Town of Canaan

To the inhabitants of the Town of Canaan, New Hampshire, who are qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified that the annual town meeting of the Town of Canaan, New Hampshire, will be held at the Canaan Elementary School Gymnasium on Tuesday, March 8, 1983, at ten o'clock A. M. to act upon the following subjects:

Polls will be open for voting by ballot for the election of town officers and voting on referendum questions at the Canaan Elementary Gymnasium on Tuesday, March 8, 1983, at 10:00 A. M. and will close at 7:00 P. M. unless the town votes to keep the polls open to a later hour.

ARTICLE 1: To vote by nonpartisan ballot for the following town officers:

One Selectman to serve for a term of three years.  
A town treasurer to serve for a term of one year.  
A road agent to serve for a term of one year.  
The overseer of public welfare to serve for a term of one year.  
A cemetery agent to serve for a term of one year.  
Two auditors each to serve for a term of one year.  
Three members of the town budget committee for a term of three years.  
One member of the town budget committee for a term of two years.  
Two members of the planning board for a term of three years.  
One trustee of trust funds and cemetery trustee to serve for a term of three years.  
One library trustee to serve for a term of three years.  
And any other such town officers as may be required by law.

ARTICLE 2: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:62 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a solar energy heating or cooling system which exemption shall be in an amount of \$50.00?

The following articles will be presented, discussed and acted upon on March 12, 1983, at the Canaan Elementary School Gymnasium at 1:00 P.M.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed, by public auction or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of taxes and to authorize the Tax Collector to accept payments in prepayment of taxes as provided in RSA 80:52-a.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to authorize prepayment of resident taxes and to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayments as provided in RSA 80-1:a.

- ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend gifts of money or personal property for the purpose intended by the donor and in addition to apply, receive and expend any federal or state assistance not anticipated as of the annual Town Meeting for the purposes set forth in the Town budget on the condition that the Selectmen shall account to the voters of the Town for all such additional receipts and expenses.
- ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken at March 1980 Town Meeting on Article 15 that the Town Selectmen may appoint the Chief of Police as provided by RSA 105:1, and that, beginning with the next Town Meeting hereafter, the position of Chief of Police shall be filled by election by legal voters of Canaan.
- ARTICLE 8: (by petition) To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,390.00, to add to the Police Department budget. This will allow the necessary funds to operate this Police Department this year so that the present services will not have to be cut.
- ARTICLE 9: (by petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500 for the purchase of a truck sander for the Town Highway Department.
- ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the New Equipment Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon.

- ARTICLE 14: (by petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$630.00 to support the work of Headrest in 1983.
- ARTICLE 15: (by petition) To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Historic Museum Committee to implement restoration and maintenance of the Canaan

Street Library Building, also formerly called the Academy Building, under the direction of the Board of Selectmen.

- ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to RSA 231:45, to discontinue subject to gates and bars that section of the Lary Road, so-called, leading from the west side of New Hampshire Route 118 to the intersection of Lary Road with Stevens Road.
- ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and withdraw \$1,200.00 from the Library Renovations Trust Fund for the purpose of library renovations.
- ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the position of Deputy Treasurer as provided in RSA 41:29:a.
- ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of the people of the Town of Canaan. These actions shall include:
1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.
  2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the Government of Canada that will commit both nations to the same goal.
- ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of tax revenues as provided under the Municipal Finance Act, RSA 33:7.
- ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise such sums as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same based on the budget submitted by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 22: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or any other officers and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 23: To transact any other business that may be legally brought before this Town Meeting.

AUDITOR'S OPINION

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds of the Town of Canaan, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1981 listed in the foregoing table of contents. Except as set forth in the third paragraph, our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and included such tests of the accounting records as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described more fully in Note 2, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of expendable and non-expendable trust funds as well as the general fixed asset group of accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

Because the Town of Canaan, New Hampshire does not maintain adequate records of the Water Fund's fixed assets, we were unable to satisfy ourselves as to \$61,449 of fixed assets and related accumulated depreciation of \$4,227. Further, due to inadequate accounting records we were unable to satisfy ourselves as to the \$3,316 of receivables.

In our opinion, except that the omission of a statement of General Fixed Assets and Trust Funds results in an incomplete presentation, the financial statements of the governmental and fiduciary fund types present fairly the financial position of these funds of the Town of Canaan, New Hampshire at December 31, 1981 and the results of their operations for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with the preceding year.

In our opinion, except for the effects of such adjustments, if any, as might have been determined to be necessary if we had been able to audit the Water Department's utility plant in service and receivables as discussed in a preceding paragraph, the financial statements of the proprietary fund type present fairly, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, the financial position of the Town of Canaan, New Hampshire Water Fund as of December 31, 1981, and the results of its operations and changes in its financial position for the year then ended on a basis consistent with the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material aspects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

SELECTMENS REPORT

1982 was in some respects an encouraging year, but in some areas discouraging.

On the positive side, many short term projects were completed. The Community Building balcony was rebuilt. After completion, the Lions Club installed the American flag and the lighting for it. The new foundation for the Library/Museum Building was completed. Under the direction of the Library Trustees, the library in the Community Building was painted and a children's reading room made on the former stage. The Old Meeting House Committee completed the project of tearing out the second floor and removing the stage on the first floor of the Old Meeting House. The fuel tank for the Community Building was installed.

The Town's books were audited for the first time in many years by the Department of Revenue Administration. The auditor's comments and opinions are contained in this annual report.

In the area of housing, the Town unsuccessfully applied the first time for a Community Development Block grant, for housing rehabilitation and to construct a public facility to house the Meals-on-Wheels Program and Mascoma Area Health Services, Inc.. If funds are available next year, we may again seek funding for housing rehabilitation, public facilities, or economic development activities. We were pleased to see the Indian River Elderly Housing Project get underway.

We would like the townspeople to be aware of the poor conditions of some of our bridges. The following bridges have at least one condition rated as critical or poor as of the June state inspection.

- Goose Pond Road/Goose Pond Brook
- Lary Road/ Lary Pond Brook
- Potato Road/Mascoma River
- Pillsbury Road/Mascoma River
- Clark Pond Road/Clark Pond Brook
- Blackwater Road/Crystal Lake Brook
- Blackwater Road/Mascoma River
- Lary Road/Indian River

Patrolman Acerno left employment with Canaan this year, which we were sad to have happen. John Deery was hired in June and has done a fine job.

A continuing problem for most communities, including Canaan, at this time is trying to provide needed services while federal and state revenues are dwindling. We will try to continue to provide the quality of services you desire.

We wish to take this time to express our thanks to all the people who have taken the time and interest to serve the community in various capacities and the dedicated employees of the Town of Canaan.

6. Disbursements

For the years ended December 31, 1982 and 1981, unexpended income in the general fund was sufficient to fund all disbursements in excess of accumulated unexpended income for the cemetery accounts.

7. Non-participating funds

Certain fund's investments do not share in the assets and income of the trust funds but are instead invested in a specific savings account. Consequently, only the interest paid on that specific savings account is used to determine the earnings of that fund.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

In our continued effort to communicate more directly with the taxpaying citizens of Grafton County, we take this opportunity to reach you through your town/city report.

Budgeting becomes more complex each year due to variables and unfunded state mandates. Until authority accompanies funding, our local governments will have little control over spiraling taxes. Counties encounter funding problems similar to towns and cities. We are continually absorbing more costs of state/federal programs. This year local governments picked up a 25% increase in their share of the OAA/APTD/ICF grants. Child placement costs are increasing dramatically with the private foster homes rapidly being replaced by more expensive group homes, some costing \$25,000 to \$40,000 per year compared to private home rates of \$2,400 to \$3,600 per year.

Our new sewage system, tied in with Woodsville Precinct's treatment plant, was complete and operational in February 1982.

Many dollars are being saved in energy accounts through conservation measures. Fuel costs were reduced by 20% and electric costs by 8% in fiscal year ending June 30, 1982, saving \$41,800.

Finishing the second superior courtroom will cost approximately \$169,500. Bonding is approved and the project should be completed this spring.

The Jail & House of Correction had another busy year. Average census was 38. We continue to get inmates with mental or emotional problems requiring additional staff and medical treatment and higher medication costs. No change is foreseen in the admission pattern due to the continuing discharge policy of N.H. State Hospital. Pending legislation requiring more severe sentencing for some crimes will increase duration of stay and census, proportionately increasing the burden on correctional staff.

The County Farm is a productive asset to the County through participation in Extension and Conservation Service programs and by creating meaningful work for House of Correction inmates. Volume of milk remains constant although the revenue dropped slightly due to decrease in federal parity. Quality of the Holstein herd is excellent. Revenue from livestock sales grossed \$25,092 last fiscal year, and produce grossed \$40,016 for the Farm.

The Commissioners meet Mondays at 9:30 AM at the Courthouse, 1:30 PM at the Nursing Home. Meetings are open to the public.

REPORT OF THE OLD MEETING HOUSE COMMITTEE - 1982

The restoration program for the Old Meeting House was active in 1982. The new main ceiling was installed in 1980 was painted. The major 19th century interior additions were removed, consisting of the downstairs sloping floors and stage platform, and the two second floors which enclosed and covered the original balcony. The original interior is therefore now visible and accessible for restoration. The downstairs benches were removed carefully and stored for use in restoring the balcony.

The original structural framing of the balcony is largely intact, but a considerable part of the flooring is missing. Hand-rails, box pews, and seating are completely gone, but fragments remain which give clues to the original appearance.

The original flat ground floor is mostly intact and in fairly good condition. However, it will require careful and fairly extensive leveling, along with some repair work on the joists and support piers. Work on the piers is also needed to improve and equalize the support of the balcony columns. Some additional piers will be advisable.

It is anticipated that the 1983 program will start with the foregoing work on the first floor.

MASCOMA HOME HEALTH SERVICES, INC.

Mascoma Home Health Services, Inc., like all providers of health care, has this year felt the impact of scarce resources, but as in the past 14 years has met the challenge by continuing to provide in-home care as well as community health programs. This has been made possible in part by the continued support of the towns it serves, which are Canaan, Enfield, Orange, Grafton, and Dorchester.

The home health care offered by the agency includes nursing, physical and occupational therapy. These skilled services are available to those patients who are confined at home and under the supervision of a physician. The patient may need either temporary or long term care. Mascoma Home Health is certified to provide care under the Medicare program and also has a contract with Blue Cross.

Home Health aide and homemaker services are also available. Activities for this program can include bathing and personal grooming needs, helping in practice of self care skills as in the "Keeping Mobile" program offered by the Therapy service. General homemaking services are also available to those persons with limited mobility so that they may remain in their homes safely and independently.

The Child Health Program includes a monthly well-child clinic and 2 dental clinics per year. Health education is a part of these clinics as well as direct care. New born visits are made to those families who desire this additional help. This year prepared childbirth classes "Lamaze" are being held at the agency.

As expected we saw an increase in the number of people in distress in 1982, and the decrease in government subsidized services continues. Headrest is available for immediate support to individuals and families. Headrest also refers callers to resources most appropriate for helping them cope with different kinds of crises and distress. These resources include agencies, support groups, skilled individuals, and organizations.

Much of Headrest's support comes from local towns and local individuals who become trained volunteers. Volunteer training sessions cover the areas of suicide prevention, alcohol and drug abuse prevention, crisis counseling, community resources, domestic violence (including child and spouse abuse) and continuing training for experienced volunteers.

Special Hotline training includes alcohol crisis intervention with trained medical technicians on call for emergencies, the Winter Home Emergency Network (WHEN) for fuel emergencies, drug abuse counseling for individuals and school groups, temporary emergency shelter and housing referrals.

Funds donated to Headrest will be used to support and publicize the availability of the hotline, to help train volunteers, and to maintain accurate, updated files on community resources.

Anyone who has a problem or who has a friend or family member with a problem may call the hotline 448-4400 anytime. Often the sound of a caring human voice carries a person through a time of crisis--many services are closed at night or on weekends. Calls are anonymous and confidential.
