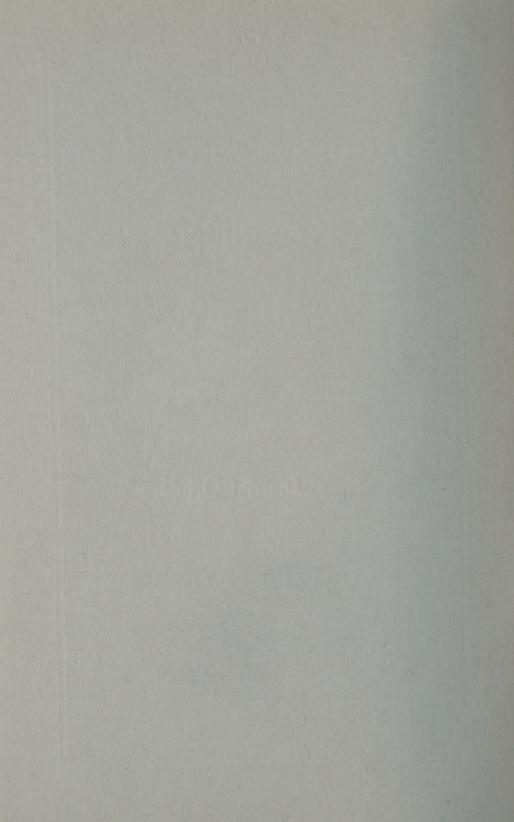

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Marlow in the County of Cheshire in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Jones Hall in said Marlow on Tuesday the 10th day of March, next at seven of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and to make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor.
- 4. To see if the Town will apply for class five money known as TRA and raise the sum of \$417.74 required by the State. The State will contribute \$2,784.96.
- 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repairs of Highways and Bridges.
- 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Library.
- 7. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 8. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money for the temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 9. To authorize the Tax Collector to give two percent cash discount on all property and personal taxes for the payment made within thirty days after the date of the tax bill, and empower the Collector to appoint a deputy Collector.
- 10. To see if the the Town will raise such sums as may be necessary to improve Town Cemeteries.

- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-four dollars for the Monadnock Region Association.
- 12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell or administer all real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector deeds.
- 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$205.00 as its fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital.
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be matched by the State for brush removal on back roads.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new truck and authorize the Selectmen to borrow funds for the same.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the cost of such audit.
- 17. To see what action the Town will take in regard to those items in the Town budget not covered in the preceding articles.
  - 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds.
- 19. To hear the reports of officers, agents, and committees, heretofore chose, and pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district of the town of Marlow qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Jones Hall, in said district on the 9th day of March, 1959 at 7:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing two years.
- 4. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
  - 5. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 6. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer, and fix compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 7. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or other officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 8. To choose agents, auditors, committees, or other officers in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 9. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together

with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 10. To see if the School District will vote to authorize the School Board to negotiate a tuition contract with the Keene School District.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept and use in the name of the district such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States government or any department or agency thereof, or any state or private agency.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Marlow:

I herewith submit my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

Survival and success in the years ahead will be influenced to a large extent by the choices we make in regard to what we as a people consider to be valuable. The support given to the educational program in a community is a reflection of the value placed on education by its people.

Young people soon discover what their elders really value. More than financial support of the school program is needed. There is a need for cooperative effort of parents, citizens and teachers to promote a climate in all phases of a youngsters life that will encourage and demand the best that he or she is capable of doing. The help and influence of parents is needed to aggressively support the school's efforts to promote excellence of performance.

The committees that were working on the Oral Language Arts Syllabus as a follow-up of the 1957 Workshop completed their outlines; syllabi were adopted and placed in use this year for grades one through twelve.

The Language Arts Workshop held this year placed emphasis on the written program. Miss Helen O'Leary, Associate Professor of Education at the University of Massachusetts was the keynote speaker and principal consultant. Other consultants contributing to the success of the Workshop were Miss Marie Capron, Supervisor of Student Teaching at Keene Teachers College, Miss Amy Mayo, Educational Consultant for the American Book Company and Mr. Normand Pacquette, Head of the English Department at Stevens High School, Claremont, New Hampshire.

Committees are working to complete a Written Language Arts Syllabus for grades one through twelve and it is hoped that it will be completed by the end of the school year.

Mathematics and Science teachers conducted a three-day workshop at the same time the Language Arts Workshop was in progress. This group studied mathematics teaching methods and procedures and are currently working on a mathematics syllabus for grades seven and eight.

Mrs. Helen Lynch of Bellows Falls replaced Mrs. Madeline Whitcomb as the teacher for grades 5, 6, 7, and 8. Mrs. Lynch prepared for teaching at the University of Vermont and has had several years of experience as a teacher in Vermont schools.

I wish to thank the Marlow P. T. A. for the gift of a television set to be used as a teaching aid in the school; also for their financial assistance to the milk program and their help in providing social activities for the children.

You will note in the financial report that the proposed budget for 1958-1959 estimated an income of \$4,492.42. The actual income figured as of July 1, 1958 is \$4,945.25. The difference between these figures is \$452.83 which was used to reduce the amount of money to be raised by taxation. The increase in income was due to a larger balance than anticipated and a small increase in the amount of state aid,

The end of the year balance is expected to be much larger than usual this eyar.

It has become more difficult each year to keep our present school bus in repair. The Board has put off requesting an investment in a replacement vehicle as doing so would have increased our budget even more than was necessary to do under the circumstances of increasing costs of operation. The use of the balance available at the end of this year will make it possible to purchase a vehicle and still not increase the budget over the amount voted last year.

- 7 pupils checked for smallpox vaccination, and necessary follow-up where needed.

Dental Program—Dental Health education in classroom October and January.

The aims of the school nurse are numerous, to list a few:

To instruct children and young people so that they may conserve and improve their own health, and thus be more able to secure that abundant vigor and vitality which are a foundation for the greatest possible happiness and service in personal, family, and community life.

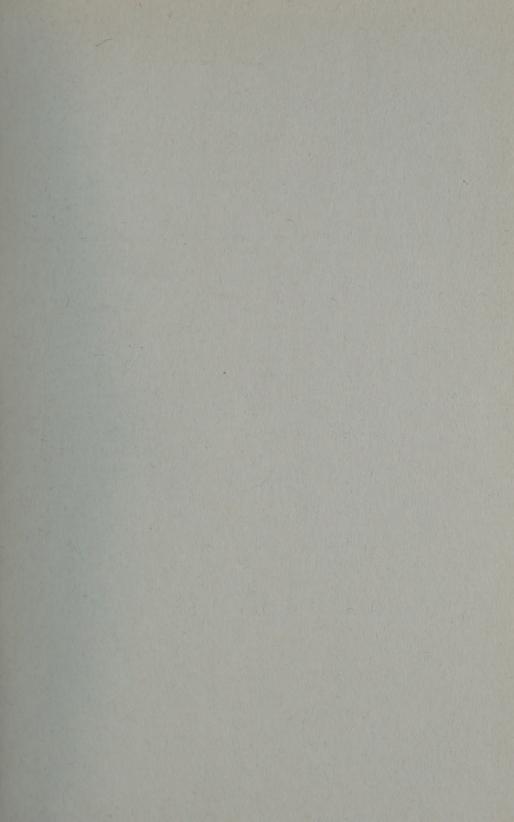

### YOU CAN HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning—brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you—personally and financially.

- If, however, you do burn on your premises:
- Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
