#### TOWN MEETING WARRANT

#### State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bath qualified to vote in town affairs. You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in Bath on Tuesday, March 11, 1969 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for two years, one Library Trustee for three years, a Treasurer, an Auditor, a Highway Agent, and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To hear the reports of officers and agents heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, for repairs, maintenance and construction of highways and bridges, for the support of the poor, town Library, for old age assistance, for the protection of the public and all other necessary town charges and expenses for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class 5 roads and to raise and appropriate or set aside the sum of \$934.34 and the State to contribute \$6,228.94 for the same.
- Article 5. To see what action the town will take on the following question: Shall the provision of the laws relative to the playing games of beano be adopted in this town.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Tax Commission to have an audit made by the

Municipal Accounting Division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Tax Collector's deed.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 9. To see what action the Town will take on the following requests for appropriations and to appropriate such sum of money as may be determined by vote of the Town for each: White Mt. Community Services; Lisbon District Nursing Association; Ambulance Service.

Article 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Again this year the State Aid grant of \$100.00 was for the purchase of reference books. These are especially helpful to junior and senior high school pupils in preparing research reports, and have contributed considerably to our reference resources for adults.

The library is very fortunate to have been given so many books and magazines, and magazine subscriptions to Look and to The Golden Magazine. Of the 203 books, 143 were from the collection of Alice and Michael Woods, most of which are the Little Golden Book type. These have provided much enjoyment particularly to the pre-school children. Mr. Harold G. Titus of Berlin gave a David Sutherland History of Bath in the original edition. In the early summer RCA sent the library 50 recordings, in type ranging from country and western music to concerts. Since then Mrs. Foster

Carr has given 5 to add to our "listening library."

The young people have been most cooperative. Steven Ide, noting the need for a cabinet to hold the records, volunteered to design and make one. Jody Estes, in September, offered to assist with the younger school children on library days and has helped a great deal. During July Linda Lamarre conducted a successful Story Hour with 16 boys and girls, aged five to ten. Since then she has arranged three book exhibits, one for Thanksgiving holiday reading, one for Christmas, and one of suggested books for teen-agers. In addition, she made posters for the library window urging every citizen to vote in the November elections.

#### REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

New Hampshire is the fastest growing state in the northeast in terms of population increase. It is also an industrialized state and this growth is likely to continue, all of which means more families and homes. Our growing summer population is scattered throughout the state with a phenomenal increase in vacation homes.

Many new homes and practically all cottages are being located in woodlands and abandoned fields and forests crowd into the back yards of our village streets. In a state where the forests cover 86% of the land surface, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow until the snow comes again, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn
  - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for all debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.
  - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on grass by householders between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.
  - c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire before you light the match.

4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save our tax dollars for useful purposes.

At the Raymond Hill fire, our 750 gal, per minute Seagraves pumper more than proved itself by pumping water continuously for eight hours. This performance gave us a great deal of confidence in this piece of equipment. As they have in the past our tank trucks proved themselves more than adequate in coping with brush, grass and dump fires.

In 1968, equipment added to our fire arsenal included; 100 ft. of high pressure  $1\frac{1}{2}$ " plastic hose to be used on the Chevy tank truck. We also purchased a  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " by  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " wye and a  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " fog nozzle to be placed on our pumper.

In the spring of the year, ten of our members attended classes held at the Fire Station by Bob Gilbert of the State Fire Marshal's Office. These classes were to instruct members on the types and uses of fire pumps. One of the objectives here was to familiarize

firemen with our own pumper.

We have started a Savings Account with monies earned and donated to the Dept. We hope to save enough in this account to purchase a newer and more powerful vehicle upon which we can place one of our tanks thus retiring one of our older vehicles. With a more powerful truck, we will be able to deliver our water capacity to fire sites much quicker.

In the near future, our Dept. will be on a Red Phone System, thus solving one of our more troublesome problems, that of communication. This system will enable persons to contact the Dept. much faster when the need arises. The Dept. will get our phone number to the public as soon as this system is installed.

Members of the Dept. wish to express their appreciation for the assistance, financial and otherwise, you the taxpayer and neighboring Fire Depts. have given us.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Bath qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 12th day of March, 1969, at 8 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To chose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the ap-

- propriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to paint the Bath Village School.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to create a committee of five voters, three of whom shall be the Bath School Board and two shall be appointed by the Moderator or elected from the floor, to study the feasibility of signing a long-term tuition agreement or contract with the Haverhill Cooperative School District and report their findings and/or recommendations to the district voters at the School Meeting in March, 1970, or at a Special School District Meeting.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The school board dilemma as to how to finance local school programs with an overburdened property tax continues to play havoc with our school budget.

As a point of interest, it might be well to illustrate to the paying public how little the State of New Hampshire returns to local coffers as compared to what they should be paying under existing statutes. We have estimated that, in 1969-70, the Bath School District will receive as its share of the Foundation Aid Program the sum of \$14,125.00; while, if this program were fully implemented according to the current law we would receive \$40,651.17.

If the foregoing were ever to come to fruition, Bath would have to raise through local property taxation \$40,907.92 instead of the amount listed at \$67,434.09 in 1969.

Our major budget increases this year are reflected in teachers' salaries, transportation and tuition payments.

In addition, areas where we have little control, as far as increases are concerned, can be seen in fixed charges where local contribution to social security has risen this year from 4.4% to 4.8%. Also, the minimum wage law dictates that we pay our school help a minimum of \$1.45 in 1970 and \$1.60 in 1971.

When all these factors are analyzed and grouped together there doesn't seem to be any area where we can economize and still provide a minimal educational program for our children in Bath.

# SUPERVISORY UNION #23 REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent.

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union #23, during 1968-1969, will receive a salary of \$14,000.00, which is made up as follows: \$3,500.00 to be paid by the State Department of Education and \$10,500.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1,500.00 for travel within the Union is also prorated as stated above.

Hearing and vision tests are done any time during the year at the request of the teacher or a parent.

All first graders received the Tbc Tine skin test in the Spring '68.

Tetanus and Diphtheria Boosters were given in grades 1-4-8. There were a total of:

Whenever tests or immunizations are done in school a permission slip signed by the child's parent or guardian is required. Nothing is given without permission.

On February 22, 1968, Dr. Jamback visited the school and gave a talk in the 3-4-5 grade room about good dental hygiene. The Crest kits were given to third grade pupils at this time.

On March 19, 1968, Mrs. Stark, the Dental Hygienist from the Department of Heath Dental Services, visited all grades with a special Dental Health Program.

During the year I attended the following meetings: November 6 and 13, 1967, Seminar at Concord with Dr. Riggs from the Child Guidance Clinics. November 9, 1967, a Nurses' meeting at Concord Technical Institute. January 23 and February 27, 1968, Staff Meetings at Littleton Community Services Center.
