WARRANT FOR 1996 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton and State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Russell Elementary School Gymnasium on School Street in said Rumney on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at 8:00 o'clock in the morning at which time the polls shall be opened for balloting on Article 1&2 and shall close not earlier than 7:00 o'clock in the evening, and you are hereby notified to meet at the Russell Elementary School Gymnasium in said Rumney on Thursday, the 14th day of March, next, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening for the second session of the Town Meeting at which time action will be taken upon the remaining articles in this warrant.

ARTICLE 1: To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year; (By official ballot on March 12.)

ARTICLE 2: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the Town? However, if this article is approved by the Town, the requirement to conduct Town Meeting business by official ballot shall take effect only if both the Rumney School District and Plymouth Regional High School District also vote at their 1996 Annual Meetings to conduct School District Meeting Business by this option. (By official ballot on March 12, 3/5 vote required.)

ARTICLE 3: To choose a member of the Advisory Board for the ensuing three years, to represent the Village.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$150,492.00** to defray General Government Expenses for the ensuing year. (*The selectmen recommend this appropriation.*)

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$88,900.00** for the maintenance of highways and bridges during the ensuing year. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$7,800.00** to defray the cost of street lights in the ensuing year. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$28,000.00** for the purpose of sealing and shimming part of Buffalo Road, Drainage & paving part of Old North Groton Road. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$52,600.00** to defray the cost of maintaining the Town Transfer Station. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$175.00** to defray the Town's share of the costs of the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$7,000.00** to defray the cost of interest expenses on loans in anticipation of taxes and other temporary loans. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate sums to be added to previously established Capital Reserve Funds as follows: *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of **\$15,000.00** to refurbish the 1976 International Fire Truck.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of **\$1,200.00** to preambulate the Rumney/Wentworth Town Line. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of **\$500.00** for maintenance and improvements at the Old Town Hall. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$3,800.00** to make energy improvements to the Town Shed. Improvements will include the installment of a new furnace and additional insulation. Said sum to be offset by **\$1,900.00** from the NH Governor's Office of Energy and the balance of **\$1,900.00** to be withdrawn from the Town Facilities Capital Reserve Fund. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$700.00** to update E-911. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$735.00** for the purpose of administrating an infectious disease control program to FAST Squad members. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate **\$500.00** to continue the process of preserving town records. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$1,000.00** to defray the cost of "Old Home Day".

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for a "Used Oil Collection Center" at the Transfer Station. Said sum will be reimbursed through a grant from the Department of Environmental Services. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote under RSA 31:19 and 19-a to authorize the Selectmen to accept all gifts, demises, bequests and trust funds in the public interest, providing minimal additional expense, during the ensuing year. This authorization shall remain in effect indefinitely, until rescinded by vote of the Town.

ARTICLE 25: Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 31:95-b providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific recession of such authority, the selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year?

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease rent sell and convey or otherwise dispose of any real estate or mineral rights acquired by the Town by any Tax collector's deed by public auction or advertised sealed bids. This authorization shall remain in effect indefinitely until rescinded by vote of the Town.

ARTICLE 27: Shall the Town accept the provision of RSA 33:7 providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific recession of such authority, the selectmen to issue tax anticipation notes?

ARTICLE 28: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, and committees heretofore chosen, to pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

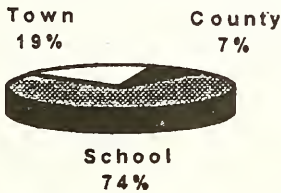

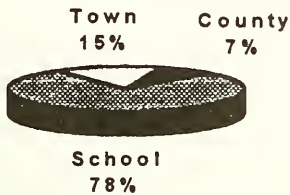
1993 TOWN TAX RATES

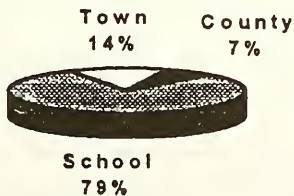
1994 TOWN TAX RATES

SELECTMEN'S ANNUAL REPORT

The good news for Rumney citizens is the town ended its tax year with a surplus in its budget. Expenses were lower than projected resulting in a surplus of approximately \$44,000. The Selectmen are also pleased to announce the proposed increase in the 1996 budget is only 1%. Finally, the selectmen wish to take this opportunity to thank all those individuals who have volunteered their time in various ways to benefit the community.

Town Administration:

Our Administrative Assistant, Susan St. Pierre, has completed her first full year. Susan has taken over the responsibility of the position in a most competent and professional manner and has expanded the duties of the office. During the past year her efforts to complete E-911 mapping and numbering deserves recognition. Further, most of the records for the town have all been computerized, including record keeping and payroll.

Highway Department:

There is a slight increase in the Highway Department's budget for fiscal year 1996. These increases are generally in two areas: wages and repairs. Wages have been increased due in part to cover anticipated winter maintenance, plowing and sanding. The Caterpillar backhoe/front-end loader will need to have new tires and a complete service on all brakes. This service requires the work to be done at the local Caterpillar dealer. Cost for these two items is estimated to be \$4,000. The Road Committee updated its Capital Improvement projects list, and in 1996 they recommend shimming and re-sealing a portion of lower Buffalo road, 800 feet of Cross Road and 600 feet of Old North Groton Road. The Committee will also be updating a list of improvements on several town roads for the next five years.

Transfer Station:

There was a slight reduction in the volume of solid waste delivered to the landfill in Bethlehem, N.H. in 1995. Also, income from recyclable materials increased significantly this year due to the increase in price being paid for newsprint. The cardboard and magazine markets became depressed during the second half of 1995, and the Selectmen have stockpiled these two products until markets improve. An addition was added to the storage shed, and the town did qualify for a grant to build a storage containment shed for used oil. This project will be completed as soon as weather permits in 1996. The net operating cost for the transfer station was below our projected 1995 budget and also less than the 1994 costs.

Welfare:

The changes in welfare laws have placed increased burdens on towns and cities. With these increased changes the Selectmen decided to bring the welfare administrator's position "in-house", and the position will now be the responsibility of our Administrative Assistant Susan St. Pierre. Mrs. St. Pierre has attended several workshops dealing with welfare and also worked with the outgoing administrator during the last two months of 1995. As in

the past, the town continues to closely monitor all welfare requests and provide assistance when and where appropriate.

E-911:

The project is complete, and the Selectmen wish to thank all those who participated in the project. A special thank you to Susan St. Pierre and John Alger for their diligence in overseeing the numbering system and finally a hats off to John Hemeon and the Fire Department for all their hard work.

Personnel:

The Selectmen, speaking for the residents of the town, take this opportunity to thank Janice Mulherin, Chairman of the Planning Board and Mary Davis, Welfare Administrator, for their years of dedicated service to the town.

TRANSFER STATION REPORT

The Rumney Transfer Station had its highest return of recyclables since the Town began recycling eight years ago. Most of the increase was due to the demand for newsprint. Cardboard and Magazines were not recycled this year. Since prices are expected to increase in the first six months of 1996, we have stockpiled these materials and will wait until the price rises. Operating costs from recycling and cost avoidance saved the Town in 1995.

The Town applied for and received a used oil collection grant in 1995; the project will be completed in 1996. Income of the grant is deferred by a tax excised on oil products sold to consumers, { 1 cent per quart of oil}.

REPORT OF THE RUMNEY FIRE DEPARTMENT

The following brief summary is to inform you of what has been going on in the Fire Department and to keep you informed of our goals for the future.

We responded to 69 fire related calls which is up from last year.

We are continuing our training on a monthly basis with special training for new firefighters run by the State. We also have participated in several all-day practice burns one of which we sponsored and invited other towns.

Rumney has been awarded a Federal Grant for the installation of "Dry Fire Hydrants". Over the years we have installed a total of eight dry hydrants and with the help of this grant we can improve our water supply by adding 2 more.

We are asking for funds to repair and refurbish our 1976 pumper so it can stay in service until the year 2002. At that time it would be replaced with a new unit. This gives 16 year increments between purchases.

We are thankful for the new 911 system. The new road signs are great! Please get your homes and businesses numbered.

A big "Thank You" goes to our Ladies Auxiliary for their dedication to the Fire Department. They supply our refreshment at Fire & Training exercises, also this past year donated money so we could purchase a carbon monoxide tester.

Thank you for your support to us in the past. We look forward to giving our best efforts to protect the residents of our town and community for emergencies in the years to come.

All of our equipment, pagers, and supplies are expensive, and we are trying to provide the needed items with minimal effect on our taxes.

The new enhanced 911 program is working well as the system is being fine tuned. We need everyone's help by displaying your house number where it can be seen. In an emergency, seconds count!

1995 was an interesting and busy year for the Rumney Planning Board. Through a scholarship with the Lincoln Institute of Planning in Cambridge, Massachusetts, several Planning Board members were able to attend seminars on various subjects. Other attendees came from all over New England.

Spring brought with it various proposals for the site of the new Rumney Post Office. This has proved to be quite a learning experience. A year later we are still working to balance the needs of the Rumney residents and those of the Postal Service.

We have applied for a grant through the Lakes Region Planning Commission for the construction of a bike path. If our proposal is selected, we hope to build a path suitable for walking or biking along School Street, Depot Street and Main Street to the village.

We continue to work with other town departments to provide the Selectmen information on future capital improvement expenses. This report gives the Selectmen an idea on the short and long term financial needs broken down into yearly increments. This information helps to even out the tax rate by adjusting expenses more even over the years.

The result of this enforcement resulted in a 60% cut in monies spent for rental assistance over 1995's expenditures. Upon closing, I would like to thank all the businesses and people that cooperated with me during the last four years that I have been Welfare Director. Due to a change in employment, I submitted my resignation to the Selectmen on Jan. 1, 1996.

REPORT OF THE RUMNEY CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Commission meets the first Wednesday of the month in the Town Office Building.

The Commission dealt with a wide variety of environmental issues, including the following.

1. Wetlands dredge and fill permit requests which involve site inspections.
2. Logging operations were visited if erosion could impact water quality.
3. Several requests for the building of docks at Stinson lake required site inspections.
4. Complaints by citizens of possible violations of an environmental nature were looked into and advice and aid was given if needed.
5. A cursory check of the acidity of rainfall seemed to indicate lessening of acidity. High PH's were observed at Loon Lake.
6. Plans prepared by the Department of Transportation for the replacement of two bridges in Rumney were viewed by the Commission.
7. A beach cleaning operation at Stinson Lake was monitored.
8. Advice to homeowners on procedures for the testing of drinking water.
9. Research of septage spreading and advice to a Rumney resident who was concerned with the process.
10. A lengthy search into the spreading of sludge carried out, including the request that Rumney be supplied with analyses of the sludge from the city of Nashua, NH. Several letters were written and calls made to the company supplying the sludge. A meeting with a representative of the company was arranged by the selectmen. Two members of the Commission attended a hearing in Concord where new regulations are being formed by the state to oversee this matter.
11. Two members removed tires dumped alongside the road by someone.
12. Several trips were made to monitor a major subdivision on Stinson Lake at an environmentally fragile area.

The Commission prepared rules to be added to the state's Expedited Wetlands Permit to aid Rumney residents in applying for these permits. Mr. Terry Owen, of the Commission, started blazing the lines on town lot (11-107-08) that was surveyed in 1994. The Rumney C.C. budget was increased because dues to the state Commission was increased.

An early listing of speakers for the 1996 lecture series is: Dr. Malcolm Wetherbee, Fremont, NH, a member of the Civil War Roundtable of NH, who will speak on Abraham Lincoln; Donald and Beverly Newell, Laconia, NH, who will explain Indian life in NH and John Alger who will discuss early Rumney town meetings which began in the 1700's. As before, meetings will be held the third Thursday of the month at 7 pm at the museum from April through October.

We also plan to continue to invite the students from the Russell School to come to view the displays.

Our hopes are that 1996 will be another satisfying year and that we'll continue to provide growth in attendance, membership and activities in our society which is in existence to serve each member of our community who has an interest in our heritage. Please join with us.

1995 RUMNEY RECORDS PRESERVATION

Two additional projects were accomplished in 1995 in this program of records preservation begun in 1994. After approval of \$500 at the 1995 Rumney Town meeting following instructions of the State Archivist documented in "New Hampshire Municipal Records Board Rules (updated in 1995)," the 1995 projects were:

1. Publication of a booklet, computerized by the Town Clerk, that documents 1,334 births in the Town of Rumney from the 1700's through 1900. Copies of the booklet were given to the Pease Library in Plymouth, the Merrill Library in Rumney, the Rumney Historical Society as well as made available through the office of the State Archivist and the Rumney Town Clerk's office. Doris Tunnell provided help in assessing accuracy of the records.

2. Microfilm preservation on 35 mm film of volumes 3, 4 and 5 of Town record books covering years between 1841 and 1916. Copies will be given to the State Archivist and the Plymouth Lamson Library, where reading equipment is available, as well as keeping a copy in the Rumney Town vault.

In addition an additional small safe box was obtained in which to preserve microfilm records.

Numerous requests for help in genealogical research are received each year by the Town Clerk and the Rumney Historical Society. In addition to preserving important Town records for legal reasons in case of disaster, these organized records are providing an assist to those inquiries.

For 1996 there are still numerous records that, by State rules, should be permanently preserved on microfilm such as the remaining Town records books, Trust records, property record cards, Selectmen's minutes and others. An emphasis on microfilming the most important records first will be continued as in 1994 and 1995 along with making those records available to interested parties.

In addition for 1996, the Rumney Historical Society anticipates that a researcher may become available through Professor Switzer of Plymouth State College for documenting significant Rumney Town records; and, we are on the list of Towns in the Town Clerks Association for possibly receiving grant money for the purpose of preservation of our record books of vital statistics.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton and State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

Residents of Rumney met at the Russell Elementary School Gymnasium on School Street in said Rumney on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, at 11:00 o'clock in the forenoon at which time the polls opened for balloting on Article 1, and closed at 7:00 o'clock in the evening. Residents of Rumney met at the Russell Elementary School Gymnasium in said Rumney on Thursday, the 16th day of March, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening for the second session of the Town Meeting at which time action was taken upon the remaining articles in the warrant. The meeting was opened with the pledge of allegiance being led by members of the 4H Lancers Club (Tosana Melanson, Katrina Wilkin, Jessica Goss, Samantha Wilkin, and Johanna Turley)

A moment of silence was taken to honor the memory of William Lawson Sr., who recently passed away." Bill served as a Rumney Selectman in the middle 1980's and on the advisory board at the time of his passing. He was a long time summer resident of Stinson Lake and then full time resident since 1981. He was an outstanding High School track coach as attested by former students who came from near and far to honor his memory at a memorial service. He personified the concept of tough love, challenging his students to bring out their best. He was a man of substance and quality who did not hesitate to give his strong opinion. He will be missed and we will always honor his memory."

June 1, 1767 was the date of the first town meeting held in Rumney with Daniel Brainard as Moderator as called by the Royal Governor's Justice of the Peace. Previous meetings had all been held in Connecticut from which the first settlers came. This is the 228th town meeting which is still being held in the second week of March as was originally established in the 1767 Town Charter.

ARTICLE 14: The Town voted to raise and appropriate sums to be added to previously established Capital Reserve Funds as follows: *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)* Article was amended to read: \$7,000.00 to the Highway Equipment Fund instead of \$5,000.00 and \$1,500.00 to the Police Cruiser Fund instead of \$3,500.00. Amendment was passed.

ARTICLE 15: The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250.00 to survey the Rumney/Plymouth town line. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)* This is required by law every 7 years and Plymouth is sharing the cost. 25% Rumney and 75% by Plymouth.

ARTICLE 16: The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to paint the Town Hall, and install life safety requirements, and to authorize the withdrawal from the Town Facilities Capital Reserve Fund. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 17: The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,800.00 to make energy improvements to the Town Shed. Improvements will include the instalment of a new furnace and additional insulation. Said sum to be offset by \$1,900.00 from the NH Governors Office of Energy and the balance of \$1,900.00 to be withdrawn from the Capital Reserve Fund. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 18: The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for street signs. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation)*

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue an ordinance for the establishment of a street numbering system for the Town of Rumney.

This article was passed over. A public hearing meeting will be held in the future to discuss this issue.

ARTICLE 20: The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of administering an infectious control program to FAST Squad members. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

Mark Andrew explained that this is not additional money to last year's appropriation. There was money left over last year, but money can not be used from one year to the other so this was needed to reappropriate the funds.

ARTICLE 21: The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$500.00 to continue the process of microfilming town records. *(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.)*

ARTICLE 22: The town voted to ratify the present organizational structure of the Rumney Fire Department, where the Fire Chief, Fire Officers and Fire Fighters are elected by the "Fire Fighters," as it has been since the inception of the Rumney Fire Department. Added the provision, "that the elected Fire Chief and officers be approved by the Fire commissioners." *(The Fire Commissioners support this article.)*

This is in compliance with HB 224, with specific reference to RSA. 154.1.

There was much discussion on this article (See Tapes) but was passed as written.

ARTICLE 23: The Town voted by ballot, (82yes / 4no) to adopt the following: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 32-B:2-II to restrict revenues from program participation, donations and contributions for Town recreation programs to expenditures for the purpose of Town recreation program operations? Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund to be known as the "Town Recreation Fund", separate from the General Fund. Any surplus in said fund shall not be deemed part of the General Fund accumulated surplus and the legislative body shall vote to allow the Selectmen to expend any surplus in the "Town Recreation Fund" solely for Recreational purposes, throughout the year.

(This article requires a majority vote by written ballot at the deliberative session of the Annual Meeting.) (The Selectmen recommend this Article.)

This money will go directly into the Recreation Fund not the general fund. It will carry over year to year. Checks will be signed by the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 24: The voters of Rumney defeated this article to hold the business meeting portion of the annual town meeting on Saturday afternoon in the second week of March rather than Thursday evening. *(This article inserted by request.)*

ARTICLE 25: The Town voted under RSA 31:19 and 19-a to authorize the Selectmen to accept all gifts, demises, bequests and trust funds in the public interest, providing minimal additional expense, during the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 26: The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money.

ARTICLE 27: The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease rent sell and convey or otherwise dispose of any real estate or mineral rights acquired by the Town by any Tax collector's deed by public auction or advertised sealed bids.

ARTICLE 28: The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes and pay the obligations of the Town.

ARTICLE 29: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, and committees heretofore chosen, to pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

No other business was brought before said meeting.

Meeting adjourned at 9:10 pm.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

In the calendar year 1995, our three leading causes of fires were Children, Non-Permit fires not properly extinguished, and Smoking Materials.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire, are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

MT. MOOSELAUKEE HEALTH CENTER 1995 REPORT

The past year at the Mount Mooselaukee Health Center has offered some important changes and new challenges. In spite of these challenges, the Center Staff, Board and many Volunteers are continuing the important effort to sustain a comprehensive health care facility offering a broad range of medical and social services for all people in our community, regardless of family income or health insurance status.

Dr. Richard Covington joined the Health Center as Medical Director in October 1995. We are all very pleased to have Dr. Covington with us and appreciate the caring attention he gives to each of our patients. Dr. Covington is a Family Practice Physician and is board certified • through the American Academy of Family Practice. His particular professional interests include the care of diabetes, hypertension, arthritis, and pediatrics. Dr. Covington also shares after-hours and weekend call with the other Family Practice physicians on staff at Speare Memorial Hospital, thus providing our patients with 24-hour, 7 day per week physician coverage.

Dr. Covington joins our professional team which includes Tim Cox, ARNP a Family Nurse Practitioner who specializes in Geriatrics; Jamie O'Connor, ARNP, CNM who provides prenatal and other women's health care; and Jessica Thibodeau, ARNP, who provides a broad range of adult and adolescent health care. The family practice currently sees patients by appointment Monday through Friday from 8:30 until 5:00, except Tuesday and Thursday when the Center offers early evening appointments until 6:00. In addition to the family practice, other Center services include women's health and prenatal services on Wednesdays and Thursdays; Well Child Care including dental services; Women, Infants and Children Nutrition program; a diabetes support group; an emergency food pantry; a car seat program; family support services; volunteer outreach to the homebound; and special preventive clinics for hypertension, foot care, cancer screening, and adult immunizations. The Health Center has also recently arranged with White Mountain Health Services to have a counselor, Heather Larkin, available at the Center for scheduled counseling sessions.

During 1995, the Mount Mooselaukee Health Center provided over 3,100 medical visits including 2,627 visits to residents of Warren, Wentworth, Rumney, Glencliff, and Pike. In addition, 21 women who received prenatal care at the Center delivered babies in 1995. The Health Center provided preventive health care including free immunizations, lead screening, and subsidized dental services for over 70 children, free cancer screening exams for more than 60 women and flu shots to 240 people. Over 75 families utilized the WIC program and more than 40 families used the food pantry or supplemental food distribution program. The health center has continued our policy of offering discounted fees to uninsured individuals and families with limited incomes. We also accept assignment on Medicare benefits including waiving the annual deductible for Medicare beneficiaries. In 1995, the Center provided over \$24,000 worth of discounts and fee adjustments for medical care alone; not including the value of the Center's supplemental health and social services. As we begin our 40th Anniversary Year as a health facility, our ability to continue these policies and to sustain services in general are dependent on the tremendous support we receive through Town and individual contributions, as well as donations of time from many wonderful volunteers. We thank you all very much and look forward to a Healthy 1996.

PEMI-BAKER HOME HEALTH AGENCY 1995 REPORT

The Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency is entering its twenty-ninth year of operation and increases its visits on average of 20% a year. New services are added as the need arises and as funding permits. Care is provided to those who are essentially homebound and in need of services in their home as opposed to an institutional setting. Many new hi-tech procedures are now done in the home which adds another interesting and challenging dimension to the home health field.

- Many of our programs are becoming more specialized; examples are Pediatric Nursing and Psychiatric Nursing. Out parenting programs continue to grow and the free dental screenings have been increased. We are in hopes of being able to increase the number of children we see in our Well Child Program.

- The agency is now officially Medicare HOSPICE certified and this program can now enhance our terminal care program. Terminal care provides both medical and emotional support through a team of professionals, volunteers, and clergy.

- We continue to hold free blood pressure clinics, diabetic screening and immunization clinic and, in October, CO-sponsored a breast cancer town meeting moderated by Heather Merrill.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL 1995 ANNUAL REPORT

This last year has been a year of great growth for the Council. The high point of the year came with North Country Council's move to the new regional resource center on November 1. The center will provide expanded information, data, and resources. It will bring together under one roof, public technical assistance providers, businesses, and non-profits for regional advocacy and partnership. The new center, located at the Rocks Estate in Bethlehem, offers conference facilities, electronic network connections and technical assistance.

It has also been a very productive year for the regional transportation planning program. We have undertaken a scenic byway project in the Connecticut River Valley involving 13 towns, and will in the near future expand this effort to the remaining 38 towns in the region. We have also completed a list of projects to be included in the state ten-year highway plan. We have completed the North Country program for transportation enhancement funding and have been active in transportation projects at the local and regional level.

We have had a successful public works development program this year. Littleton's industrial development project and Conway's sewer project are underway. We have started the work to fund a sewer expansion project in Haverhill and a water development project in Berlin. The total of these 4 projects exceeds \$6.5 million. In addition, we have provided detailed engineering assistance and leadership on 16 additional projects across the region totaling \$10 million.

The Council hosted the third annual Ingenuity Fair which exhibited the manufacturing and business creativity of the North County to 10,000 visitors. We also conducted our fourth annual business survey of the 3000+ businesses in the region. We have been working on the development of a regional commercial kitchen with the Town of Lancaster and the state Rural development Council. We also have updated the NCC industrial marketing video with support and assistance from DRED and Fleet Bank.

The Council continues to be actively involved in telecommunications, from a legislative and coordinative role. In addition, we have been participating in a variety of statewide forums to make sure our telecommunication needs as a region are being heard.

Recognizing that adequate and affordable health care is an essential component of the region's economic infrastructure, the Council is committed to supporting and facilitating regional efforts to improve the coordination and delivery of health care services. Our involvement has been prompted by our work with CHOICE, Inc., a non-profit education and cost containment organization that is affiliated with the NHMA. In the same period of time, we've been meeting with local health care providers to get their views on the regions's health care practices, problems, and potential solutions.

On the solid waste front, the Council is providing solid waste technical assistance to all member towns on solid waste and recycling issues.

We have continued our commitment to community planning assistance. We have provided 4 training sessions in the region for local planning boards. We have also provided project assistance to 17 towns on local land use, planning and design issues and have worked with virtually every town in the region to answer short-term planning questions.

North Country Council is participating in a national demonstration highway planning corridor project with three other regional planning commissions along Route 16 under the auspices of the NH Department of Transportation. Our segment of this project involves approximately 90 miles of Route 16 beginning at the southern end of the Mt. Washington Valley and ending in Wentworth Location. The project involves an intensive land use and transportation assessment and will be both GIS and data base formatted. The public participation process has been designed to involve all the communities along the corridor to develop innovative land use and traffic management recommendations.

This coming year promises to build on the progress of 1995. We will see the growth and development of the regional center, the establishment of a business resource library and a community design center in cooperation with several major universities. On behalf of the Board of Directors of NCC, we thank you for your involvement in the Council and we look forward to serving you in 1996.

The Board of Directors and staff of Grafton County Senior Citizens Council, Inc. work throughout the year to enhance the health and independence of our older citizens and to assist them to remain independent in their own homes and communities for as long as possible. Through eight locations throughout the County, including Plymouth, Bristol, Canaan, Lebanon, Orford, Haverhill, Littleton and Lincoln, older adults and their families are able to obtain services such as home delivered meals, senior dining room programs, transportation, social work services, information and referral, health and educational programs, adult day care, recreation and opportunities to be of service to the community through Volunteering.

During 1995, 110 residents of Rumney were able to make use of one of more of GCSCC's programs. These older adults enjoyed balanced meals in the company of friends in a senior dining room, benefited from hot, nourishing meals delivered to their homes by caring volunteers, were transported to health care providers or other community resources by our lift-equipped buses, and found opportunities to put their talent and skills to work for a better community through volunteer service.

Services for older residents of Rumney were often important to their efforts to remain in their own homes and out of institutional care despite chronic health problems and increasing physical frailty, saving tax dollars and contributing to the quality of life of our older friends and neighbors.

GCSCC very much appreciates the support of the Rumney community for services which enhance the independence and dignity of our older citizens and assists them to meet the challenges of aging in place.

PEMI-BAKER SOLID WASTE DISTRICT 1995 ANNUAL REPORT

The representatives of the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District voted early in 1995 to offer any interested member towns the services of the district's coordinator to apply for a new waste oil collection grant being offered by the State of New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services. As a result of applications written on behalf of the towns, Wentworth and Rumney were each awarded \$1,400 for improvements to their waste oil collection programs and the Campton/Thornton/Ellsworth facility was awarded \$1,500 to help cover the cost of a previously purchased waste oil-fired furnace which heats the recycling building. The district will continue to offer this service to any member town desiring to apply for these funds.

We tried a new Northeast Resource Recovery Association (NRRA) program allowing for the collection of oil-based and latex paints for recycling at permitted solid waste facilities and, after a slow start due to unresolved regulatory issues, has on-going paint collections in four of the eleven member towns. Facility operators like the program and district committee members decided to continue it for the 1996 collection season. Paint recycling will be available in several district towns from May through September of 1996. Residents should check at their local solid waste facility to determine where the nearest paint recycling collection is and what requirements are associated with the collections.

In addition to the paint recycling program, the district also sponsored another one-day Household Hazardous Waste Collection in October. In an attempt to reach new users of this program, the collections were held at the Rumney and Campton/Thornton facilities this year. As we expected, many of the participants were first-time attendees from these towns. After considerable discussion, it was decided by the district committee that the next one-day collection will be held in 1997, with only paint recycling being offered in the interim. This will save the district and towns some money and still address the one material that we see the greatest volume of at the annual collections. As in previous years, the district applied for and was awarded just over \$4,000 in grant money from the State of New Hampshire for the HHW collection.

Other programs that the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District looked into in 1995 were an asphalt shingle recycling program and construction and demolition debris recycling. We continue to look for ways to assist all the district towns in safe and cost-effective methods of handling their recyclable materials and transporting and disposing of their solid waste.

District meetings are held regularly, with notices going to each town of-
fice at least a week in advance of the meetings. All interested parties are welcome to attend.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Russell Elementary School in said District on Tuesday the fifth day of March, 1996 at 7:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1: To see what action the District will take relative to the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers.
- Article 2: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board under RSA 198:20-b to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action of the School District Meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the fiscal year provided that such expenditures be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money and that such expenditures not require the spending of other school district funds.
- Article 3: To see if the District will vote to establish a contingency fund in accordance with Revised Statutes Annotated 198:4-b, such contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year and, further, to see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2 000) for such contingency fund. (The Board recommends this appropriation. Majority vote required.)
- Article 4: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-six thousand six hundred dollars (\$26,600) for the purpose of tuitioning district Kindergarten students to a Board approved Kindergarten program. (The Board recommends this appropriation. Majority vote required.)
- Article 5: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of nine thousand dollars (\$9,000) for the purpose of plumbing repairs. (The Board recommends this appropriation. Majority vote required.)
- Article 6: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for the purchase of play ground equipment and improvements to the playground and playing fields. (The Board recommends this appropriation. Majority vote required.)
- Article 7: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand four hundred eighty-one dollars (\$3,481) to be added to nursing funds in the general budget for the purpose of subcontracting nurse services. (The Board recommends this appropriation. Majority vote required.)

- Article 8: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for the purpose of fees and legal expenses should Senate Bill 2 pass. (The Board recommends this appropriation. Majority vote required.)
- Article 9: To see if the Rumney School District will vote to have a standing committee appointed for the purpose of assisting and supporting the school board in areas needing review, research, exhaustive inquiry, close study, citizens' concerns. The committee would consist of five (5) members: two (2) chosen by the selectmen, two (2) chosen by the school board and one (1) chosen by the town advisory committee. A sum of \$500 would be allocated for any reports that might be issued to the town. (Submitted by petition.) (The Board does not recommend this article. Majority vote required.)
- Article 10: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one million one hundred sixty-one thousand six hundred seventy-one dollars (\$1,161,671) for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials, employees and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District such sum to include Articles 3,4,5,6,7 and 8. (The Board recommends this appropriation. Majority vote required.)
- Article 11: To discuss Senate Bill 2 which will be voted on by official ballot at the polls on March 12, 1996: such ballot question to read: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 to allow official ballot voting on all issues before The Rumney School District?" (Inserted by petition). (Not recommended by The School Board.) (60%) vote required at the polls.)
- Article 12: To transact any further business which may legally come before this meeting.

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SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

It is with pleasure that I respectfully submit my 3rd annual report as superintendent of schools. I have chosen the following areas to emphasize:

1. Comments About Each School (from a myriad of accomplishments)
2. Plymouth Regional High School Mission and Goals
3. Plymouth Regional High School and Thornton Space Needs
4. Technology
5. District Educational Improvement Committees

This has been an exciting year for our schools. Wentworth students participated in a community-wide history of Wentworth project which was well received. In addition, the school has one of the best computer to student ratios in the state.

Thornton was recognized by the New Hampshire Partners in Education for its programs sponsored by the police department and for its volunteer program. Great strides have also been made in the area of community communication through the Bridges school and community publication.

Waterville Valley is maintaining an excellent educational program with strong community support. Small classes and individual attention are hallmarks of the school's quality.

Rumney received a grant written by Gail Poitrast which will provide teacher training in science. In addition, a student recognition program has become an integral part of the school. The artist-in-residence program provided an excellent tile wall hanging depicting the community.

Plymouth also received recognition by the New Hampshire Partners in Education for its volunteer reading program. Student training and education in computer use, the automated media center, and networking are becoming integral parts of the everyday program.

Plymouth Regional High School is making significant efforts to increase communications with parents through the Principal's Advisory Committee and the School Community Council. Our high school athletes also received the New Hampshire Interscholastic Athletic Association's Sportsmanship award. This speaks highly of our students. Post secondary placement of our students is running at an all time high.

Campton has experienced a wonderfully smooth year thanks to the efforts of two administrators who are student centered and responsive to parents. The building is neat and clean, students are well behaved, and there is an atmosphere of learning. If you haven't been in recently, please visit.

Holderness continues its commitment to small classes and quality instruction. Its new addition has provided badly needed space. The building is a far more effective place to learn in.

The Pemi-Baker Regional School Board has authorized the administration to hold a day and a half work session in June to determine the mission

and goals of the high school. This will involve a large number of parents and other community members in an effort to provide a focus for Plymouth Regional High School's primary purposes. This activity will be done through a consensus building process. The effort will be organized by the School Community Council (made up of community members and staff) which is a collaborative decision making group that works with the high school principal and board to bring about productive change to improve the high school as our students enter the 21st century. SCC members have identified three areas on which they will be focusing. The first is an effort to look at the structure of the school day for students including the bell schedule and length of classes. They have also identified the raising of academic standards and expectations as an area worthy of attention. The third area is the school/community session noted above.

The need to improve the high school is crucial in that the future is approaching rapidly with dramatic change on nearly a day to day basis. In 1955 only 50% of the student body graduated from high school. Today we no longer have the luxury of having the high school be a sorting system with half our students winning and half our students losing. All of our students need to win.

As noted last year, two of our schools are struggling with space needs. One is the high school and the other is Thornton. We believe that Thornton's space needs can be resolved through a small addition which will be addressed through a bond issue at this year's district meeting. The high school board has approved the formation of a space needs committee, which will consist of board members, community members, as well as staff and student representatives. It is hoped that this group can come forward with recommendations at next year's district meeting.

The schools of SUA #48 have a technology plan which recommends 1% of the annual budget be devoted to technology each year. Although this is not always feasible because of budgetary needs in other areas, it is given consideration annually. All of our students need to be proficient in terms of their familiarity with computers, word processors, spreadsheets, data bases, simulations, information retrieval and other areas of technology in order to succeed in the future. To achieve this goal access to technology is critical. As long as there is a disparity, the gap between highly skilled, well paid employees and less skilled, poorly paid workers will widen. It is our goal to ensure that our students are not denied jobs due to a lack of proficiency in this area.

The SAU, in conjunction with each building's administration, is presently developing a plan for the continuing improvement of instruction as measured by achievement. Each school will have a group of parents and community members working with the principal and teachers to identify areas for improvement each school year. Areas will then be reviewed and approved by the local school board. Parent involvement in the schools is an essential component to successful student learning. We feel it is necessary to provide a structure to ensure that involvement.

My sincerest appreciation is extended to each board member, parent, community member, teacher, support staff member and administrator. Many have provided support, counsel and numerous contributions. Our schools are indeed fortunate to have so many community members and educators committed to providing the best possible education for all of our children.

RUSSELL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL ANNUAL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1995

It is with pleasure that I submit my second annual Principal's Report. During the past year, our building and surrounding grounds have improved. Projects to add stage lighting and a curtain have been completed due mainly to Russell School PTO. Our multi-purpose room has served our food service needs in fine fashion and has also been converted into our word processing center as well. A special thanks to the Holderness School for the addition of a dozen computers and accompanying software and printers which have been used effectively by many of our students. Our library program continues to expand under the direction of Paula Hancock who has orchestrated an effective volunteer program with help from local residents.

The newly-developed lower athletic field has been put to good use with our softball and newly-established soccer teams hosting Pemi-Baker league games at this new location. Our softball team captured both the Pemi-Baker League Championship along with the Team Sportsmanship Award and our 1995-96 field hockey team was awarded the Pemi-Baker Sportsmanship award as well.

Curriculum and instructional programming also remains a primary focus. The Health Materials Review Committee presented its recommendations to the School Board after four months of concentrated study. Many of our staff members continue to serve on a variety of both school and SAU-level committees which has enabled us to assess our particular needs and implement appropriate strategies for the purpose of improving instruction. A newly-formed Facilities' Study Committee has also been formed for the purpose of developing both short and long range plans regarding the existing physical facility.

Grant funding has once again played an important role as monies have been accessed to purchase computer equipment, educate staff in math instruction, and immerse our entire community in an Artist-In-Residence project. This residency featured sculptor, Emile Birch, who spent a total of twenty-one days in Rumney working on a community-wide project entitled "Hands Into History". This residency produced a permanent piece of sculpture that now adorns the main entrance to our community building. Staff members Gail Poitras and Marlene Tabor are to be recognized for their efforts in the preparation and implementation of the aforementioned grants. Also, the D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) Program continues to be offered to our fifth grade. Thank you to Howard Beaudry of the Ashland Police Department and Ken Chase, Chief of the Campton Police Department for facilitating this program during 1995 and 1996 respectively.

The "Save for America" banking program was implemented this year offering all students an on-site opportunity to deposit money in a savings account on a weekly basis. A special thank you to the Pemigewasset National Bank for sponsoring this worthwhile program and to Judy Downing for overseeing the school's role in this.

Another new school-wide activity is the SHIN (Science, Hobby and Interest Night) DIG. This activity which debuted in the spring of 1995, saw students create inventions, display his/her hobbies, and/or display and explain science-related projects. Hopefully, this program will become an annual activity. I'd also like to express my gratitude to PSC for their various services made available to us. We have been fortunate to have had student teachers, methods students, and other programs that have assisted us in providing quality education to our students. In addition, the Franklin Pierce College Teacher Institute has also been furnishing us with student teachers during the past two years and I feel fortunate to have them as a partner as well. My report would not be complete without recognizing the numerous community members, local businesses and other community departments who have contributed in so many different ways.

Through your diversified efforts, you have expressed your desire to develop and maintain quality education in this community. It's been a rewarding experience to serve as principal and on behalf of the dedicated and resourceful staff of Russell Elementary School. I encourage you to visit the school and witness the exciting educational opportunities being offered to our children.

SCHOOL NURSE REPORT

- Nov. 1995 - Annual immunization report completed and sent to State Bureau of Disease Control.
- Dec. 1995 - Free and reduced lunch verifications were completed per federal regulations.
- Vision screens - ongoing
- Hearing screens - ongoing
- Heights and weights - ongoing
- Scoliosis checks - annually
- Head checks - 200+
- First aid visits - 263

MARCH 23, 1995**

School Board Members Present: Teresa Medaglia, Richard Badger, Douglas Willett

Moderator John Alger called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by members of the Mt. Stinson 4-H Club.

The moderator began the meeting by reviewing the rules of the meeting. Each warrant article will be read by the moderator and opened by the School Board. The moderator then explained the rules of the meeting will be run by the 1995 New Hampshire Municipal School and Town Book and New Hampshire RSA's and Robert's Rules of Order. He further explained about reconsideration of an article and the secret ballot process.

School ballot results of the election on March 14, 1995 were read by the moderator. (See attached).

ARTICLE #1: To see what action the District will take relative to the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers.

The article was moved by Richard Badger, seconded by Teresa Medaglia.

The article passed with no discussion.

ARTICLE #2: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board under RSA 198:20-b to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action of the School District Meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the fiscal year provided that such expenditures be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money and that such expenditures not require the spending of other school district funds.

The article was moved and seconded by the school board.

The article passed with no discussion.

ARTICLE #3: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty thousand three hundred twenty-four dollars (\$30,324.00) for the purpose of tuitioning district Kindergarten students to a Board approved Kindergarten program. The Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority voted required).

The article was moved by Richard Badger and seconded by Teresa Medaglia.

Richard Badger amended the article changing the figure to twenty-eight thousand seven

hundred twenty-eight dollars (\$28,728.00). The amendment was seconded. The amendment was voted on affirmatively.

Article 3 passed as amended.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighteen thousand seven hundred twenty-eight dollars (\$18,728) to fund a percentage of the Chapter I reading position. The Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

The article was moved and seconded by the school board.

There was minimal discussion. Arthur Morrill asked to go on the record as supporting this program.

The article was passed.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the District will vote to establish a contingency fund in accordance with Revised Statutes Annotated 198:4-b, such contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year and, further, to see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for such contingency fund. The Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

The article was moved by the school board.

The article passed with no discussion.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to negotiate and enter into a contract to transport District students to and from school; and further, to authorize the School Board to sell the District's school buses if it determines it to be in the best interest of the District. The School Board recommends this action. (Majority vote required).

The article was moved by Doug Willett.

There was a Point of Order by Arthur Morrill requesting permission to handout financial information relating to the bus issue. Permission was granted.

Mr. Willett listed the Board's reasons for Article 6 (see attached "Transportation Modification Proposal Goals"). A lengthy discussion followed. Mr. Willett further stated that by passing Article 6, the school would eliminate a lot of problems that presently exist with the current system such as repairs, liability, difficulty in finding bus drivers, etc. Most impor-

tantly, Mr. Willett stated, is that the students would gain 40 minutes more of instruction than they are presently getting.

Arthur Morrill requested that the question be moved and discussion ended. Moderator John Aiger stated that in order to move the question a 2/3 majority had to be in favor of moving it. A hand vote was taken: In favor: 21; Opposed 52. The motion to move the question was defeated. More discussion followed.

Arthur Morrill made a motion to amend the article to "To have the School Board appoint a committee to study the questions of purchasing transportation service vs. owning our own school buses and report back next year at the School District Meeting with the committee's findings." The motion was seconded. A hand vote was taken: In favor: 27; Opposed: 56. The amendment was defeated. More discussion followed.

Arthur Morrill requested the question be moved; it was moved and seconded. A majority vote was taken by hand to move the question; two-thirds of the majority were in favor of moving the question.

A secret ballot was requested on the article as written. The article passed. In favor: 55; Opposed: 45.

Point of Order by Arthur Morrill to move on to Article 9 while the votes on Article 6 are being counted. A voice vote was taken. It was agreed to move on and discuss Article 9.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the School District will vote to approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Rumney School Board and the Rumney Education Association which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits:

and, further, to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-nine thousand three hundred three dollars (\$29,303) to fund the agreement which sum is comprised as follows:

the sum of four thousand three hundred eleven dollars (\$4,311) as a deficit appropriation for the current 1994-1995 fiscal year, such sum representing the additional cost attributable to the increase in salaries for the current 1994-1995 SY over those paid in the 1993-1994 fiscal year; and, the additional sum of twenty-four thousand nine hundred ninety-two dollars (\$24,992) for the 1995-1996 fiscal year, such sum representing the cost attributable

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to the increase in salaries and benefits during the 1995-1996 fiscal year over those paid in the 1993-1994 fiscal year. The Board recommends this article. (Majority vote required).

The article was moved by Richard Badger.

The article was passed with minimal discussion.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the District will vote to discontinue the Capital Reserve Fund: School Bus Purchase; said funds with accumulated interest to be transferred to the school district's general fund. The School Board recommends this action. (Majority vote required).

The article was moved.

John Dow asked the Board if they could try to get more money for the buses; presently planning to get \$20,000 for both buses under the current proposal. The School Board stated they would look into it.

The article passed.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the District will vote to create an expendable general fund trust fund under the provisions of RSA 198:20-c, to be known as the school transportation fund, for the purpose of providing transportation to District students. Furthermore, to name the Rumney School Board as agents to expend from said fund, and further, to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be placed in said trust fund, and authorize the use/transfer in that amount from the June 30, 1995 fund balance for this purpose. The School Board recommends this action. (Majority vote required).

The article was moved.

Mr. Willett stated there was currently \$45,202 in the Capital Reserve Fund for transportation. Twenty-five thousand two hundred two (\$25,202) would be used this year to reduce taxes; \$10,000 a year for two years thereafter reducing taxes by that much.

The article passed with minimal discussion.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one million sixty-four thousand seventy-seven dollars (\$1,064,077) for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials, employees and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. The Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

The question was moved and seconded.

Richard Badger amended the figure in Article 10 to one million sixty-two thousand four hundred eighty-one dollars (\$1,062,481.00) reflecting the change in the Kindergarten figure as voted on in Article 3.

The amendment was voted on affirmatively.

Point of Order by Arthur Morrill: He recommended going through the budget by the bottom line rather than line by line. The people agreed to this.

There was some minimal discussion on several items.

There was discussion on the nurse's salary. A motion was made by Paula Ferenc to amend the dollar amount on Line 2134 to be increased by \$3,000 for the purpose of adding one more day to the nurse's schedule. The motion was seconded. More discussion followed.

A voice majority vote was taken; the amendment was defeated.

Discussion continued on several items throughout the budget. It was brought to the Board's attention by Yvon Cloutier that Line 2552.513 Contracted Transportation should read sixty-thousand dollars (\$60,000), the actual cost, and not forty-thousand dollars (\$40,000) as written. The Board acknowledged this correction.

Moderator John Alger read the bottom line figure to be voted on was one million sixty-two thousand four hundred eighty-one dollars (\$1,062,481.00).

At this time Stephen DeCosta asked if he could read an excerpt from Maureen Kelly, member of the New Hampshire School Board Association. Mr. Willett objected, stating that it was not relevant to the item being voted on. Mr. Willett suggested he post it so that those interested in it could read it on the way out. Mr. DeCosta said that it was relevant to the issue at hand. The Moderator asked if he could read the material; Mr. DeCosta showed him what he wanted to read. The Moderator suggested it be brought up under Article 11 where any further business could be transacted. The was discussion between the Moderator and Mr. DeCosta.

Mr. DeCosta was allowed to read his excerpt under Article 10.

The Moderator asked if there was any more discussion on Article 10 before the vote is taken. No further discussion.

A majority vote was taken to vote on the article; it was voted affirmatively to vote on the

article. There followed a request for more discussion on the article; the Moderator informed the people that once a voice vote was taken there was not further discussion.

A secret ballot vote was requested. In favor 56; Opposed 30; the article was passed.

ARTICLE 11: To transact any further business which may legally come before this meeting.

Arthur Morrill made a motion: "To see if the Rumney School District will vote to appoint a school study committee, appointed by the moderator, consisting of no less than five (5) Rumney residents to study the present school district organization and the cost thereof; and the alternatives to this present arrangement which shall include, but not be limited to the following: Charter Schools; Voucher Systems; Special Education Funding; Present Staffing Levels and Duties of Personnel, etc. AND return to this meeting one year hence with their findings and recommendations." Mr. Morrill asked for a secret ballot on this. The Moderator said if he could get the necessary signatures for a secret ballot as the votes on Article 10 are being voted, he would accept the signatures and allow a secret ballot.


There was discussion about committees, past and present.

RUMNEY SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

SUMMARY 1995

The Rumney School Study Committee was appointed to study Rumney School District present organization and cost. The complete report summarized here will be available at the library, town office, and at the Russell Elementary School. It contains: results of taxpayer questionnaires; selections from NH State Board of Education Committee's Draft Report on Special Education; the legal status of charter public schools, voucher, privatization and home schooling; evaluation of the school budget, relationship to SAU48 budget; CA achievement and NH State test scores.

FINDINGS:

A questionnaire to Rumney taxpayers had 128 respondents. Highest priority was control of costs. Also strongly favored were changes in the school budget format to ease understanding about expenditures, and the right to vote in the private polling booth on all warrant articles.

Special Education for students with disabilities is governed by Federal and State laws, and Department of Education regulations. Some State law provisions and Department of Education regulations exceed the Federal statutes. Funding for special education comes from Federal and State sources. Although federal funding is legislated for 40% of total cost, only 7% is actually funded. The state has two funding programs based on set formulas. Total Rumney School District expenditure allocation is NOT made at State level. There is NO available breakdown of costs associated with all special education services. Does actual local control of funds exist? Why the discrepancy in laws and requirements at different levels? Why did the number of students coded for special education triple in ten years, with a corresponding rise in costs? Is this enormous expenditure aligned with realistic expectations of outcome? Has there been a mission statement that persuasively correlates means and goals?

Alternative educational programs to the present public education system are considered in the full report. These include charter public schools, privatization, performance contracting by teachers, voucher plans, and home schooling.

The school population has grown very little in the last thirty years, from 160 at the elementary level then to 182 now, and from 60 high school students then to 73 now. School costs and taxes have grown at a disproportionate rate over the same period. Thirty years ago, elementary and high school costs were approximately \$100,000; today they are about \$1,000,000 for elementary school and \$600,000 for high school. Inflation alone is not the cause. Out of 162 NH public schools, only 25% have significantly lower pupil-teacher ratios than Russell Elementary School. Salaries range from \$20,600 to \$38,400. The average teacher's salary is \$30,000 per year. In the last five years, the Rumney School District assessment has grown from \$655,180 to \$857,291 - a 24% increase to Rumney taxpayers. The SAU budget has increased nearly twice as fast as other spending. Yet, studies show that increased spending does not necessarily improve education. Studying school spending in 20 states, Coopers and Lybrand found in 1995 that an average of 40% of public school spending

never reached the classroom. They concluded that too much public money was wasted on a school bureaucracy that did not help students to learn.

A NH State test assessment of Russell School third graders showed: Language Arts - 0% were rated Advanced or Proficient, 43% rated Basic, 38% Novice; 19% were not tested. Mathematics - 5% were rated Advanced, 14% rated Proficient, 29% Basic, 52% Novice, all students were tested.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. Adoption of provisions of RSA 40:13: Official Ballot (SB2) warrant article that will be on the Rumney ballot in March 12. RSA 40:13 (SB2) will enable citizens to cast their votes in the privacy of the voting booth on Election Day, without fear of criticism or intimidation, for town candidates, school district officials, and all warrant articles, including budget and bond issues. Absentee votes would be included.

2. The mass of material School Board Members have to consider to stay current for wise decisions on complex issues affecting lives and futures of our school children, requires arduous research. Dependence on SAU administration for interpretation has led to loss of local control. To forge real partnerships among Rumney school board, taxpayers, parents, and Russell Elementary School teaching staff, the committee recommends that a warrant article be passed at the School District Meeting, to read:

“To see if the Rumney School District will vote to have a standing committee appointed for the purpose of assisting and supporting the school board in areas needing review, research, exhaustive inquiry, close study, and citizen’s concerns. The committee would consist of five members: two (2) chosen by the Selectmen, two (2) chosen by the School Board and, one (1) chosen by the Town Advisory Committee. A sum of \$500 would be allocated for any reports that might be issued to the town.”

CONCLUSION:

The charge given the School Study Committee is that of a never-ending search for excellence in the education of our children. Rumney classroom teachers are to be commended for their dedication to this principle.

However, problems are evident with the administration’s accountability to the citizens of Rumney concerning measurable educational goals, quality control, expenditures, and parental vs. school responsibilities. Also apparent is loss of local control in curriculum and budget matters. To reestablish local control, we recommend that citizens:

1. Support RSA 40:13 (SB2) so that voting may be private on budget matters.
2. Support the warrant article for appointment of a citizen’s committee to assist and support the Rumney School Board.

DOG OWNERS shall register all dogs over three months of age by April 30.

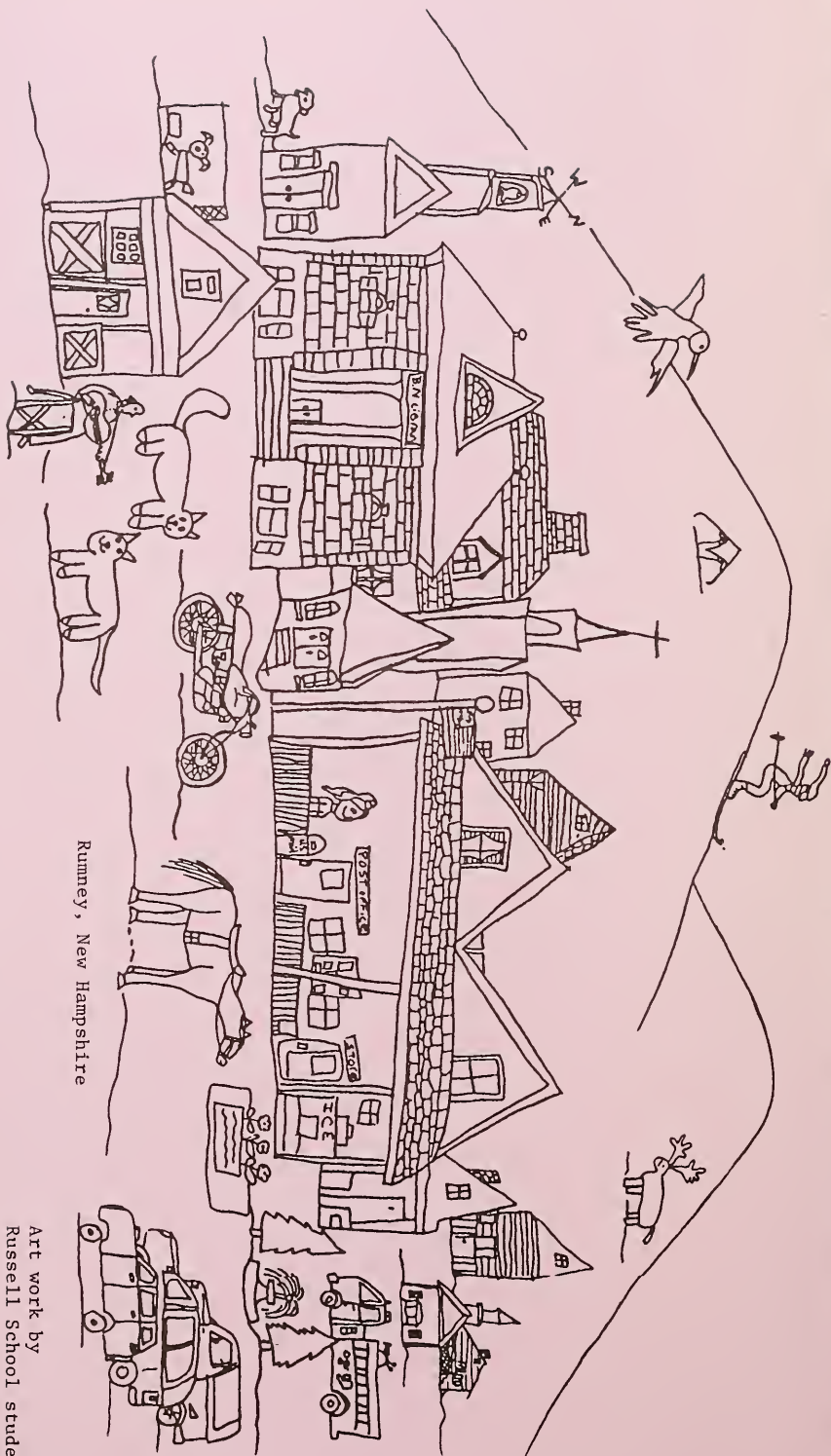
- Rabies certificates required for registration.
