CHARLES H. FELCH, SR. May 28, 1926 - March 30, 1998

The 1997 annual town report is dedicated to Charles Henry Felch, Sr., was born in Seabrook on May 28, 1926, the son of the late Myron B. and Sarah M.(Perkins) Felch.

Charles was an U.S. Navy veteran of WWII, and served aboard the destroyer, USS Keith. He worked as a firefighter in the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, retiring in 1975 with 27 years of service. He served the towns of Seabrook, South Hampton and East Kingston for 22 years, as state representative for Rockingham County District 1, elected for 11 consecutive terms since 1976, he was active on the State Fish and Game and Conservation Committee.

Charles served the town of Seabrook as selectman, moderator at both town meeting and school meeting, school board member, volunteer firefighter for 47 years, part-time police officer, chairman of the town conservation commission, served as chairman on the housing authority, was a former scoutmaster and was master of ceremonies for the Junior Miss Seabrook Pageant for many years. He was a member and past commander of the Raymond E. Walton American Legion Post 70, member and past president of the Seabrook Lions Club. Charles was an avid hunter, fisherman, woodworker, and accomplished artist.

Town residents, acquaintances, elected officials, friends and family were quoted as saying the following: "He never walked away from you, he always listened;" "if he disagreed with you he wasn't disagreeable;" If he said he was going to do it, he did it and his favorite saying was, I did it my way." Charles was always available to help the people of Seabrook.

Charles was a public servant for most of his adult life and was considered as being thoughtful, loyal, and compassionate and his experience in state and local government will be hard to replace.

#### AUSTIN C. RANDALL

Austin C. Randall was born in Seabrook on November 23, 1926. He was the second born of Clara and Austin Randall who also were lifetime residents of Seabrook. He had two brothers and six sisters, seven children and several grandchildren. He and his wife Alice resided on Ledge Road. Jim was especially close to his granddaughter Vicki, they had a wonderful relationship. He loved all of his family.

Jim, as he was known to everyone, served as Seaman 1<sup>st</sup> Class in the United States Navy, WW II. He was a longtime member of the American Legion Post #70. He served the town for many years as a police officer under the supervision of then police chief Rayenold Perkins. Among other occupations, he worked for Bailey Corp., New England Wood Heel and Yankee Greyhound security, but his love was the sea and fishing was where he spent most of his leisurely time.

Jim loved life and he lived it to the fullest. He loved to party with his young nieces and nephews. He loved music and was a talented dancer and singer. He was an advertent sportsman and loved to camp. Jim was endlessly young.

When Jim retired he spent most of his days fishing. He did this for many years, until his illness in July of 1998. He began his adult life as he ended it, doing what he loved and being where he loved - The Sea. Knowing this; his family is at peace.

IN MEMORIUM JAMES E. CHAMPOUX December 31, 1911 - March 12, 1998

From the time "Jim" Champoux came to Seabrook in 1962, he was an active participant in local affairs, town meetings and elections, serving as assistant town moderator for several years. He served on many boards and committees including the board of adjustment beginning in 1973 and as chairman in 1975; in 1976 he was appointed to the planning board, was elected to that board in 1977 and served until 1982 serving as chairman for 3 of those years; the recreation study and community center building committees from 1980-1984.

In 1985 the planning board recommended and the town adopted Jim's "minor subdivision" idea which increased the flexibility of the planning board in meeting some of the town's housing needs and, perhaps most important, gave townspeople the opportunity to develop their own "backland" to provide family members places to build affordable homes. He served on the coastal zone management study committee from 1978-1980 and was instrumental in drawing up the state's "CZM" plan to ensure protection of coastal resources for the future.

Jim volunteered in 1987 for the public works facility study and was chairman of a committee of 5 experienced, local trades-people who developed the plan approved by the town meeting. The same group, with Jim as chairman and liaison between the committee, the selectmen and department heads, became the DPW building committee in 1988 and coordinated all phases of construction for the successful and economical \$390,000 project which was ready for use in October of 1989.

Jim was a recipient of the New Hampshire Municipal Association's "Municipal Volunteer Award" in 1989. His dedication to volunteer public service is truly appreciated, commendable and inspiring. His dreams, ideas, efforts and accomplishments will continue to be enjoyed by many people well into the next century. A special tribute and "thank you" from the selectmen, on behalf of the whole town Jim contributed so much to, is extended to his family members and friends for sharing his time and devotion.

Article 2: To see if the town will vote to amend Article II of the Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

A) Replace the existing definition of **Accessory Building** with the following: "A building whose purpose is subordinate to that of the main building. It may be separate from or attached to the main building. For the purpose of this ordinance, a garage or a carport that is attached directly to the main building by a breezeway shall be regarded as an integral part of the main building."

B) Replace the existing definition of **Building** with the following: "Any permanent structure occupied or intended to shelter any occupancy. For the purposes of this ordinance, a multi-unit building, with or without firewalls, shall be considered one building."

C) Add the following to the definition of Family Apartment:
", the area of said apartment not to exceed 750 square feet."

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to amend Article VI (Table 2) of the Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, by adding the following footnote to Side & Rear (minimum setbacks): "On corner lots where the side yard abuts a street, the side yard shall be subject to the minimum setback requirements for front yards." YES 1121 NO 669

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

A) Add the following definition to Article II of the Zoning Ordinance: "Wetlands means an area that is inundated or saturated by surface or ground water at a frequency and duration sufficient to support a prevalence of vegetation typically adapted for life in saturated soil conditions. Wetlands include, but are not limited to, swamps, marshes, bogs, and similar areas. Wetlands shall be delineated on the basis of hydrophytic vegetation, hydric soils, and wetlands hydrology, in accordance with the techniques outlined in the <u>Corps of Engineers Wetlands</u> <u>Delineation Manual</u> (January 1987)."

B) Add a new Article XVI to the Seabrook Zoning Ordinance, to be entitled "Wetlands", as set forth below, and re-number subsequent articles accordingly:

**"A - Purpose:** to protect the larger expanses of wetlands in Seabrook, to minimize flooding, to protect wildlife habitats, to protect groundwater quality, and to prevent damage to structures and property."

"B - Minimum Lot Sizes: Wetlands shall not be utilized to satisfy more than 20% of the minimum lot size requirement specified in Article VI of this ordinance. Tracts of land which were less than five acres as of January 1, 1998 are exempt from this requirement."

YES 1180 NO 620

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

A) Add the following definition to Article II: "Telecommunications Facility: any structure, antenna, tower, or other device which provides commercial mobile wireless services, unlicensed wireless services, cellular phone services, specialized mobile radio communications (SMR), personal communications service (PCS), and common carrier wireless exchange access services."

B) Amend Table 1 in Article V by permitting **Telecommunications Facilities** in Zones 1, 2 & 3, subject to a footnote to read as follows: "permitted only on land west of I-95 and within 3,500' of the centerline of I-95. These facilities are subject to the provisions of Article XVII". (Telecommunication facilities are to be prohibited east of I-95, and at locations more than 3,500' west of I-95.)

C) Add a new Article XVII, to be entitled **Telecommunications Facilities**, as set forth below, and change the current Article XVII's designation to Article XVIII:

"A - Signs: Telecommunication towers shall not contain signs or graphic representation of any kind.

**B - Fall Zone:** A circular fall zone shall be depicted on the site plan. The radius of said zone shall equal the height of the proposed tower. This zone shall not include any buildings or public ways. Easements shall be required if the fall zone extends onto other properties.

**C** - Evidence that Co-Location is not Feasible: If a new tower is being proposed, the applicant shall submit evidence which is satisfactory to the Planning Board, that no

existing structure can accommodate the applicant's antenna(s).

**D** - Cooperation: An applicant proposing to build a new tower shall submit a binding agreement which provides for the maximum allowance of antenna co-location on the new structure. This agreement shall obligate the applicant to supply antenna co-location for reasonable fees and costs to other telecommunications providers. Failure to provide an agreement that is satisfactory to the Planning Board is grounds for denial.

**E** - **A Bond** shall be submitted by the applicant to cover the costs of tower removal in the case of abandonment. The applicant shall submit a written agreement, the terms of which are to be satisfactory to the Town of Seabrook, which governs the bond.

F - Abandoned Telecommunications Facilities are those which have not operated for a period of twelve consecutive months."

#### YES 1139 NO 569

Article 6: On petition of Lorraine D. Fogg and twenty-nine (29) other legal voters of the town: "Are you in favor of amending the town zoning ordinance by increasing the area of the commercial zone which now extends 500 feet from the corner of Route 107 down the westerly side of Stard Road, by increasing said commercial zone another 1,041+- feet, for a total of 1,541+- linear feet down the westerly side of Stard Road to the northern property boundary of land owned by Lorraine D. Fogg, and thence northwest along said property boundary to a depth of 850+- feet. The depth of 850+- feet to then continue in a southwesterly direction, parallel to Stard Road, back to the existing commercial zone." (Recommended by Planning Board)

Article 8: Shall we vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Fourteen Million Sixtythree Thousand Two Hundred Fifty-seven (\$14,063,257.00) Dollars? Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be Thirteen Million Three Hundred Forty-three Thousand One Hundred Eighty-six (\$13,343,186.00) Dollars, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

#### YES 809 NO 964

Article 9: Shall we adopt an exemption for the disabled? The exemption, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers shall be \$20,000.00. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire

resident for at least 5 years and own and occupy the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by a spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$15,000.00 or, if married, a combined net income of not more than \$25,000.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$70,000.00 excluding the value of the person's residence.

#### YES 1277 NO 562

Article 10: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 154:1, I (b), relative to the organization of the fire department in that the "fire chief be appointed by the local governing body, or by the town or city manager, if any, with firefighters appointed by the local governing body or manager, upon recommendation of the fire chief." Said appointments to be based on qualifications set by recognized standards. This article to take effect one (1) year from passage. Should this article be voted in the affirmative, the term of office for the fire chief elected in 1998 shall expire in one year. YES 730 NO 1092

Article 11: To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to establish ambulance fees based on insurance reimbursement or Medicare allowance and to establish a waiver system that protects those unable to pay through a reduction in the bill or full abatement. Ambulance service will still be provided in all emergency situations.

#### YES 762 NO 1104

Article 12: To see if the town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of purchasing an ambulance; and to authorize indefinitely the town treasurer to transfer all ambulance fees collected into said fund at the end of each fiscal year.

#### YES 953 NO 751

Article 13: To see if the town will vote to adopt the following ordinance to regulate transactions of a pawn shop nature and, upon adoption, add the ordinance to the Code of the Town of Seabrook, formatted and numbered appropriately.

#### PAWNBROKER/PAWN SHOP ORDINANCE

PURPOSE.

The intent of this ordinance is to establish a system which will fairly and impartially regulate retail transactions of a pawn shop nature. This regulation shall be for the purpose of identifying stolen property which is unintentionally received by the regulated

parties and the detection of regulated parties who are intentionally transacting business in stolen property.

This ordinance has been enacted pursuant to the authority granted to the Town of Seabrook by New Hampshire RSA 398.

DEFINITIONS.

Any person, firm, partnership and/or corporation whose business includes any transaction wherein there is the lending of money secured by taking possession of any physical property including but not limited to jewelry, watches, clocks, diamonds and/or all precious and semi-precious gemstones, gold, silver, platinum and/or any other precious metals, musical instruments and/or equipment, cameras, wearing apparel, collectibles and or antiques, home and auto stereo equipment, entertainment equipment, televisions, VCRs and all other electronic/battery operated equipment, tools, computers and/or equipment, firearms, vehicles, auto accessories, meters, connections, plates/dishware/glassware, office/store equipment and/or fixtures and any and all other relative equipment/items, with the right to sell such property if it is not redeemed.

A person, firm, partnership and/or corporation shall be deemed to be a pawnbroker whether the transaction takes the form of a loan by the pawnbroker secured by the property OR a sale to the pawnbroker with the right to repurchase within a specified period of time. Pawnbrokers are regulated under NH RSA Chapter 398.

EXCLUSIONS.

Mail order transactions and retail stores that exchange or provide cash or credit for returned articles are excluded from this ordinance. Flea markets, second hand dealers and private yard sales are also excluded. See "EXCLUSIONS".

LICENSE REQUIRED, APPLICATIONS, FEES, REVOCATION.

1. No person, firm, partnership and/or corporation shall engage in the business of pawnbroker herein defined unless licensed therefor by the Town of Seabrook.

2. Applications for licenses shall be made to the Town Office -Office of the Town Clerk and filed therewith. Applications shall contain the following information:

a. Name and address of the applicant.

b. At least two (2) persons of good character who may be used as references for the applicant.

c. The name of one (1) person, not living at the same address as the applicant, who will always know where to locate the applicant should the applicant move.

d. Places of residence of the applicant for the past five (5) years.

e. Location of previous businesses of the applicant over the past five (5) years.

f. Information regarding whether the applicant has ever been convicted of any crime.

g. If the applicant is a partnership, the information required under a-f shall be furnished for each partner. If the applicant is a limited partnership, the information required in a-f shall be furnished for the general partners and for each limited partner. If the applicant is a corporation, the information shall be furnished for each officer and for each shareholder owning twenty (20%) percent or more of the corporate stock. Said applications shall be thereafter forwarded to the Chief of Police who shall cause an investigation to be made of the fitness of the applicant to engage in the business of pawnbroker. The Chief of Police shall then report his/her findings to the Board of Selectmen before such license is acted upon and a fee of \$50.00 per annum shall be paid to the Town Clerk.

3. Such license(s) shall expire on December thirty-first (31) of each year unless sooner revoked, and shall not be assigned nor transferred, but it may be revoked at any time by the licensing authority after notice and hearing for just cause.

#### EMPLOYEES.

Employees of a licensed establishment are not required to obtain a license in addition to that of the establishment; however, the proprietor of such licensed establishment will notify the Chief of Police of the name and pertinent information regarding such employees within twenty-four hours of their hire.

#### PURCHASES FROM MINORS.

No pawnbroker shall, directly or indirectly, either purchase or receive in any way of barter or exchange, any of the articles aforesaid, of a minor under the age of eighteen (18) years, knowing or having reason to believe him/her such, except when said minor shall be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian who shall sign the transaction record in person before said pawnbroker.

PAWNBROKERS' RECORDS, INSPECTION RESALE OF ARTICLES, CHANGES OR ALTERATIONS.

Every pawnbroker upon the acquisition of any article either by purchase or exchange defined herein, shall prepare duplicate transaction records (blanks for which shall be provided by the Town Clerk), stating the following:

Full name (last, first, middle initial) of the individual. Date of birth and social security number of the individual. Accurate and active address of residence of the individual. Full notation (month, day, year and time) of the transaction. Full, accurate and detailed description of each article purchased or exchanged. Full and accurate price paid/loaned shall be made available on dealers's records which shall be made available upon request of police. Accurate physical description of individual (photos may be used).

Every pawnbroker shall cause such transaction document to be signed by the seller/transferor in person. Identification shall be obtained via photo ID of the customer in each and every transaction.

A copy of said transaction record shall be delivered to the Seabrook Police Department or to any duly authorized police officer of the Town of Seabrook within twenty-four (24) hours of said transaction. Said dealer shall maintain their copy of the transaction in his possession, which, together with any article therein listed, may be inspected at any and all times by any duly authorized police officer. Confidentiality of information shall be maintained unless it becomes integral to a criminal investigation.

No article so obtained shall be sold or otherwise disposed of or changed or altered in its appearance or otherwise within twelve (12) days or such additional time as may be required by statute after the purchase/control thereof, except with the written consent of the Chief of Police of the Town of Seabrook, but in NO case, within forty-eight (48) hours after said transaction.

Should the Seabrook Police Department or other law enforcement agency determine that an article is required as evidence in a criminal investigation/prosecution, an authorized agent of the Seabrook Police Department shall seize such evidence pursuant to applicable criminal procedure. The pawnbroker shall be issued a receipt for same.

Pursuant to NH RSA 595-A:6, the Seabrook Police Department or an authorized agent thereof shall retain seized articles under the court's discretion as long as necessary to permit the article to be used as evidence. At the conclusion of the court proceedings and/or closure of a criminal investigation, the Seabrook Police Department shall notify, by regular mail to the last known address, the original owner as well as the pawnbroker and any other person who may have a lawful interest in the property; that said property shall be released in thirty (30) calendar days to the original owner if no other claim is placed on the property.

In the case of the original owner being the recipient of returned article(s), the Seabrook Police Department shall request in the case of a prosecution (when applicable) that a court consider restitution in the amount paid for the property by the pawnbroker as a portion of sentencing in the criminal case. In such a circumstance, the property would be returned to the original owner (as noted above) and cash restitution in the amount paid would be requested for the pawnbroker.

EXCLUSIONS.

Specifically excluded from the provisions of this ordinance are the following:

- a. Purchases from private residences.
- b. Yard/garage sales.
- c. Flea markets.
- d. Antique dealers.
- e. Estate dissolution dealers.
- f. Wholesalers who do not purchase from the public.
- g. Second hand dealers.

## PENALTIES.

Whosoever violates the provisions of this town ordinance shall be fined no less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars and no more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for a first violation, with each consecutive violation affording a fine of the original amount plus an additional one hundred (\$100.00) dollars - fines shall not exceed five hundred (\$500.00) dollars. Any and all criminal violations which may pertain to the businesses herein denoted, may be found in NH Revised Statutes Annotated.

#### YES 1088 NO 603

Article 14: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-one Thousand Eight Hundred Two (\$71,802.00) Dollars for the cost of Seabrook's contribution to eighteen (18) human service agencies in the seacoast area. A breakdown of each human service agency's request follows. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse as to each line item until the contributions are completed or in one (1) year. The selectmen recommend Seventy-One Thousand Five Hundred Fifty-two (\$71,552.00) Dollars for this appropriation. The budget committee recommends Seventy-one Thousand Eight Hundred Two (\$71,802.00) Dollars for this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

#### BOARD OF SELECTMEN/TOWN MANAGER - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1998

We are pleased to be able to provide you with the following report summarizing the events and activities of 1998.

The town and power plant litigation has been settled. This accomplishes the following town goals:

- Eliminates tax abatement litigation over plant value brought by Great Bay Power before the BTLA for 1994, by Great Bay and MMWEC before the BTLA for 1995, by Great Bay and MMWEC before the BTLA for 1996, by all the joint owners before Superior Court for 1996, by Great Bay and MMWEC before the BTLA for 1997 and prospectively, through the year 2002.
- 2.) Recognizes the impact of electric utility deregulation plant value gradually, providing predictability and stability for the town by establishing fair values which allows the town to control its future.

The Claremont Superior Court decision on education funding was not resolved in 1998. The Town of Seabrook, due to the nuclear power plant could be impacted very negatively if the legislature should decide to institute a statewide property tax. We are actively working with all parties to stop any type of statewide tax from being implemented.

The sewer project has made significant progress toward its final phase with 97% of the installations completed. There are approximately 200 connections to be completed during 1999.

We are continuing to grow both in residential and new businesses throughout the town. New residential construction is still progressing at a rapid rate with ninety-two housing units built this year, a slight decrease from 1997. There are now approximately 150 lots in approved subdivisions available for construction and this building boom is expected to continue. Commercial growth is also increasing with a new Wendy's, Taco Bell, Autozone, Sullivan Tire, Irving Oil, and Applebee's in the approval process or under construction. There is also an office supply building and movie theater in the planning stages.

The harbor dredging and erosion is still a major problem. The state is doing some work to protect homes along River Street but the main problem still exists. We need to develop a new dredging permit that will correct the constant filling in of our harbor area and the pier/boat ramp. In addition, the new channel along River Street is eroding the area around the ramp/pier. We plan to put some temporary riprap in this area while pursuing with the state to provide a permanent solution. The town is actively pursuing the correction of this problem.

The new Riley Well Field development has been successful in that we have found a new source that will produce at least 300 gallons per minute. We plan to install the permanent well in 1999.

The board would like to encourage your participation in Seabrook's government. This can be accomplished by serving as a volunteer on many committees which town government has or attending meetings and voicing your input on how you would like to see us function. The office of the selectmen and town manager is here to serve you. Please let us know how we can improve our service.

The Local Emergency Planning Committee (LECP) meetings were reestablished in December of 1998 and various town companies were invited to discuss the proper procedure for any type of emergency. The fire department visited various factories in conjunction with the NH Environmental Protection Agency.

I would like to thank the board of selectmen, town manager, and all the departments that are involved with emergency response. I would also like to thank my staff of volunteers for their continued time and assistance in making this a well organized and efficient emergency management department.

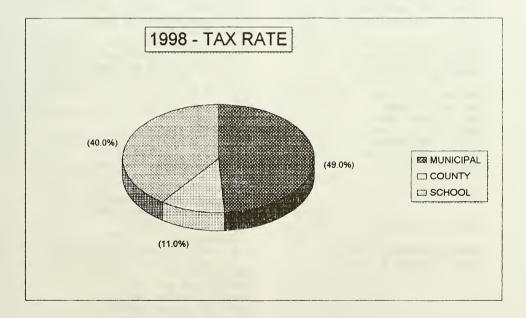

#### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1998

On behalf of all employees from the Department of Public Works, we would like to thank all town residents in supporting our efforts throughout the year.

The department was involved with numerous projects this year. Crews installed and upgraded drainage on True Road, Old New Boston Road, Manchester Street, and Boynton Lane. They also shouldered numerous roads, assisted the sewer department in hookups, sandblasted and repainted a truck and equipment.

The town has experienced a tremendous amount of growth this year. This resulted in our biggest ever annual cleanup. The cleanup was moved to the Fall. This move was done to allow us the extra time needed to prepare the cemeteries and beaches during the spring.

Other projects have included resetting all the beach boardwalks, beach raking, and repairs of the boat ramp on River Street. Further, all the catch basin east of Blackwater River were cleaned.

The Transfer Station and Recycling center had a lot of activity this year. We hired a company from Maine to grind approximately 12,000 yards of our compost pile. This produced a wonderful loam that will be used on other projects.

We also received bids for removal of our clamshells in a pile of approximately 8,000 yards. Only a small amount has been removed this year so far and we expect to have the remainder taken in 1999. This project will also produce a revenue to the town.

In closing, I would like to thank all of the board members for the many hours of devotion and the professional and courteous way all plans were reviewed. I would also like to thank Town Planner Tom Morgan and C.E.O Robert Moore for their expert advice.

#### Conservation Commission - Annual Town Report 1998

The Conservation Commission would like to thank all the citizens that voted in favor of creating a Conservation Trust Fund in 1998. This fund is necessary for any grant awards.

Our Cains Brook project is still alive and well. Because of our findings from last years Water Quality Study, the State of NH Department of Environmental Services Water Quality Division has taken a series of water samples from several locations indicated during our study done in 1997. Their findings were similar to ours. We found this encouraging for several reasons. One, it let us know that 'we did it right', and two, the status of Cains Brook is generally quite good with only a few spots that may need water quality monitoring. This year the Conservation Commission has been working with several Departments in Town and other wetland and water quality advisors to get the paperwork ready for dredging Secord's Pond and Cains Pond in conjunction with dam repairs. This may take more than several years to accomplish.

During the June record rain storm the bridge to the Spherex plant washed out. We coordinated efforts with the land owner, business owner, and the USDA-NRCS to install a new box culvert to replace the old bridge. By the end of October the new culvert was in place. This box culvert is a crucial part of the restoration of Cains Brook. Now that there is sufficient tidal water flushing of the lower sections of Cains Brook, we can begin to seek assistance in restoring the rest of the 4.5 miles of Cains Brook. Additionally this box culvert will be able to handle considerably more flow in the case of spring storms like we encountered this past spring. This will help to insure the lower half of Cains Brook will be less prone to storm flooding.

This spring we received a Coastal Program grant to begin a Salt Marsh Restoration Project. The first area to be restored is a small section of marsh between Rout 286 and South Main Street. In August several members of the Conservation Commission did a survey of the area. We would like to thank Millennium Engineering for donating the use of their equipment. In November the contractor, SWAMP, spent several days mowing down most of the Phragmites and cleaning out the old drainage swale near Rt. 286. We hope to do the actual ditch and panne work in February of 1999.

In September we conducted a Town Forest Survey. Three students from Winnacunnet High School, Micah Fournier, Ben Redden, and Jay Smith assisted us with the assessment of the data collected. We received immense support for the establishment of a Town Forest. There is still considerable work to be done before a Town Forest becomes a reality. During the next year we will plan several Public Hearings for further input and selection of location.

Through out the summer and early fall one of our members worked with a team of State and local water quality samplers to conduct a Shoreline Survey of the Salt Marshes in Seabrook, Hampton Falls, and Hampton. The results of the survey indicated that the estuary was in fairly good condition. This survey, along with other water quality samples, resulted in the opening of several new sections of tidal shellfish beds for soft shelled clam harvesting. These areas had not been open to clamming for over 15 years.

On March 30<sup>th</sup> we lost our Chairman, Charles H. Felch, due to illness. His knowledge of, and visions for, the Town's natural resources will be impossible to replace. We all miss him deeply and have fond memories of his time with us.

The Conservation Commission meets on the second and forth Monday of the month at the Seabrook Town Hall, at 7:00PM. The public is always invited to attend. We look forward to an exciting and productive year ahead.

New residential construction is still progressing at a rapid rate with ninety-two housing units built this year, a slight decrease from 1997. There are now approximately 150 lots in approved subdivisions available for construction and this building boom is expected to continue.

Commercial growth is also increasing with a new Wendy's, Taco Bell, Autozone, Sullivan Tire, Irving Oil and Applebee's in the approval process or under construction. There is also an office supply building and a movie theater in the planning stages.

Three new industrial buildings were constructed this year and a 39,000 square foot building has been proposed for approval off of Stard Road. Several more industries have expressed interest in locating in Town.

Junk cars and trash continue to be an on-going problem. Hopefully the property maintenance code put forward by the Board of Selectmen will clarify and make these nuisance regulations enforceable if approved by the voters this year.

I would like to remind all pet owners to keep their animal rabies shots up-to-date. More rabid animals were found in the area this year.

#### SEABROOK LIBRARY - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT - 1998

The year nineteen ninety-eight saw library use increase dramatically. Circulation, or the number of items loaned, climbed to a record 38,691 - an increase over the previous year's figure of 23%! The number of cardholders now stands at 2,281 (re-registration began in July of 1997).

Computers remained a top draw for the Library. Lessons on surfing the Internet were again offered throughout the year to those interested and proved to be very popular. The public access computers were again kept busy by adults and young people alike - indeed, waiting lines were often the norm.

The Library got its website up and running with the help of staffer Lesley Gaudreau and Jennifer Pineo, a Seabrook student at Winnacunnet High School. The URL is: http://www.seabrook.lib.nh.us - give it a try!

During the year, several ongoing programs were continued such as weekly story hours for children and the monthly Book Discussion Group for adults. The Friends of the Library again sold the ever-popular glow necklaces during the fireworks display at Seabrook's Old Home Days in August and in May they held an extremely popular Plant Sale. Also, in July, the Friends directed a craft program for children. Thanks are due to Friends Terry Amato, Denise Favaloro and Karen Luxton for all of their organizational efforts in these regards. And of course a big thanks to all of the rest of the Friends, as well.

Adult programming included: Herbs, with Seabrook's own Susan Foote; Salt Water Fly Fishing with Allan Butler, Jr.; Yoga with Barbara Kizner; Basketmaking with Sally Watkins, also a local resident; and, back by popular demand, a program for parents and caregivers on teaching children how to safely surf the Internet, given by the Library staff.

Additionally, the year 1998 saw Beverly Cunningham join the Library staff, replacing Jennifer Haven as part-time Adult Services Librarian, who currently concentrates her efforts in the Reference and Circulation departments. Nettie Hartwick also joined the Library staff as a volunteer. Nettie puts away, back on the shelves, much of what the public returns to the Library after use - and a large thank you is owed to Nettie for the generous giving of her time and energy.

The Library's Young Adult Department was also busy. YAs have been checking out more library materials than ever before. Summer's *Click* on Summer was very popular as were the many other offerings such as Make Your Own Web Page; Link Up @ The Library which was held in conjunction with a national campaign by the American Library Association; and a three-part HTML class. Other perennially popular programs were also held such as Mystery Night and an afternoon film series.

The Children's Room held two successful summer reading programs entitled Live Free & Read for grades 1 - 4, and STAR - Summer Time And Reading for ages 3 - 6. Special events for children included puppeteer Martha Dana, long-time local favorite Papa Joe, and Todd Wellington professional silly person. Program topics included rainforest creatures, origami - a workshop with Jane Eslinger, and mammals - with the Audubon Society.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Seabrook, in the County of Rockingham, in said state, gualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the auditorium of the Seabrook Community Center, U.S. Route 1 (Lafayette Road), on Thursday, February 4th, 1999, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening to participate in the first session of the 1999 Annual Town Meeting;

And, you are hereby notified to meet in the auditorium of the Seabrook Community Center, U.S. Route 1 (Lafayette Road), on Tuesday, March 9, 1999, at 7:00 o'clock in the forenoon and to cast ballots on the official ballot questions below, until at least 7:00 o'clock in the evening of the same day.

Further, you are hereby notified that the moderator will process the absentee ballots at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon on Tuesday, March 9, 1999, pursuant to RSA 659-49.

Article 1: To elect by non-partisan ballot: one (1) Selectman and Assessor for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Moderator for a term of one (1) year, to fill a vacancy expiring in 2000; one Town Clerk for a term of three (3) years; one Treasurer for a term of three (3) years; two (2) members of the Budget Committee for a term of three (3) years; one (1) member of the Budget Committee for a term of two (2) years; one (1) member of the Budget Committee for a term of one (1) year; two (2) members of the Planning Board for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Park Commissioner for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Trustee of the Trust Funds for a term of three (3) years; three (3) Constables for a term of one (1) year; and one (1) Trustee of the Library for a term of three (3) years.

Article 2: To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

-Add the following to Article XIII (Wetlands) of the Zoning Ordinance:

C - Setbacks: Buildings and paved parking lots shall be no closer than ten feet to wetlands.

**D** - Vegetation: No natural herbaceous vegetation and no more than 50% of tree, saplings, or shrubs shall be removed from wetlands. Vegetation shall only be removed during the dry season or when the ground is frozen.

-Add a new line in Article VI under "Minimum Setbacks" (in every zoning district as follows: <u>From wetlands: 10';</u> and

-Move Section E ("Ponds & Streams") from Zoning Article IX to Zoning Article XIII.

Article 3: On petition of Lorraine D. Fogg and thirty-nine (39) other legal voters of the town: "Are you in favor of amending the town zoning ordinance by increasing the area of the commercial zone, which now extends 500 feet from the corner of Route 107 down the West side of Stard Road, another 1,050 feet+-, for a total of 1,550 linear feet+- to the Northern property boundary of land owned by Lorraine D. Fogg, and thence Northwest along said property line to a depth of 850 feet. The depth of 850 feet to then continue Southwest, parallel to Stard Road, back to the existing commercial zone."

(Recommended by Planning Board)

Article 4: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Million Eight Hundred Thousand (\$2,800,000.00) Dollars for the construction and original equipping of a forty (40) unit expansion of the elderly housing facility. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the project is completed or in three (3) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 5: To see if the town will vote to forgive repayment by the Seabrook Housing Authority of the \$250,000.00 promissory note as approved under Article 40 of the 1983 Town Meeting. The selectmen recommend this action.

Article 6: Shall we vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Fourteen Million Forty Thousand Two Hundred Sixty-one (\$14,040,261.00) Dollars? Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be Thirteen Million Six Hundred Eighty-three Thousand Eight Hundred Ninety-two (\$13,683,892.00) Dollars, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 7: To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to sell at public auction or by advertised sealed bids such town property as is no longer used by the town with sale conditional upon restrictions satisfactory to the town.

Article 8: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 154:1, I (b), relative to the organization of the fire department in that the "fire chief be appointed by the local governing body, or by the town or city manager, if any, with firefighters appointed by the local governing body or manager, upon recommendation of the fire chief."

Article 9: To see if the town will vote to adopt by reference the provisions of "The International Property Maintenance Code, First Edition, 1998" as published by the Building Officials and Code Administrators International, Inc., the International Conference of Building Officials, and the Southern Building Code Congress International, Inc., as an enforceable regulation governing existing structures and premises within the Town of Seabrook. Copies of this regulation, which may be referred to as the *Property Maintenance Code*, are available for public review at the town office building in the offices of the town clerk, code enforcement officer and town manager.

Article 10: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95-c to restrict Three (\$3.00) Dollars of revenues from each vehicle registration to expenditures for the purpose of highway maintenance? Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund to be known as the Transportation Improvement Fund, separate from the general fund. Any surplus in said fund shall not be deemed part of the general fund accumulated surplus and shall be expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose of the fund or source of the revenue.

Article 11: To see if the town will vote to authorize the transfer of the non-resident ambulance fee revenue, Five Thousand Eight Hundred (\$5,800.00) Dollars, into the capital reserve account approved at town meeting under Article 12 on March 10, 1998. This sum represents the amount collected from non-resident ambulance fees in the fiscal year 1998. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 12: To see if the town will vote to establish a noncapital reserve fund pursuant to RSA 35:1-c for the purpose of stabilizing the tax rate of the town in the context of the fixed and declining life of the Seabrook Nuclear Power Station. This shall be a non-lapsing account pursuant to RSA 32:7 II and may be funded either by transfers from surplus or by appropriations. This non-capital reserve fund may be expended only for specific public purposes stated in the DRA MS-7 form of the town for the year such expenditure is authorized by town meeting provided, however, that that this fund may not be expended for the repayment of loans or retirement of debt as defined by RSA 33:2. The selectmen recommend this article. (Majority vote required.)

Article 13: To see if the Town of Seabrook will vote to implement the recommendations contained in the Fact Finder's Report in the matter of the Fact Finding between the Town of Seabrook and the Seabrook Employee's Association dated July 1, 1998, which calls for the following increases in the salary and benefits:

This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the revaluation project is completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 18: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-one Thousand (\$71,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping three (3) police cruisers, and to authorize the sale or trade-in of three (3) existing cruisers.) This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the cruisers are purchased and equipped or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 19: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-eight Thousand (\$28,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing a communication recording system for the police department and to authorize the sale or trade-in of the present system. The present system will become non-operational on January 1, 2000. This system is a critical part of the operation of the police department. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the communication recording system is purchased or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 20 : To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars to upgrade, replace computer equipment as necessary to ensure we are compliant with the year 2000. This is a critical article that will ensure systems are operational effective January 1, 2000. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the work is completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.) Article 21: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-nine Thousand Three Hundred Sixty-seven (\$69,367.00) Dollars for the cost of Seabrook's contribution to seventeen (17) human service agencies in the seacoast area. A breakdown of each human service agency's request follows. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse as to each line item until the contributions are completed or in one (1) year. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend Sixty-nine Thousand Three Hundred Sixty-seven (\$69,367.00) Dollars for this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 22: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars to the Council on Aging to be used to continue the transportation program which assists non-driving handicapped and/or elderly residents of Seabrook. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the contribution is completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 23: To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to establish a program for televising selectmen's and other local meetings and public information announcements through an agreement with the local cable company, and also, to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and installing the necessary cable television equipment and training personnel to operate it. This will be a nonlapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the televising program is implemented and the equipment is in operation or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 24: To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars as the total cost for the purpose of a salt marsh restoration project. This will include Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars from a 1999 Coastal Program Grant and Ten Thousand \$10,000.00) Dollars of the town's share, of which Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, will be work-in-kind and volunteer services and the remaining Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars to be raised through taxes. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the 1999 project is completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 25: To see if the town will vote to deposit five percent (5%) of the revenues collected pursuant to RSA 79-A (the land use change tax) in the Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5 III as authorized by RSA 79-A:25 II.

Article 26: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars for the purchase and installation of a minimum of fifty (50) water meters. This will allow for a study of usage to best determine a fair and reasonable fee system. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the water meters are purchased and installed or in five (5) years. The selectmen recommend this appropriation. The budget committee does not recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 27: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty-seven Thousand (\$157,000.00) Dollars for the purchase of 27 acres located near well #5 off Old New Boston Road for the development of additional water sources and for the protection of our existing water supply. This will be a nonlapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the land is purchased or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 28: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and implementing the first phase of a SCADA alarm and monitoring system for the water department. This system is critical for the proper monitoring of the system to ensure proper pumping and chemical treatment. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the SCADA system is completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 29: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Eighty Thousand (\$180,000.00) Dollars to drill the permanent Riley well, install casing and pipe needed for final development of this new well. The tests show that this well can pump a potential of 300 gallons per minute. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the well is completed The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 30: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty Thousand (\$60,000.00) Dollars to be used to search and test for new sources of drinking water. This warrant is needed to ensure we continue pursuing new sources to maintain our water system. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the searching and testing is completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 31: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-four Thousand (\$24,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a 3/4 ton four wheel drive emergency service truck for the wastewater treatment plant and collection system. This vehicle will be used to service residential sewer stations as well as town-owned stations. There is no existing vehicle to be replaced. This is a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the truck is purchased and equipped or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 32: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-three Thousand Eight Hundred (\$63,800.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a tractor for the public works department, and to authorize the sale or trade-in of the existing 1985 John Deere tractor. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the tractor is purchased and equipped or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 33: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-eight Thousand Nine Hundred (\$68,900.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a 1999 rubbish truck for the public works department, and to authorize the sale or trade-in of the existing 1986 rubbish truck. This will be a nonlapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the rubbish truck is purchased and equipped or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 34: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-nine Thousand (\$69,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of removing, replacing, and equipping the existing scale house and weigh station. This is part of the solid waste master plan to modernize and increase the efficiency of operations at the transfer station. This will allow for proper management of the town's solid waste and provide for a payback within 2 1/2 years. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the scale house and weigh house is purchased and equipped or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 35: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty (\$8,980.00) Dollars for the purpose of installing beach boardwalks on four (4) town rights-of-way. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the work is completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 36: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-two Thousand (\$22,000.00) Dollars for the construction of a public bathroom facility to be located on town property near the Route 1A parking lot. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the bathroom facility is constructed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 37: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-seven Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty-two (\$47,922.00) for the purpose of rebuilding and paving Cross Beach Road. The work will consist of re-grading, adding gravel and paving. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the work is completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 38: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$14,500.00) Dollars to repair, resurface and reline one-half (1/2) of the existing parking lot areas at the Seabrook Community Center. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the repairing, resurfacing and relining project is completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 39: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Five Hundred ((6,500.00)) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing one thousand (1,000) feet of three (3") inch fire hose and one thousand (1,000) feet of one and three-quarter (1 3/4") inch fire hose for the fire department. This will be a nonlapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the fire hose is purchased or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 40: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-six Thousand Two Hundred (\$26,200.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a 3/4 ton utility truck for the water department, and to trade or sell a 1989, 3/4 ton Dodge utility truck with 110,000 mileage. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the utility truck is purchased and equipped or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 41: On petition of Robert A. Stankatis and thirty-three (33) other legal voters of the town: "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Five Hundred (\$11,500.00) Dollars for a multi-use tractor to be used at all town owned property for sweeping, snow removal and lawn mowing." The selectmen and the budget committee do not recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 42: On petition of Mark Preston and forty-nine (49) other legal voters of the town: "Shall the provisions for voting by official ballot on all issues before the Town of Seabrook under RSA 40:13 be limited to election of officers and certain other questions?" (Three-fifths (3/5) vote required.)

Article 43: On petition of Norman H. Brown and seventy-two (72) other legal voters of the town: "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-seven Thousand Six Hundred Eight (\$47,608.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing new, user-friendly Windows-based library management software (circulation, card catalog and cataloging) to replace the outdated DOS-based software, and the hardware necessary to operate the system at the Seabrook Library. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the items are purchased and installed or in five years." The selectmen and the budget committee do not recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 44: On petition of Norman H. Brown and seventy-one (71) other legal voters of the town: "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand (\$12,000.00) Dollars to upgrade the existing computers and purchase new computers at the Seabrook Library in order to increase public access. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the equipment is purchased and installed or in five (5) years." The selectmen and the budget committee do not recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 45: On petition of Norman H. Brown and sixty-four (64) other legal voters of the town: "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nineteen Thousand Five Hundred and Seventy-eight (\$19,578) Dollars for the purpose of correcting acoustic problems in the meeting room of the Seabrook Library. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the proper corrective measures are taken or in five (5) years." The selectmen and the budget committee do not recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 46: On petition of James I. Fuller and forty-three (43) other legal voters of the town: "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000) dollars for the purpose to support the health services offered by Seacoast Health Net to the uninsured, working families who are residents of the town. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not

lapse until the contribution is completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

Article 47: To transact all other legal business that may come before this meeting.

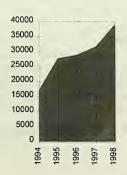

### 1998 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SEABROOK RECREATION COMMISSION

The 1998 members of the Seabrook Recreation Commission: Vernon Small, Chairman; Oliver Carter Jr., Selectmen & Vice Chairman; Shelly Carter, Secretary; Rosemary Fowler, Parks Department; Susan Foote, Planning Board; Sheryl Maltais, Ralph Marshall, Charlotte Dow, and Salvatore Rubera. The Full-time Staff: Sandra Beaudoin, Director of Recreation; Derek Griggs, Assistant Director(thru Sept. 1998); Frances Eaton, Secretary and Clyde Eaton, Community Center Custodian.

### CHANGES IN 1998

The Recreation Department continued to organize and implement a program fee system involving many This was the first full year of charging small fees for structured structured programs during 1998. programs. The purpose of starting user fees now is to gradually execute fees and charges, so that in 20 years, the users fee portion and tax appropriated portion together will cover the expenses of this department. The burden of the program cost will shift primarily to be the program user responsibility and the balance subsidized by the taxpayer. The fees currently being exercised are unusually low, when compared to recreation departments in the surrounding communities. For example, the fee for one week of camp in Seabrook, at the Community Center, is \$7.50 and in other communities ranges from \$20 to \$75 per week for similar camp programs. The Seabrook Recreation Department also charged from \$5.00 to \$10,00 per 10 weeks/session of year round structured sports and creative classes during 1998. Other Communities charge five times these fees. Non-residents fees were also applied in 1998. All monies generated from fees are turned into the Town Treasurer and applied to the town's expenses, which helps to offset monies raised through property taxes. In summary, any goals for fees and charges are planned to be gradual, and take into consideration families with larger numbers of children and lower incomes.

In 1998, the major repairs to the Community Center included repairs to the brick walkway, installing light fixtures to improve the lighting near an exit, replacing carpeting in the main office areas and exercise room. All of these items had been postponed from 1997 due to the default budget that year.

In conclusion, the commission and department staff, gratefully extends a special thanks to all those volunteers who shared their time and put forth much effort for the youth of Seabrook during 1998. Local volunteers were responsible for coaching over 35 sports teams for youth & teens.

#### WATER & SEWER DEPARTMENT ANNUAL - TOWN REPORT 1998

There were 520,262,298 gallons of water pumped in 1998. This was a 14,284,130-gallon decrease over the previous year. Industrialcommercial use decreased from 156,835,690 in 1997 to 152,221,470 in 1998. This 4,614,220-gallon decrease can be attributed to North Atlantic Energy Service, Bailey Corporation and Fisherman's Co-op who had 8.5, 2.0 and 1.8 million gallons respectively. Others had increases in 1998. They were Pierce and Stevens, Majestic Laundry and Beach Laundry that had 4.3, 1.2 and .4 million gallons respectively.

There were approximately 98 new services added to the water system. The department installed 19 of them. Seven new metered accounts were also added; Auto Shine Car Wash, 919 A Lafayette Road, Dynamic Chromium, 146 Batchelder Road, Oh No Realty Trust, 34 Folly Mill Road, Beach Precinct Building, 210 Ocean Blvd, Corium, 9 Batchelder Road, Seabrook Elementary School Addition, 256 Walton Road, Wendy's 264 Lafayette Road.

Seventeen new sub-divisions were constructed this past year. The water crew observed the installation of hundreds of feet of water mains services and several fire hydrant installations on Beckman's Landing, Pondview Estates, Quaker Way and Troy Road on these larger subdivisions.

Our crews also installed approximately 2400' of 8" water main with four fire hydrants on Cross Beach Road. This was accomplished with the funds from Town Warrant Article #52 of 1998 Town Meeting. In the spring of 1999 this project will be completed with the connecting of every water service on Cross Beach Road to this new main. Then the old 2" water main will be disconnected. Previous to this homeowners on Cross Beach had no fire protection. Also at Cross Beach the crew completed a drainage project. Sand dunes were restored and dune grass planted by the water and sewer crews.

Our crews repaired several water leaks. The larger of these occurred with a 12" break on New Zealand Road, a 10" one on Route 107 and another 6" one, in the intersection of Weare Road and Mill Lane. Several hydrants were repaired, with the replacement of two: one on New Zealand Road the other on South Main Street.

On Smalls Avenue our crews while installing the sewer main and services also installed a new water main and new water services. At the Elementary School a new 2" water service was installed, replacing the old one.

At our Ledge Road well field we built a temporary road to accommodate a well drilling rig. A well was drilled; temporary pumps installed and pump test run. The results show that this site has potential of being our next well to be added to the system. Sewer crews have been extremely busy this past year with hook-ups in Adams Park, Seabrook Mobile Village, Stonybrook Park and Staples Park and services all over town with the more difficult ones were the businesses along Route One. Larger mains with manholes and some with pump chambers were constructed at Meadow Stone Park, Foxmere Trailer Park, Twinbrooks Campground, Bailey Corporation, Autumn Way, Chevy Chase Road, Andy's Mobile Home Park, Moores Lane and Felch Lane. Also our crews stripped and screened approximately 5,000 yards of loam in preparation when we pumped, crushed, filled, loomed and seeded several hundred septic tanks.

Also crews assisted the highway department with rubbish and recycling collection and with snow removal.

I am pleased to report that approximately 97% of the town is now hooked up to the sewer system. Our treatment plant received 264,000,000 gallons of sewage in 1998 with the removal of 924 tons of biosolids. These solids were trucked off to be composed or land applied. Flows at the plant now average 725,000 gallons per day.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the water and sewer personnel for the outstanding work they accomplished in 1998. I would also like to thank everyone who cooperated with observing our partial water ban on the outdoor use of water during the summer months. This only allowed outdoor use of water three hours per day between 6:30 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. and 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Remember - water is a precious and useful resource and should be used wisely not wastefully. Conserving water is everyone's responsibility.

#### SEWER PROJECT - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1998

The townwide sewer project made significant progress toward completion of house service installations in 1998. A partnership of Town of Seabrook Water and Sewer Department personnel and private contractors performed nearly 1000 sewer connections. Some of the sections of the town connected during 1998 include Farm Lane, Causeway Street, A and B Streets, Dixon Way, True Road, True Lane, New Zealand Road, Frances Drive to name a few. There are approximately 200 connections to be completed during 1999, along with retirement of remaining septic tanks if not completed during the installation phase.

As the project nears its ultimate completion, I would like to reflect on the benefits of the new sewer system. All residential, commercial and industrial buildings are connected to a modern and reliable sanitary waste disposal system. The days of failed septic systems in naturally high groundwater are a memory.

Many houses with restrictions on expansion now are eligible for expansion. Most importantly, the environment is receiving relief from contamination of soil and groundwater. A direct result of this benefit can be witnessed in the reopening of clamming beds in Seabrook Harbor which were closed for several years due to red tide.

I would like to recognize the hard working individuals from the sewer project staff and water and sewer departments. Their work during 1998 to bring the project to this point should be commended. I would also like to thank the former Project Manager John Dold. His diligent effort to lay the groundwork for the project is much appreciated.

### WELFARE DEPARTMENT - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1998

For the fiscal year 1998, the town's welfare department spent a total of \$50,606.00, \$7,736.00 more than 1997. A total of 81 families were assisted in 1998 and the town has recovered \$2,976.68 through promissory notes, assignments, court actions, and liens. An additional \$879.35 has been worked off by recipients through the town's workfare program.

The past year has seen a considerable number of working poor families, those who work but do not earn enough working full time to make ends meet should an emergency arise. There have also been a number of cases where assistance has been needed while awaiting disability awards. Although there have been no new cases due to assistance ending in another state, it is still early to determine what the impact of welfare reform will be to the town.

### SEABROOK HOUSING AUTHORITY - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1998

The residents of the Town of Seabrook created the Seabrook Housing Authority during the 1980s to help meet the housing needs of our senior population. By law, the Board of Selectmen appoints five members for staggered five-year terms. We suffered a great loss this year with the sad passing of member Charles Henry Felch. Charlie was instrumental in the building of the Seabreeze Village, and was the visionary for Seabreeze Village II. He will be sadly missed. We are pleased the Board of Selectmen appointed our newest member, Mr. Richard Donahue; his expertise will be much appreciated. Housing Authority members Oliver Fowler, Paul Kelley, and Patricia O'Keefe continue to serve on the Authority. It has been a pleasure working with them.

Since opening in 1992, Seabreeze Village has enjoyed a 100% occupancy rate. Demand for senior housing by residents has exceeded availability for the past six years. Currently there are over 30 elderly Seabrook residents waiting for an apartment at Seabreeze Village. Our property manager Paul Stewart of Stewart Property Management advises us that the average wait time for someone on the waiting list is over **seven years**. The State of New Hampshire has cited Seabrook as the 3<sup>rd</sup> neediest community in the state for affordable housing.

In 1989 the Authority bought enough land for future development at the 81 Railroad Avenue site. The time has come to address the needs of those on the long waiting list by hopefully approving Seabreeze Village II, which will add an additional 40 units. We urge our fellow citizens to vote YES for this warrant article. It will mean a safe, clean and healthy home for many of our senior citizens.

Seabreeze Village continues to operate in the "black" or with a positive cash flow without the need for additional financial support from the Town. The Authority, by law, is non-profit and all rents must go to satisfy the upkeep and capital reserve requirements of the building. The Authority members volunteer their time and service and are not paid any stipends or fees of any kind. All funds expended by the Authority are done so for the betterment of the tenants.

The audited financial statements of the Seabrook Housing Authority are filed annually with the Board of Selectmen and the Town Manager. Those wishing to examine the audited financials may do so at the Town Hall.

In closing, I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, the Town Manager and all those town employees and residents for their help and support through the years.

Even though information is sent to the electric company periodically, we have no idea when the requests or changes will take place.

# INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen and Town Manager Town of Seabrook Seabrook, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Seabrook as of and for the year ended December 31, 1997 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Seabrook has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Seabrook, as of December 31, 1997, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Seabrook taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Seabrook. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.
