TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 14th of March next, at nine-thirty in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years and all other necessary town officers.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for snow removal and sanding.
- Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing town highways and bridges.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for the purpose of construction on Prospect Street.
- Article 6. To see if the town will accept state aid for Construction of Class 5 Roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$331.75.
- Article 7. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to oil North Main Street, from the residence of Joseph Hawkins to the Cemetery, or take any action relative to the same as petitioned.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of snow removal equipment.

- Article 9. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty dollars (\$30.00) for two lights on Prospect Street.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes, excepting poll taxes, paid before dates to be designated at this meeting and the selectmen to extend the dates if the adjournment of Legislature necessitates.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the fire department.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be set aside as a sinking fund, to pay for the water bonds at maturity.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the water system.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of installing two toilets in the town hall.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of employing a district nurse.
- Article 18. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.
- Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to allow the American Legion to use the town hall one Friday night each month without pay.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred fifty dollars (\$350.00) in addition to the amount required by law for public library.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for the purpose of advertising the resources and natural advantages of the town, said sum to be expended under the direction of the selectmen, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the care of shade trees.

Article 25. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Article 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF TROY HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my report as Headmaster of Troy High School.

ACTIVITIES

The High School paper, "The Trojan," sponsored by Miss Katherine Gage and a very capable student staff published an Easter and a Graduation issue, during the school year 1937-38, both of which proved to be editorial as well as financial successes. Much favorable comment was received from administrators and school paper sponsors of other schools in the state for the splendid work exemplified in these two copies. The editorial staff consisted of Olive Haskins, Editor-in-Chief; Beverly Parker, Assistant Editor; and Elizabeth Rogers, Business Manager. The "Thanksgiving number," published this year under an editorial staff headed by Beverly Parker as Editor-in-Chief, was equally

as successful. Another graduation issue, which is to contain the pictures of all of the graduates, is planned for the end of the year.

Music, under Mrs. Mildred Whitcomb, has taken on added interest as is evidenced by the willing cooperation of the pupils in the formation of a mixed glee club and school orchestra. The orchestra, but recently organized, is badly in need of more recruits and Mrs. Whitcomb is trying to interest pupils in the grades as well as in the High School. Mr. Hendrickson and an assistant are teaching the rudiments of string and wind instruments during school hours to all pupils interested. The orchestra is being organized with this group as a nucleus. I hope that the pupils will receive much encouragement from their parents to participate in this way.

Considerable interest has been displayed by the pupils in the carrying on of manipulative projects in a Home Economics club, sponsored by Miss Gage, and a Woodworking Club, conducted by the headmaster. These two clubs meet on each Tuesday and Thursday during the last period of the day, which is activity period. On Mondays, during this same activity period, drill in the fundamental processes is given to all pupils of the High School, and on Wednesdays the period is used for chorus singing and Glee Club. Assemblies are being held once each week under the direction of the Student Council. Every other week assembly programs are given by various school classes. To date some very fine programs have been presented.

On December 17th the Senior Class presented the play, "One in a Million," under the direction of Miss Katherine Gage. The play was a striking success both dramatically and financially. Rudolph Valonen, Prescott Robbins, Irene Tahtinen, Beverly Parker, Bernadette Duprey, Evelyn Gove, Harvey Trombly, and Paul Girouard gave excellent performances.

In addition to his regular class work and his duties as general treasurer of the High School Activity Funds (a report of which appears in this booklet), Mr. Hackler is carrying on a fine program of youth guidance for the younger boys of the school in his capacity as leader of the Y. M. C. A. sponsored "Pioneers."

One hundred and twenty dollars was again allotted to Troy High School for the year 1938-39 by the National Youth Administration to assist worthy and needy pupils to continue their high school education. This year two of our pupils are taking advantage of this opportunity.

ATHLETICS

I feel that athletics have a proper place in the school and that here in Troy they are not being over-emphasized. Under the very able coaching of Mr. James Noucas, who replaced Miss Helen Rice as sixth grade teacher, the boys have had a very successful vear at basket ball, and are looking forward to an equally successful baseball season. The defeat, by our boys, of such teams as Marlboro, Walpole, Alstead, and Hancock, has done much to prove the desirability of good coaching, not only as it relates to the development of the team as a whole, but also to the development of the individual in teaching him how to coordinate his muscular and thinking processes. It is needless to add any mention of the greatly increased school spirit which has resulted from a winning team. Mr. Noucas has also aided materially in rebuilding the girl's team, which was necessary due to the graduation of so many of its members last June. In addition to his work with the athletic teams, Mr. Noucas, who is a trained physical education director, is devoting two periods per week to the teaching of physical education to all pupils in grades four through twelve. This work is carried on in the Town Hall and on the school playground. In speaking of athletics I cannot refrain from mentioning the need and the desirability of a more adequate gymnasium provided with the proper facilities necessary for healthful play.

SCHOLARSHIP

In an effort to prove or disprove a popular local issue concerning the relative value of a two year versus a four year high school in Troy, I have carried on as extensive a survey as possible, with such available records as are contained in the school together with information gathered from past pupils, to determine to some degree the merits of the two procedures as measured by relative attendance and by the performance of the graduates. I have attempted to picture the relationship between the two systems by a comparison of the graduates' performances and the attendance facts of the four years of our present four year high school with the performance of the graduates and the attendance facts of the previous four years during which our high school pupils completed their eleventh and twelfth years at Keene High School. As I see it, this is the only possible method

of making a fair and accurate comparison of the two systems a comparison which is not effected, to a very substantial degree, by any of a variety of personal factors which might readily enter into a comparison of this type. Made, as it is, on the basis of but four years for the two groups, might appear as insufficient proof of the relative values. Some salient points stand out, however, that are both interesting and worthy of mention later. All available facts are pictured in the following table:

73% of those that entered grade 9. 84% went on to grade 11. 65% of those that entered grade 9. 37% of graduates entered postsec. school.

From the foregoing table the following points deserve consideration.

- 1. There was an 18% increase in the number of pupils entering grade nine upon the establishment of the four year high school.
- 2. There was a marked increase of almost 20% in the number of pupils who remained in school after the tenth grade to go on to grade eleven, after the founding of the four year school.
- 3. Of those that had entered grade nine, there was an increase of 23% in the number which graduated from high school in Troy over the number that graduated from Keene.
- 4. The number of graduates (19) of Troy High that have furthered their education at post-secondary institutions gives a slightly lower percentage than the number of graduates (15) of Keene High who took advanced training. It must be considered, however, that we are dealing with a very small group in each case, that from Troy High four have gone on to a school of college level as compared with but one from the Keene High group, and that the Troy High graduates are all four years younger than the other group and may yet overcome the slight percentage advantage by soon deciding upon further schooling.

I do not think it necessary to draw any long conclusions from the foregoing—the facts speak for themselves. One conclusion should be stressed, however, and that is that attempts to maintain such a scholarship standard, that we can have our pupils accepted at college by our certificate, have been well rewarded. It would also appear significant that at the same time we have not neglected to interest and hold in school until graduation those who have not the desire or means to continue their education in post-secondary institutions. If I were asked for recommendations concerning the school, I would say without any reservations whatsoever, that the school should continue as one of four years, that the support which has heretofore been given to Keene High be transferred to Troy, that the town of Troy and its inhabitants become more aware of the valuable asset which their high school is to them, and that if there are shortcomings in the courses or curriculums of the school to correct them without loss of time.

As a school officer, I hereby invite you, the citizens and parents of Troy, to visit your educational plant more often, that you may better be fitted to judge and constructively criticise the present administration, or to suggest improvements. You will always be made welcome on such occasions, and cannot help but be enlightened on the manner in which your children are being taught, and the use which is being made of your financial support.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools for his administrative and supervisory aid and support, the teachers for their untiring cooperative efforts, the pupils for their admirable loyalty to the school and staff, and the citizens of Troy for their moral and financial backing; all of which has done so much toward making Troy High School stand out as a leader in its field of endeavor.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

With pleasure I submit this report of the music department of the Troy schools.

During 1937-38 a Harmonica Club was formed, composed of twenty-two members from Grades IV, V, VI, and two joint concerts were held with the Dublin Harmonica Club,—in Dublin and Troy. Two and three-part music was played under the leadership of each Club's child-director.

Three High School girls, Elizabeth Rogers, 1st Soprano, Olive Haskins, 2nd Soprano, and Claire Parker, Alto, were selected to attend the N. H. High School Music Festival in Nashua, May 12-14, 1938 and were accompanied by their Supervisor. They with five girl-and-boy Jaffrey High School Glee Club members joined once each week after school hours in a rehearsal with the Supervisor, memorizing each of the five selections. Just before the Festival the two groups, Miss Laura Kononan accompanying on the piano, sang the choral numbers in assemblies of The Junior High and High Schools of respective towns with the superintendent and school board invited. The All-State Chorus numbered 250 and the All-State Orchestra 250 for the Friday evening concert.

This year the number of Supervisor's visits were cut in half, necessitating the elimination of some phases of the music work, but the teachers have carried on faithfully, achieving much fine grade work. I wish to mention the gratifying advance of the sixth grade to three part singing.

As this report goes to press, a school orchestra of eleven members has been formed and one rehearsal held under direction of the Supervisor. It is urgent that more pupils avail themselves of the opportunity for instrumental instruction under the teaching of Mr. Hendrickson and Mr. Farr who hold classes at the school each week.

The response of boy singers in the High School has been pleasing,—their request for Glee Club making it wise to organize a Mixed Glee Club instead of Girls' Glee Club as in recent years. We are about to begin preparations for the All-State Festival to be held in Concord next May.

I wish to express appreciation for the continuous evidence of school spirit evidenced in the music classes, because of the promotion of this element by Headmaster Faunce and other teachers.

In closing I wish to express gratitude for cooperation of our Superintendent, the School Board and teachers.
