ACTION ON ARTICLES OF TOWN MEETING 1980

ARTICLE 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year. Article 3 was ammended by Douglas Woodward as follows "In Accordance with RSA 41.25 to see if the Town will vote to pay the Town Clerk and annual salary of \$2400, in lieu of Statutory fees. In the event that the Town Clerk is paid a compensation in lieu of Statutory fees, all fees shall be paid to the Town Treasurer monthly".

There was also a petition presented which read as follows: "In Accordance with N.H. RSA 40:4-A, we the undersigned registered voters of the Town of New Castle, N.H. do hereby petition that the appropriation for the Town Hall renovation, item 61 in the budget of the town for 1980-1981, be determined by secreat ballot at the annual town meeting of May 13, 1980.

The budget with the ammendments for a grand total of \$388,904. **PASSED.**

ARTICLE 4. Authorize Selectmen to incur temporary loans for year 1980-81. **PASSED.**

ARTICLE 5. To accept Town Road Aid from State. PASSED.

ARTICLE 6. To authorize Selectmen to accept gifts, grants or Federal Aid. **PASSED.**

ARTICLE 7. To authorize the Selectmen to tear down the old Fire Station. **HAND VOTE PASSED Yes 47 - No 33.**

ARTICLE 8. To authorize the withdrawal of \$10,000.00 including \$500.00 interest from Revenue Sharing Fund to offset against budgeted appropriations for Police Dept. **PASSED.**

ARTICLE 9. To establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of funding a new fire engine to replace the 1956 Dodge. To raise \$15,000.00 to be placed in said fund. **PASSED.**

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to exempt itself from requirements relative to the Town Clerk being required to accept and process voter registrations. **BALLOT VOTE PASSED Yes 139 - No 44.**

ARTICLE 11. Planning Board an amendment to Section IV. B. 5. **BALLOT VOTE PASSED Yes 132 - No 46.**

ARTICLE 20. No other official business came before the town.

SELECTMEN'S ANNUAL LETTER

In reviewing the past year your Selectmen are reminded of several matters which seem worthy of your attentions.

The Town's financial position remains in excellent condition thanks in part to prudent management. But we would be less than candid if we didn't recognize the mildness of the past two winters which has meant a lesser expense for snow removal.

The Town's sewer system is in full operation except for the Coast Guard connection. We understand that a contract has been let to install the lines and pumping stations for this connection. The revenue from that "hookup" will put our Sewer Fund in a more favorable position.

Renovation of the Town Hall is still in progress with some deliberate delay to permit us to assess the school situation. Since the School Board now sees no prospect of the closing of the School we have resumed the renovation.

The sale of the Wentworth Hotel and surrounding lands to Pacific Park Corporation is the only important real estate transaction. The new owner expects to make extensive renovations and additions to the property beginning late this calendar year.

We are again reminded of the many generous efforts of our citizens to support and aid in the running of Town affairs. New Castle is a better community for the fine community spirit.

The Selectmen are anxious to have citizens express their willingness to serve on one or more of the Commissions or Board of the Town.

The Resident passes for the Common are available at the Selectmens Office. The Selectmens Office is open daily 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m.

Board of Selectmen Town of New Castle New Castle, New Hampshire

I have examined the financial statements of the various funds and the long-term debt group of accounts of the Town of New Castle, New Hampshire for the periods ended June 30, 1980, listed in the foregoing table of contents. My examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances. The financial statements of the Enterprise-Water and Sewer - Funds of the Town are reported under separate cover, and accordingly, are not included in this financial report.

The Town has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets and accordingly a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial report.

In my opinion, the financial statements listed in the aforementioned table of contents present fairly the financial position of such funds and the long-term debt group accounts of the Town of New Castle, New Hampshire at June 30, 1980, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended, (except for the results of operations of the Trust Funds for which the period is eighteen months then ended), in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

My examination was made primarily for the purpose of rendering an opinion on the basic financial statements described above taken as a whole. The supplemental data included in this report on pages 20 and 21, although not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and results of operations of the various funds of the Town, are presented primarily for supplemental analysis purposes. This additional information has been subjected to the audit procedures applied in the

aforementioned examination of the basic financial statements and is, in my opinion, fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

In connection with my examination, I also performed tests of compliance with the Revenue Sharing Fiscal Assistance Act and regulations as set forth in the Audit Guide and Standards for Revenue Sharing Fiscal Assistance Fund Recipients issued by the Office of Revenue Sharing, U.S. Department of the Treasury.

Based on these procedures, I noted no instance of material noncompliance with the regulations.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE ROCKINGHAM, SS. NEW CASTLE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Castle, in the County of Rockingham and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Recreation Building in the Great Island Common in said New Castle, on Tuesday, the twelfth of May, 1981, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. The polls for the election of Town Officers and Ballot Articles will be open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and shall not be closed before six o'clock in the afternoon.

ARTICLE 2. To hear the reports of agents, officers, committees, boards, and others heretofore chosen and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur temporary loans in anticipation of taxes for the year 1980-1981 upon credit of the Town, and to issue its notes therefor in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or private source which becomes available during the fiscal year as provided by RSA 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will authorize the withdrawal of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as a set-off against budgeted appropriations for the Police Department.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to confirm the deposit of Thirty Nine Thousand (\$39,000.00) Dollars received from Wentworth-by-the-Sea, for sewer hook-up, to the Enterprise Fund.

ARTICLE 8. On Petition of Katherine F. Frampton and eleven other legal voters of the Town of New Castle to see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the state or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent.

ARTICLE 9. On Petition of Virginia L. Coyle and eleven other legal voters of the Town of New Castle to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty-Two (\$82.00) Dollars to Greater Portsmouth Community Action Center, a subdivision of Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc., a private non-profit, anti-poverty agency. This figure represents 2.5% or \$3,338 in services rendered to New Castle residents during the fiscal year 9/1/79 - 8/31/80.

(NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 10. On Petition of Michael C. Riffe and eleven other legal voters of the Town of New Castle to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the Portsmouth-Kittery Armed Services Committee.

(NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE)

ARTICLE 11. To transact such other business as may legally come before this meeting.

NEW CASTLE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The New Castle Police Dept. has had a busy year. It has been a year of transition and change. With the resignation of Chief Pridham from full time duty, I felt pleased and honored to be chosen as your new Police Chief.

Community Crime Prevention Meetings were begun this past fall. It is our hope that these meetings will help community members to develop a more realistic view of crime and its potential impact on our town. However, these sessions are not only to discuss what is wrong in town. Here we hope to answer the question as to how we can make our town a more secure and pleasant place to live.

We are still available for Home Security Surveys. Although we have offered this service for 2 years, only very few townspeople have taken the time to have this survey conducted.

There has been an increase of 400% in the number of home burglar alarms installed within the past two years. We would ask that every homeowner who has such an alarm be sure that it is in perfect working condition so as to avoid false alarms ringing in.

All Special Officers will be attending State Certification Classes and in-service training sessions. By this time next year all Special Officers for the town of New Castle will have completed the requirements for state certification. It is expected that all full-time officers will attend classes sponsored by The New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

All members of the Commission inspected town land to help in the preparation of an index of property including sensitive wetlands, tide lands, the shore line, and tidal marsh. Most of these wetlands in our coastal environment are already under federal and state protection and require special permission for effecting changes. Using town property maps as a base, the areas were identified and located. In general terms the index recommendation includes the following:

- 1. All shore property 143 lots
- 2. All shore property abutters 50 lots
- 3. Approximately 40 acres of tide lands and wetlands located in the lavenger creek area, the gravel pit lane area and the Cat-O'-Nine-Tails area adjacent to Wentworth Road.

The Commission will:

- 1. Continue the improvement program at Great Island common for trees and shrubs.
- 2. Encourage use of the nature trail on the common and help maintain markings.
- 3. Encourage tree and shrub replacement on private and municipal property.

Commission members attended and participated in regional meetings and discussions of conservation matters including those organized and set up by:

- 1. Southeastern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission
 - 2. Strafford-Rockingham Regional Council
 - 3. Coastal Advisory Committee

The commission also reviewed three wetland and shoreline applications:

- 1. Construction of a pier for lobster business.
- 2. Minor gravel fill on private property.

3. Town of New Castle rip rap fill for shoreline protection in the common.

FIRE DEPARTMENT 1980

During 1980 the Department answered 24 calls. Of these four were related to wood stoves. A Mutual Aid response was made to Portsmouth, but none were required by the Town.

Our volunteer membership has increased considerably over the past several years, more people seem to be interested in joining the Fire Department since the new station was built and the purchase of a class A pumper eight years ago. The Fire Wards feel that this increase is primarily due to the improved environment not only from the new Station but also from the acquistion of update equipment. It is important to maintain a large membership in a volunteer Department in order to have enough trained firefighters to respond to an alarm.

Through the efforts of our Training Officer, a State certified instructor, we now have eight fire fighters who are certified by the State. This has taken the majority of the 140 hours of training offered this past year.

A tone alert system is being considered to supplement the siren in order to reach all the members in an emergency if they are out of Town or in the winter when windows are closed and the siren cannot be heard. This item was cut from this years budget at the request of the Selectmen when they proposed the purchase of a new pumper this year, rather than wait another two years. This new pumper will replace the 1956 Dodge and is needed for several reasons.

First, the Town needs a more reliable pumper as the 1956 truck is already well over its recognized life of 20 years. Second with the building that has been going on and that will continue in the Town, the additional protection will be required when repairs are needed on our only class "A" pumper or when we provide Mutual Aid to other communities. Third in order to maintain or possibly lower the fire insurance rates, the 1956 Dodge will have to be replaced.

Last year we put aside \$15,000 towards a new truck originally intended to be put in service in 1984. This year we

requested that \$30,000 be added to the Capital Reserve Fund since the Cost of a new truck is about \$90,000. Taking into account that prices are rising according to industry figures about 1½% each month or 18% a year we are losing ground by adding \$15,000 a year. The \$30,000 request is to cover inflation and provide enough money to prevent a large tax bite when the truck is purchased. The anticipated increase of construction and remodeling at the Wentworth Hotel is yet another reason for the addition of this new pumper.

At the original suggestion of the Selectmen the Fire Wards have recommended to the Budget Committee that the most economical way of purchasing this new truck is to buy it this year with the money set aside as a down payment and raise the remainder by a 10 year bond issue since it is presently less costly to borrow money than to try to keep up with inflation. The new engine will pay for itself in the long run by keeping fire insurance rates low and possibly, along with other improvements already made, to have the rates lowered again by the underwriters.

The new owners of the Wentworth Hotel sumbitted a new concept for developing the Wentworth. After surveying their submission, the Board instructed the Pacific Park Corporation to go ahead with preliminary plans and present these to the Board to check for conformity with Zoning regulations.

The Townspeople will be given a chance to comment on any such plans at a public hearing before any approval or denial by the Planning Board.

This was my last year as Building Inspector. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the townspeople for their cooperation and the Town Officials for their continuing support, particularly the Town Administrator "Joanne Arsenault". Your new Building Inspector is Charles Petlick.

ROAD AGENT REPORT

During the past year we completed paving Davidson and Ritson Streets as part of our improvement program. We removed ledge and straightened Pitt Lane on the Wentworth Road end. We are trying to make improvements on this road each year to make it safer for pedestrians and bicycles. As there was little snow and ice on the Town roads this past winter, I did not use any salt, just sand which is not harmful to vegetation or lawns.

I am recommending to the Selectmen that we completely sweep the Town roads this spring to remove the snad and debris from the roadsides. This has not been done for two years.

I am also recommending the institution of a new policy on digging in Town roads. Whenever Town roads are to be dug, I recommend that a Trench permit be required before any work is started. This will provide us with a record for trench maintenance.

PUBLIC WORKS COMMISSION SEWER AND WATER

Water System: Approximately three and one half (3½) miles of water-lines serving 271 metered users. Water is purchased wholesale from Portsmouth and distributed by New Castle. Seventy-five (75) residences on the Ocean side of the Island, along Wentworth Road from the Rye Bridge to the Coast Guard Station are served directly by Portsmouth.

Sewer System: Built in 1975 the sewer collection system serves 143 residences and consists of four (4) miles of sewers and three (3) lift stations. Sewerage is pumped to the Portsmouth Treatment Plant on Pierce Island for treatment. New Castle reimburses Portsmouth for the treatment costs. Some areas are not served by sewers. The Public Works Board was expanded in the last year and now consists of Ed Stringham Chairman, Charles Clark, Richard Toomey, and Al D'Antonio ex-Officio. George Pitts, who had contributed much to the Public Works over many years stepped down from the Board although he is still active in many day to day demands of operating our systems. A special thanks to George for his many years and continuing efforts for the New Castle Public Works.

While the sewer collection system is relatively new, the three complex pumping stations do require daily monitoring and frequent repairs. These stations are a major part of our operating expense of the system. Some residences, not presently served by sewers, have requested that sewer lines be extended into their areas.

The water system consisting of many old and undersized lines, is requiring more maintenance. The line on Shore Lane failed this year and was replaced on an emergency basis. Also water meters are being replaced with remote reading meters on a planned basis over several years. The Board has recommended that some of the older water lines, especially the Oliver Street line (built 1916) be replaced in 1981.

Waterline freeze-ups were a problem this year to a number of residences. Where this has been a recurring problem, homeowners should consider lowering their line. Also running water slightly during severe weather and subsequent thaws can help avoid line freezing.

It has not been necessary to raise rates significantly in recent years. A lot of volunteer help, cost consciousness and citizen cooperation has been helpful in keeping our costs minimized. Also, added users have helped spread our fixed costs. Should any major repairs be required in the future, rates could be effected.

ANNUAL REPORT TOWN HISTORIAN 1980-1981

The process of making an index of the important and interesting subjects in the town's many volumes of records and thousands of separate documents is proceeding slowly. As in past years we have had some documents restored at the Northeast Document Conservation Center. Twenty nine documents of the era of the 1720's were restored this year. The majority were lists of taxpayers. Each document was deacidified and encased in a mylar envelope. This is a well recognized method of preservation.

Several gifts of photographs were gratefully received, and we would welcome others!

A booklet describing the 24 houses in which soldiers were quartered during the Revolution was prepared by Kenneth Maxam and presented to the town. Eugene Morrill photographed all of the houses which still stand, and also photographed the houses currently on the lots where older houses no longer exist. This is a valuable historical resource for the town to have.

Mr. Maxam also presented another article he had written after exhaustive research in the Provincial Papers, many wills and deeds etc. It concerns the various houses which have been called "Town House", "Province House", and "Jaffrey Cottage". In the article he refutes the long held belief that George Jaffrey ever lived in the "so-called" Jaffrey Cottage, or that the Provincial Council met there.

Mr. Maxam's knowledge, and interest in the history of New Castle are much appreciated.

Cynthia Thomas continues to discover important historical and genealogical facts in her widespread contacts and correspondence with researchers in other areas. New Castle receives many compliments about the splendid manner in which she has organized our Vital Statistics, and amplified them with information from other sources.

The Committee has started working on a long range project of documenting the history of the oldest houses,

and eventually hopes to identify original grants of land. They seek information and assistance, and any who are interested may call Cynthia Thomas (436-7525), or drop in at the Town Hall on Friday mornings.

Other members of the Archives and Records Committee work on the records every Monday morning from 9 to 11 at the Town Hall and gladly welcome anyone interested in any aspect of town history or records, or with information which might help in assembling historical data.

TRUSTEES OF CEMETERIES

Occasionally we are asked how much specific projects or improvements at our various cemeteries have amounted to, and/or the source of such funds. Again during this past fiscal year no appropriated town funds were expended for cemetery care or improvements.

Income is primarily from interest on trust funds provided for this specific purpose and from private billings submitted annually to a few families owning burial lots not covered under the policy of perpetual care. The \$2000.00 contingency appropriation in the 1980 Town Budget was not drawn upon by the Cemetery Trustees.

The wall at Riverside Cemetery is constructed of none other than New Hampshire Granite. Complete cost of this long talked about project approximates \$5200.00. The road within this cemetery was also somewhat improved through the use of gravel and stone dust which hardens considerably through use. There are still some ruts, however, which remain high on the priority list for corrective action.

In general the greatest annual expenditure is always that of care and appearance. We sincerely appreciate the concern and assistance of many townspeople for timely removal of faded wreaths and wilted flowers as well those who continue to care for and trim their own family plots.

MOSQUITO CONTROL BOARD REPORT

1980 was the third year of mosquito control under the supervision of the State of New Hampshire. The previous years were 1978 and 1979.

Some of the pertinent operational data is submitted:

- a. Larviciding is the sole method of control
- b. Surveying period was from April 15 to September 30.
- c. Thirty surveys were made; spraying was done on 14 occasions.
- d. Less than 1 fluid ounce of the insecticide was used during the year. Abate 4E is the insecticide.
- e. No area is sprayed unless there are mosquito larva present in the water.
- f. No adulticiding or spraying in the air is done in New Castle, Wind conditions usually make spraying in the air difficult and ineffective.
- g. Most of our mosquito breeding occurs in numerous small puddles and depressions found in Lavenger Creek, Cape Road, Wild Rose Lane and Pitt Lane.
- h. During the 1980 season only two species of mosquitos were in evidence; Aedes Sollicitans and Aedes Cantator.
