SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Although a continuing effort was made during 1980 to restrict Town expenses to budget allocations, appropriated funds were insufficient to meet the high cost of maintaining necessary Town services in several areas of operation, notably the highway, police and fire departments and public welfare. Unfortunately the outlook for 1981, with continuing inflation, promises no relief for the taxpayer. Our share of the anticipated budget for the Hillsboro-Deering Cooperative School will probably exceed last year's levy by some \$40,000. The proposed Town budget for the year 1981 (exclusive of education) represents an increase of approximately 5% over the amount allocated for 1980.

The improvement of Town services, which has been a constant goal of the Board of Selectmen, particularly in recent years, hopefully will become more evident as the revamping of Deering's Volunteer Fire Department fulfills current expectations. The Town's burgeoning population, already surpassing 1,000 inhabitants, needs greater fire protection. An enlarged force of dedicated volunteers, eager to acquire the necessary training for the avocation, together with more serviceable vehicles and equipment, will substantially improve Deering's ability to protect property from the ravages of fire.

State assessors are presently engaged in the revaluation of all properties in the Town. When this undertaking has been completed, a booklet of the new assessment values will be mailed to each property holder at the time their final tax bill is mailed. A public hearing will be held later in the year at which time taxpayers will have an opportunity to discuss assessments with the State assessors.

All taxpayers are reminded again that failure to return completed inventory forms by April 15, 1981 may disqualify them for consideration should they subsequently wish to file tax appeals. Failure to return an inventory form may also subject the taxpayer to a penalty. These forms will be mailed first class.

On behalf of all citizens of the Town of Deering, the Board of Selectmen extend a well-deserved vote of thanks to Robert P. Nugent for his many years of service to the Town. Bob has given most generously of his time, particularly during the eight years he has served on the Planning Board. Although he is retiring from the Planning Board as of March 12, 1981, we are assured of his continuing interest in Town affairs and the availability of his expertise.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Deering in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, GREETINGS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Deering on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at 10:00 A.M. in the morning to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Polls will open at 10:00 A.M. in the morning and will remain open until 6:00 P.M. (The polls may be continued to be open following the above hour by vote of the Meeting, but may not be closed before the hour of 6:00 P.M. - RSA 39:2).

Additionally, pursuant to RSA 39:2a you are hereby notified that Article 2 through 24 will be taken up at 7:30 P.M.

(All Articles hereinafter are submitted by the Selectmen unless otherwise noted.)

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of the Town Officers, Agents, Committees, and Auditors for the year 1980.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money: Town Officers' Salaries \$10,800.; Town Officers' Expenses \$16,000.; Election and Registration \$800.; Town Buildings and the purchase of office equipment \$10,500.; Social Security Payments \$4,800.; Insurance \$15,000.; Damages and Legal Expenses \$1,000.; Dog Expenses \$400.; Dumps and Trash Removal \$9,000.; Vital Statistics \$25.; Street Lighting \$1,600.; Library \$35.; Town Poor \$10,000.; Old Age Assistance \$1,000.; Aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled \$1,000.; Cemetery Care \$1,000.; Hillsboro District Nursing Association \$1,200.; Tax Map \$500.; Communication Dispatch Center \$1,600.; and to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year 1981 or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to auction property taken by Tax Collector's Deeds, in accordance with the provisions of RSA 80:42. Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to continue membership in the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission and raise and appropriate the sum of \$601. for the Town's share of the operating costs of said Commission, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400. for the current operating expenses of the Planning Board and the sum of \$400. for the current operating expenses of the Conservation Commission, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,500. for the Police Department and the sum of \$200. for Civil Defense, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum fo \$250. for the support of the Hillsboro Rescue Squad and the sum of \$150. for the Weare Rescue Squad, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000. to continue the renovation of the Town Hail, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money for Highway purposes: (1) Road Maintenance \$48,500.; (2) General Expenses of the Highway Department \$22,000.; (3) Road Sealing \$9,000.; and to raise by State Grant, Highway Subsidy, and appropriate the sum of \$13,122.28 to be used for the maintenance of Town Highways under the provisions of RSA 241:14 as amended, and to further raise by State Grant, Highway Subsidy, and appropriate the sum of \$9,911.78 to be used for the maintenance of Town Highways under the provisions of RSA 241:15 as amended, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,209.21 to secure Town Road Aid (State Share \$8,061.38) or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000. for equipment, primarily a wood chipper, for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of \$8,000. for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,500. for the Fire Department, or to take any other action relating thereto. Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1.00 for the purchase of land for a fire station to be located in West Deering or to take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by Fire Department).

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000. for the purchase of building materials for a fire station in West Deering, or to take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by Fire Department).

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,000. for the purchase of a fire truck, and further appropriate the sum of \$8,000. for the purpose of outfitting the fire trucks that have been acquired for the Deering Fire Department and authorize the withdrawal of 10,000 from the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund for these purposes, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. for the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amounts indicated; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or to take any other action thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept or purchase on behalf of the Town any Federal or State surplus fire or highway equipment, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to trade, sell or otherwise dispose of any surplus Town property, or to take any other action relating thereto.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The annual meeting of the Association of New Hampshire Conservation Commissions held in Concord in November, 1980 focused attention on two of the ongoing concerns of the Deering Conservation Commission: the preservation of an intrinsic asset, our wetlands, and the preservation of the natural beauty of our rural community. While continuing in its obligation to monitor all Dredge and Fill applications, the Deering Commission has joined other New Hampshire Commissions in initiating a systematic wetlands inventory. The first step in this process, a soils map compiled by the Hillsborough County Soils Conservation Service will be completed by the summer of 1981. The second area of shared concern stressed at the annual meeting was the importance of advocating the passage of the "Bottle Bill" so that the natural beauty of our community can be maintained. This year the Commission reinstated the annual May Clean-Up Day in the hope that the bill might be passed during the next session of the Legislature. Bottles once more constituted the main content of the trash picked up at this year's Clean-Up Day.

The towns of Henniker and Bennington have agreed to cooperate in the installation and cost of erecting Town Line signs. Having previously purchased the signs and installed those on the Hillsboro-Deering line, the Commission this year purchased from the state all posts needed to install the remaining signs including those on roads shared with Weare and Francestown. By spring all thirteen signs should be in place.

Under the sponsorship of the Commission, Aileen McWalters attended the 1980 session of Interlocken Conservation Camp in Hillsboro Upper Village. She reported enthusiastically on her experience. Any young Deering resident between the ages of fourteen and seventeen interested in attending the camp might contact the Conservation Commission for information.

As the "conservation conscience" of Deering the Commission

expressed to the Selectmen its concern over the proposal by the road agent to cut a number of trees on Glen Road, designated a "scenic road" by a vote of the townspeople at Town Meeting several years ago. Of particular concern was the ravine area, not only because of its unique beauty but also because of the potential accident hazard and inevitable road deterioration. Since designating a road as "scenic" does not affect the right of the landowner to work on his own property, the Commission also contacted the owners of the ravine area to acquaint them with the views of the Commission. It was decided not to cut the trees in question.

The Commission thanks Ellen Warwzynski and Frank Perreault whose terms expired this year and Polly Pierce who resigned, for their many contributions and welcomes Jean Bertrand, Betsy Neville-Bright and Villa Ramsay who were appointed to fill those vacancies.

DEERING VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

1980 has been a year of transition for the Fire Department. Since last August there have been significant changes in both membership and equipment.

Since my selection by the Board of Selectmen as Fire Chief, I have made two line officer appointments. John Snow has been appointed as Captain in charge of the men and equipment responding from the Old County Road Firehouse and Jerry Donovan is Captain in charge of the firemen and equipment stationed in West Deering. Additional appointments include: Thomas Copadis, Administrative Officer; Carl Hammond, Communications Officer; Gordon Rich, Maintenance Officer; Douglas Craighead, Training Officer and Joanne Devine in charge of the proposed "CPR" Group.

In recent months, the Fire Department membership has grown from approximately 13 primarily non-resident members to more than 40 members. All new members are Deering residents.

The Fire Department has also begun a comprehensive training program. John Snow, Jerry Donovan, David Merrill and Carl Hammond have attended 88 hours of intensive schooling, and all have become certified by the State of New Hampshire Fire Training Service. All four have continued their training to become certified instructors. Approximately 20 formal training sessions are planned for the complete membership during 1981.

In recent months the Fire Department has begun to up-grade its equipment. We have tentatively acquired an engine from the Henniker Fire Department. It is stationed at the Old County Road Firehouse, replacing the Forest Fire Service Pumper. The latter has been moved to West Deering. Two 1200 gallon tankers have been acquired from the U.S. Government as surplus property. They have been reconditioned by Fire Department members and with some additional outfitting will be significant additions to the Department. One tanker will be stationed at the town hall and the other in West Deering, giving the town substantially increased coverage.

Presently, the Deering Fire Department has no formal mutual aid agreements with any other Fire Departments. However, Hillsboro and Weare respond to fires in Deering. Hillsboro's cost for responding is projected to double in 1981 and Weare has indicated the possibility of charging for responses in town this year. We are endeavoring to up-grade our department so that in the near future we will be able to seek formal mutual aid agreements with these towns as well as others. Mutual aid agreements are means of avoiding charges for responses by other Fire Departments.

Our rebuilding efforts have not gone unnoticed by other Fire Departments. We have received tremendous support and assistance from the officers and men of the Hillsboro and Weare Fire Departments, as well as departments in the towns of Henniker, Antrim, New Boston and Hudson. Also the support and cooperation of Ray Farrell and the Decring Board of Selectmen has been invaluable. However, it has been most gratifying to see the support and participation of the people of Deering. Without this support this up-grading could never have been undertaken.

The Deering Fire Department's goal is to build an exceptionally effective small town Fire Department, which everyone in town can be proud of, participate in and depend upon. Our philosophy is to accomplish this goal in the most cost effective manner possible. We are well on our way toward accomplishing this goal and thank you for your support.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The year 1980 saw an almost complete collapse of the real estate market in this area. As a result, the Planning Board did not have a single application for a subdivision from a developer. Only five applications were filed. All were approved. One application from December 1979 was also approved in 1980. Two of the subdivisions were annexations to abutters and did not create any new lots. The largest subdivision was three lots. A total of five new lots were created this year.

This lull in development due to the present economic situation probably will not last much longer and the Planning Board must be prepared to meet the challenges which will arise. In spite of the slowdown in the real estate market our population continues to grow at an alarming rate. In the past decade our year-round population increased from 578 to 1046, an 81% growth rate. By 1990 the figure will probably be over 2000.

The Planning Board has nearly completed its Master Plan which seeks to provide some control over this anticipated growth to keep it from overwhelming the Town. It is hoped that all interested persons will study the Plan when it is published and will give the Planning Board the benefit of their views of the Plan at the public hearing which will be held soon after.

Townspeople are always welcome at Planning Board meetings which are normally held on the second Wednesday of each month.

1980 marks the tenth year that the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission has been in existence. During this period the Commission has continued its involvement in studies of both a local as well as a regional nature.

The Commission is solely an advisory body to the member communities and as such is often invited to provide technical assistance and advice on local projects.

As part of this ongoing technical assistance the Commission has been pleased to provide valuable assistance to the Planning Board in completing the Town Plan and will publish the Plan in 1981. The Commission also has provided assistance in preparing an ordinance on gravel pits as required by State statute as well as furnishing many valuable publications.

The Commission, this past year, again hosted a series of legal seminars for local officials and an open house on alternate energy sources.

The Commission hopes to be able to continue to serve the needs of its member communities in the future and appreciates the past support of its activities by the Town of Deering.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

The United States Bureau of the Census has issued population figures for minor civil divisions for 1980 and the figure for Deering is 1047. The first Census for 1790 reported our population as 928, so it seems that during two centuries we have gained few in number. In 1820 we had our largest population - 1415, and in 1920 our smallest population - 287.

The decade from 1970 to 1980 shows the largest change - from 578 in 1970 to 1047 - and if we add as many from 1980 to 1990 (which seems possible) we shall then have our largest population.

However, the type of population has changed since 1820, when agriculture was the principal occupation and large families were common (with grandparents, bachelor uncles and spinster aunts living together with parents and children), to a town in which fulltime farmers are few and far between, but many families have gardens and a minimum of livestock, a cow, goat, horse or poultry. Families with more than four children are the exception rather than the rule.

Trailers have replaced many of the houses which have burned or fallen down due to having been unoccupied for long periods. We have two trailer parks in town as well as smaller groups and individual trailers scattered throughout the town.

As Historian I have answered phone requests for Deering information. Recently I was able to tell a woman, who knew her great grandfather was born in Deering, the date and place of his marriage and his and his bride's residences at that time, which was information she did not have.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

The Health Officer is once again happy to report that there were no serious problems to be dealt with by the Board of Health this past year.

A few minor problems arose which were resolved quickly and easily on location or by telephone.

A lack of snow and rain over the past two years presents a potential problem to many. Conserving water should be seriously considered by all until the water table is built back up again.

During this period of drought extreme care should be taken to maintain the water bodies from contamination and pollution.

The Health Officer again asks that any Deering resident or non-resident who has a question or problem relating to the health and well being of the community, which is everyone's business, please feel free to contact me.

May the 1980's bring health and well being to all.

DEERING HISTORICAL SOCIETY

"HISTORY UNITES US FOR THE FUTURE"

The Deering Historical Society was duly organized, as an independent organization of the Town, under the advisement of the Selectmen. The Society was officially recorded in August by the State of New Hampshire as a non-profit organization, affixed with both the State and Town Seals. The identification number of the Internal Revenue Service was received in August from the Federal Treasury Dept.

The Deering Historical Society was honored to accept membership in two State Organizations, 1 - The Association of Historical Societies of N.H. Inc.; 2 - The N.H. Old Grave Yard Association.

Several funding organizations had responded with substantial favor to our submitted proposals regarding the old town garage, but due to unavoidable circumstances it was necessary to abandon the plan. Consequently without a building or a budget--no monies could then be requested.

Therefore, it became essential that the Society immediately shift its focus from an Historical Building to visible and tangible benefits to the Town itself.

- 1. A framed Plaque recording all charter members with the beautiful reverse side of the Town Seal - Artist, Mrs. George Wolf.
- 2. To beautify and improve the Town Common.
- 3. To establish an "Historic Trail" by identifying historic houses and buildings with an artistic marker and date.

Four public meetings and programs were held in the Town Hall.

April - Historic Aspects of Deering - Guest Speaker Mr. Harold Titcomb. An illustrated lecture on the artifacts from the Ira Kimball Place.

- June Slides and Lecture on Nutrition and Foods Guest Speaker Mrs. B. T. Hunter.
- August History of West Deering at the turn of the century with extensive exhibits, pictures, artifacts, etc. Presented by Mrs. Nellie McAlister and her family.
- November Special Program "Where the Wind Blows Free". The historical highlights of Dunbarton. Guest Speakers were Mr. Webster Burn Lane and Mr. Gardner Mills.

Two fund raising projects were conducted with tremendous success -

1. Old-fashioned Country Auction

2. Deering's Historic Cook Book

Future Programs Include:

- 1. March 28th "America the Beautiful", a national organization, will hold a special meeting in the Deering Town Hall with State and National focus and prestige.
- 2. April 11th The Old Grave Yard Assn. will hold its annual State Meeting at the Deering Town Hall.
- 3. Research Project on the Indians of Deering, conducted by the 4th & 5th grades, under the Direction of Mrs. Villa Ramsay.
- 4. Many enjoyable fund raising events are being planned.

It is with sincere appreciation and gratitude to all who have contributed so generously to make this initial year an outstanding success, with anticipation, enthusiasm and participation.

Our theme "History Unites Us For The Future" gives all of us a realistic unity, it is our moment of a new beginning as we stand firmly on the solid foundation of the past - on the people who lived here before us.

MINUTES OF THE TOWN MEETING

MARCH 11, 1980

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Deering qualified to vote in Town Affairs was called to order at 10:00 a.m. in the morning March 11, 1980.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Total ballots cast 175.

Selectman for two years - Raymond L. Farrell - 151.

Selectman for three years - Whitney S. Yeaple - 125, Elected; Carroll E. Greene - 45.

Town Clerk - Eleanor B. Fitzpatrick - 159.

Tax Collector - Eleanor B. Fitzpatrick - 159.

Town Treasurer - Clara T. Rich - 165.

Trustee of Trust Funds for three years - Edna S. Yeaple - 154.

Library Trustee for three years - Connie L. Craighead - 158.

Auditors - Marjorie A. Heath - 142; Marjorie E. Campbell - 125. Moderator for two years - George F. Wolf - 146.

Supervisor of Check List for six years - Evelyn M. Marotta - 156. Hillsboro-Deering Cooperative School District

School Board at Large for three years - Ruth Colby - 87; Darline Crane - 69.

School Board from Deering for three years - Robert T. McWalters - 152.

Moderator - Donald E. Knapton - 129; Frank J. Sylvia - 35.

Article 2. It was voted to adopt the provisions of RSA 466:30-a which makes it unlawful for an owner of any dog licensed or unlicensed to allow said dog to run at large, except when accompanied by the owner or custodian, and when used for hunting, herding, supervised competition or exhibition or training for such. Total ballots cast 159. YES - 87 NO - 72.

At 7:30 p.m. Moderator George F. Wolf opened the meeting with a Salute to the Flag followed by a prayer. Articles 3 through 29 were voted. It was voted that any article once voted upon cannot be brought back or rescinded at the meeting except for technical reasons. The results of the election of Town Officers and School Officials was announced by the Moderator.

Article 3. It was voted to accept the reports of the Town Officers, Agents, Committees and Auditors for the year 1979.

Article 4. It was voted to raise and appropriate the following sums of money: Town Officers Salaries \$10,500.; Town Officers Expenses \$15,000.; Election and Registration \$1,600.; Town Buildings and the purchase of office equipment \$9,000.; Social Security Payments \$4,500.; Insurance \$9,000.; Damages and Legal Expenses \$2,000.; Dog Expenses \$400.; Dumps and Trash Removal \$8,250.; Vital Statistics \$25.; Street Lighting \$1,600.; Library \$35.; Town Poor \$2,000.; Old Age Assistance \$1,000.; Aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled \$1,000.; Cemetery Care \$1,000.; Hillsboro District Nursing Association \$400.; and to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year 1980.

Article 5. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 6. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to auction property taken by Tax Collector's Deeds in accordance with the provisions of RSA 80:42.

Article 7. It was voted to authorize prepayment of resident taxes and to authorize the tax collector to accept prepayments as provided by RSA 80:1-a.

Article 8. It was voted to continue membership in the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$602. for the Town's share of the operating costs of said Commission.

Article 9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800. for the current operating expenses of the Planning Board and the sum of \$350. for the current operating expenses of the Conservation Commission.

Article 10. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500. for continuing and making corrections to the Town Tax Map, which is required by RSA 31:95a.

Article 11. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,500. for the Police Department, the sum of \$6,500. for the Fire Department and the sum of \$200. for Civil Defense.

Article 12. It was voted to raise nad appropriate the sum of \$200. for the support of the Hillsboro Rescue Squad and the sum of \$100. for the Weare Rescue Squad.

Article 13. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500, to continue the renovations of the Town Hall.

Article 14. It was voted to raise and appropriate the following sums of money for Highway purposes: (1) Road Maintenance \$47,500.; (2) General Expenses of the Highway Department \$18,-500.; (3) Road Sealing \$9,000.; and to raise by State Grant, Highway Subsidy, and appropriate the sum of \$13,267.79 to be used for the maintenance of Town Highways under the provisions of RSA 241:14 as amended; and to further raise by State Grant, Highway Subsidy and appropriate the sum of \$11,111.28 to be used for the maintenance of Town Highways under the provisions of RSA 241:15 as amended.

Article 15. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,221.91 to secure Town Road Aid. (State Share \$8,146.08).

Article 16. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500. for a reversible plow for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of \$6,500. for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 17. It was voted to accept Driscoll Road, which runs from Center Range Road to Tubbs Hill Road, as a Class V town highway.

Article 18. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000. for the purpose of entering into a contract with the Department of Revenue Administration of the State of New Hampshire for a complete reassessment of the entire taxable and non-taxable real estate in the Town, and to raise such sum by the issuance of bonds or notes to be repaid over a five (5) year period under and in compliance with the provisions of RSA 33:3b (Municipal Finance Act). Vote YES - 92 NO - 8.

Article 19. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000. as the Town's share of a Communication Dispatch Center to be located in the Town of Hillsborough, to serve the Town's Police and Fire Departments.

Article 20. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. for the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 21. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. for the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 22. It was voted to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced.

Article 23. It was voted to withdraw this article of to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rata increases in the amounts if estimated entitlements are increased or pro-rata reductions in the amounts if the estimated entitlements are reduced.

Article 24. It was voted to convey to Laura M. Johnson, a/k/aLaura Johnson, a thirty (30) foot wide roadway known as Zoski Road, conveyed by Louis J. Fisher and Orvis Fisher to the Town of Deering by deed dated July 9, 1957 and recorded in the Hillsborough County Registry of Deeds in Volume 1519, Page 483, and, in place thereof, accept the conveyance from Laura M. Johnson, a/k/a Laura Johnson, of a fifty (50) foot wide strip shown as "Zoski Road" on "Plan of Lots in Deering, New Hampshire, owned by Laura M. Johnson, R.F.D. 1, Box 164, Hillsborough, N.H. 03244, Scale 1" = 50', June 15, 1979, revised July 31, 1979, Donald R. Mellen, Surveyor, Hillsborough, N.H.", and in addition thereto, accept the conveyance from Laura M. Johnson, a/k/a Laura Johnson, of a fifty (50) foot wide strip shown as "Private Road" on the above mentioned Plan.

Article 25. It was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

Article 26. It was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept or purchase on behalf of the Town any Federal or State surplus fire or highway equipment.

Article 27. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to trade, sell or otherwise dispose of any surplus Town property.

Article 28. It was voted to have the Board of Selectmen select the cover for all Annual Town Reports.

Article 29. Selectman Thomas Allen spoke in praise of Roland F. Cote who has served the Town for seven years as Selectman. A round of applause was given to Mr. Cote in appreciation for his service to the Town. Mr. Cote thanked all elected and appointed officials and the townspeople for their support during his term of service and especially his wife, Rollande Cote.

A round of applause was given to Ernest Johnson for his one year's service to the Town as Selectman.

Mrs. Evangeline Poling read her Historical Committee report which appeared on page 50 of the Town Report. She pointed out the drawing she had on display which showed the projected hopes and plans of the Committee. Announced that the Committee's Co-Chairmen were Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Poling, permanent members were Marjorie Heath and Thomas Copadis and that they used floating committees for individual projects.
