TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chester in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: (L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Stevens Memorial Hall in said Chester on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Polls not to close until 6 o'clock.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money for the improvement of highways in accordance with the provisions of Section 4, Chapter 35 of the laws of 1905 and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to cap one mile of the Towle road from Chester Towle's corner towards James Towles by mix and place method.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to Cap a part of the road from Woodards corner towards Towle corner by using mix and place method.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$597.53 for class 5 roads, the State to contribute \$3,983.52.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of the Town Poor and Old Age assistance.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray the expenses of the Chester Free Public Library.
- 10 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day.
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Street Lights.
- 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for extermination of Moths and Pruning Trees.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefore.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to pay into the Town Treasurer the sum of \$727.00, it being part of the amount returned to said Trustees by the Trustees of the Wilcomb Townsend Home in January 1951.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$89.00 (1/100 of one percent of the Town's valuation based on the 1950 assessment) to the Merrimack Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 communities in this region, or act in relation thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray the general expenses of the Fire Department and any balance of appropriation at the end of the year, to be placed in the hands of the Trustees of Trust Funds to purchase Fire Equipment.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for maintenance of Stevens Memorial Hall.

- 20. To see what discount will be allowed on April assessment of taxes paid on or before August 1, 1951 or within ten days of presentation of bill, and take any vote relating thereto.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of the Town Dump.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the eradication of Pine Blister Rust as required by law.
- 23. Article for Town Warrant requested by Forsaith-Drowne Post American Legion:

To see what action the Town will take regarding a Memorial to the men of Chester who served in World War 2 and appoint any committee therefore.

- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Civil Defense.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to request the State Tax Commission to make a complete Reappraisal of the lands and buildings within the Town to equalize valuation in accordance with the law, and to raise and appropriate money for the purpose.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for maintenance of Cemeteries and cutting trees in same.
- 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefore.

Forest Fire Prevention Pays Dividends

Most forest fires are preventable because someone is responsible for them. State records for 1950 show 94% of 632 fires resulted from human perverseness and carelessness. Refusal to secure the required warden permit before burning; failure to use good judgment, lack of equipment and assistance while burning; carelessness in smoking and poorly conditioned woods equipment (trucks, tractors, etc.) resulted in a total of 6090.6 burned acres with a loss of \$63,949.10 in valuable property.

Fortunately, these human factors can be dealt with because people can be reached. This the local forest fire warden tries to do by informing his fellow citizens that EVERYONE MUST:—

- 1. Secure a written permit to burn in or near woodlands when the ground is not covered with snow.
- 2. Use good judgment in burning and have enough equipment and assistance to keep fire under control at all times.
- 3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands and refrain from throwing lighted material from automobiles.
- 4. Make certain that all equipment used in the woods is in good condition.

His success depends entirely upon public reaction to his appeals. He does his part—the rest depends upon YOU and

YOUR compliance with burning requirements

YOUR care you with YOUR fires and YOUR smoking and YOUR care of motive equipment you use in the woods.

It all aids, materially, in reaching the desired goal, the prevention of forest fires—because prevention pays dividends!

REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

In compliance with the Civil Defense Act (Chapter 304, Laws of 1949, State of New Hampshire) a local Civil Defense Organization has been established to insure that lives and property within the community will receive the maximum possible security in the event of attack, sabotage or natural disaster.

An actual survey has been made to uncover the resources of the town particularly in the fields of housing, equipment and transportation and everyone should be grateful for the efforts of the volunteer workers and the wholehearted cooperation given by over ninety percent of the property owners, both resident and non-resident.

The following units have been organized: warning and communication; ground observer; refugee; fire fighting; police and warden services; engineering; transportation, rescue and evacuation; health and sanitation; medical, nursing and first aid; and administration. All are under competent unit leaders who have given a great deal of time and thought to their respective units and duties. Much has already been accomplished, more remains to be done. A verbal report will be given and questions answered at town meeting.


Your town officers and the key personnel of the Civil Defense Organization are aware of the need for preparedness. In addition, every man, woman and child in the community must realize that intelligent and energetic preparation to meet emergencies always has and always will save lives and property and if, due to inertia, laziness or a mistaken feeling of security, their preparation is not the best possible with the means at hand and attack or other disaster strikes, the responsibility for a large part of the suffering and loss that will follow will rest directly upon them and them alone.

Statistical Reports Enrollment

The total enrollment for grades one through eight for the period ending January 31, 1951 was 159 as compared to 149 for the same date last year and 128 two years ago.

The enrollment shows an upward trend. It is considerably less than a year ago, but still continues upward. The primary grades show the heavier enrollment and this tendency will be accentuated in 51-52. The enrollments have advanced to the point where an additional teacher is needed to meet the educational needs of the little children of the primary grades.

High School enrollment shows the same tendency. The present enrollment is 51 as opposed to an enrollment of 45 last year. The scholastic year 51-52 will show an additional increase. This fact has serious implications for high school tuition rates have advanced. With increased enrollments and increased tuition rates the financial responsibility of the district will show a large increase.

Personnel

The resignation of Mrs. Brown necessitated a change in the teaching organization. Mrs. Greeley was assigned to the primary grades and Mrs. Doris McCully, who returned to teaching, was assigned grades III and IV. Again the district was fortunate to have the services of trained experienced teachers. It may seem trite but the fact cannot be emphasized too strongly that the shortage of elementary teachers continues to be one of the most serious problems faced by education every where. That the district can continue to retain the services of a staff that is experienced trained and sympathetic to the needs of children is a fortunate situation.

Instruction

The services of Rinehart Handwriting System were continued. This service has resulted in a general improvement of written work in all areas. It also is an area where tangible results are evidenced.

The work in music continues under the direction of Mrs. Kelley. The high level of achievement in this area as indicated by the public performances during the year is a source of satisfaction to all.

The teachers are interested in improving their proficiency in the classroom. This interest is evidenced in the service training program that they engage in during the school year. During the current year Miss VanCamp, reading consultant, worked with the teachers to improve their techniques in this important area. Miss Greer is scheduled to be in Derry for 3 days in March to assist teachers in the area of art instruction.

In addition, teachers are enrolled in extension courses at Manchester or Derry to improve their knowledge and techniques in elementary subjects. The efforts of teachers to constantly improve their classroom work is concrete evidence of their sincere desire to be of greatest possible service to children.

In the area of instruction the two factors of prime importance, once the physical facilities are available, are the staff and teaching aids. With a fine staff the necessity of providing tools in sufficient quantity and variety is almost self evident. Books, visual aids, and general supplies are in total a small part of the operational budget. They are, however, an important phase of the instructional process. To enable good teachers to work efficiently tools should be available so that the needs of children can be met adequately. Interests of children should be used as a focal point and the instructional process then becomes easier. With this fact in mind, varied texts are being added to the supply of the classrooms to make more effective the work of the teachers.

Hot Lunch Program

Perhaps the greatest single advance in the current year is the inauguration of the hot lunch program. The efforts of the local P. T. A. in promoting this program resulted in the beginning of a Type "A" lunch during the current year. The popularity of the program is evidenced by the continued patronage of over 100 children. Thus far the program has been self supporting. That it is has been due to the cooperation of interested individuals. In addition large donations of equipment has made it unnecessary for the district to make any extensive purchases. The work of Mrs. Clark has been an important factor in the success of the program. The health of the children is affected advantageously by the program and pays dividends in the classroom as well.

Special Articles

The hot lunch appropriation suggested in the special article is primarily to assist in starting the program in the fall. Since the funds of interested organizations have equipped the kitchen up to the present and those funds are now nearly gone it is necessary to have a source of money available to start the program and buy needed equipment.

The deficiency appropriation is due to increased transportation of elementary pupils. The transportation costs for Sept. were \$335.29 This figure was based on the routes in operation last spring when

the budget was prepared. The routes were changed to accommodate new pupils and from September through January our total cost for transportation was \$2,256.10 or an average of \$451.22 per month. In January, two additional families moved in so that for the last 5 months of the year our estimated costs are \$2,689.40 or an average of \$537.88 per month. The total of these two figures (\$2,689.40 and \$2,256.10) is \$4,945.60 or an increase over budgetary estimate of \$1,445.50. By curtailing expenditures in other areas an estimated \$1,000 to meet this uncontrollable and unanticipated expenditure is needed.

Budget

• The operational budget including debt service shows an increase of \$8,010.52 exclusive of special articles. The levy shows an increase of \$5,210.36. If special articles are passed this would increase the levy by \$1,250 to make a total of \$6,460.36.

An analysis of the areas set up in the budget will make the causes more apparent.

Administration

There is a slight increase in administrative costs. With the exception of district officers salaries this area is composed of items that are statutory. The reason for the increase is increased enrollment. The method of allocating all supervisory union expense is now established by law. The allocation is based on enrollment and equalized valuation. Increased enrollment causes an increase in the district's share. The total amount of increase in this area is \$70.50.

Instruction

The increase in this area accounts for a large portion of the total increase. The increased teacher load because of increased enrollments make effective teaching difficult if not impossible on an individual basis despite the quality of the teaching staff. In order to provide adequate teaching personnel provision is made for an additional staff member. The increase is \$3,140.92.

Operation of School Plant

Experience has demonstrated that heat, water, light and supplies have been exceeding budgetary estimates. The figures were revised to more accurately reflect actual expenditures. The increase is \$400.

Repairs and Replacements

This item is placed at \$250 an increase of \$50. It allows for a nominal amount for repairs but takes into consideration the need for additional furnishings for an additional room and additional seating.

Auxiliary Activities

This area is responsible for approximately 60% of the increase in the budget. High School tuition is responsible for most of the increase. The situation is one that cannot be controlled at the local level. The legal responsibility of the district is based on the state average cost of high school instruction. The figure for 1951-52 tuition charge is \$250.04. The rate established by the receiving schools is \$215 which represents a saving to the district of \$35 a pupil. There are 51 Chester pupils enrolled in high school. Six of these are seniors. The freshmen class of Sept. 1951 should be 20. The result is a prospective high school enrollment of 65. The resulting tuition charge is \$13,975.

Our situation in regards to transportation has been explained early in this report. An allowance of \$1,000 is made in this item to meet the situation as it exists.

The gross increase in this area is \$4,817.77.

Fixed Charges

The figure of \$663.20 is the statutory requirement for employees of the district. Insurance is self explanatory. The increase is \$359.16.

Revenue

The problem of estimating revenue in a legislative year is not feasible. Legislation has been introduced that will alleviate the burden considerably if enacted into law. Under the proposed state aid program Chester School District would receive in excess of \$15,000.00. In light of conditions it would seem that such legislation should pass. The action of the legislative body should recognize the state's responsibility and also the tremendous burden that real estate is carrying.

The cooperation evidenced in the inauguration of the hot lunch program is indicative of the attitude of the whole community. Such cooperation makes possible the development of a fine school program. The efforts of school board, teachers, pupils, parents and townspeople are expended to produce a better school situation. I appreciate the opportunity of working for and with children in such a situation.
