpose of planning the Town's 200th birthday celebration to be held in 1984 and to use Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for this purpose.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Eleven Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$11,800.00) for the purpose of purchasing certain equipment to be used in conjunction with the equipment of Supervisory Administrative Unit No. 35 in order to update the Town's bookkeeping system, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

This article was first defeated. Then a motion was made to reconsider. After much discussion, the article was approved.

Article 15. The Town voted to appropriate the sum of \$3,420.00 for the purpose of repairing 12 airpicks, and to use Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for this purpose.

Article 16. The Town voted to appropriate the sum of \$23,020.00 for the purpose of improving the entrance to West Elm Street and to use Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for this purpose.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for the purpose of completing Mill Street so as to open it up to through traffic and create additional parking and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

The Town voted to pass over this article.

Article 18. The Town voted to appropriate Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) for the purpose of paying the principle which will be due on November 1, 1983 on the Town Sewer Bond Note and authorized the withdrawal of this amount from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

Article 19. The Town voted to appropriate a total sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) for the purpose of establishing a Capital Reserve Fund, Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) of which would be used for repairs to Town buildings, Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) of which would be used to replace Town vehicles, and Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) of which would be used to reappraise Town property, with interest thereon being paid back to the general fund, said funds to be expended within five (5) years, and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 20. The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$1,400.00) for the purpose of the Community Action Outreach Program.

Article 21. To see if the voters of the Town of Littleton will vote to eliminate all parking meters within the Town and in their place establish a two-hour time limit on parking only between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. from Monday through Saturday, excluding holidays.

Article 21 was voted as amended. "I make a motion to keep parking meters on the Main Street of Littleton with enforcement to be only 9 A.M. to 5 P.M. Monday through Saturday excluding Sundays and holidays and lower overtime parking fines from \$3.00 to \$2.00. All funds left over from the Meter Fund to be turned over to General Funds for the following Fiscal Year for alleviation of taxes. Voted affirmative.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to direct and empower the Selectmen to waive and/or release the right of first refusal upon the Schoff Lumber Mill property and the appurtenances thereto.

Article 22. After much discussion, this article was defeated. The Town will keep the first refusal upon the Schoff Lumber Mill property.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote of the 1979 Town Meeting (Article 17) requiring a 7-man Fire Department (by request of the Budget Committee).

The Town voted to pass over Article 23.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to require individual property owners to construct their own sewage or waste disposal systems in accordance with all Federal and State laws and regulations at their sole expense, thus rescinding all previous votes and policies by the Town; provided, that the Town continue to pump and clean said systems as needed. This article was defeated.

Article 25. The Town voted to authorize the prepayment of all property taxes, and authorize the tax collector to accept such payments.

Article 26. The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey the property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed. The sales to be by public auction or by advertised bids.

Article 27. The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow moneys, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1983 and to be paid therefrom.

Article 28. The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source or bequest which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with the procedure set forth in R.S.A. 31:95-b.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-six Dollars (\$3,236.00) for the purpose of purchasing telephone equipment for all Town Departments.

The Town voted to pass over this article.

Article 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

This motion was made by Paul McGoldrick and so adopted.

I move that the Selectmen appoint a task force of nine Littleton voters (at least one of whom will be a Selectman and one will be a member of the Planning Board) to study the problems and hazards related to heavy truck and auto travel on South Street. This task force should study all reasonable and feasible alternatives, and select one which best meets the short and long range goal of safe and efficient community vehicular traffic in the area of the Bridge Street bridge,

Bridge Street, Meadow Street, Riverside Drive, South Street, and the so-called dump road, and bring that alternative to the 1984 Town Meeting as a proposal for voter action.

There being no other business, the final meeting was adjourned.

This 1983 Town Meeting required four evenings to complete all business involved. The March 8 and March 9 meetings were held at the High School, and the March 10 and March 15 meetings at the Town Building Auditorium. Each night the meeting was adjourned at 11 P.M.

SELECTMEN OF LITTLETON, N.H.

LITTLETON WARRANT
The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton in said State qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the thirteenth day of March, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M. and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:00 P.M.), to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for a three-year term, a Town Treasurer for a one-year term, three members of the Board of Trustees of the public library for three-year terms, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a three-year term, one Supervisor of the Checklist for a six-year term, and one Moderator for a two-year term. (Ballot vote.)

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of increasing the Board of Selectmen to five members? (Ballot vote.) (By petition in accordance with RSA 39:3 and RSA 41:8-b.)

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by petition of the voters of this Town, as follows?

"To see if the Town will re-zone the property on East side of Route 135 and the North side of I-93 owned by C. George McLure and Patricia McLure. From 'Commercial 111' and 'Rural' districts to 'Industrial' except for 500 feet easterly from the easterly boundary line of Route 135 shall be 'Commercial 1' with said lot being approximately 61 acres. As more particularly shown on the plan attached to the petition."

(The Planning Board disapproves this amendment.) (Ballot vote.)

ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance, as follows?

Purpose: The regulation and control of the location, size, type, and the number of signs permitted shall be governed by the provisions of this article. The purpose of this article shall be to safeguard and enhance property values; to protect public and private investment in buildings and open spaces; to preserve and improve the appearance of the community as a place in which to live and to work; to attract non-residents who come to visit or trade; to encourage sound signing practices as an aid to business and public information; and to promote the public health, safety, and general welfare.

8.01 Sign Definition: Any exterior structure, device, or representation designed or used to advertise or call attention by visible communication to any thing, person, business, activity, or place. The word 'sign' does not include the flag of any governmental unit, unlettered awnings, or temporary flag/pennant displayed during business hours of an establishment.

8.02 Signs not advertising or identifying the occupant or activity of the lot on which they are located shall be allowed only in C or I districts and are subject to the following:

8.02A Free-standing, off-premise signs must not be:

8.02A.1 Within 5' of any public way.

8.02A.2 At the corner of any public ways within a radius of 150 feet from the point where the center lines of the ways intersect.

8.02A.3 Within 300 feet of any public park, playground, or other public grounds.

8.02B Attached, off-premise signs:

8.02B.1 One per business, for the purpose of direction only, not to exceed 4 square feet in size, and subject to 8.09.2C, 8.09.2D, and 8.13 of these regulations.

8.03 No Change.

8.04 No Change.

8.05 No Change.

8.06 No Change.

8.07 No Change.

8.08 In I District a free-standing directional sign is permitted as follows:

8.08.1 One per business entity

8.08.2 Size may not exceed 4 square feet in each of 2 sides.

8.08.3 Number of directional signs limited to number of major entrances to industrial area.

8.09 Attached Signs:

8.09.1 One sign per enterprise permitted on each building side in public view.

8.09.2 Size:

8.09.2A Primary sign (defined as the sign on the primary public entrance side) shall not

exceed one square foot per each linear building foot of enterprise on that primary entrance side, or 100 square feet, whichever is less. Sign is to be measured by perimeter of backing or where there is no backing, by perimeter of letters.

8.09.2B Additional signs on other sides of building shall not exceed size of primary sign.

8.09.2 Size:

8.09.2C Projection: No sign or supporting structure shall extend more than 10 inches out from building where such extension is over the public way.

8.09.2D Height: Sign may not exceed height of building or parapet or be placed above second-story ceiling line (as measured from street level entrance), whichever is lower.

8.09.2E Increased square footage is allowed for increased building setback as follows:

<u>Building Setback</u>	<u>Increase in Size</u>
40' - 50'	50%
50' - 75'	100%
75' +	200%

8.09.2F Sign may be subdivided into more than one, but the total square footage, as measured individually, must not exceed maximums in Section 8.09.2A or 8.09.2E.

8.10 Free-Standing Signs on Premises:

8.10.1 One per building or contiguous complex.

8.10.2 May not extend over height of building or parapet, or more than 35 feet, whichever is less.

8.10.3 May not exceed ~~50~~ square feet on each of two sides, including attachments. Special exception may be granted to this section when business is located in an area where the speed limit is greater than 35 m.p.h.

8.10.4 Leading edge of sign must be set back from public way 10 feet, if building is set back 25 feet or more. In no case may the leading edge of sign extend over public way or cause a safety hazard.

8.10.5 Increased square footage permitted for increase in sign setback as follows:

<u>Sign Setback</u>	<u>Increase in Size</u>
40' - 50'	50%
50' - 75'	100%
75' +	200%

8.10.6 Shopping center signs: (advertising 3 or more contiguous enterprises and building set back 40' or more). All regulations in this section apply except:

8.10.6A Total surface of area of main sign may not exceed 100 square feet on each of two sides. In addition, individual identification signs for each enterprise may be attached to main sign, but may not exceed 8 square feet on each of two sides.

8.10.6B Individual enterprises in complex may have an additional attached sign, regulated in accordance with Section 8.09 except that the following increases in size for said attached sign will be allowed for increased setback.

<u>Setback</u>	<u>Increase in Size</u>
40' - 50'	50%
50' - 75'	100%
75' - +	200%

(See the remainder of this amendment on the back cover.)
(Ballot vote.)

ARTICLE 5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance, as follows?

"To create a Commercial IV zone, the boundaries of which would lie on either side of Meadow Street from Main Street to Interstate 93, and run to the Ammonoosuc River on the southerly side and to the present C-1 zone line on the northerly side, which is 250 ft. deep between Main Street and Dells Road, and 500 ft. deep between Dells Road and Interstate 93.

The Table of Use Regulations and the Table of Lot Requirements shall both be the same for the C-IV zone as for the present C-I zone.

Section 6.03 'Setback' shall be amended by adding the following to the last sentence, 'except that this reduced setback shall not apply to the C-IV zone.'

(Ballot vote.)

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to satisfy the purposes specified in the budget as posted.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town of Littleton shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative(s) and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Littleton, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire. (By petition in accordance with RSA 39:3.)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the sale of an automobile currently being used by the Police Department and vote to authorize the expenditure of a sum not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) from the Town's capital reserve fund pursuant to RSA 35:15 for the purchase of an automobile for the Police Department.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the expenditure of a sum not to exceed Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) from the Town's capital reserve fund pursuant to RSA 35:15 for the purpose of conducting a study and for the making of improvements to the Town Hall.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to require all moneys in the Parking Meter Fund, now or in the future, consisting of meter funds and ticket fines be transferred to the General Fund at the end of each fiscal year and that all expenses relating to the parking meters, including the Meter Person, be charged to the General Fund.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept a fire tanker from the Eureka Fire Hose Company in consideration of transferring the old fire tanker to the Eureka Fire Hose Company plus One Dollar (\$1.00).

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500.00) to be used by the South Street Traffic Study Committee to retain a consultant to study alternatives.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for the purpose of correcting alleged problems with well water systems along Mann's Hill Road.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Eighty-six Thousand Dollars (\$86,000.00) for the purpose of reappraising the real estate in the Town for tax assessment purposes and authorize the expenditure of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) from the Town's capital reserve fund pursuant to RSA 35:15 for this purpose and further authorize the withdrawal of Fifty-six Thousand Dollars (\$56,000.00) for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Thirty-five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) for the purpose of preparing new Town tax maps and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate One Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$1,900.00) for the purpose of making improvements to the library building and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600.00) for the purpose of purchasing Scot Air Packs for the Town Fire Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00) for the purpose of the Town's Bicentennial Celebration and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing two snowplows for the Town highway department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for the purpose of making land improvements in the Town parks and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the sale of a vehicle currently being used by the Highway Department and vote to appropriate Thirty-two Thousand Dollars (\$32,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing a dump truck for the Town Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) for the purpose of making repairs and erecting signs on the Town bridges and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey the property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed, the sale to be by public auction or by advertised sealed bids.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate One Hundred Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$130,000.00) to purchase the Beaton property, so-called, currently being occupied by Crosstown Motors on West Main Street and located in front of the Town Garage.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow moneys, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1984 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit, or a private source or bequest which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with the procedure set forth in RSA 31:95-b.



ARTICLE 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before the Meeting.



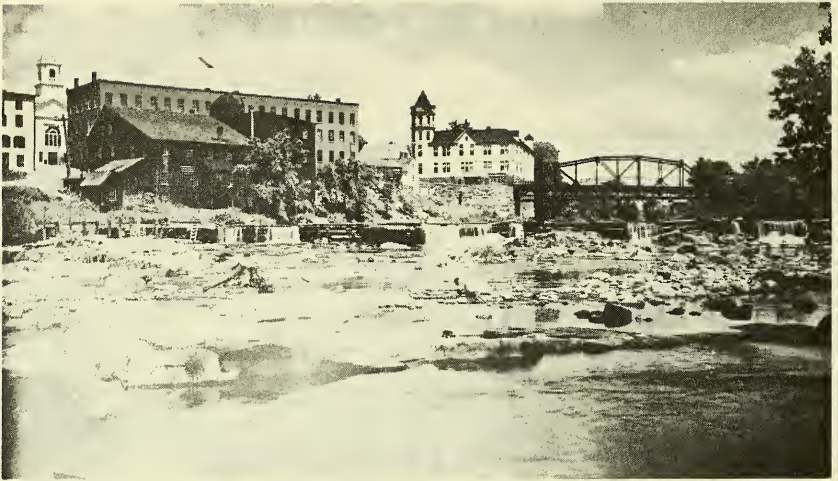

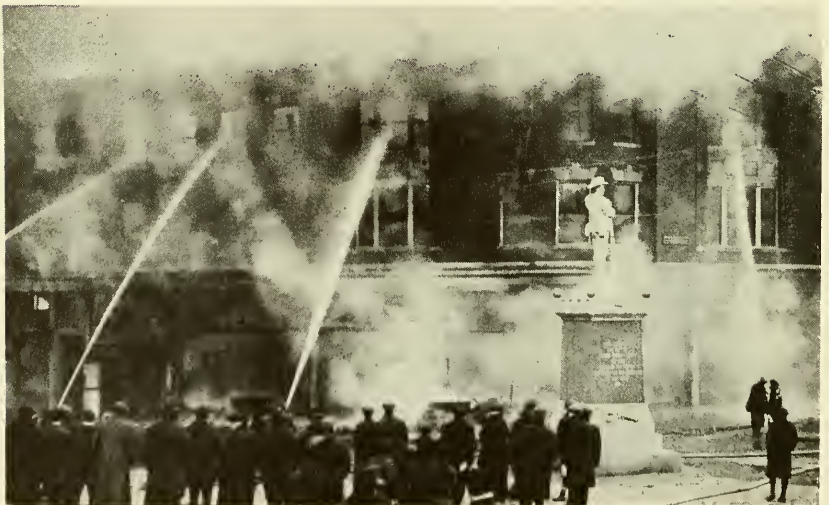
Town Building and Main Street 1900 – Opera Block at right

Salomon Block — just across the street from the fire station is destroyed for the second time by fire, in April 1917. Town Building and Opera House were spared and block rebuilt.

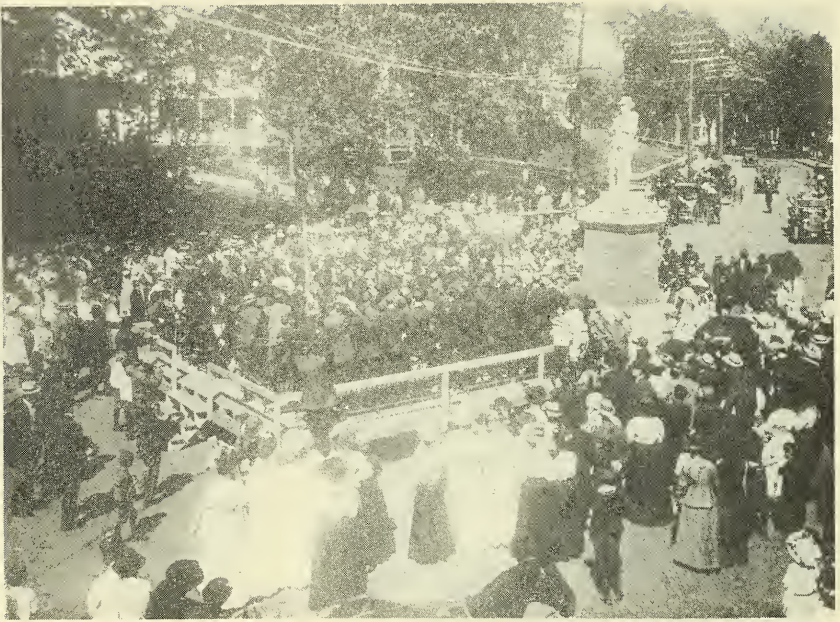

Littleton High School — built in 1867, remodelled several times, torn down in 1926 and replaced with a new building which opened September 14, 1926.





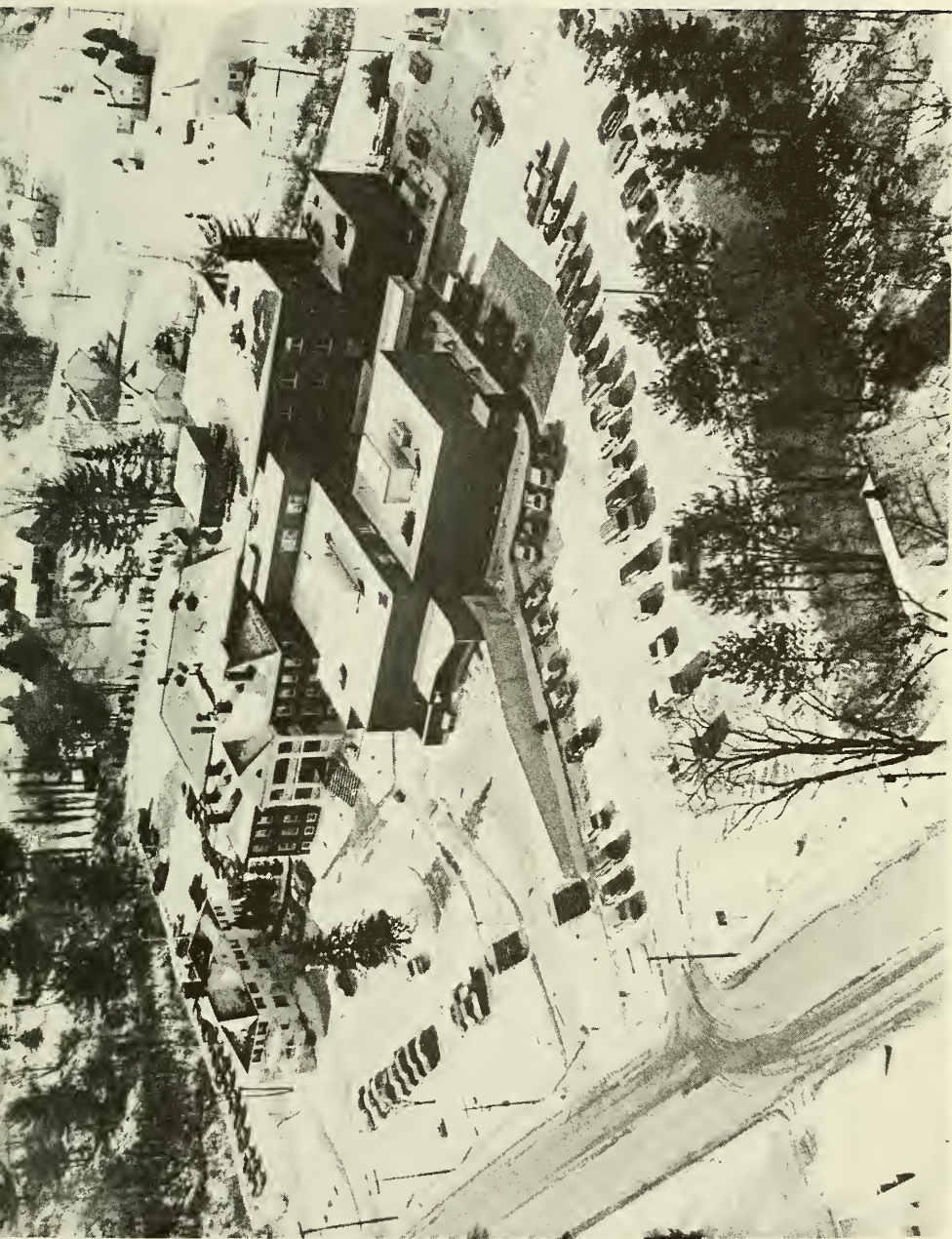
Thayer's Hotel — one of N.H.'s oldest surviving inns; built 1848-1850; a stagecoach center for travelling guests and those who came by train.



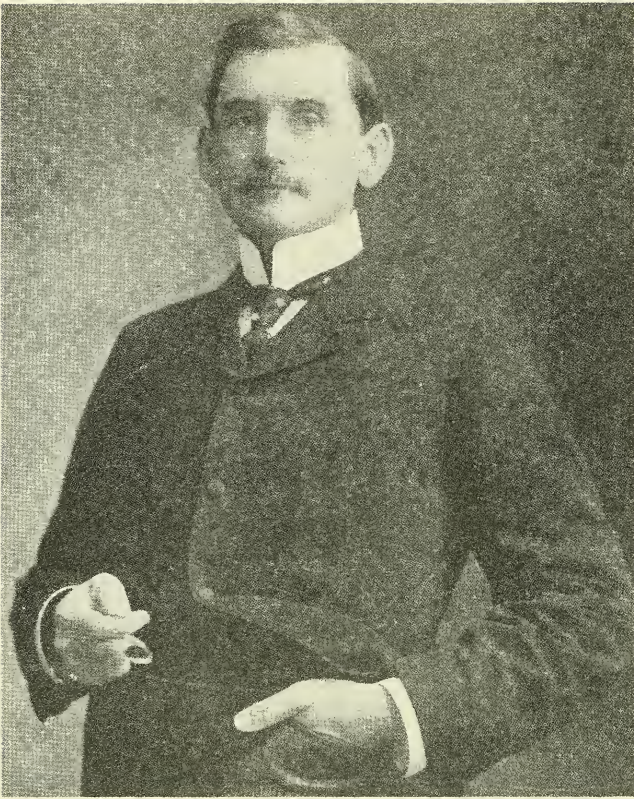
Flood On Lafayette Avenue — Devastating flood of 1927 as seen on Lafayette Avenue; Sears Roebuck factory is seen in the rear.

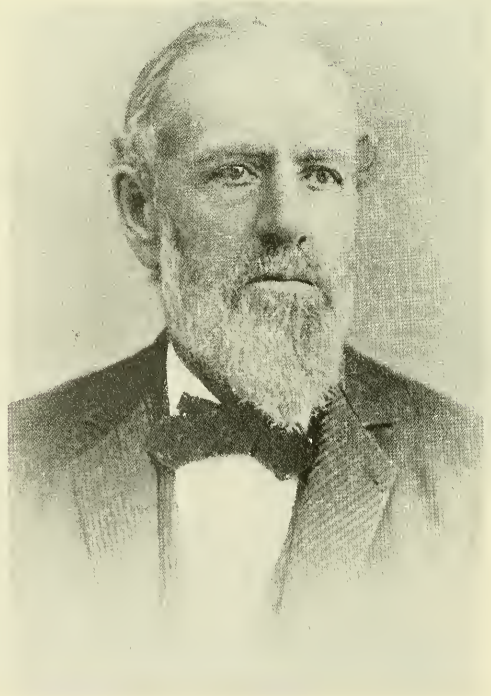

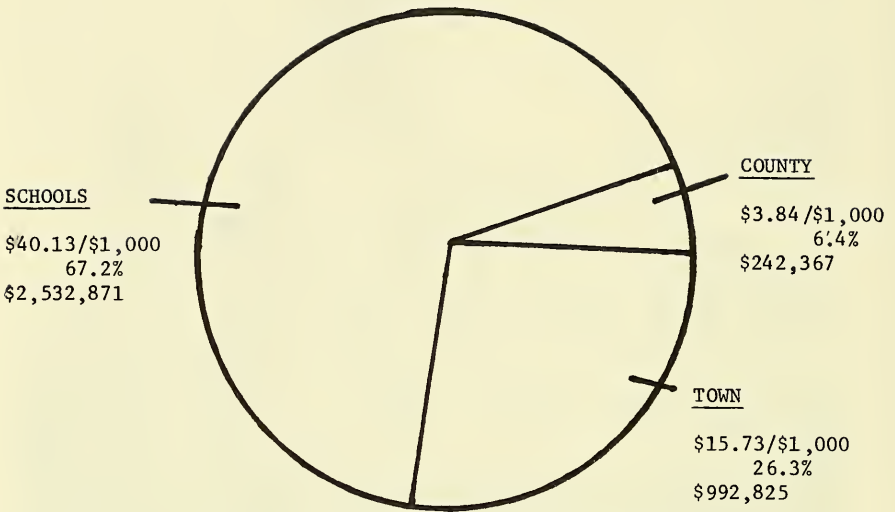

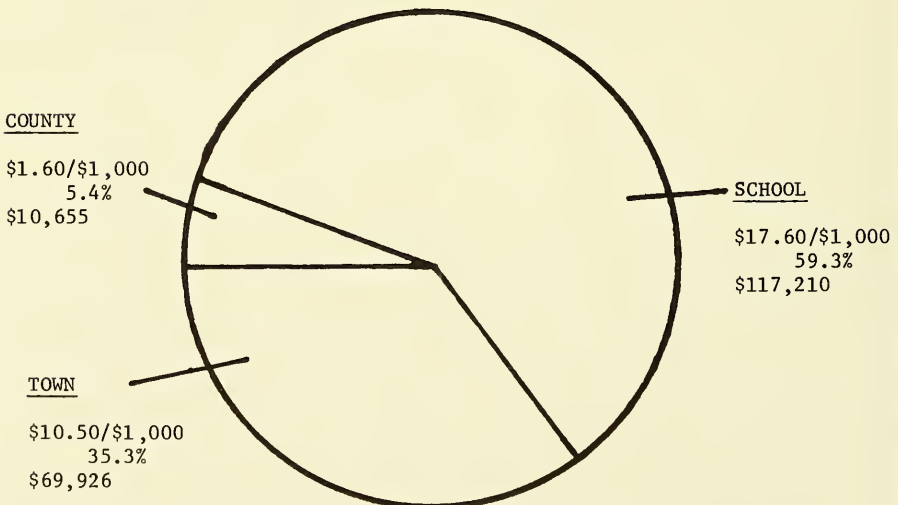

Dear Selectmen:

In connection with our examination of the financial statements for the Town of Littleton for the year ended December 31, 1983, we reviewed the system of internal control and accounting procedures of the Town. Our procedures included discussions with various employees responsible for performing accounting functions. We noted several areas where internal controls and accounting procedures could be revised and supplemented in order to better safeguard the Town's resources and for improved operations. We realize that, with a limited size office staff, the most ideal system of internal control or the most desirable accounting system may not be practical; however, it is our opinion that a concerted effort should be made to improve internal control in operating procedures wherever possible. The comments and recommendations we are making attempt to recognize the limitations imposed by the existing number of personnel.

One objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition. Another objective is to provide reasonable assurance as to the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived. This concept also recognizes that the evaluation of cost versus benefits necessarily requires judgements by the Selectmen.

There are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal accounting control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from the misunderstanding of instructions, carelessness, etc. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented by collusion. Further, reliance on any system of internal accounting control may deteriorate with the lack of compliance with the systems procedure.

The following areas are those we believe have material weaknesses in internal accounting control.

Department Revenue

Department Revenue is an area in which strengthening controls should be considered. Currently, Town invoices are kept in a book in alphabetical order by the bookkeeper. However, the Police Department does their own billing for officer duty. The invoices the Town uses are prenumbered, but no system is used to determine whether all invoices are accounted for. After the invoice is paid, the Town destroys its copy.

We recommend that the Town make use of the prenumbered invoices to develop a system that will account for all Town earned revenues. A listing of all invoices should be maintained. Revenue in the cash receipts journal should be reconciled regularly to the total of paid invoices on the listing. The employee given responsibility for this duty should also prepare invoices and billings for the Police Department. Assigning one person the responsibility of the recordkeeping of a certain accounting function provides greater internal control in that area.

Parking Meter Fund

The recordkeeping and collection procedures used to control revenue collected from the meters and parking fines are inadequate. No records are kept of total tickets handed out or whether the fines levied are collected. Also, records are not maintained regarding which tickets are given to individual officers or the meter maid. In addition, when tickets are paid or voided, they are torn up and thrown out, defeating the purpose of the consecutively numbered tickets.

The following measures should be taken:

- 1) One person, preferably not a member of the Police Department, should have custody of all unissued parking tickets.
- 2) Upon issuance of parking tickets to the officers and meter maid, the custodian of the tickets should record which tickets have been issued to which individuals.
- 3) There should be a monthly or quarterly accounting of all unissued tickets.
- 4) Issued tickets should be kept and filed in numerical order. Tickets paid or voided should be marked as such.
- 5) Preferably, meter collections should be made by someone outside of the Police Department and deposited directly in the bank by that person.
- 6) Fines paid should be deposited separately from the meter collections. The fines paid should be reconciled with the tickets issued.

Town Disbursements

Two minor weaknesses in internal control came to our attention during the review of the Town's financial statements. One weakness is that unused checks are readily available to all office staff. Internal controls would be strengthened if one person

had possession of the checks, preferably the Treasurer. When the office staff requires the use of checks for disbursements, the Treasurer can provide the checks for them.

Also, the bookkeeper is currently in charge of reconciling the bank statements to the checkbook. Although our audit procedures disclosed no errors, a good internal control accounting system requires the bank reconciliation to be done by an individual not involved in the handling of cash or bookkeeping records.

Computer

The purchase of a computer with the capabilities of performing most accounting procedures can provide a stronger measure of internal control. The major advantage of an integrated computer system is the increased amount of knowledge regarding the Town's activities. Monthly balance sheets, revenue and expense statements on the accrual basis, and budget to actual analysis can increase the management controls over day-to-day activities of the Town. Also, many mechanical procedures such as calculating the interest due on taxes and posting to accounts can be done swiftly.

The purchase of the computer should be done with great care and deliberation so that the system selected will provide with reasonable assurance:

- a) transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization;
- b) the necessary transactions are recorded to permit preparation of financial statements and to maintain accountability of assets; and,
- c) the recorded amount of any asset can be reconciled with the actual assets at reasonable intervals.


Conclusion



However, another firm of auditors has been engaged to audit that department's financial statements for the year ended December 31, 1983.

The Town of Littleton has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets, and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial statements.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the omission of a statement of general fixed assets, and the omission of the statements of the Littleton Water and Light Department as discussed in the preceding paragraphs, these financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Town of Littleton at December 31, 1983, and the results of its operations and changes in financial position for the year then ended, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with the preceding year.

The accompanying supplemental information is not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements, but is presented as additional analytical data. This information has been subjected to the tests and other auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements mentioned above, and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies of the Town of Littleton conform to generally accepted accounting principles applicable to governmental units, except as indicated hereinafter. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies.

Basis of Accounting - The accrual basis of accounting is followed by the Trust and Agency Funds. The General Fund and Special Revenue Funds utilize the modified accrual basis of accounting whereby revenues are recorded when measurable and available and expenditures are recorded when the liability is incurred.

General Fixed Assets - As is the usual practice in the State of New Hampshire, fixed assets are not capitalized in the accounting records when acquired. Funds used to acquire general fixed assets and/or make the debt service payments on borrowings in connection therewith are accounted for as expenditures in the year payments are made. Generally accepted accounting principles require that general fixed assets be capitalized and accounted for in a separate fixed assets group of accounts.

Continued Appropriations - Appropriations for certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year end are carried forward as continued appropriations to the new year in which they supplement the appropriations of that year. At the year end, the continued appropriations are reported as a component of the fund balances and are detailed as follows:

Investments - Investments in marketable securities are carried at cost.

Taxes Collected for Others - The Town collects taxes for Littleton School District and Grafton County which are remitted to them as required by law. These funds are accounted for in the general fund.

Inter-Fund Transactions - During the course of normal operations, the Town has numerous transactions between funds including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services, construct assets and service debt. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary funds financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

Retirement System - Members of the Police Department and Fire Department are automatically members of the New Hampshire Retirement System. Membership is voluntary to members of the Highway Department and Town Offices.

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Under this plan, participants contribute annually a percentage of compensation which is fixed by law and dependent upon age when contribution begins. The Town's contribution rate for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the state plan. In addition, the Town is contributing to the Special Legislative Annuity being paid monthly to retired employees in accordance with RSA 100-A. The amount, if any, of the excess of vested benefits over pension fund assets for the Town of Littleton is not available since all employers contributing to the New Hampshire Retirement System are treated in the aggregate.

The Town has no past service cost obligation. The total pension cost to the Town for the year was \$54,685. This includes payments made to a separate pension plan made on behalf of the Town Manager.

Property Taxes - Annually, the Town establishes an amount for abatement, discounts and refunds of property and resident tax revenues known as "Overlay". All abatements, discounts and refunds are charged to overlay.

As prescribed by law, the Tax Collector sells at tax sale, all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due, where applicable. The purchaser at tax sale has a priority tax lien on these properties and accrues interest at 12% per annum. Delinquent taxpayers must redeem property from tax sale purchasers.

Property is sold to the party who will accept a lien for the least undivided interest in the property for payment of taxes and related costs due. If property is not redeemed within the two-year redemption period, the property is tax deeded to the lienholder.

NOTE B - PURPOSE OF FUNDS AND ACCOUNT GROUPS

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purpose for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the Town.

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

General Fund - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges, and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

NOTE B - PURPOSE OF FUNDS AND ACCOUNT GROUPS (CONTINUED)

Special Revenue Funds - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action.

Capital Projects Funds - Transactions related to resources obtained and used for the acquisition, construction or improvement of capital facilities are accounted for in Capital Projects Funds. Such resources are derived principally from proceeds of long term notes or bonds and from federal grants.

Debt Service Funds - This fund accounts for the accumulation of resources for, and payment of, general long term debt principal and interest.

FIDUCIARY FUNDS

Trust and Agency Funds - Trust and Agency Funds are used to account for the assets held in trust or as an agent by the Town for others.

ACCOUNT GROUPS

General Long Term Debt - This account group is used to account for the unmatured principal of the Town's general long term debt. This account group is not a fund. It is concerned only with the measurement of financial position and not results of operations. Since they do not affect net current assets, such long term liabilities are not recognized as governmental fund type liabilities.

NOTE D - CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

The Town is contingently liable in respect of lawsuits and other claims in the ordinary course of its operations. The Town is a defendant in a significant suit arising from claims over a construction contract. The settlement of such contingencies under the budgetary process would require appropriation of revenues yet to be realized and would not materially affect the financial position of the Town at December 31, 1983.

NOTE E - CAPITAL PROJECTS FUND

The Town has completed the Headworks Sewer Project with E.D.A. funds. The remaining cash balance is retainage to be paid out when the project is approved.

NOTE F - DISTRICT COURT

Beginning in 1984, the District Court will be under the jurisdiction of the State of New Hampshire.

PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS

STREETS AND HIGHWAYS:

January through March snow fall was light, so we had time to do a lot of brush cutting along our roadsides. Also, time was spent hauling cover to the Dump from the Mt. Eustis Pit.

As soon as weather permitted, sidewalks were cleaned of Winter sand, and the Mobil Sweeper started Spring Clean-Up. Ditches and culverts were cleaned, and basins were cleaned and repaired in different areas. Also, some culverts had to be replaced.

The Old Waterford Road Project was finished this past season. The Elm and West Elm Street Project was completed. This consisted of retaining walls, storm drain pipe, and resurfacing.

McBean Circle, which is off the Sampson Road, was paved. Also, some paving was done on Mt. Eustis Road and Farr Hill Road. A small project on Mann's Hill was done from Nelson's Driveway down beyond Bulis' Property, consisting of culvert work, ditch and shoulder work, and repaving.

Some time was spent with the Water & Light Department on different projects.

We did a little project on the back side of Mt. Eustis--culvert work, widening the road a little by straightening curves and corners.

Some 2,200 yards of sand were hauled from the Mt. Eustis Pit into the Town Garage Stockpile to replenish the stockpile for Winter use.

SEWERS:

Some of the sewer lines in the compact area were rodded and flushed, as there were a few spots in Town that gave us problems. This has to be done from time to time to prevent plug-ups in the lines.

Also, there were 12 new septic systems installed and 4 repair jobs on existing systems.

SIDEWALKS:

Winter sanding and Spring clean-up were done.

DUMP:

5,600 yards of cover were hauled to the Dump this past year. Material from our ditching work was hauled there also. A lot of time was spent at the Mt. Eustis Burning Dump cleaning up and digging trenches for burning.

LITTLETON POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Littleton Police Department worked a total of 32,653 hours in service to the Town of Littleton. This included an average of 254 calls for service per month or 3,048 calls for the year. These calls included but are not limited to 22 separate categories of service from routine foot and cruiser patrol to administrative paperwork, (ie. fire calls, traffic enforcement, motor vehicle accidents, criminal investigations, sick cared for, escorts, special details, court appearances, dog complaints, etc.) 12,633 hours were spent on administrative and support services, this includes the two dispatchers, one clerk-typist, meter maid and Chief of Police. (Eight regular officers accounted for 17,680 hours while special officers accounted for 2,340 hours of service.)

During the year 1983 the Littleton Police Department made a total of 780 arrests. These included 501 motor vehicle, 245 criminal and 34 juvenile offenses. Speeders again lead the arrest list in motor vehicle violations with 218, followed by D.W.I. with 36, operating uninspected vehicle 27, crossing center line 19 and operating without license 17, 184 in other categories. There was a total of 61 Breathalyzer examinations by Littleton Police. This low number is accounted for because of a challenge of the old Breathalyzer equipment in the Supreme Court. There was a period of approximately six months when we could not use the old Breathalyzer before we received the new Intoximeter.

There were a total of 213 accidents investigated by the Littleton Police Department during 1983, including 199 motor vehicle, 9 motorcycle, 2 bicycle and 3 pedestrian. There were 36 injuries with no fatalities. Of the 199 motor vehicle accidents 116 fell in the category of the two-car accident and 82 one-car accidents and only one three-car or more category. There were 212 males and 98 females involved in these accidents. The majority of these accidents occurred on Wednesday through Saturday between the hours of 10 AM to 1 PM and again between 3 PM and 5 PM in the evening. These accidents mostly took place on straight dry roads in the 30 mile per hour zone. The cause of most accidents fell in the backing, speeding and following too close categories. The average age of the operators involved in accidents fell in the 16 - 40 age bracket. Sixty-six accidents caused more than \$500 damage and there were 138 less than \$500 dollars damage. Nine produced no financial loss.

During 1983 there were 245 criminal arrests. Of these there were 2 aggravated assaults, 3 assaults on police officers, 15 simple assaults, 16 theft cases, 21 shoplifters, 11 forgery cases, 7 cases of bad checks, 21 bench warrants, 4 arrests made for other departments, 9 persons for resisting arrest or detention, and 136 other arrests of less serious nature.

Again during 1983 our aggressive patrol and investigative procedures accounted for a low burglary count, 14 against 13 for 1982. This same patrol and investigative procedure accounted for 26 narcotics arrests covering both sales and possession of controlled drugs and one glue sniffer.

In the theft categories there was a total of \$37,443.00 worth of cash and merchandise stolen, of this amount \$23,108.00 was recovered.


There were 34 juvenile arrests on 41 separate charges. Of those arrested 27 were males and seven were females. Crimes included 3 robbery, 5 burglary, 2 on narcotics violations, 7 criminal trespass, 6 theft charges, one forgery, 2 shoplifters, 2 criminal threatening, one false fire alarm, 3 Chins-Family related and 9 less serious crimes. Approximately 24% of the cases were alcohol related, 12 were referred to Juvenile Diversion. Six of the juveniles were repeat offenders, all of which were male.

This year the Littleton Police Department commenced a new policy of Officer Commendations. This is to commend those officers who have shown exemplary performance of duty. This year, 1983, four of our officers received six commendations and one fireman was commended for his bravery during a fire on Meadow Street. These commendation ceremonies shall be held each year in the future during Police Week. The citizens of Littleton can be most proud of their police personnel.

We also commended the Fire-Police Organization for their service to the community on a volunteer basis during storms, serious accidents and fire calls. We wish also to again thank Mr. Courtland Quimby for his volunteer service at the crosswalk at school and Main Street.

We, the members of the Littleton Police Department, wish to publicly thank all the citizens of Littleton for their support over the years. We recognize that any police organization is only as good as the citizens who support them. It is the concerned citizen working in conjunction with their local law enforcement agency who really make the difference in our crime statistics by notifying the police about crimes taking place or about to take place or offering information on criminal activity in their neighborhood. I am pleased to say that we are receiving more and more letters and phone calls informing us of criminal activity and more and more citizens are coming forward to give statements and testimony in order to make their town a safer and happier place in which to live.

Again we wish to thank you one and all and wish you and yours a healthy and prosperous 1984.

LITTLETON FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

In the 1983 season the Department responded to one-hundred twenty-eight emergency fire calls. The emergency calls were down by twenty-one fires from last year. This could be credited to good fire prevention ideas.

We responded to one-hundred thirty-four non-emergency calls. These consisted mostly of tanker work in assisting other departments. Also, we gave fire prevention talks and demonstrations.

Late this Fall the Department had a chance and did purchase a 1973 Ford F 100 Truck. The Truck came from Lotta Rock Dairy, and it has a 3,000 gallon stainless steel tank. It will be equipped with a 350 G.P.M. Electric Start Waterous Pump and a six-inch Quick Dump Gate Valve.

After getting the truck, we sanded down the cab and chassis. The chassis was all undercoated, and the cab was painted red. We still have the tank left to paint. The work was done at Bob Morris's Shop by volunteer help.

We feel that this truck is a big addition to the fire-fighting power of the Department. The truck will be extremely helpful, especially at fires outside the hydrant district. It will be a big advantage to have 3,000 gallons of water available to roll at any fire.

In closing, we the Littleton Fire Department would like to extend a fire-safe year to all in 1984.

LITTLETON CIVIL DEFENSE AGENCY REPORT

The past year has thankfully been uneventful with no natural or man-made disasters. In the spring and fall I attended two seminars conducted at Littleton Hospital relative to Mass Casualty Incidents (MCI) and their management. A disaster drill was held at Littleton High School in which there were twenty-five simulated victims of a roof cave-in. The fire department, the police department, the Ross ambulance service and Littleton Hospital combined to make it a very successful and well-managed operation. One area in which our resources were found wanting was in the number of long backboards used for the evacuation of the victims. Subsequently, I contracted a local carpenter to make twelve backboards at one-fourth the price of those made commercially.

Program papers for the town have also been filed with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) making us eligible for disaster assistance should the need arise.



Celebrating 200 Years of Community

LITTLETON WATER AND LIGHT DEPARTMENT REPORT

This is a brief summary and description of various jobs that the Littleton Water and Light Department has performed in the year starting January 1, 1983 to December 31, 1983.

It was necessary for the Department to assist the Telephone Company in relocating and transferring poles on Union St., Cottage St., Lisbon Rd., West Main St., and Route 18 for the purpose of acquiring more adequate clearance.

The Department laid new 6" water main down a section of Elm Street tying the mains on West Elm, High Street, Elm Street and Oak Hill Avenue all together, resulting in a greatly improved water pressure to its customers in this area and also improving the fire protection in this area.

Along with keeping its drinking water standards up to the satisfaction of the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission the Department cleaned and repaired the two (2) open reservoirs on Oak Hill Avenue and Apthorp. A major project out at the North Branch Intake where the Department's water system begins was accomplished by refacing the dam and spillway which had not been done since 1903. This project will result in protecting the dam and spillway.

A power survey was made of the entire electrical system by Electrical Engineering Consultant Frank Hubley. The report composed of a technical evaluation as to the high integrity of the system. Results from the tests showed that some of the present substation equipment is in need of replacement; these needs will be corrected in the very near future.

The Department has done major relocations on its electric system on the Monroe Road in the vicinity of Route 18 near the Lobster Tub. New utility poles had to be set to accommodate its electric customers and to furnish power to the new street light installations for the on and off ramps of I-93.

Numerous temporary electrical hook-ups had to be made for the contractors who are doing the construction work on the new highway.

In an effort to reduce line loss on the 3315 line which is the high voltage transmission line that serves the Town of Littleton with electricity, the Department rebuilt five (5) sections of this line replacing the old wire with new 477 aluminum conductor. By doing this the Department improved the efficiency of the transmission line from the

Pattenville Switch Tower to the Slate Ledge Road.

There were three (3) new hydrants installed on the water system due to traffic accidents whereby the hydrants hit had to be replaced. The Department also repaired various other hydrants that required work in order to have them operate properly. At the same time, the Department flushed all of the hydrants in town.

The main water right-of-way from Railroad Street to Bethlehem Hollow was brushed out and remarked for easy accessibility should the water main have to be worked on in a time of emergency.

The Department handled eighty-two (82) electric outages during the year which were acted upon in the utmost efficiency humanly possible. These outages were primarily due to storm action.

The Department employed G.A.B. Business Services, Inc. to appraise the buildings, contents, and Substations of the Department. This type of appraisal, now completed, gives the Department a current up to date insurance evaluation based on actual replacement cost on everything the Department owns. These figures on actual replacement cost will be updated through the computer system annually to stay in line with inflation.

The Department continued to accommodate and cooperate by volunteering its services in hanging the Red Cross Banner, Trout Tournament Banner, and American Flags on days designated and installing, repairing and removing Christmas lights.

The Department has been in periodic consultations both with the Selectmen and members of the L.I.D.C. on the need and planning for services to the Industrial Park.

The computer system is now programed to the degree that the records are processed in the most cost efficient manner possible.

White Mountain Hydro is continuing to benefit all the Department's electric customers by generating as much electricity as possible during the peak hours of 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM, resulting in lower electric rates.

All these projects were performed along with the regular routine maintenance and upkeep of the water and electric facilities. Superintendent wishes to acknowledge that these accomplishments could only be achieved by the dedication and friendly attitude of the Department's employees.

In 1984 and beyond, the Commissioners have under consideration a number of vital projects that must be completed, including the following:

- A. Lafayette Substation, installing new switch gear

and air core reactors to update the system so it can protect the station adequately from any severe electrical short circuits.

- B. Installing a floating cover on the Oak Hill Reservoir that will meet the requirements of the Safe Water Drinking Act requested by the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. By accomplishing this project it will improve and protect the water quality of the system.
- C. Relocating electric lines and water mains for I-93 on Route 18.
- D. The Department is responsible for the over-seeing of Littleton's main water line going thru Bethlehem where the new Bethlehem Sewer Treatment Plant is being built. Approximately 400 feet of 12" water main has to be relocated without interfering with the System's water supply.
- E. The Department is in the process of installing some new chlorinating equipment which the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission is requiring. This is another step towards safeguarding the System with pure drinking water.
- F. In order to study reduction of energy costs, the Department is going to install four (4) high pressure sodium street lights in an area of town to test and evaluate both the cost savings and illuminating features of these lights. A survey will be made after the lights have been in operation over a period of time.





LITTLETON PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Littleton Public Library was a lively place this year with circulation increasing by 10% over 1982. Both Reading Rooms were in constant use as adults took advantage of the excellent magazine collection, and children crowded around the two computers placed in the library by the School for Lifelong Learning.

A source of pride for the town is the fact that 34 local businesses supported the library last year with outright donations of money or materials. Norton Pike Company has funded the Children's summer programs for years, and many merchants have donated prizes -- from theater tickets and books to candy and ice cream sundaes.

Record attendance at a library program occurred when Karl Wendelowski presented a slide show on "Antarctica: the Last Wilderness." Unused to being mobbed, the library did not have enough chairs for the more than 80 people who showed up.

"The Quest for Identity" was a series of book discussions featuring a different speaker each session. Three of the speakers were from Dartmouth, and two were local -- all were interesting and exciting. The program was funded by the New Hampshire Council for the Humanities.

Another program funded by the Council and the New Hampshire Historical Society was an Oral History Workshop. Area residents learned practical information on how to interview people and record their reminiscences.

Mortimer Fisch led another series of book discussions entitled "The Puritan Ethic and the American Novel, 1850-1893." Woodrow Denham talked about "Aborigines -- A Year in the Land Down Under." The Summer Reading Program and the Young Writer's Conference continued to be popular.

One of the highlights of the year was the open house held at the library to honor former trustees and acquaint them with all the changes which have occurred over the years. They took a tour through the various rooms in the building and saw demonstrations of the new equipment -- the Apple computer, the microfilm reader/printer, and the slide and film projectors. State Librarian, Shirley Gray Adamovich and Assistant State Librarian, Matt Higgins, came up from Concord for the festivities. Mrs. Adamovich spoke to the group which included trustees from area towns.

All the windows were covered with window quilts which highlight the beautiful arches and provide the insulation necessary to keep fuel costs down. The outside trim was painted, giving the library a new look and protecting the wood.

Kathryn Wendelowski was elected Vice President/ President Elect of the New Hampshire Library Association. This is the first time any one from the North Country has held that position.

Elizabeth Pike provided the library desk with some lovely floral bouquets during the summer. They were enjoyed by the staff and the public.

Sally Haskell retired from the library staff after 5 years employment. Her quiet humor, pleasant manner and hard work, especially the maintenance of the record collection, will be missed. Good luck Sally -- from Pat, Ellen, Kathryn, Dave, Stanley, Pam, Bob, and all the Trustees.

The past year has been one of continued growth and development for Littleton Hospital Association. The new building is nearing completion and modern facilities will be added to enhance our services in nutrition and medical care. Several new physicians will be joining the medical staff within the next six months. Financially we are in solid shape as we enter into the new prospective pricing policies of Medicare. Our room rates continue to be among the lowest in the state and New England.

Major problems are yet to be resolved in the medical liability insurance area. However, creative solutions are being pursued on a state-wide basis. Our employees have provided excellent care; and we are grateful to them, also to board members, medical staff, volunteers, auxiliaries, and to our consumers from the Littleton area for their continued support and interest.

In the future we will plan to relate closer to area health care providers for increased shared services, cooperative efforts and joint planning so that expensive duplication of health care can be minimized. Survival will dictate having appropriate linkages with area institutions and agencies for the common benefit of all concerned.

Each resident of the Town of Littleton is most welcome to tour our new dietary and second floor addition.

WHITE MOUNTAIN MENTAL HEALTH & DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES
DIRECTOR'S REPORT

1983 has been a year of change for WMMH&DS. We relocated our central offices in Littleton. This is the first time we have been able to combine mental health and developmental services into a single facility. Along with this move, we changed our name. Previously, we were White Mountain Mental Health Center and T.E.M.P.O. Workshop. The new name, White Mountain Mental Health & Developmental Services, reflects the integration of services which occurred. We have been at our new site for nine months and we have clearly felt improvement in the efficiency of our programs.

We have also added two new Developmental Service programs during 1983. One of the programs is Day Habilitation. This is a day service for severely or profoundly handicapped individuals. Its purpose is to teach skills which will help them to attain their highest level of functioning possible. Many of the clients in this program are former residents of Laconia State School. The second program is Early Intervention. This is a service to the 0 to 3-year-old population (and their parents) who are developmentally delayed, or at risk of being delayed. The program staff work with the children and their parents in their own home. The goals of this service is to enhance the developmental growth of these children. We are very proud of our new programs and feel that they offer our communities essential services to the developmentally delayed.

North Country Home Health Agency provides service in the home for the treatment of disease, and public health activities for prevention and intervention of disease.

In-home services include nursing care, physical therapy, speech therapy and homemaker/home health aide care for homebound patients. Home care has proven to be cost effective and helps prevent unnecessary institutionalization.

The Family Assistant Program works with parents to strengthen child-rearing skills and to help families cope with problems.

Prevention services include all clinics listed above, visits to newborns and health promotion visits to assess home situations and physical problems. There is no charge for any of these services. Recent decisions by the State Division of Public Health regrettably will mean elimination of the Handicapped Childrens Clinics and relocation of the Pediatric Diagnostic Clinics outside of our area.

North Country serves 15 towns: Haverhill, Benton, Bath, Landaff, Lisbon, Lyman, Littleton, Monroe, Bethlehem, Franconia, Sugar Hill, Easton, Twin Mt., Lincoln, and North Woodstock, from its main office at 60 High Street, Littleton and satellite offices in Lincoln and Woodsville.

Services to residents of Littleton include: 1,399 nursing visits, 260 physical therapy visits, 133 speech therapy visits, 1,800 home health aide hours, 1,360 homemaker hours, 108 health promotion and newborn visits. Littleton children may attend any of the clinics listed above.

LITTLETON PARK COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

The past year saw few new changes to our Parks and Playgrounds. However, during the past season improvements were made to existing programs and to one major section of Remich Park.

As always, our Summer Recreation Program was second to none thanks to the outstanding leadership of Pierre Lafitte and a most qualified staff. Included in our nine-week program was structured recreation for children of elementary school age. There were also weekly bus trips to various sites in New Hampshire and Vermont.

Available to the Townspeople were open recreation programs in tennis, swimming, basketball, softball, and many different games.

Both the swimming pool and recreation program serviced several hundred participants, young and old, the entire Summer. Again, the adult softball leagues for men and women were a great success.

Skating continues to be very popular at both Remich Park and at Apthorp Common. We are fortunate to have good ice available for use by the public and the Littleton Hockey Association.

For the second year Mt. Eustis Ski Area was closed due to the lack of volunteers.

1983 saw no new construction to the Parks. However, the Oak Hill Avenue and Park Avenue Corner of Remich Park was regraded for future use. At present it can be used for parking and some recreational activities. At the Dell's this past Summer brush was cleared, and small improvements were made to the picnic areas.

LITTLETON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Members of the Littleton Conservation Commission are appointed by the Selectmen in adherence to the Town ordinance which established the commission in 1965. The commission met five times in 1983.

Two persons from Littleton, Tammy Bilodeau and Jackie Crawford, were sponsored by the commission and granted scholarships to attend the 1983 Conservation Camp, which is administered by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests. These two young people reported in person to the commission, summarizing their camp experience.

During the summer the commission employed Bob Bilodeau for 10 weeks in the Dells. Under commission supervision, he cleaned brush, restored fireplaces, opened several new nature trails, and policed the area of litter. Interest on trust funds, established by Daniel Clark Remich for Dells maintenance, was used to finance the project. The commission hopes to continue this Dells maintenance work in 1984.

In addition, the commission plans to complete work at the Kilburn Crags, clearing some trees at the top to provide for an unobstructed view, and providing a well-marked hiking trail.

The commission is charged by State law with receiving and acting upon all dredge and fill permit applications filed within the Town of Littleton.

Membership in the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions is maintained by the Littleton Conservation Commission.

Purposes of the Society, founded in 1967, are being carried out. There is research, verification of data, and collecting and publishing of material about the town and its people. Important sites and events are recognized. A Museum for the preservation of memorabilia and artifacts is maintained in the basement of the Library. It is open on Wednesday and Friday afternoons and by appointment under the care of the Curator, Lester Goad, and other volunteers. Dozens of gifts have been recorded in 1983.

Programs of the year included over 30 participants. Speakers talked about an important local business and on the location and care of the eight Littleton cemeteries. Founders' Day, hosted by Margery Robinson Morehouse, brought out detailed history of Farr Hill by residents. At the top of Grove Street, the story of the present Mt. Sacred Heart was combined with the experiences of living and working on that estate when it was the Morron "Hill Acres." Furniture making in Littleton, both regular size and miniature, was explored. There was a field trip to the Franconia Ski Museum, and a meeting when members exhibited personal treasures and collectibles.

Society members are by far the largest contingent of the volunteers working on the new Littleton History. They should be, because such a project may be their finest service to the community. They also have promoted and sold the deluxe and regular editions of the book.

Dues remained the same; Sustaining, \$25 ; Contributing, \$10 ; Family, \$5 ; and Individual, \$3. The greater response to the higher categories was indicative of public responsibility. Some 295 members are on the rolls. (Through member gifts, all Society costs of postage and supplies for the year were under \$156.)

The Society contributed to the Library, Community Center and the Franconia Ski Museum. It furnished a photograph for the North Country Historical Foundation calendar, and belongs to the N.H. Historical Society and the Association of Historical Societies of N.H. It gave \$200 toward printing the pamphlet on the Walking Tour of Littleton which was jointly published with the Chamber of Commerce and the PRIDE Committee. Another larger project, that of obtaining color view postcards of Littleton scenes, has been financed by the Society, to be ready for the summer of 1984.

Numerous letters and queries are answered by the Historians, Mrs. Mildred C. Lakeway and Wilbur W. Willey, and others. Date plaques for homes and buildings are available from Shirl F. Lakeway.

A Permanent Endowment Fund has reached \$1597.51.

A photographic contest, showing "Littleton, Yesterday and Today" is underway. Amateurs and professionals may enter. Contact Mrs. Gardner - The Courier for details.

Important insights of life in the 1800s have been introduced in the first grade by Mrs. David Sundman.

My personal gratitude is extended to officers, committees, all the members, and to the Library staff and the Community Center, as well as to the media for giving notices and publishing accounts of activities.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL

North Country Council is the regional planning and economic development agency for communities in the northern part of the State. Littleton is one of 43 member towns that utilize the Council staff in community and land use planning, economic development, solid waste, transportation, recreation and municipal services. The Board of Directors is made up of representatives from every member town.

In Littleton, the Council coordinated and prepared the Economic Development Administration grant application for Phase II improvements at the Industrial park. We worked closely with the Littleton Industrial Development Corporation and the State Office of Industrial Development on marketing and recruitment activities, and provided brochures and information for the Littleton Industry Weekend. Staff also submitted Littleton data to Northern Communities Investment Corporation's application.

We have assisted the Planning Board by reviewing and revising proposed subdivision regulations, by commenting on proposed site plan review regulations and with advice on subdivision review. References and recommendations were provided in anticipation of the revision of sign and mobile home provisions. Staff has developed a proposal for undertaking a master plan and provided assistance with the procedures for amending the zoning ordinance.

With respect to Mill Street, we have met with Town officials and property owners on redevelopment of that area and a Community Development Block Grant was prepared. With a variety of re-use scenarios possible and strong commitment of private investment lacking at the time, the application was not submitted. A clear plan and secure development agreements may be possible this spring, if a small CDBG feasibility grant is awarded (the Council prepared the feasibility grant application). The Council also met with a Chamber of Commerce Downtown Revitalization subcommittee to discuss goals and possible Main Street improvement activities.

We worked closely with the Whitefield Regional Airport Commission and the Littleton-Whitefield business community on the six-week trial air service between Whitefield and Burlington. We served as liaison between area travel agents, the media, the public and Air Vermont, and provided feedback on the service. Though service was beginning to catch on near the end of the trial period, the return of the service is uncertain at this time.

The Council assisted Littleton and neighboring towns in establishing a solid waste planning district. As part of a related regional septage disposal study, we met with the Town's wastewater treatment plant operator to discuss the treatment process and disposal capacity.

Besides direct planning, development and grant assistance to individual towns, the Council advocates for the entire North Country on legislative and funding issues at the state and federal level. We appreciate the involvement and interest of the Littleton Selectmen, Planning Board, Town staff, other local organizations and citizens in the above activities and look forward to 1984.

REPORT FROM LITTLETON HISTORY COMMITTEE

The updated Littleton Town History, with the title, "LITTLETON -- The Crossroads of Northern New Hampshire," will make its appearance at the June 16, 1984, Reunion of the Littleton High School Alumni Association.

This will culminate nearly four years of effort by many members of the community since before the March 10, 1981, Town Meeting when \$35,000.00 in Revenue Sharing Funds were approved for this ambitious project. (The only other such recorded history was published in 1905.) The Littleton Board of Selectmen had named a Littleton Town History Committee in July of 1980 in anticipation of the 200th Birthday of the Town in 1984.

The new volume contains a summary of the previous History and presents the life and times of this century in Littleton in the most complete form permitted by space limitations.

Replete with photographs and illustrations, "LITTLETON -- The Crossroads of Northern New Hampshire" is expected to make a meaningful impact on the observance of Littleton's Bicentennial, resulting from the input of over 200 citizens who have made up the more than two dozen committees participating in the development of the material.

During the project there has been keen interest in its progress, and many local residents and others living elsewhere have reserved their copies -- either the special deluxe personalized, individually titled and numbered edition at a price of \$100.00 per copy (limited to 200), or the regular edition at \$25.00 per copy, limited to 1,800. (Deadline for the special edition was February 15, 1984.) Both prices were pre-publication, and the cost of the regular edition undoubtedly will have to be increased. The revenue from the special edition has helped to meet the cost of publication.

The Littleton History Committee, in close cooperation with Phoenix Publishing of Canaan, New Hampshire, premier publishers of histories, has been able to meet strict deadlines to assure that this volume of more than 700 pages will be introduced as programmed at the June 1984 Reunion.

WHITEFIELD REGIONAL AIRPORT 1983 REPORT TO TOWN

1983 has been both a rewarding and sad year for the Whitefield Regional Airport Commission. Warren Kiel of Whitefield resigned. New members include Donald Mooney of Dalton and Donald Herbert of Whitefield. In April Mr. William Roberts, the Commission Chairman and Fixed Base Operator, passed away. His loss has been felt by all connected with the Airport.

In June Gary Sanborn was appointed as Airport Manager and Fixed Base Operator, David Astle started giving flight instruction, and B & B Aircraft began gearing up to become an aircraft maintenance facility.

September brought word that a Federal Grant of \$422,000.00 had been awarded for runway rehabilitation and the relocation of the access road for the Airport and Industrial Park. Construction will start in the Spring of 1984. The New Hampshire Aeronautics Commission not only helped us to obtain the Federal Grant but will rebuild the Instrument Approach System.

Corporate aviation users have been supporting and using the Airport more than ever. James River Corporation now bases a twin engine airplane at Whitefield, and they have renovated one of the Airport Commission Hangers. Burndy Corporation and Georgia Pacific Corporation are among the regular users. Transit aircraft have been bringing in passengers to stay at the resort facilities located in and around the Littleton Area.

Regular airline commuter service was again established for a one-month trial period. The Airport Commission is in negotiations to establish seasonally-scheduled commuter airline service for next Summer. This service would provide substantial benefits to Littleton and surrounding areas.

1984 will require the Airport Authority to initiate programs to further improve the runway and meet Federal Requirements. Commission-Implemented Programs will help hold down the expenses of maintaining and running the Airport.

With continued, dedicated support from the community, the Regional Airport is well on its way to becoming a viable, modern facility. Thank you for making the Airport an active part of your community.

REPORT OF THE GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

We appreciate this opportunity to more directly communicate with our taxpaying citizens through their annual town/city reports.

Because of our July 1st fiscal year, it is hard to anticipate the local tax impact of the county budget. The Commissioners are accountable to the public and taxpayers, and accordingly are extremely conscious of meeting the citizens' needs adequately and efficiently, yet as economically as possible. However, we are faced with similar budgeting dilemmas as towns and cities. Real budget concerns are created by the federal and state mandated programs and services without supporting funds or local control, and the increased demand for services while attempting to hold down budgets and taxes. We all must maintain a close relationship with our legislators. The Commissioners are following very closely the pending legislation regarding settlement and assistance programs, and hope that the towns are also involved in this very important issue.

Courtroom #2 was finished last summer and was dedicated during the opening of the fall term of Superior Court on September 13, 1983. We anticipate having a second judge in March, which should relieve the backlog and reduce the need for masters.

Counties, as well as towns, are experiencing the transition of the courts into the new State Unified Court System, and should notice a decrease in local expenses for the judicial system. However, the counties will have to "reimburse" \$2.75 million to the Unified Court System in fiscal year 1985, which means approximately \$200,000 to Grafton County. We also expect that the counties will retain certain operating expenses such as Probate Court guardianship and appeals costs, Superior Court bailiff costs, and probably will have to provide court space, furnishings and equipment without remuneration.

On Commissioner recommendation, the Delegation Executive Committee appointed a Jail Study Committee to review the needs for the county correctional facility. The National Institute of Corrections made an independent study of the correctional facility at no cost to taxpayers, and issued an encouraging report recommending minor changes, but overall indicating a good facility in general compliance with laws, regulations and meeting needs. Some attention is being given to the need for additional space, especially for "weekend" incarcerations. There was no recommendation for new permanent facility construction at this time.

Grafton County is currently involved in litigation in a retirement buy-back issue which could have heavy impact on all local governments in the N.H. Retirement System. Assessment on Grafton County in this one case could run approximately \$70,000 plus legal fees and could result in a serious "domino" effect on local governments.

Grafton County will be going through the budgeting process in May and June, with a public hearing on the Commissioners recommendations expected to be held in mid-June. The hearing will be advertised, and we strongly encourage your attendance at the hearing to voice your opinions and feelings on the budget. We welcome your attendance and comments.

The Commissioners meet Mondays at 9:30 a.m. at the Courthouse and at 12:30 p.m. at the Nursing Home. Meetings are open to the public.

LITTLETON INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION REPORT

The Littleton Industrial Development Corporation is a non-profit organization, established through the efforts of the Littleton Chamber of Commerce and the town selectmen, as an entity to own and develop the Littleton Industrial Park and to take the responsibility to lead the town's effort to attract new and desirable industrial employers.

In 1983 LIDC efforts have been concentrated on the recruitment of new industry. At this writing, there are two sizeable employers of over 100 jobs each, with whom active discussions are continuing, plus 5 or 6 other smaller prospects.

Attracting industry to a community is a very competitive undertaking, but we feel Littleton has several valuable assets to offer, including our modern industrial park with over 100 acres of fully serviced land ready to build on, and the former Kell-Tronics building with 50,000 sq. ft. of modern industrial space.

The New Hampshire Office of Employment Security indicates that Littleton needs 200 to 300 new jobs to stabilize the unemployment/underemployment problem that we have.

A very successful Industry Weekend was conducted in September, in conjunction with the Littleton Chamber of Commerce. Seven guests were entertained and received the Littleton story on the benefits we have to offer industry. Many local people contributed to making the weekend a success, as well as Governor Sununu and Congressman Judd Gregg.

Construction of the phase II expansion of services at the Littleton Industrial Park was nearly completed, with the balance to be finished in the spring. A local fund drive raised approximately \$28,000 of new capital, which went toward this construction project.

Past experience has shown that negotiations with an expanding or relocating new industry may take from two to five years. With the continuance of a positive attitude on the part of the Littleton community, that is receptive to new industry, LIDC expects to have some results to show within the next year or two.

The Littleton Self-Help Clinic offers a variety of services to the victims of family violence. A network of 15 host homes are available to house victims seven days a week on a 24 hour basis. Transportation to shelter, court, police, hospital, and appointments is provided, as well as emergency child care when needed. The Clinic maintains a 24-hour emergency telephone line through Don and Linda Ross at Tell Call Answering Services. Advocates are available to assist a victim with obtaining restraining orders or in dealing with any administrative agency. Caring and trained volunteers are constantly on call to offer the victim assistance, support, and referrals. Information and referral services are available to all members of the North Country Community. The Clinic provides peer and support counseling on an individual basis, as well as in a support group which meets once a week.


Community education and outreach to the public to increase awareness of the problems of family violence are ongoing services offered to the community. Trained speakers are available to any group or organization upon request. We offer workshops on any issue surrounding family violence. During 1983, the Clinic sponsored several films and discussions on battering, a date workshop for area teenagers, and four radio shows on related topics.

Our Domestic Violence Task Force rates proportionately one of the highest in the state with volunteer effort which, in 1983, included over 9000 hours of donated time and over \$3200 in donated

housing, food, transportation, space advertising, and professional services. As members of the New Hampshire Coalition Against Family Violence, we meet at least once a month with all thirteen task forces in the state to plan, coordinate, and implement services on a state-wide level. All services on family violence are monitored, and, in part, funded by the New Hampshire Coalition.

The Littleton Self-Help Clinic would like to say a very special thank you to all who gave of their energy, time, and finances to assist in the operation of our services. It is through the efforts of volunteers and Littleton residents that we are able to do the work that we do to assist those who are the victims of a violent home.

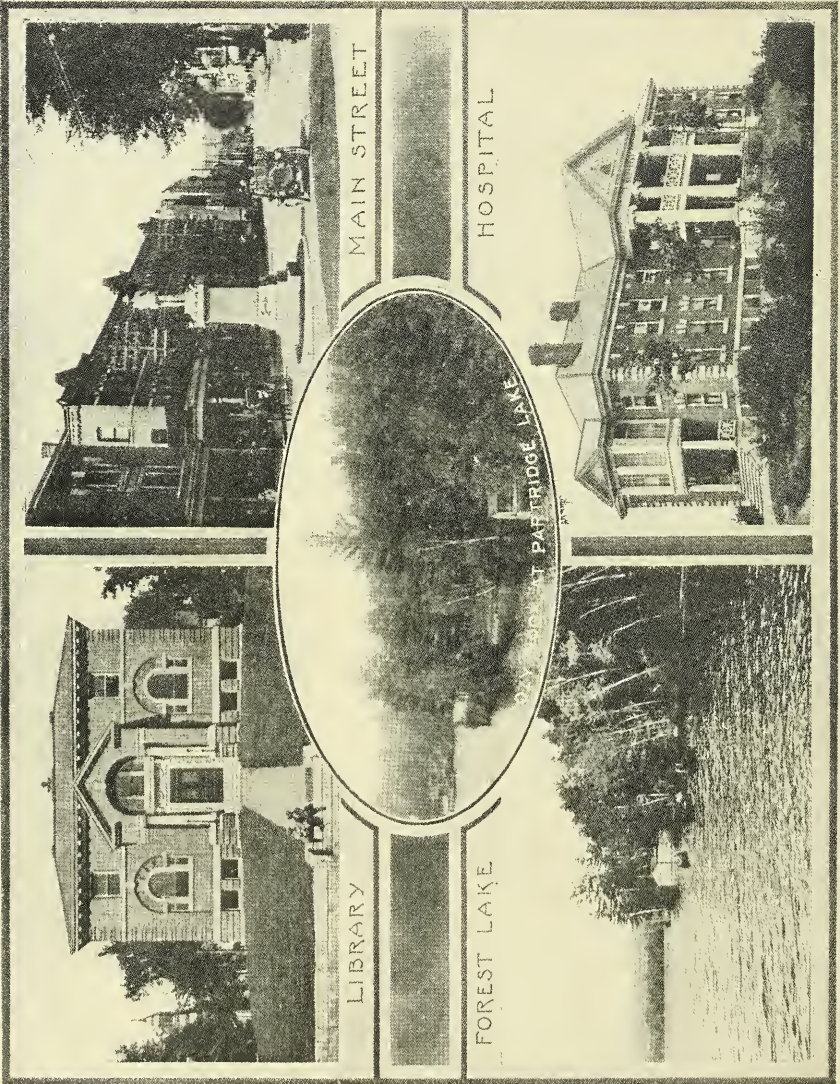
- 8.11 Attached signs which project more than 10" are permitted as follows:
- 8.11.1 One per enterprise on each building side in public view where there is no other sign.
 - 8.11.2 Sign and structure may not extend above roof or parapet of building, or over the public way.
- 8.12 Where goods are displayed outside of building in accordance with town ordinance, signs identifying and attached to said goods or their containers are permitted.
- 8.13 Lighting: Signs may be illuminated only by continuous indirect or internal white light, with the light sources so placed as they will not constitute a hazardous street or highway glare. Indirect lighting for signs attached to buildings under Section 8.09 and lighting attached to buildings which extend over the public way shall not extend more than 6" above the roof or parapet line of a building, nor more than 12" out from and parallel to the sign or building it is illuminating.
- 8.14 Maintenance: All signs and other advertising structures together with all their supports, braces, hooks, guys, and anchors, shall be of substantial and sturdy construction, shall be kept in good repair, and shall be painted or cleaned as often as necessary to maintain a clear, neat, safe, and orderly appearance. Within 30 days of notice of default, owner must take steps to correct same.
- 8.15 Removal: Signs advertising an activity, business, product, or service no longer in operation must be removed by current owner within 30 days of cessation of said operation, unless such sign is deemed necessary to sale or leasing of premises.
- 8.16 Variances: A request for special exception to these regulations may be made to the Board of Adjustment.
- 8.17 Non-Conformance: All signs existing on the date of adoption of this ordinance may remain. Signs which do not conform may be repaired and maintained but must come into conformance when any of these changes take place:
- 1. Sign is replaced
 - 2. Sign is relocated
- 8.18 A permit must be approved by town zoning officer before the establishment of any sign except temporary signs as specified in sections 8.03, 8.04 and 8.07. "
