1995 TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March 1995 at eight o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Articles 1-2 will be by official ballot at the Town Hall and the polls shall open for balloting at eight o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before seven o'clock in the evening. The following articles (Articles 3-28) in the warrant will be acted upon on Thursday, March 16, 1995 at six thirty o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of increasing the Board of Selectmen to 5 (five) members? Yes or No. Selectmen oppose - a five member board in a town this size is not necessary and only creates more bureaucracy, wasted expense, larger, longer and hard to schedule meetings, more confusion, and a myriad of other cumbersome logistical problems.

ARTICLE 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, indefinitely until specific rescission of such authority, to accept gifts of personal property which may be offered to the town for any public purpose, pursuant NH RSA 31:95-e. The Selectmen must hold a public hearing before accepting such gifts, and the acceptance shall not bind the town to raise, appropriate, or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair, or replacement of any such personal property and such authorization shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of town meeting. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,000.00 for town road improvements and reconstruction. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for town road improvements and

reconstruction and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$20,000.00 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for the purchase of a highway roller and trailer. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$80,000.00 for a new 4-wheel drive, diesel truck with plow and wing, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$80,000.00 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33), and to authorize the municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to purchase a tractor/mower from the Forest Service. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,500.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,300.00 to install three electronically operated overhead doors at the Town Garage. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the replacement of the water tank on Tanker 1 of the fire department which is housed at the Glen Station. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for construction of a roof over the handicap access ramp and Town Clerk entrance and roof shingling and painting of the trim and windows at Town Hall. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 as its share of the cleanup costs associated with a diesel fuel spill at the Transfer Station. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote on the following: Are

you in favor of doing away with the unlawful and unconstitutional by-law prohibiting all electioneering and signature gathering on all town-and school-owned property? Said by-law exceeds the power granted to a town in NH RSA 31:41c that only applies to "interfering with voters" on election day at their polling place. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph J. DeMinico, Jr. and others. Selectmen oppose. NH RSA 31:41c permits the Town to do exactly what the overwhelming majority of citizens voted for at the 1987 Town Meeting and that is control the needless harassment, glad handing, and cajoling to try and force a person's vote at the polling place. Voting is a private right and privilege and should not be interfered with.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 as its share to participate in the Hazardous Waste Collection Day along with the Town of Conway. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to pay for mapping and other costs related to the Enhanced 911 Program installation. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,480.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Selectmen oppose - use of public funds should require salary disclosure.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,455.00 for the Children's Health Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert Owen and others. Selectmen favor \$3,410.00.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$925.00 for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. Also to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the Big Brother Big Sister Organization administered also by the Tri-County Community Action Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Charles Gothreau and others. Roode favors/Patch and Chandler favor \$925.00 for CAP and oppose \$200.00 for BBBSO.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,090.00 to assist the Family Health Centre. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Selectmen oppose.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,150.00 for the Early Intervention Program of Children Unlimited, Inc. (birth to 3 yrs.). Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Roode favors/Patch and Chandler oppose.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for support of operating expenses of the Eastern Slope Regional Airport Authority. Agreeable to a petition signed by George Howard, Bartlett's representative to the Airport Authority, and others. Roode favors/Patch and Chandler favor \$300.00.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,326.00 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$589.00 for the support of Carroll County Against Domestic Violence and Rape's shelter for battered women and children. Agreeable to a petition signed by Karen Hebert and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,499.00 for the support of the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by Charles Gothreau and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed for the remaining 1800 feet of Ellis Ridge Road. This road starts at the intersection near Lot #20 and continues around to form a loop back to the same intersection. All construction and surfacing to be completed to current Town standards prior to final acceptance by the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Owen Jefferson and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Another year has passed and 1994 saw many new and exciting changes in Bartlett, including the re-birth of the railroad to the purchase and expansion at Attitash.

A significant amount of progress was made on our town roads during the past year and thanks to the diligent and capable work of Road Agent Pat Roberts and his crew, a number of sub-standard roads were brought up to satisfactory travel levels.

Thorn Hill Road was the recipient of most of the work with every culvert being replaced, major drainage and slope work completed, over 500 feet of complete reconstruction and major amounts of shimming and sealing. Other significant amounts of work were done on Wilhelm Place and Graz Place in Linderhof, Spring Hill Road, and Glenwood.

Major undertakings for the coming year include portions of Dundee Road, Linderhof Strasse, River Road, Alpendorf, and Glen Ledge Road along with smaller jobs on a number of roads. Grove Street and River Street in the village are ready for attention and we will be awaiting the outcome of the water project before spending any major amounts of money on those roads. The amount of work and improvement in the roads is now quite noticeable and the Selectmen feel that sticking with our present budget plan with slight increases in the next 2-3 years will bring the majority of all roads into satisfactory condition allowing safe and comfortable passage at the recommended speed limits.

The Transfer Station and recycling efforts took on a new look with the addition of mandatory cardboard recycling and voluntary efforts for tin, magazines and office paper. The Selectmen hired a consultant to help with the program and the result is turning into significant savings to the town. Only two months into the new program, the Towns saved approximately \$1,300.00 in hauling and dumping fees and received \$413.73 in income from the recyclables and the first two months of 1995 show increased levels of savings and income. The Selectmen would like to thank the crew at the Transfer Station and the town crews from Bartlett and Jackson for their help in making the dual town operation such a success.

Unfortunately, due to environmental costs and increased dumping costs, we have had to raise prices on mattresses and some other disposal items. The Town is not making any profit, merely trying to break even on the disposal costs of these items.

Elsewhere in the town report is a complete listing of the rules and regulations for the Transfer Station.

Work at closing the Garland landfill is progressing, albeit a bit slowly. While the process is taking some time, it is still expected that the costs for completing the project will be reasonable and much under anticipated costs estimated a few years ago. This year we finished the final shaping of the site and we were fortunate to purchase the material for that task for only \$3.00 per yard (delivered). Loam for the site had been held for the Town since 1991 (and paid for at a rate of \$10.00 per yard delivered) and is at the site and the purchase of the high quality State-specified material to cover the site before loaming has been awarded (in 1993) by competitive bid. Water samples have been taken, tested and submitted to the State and there appears to be no problems with any of the samples but we are awaiting word from the State. Once again, it is hoped to finish this project this year, but we will move cautiously to finish the job at the least possible expense.

The new health insurance idea that the Selectmen proposed to town employees this past year appears to have been very successful. While difficult to explain here in detail, the basic idea of the program is that the town pays for a lower premium health plan (Comp 200) but reimburses the employee the difference between the old plan's (JW) deductible and the new one should expenses be incurred. Approximately \$9,200 was saved over what would have been spent for 1993. We plan on seeing if we can expand on this idea and perhaps the School Board may want to look into the idea to see if it might not save money there also.

The Selectmen will have already held or will be holding a public meeting in the Village to see if the Bartlett Village Precinct residents will approve a plan to establish at least a two rod (or 33 ft.) wide right-of-way on Town roads within the Precinct. Only a portion of the Town roads have a definitive right-of-way and the Precinct needs the width to properly and efficiently install the new water system. The Selectmen hope that this proposal will be accepted by the Precinct landowners and avoid any land taking costs which would only drive up the cost of the water system, the town tax rate or both.

This year's budget has been overspent by \$45,054 representing 4.6% of the total budget. While the Selectmen try not to overspend the budget; we tend to budget very conservatively

and try to hold to the approved amount. We feel it is better to budget conservatively, and try to meet that amount, than to budget high and have a tendency to waste money or not watch the expenditures as closely, feeling we have a cushion. If it looks like we might overspend, we are careful to make sure one or two of the following is present: 1) our surplus is such that we won't be in a deficit situation and/or 2) income is high enough, or higher than projected, which helps balance off the overexpenditure. This year both cases are true and our surplus is \$145,751 and income is \$532,933 as compared to \$492,062 which was projected at the time of setting the tax rate.

Two major areas resulted in the overexpenditures, the transfer station and highway accounts. The transfer station account was much higher due to a couple of factors. Increased tonnage and construction debris which can probably be attributed to an upturn in the economy. Another factor was one of the hauling firms was hauling in non-recycled loads to the Transfer Station. This has been halted and although we are still unable to determine the fiscal impact on the account due to these violations, we are attempting to do so. The Selectmen have initiated a firm policy on recycling and have notified a number of parties that their transfer station rights will be suspended if our recycling ordinance is not adhered to. Periodic inspections on location and at the transfer site will note violators and their privileges will be revoked.

The highway account overexpenditure was the Selectmen's decision. Part of the problems with our town roads stems from the fact that in past years the Selectmen have budgeted a set amount for the highway department and if we had a particularly bad winter or other unforeseen expenses such as repairs, etc., we would try to stay close to the overall highway budget with the result being a cut back on summer maintenance. During the summer of 1994 when it became obvious we could not complete our planned schedule of road repair without overspending the highway account, the Selectmen made the decision to try and complete the summer schedule so we would not fall further behind in the road improvement schedule. With only a five cent increase over the 1993 town tax rate for 1994, and hopefully no increase planned for this year (1995), the Selectmen felt this was the best decision.

In December, the Selectmen became aware that the White Mountain National Forest was preparing to auction off a trac-

tor/mower which would serve nicely for the Town to do its roadside mowing. The Selectmen tried to negotiate with the Forest Service to postpone or delay auctioning that item until after Town Meeting to see if the Town would vote to appropriate the funds to purchase this piece of equipment. Unfortunately, we were unable to delay the auction or get the equipment declared surplus, so we were faced with a difficult decision. Should we lose the chance on purchasing the equipment or go to the auction and try to be the successful bidder. In 1993 the Town put out the roadside mowing and paid \$2,149.95 to the successful bidder. In 1994 the Town advertised the mowing for bid and received one bid for \$5,600.00, so we elected to not mow the roadsides in 1994. Faced with this annual expense, the Selectmen purchased the machine at auction for \$6,000.00. We think this makes good financial sense for the Town and with this machine we will be able to mow a wider area and reach areas that previously were not done or done by hand. If the Town does not appropriate the money, we will sell the tractor/mower.

This year the Selectmen are asking the voters to approve the purchase of a used roller and a trailer. Last year we spent \$6,369.00 for roller rental and we think the purchase of a used roller is a wise investment. The trailer will allow transport of the roller as well as any other equipment the Town is using.

Last year's Hellen Hayes Memorial Fourth of July Parade and Old Home Weekend was so successful that Selectmen want to see the tradition continued. A number of former citizens of Bartlett returned to renew acquaintances and friendships and we hope the same will occur this year. In order to allow for the greatest participation and allow for a rain day, the festivities will be held on Sunday, July 2, 1995 with Monday, July 3, 1995 available in case of rain. Schedules will be announced prior to the event but it is hoped that this early announcement will allow families and friends to plan for vacations and reunions.

While we state something similar each year in our annual report, it is with sincere thought and meaning that we thank all the town employees, volunteers and citizens for making Bartlett such a great place to live.

There will always be personality disputes, people with ideas on how to do things better; those who complain without solutions or suggestions; those that get involved and those who

don't. That is what makes a small town a small town. If everyone pauses for a moment, takes a deep breath and has a hard look around the region, the State, and the county, on balance you will agree with the Selectmen: We're pretty fortunate to be right here in Bartlett.

BARTLETT PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT 1994

The library book and periodical circulation for 1994 was 12,727. Four hundred twelve books were added to the collection with 161 being gift books. Our library also circulates and borrows materials through the New Hampshire Automated Interlibrary Loan System. By accessing this statewide data base our library has access to public and academic libraries throughout our state, greatly improving our ability to meet our patron's needs. The library also belongs to the BearCamp Video Cooperative, a group of Carroll County libraries formed to pool and share our resources. The video collection changes every two months with a new collection of 30 to 40 videos in each bi-monthly collection.

The library conducted a successful reading program, "Reading is a Magic Trip," last summer in conjunction with the school's summer programs. Every Tuesday morning a story hour was held with volunteers providing the programs:

- Zoo Doings -- Jean Gustin
- Find Hermit Crab -- Mary and Ned Goodwin, Ann Ostroski
- Cooking with Big Bear -- Barry Williams
- Blueberries for Sal Day at Attitash -- Lydia Lansing
- McLaura's Farm -- Laura Slitt
- Magic School Bus' Ocean -- Jeanne Forrest

The summer program culminated with a Magic Show. During the summer the children kept track of the books read for the statewide COUNT ON BOOKS book count. The children are still keeping count in their classrooms in order to help meet New Hampshire's goal of 1,480,000 in this on-going nation-wide reading incentive program.

The library published its second book on Bartlett's history in October. "*The Latchstring Was Always Out: A History of Lodging Hospitality and Tourism in Bartlett New Hampshire*", written by Aileen Carroll, has received many rave reviews. Funds from the sale of this book will be put into the Bartlett History Fund.

The library received many memorial gifts for the Lucille Garland Children's Book Fund in memory of Buhrman and Margaret Garland bringing this fund to over \$2800. Interest on this fund will be used each year for children's books.

The library has undertaken the first major step toward automating the library circulation and catalog system by weeding the book collection and barcoding the books. Currently we are examining demos of the many systems available in order to select the one which will best meet our needs as a school and public library. An automated system will make the process of locating materials in the library much easier for patrons; provide information on the status of a book quickly; prepare special bibliographies when needed, process overdue notices and keep records of materials circulated by category.

The librarian attended three Area Forum meetings, three Five Rivers Users meetings (NHAIS), a technology workshop and the Christa McAuliffe Technology Conference.

This year's budget reflects a small increase in the overall library operations. After examining our insurance last year we found we needed additional coverage. The book budget was increased slightly to meet the increased demands. We decreased the periodical budget but are budgeting for half of the cost of Wilson's Magazine Abstracts on CD Rom. This program, updated monthly, provides information access to the past ten years for many more magazines than we are currently receiving. Proceeds from book fairs will pay for the remaining cost.

The library wishes to thank our local Brownie troop for the beautiful flowers which were planted in our window boxes last summer and also the seventh grade science class for decorating the boxes this winter with greenery as part of their participation in the Northern Lights Wintery Trails contest. They won second place with their decorations.

It is with sadness that I mention Gabriella Ainsworth's death. "Gabe," as we all knew her, was our library assistant for many years. Many people mentioned her willingness to help and her cheerful disposition. She served as a substitute until her recent illness. She was a great lady and will be missed by our community.

Our library's hours are listed on the following page. The public is also welcome to use the library during the school day when the school is open. This is your library and we are here to serve you. It is one of the best bargains in town.

THE BARTLETT HISTORY FUND

The Bartlett History Fund was established by the Bartlett Library Trustees following the Town's bicentennial in 1990. The purpose of the History Fund is to further the recording of the history of Bartlett and its vicinity. Profits from the sale of the Bartlett history book, *Bartlett, New Hampshire: In the Valley of the Saco*, and the sale of bicentennial memorabilia were set aside to establish the Bartlett History Fund.

The following guidelines for the Bartlett History Fund have been established:

- All monies received from future sales of the Bartlett history book, bicentennial memorabilia, and any other project undertaken by the Trustees for the History Fund will go into the History Fund.
- The money is put into a separate account under the name "Bartlett History Fund".
- This fund may not be used for the Library budget. The library may, however, use this fund to purchase books and materials which relate to the history of the town and region which will then become part of the Bartlett History Collection which is being maintained in a special fireproof file cabinet.
- The money in the History Fund may be expended for historical projects, pictures, postcards, and other types of historical materials.
- The Bartlett Library Trustees must approve the above expenditures.
- Donations of materials and monetary gifts may be made to the Fund.

Cash on hand as of December 31, 1994 - \$4,084.15

In October the Bartlett Library Trustees published another book, *The Latchstring was Always Out: A History of Lodging Hospitality and Tourism in Bartlett, New Hampshire*, written by Aileen Carroll, the author of the previous book. Following a book signing hosted by New England Inn, the book went on sale in the local book stores and the Bartlett Public Library and has received many positive reviews.

BARTLETT FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT 1994

In 1994 the fire department responded to 174 calls for services. This is an increase of 24 calls over 1993.

Each year as the town grows, our calls increase. An example of this is as follows: In 1990 there were 90 calls; in 1991 there were 95 calls; in 1992 there were 128 calls; in 1993 there were 150 calls, and in 1994 there were 174 calls. 1994 calls are almost double the calls in 1990.

This past year 12 members of the department completed a 120 hour course for Fire Fighter I certification. We should be proud of these members for spending so many hours of their own time for special training like this, on top of their regular twice a month training.

A reminder to all citizens that in time of a major power outage like the one we had on December 29, 1994, members of the department are standing by at both stations to provide assistance and shelter if needed for anyone who does not have back up heat. The Red Cross also works with us during these emergencies to provide whatever assistance is necessary.

We are still in need of additional personnel in the department. This is a chance for you to become involved with your community by doing a service that is needed.

I wish to thank all the elected officials, the Police Department and Bartlett/Jackson Ambulance for their assistance and support in 1994.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

In Calendar year 1994, our three (3) leading causes of fires were no permit, children and rekindles of fires where the fire was not properly extinguished.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violations are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

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Local communities and the State share the cost of suppression on a 50/50 basis. The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid the quick response from the local fire departments.

One of the major projects that BARA did this year was a fund raiser headed up by Joe Russo. We were able to raise enough money to install a new back stop at the ball field along with new protective fencing for both player benches. With the remainder of the money that was raised, we plan on installing new player benches, new bases and the addition of clay/sand mixture to the infield. If you were at the field this past year you realized that all of these improvements were past due. We would like to thank all those who contributed to this fund raiser.

We continue to help sponsor the two Little League teams with their dues to the Mount Washington Little League. The majority of their money to operate the teams came from their own fund raising efforts.

BARA again ran the summer recreation program and had approximately 50 kids per day, five days a week. They did a number of activities including: swimming at the town beach, floor hockey, kickball, arts and crafts, basketball, and a number of other activities. Once a week they had a theme day in which they centered their activities around a special theme; such as Christmas in July. They went on field trips to: Santa's Village, Aquaboggan Water Park and Sky Valley (Cookout and Swimming). The "Red Cross" swim program was run again this year, instructed by Jessica Beyerle. We plan on having another successful summer program again this year.

We joined the Carroll County Recreation Association which will allow us to attend a number of activities and tournaments run by that Association. This association is made up of a number of other local programs. This past year we attended a soccer tournament in Wolfeboro in which we sent two teams, both of which did very well. We attended a basketball tournament for both the girls and boys teams down at Kennett High School. They also have plans for a softball tournament this spring.

BARA is looking to do another fund raising event so we can continue with our plans on building an outdoor basketball court. As you can see by our financial report we have \$2,000 towards this goal. This will be an active project for this coming year.

Even though some of our expenses have increased, we are not asking the town for any additional funds.

TEST PIT INSPECTION ORDINANCE: requires inspection of pits prior to application for state septic design approval. \$20.00 fee per pit dug.

EXCAVATION PERMIT REGULATION: permit required to excavate in Town road. Permit must be obtained 24 hours prior to commencement. Violation = fine of \$100.00.

DOG LEASH BY-LAW: requires that all dogs be restrained by leash or under direct control of owner. Violation = fine of up to \$100.00+ board reimbursement.

PERMIT TO OCCUPY ORDINANCE: required prior to occupancy of any construction that is intended for habitation or for which a septic system is required. Violation = fine of up to \$100.00 and/or \$10.00 per day/each day of violation.

SPECIAL EVENTS ORDINANCE: regulates the conduct of special events; provides for fines up to \$300.00 for violations.

ZONING ORDINANCE: covers setbacks, density, green areas, frontage, signs, etc. Copies available at Town Hall.

FLOODPLAIN ORDINANCE: governs activity in the floodplain.

GRAVEL PIT ORDINANCE: governs the excavation of gravel pits.

SEPTIC SYSTEM DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION ORDINANCE: governs the design and construction of septic systems. \$50.00 review fee.

1994 TOWN MEETING MINUTES

Moderator William Paine opened the Annual Town Meeting by opening the polls at the Town Hall on Tuesday, March 8, 1994 at 9:00 AM by reading the following:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the eighth day of March 1994 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot at the Town Hall and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before seven o'clock in the evening. The following articles in the warrant will be acted upon on Thursday, March 10, 1994 at six thirty o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

We hereby certify that we posted a like copy of said Town Warrant and Budget on February 21, 1994 at the post offices in Glen and Bartlett, at the Town Hall in Intervale (Bartlett) and the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School, the places of meeting, all being public places within the said Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire. Dated February 25, 1994, and signed, Kathlyn G. Nealley, Gene G. Chandler, Richard F. Patch, Sr., Board of Selectmen.

The following article was then voted on throughout the day:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Motion was made by Gail Paine, seconded by Sheila Glines to adjourn the meeting until Thursday, March 10, 1994 at 6:30 PM to the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School to continue with Articles 2 through 29. Vote = Meeting adjourned at 7:00 PM.

Moderator Paine reconvened the Annual Town Meeting on Thursday, March 10, 1994 at 6:35 PM at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School. Moderator Paine mentioned the births of new Bartlett residents and then observed a minute of silence for those Bartlett residents who passed on in the last year. Moderator Paine then recognized Susan Fabrizio, Miss Bartlett Teen, to lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

Moderator Paine read the election results of the voting held on Tuesday, March 8, 1994 as follows:

Moderator Paine then proceeded to Article 2.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Richard Patch to accept the article

with a budget of \$979,075. Chandler explained the Selectmen's positions on employee raises and then went through the budget by department as listed in the budget detail. Various questions asked and answered regarding detail of all employees' benefits, need for fourth police officer, raises, and new Comp 200 health plan. Chandler explained the reduction by \$500 of the Bartlett Athletic and Recreation appropriation due to use of the funds for a capital improvement project in years past rather than for operating expenses as was the intent of previously budgeted funds, suggesting that capital improvement projects should be funded either by a special article or fundraising. Moderator Paine then recognized Leslie Mallett who made a presentation on restoring the \$500. Motion was made by Leslie Mallett, seconded by Richard Ware to raise the budget by \$500 to be added to the Bartlett Athletic and Recreation budget. No discussion. Vote = PASSED (\$500 added bringing the budget to \$979,575). Moderator Paine then recognized William Duggan to discuss the need for a fourth full time police officer. After brief discussion, Moderator Paine stated that Duggan should make a motion to delete the fourth full time police officer. Duggan reluctantly agreed and John Murphy seconded the motion. Discussion then ensued with Selectman Chandler explaining that while he did not support the addition of the third or fourth full time police officer, that the town had voted these positions in as they felt the need for this level of coverage. Much discussion ensued. Duggan then objected to Moderator Paine making his motion for him and Paine offered Duggan to withdraw his motion. Duggan withdrew his motion and John Murphy reluctantly withdrew his second. Moderator Paine asked for a vote on the amended budget figure of \$979,575. Vote = PASSED (\$979,575). Moderator Paine then asked for a vote on the article as amended. Vote = PASSED (\$979,575).

Moderator Paine then explained that Articles 3 through 6 were the standard articles which appear in the warrant every year except that this year we are voting on them indefinitely until rescinded as provided for in the new NH RSA's (cited in each article).

Motion was made by Norman Head, seconded by Robert Jones to waive the reading of Articles 3 through 6 and that they be taken as a group. Vote = PASSED. The following Articles 3 through 6 were taken as a group and all PASSED:

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize indefi-

nately, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen and Library Trustees to apply for and accept on behalf of the Town any gifts, legacies, and devises made to the Town in trust for public purposes as permitted in NH RSA 31:19 and accept and expend without further action by Town Meeting, money from State, Federal, and/or other governmental units or private sources in accordance with NH RSA 31:95-b and 202-A:4-c. Selectmen favor. (PASSED)

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property which may be offered to the town for any public purpose, pursuant to RSA 31:95-e. The Selectmen must hold a public hearing before accepting such gifts, and the acceptance shall not bind the town to raise, appropriate, or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair, or replacement of any such personal property. Selectmen favor. (PASSED)

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provision of RSA 33:7 which provides that the town at any annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum in anticipation of the collection of taxes (Tax Anticipation Notes) for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year. Selectmen favor. (PASSED)

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of RSA 80:42 and 80:80 to authorize indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction. Selectmen favor. (PASSED)

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Floodplain Development Ordinance with the changes, deletions and additions as posted at Town Hall and other public places throughout the Town and printed elsewhere in this Town Report. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Robert Jones to accept the article as read. Selectmen Nealley spoke to the article. No discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for town road improvements and reconstruction. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Terrie Kroger to accept the article as read. Selectmen Chandler spoke to the article outlining the roads proposed to be worked on and what work to be done along with the regular work included in the highway budget. Bill Fabrizio asked whether any funds were included in this article to correct the problem of road width at the dugway area of Cobb Road. Chandler stated no. Motion was made by Fabrizio, seconded by Leslie Mallett to add \$5,000 to this article for work at the dugway area to include cutting back the bank by 10 feet and putting in a retaining wall. Chandler and Road Agent Pat Roberts both indicated that to correct this situation would require much more money (\$300,000+). Vote was taken on the amendment = FAILED. Vote was taken on the article = PASSED (\$50,000).

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 as its share to participate in the Hazardous Waste Collection Day along with the Town of Conway. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by John Murphy to accept the article as read. No discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for installation of two insulated and electric doors at the Town Garage. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Richard Patch to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article explaining that we will be doing three more doors in the future. No discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the closeout of the old Garland Landfill and authorize the removal of the entire balance plus interest of the Dump Capital Reserve Fund for this purpose. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Richard Patch to accept the article as read. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Kathryn Nealley to raise the amount by \$10,000. Chandler explained that upon second review of this article he realized that he had made a math error and apologized for the mistake. Discussion ensued about closure procedures. Vote was taken on the amendment = PASSED. Vote was taken on the article as amended = PASSED (\$20,000).

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,200.00 for the purchase of a new Ford Crown Victoria police cruiser. Patch/Chandler favor - Nealley abstains. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Richard Patch to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article explaining that we would be trading or selling the 1988 cruiser. Questions were raised on whether we considered four-wheel drive (the police did not ask for it) and whether it would be a marked or unmarked cruiser (no decision yet). Vote was taken = PASSED.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 for the purchase of a four-wheel drive backhoe and authorize the transfer of up to \$25,000.00 of the December 31, 1993 fund balance for this purpose. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Richard Patch to accept the article as read. Motion was made by Chandler, seconded by Patch to amend the article to read "to authorize the transfer of up to \$65,000 from the fund balance". Discussion ensued on need for backhoe, how much it cost to lease vs. purchase, and how much expended on lease in 1993. Vote was taken on the amendment = Standing vote taken - Yes = 52 / No = 61 - FAILED. Vote was taken on the article = FAILED.

Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Richard Patch to reconsider Article 2. Chandler explained that now that the backhoe has been defeated, more money will be needed in the highway budget to rent one. Vote = PASSED.

Article 2 was reconsidered. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Bill Fabrizio to increase the budget by \$8,000 to be included in the highway budget to provide for lease of a backhoe. Much discussion ensued on need for backhoe. Vote = PASSED (Budget = \$987,575).

Motion was made by Bill Fabrizio, seconded by Bill Duggan to reconsider Article 13. Vote = FAILED.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to repair various dry hydrants. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Richard Patch to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article explaining which would be repaired. Vote was taken = PASSED.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appro-

priate the sum of \$37,000.00 for the purchase of a new one ton four-wheel drive diesel truck with plow, wing, sander, and body and authorize the transfer of this amount from the fund balance as of December 31, 1993. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Richard Patch to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article explaining that we will be selling or trading a vehicle but unsure at the moment which one. Vote was taken = PASSED.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 as its share of a glass crusher and building addition at the Transfer Station. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Kathlyn Nealley to accept the article as read. Chandler explained this was a joint project with the Town of Jackson and costs are split 50/50, this representing our share. Vote was taken = PASSED.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,902.00 for 1994 membership in the North Country Council, Inc. Agreeable to a petition sponsored by the Bartlett Business Association and signed by George L. Howard and others. Chandler/Patch oppose - Nealley favors. Motion was made by George Howard, seconded by Brian Hill to accept the article as read. George Howard spoke to the article. Vote was taken = PASSED.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to defray the operating expenses of the services and programs as carried out by the Mt. Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by Susan Fox and others. Selectmen oppose - not a proper use of town funds for national organizations - people should have an individual choice concerning donations to charitable organizations. Motion was made by Susan Fox, seconded by Gail Paine to accept the article as read. Fox spoke to the article. Chandler explained Selectmen's position. Vote was taken = FAILED.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,410.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Selectmen oppose - use of public funds should require salary disclosure. Motion was made by Vicki Varrichione, seconded by Susan Fox to accept the article as read. Varrichione spoke to the article. Chandler explained Selectmen's position. Vote was taken = FAILED.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$431.00 for the Family Support Program of the Center of Hope. Motion was made by Leslie Mallett, seconded by Susan Fox to accept the article as read. Mallett spoke to the article. Chandler explained Selectmen's position. Vote was taken = FAILED.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,345.00 for the Children's Health Center (formerly Children and Youth Project of the Mt. Washington Valley). Agreeable to a petition signed by Lisa Tateosian and others. Agency is requesting 27% increase - Selectmen favor last year's request of \$3,410. Motion was made by Vicki Varrichione, seconded by Terrie Kroger to accept the article as read. Varrichione spoke to the article. Vote was taken = PASSED.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$875.00 for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. Also to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the Big Brother Big Sister Organization administered also by the Tri-County Community Action Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jane Stoutermire and others. Selectmen favor \$875 for CAP/Chandler/Patch oppose BBBSO - Nealley favors. Motion was made by Leslie Mallett, seconded by Ronald Patch to accept the article as read. Mallett spoke to the article. Vote was taken = PASSED.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,060.00 to assist the Family Health Centre. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Chandler/Patch oppose - Nealley favors last year's request of \$1,026. Motion was made by Vicki Varrichione, seconded by Leslie Mallett to accept the article as read. Varrichione spoke to the article. Vote was taken = PASSED.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,150.00 for the Early Intervention Program of Children Unlimited, Inc. (birth to 3 years). Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie T. Kroger and others. Chandler/Patch oppose - Nealley favors. Motion was made by Terrie Kroger, seconded by Kathlyn Nealley to accept the article as read. Kroger spoke to the article. Vote was taken = PASSED.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for support of operating expenses of the Eastern Slope Regional Airport Authority. Agreeable to a petition signed by George L. Howard and others. Agency request is for 66% increase - Selectmen favor last year's request for \$300. Motion was made by George Howard, seconded by Brian Hill to accept the article as read. Howard spoke to the article. Vote was taken = PASSED.

Motion was made by Terrie Kroger, seconded by Karen Libby to waive the reading of Articles 26 through 28 and accept them as presented. Vote = PASSED. A vote was taken on the following articles as a group and were PASSED:

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,326.00 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie T. Kroger and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED)

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$589.00 in support of Carroll County Against Domestic Violence and Rape's shelter for battered women and children. Agreeable to a petition signed by Lawson Bruce Hill and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED)

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,499.00 for the support of the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by Ruth Morton and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED)

ARTICLE 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Moderator Paine cautioned that any items taken under this article are advisory only and no money items can be considered. Moderator Paine recognized David Roode who asked that the town recognize and thank Selectman Kathlyn Nealley for her years of service to the town. The audience applauded and gave a standing ovation.

Motion was made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Bill Fabrizio to adjourn. Vote was taken = ADJOURNED at 9:45 PM.
