

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 12, 1957

The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Mr. Francis Tolman, at 9:30 a.m. The Town Warrant was read and Article 1 was open for consideration.

The following town officers were elected and duly sworn into office by the Moderator and Town Clerk:

Town Clerk—Mrs. John Walter.

Selectman for 3 years—Mr. Kenneth Corey.

Treasurer-Mrs. Florence Tolman.

Tax Collector—Mr. Frank E. Upton, Sr.

Road Agent—Mr. Edward Savage.

Constable-Mr. Frank E. Upton, Jr.

Police Officer—Mr. Lewis Tompkins.

Fire Chief-Mr. Joseph Dobson.

Civil Defense Director-Mr. Charles Leonard.

Trustee of Trust Funds for 3 years—Mrs. Frances Tolman.

Sexton and Custodian-Mr. Winston French.

Library Trustee—Miss Alice Sharples.

Auditor—Mr. Sidney Partridge.

Article 2 was then read and the town voted to raise the sum of \$7,885.00 to defray town charges as explained by the Selectmen.

Article 3—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to repair highways and bridges. It was voted to raise the sum of \$7,500.00, \$4,500.00 for summer maintenance and \$3,000.00 for winter maintenance.

Article 4—To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$384.40 to construct and reconstruct Class V roads was accepted as read.

Article 5—The Town voted to raise the sum of \$300.00 to purchase metal culverts.

Article 6—The Town voted to raise the amount of \$300.00 to purchase calcium chloride.

Article 7—The Town accepted the article as read, giving the selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 8—The Town voted to raise the sum of \$100.00 for the support of Old Home Day, and \$50.00 to buy flowers and flags for Memorial Day.

Article 9—After much discussion in favor of the article by Mr. Walter, Mr. Barker and Mr. French, it was voted to raise the sum of \$89.00 for the support of the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 10—By a vote of yeas and nays the sum of \$135.00 was raised for the support of the Elliot Community Hospital.

Article 11—The Town voted the amount of \$150.00 for the support of the Nelson Village Cemetery.

Article 12—The article on Civil Defense was passed over by the Town due to the fact that there is already a sum of \$50.00 unexpended balance in the account.

Article 13—This article was passed over as the Library had funds enough at this time.

Article 14—The sum of \$200.00 was raised for Pine Blister Rust control.

Article 15—No money was raised for waterholes this year, and a third man was voted to the committee, Mr. Joseph Dobson.

Article 16—To see if the Town will authorize and instruct the Board of Selectmen to sell at public auction any and all parcels of property conveyed to the town by tax collector's deeds and to execute, acknowledge and deliver quitclaim deeds thereof, or take any action thereon was accepted as read.

Article 17—The Town voted to raise the amount of \$150.00 for a survey of the new addition to the Nelson Village Cemetery, including maps thereof.

Article 18—Road Grader Repair—\$3,000.00 total raised; \$1,000.00 to offset amount spent last year, and \$2,000.00 for new repair. It was also voted under this article that the Select-

men be empowered to dispose of any piece of equipment that was worthless.

Article 19—It was voted to pass over this article and take up Article 20 at this time.

Article 20—The wording of this article was discussed at length with Mr. Dobson, Mr. Forssen, Mr. Huber and Mr. Neil Tolman. The vote was called and it was requested that a written two-third ballot be taken. There was a total of 63 votes cast and 42 necessary for choice. There were 24 no votes and 39 yes votes; the vote was against the article and it was duly thrown down by the moderator.

Following this, a motion was made by Mr. Huber as follows: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the purpose of constructing a building for housing the town fire truck and equipment, and to purchase and install two way radio equipment on the fire truck. This motion was seconded and voted upon and accepted by a simple majority. 54 votes were cast, of which there were 17 no and 37 yes.

Article 19 was then taken up: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the maintenance of the Fire Department, or take any action thereon. This article was discussed at length and the following motion to amend the article as follows was accepted: "To raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300.00 for the maintenance of the Fire Department, such sum to be raised and expended in the event that the vote under Article 20 be declared illegal. If Article 20 is ruled to be a legal vote by proper authority and properly taken by voters assembled, said amount of \$3,300.00 will then become the sum of \$800.00 or such lesser sum as may be required to maintain the Fire Department in the event of no Fire House being built during the ensuing year.

Article 21 was voted to be passed over after much discussion.

Article 22—To see if the Town will elect three members to serve with the Road Agent and the Chairman of Selectmen on a road Survey of the Town roads. Mr. Edward Murdough, Mr. Rodger Tolman and Mr. Kenneth Corey were elected to serve on the committee for one year with Mr. Francis Donovan,

Chairman of Board of Selectmen, and Mr. Edward Savage Road Agent, and to report at the next annual Town Meeting.

Article 23 was passed over after much discussion and deliberating.

Article 24 was passed over as read.

Article 25—To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting. An ordinance pertaining to trailers and portable homes was voted and accepted as follows: To see if the town will vote to prohibit trailers and portable homes was voted and accepted as follows: To see if the Town will vote to prohibit trailers and portable homes from entering the Town of Nelson and taking up residence as such, and to empower the Selectmen to enforce said ordinance.

REPORT OF SELECTMEN

In order to properly fulfill its duties, your Board found it desirable to meet regularly on Tuesday evenings at the Library. It is expected that this practice will continue.

Appreciation is expressed to the Board of Trustees of the Library and especially to Mrs. Albert Quigley for making the use of this building possible.

Mr. John Walter resigned as Selectman because of ill health as of April 4, 1957, and Mr. Rodger M. Tolman was appointed to serve until the next annual Town Meeting.

Through the efforts of the Director of Civil Defense, the town was fortunate in acquiring at nominal cost a well equipped fire truck which may be used at all times for fire protection purposes. Mr. Charles Leonard resigned as Director in November and Mr. Kenneth Balch was appointed to serve the remainder of the term.

A new Fire Station was erected in Munsonville on land donated to the town by Mr. John W. Johnson. Although it was impossible to provide heat, wiring, or a concrete floor with the funds available, the generous contributions of time, money and material by many of the people of Munsonville have added substantially to the value of the building.

The soldiers monument in the cemetery was found to be extensively damaged by frost, the fieldstone facing having become separated from the central core. Inasmuch as sections of this facing were falling off from time to time it constituted a very hazardous situation, and it was deemed necessary to proceed with repairs at once.

A hearing was held in April, 1957 to consider a petition to establish a public right of way to Granite Lake. As most of the proponents were residents of the Town of Stoddard, the location of the way in this Town was opposed on the grounds that it would constitute a public nuisance and would cost the town a considerable amount for policing.

The Cletrack power shovel was found to be in such poor

condition that it was inadvisable to repair it, and it was therefore sold to the highest bidder.

Duplication in fire insurance policies has been eliminated. Four policies covering the library and books have been combined in one, and premiums will be paid by the Library Trustees.

Fire insurance policies covering the Town Barn and Town Hall have been combined and premiums will be paid on a budget plan. This makes regular annual payments possible while retaining the advantage of the lower rates of a three year policy.

Your board takes this opportunity to express its appreciation for the wholehearted cooperation of all town officers and for the valuable assistance rendered by many of the other townspeople.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Nelson in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are herehy notified to meet at Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$8135 to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$468.28 as its share of T.R.A. construction, the state's share being \$3121.88.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$8500 for the repair of highways and bridges, \$4750 of which will be for summer maintenance and \$3750 for winter maintenance.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300 to purchase Metal Culverts.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$600 to purchase Calcium Chloride.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen the right to borrow money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100 for Old Home Day, and \$50.00 for Memorial Day.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$92 for the support of the Monadnock Region Association.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$120 for the support of the Elliot Community Hospital.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$400 for the maintenance and improvement of the Cemetery.

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$250 for Civil Defense purposes.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$150 for the construction and maintenance of fire trails and water holes.
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize and instruct the board of Selectmen to sell at public auction to any proper buyer any and all parcels of property conveyed to the town by tax collector's deeds, and to execute, acknowledge and deliver appropriate deeds thereof.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purpose of (a) purchasing road maintenance equipment, and/or (b) purchasing spare parts and making necessary repairs; and in the event that the sum realized under this article should exceed the amount of \$2000, then in order to provide such excess funds,—to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and sell bonds or negotiate notes in the name of and on the credit of the Town under Chapter 33, Revised Statutes Annotated, of New Hampshire, and any amendments relating thereto; and delegate to the Board of Selectmen authority to fix the time and place of payment of the principal and interest of said bonds or notes, the interest thereon, and the principal amount of each bond or note.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$800 for the maintenance of the Fire Department.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1300 for the purpose of completing the Fire House project.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500 to add to the Reserve Fund, it being understood that no withdrawal either from the principal or accumulated interest may be made except for a specific purpose by a vote of the Town.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee of five members for the purpose of studying the question of zoning and such appropriate regulations as may be applicable to the town; said committee to submit a written report of its studies and recommendations to the Selectmen on or before January 15, 1959.

- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repair and renovation of the interior of the Town Hall and its contents.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repair of the apron at the entrance of the barn owned by Mrs. Charles Leonard.
- 22. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE NELSON FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Nelson Fire Department has come a long way since the last report was made to the residents of Nelson, and much progress has been made in giving better fire protection to the people of the town.

The department presently has two good pieces of fire fighting equipment housed in a very suitable building located in Munsonville and a group of well trained and interested men to operate same.

Truck No. 1, the converted army truck, presently carries the following equipment: 1200 feet $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. hose, 600 feet $1\frac{1}{8}$ in. hose, 8 Indian pumps, nozzles, ladder, searchlights, axes, rakes and mattocks. The truck has a built-in pump with a capacity of 110 gals. per minute, a tank holding 170 gal., two 10 ft. lengths of suction hose with strainer. The portable pump is also carried on this truck. The truck has this year been equipped with a spotlight, a 24 ft. ladder and rack.

Truck No. 2 is a 1½ ton 1947 Dodge with two speed rear axle which was secured for the town thru the good offices of the State Civil Defense Agency and came from Portsmouth Navy Yard. This truck has a separate engine that pumps 500 gals. per minute at a 150 lb. pressure, 1200 ft. of 1½ in. hose is carried, a 30 ft. extension and a 12 ft. ladder, nozzles, emergency smoke masks, first aid kit, emergency lanterns, helmets and coats, two 10 ft. lengths 4½ in. and two 10 ft. lengths 2 in. suction hose with strainers. Truck No. 2 carries 400 gals. water. The two way radio tying in your department with the Mutual Aid System is installed on this truck. During the past year the truck has been overhauled, painted, ladders revarnished, and all equipment put in good condition by members of the department.

The fire house was partially completed in October, 1957, the outside work being done by contract. Using money that has been raised and donated, for the most part by Granite Lake and Munsonville residents, the members have insulated the building, installed wall board, done all electrical work, laid a floor in the upper part of the building to provide space for a meeting room and storage space. The old oil stove from the town barn has been placed in the building to provide heat as a temporary measure. This has kept the water in the truck tanks from freezing and has insured that the trucks could be started and operated in cold weather; this is a requirement for membership in the Mutual Aid System.

There are at present 15 active members in the department who meet a minimum of once a month during the winter for business sessions and inside work, and for out of door drills in the warmer weather. At the drill sessions hose is run out, suctions put into the water supply, and each member drilled in the use of hose and ladder handling, operation of the pumps, and other pieces of fire fighting equipment. All of the members at present are residents of the Munsonville section of Nelson and any interested men from other parts of the town will be most welcome.

We have been most fortunate this past year that no serious fire loss occurred. The department responded to two chimney fires and one brush fire.

During the drouth townspeople were offered the use of fire equipment in hauling water to any families needing it, and the department was able to help one resident who requested help.

In 1957 your department expended \$831.18 of its own funds for purchase of equipment, building supplies, etc. Members volunteered over 200 man hours working on the trucks and the building.

It is the hope of the department members that the townspeople will see fit to appropriate sufficient monies to complete the building and to add needed equipment. Requirements are explained in articles offered for inclusion in the warrant.

The members of the Nelson Fire Department wish to express their appreciation to the people of the town, the Board of Selectmen, the N. H. State Civil Defense Agency, and the Keene Fire Department for the help and cooperation in aiding in establishing an efficient fire fighting unit that these persons have given.

REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

During the past year the fire truck, secured for the town by the State Civil Defense Agency from the Portsmouth Navy Yard thru the good offices of Capt. Louis Coutu, U.S.N., has been refurbished and partially equipped thru the combined efforts of the fire department personnel, the Board of Selectmen, and the Civil Defense Director, and presently is in condition to cope with practically any emergency that might occur in Nelson.

There are still a number of items needed that would add to the efficiency of this unit, and it is the hope of the writer that funds for needed items may be included in an appropriation for the Civil Defense organization for the current year. A more detailed description of the work done and contemplated needs will be found in the report of the Chief of the Fire Department.

It might be of interest to the taxpayers that thru the New Hampshire Distributing Agency and the State Civil Defense Agency it is often possible to secure, at most reasonable cost and thru matching funds, various items that will prove of value to several departments of the town. Thru the above agencies it has been possible to secure our new fire truck valued at \$5,661.00 at a cost of less than \$200.00, the two way radio equipment that ties Nelson in with the Mutual Aid system, coats, helmets, Indian Pumps, and hand searchlights for use with both fire units.

On Dec. 6, 1957 the director supervised an evacuation test held as part of a statewide alert, at the school in Munsonville. The purpose of the test was to ascertain the length of time required for the children to reach their homes in the event of an emergency. A report of this test was submitted to the Selectmen and to the School Board for their consideration.

It is hoped that included among the various items of equipment we hope to secure is a suitable warning system for use

in the town in event of an emergency.

The writer would like to express his appreciation to the Board of Selectmen, the Fire Department, and to the members of the State Civil Defense Agency for their help and cooperation during his terms as director.

REPORT OF ROAD SURVEY COMMITTEE

During the past year members of the Road Survey Committee have inspected all the town roads and considered several of our road problems. We have also sought the advice of highway engineers whose counsel we have found most helpful.

As a result of our investigation we wish to present for the consideration of the voters the following recommendations. (See map.)

- I. Certain roads and sections of roads should be widened and ditched. These include:
 - 1. Road 50, Struthers's corner to Tolman Pond.
 - 2. Road 69, Nelson Center to the Warner farm.
 - 3. Road 72, the section between roads 69 and 44.
- II. Certain roads and sections of roads should receive a hard surface treatment. Our best information clearly indicates that such roads can be maintained at approximately the same cost as gravel roads and, on grades, hard surfaced roads can be maintained at considerably less expense than those surfaced with gravel. This conclusion is even further emphasized in Nelson where gravel in adequate quality and quantity appears to be practically non-existent. We therefore recommend that a hard surface treatment be applied at the following locations:
 - 1. Road 62, the section between Sharples' corner and the Harrisville town line.
 - 2. Road 64, Nelson Center to Nelson Cemetery.
 - 3. Road 50, the section between road 41 and Struthers' corner.
- III. Certain roads and sections of roads should be made subject to "Gates and Bars." These roads have gradually fallen into public disuse and consequently some of them have not been maintained. This action is


suggested to relieve the town of liability for repairs and damage claims and is applicable to the following roads:

- 1. Road 70, from the property of Mrs. Irene Tompkins southwesterly to the Sullivan line.
- 2. Road 83, northerly from the Teppema property.
- 3. Road 80, southerly from road 64 to the Harrisville line.
- 4. Road 81 southwesterly from road 67 to the Roxbury line.
- 5. Road connecting roads 66 and 81 near the Trowbridge property.
- 6. Road 82, westerly from road 66 to the Roxbury line.
- 7. Road 50 southeasterly from the property of Mr. Joseph Skinner to the Harrisville line.

We believe the improvements we have suggested can be undertaken gradually without undue expense to the town and that they will be in the best interests of both resident and non-resident taxpayers.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the School district in the town of Nelson qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 8th day of March 1958, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see what action the district will take to authorize the School Board to establish a Salary Schedule for the District Teaching Staff.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Ch. 186 Par. 24 RSA. as amended to provide for the employment of a helping teacher on a union-wide basis to assist teachers and pupils—to improve the growth and development of children, solve pupil problems of retardation and maladjustment, adapting the program of studies to better meet pupil needs, acting as consultant to the entire staff, etc.—and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$135.00 (one hundred thirty-five) as Nelson's share of the helping teacher salary.
- 11. To see what action the district will take to authorize the School Board to enter into tuition contracts with Marlboro and or Keene School districts for the education of High School pupils.
- 12. To take up any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE NELSON SCHOOL DISTRICT

March 9, 1957

The meeting was called to order at 8:05 p. m. by the Moderator, Francis W. P. Tolman, who then read the school warrant.

Article 1. Francis W. P. Tolman was elected Moderator for the coming year; the Clerk casting one ballot.

Article 2. Mrs. Eleanor J. Ellicott was elected Clerk for the ensuing year; the Moderator casting one ballot.

Article 3. Mrs. Gale Forssen was elected as a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years; the Clerk casting one ballot.

Article 4. Mrs. Irene Tompkins was elected Treasurer for the ensuing year; the Clerk casting one ballot.

Article 5. Motion by Robert E. Robinson, Chairman of the School Board; Moved to pass over this article and take up under Article 8. Seconded and passed by voice vote.

Article 6. Mr. Robinson asked and was granted permission to give a report on the school situation, from which the following notes were taken:

On September 4th, 1956, the School Board and Building Committee met and accepted the work completed by Mr. Hubert Priest on the Munsonville School.

A balance of \$257.13 from the Building Fund will be used to remedy the wet cellar under the school.

This district is now elegible for State Building Aid in the amount of \$400 per year for two years.

The insurance policy on the school building will be changed to a mutual company.

It has been impossible to obtain the services of a nurse for health examinations. By law, a lay person may not fill this position, and a nurse must be a registrant of this state. A salary schedule for the teachers and custodian has been considered and will be studied during the coming months so that an article can be incorporated into next year's warrant. The school board does not recommend a pay raise this year.

The co-operative secondary school program being considered by towns adjacent to Keene is unlikely to be found practical, therefore will not be accepted. Keene will consider increasing the capacity of her secondary schools to take care of out-lying tuition students.

Mr. William McIntyre had made a personal inquiry on teachers' salaries in the surrounding towns and found them generally higher than Munsonville.

Mr. Rodger Tolman gave a report on teachers' salary demands in adjacent states which were consistently higher than New Hampshire. Mr. Tolman then made a motion which was withdrawn to be taken up under Article 8.

Article 7. Motion by Mrs. Newton Tolman: That this article be passed over and taken up after Article 8. Seconded and passed by a show of hands, 14 to 13.

Article 8. Motion by Mr. Robinson: That the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,301.00 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. The motion was seconded.

Amendment by Mr. Rodger Tolman: That the appropriation for operating expenses of the Munsonville School for the school year 1957-1958 be increased by \$450.00 and that this meeting go on record as recommending to the School Board that this amount be used for the following salary increments:

The Moderator granted a request to vote on the amendment by ballot, with the following results:

Amendment by Mr. Kenneth Balch: That the salary of the custodian be increased by \$50 and the amount of \$23,351.00 be substituted in the Motion. Seconded and passed by voice vote. Motion (above) was then voted on as amended and passed by voice vote.

Article 7. Mr. Sidney Partridge was elected Auditor for the ensuing year. The Clerk was instructed to cast one ballot.

Article 9. Motion: That this article be passed over. Seconded and passed by voice vote. A discussion preceded this motion and it was decided that through co-operative efforts a fence could be built without expense to the town. A tree fence was suggested.

Article 10. Motion: That we raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$200.00 for the expansion and improvement of the present playground area. Seconded and passed by voice vote.

Article 11. Motion: That the Clerk be empowered to cast one ballot for the following Building Committee:

Seconded and passed by voice vote. The ballot was cast by the Clerk.

REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

In last year's report by the school supt. two major items were mentioned. One, the need to develop adequate play areas on the property purchased by the district; and secondly, the importance of retaining capable teachers experienced in multiple grade work, through a reasonable salary increase.

The district approved a small sum of money for extension of the playground and this needs much additional work before the playground is adequate and a safe place away from the highway.

The district voted against a small salary increase for the three experienced staff members and this resulted in the resignation of all of them. It was found impossible to replace the music teacher and it is likely that specialized music education will no longer be available at Munsonville school. Two young women were found for the regular teaching assignments but neither of them had any experience in multiple-grade teaching. Both teachers have found it difficult to adjust to the many demands of the small rural school though both are capable teachers. Usually several years of work in the small school is necessary before maximum results can be expected. At this point it is doubtful whether either of the present teachers will be interested in returning another year and it may be some years before the Munsonville school again has a stabilized staff. I believe this situation illustrates very well the poor economy in terms of pupil education, in losing experienced teachers.

The new Marlboro Junior-Senior High School is now in operation and offers an excellent opportunity for the pupils of Nelson to obtain a sound education as well as every opportunity to participate in band, chorus, boys and girls basketball, baseball etc. Marlboro board policy will tend to keep the Marlboro high school tuition rate one hundred dollars below that charged in neighboring high schools, thus offering some inducement to Nelson to consider Marlboro schools. Since both

districts are in the same supervisory union, and have the same school supt., Nelson will have a measure of control over their pupils education in high school, which they now lack.
