# PEOPLE:

## PLACES:

## TOWN MEETING 1991

Proceedings of the Annual Town Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Chesterfield School in said town on Tuesday, March 12, 1991.

At 10 o'clock in the forenoon, the meeting was called to order by the Moderator Carl A. Johnson, who read the warrant Articles One and Two and declared the polls opened for voting for Town Officers and Amendments to the Zoning Ordinances.

The Moderator called the Town Meeting to order at  $6:30\,\mathrm{pm}$ , with Warren Allen and Sandra Hoag as assistant moderator and clerk, respectively.

#### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS REPORT FOR 1991

A new 1991 Ford, 4-wheel drive diesel backhoe was purchased with a thumb, a wrist (for slope grading) and extension hoe. This is a great asset to our equipment fleet. A 1991 Ford diesel dump truck with plow and sander was purchased, replacing the old 1983 GMC 1-Ton.

The move to the new highway garage was made in mid-summer. A new salt and sand shed was built there. Grading around the facility will be done in summer 1992.

A construction/reconstruction project was completed on two sections of Old Swanzey Road, which was gravel over fabric, to eliminate mud problems there. We will finish the ditches and pave these two sections in 1992.

Blasting, tree removal, culvert replacement and paving were done to North Shore Road.

Pine Crest Drive had a culvert replaced, gravel added and upgraded.

The blasting of ledge to improve three more sections of Gulf Road is being carried into 1992 due to delayed tree removal and utility pole relocation.

The 1992 construction/reconstruction funds will be applied to one-half mile of Cady Lane with new culverts and gravel. The balance of one-half mile to the Keene town line to be reconstructed will be on the 1993 budget.

The 1991 tarring was done on North Shore Road, Pine Tree Circle, Wildwood Road and Brattleboro Road to the Recycling Center and the new highway garage.

In 1992, tarring will be done on Hewitt Road, Key Road, August Avenue and Chandler Road, which are now gravel roads. Also, sealing and shimming will be done on Holman Hill Road, Tuttle Road, Erbhof Road, Town Hall Road, River Road, Mill Road and one-half mile of Cady Lane.

During 1991, there were twenty-eight driveway applications issued.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the Selectmen for appointing me to the position of Director of Public Works vacated this summer by Marshall Bills, who I wish the best of luck in his future endeavors. Also, my thanks to the citizens of Chesterfield for your support.

# SOLID WASTE/RECYCLING CENTER REPORT FOR 1991

In August 1991, we paved most of the area around the main building to eliminate a muddy surface during freezing and thawing conditions. We can salt the area during winter months to maintain a nearly bare pavement for the safety of our patrons and employees.

We do not have enough space to store the material to be baled plus the baled material. This year we purchased two forty-five foot freight trailers for storage.

NOTE: Newspaper market - no income, but it is taken away at no charge. Also, per pound rates have gone down for each item. A delay in getting paid for January 1991 shipment of Plastic reduced income by \$522.82. The check for this shipment was received January 1992.

Cost per month for unrecyclable material ranged from a low of \$2,676 to a high of \$3,892. The average being \$3,206 including container rental. Total for the year - \$38,466, this relfects a reduction of \$850 from the previous year.

We have started to recycle tin. This is not an income item, however, it is being taken away at no cost to the town and this reduces the amount of unrecyclable material being hauled away significantly.

We are working on more profitable markets for the corrugated cardboard and now that we have the trailers for storage, we will be able to get a better price for our plastics by shipping trailer load quantities.

In closing, I'd like to thank the Recycling Committee, the attendants, the Selectmen, Joan and you, the Townspeople, for your contributions in helping to make our Recycling Center a success.

RE: Annual Report of the Police Department

This annual report is intended to offer a brief overview of the activities of the police department for the previous year and our projections for this year.

1991 was an extremely active year for the department. We handled 6558 calls which was up from 1990's 5800. Motor vehicle violations make up a good share of this, but we are seeing sharp increase in our criminal cases and their complexity. We also found that the "second or backup" officer calls are up sharply. I do not envision that 1992 will be any different. With the economy as it is, I expect that we will be even busier.

Project D.A.R.E. was started last year with great response. The program teaches life skills to the sixth grade students and gives them positive alternatives to drug use. I feel strongly that this program is the right approach to the drug problem. Hopefully, by decreasing the demand, the supply will lessen.

The department has continued on an aggressive training policy. With the ever increasing amount of lawsuits being filed and adverse media coverage, it is imperative that all emergency service agencies provide and maintain high levels of relevant training to their personnel. No agency or municipality, regardless of size, is immune from these lawsuits and the only defense is sufficient training and supervision.

In conclusion, I would ask that you keep an eye open for your neighbors and report suspicious activity. Many times your assistance has helped immensely. I also would like to say that if you have questions about the police department that you contact me and I will be happy to discuss them with you.

# REPORT OF THE EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DIRECTOR

#### ACTIVITY:

The town took delivery in January of a mobile power unit (portable generator) acquired with state funds which will provide a versatile piece of equipment to assist us in dealing with emergencies of all types...in fact, its capability to produce heated air was utilized to warm an accident victim trapped for hours in a vehicle which was crushed under a log truck during a snow storm the first week we had it. As far as I'm concerned it paid for itself that night.

In November, we participated in the biannual exercise of emergency plans for handling a disaster at the Vermont Yankee Nuclear Power Station in Vernon, Vermont. This was a full-scale exercise which was graded by FEMA and the NRC. Chesterfield, as well as the exercise in general, rated well. Much of our activity throughout the year included preparation and training for this event.

#### FEDERAL AND STATE FUNDING:

It is important to note that 50% of the total Emergency Management budget for Chesterfield is funded through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), which means that the actual impact on the town is one-half of the budget amount listed. Additional funds available through the state may offset this remaining amount partially or in total.

#### WEATHER ALERT RADIOS:

All Chesterfield residents living within the ten (10) mile Emergency Planning Zone (EPZ) should have a weather alert radio in their home. These radios are used to issue a warning in the event of an emergency at the Vermont Yankee Nuclear Power Station in Vernon, Vermont. If you do not have one of these radios, or have one which is malfunctioning, please contact the Selectmen's Office for assistance. Any resident moving out of town should leave this radio in the house for use by the next occupant.

#### SPECIAL NEEDS:

We encourage anyone who feels that they may need help in evacuating their premises during any type of disaster to contact the Selectmen's Office and fill out a card indicating this. All information of this nature will be considered confidential.

#### ACCOLADES:

This year, I would like to acknowledge the support and involvement of the Selectmen in the emergency planning activities we conducted. All three members of the board took an active role in the November exercise and the training which preceded it. As always, Joan Dittrich's help was invaluable.

# REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT 1991 CHESTERFIELD/WEST CHESTERFIELD

#### OVERVIEW

1991 has been an extremely busy year. There has been a big increase in the number of those seeking higher levels of training and certification. On October 14th, the members of the Chesterfield and West Chesterfield fire companies each voted to begin planning for the eventual consolidation of the two departments. We hope to have accomplished this merger by May, 1992 and a joint committee has been meeting regularly toward that end. Since early in the year a fire station building committee has been hard at work planning an emergency services facility designed to meet the needs of the town well into the future. We expect the coming year to be just as busy, if not more so.

#### FIRE PREVENTION

As we have done on an annual basis since 1984, members of the Chesterfield, West Chesterfield and Spofford Fire Departments visited the Chesterfield School on October 14th to conduct fire prevention activities for students in grades K-8 as part of National Fire Prevention Week. This year's program included a fire drill, videos, a visit from Smokey Bear, outside presentations by fire and emergency medical services, a vehicle display, and a parents' program. The theme of this years' program was "planning your escape". The highlight seemed to definitely be a mockup of a child's bedroom designed to show students how to react if they should wake up at night and find themselves confronted with a fire situation.

#### INSPECTIONS

Much time was devoted to inspections this year with special attention given to the school, town buildings, and new construction. Inspections have up until now been conducted with help from the State Fire Marshal's Office in Concord, however, due to budget cutbacks at the state level, we can expect to see an even heavier burden placed on the local authorities with regard to responsibility for inspections and site plan review.

#### TRAINING

On July 29, 1991 twelve firefighters from the Chesterfield, West Chesterfield and Spofford fire companies passed state examinations to become New Hampshire certified firefighters after having completed a 110 hour course, which began in March. Those now certified at level I are Dennis Abbott, Wayne Austin, Donald Bitcon, Jeffrey Chickering, Richard Cooper, Patrick Greenwood, Roy Schlichting, Kevin Spencer, James VanOudenhove, Herb Vicaire, William Vogeley and David Wright. Seventeen firefighters were certified in 1989, so that, together with those who have attained certification on an individual basis, townwide certification stands at about fifty percent (50%). Additionally, Charles Konkowski has

passed examinations for level II certification and fire instructor I. Stephen Bevis, Steven Chickering and James VanOudenhove have passed courses in hazardous materials operations. Three members are currently enrolled in a 120 hour course to become emergency medical technicians. Many firefighters also attended the regional school (both spring and fall) at Meadowood. Monthly drills of each company are held as well as joint drills of the Chesterfield Fire Service (which also includes Westmoreland). Plans for next year include training and adoption of the incident command system, hazardous materials awareness training and rescue training, including additional CPR courses (agressive CPR training was conducted during the year with classes held for teachers at Chesterfield School, waterfront staff at Camp Spofford, emergency workers and others).

#### FIRE STATION

This year we are asking the citizens of Chesterfield to support the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of building an emergency services center. For a number of years now the Chesterfield Center station has been inadequate. Because the building is not large enough to house all of the equipment, one truck is stored at a nearby residence. The newest piece of apparatus is in the station, but quarters are so tight the only way a driver can get into the vehicle is through the passenger side door. In addition, neither West Chesterfield nor Spofford have room to store a fire department rescue boat or the Office of Emergency Management's trailer-mounted generator.

We strongly urge you to visit all of the fire stations in town, especially the one in Chesterfield Center. It is important that you understand and realize the handicaps we operate under while continuing to provide you with the high level of service you have come to expect.

#### PLANNING BOARD REPORT 1991

1991 was, on the surface, a slower paced year for your Planning Board. The Shopco rezoning proposal was defeated at the January 15th special Town Meeting and the subsequent massive residential development proposed for that site and surrounding lands has not been pursued beyond the conceptual stage. With the current lull in activity, the Board has been able to begin to catch up on its primary function, planning.

During the summer, the Board, working with Building Inspector Charles Ellingwood, created an updated set of Building Codes and Regulations. The changes made should, if approved, allow for easier compliance and enforcement. These will be voted on at March 1992 Town Meeting.

The Land and Building Committee III presented their recommendations for the evolution of the Town Center. This plan, intended to help coordinate the individual housing needs of the various town departments, should result in the efficient use of the town's resources and the preservation and enhancement of the existing Town Center. The resulting plans are supported by the full Board and were presented at a public hearing and also at the summer Town Meeting. While these plans are still evolving and changing (a new location for the proposed library was presented to the Selectmen and the Planning Board in January), the results of the committee's work may be seen at the Town Offices 8AM-2PM weekdays.

The Master Plan update is well underway. The town has hired Raymond Lobdell Associates of Landaff, NH as the consultant to help with the formulation of the updated plan. A citizens' advisory committee comprised of over 20 volunteers has been working with the Board and the consultant with good progress. A comprehensive survey of citizens' opinions on the state of the town and its future is due out in April of this Year, with completion of the updated plan projected for January of 1993.

The Selectmen's secretary, Evelyn Nadeau, is now also the secretary for both Planning and Zoning. Her familiarity with town Administrative procedures will be a definite asset to the boards.

Some personnel changes have taken place on the Board this year. Roger Monsell has changed from full time member to an alternate, still giving the Board the benefit of his considerable expertise while allowing him time to pursue career interests. Kathleen Davidson and Lawrence Lester are not full members and Warren Porter returns to the Board as an alternate. Our thanks to Lyle Hoag who resigned after 4 years of service to pursue other interests.

1992 is shaping up as being a productive year and we welcome this slowdown in applications so that we can catch our collective breaths and plan for the changes and development that will surely come.

# REPORT OF THE PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION DECEMBER 31, 1991

The Parks and Recreation Commission whose charge is to oversee town recreation programs and the operation of the two town beaches, met often in 1991. We completed our new building that opened in August.

Our new building combines bathrooms/ticket/concession stand and stands closer to the beach. Our main drive was to have those at the beach not to have to cross the parking lot and walk a ways to the bathrooms and concession stand. The employees are better able to maintain its' cleanliness by the design and being so close to the beach. We had it landscaped and added more fencing. We are pleased with the final product.

Our Director, Cassy Deedy, has completed another fine year overseeing a variety of demanding jobs. Her staff worked hard to maintain clean and safe beaches for those who enjoyed the beaches. She oversees the eight week Tuesday and Thursday Recreation program at Wares Grove from late June to mid-August for town children ages 6 and up as well as participating with them. The children enjoyed a variety of wonderful land and water activities, field trips, arts and crafts, aerobics and an overnight stay at the Grove. Swimming lessons were again offered and many town children participated free. The director and her staff ran concession stands at both beaches. We are grateful for the job and service Cassy gives to the town.

In conjunction with the Chesterfield School gym, the adult program on Tuesday and Thursday nights 7:00-9:00 pm were offered from December to mid-April. Tuesdays have been men's basketball and Thursdays, a co-ed volleyball night. Participants have varied and townspeople are always welcome. This program will be reviewed for next year. Our special thanks to the Chesterfield Principal and School Board for allowing us to do this.

We continue to support two volunteer run programs for the town youth, grades K-5, at the school fields. Chesterfield Youth Baseball in the spring and Chesterfield Youth Soccer in the fall. Our heartfelt gratitude to the coordinators for the tremendous job they do in getting so many children involved, as well as parents, coaches and officials.

During the summer there were special recreational events at Spofford Lake. The Brattleboro Outing Club held a triathalon in July in which area residents participated individually or in a team effort. We assisted the Spofford Fire Dept. in opening the beaches for a spectacular fireworks display. For the convenience of town residents, we rent portable toilets for the south shore boat landing and for the school ballfields from May through October.

The Commission thanked and wished Jim Hertzler and family the best in Pennsylvania this summer. We have been lucky to replace Jim with Kipp Rancourt. Kipp has been a tremendous addition to our Commission. We will continue to meet and work hard through to 1992.

Prices at the beaches will remain the same as last year.

### MINUTES OF THE 1991 ANNUAL MEETING SPOFFORD FIRE DISTRICT

- Article 9: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

  \* The motion was made that the District accept any goods purchased by the Department in the past year. After discussing that this be made a regular yearly article, the motion passed.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Chesterfield Elementary School in said District on the 7th day of March, 1992, at 7:00 p.m. to act upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 1. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the District will vote to accept the provisions of RSA 198:20-b providing that any school district at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific recision of such authority, the school board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the school district, money from a state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 3. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate to fund the anticipated deficit in the 1991-1992 budget, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

### ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

This school year has been a very productive and constructive one for the children and staff of the Chesterfield School. A number of initiatives have been implemented that have, and will continue to have a very positive impact on the children at the school.

One of the major initiatives introduced this year is the transition to the middle school concept which impacts on students in grades five through eight. Probably the most unique feature of this approach is that it provides a learning environment that is appropriately structured to meet the intellectual, physical, social, and emotional needs of the students in this age range. It provides the opportunity for teachers to work cooperatively to plan and implement activities and programs that will enhance students' growth -- academically as well as socially and emotionally.

Although not entirely new this year, the expansion of the multi-age program is another change at the school that is having a substantive impact on the quality of programming available to the children. This approach is recognized nationally as one of the most significant reform efforts found in our schools. The multi-age approach helps teachers establish a very positive, cooperative, relatively stress-free learning environment in which children are highly motivated and where the chances for success are greatly enhanced.

These are but two of the initiatives that have occurred this year at the school. There are others that are proving equally positive and productive. In all cases, the success of these initiatives is contingent upon the people implementing them. I commend the willingness of the staff to accept the challenge of change, their willingness to put forth the effort needed to successfully implement these changes, and their dedication to the children in their classrooms.

There are several other factors that have contributed to the quality program that is clearly in evidence in Chesterfield. One factor is the Principal, Mr. Mahoney. Unfortunately, last year, Mr. Mahoney was called away from the school mid-year to serve his country during the Persian Gulf War. This year this was not the case. He has been able to work closely with the staff to implement changes that he and the staff believe will make a real difference to the children.

Another factor contributing to the overall quality of the school is the commitment that the community and parents have made to the school. This has taken a variety of forms. There is a very active, supportive parent group, Friends of Chesterfield, which works very hard on behalf of the school and the children.

There are open lines of communication between the school and the home. I believe parents feel comfortable visiting the school. The staff at the school have tried to increase opportunities for parents to visit the school or to become involved in one project or another.

The community has also supported the school by providing the resources needed to operate it. Over the last several years, the community has supported the construction of a facility that provides the space needed to offer quality programs, and has supported a competitive salary schedule which recognizes the value of quality teachers. It has also demonstrated a willingness to provide the materials and related equipment needed to maintain the level of programming that is expected of the school.

Unfortunately, we are experiencing extremely difficult economic times --times which make it increasingly more difficult to maintain the level of funding needed to ensure that the quality programs that have become characteristic of the Chesterfield School will continue. Please know that the administration (school board, principal and SAU #29 personnel) and staff are working to provide the current level of programming as cost effectively as possible. Although this will continue to be a priority, we cannot lose sight of the fact that we also have the responsibility of developing and providing viable educational opportunities for all children in the Chesterfield School District.

I hope I can count on your continued support for the children of Chesterfield and the Chesterfield School. Please plan to attend the School District Meeting on March 7.

### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Although our school enrollment fluctuated considerably over the course of the summer, we began the 1991-1992 school year with 380 students.

Despite some movement in certain grades, we have remained fairly stable at that point. Local census figures and a review of statistics provided by the state show a projection of approximately 400 students enrolled for the 1992-1993 school year. This represents an average increase in the student population of approximately 22 to 23 students over the past few years. At the present time, this has not had a significant impact on building utilization and staffing; however, we cannot continue to absorb these steady increases without some future considerations. These considerations also need to reflect changes in our curriculum as we seek to enhance the instructional program to meet the needs of our children in an ever-changing world.

We have experienced some changes in our staff over the past year:

- Mrs. Denise Sargent, Grade 5; Mrs. Kathy York, Grade 1; and Mrs. Audrey MacKnight, Chapter I Reading, returned from approved leaves of absence.
- Our Interim Principal from last year, Mr. Paul Bartolomucci, is still part of the SAU #29 family having assumed the principalship of Marlborough School.
- Our science teacher, Ms. Mary Grove, has taken a year's leave of absence for 1991-1992, and we were fortunate to retain Mrs. Teresa Starkey in that position. Although Teresa has been out on maternity leave after the birth of her son, Peter Allen, in December, she plans to return after the winter vacation.
- Mr. Richard Pike, who comes to us from the Lakes Region of New Hampshire, has replaced Mark Genovesi as the Assistant Superintendent of Schools for Towns.
- Mrs. Bonnie Kraft, school psychologist, working two days a week, has reduced our reliance on contracted personnel, provided a more costeffective service, and improved our ability to respond in a timely fashion to referrals for students experiencing personal and academic difficulty.

Throughout the state and the nation, schools are establishing partnerships with businesses in the private sector, working together to promote quality education. Chesterfield is no exception. Mr. Barclay McFadden, Chief Executive Officer of Stow Mills, Inc., proposed the Stow Mills Education Trust Fund. The purpose of this trust will be to improve the quality of education in the Chesterfield School District, promote educational excellence, support the development of creative and innovative ideas, and provide opportunities for educational enrichment. We welcome this initiative.

The **Friends of Chesterfield School** continue to provide both financial and personal support to the faculty and the students. Open House, Book Fairs, Italian Night Dinners, assembly programs, artists-in-residence, refreshments, numerous fund-raisers and field trip transportation are just samples of the many things they do. This year, the Friends group is chaired by Mrs. Kathy Fant and Mrs. Lynne Borofsky. I would also like to recognize Mrs. Pat Paquette, who again coordinates the school's ski program; Mr. Fred Rawlins, who continues to provide his personal support, time and talents to our school; Mrs. Susan Newcomer, who chaired many of our fund-raising events; Mrs. Linda Thomas, who coordinates the school's Odyssey of the Mind program; and the many other volunteers who lend their time and energy in so many different ways. It is that kind of community involvement that makes our school a unique and special place to be.

Student transportation has undergone a critical review over the past year. Last summer, a school committee, chaired by Mrs. Toni O'Neil and made up of drivers, parents, representatives from Cheshire Transportation, and administration, conducted a **comprehensive review of our transportation system** for both high school and elementary students. As a result, we have charted all our routes, stops, and respective student populations, ensuring a safer environment for students and allowing us to accurately gauge present and future needs.

**Curriculum and program development** continues to reflect the considerable talents, commitment, and personal initiative of the faculty. We have participated in curriculum continuum reviews in math, technology, and special education.

- Eisenhower Grant monies throughout the SAU were applied toward teacher training and the purchase of materials to effectively implement the new math standards adopted by the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM) and the Association of Teachers of Mathematics in New England (ATMNE).
- This year's Chapter 2 grant was written to support the expansion of the school's multi-age program. Its success thus far is a tribute to the devotion and hard work of the multi-age team.
- The staff in grades six through eight continues to work toward incorporating appropriate program characteristics that reflect middle school philosophy appropriate for this early adolescent population.
- Although Distance Learning is no longer funded by the district, the
  personal commitment and expertise of Mrs. Yacubian and Mr.
  Sonntag have allowed us to incorporate Algebra and Spanish into our
  program of studies.

As I drafted this report, I couldn't help but **reflect back on this time last year** when the highlight of my day was sitting in my hole in the Saudi Desert, reading letters from family, friends and students, and treating myself to a spoonful of Bee Tree Farm jelly while listening to air strikes. It was a time of apprehension and uncertainty for many of us. My departure for the Persian Gulf certainly wasn't meant to be an extension of the instructional program; however, our students certainly learned a great deal. They developed their language skills in the hundreds of letters they sent to me and other servicemen and women. They learned to take a critical view of world events and draw their own conclusions regarding the political and economic impact. They learned a lot more about the geography of Southeast Asia and the Middle East. They learned of personal values like commitment, courage and honor. And they learned that, in relation to world events, Chesterfield isn't as small as it seems.

I would like to take this opportunity to reiterate what I said when I came home in May. Very seldom in one's life do you get an opportunity to see a collection of the many people whose lives you have touched and who have so greatly touched yours. The remnants of yellow ribbons that still line the Old Chesterfield Road may be an environmental concern to some, but to me they serve as a constant reminder of the friendship and support that meant so much to me and my family. The ribbons will eventually disappear, but the memories will be cherished forever.

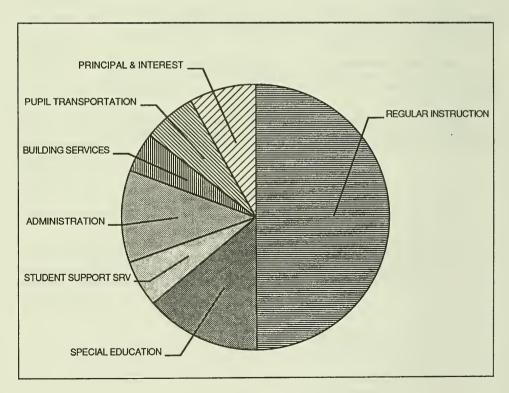

### PERCENT OF BUDGET BY FUNCTION AREA

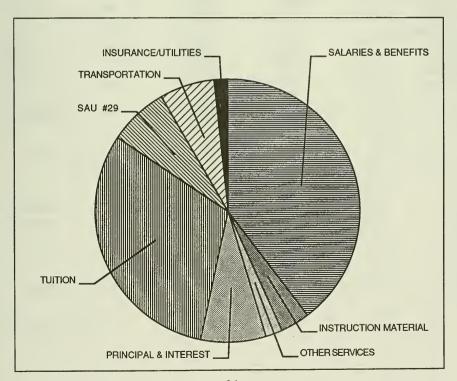

### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the School Board Chesterfield School District Chesterfield, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Chesterfield School District and the combining and individual fund financial statements of the School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1991, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the School District's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Assets Account Group results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Chesterfield School District at June 30, 1991, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Also, in our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of each of the individual funds of the School District at June 30, 1991, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

### CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING March 9, 1991

Moderator Terry L Wiggin opened the polls at 10:00 a.m. for the purpose of voting. The following persons were appointed ballot clerks and took the oath of office from the clerk, Diana S Allen: Caroline Wiggin, Sandra Wiggin, Shawn Wiggin, Thomas Allen, Marcia Esche, Elizabeth Yacubian, Robert Yacubian, Robin Holton, Claudette Russell, Pam Lynch, Pam Bergeron.

At 7:10 p.m., the Moderator called the meeting to order for the purpose of acting on the article in the warrant. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Rachel Palmer, president of the eighth grade class of Chesterfield School. A moment of silence in memory of James O'Neil, Sr. preceded the meeting. The Moderator introduced officials of NH School Administrative Unit 29; the Chesterfield School Board; Paul Bartolomucci, interim principal of Chesterfield School; and Jeff Newcomer, who was sworn in by the Clerk as Assistant Moderator.

Phillip McCormack, Superintendent of NHSAU 29, made some brief remarks about the importance of education in society today and asked for support from the community to continue to provide quality education for the children of Chesterfield. He also gave examples of accomplishments of Chesterfield graduates at Keene High School.

The Moderator reviewed the rules which will be followed during the meeting. It was requested that speakers be recognized by the Moderator and identify themselves. Speakers are to use the microphone placed at the front of the gymnasium. It was stated that first time speakers on an issue will be recognized before those wishing to speak a second time. All motions should be submitted in writing for accuracy. If a motion is made to recess this meeting and reconvene at a later date, the same number of voters will be needed to vote at a reconvened meeting as those that voted to reconvene the original meeting. If a motion is made and accepted to reconvene this meeting, any previous motions voted on tonight cannot be reconsidered and voted upon at a later date.

The Moderator suggested dispensing with the reading of the warrant and instead would read each article as it is taken up. Hearing no objections, the Moderator took up Article 1.

Articles in the Warrant were disposed of as follows:

ARTICLE 1: Robert Yacubian moved that all reports contained in the Chesterfield Annual School District Report be approved as printed. Seconded by Susan Newcomer. Gary Winn, Chairman of the Budget Committee, gave an oral report. The Moderator declared the voice vote to be in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 2: William McQuillin moved that the District vote to authorize the school board to apply for, accept and expend, without

further action by the School District Meeting, money from state, federal or other governmental units or a private source which becomes available during the 1991-1992 school year, provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money, and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds, and further, that the school board shall hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money (pursuant to RSA 198:20-b). Seconded by Richard Wolf. The Moderator declared the voice vote to be in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3: Richard Wolf moved and Susan Newcomer seconded the motion to see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$145,000.00 to fund the anticipated deficit in the 1990-1991 budget. The Moderator declared the voice vote on the motion to be in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 4: James Milani moved that the district ratify and approve the two-year labor contract with the Chesterfield Support Staff Association with an estimated cost for salary and benefits in the year 1991-1992 of \$146,038, and the year 1992-1993 of \$159,441, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$146,038 to fund the first year of said two-year contract. Seconded by Carolyn Wiggin. William McQuillin moved to divide ARTICLE 4 in two parts and to vote to accept the contract separately and to vote for the first year only separately. Seconded by Richard Slater. This motion was defeated on a voice vote as declared by the Moderator. Warren Allen moved and James O'Neil, Jr. seconded, to limit debate. The voice vote to limit debate was declared in the affirmative by the Moderator. A written request for a ballot vote on ARTICLE 4 was received from Scott Ricci, Anne Ricci, James VanOudenhove, Roger Monsell, and Edna Ranson. Ballots cast totalled 190: 114 Yes, 76 No. The official town checklist was used. The Moderator declared the motion to be approved.

ARTICLE 5: Susan Newcomer moved and Charles Paquette seconded that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,011,054 for the purpose of paying for the support of the schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.

Cornelia Jenness moved and Lawrence Lester seconded to amend ARTICLE 5 to increase the amount of money to be raised and appropriated for the support of schools by \$28,530 with said money to be used for a regular instructional aide and a library aide. Tom Allen moved to limit debate. Caroline Wiggin seconded. The motion to limit debate passed on a voice vote. The Moderator then called for a voice vote on the Amendment to ARTICLE 5. The Moderator was unable to determine the wish of the meeting by voice vote and asked for a standing count. The standing vote resulted in a tie vote: 84 Yes, 84 No. The Moderator then cast a vote in the affirmative and the motion passed: 85 Yes, 84 No.

Olaf Tabur moved to amend ARTICLE 5 to reduce the amount to be raised and appropriated to the sum of \$2,739,584 for the purpose of paying for the support of the schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. Seconded by Richard Slater. Phil Shaw called to limit debate. Seconded by Charles Paquette. The motion to limit debate passed on a voice vote. The Moderator called for a vote of the motion to reduce the budget as stated in the Tabur amendment to ARTICLE 5. The voice vote was declared to be in the negative and Moderator declared the motion failed.

A request for a written ballot was received from Scott Ricci, Anne Ricci, Roger Monsell, Edna Ranson and James VanOudenhove. The Moderator explained that the meeting would be voting on ARTICLE 5 as amended: to see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,039,584 for the purpose of paying for the support of the schools, for the payment of salaries of the school district officers and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. 177 ballots were cast using the official town checklist: 111 Yes, 66 No. The Moderator declared the vote on ARTICLE 5 to be in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 6: Richard Wolf moved that the District approve the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Constitution of the State of New Hampshire calls on the Government of our State to have the ultimate responsibility for education; and,

WHEREAS, such education, while "necessary for the preservation of a free government" according to our Constitution, should not unfairly burden those who do not have the ability to pay; and,

WHEREAS, the People of Chesterfield and other New Hampshire communities increasingly find themselves forced to choose between their homes and their children's education; and,

WHEREAS, other Granite State communities have brought legal action against the State of New Hampshire to force it to provide adequate funding for the education of our children;

THEREFOR BE IT RESOLVED, that the Chesterfield School District go on record in support of those communities seeking substantial increases in the funding of education for communities throughout our state;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that any method of increasing educational funding must shift the tax burden from those who are property-wealthy to those who are monetarily wealthy; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that such increases in funding from the state never remove a community's local authority over its schools.

The resolution was accepted on a voice vote.

William McQuillin moved and Jeff Newcomer seconded a motion that the meeting be adjourned at 10:55 p.m. Motion was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative by a voice vote.

The official town checklist was used for the election of District Officials with 279 ballots cast at the ballot box and no absentee ballots cast.
