4. To see what action the town will take in regard to trading the cemetery mower and raise and appropriate the necessary amount.

5. To see what action the town will take in regard to having the stone wall removed at Child Cemetery.

6. To see what action the town will take in regard to receiving a parcel of land for Chase Cemetery from Mr. James Campbell Lewis.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of one-one hundredth of one per cent (or a specific amount) of the assessed valuation for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

8. By Request: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Non-Partisan Ballot System for the Election of Town Officials as provided in the revised law of New Hampshire. Vote by ballot.

9. To see what action the town will take in regard to having Volume 1 and 2 of the Town Histories printed, and raise and appropriate the necessary amount.

10. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell, or otherwise administer, property acquired through Tax Sales and Liens.

11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to

borrow money, if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the Town will elect a Committee for a Memorial Day program.

13. To vote on the question: Shall the provision of chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this Town.

14. To hear the Reports of Officers, Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The polls will remain open until Seven (7:00) p.m.

There were more fires in 1964 than common. There were 9 chimney fires, 1 truck fire, 1 fire in sawdust beside a building, 1 fire in floor above a furnace, and 11 grass and brush fires.

The Town purchased 800 feet of 2½" double jacket fire hose.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy—both industrial and recreational—is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area—4,350,000 acres—is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.

2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.

3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Cornish qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said district, on the sixth day of March, 1965, at ten o'clock in the morning to act on Article 1; the meeting to be recessed and opened again at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the remaining articles in the Warrant:

1. To choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer and Auditors for the ensuing year and a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
2. To determine and fix the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government and/or state agencies.

7. To see if the district will authorize the school board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts and any other receipts from miscellaneous sources in addition to the original appropriation for 1965-66, for the lunch program, general expenses, equipment and improvements.

8. To see if the school district will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250.00, this money to be used for completing the re-roofing of the school building which was started last year.

9. To see what disposition the school district will wish to make of the surplus Sweepstakes money which amounts to \$2,062.46.

10. To see if the school district would wish to establish a definite policy relative to the tuition payments of pupils attending high school, when the tuition rate exceeds the state average cost for New Hampshire schools.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Report of the School Board

The board feels that the past year has been one of great overall improvement in the school program. It is pleased with the work of the entire staff, and it thinks that many aspects, hitherto necessarily neglected, have been greatly improved under the direction of the supervising principal, Mr. Bent. It has every hope that this improvement will continue.

To be specific, the discipline of the school body has improved. There have, in fact, been no major disciplinary problems this year, as has been the case in the past. Supervision of teaching has been much more closely and much more frequently administered. Guidance work has been continuously carried on with children with educational problems. A much closer correlation with the high schools in Claremont and Windsor has been established, with particular emphasis on keying the subject matter in our upper grades here to that which Cornish children would face as high school freshmen.

A very successful series of Christmas programs, put on by the children for their parents, families, and friends, was arranged by Mr. Bent and Mr. Brys, and the homeroom teachers.

The basketball program, under the direction of the assistant principal, Mr. Budd, was successfully continued. In addition, a physical education program of both group games and calisthenics was instituted by Mr. Bent.

Departmentalization of studies has been instituted in Grades 7 and 8. There, Mr. Budd has been teaching English and social studies in both grades, and Mr. Stowell has been teaching mathematics and science to both grades. The board feels a beneficial continuity of learning is achieved through this method. Mr. Stowell, in addition, has been taking his scientific laboratory into the lower grades for experiments whenever his time permits.

In September, the operation of the school lunch program was put under the direction of the superintendent of schools, working through the supervising principal.

Three major plant improvements were made during the past year. A new fence was installed on the school grounds bordering the main road. The board discovered that the district had had no insurance on the school boiler, and, after changes were made to the boiler to make it conform to insurance specifications, such insurance was taken out. Half of the main school building roof was re-

surfaced, and proper ventilation was installed for the attic air space.

The cafeteria room and one classroom were redecorated with epoxy paint on the lower half of the walls. This will facilitate cleaning, and no further up keep is anticipated.

The school board and the board of selectmen advertised for bids to meet the school and town fuel oil needs. The low bid on a firm, year-round price, rather than a fluctuating one, was awarded in January.

Presently a survey is underway studying the methods of teaching reading in the eight grades at the school by a committee consisting of Mrs. Runnals, Mr. Bent, and the teachers involved. Dr. Comerford of Keene State University visited the school and made several helpful recommendations. Further, agents of publishing houses were interviewed.

In October, Mrs. Beverly MacKenzie was hired as a teaching aide for Grade 1. This move was necessitated by the size of the class, which never dropped below 35 pupils.

The board appointed Mrs. Robert Traquair as school district treasurer in the fall, to take the place of Mr. Norman Chabot, who had moved from town. The board wishes to express its appreciation for the faithful, accurate, and highly competent work Mr. Chabot performed.

This June, Miss Williams and Mrs. Symons will retire from the Cornish school system after many years of devoted service to that most important of professions, teaching. The board feels sure the district will wish to join with it in thanking them for their intelligent and worthy work.

This coming year will see Cornish move from Supervisory Union 5, under the able direction of Mr. Noyes Stickney, to that of Supervisory Union 6, under Mr. George Disnard. The shift will take place October 1, when Mr. Stickney retires. As a board, we wish to express our appreciation at having had the opportunity to work with him, just as we are looking forward to our association with Mr. Disnard. The new union will consist of Claremont, Cornish, and Unity, and its headquarters will be in Stevens High School, Claremont.

Superintendent's Report

To the Cornish School Board and Citizens of the Town, I herewith submit my eighth and final annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

TEACHING STAFF

School opened on September 9, 1964 with three new teachers on our local staff.

Mr. George Bent

Mr. Bent was appointed to the newly created position of Supervising Principal of the Cornish School. He graduated from the University of New Hampshire in 1953 and is completing his Masters Degree at Keene State College this year. He had five years of professional experience before coming to Cornish.

Mr. David Regan

Mr. Regan was appointed instructor in grade 4. He succeeded Mrs. Lane who resigned for personal reasons. After graduating from Lyndon State College in 1960 with a B.S. degree, he taught in the elementary schools of Morgan Center and Topsham, Vermont.

Mr. Norman Stowell

Mr. Stowell was appointed instructor in grade 7. He succeeded Mrs. Bernard who retired last June. Mr. Stowell graduated from the Lyndon State College in 1959. He formerly taught for four years at the Brownsville, Vermont elementary school.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETINGS

The School Board has held regular monthly meetings throughout the school year, except during the vacation months of July and August. With the exception of the October meeting, the Superintendent has

been in attendance at all regular meetings, to provide an appropriate agenda for necessary business.

It is usually necessary to call two special meetings in January and February, the season of the year when we are working on the new school budget. Mr. James Farley has been our School Board Chairman, and Mrs. Harriet Runnals was appointed Financial Secretary. Our regular meeting date has been the afternoon of the third Monday in each month. Meetings are held at 3:30 p.m. at the school building.

SUPERINTENDENT'S COMMENTS

The long years of faithful service will be reflected again this year in the retirement of Miss Williams and Mrs. Symons. They have given many years in their chosen profession to the town of Cornish. We are all better because we have known them and proud to have worked with them. It is our hope they will enjoy many happy years in retirement.

We are very pleased with the operation of the school this year. In my opinion it is the best organized and disciplined school we have experienced in many years. As supervising principal, Mr. Bent has done well in his first year. With a school population close to 250 pupils, a full-time administrator has been most necessary and the results have justified our investment.

Mr. Stowell has proven to be an outstanding teacher and together with Mr. Budd has organized a departmentalized program in grades 7 and 8. So, for the first time we have been able to offer the children specialized instruction in specific subject matter fields.

Due to the fact that our first grade was overcrowded (37 pupils) the Board found it imperative to hire a teacher aide to work with Mrs. Kidder in the primary room. Mrs. MacKenzie was appointed to this position and she has worked with the regular teacher in all areas of activity in the first grade room.

Projected enrollments would seem to indicate that we may expect a first grade enrollment next year of about twenty pupils. With the graduation of thirty-five in the eighth grade it would appear that we would have an opening day enrollment next fall of about 235 pupils.

Everyone seemed to be pleased with the new cyclone fence which was erected along the highway and at the entrance to the school. It has added much to the general appearance of the school grounds and of course is a worthwhile safety factor in protecting children using the playground.

Work is under way toward stepping up our reading program. Mr. Bent and a committee of teachers and board members are working on plans for next year, together with a study of appropriate available materials to consider.

REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS

Much repair work and cleaning was done during the summer months. Our custodian, Mr. Mark, has given us very satisfactory service. During July and August the entire building was cleaned, the windows were washed inside and out, and the floors cleaned and properly waxed.

The major repair job was the re-roofing of the south side of the main building. We are pleased with the appearance of the front of the school as we approach it from the main entrance.

Eighteen window shades have been replaced in three of our regular classrooms. This has made working conditions more comfortable for the children on the south side of the building.

Two classrooms were redecorated and added bulletin board space has been provided in the third grade room. Also, Mr. Mark found time in his busy schedule to complete the painting of the exterior of the school.

CAFETERIA

Mrs. Weld and Mrs. Ackerman have again been in charge of the cafeteria this year. This department is now under the direct supervision of the administrative principal. Mr. Bent is in charge of the bookkeeping and general lunch accounts and reports. Teachers and children alike have given enthusiastic support to the lunch program, which is indicative of the service rendered, and the quality of the lunches prepared.

Over one hundred pupils are served daily and lunches are sold at a very nominal cost. The cafeteria program is self-supporting and the operating expense is not included in the school district budget. We receive some relief through State subsidy and a generous supply of government surplus foods.

MISCELLANEOUS

Cornish will experience a major change in the school department next year due to administrative changes. This will mean a year of trial and adjustment. However, this should prove to be a good move from a long view. A new superintendent of schools will be appointed and Cornish will be assigned to a different union complex beginning the fall of 1965.

Increased enrollment in our lower grades at Cornish School will seem to indicate a trend and a need for additional classroom space. Perhaps the School Board should give some thought to a building addition providing space for a Kindergarten or sub-primary group.

I wish to commend the members of the school board for their sincere efforts in support of our school. Also, I wish to thank the teachers for their support and good work throughout the year.

Principal's Report

To the town of Cornish I respectfully submit this my first report as principal of the Cornish Elementary School.

As school commenced we were immediately faced with an enrollment considerably above that which we had expected. At the writing of this report the enrollment seems to have stabilized at 245. This increased enrollment was most severely felt in the first grade. Here there are 38 students enrolled though only 30 were expected. The high demand placed on the time of a first grade teacher necessitated the addition of Mrs. Beverly MacKenzie as a teacher-aide to guarantee the best education to the students.

The school is fortunate to have as new members of its staff Mr. David Regan in the fourth grade and Mr. Norman Stowell, science and mathematics instructor to the seventh and eighth grades.

Several changes have been made in the educational program of the Cornish School. The seventh and eighth grades are now departmentalized to fully realize the strengths of the teachers which consequently improves the quality of education. In addition the seventh and eighth grades are taking part in a formal program of physical education. All other classes are also involved in a physical education and games program though on a less formal level.

We are in the process of building up the science and mathematics program at all levels. Mr. Norman Stowell has inaugurated a program in which he periodically visits other classes to perform special laboratory experiments.

The reading program is being earnestly reviewed to determine if we are fully meeting the needs of the children. From preliminary results it appears that our phonics program is beginning to show strong evidence of success.

There is a great deal of student guidance necessary in Cornish as there is in any school. It is my aim to enable the unsuccessful students to become successful students. It is also my aim to direct all the students toward the rewarding completion of a public school education. To achieve this, every student in grades five through eight will take part in an intensive guidance program. Pupils in the lower grades will be involved when guidance is necessary. Some positive successes are already in evidence and in future years, following a systematic guidance program the results should be even more rewarding.

Considerable time is devoted to teacher supervision and the insurance that the established curriculum is followed. To enable any educational program to function there must be supervision and strong

communication between administration and faculty. This we fervently hope is present in the Cornish School.

As supervisor and business manager of the School Lunch Program

I want to give special recognition to our two excellent cooks: Mrs. Pauline Weld, who plans our menus, and Mrs. Frances Ackerman, her highly capable assistant. The completely unsolicited compliments of the children are ample endorsement of our good food. The banquets of Thanksgiving and Christmas were days we will remember all year.

The fall term closed with our highly successful Christmas program. For much of this success we must thank Mr. William Brys, our music supervisor. The dramatics provided by grades four and eight gave proof that the spirit of Christmas reigned at the Cornish School.

I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, Mr. Noyes Stickney, and a highly cooperative and professional staff for the success of the school year.

Report of the School Nurse

To the School Board and Citizens of Cornish I herewith submit my annual report as School Nurse of Supervisory Union No. 5.

During the 1963-64 school year two hundred and thirty vision test were done and these were followed by twenty-eight re-checks. Of this number ten children were found to have visual difficulties. All of these children were seen for further examination and corrections were made as indicated.

Two hundred and thirty-two hearing tests were done and followed by eight audiograms. An audiogram consists of a graph of hearing which shows the loudness level or the threshold at which one can just barely hear each of the tones of the audiometer. Two children were found to have some degree of hearing loss and were checked by their family physicians.

Two hundred and thirty-three children were weighed, measured and checked for noticeable abnormalities. By far the greatest need lies in the need for more adequate dental care. Twenty-one children attended the Dental Clinic which was sponsored by the P.T.A. with the assistance of the State Department of Health. While our Dental Clinic helps a limited number of children it can in no way supply the total need.

Two children attend the Crippled Children's Clinics regularly. Two children attended the Guidance Clinic in Claremont. This Clinic is a great help to us in meeting the needs of children as well as to the child and his parents.

Communicable Diseases in the form of Mumps, Chicken-Pox and Whooping Cough accounted for many absences during the year. It seems we had a larger than usual number of cases.

Two hundred and thirty school children as well as seven adults were given the Tuberculin Patch Test. There was one reaction and that was followed by a chest x-ray at the Diagnostic Chest Clinic in Claremont. The x-ray reading was negative. In the coming Spring a different type of test will be used to detect persons who have had a tubercular contact. This will be the Stern Test.

Sabin Vaccine will again be available before the close of the present school year. Pre-school children and first grade children would appear to be most in need of this vaccine.

I would like to commend the School Lunch workers on their fine program. The food is varied, well prepared and attractively served. The Christmas dinner was a real "production". I wish more children could be on the program.
