THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Campton on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the ensuing year for the maintenance of its highways and bridges and make appropriation of the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for Campton Cemetery also to clean up and fence other cemeteries in Town.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to complete the fence at Blair Cemetery and to enlarge the same to make more lots available. Said funds to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Memorial Day.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the White Mountain Region Association.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the Campton Volunteer Fire Department.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to sell Town Property taken on tax title.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 to reimburse the Campton Village Precinct for rent of use of hydrants in Campton Village.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Tax Collector additional pay for collecting State Head Tax and fix the amount thereof.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the new Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents and officers heretofore chosen.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

I herewith submit my report as School Nurse for the school year 1951-1952.

166 children were weighed, measured and inspected with symptoms of these defects found:

The children had no childhood communicable diseases before school closed in June and except colds, virus infections and a few cases of pediculosis and skin diseases the attendance was very good.

Four children had dental work done by the Red Cross.

One child had glasses through the Sight Conservation Program of the New Hampshire Public Welfare.

Several children attended the Toxoid Clinics sponsored by the State Board of Health. One child had transportation to Hanover for an eye examination by the Red Cross. Several children had x-rays at the Plymouth Chest Clinics held by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

The children had hearing tests by the audiometer and 10 children were advised to see their physicians.

The interest and help of the School Board, Superintendent Rollins, parents, teachers and pupils is always an inspiration and greatly appreciated.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the Campton School Board:

My tenth annual report submitted herewith presents a brief discussion of those topics which may be of interest to the people of Campton. Statistical information is brief, but any information which is desired beyond that presented in this report will be furnished on request.

The same teachers are working in the Campton Schools who were with us a year ago. We are fortunate that this is so, since our schools in general are operating smoothly.

Every school in Campton is equipped with a film strip projector; and a library of film strips is being purchased by the district. It should be our plan to increase that library each year. Considerable interest has been shown in visual education in other districts in this supervisory union. This suggests the desirability of a workshop in the use of audio-visual teaching material in order that we may use our new equipment to the best possible advantage.

For several years past our spelling results in Campton have not been good. The same report is true for state and national experience. In order to correct this condition, a gradual change of textbook material was begun this year. Grades 2 and 3 were provided with new spellers. It is our plan to extend that system two grades per year until all grades from 2 through 8 are provided with the new books. Another change was also begun this year. Instead of teaching history and geography as two separate subjects, we have begun the use of a unified program which at once saves us some time and shows children the relationship between history and geography. The new textbook series provided for grades 3 and 4 will be extended throughout the schools two grades per year.

The school transportation demands vary a great deal from year to year. Campton has been fortunate

in not having to assume transportation obligations which are very heavy when one considers the number of pupils in our schools. Some of our service has to be maintained for a small number of children and on a seasonal basis, which perhaps causes this item of school expense to be more noticeable. Previous estimates for high school tuition are usually in excess of payments that are actually made. There is no safe way known to avoid this. Tuition cost estimates have to be prepared on the basis of the maximum forseeable high school enrollment. Whenever some of those on the eligible list do not attend high school or do not continue their membership throughout the full year, our actual tuition payments are less than the estimate.

At the present time, so far as I know, the building committee appointed last March has made little, if any, progress. It is to be hoped that present-day building costs, which for Campton might be prohibitive, will not prevent a thorough investigation of school needs and consideration of how those needs may be met when conditions are more favorable. Unless there is real merit in school centralization, it does not seem that so many school districts throughout the state would be engaged in such programs. As of December 1, 1952, there are 41 strictly rural schools in operation in New Hampshire. By rural school we mean one in which all eight grades are, or might be, under one teacher. Four, or nearly 10 percent of the total number in the state are in the Campton District. This statement is made for information only.

In conclusion I wish to commend the Campton School Board members for their cooperative interest and work for Campton schools, the teachers for their excellent work, and all others who have helped achieve whatever measure of success has been recorded.
