



#### **INAUGURAL ADDRESS**

#### HON. CHARLES G. WALDRON

January 3, 1923

#### GENTLEMEN OF THE CITY COUNCILS:

Complying with custom, I desire to briefly outline the present financial condition of this city, and to suggest my idea of the policies which this administration should adopt.

Our financial statement as of January 1, 1923, is as follows:

#### FINANCIAL SUMMARY

Just a few words in explanation of this treasury decrease. On the first day of January, 1922, the treasurer's balance sheet showed a cash reserve of \$72,798.66. This sum was early reduced to \$59,798.66, by the payment of a check for \$13,000.00 for the new motor-driven combination fire engine contracted for during the preceding year and delivered in the month of January. Thus it will be readily seen that this apparent decrease of \$7,235.92 in the treasury reserve is, in reality, an increase of \$5,764.08 over the actual funds available for ordinary municipal maintenance one year ago.

That we are enabled to show an increase in resources for the year just closed, burdened as it was with many unusual and unforseen demands, is, indeed, most gratifying.

The strike in the Pacific mills throughout practically the entire year called for an expenditure of more than \$6,000.00 in excess of the normal annual requirements for the support of the needy. In addition to this sum,the highway department required an extra appropriation to continue operations, aggregating \$7,000.00; the Wentworth hospital was relieved of a deficit of \$5,856.58—largely occasioned by the industrial situation and consequent lack of patronage; the Cemetery department was granted an additional appropriation of \$500.00, and the increase in salaries in the teaching force of our public schools made a further reduction (\$1,720.00) necessary in our unappropriated revenues.

Yet notwithstanding these calls for financial relief subsequent to the passage of the annual budget, we find the balance at the close of the year on the right side of the ledger, and that, too, without impairment of a single municipal interest.

On January 1, 1922, the debt of this city was \$275,000. This was reduced \$25,000 in spite of a hard industrial year. Let me suggest that our citizens who are called upon to pay the taxes are still suffering from the effects of the depression of the past year and they expect us to appropriate and expend funds in such a manner that the debt may be further reduced and at the same time reduce the taxes. I strongly urge you to refuse appropriations for any improvements which will fall short of being an absolute necessity. The various departments of the city are well equipped, and while there may be many opportunities of improvement in apparatus, etc., let us make every effort to get through this vear without spending any of the tax payers' money for unnecessary betterments.

The streets and roads in Dover are a disgrace. I recommend that some method be provided, either by legislation or through the finance committee, which will give the Mayor and City Government some authority and responsibility in regard to the Highway Department.

During the year 1923 Dover will celebrate the three hundredth anniversary of its settlement. It will be our duty and pleasure to make this Tercentenary the greatest celebration ever held in this city.

Gentlemen, I sincerely hope that this administration will be economical, and that the city tax rate will be reduced.

## ANNUAL REPORT

### OF THE

# Joint Standing Committee on Fire Department

GENTLEMEN OF THE CITY COUNCILS:

Your joint standing committee on fire department feels that it should submit a brief summary of the year's achievements, in order that the principal departmental activities for the past twelve months, not elsewhere cited, may be placed on permanent record.

The seven hundred fifty gallon Ahrens-Fox Triple Combination, purchased last year and delivered early in the month of January, was given the Underwriters' test at the Central avenue bridge, and satisfactorily passed all requirements.

This piece of apparatus proved its efficiency at Back River, where it pumped water a distance of 3,950 feet up hill, and prevented the destruction of several buildings, as well as a large area of valuable young growth.

Through the courtesy of the water commissioners the pump has been equipped with a hydrant thawing device, which will thaw out a hydrant in a very few minutes. This device will form a valuable addition to the department equipment should a frozen hydrant be encountered.

A new fire alarm box has been installed at Gage's Hill, giving to property holders on both the old and new Rochester roads the protection they have so long desired.

By transferring a pair of horses to the street

commissioner, the department has been relieved of a fixed charge, which enabled it, during the past year, to purchase new rubber coats for the entire fire-fighting force, also new rims and tires for the front wheels of the White Combination. These purchases, particularly the coats, had come to be a necessity.

Through the efficiency of the department we have suffered no serious conflagration during the past twelve months, and our fire loss has been reduced fully fifty per cent. from the loss of the previous year. The property endangered during the past year reached a total of \$434,525.00, yet the net loss was only \$3,195.65, a per capita of only twenty-four and one-half cents.

During the year the department answered twenty-three general, eighty-two still and nine engineers' alarms.

Your committee would strongly recommend the purchase of a motor-driven ladder truck to replace the present horse-drawn equipment. The truck now in use has been in service thirty-five years and is now in bad condition. Its early replacement would be in the interest of both safety and efficiency.

New fire hose is also urgently needed, and we would also recommend that the school authorities purchase a fire alarm box for each of the school buildings, and have them installed at once.

## TYPHOID FEVER

During the year 1922 there were but three cases of typhoid fever reported, a gratifying reduction in the number of persons afflicted with this disease, as compared with the twelve cases reported in the previous year. One of the two deaths attributed to this cause occurred outside the compact part of the city. The source of contagion was indeterminate; the well water and milk supplied were subjected to analysis, with negative results, and the most searching investigation failed to reveal the origin of the disease.

### DIPHTHERIA

Seven cases of diphtheria were reported to the board of health, fortunately with no resultant deaths. The record for 1921 showed eleven cases and two deaths.

One of the seven persons afflicted with this disease was an inmate of the Children's home. The patient

was immediately isolated, with a trained nurse, and cultures were taken of all persons liable to infection. These cultures all showed negative, and fortunately no other cases appeared at the institution.

## MILK SUPPLY

A campaign having for its object the improvement of our local milk supply was inaugurated June 1st, the beginning of the legal "milk year." Through the columns of the public press, and by personal solicitation, all persons concerned in the production and sale of milk were instructed to take out licenses for that purpose, and otherwise comply with the ordinances of the city and the laws of the State relative thereto.

I would recommend that a special appropriation be provided for the enforcement of the laws governing the production and sale of milk, the collection of samples and a survey of the widely separated dairies.

There are certain prerequisites to the maintenance of a satisfactory standard in the care of milk, which should be observed by both the producer and the dealer. The fundamentals will have been quite clearly established if those concerned in its production and sale would see that their product is at all times kept *cool*, *clean and covered*.

Bacteria is always in evidence. It makes no difference if every possible precaution is taken in milking, they cannot be entirely eliminated. If milk is allowed to stand even for a brief period after drawing, without cooling, thousands of bacteria will develop. Milk must be kept cool. While the visual evidence of contamination can be removed by straining, yet the bacteria and soluble filth are unaffected by even the finest screen. Every possible precaution should be taken to keep the dirt out; it cannot always be strained out.

## WATER SUPPLY

Samples have been taken from our municipal water supply at different periods, for submission to the State chemist, with the following results:

January 25—Good condition indicated.

February 16—Satisfactory quality. (Three samples from widely separated areas.)

April 5—Satisfactory quality.

May 24—Normal quality; shows no evidence of contamination.

July 24—Shows slight fecal contamination.

August 9—Unfavorable analysis; bacteria of fecal origin being present in substantial numbers.

August 18—Results unfavorable; evidence of fecal infection is undesirably pronounced.

August 21—Results continue to be unfavorable.

September 11—Satisfactory quality.

October 5—Passable. A slight trace of fecal contamination noted.

October 9—Satisfactory. A very slight excess of iron indicated.

October 31—Good analysis. (Dead end.)

The distinct drop in the quality of our local water supply, due obviously to exceptionally heavy rain falls and the consequent scouring of the water shed, occasioned considerable uneasiness. Corrective measures have been taken to avoid a recurrence of the July and August disturbances.

During the year field surveys have been made of Willand pond, as well as other sources of supply, generally in company with the superintendent of the water department.

#### SANITARY INSPECTIONS

This work has been given special attention throughout the year. It covers quite a wide range, and includes the placarding of houses during periods of infection, the fumigating of rooms, the inspection of tenements, plumbing, drainage, yards, restaurants, bakeries, delivery wagons, stables, school buildings, etc., the investigation of complaints, the abatement of nuisances, and the removal of dead animals.

## ASHES AND REFUSE MATERIAL

The collection of ashes and refuse material during the past year has reached a higher daily average than for any previous similar period. By utilizing convenient dumping places, an average of fifteen loads of ashes was collected and disposed of each day during the month of December. It would have been impossible to maintain this service with one team, if the department had been compelled to make long hauls.

#### INCINERATOR

The incinerator is taking care of all refuse and combustible material collected by the department or delivered by private conveyances. A daily record has been kept of the quantities of refuse material destroyed, which reached a surprising total. Of the 10,219 loads of material destroyed, 3,778 were hauled to the incinerator in auto trucks, 6,441 by teams, including the 2,445 loads delivered by the department. The building is open during the cold months of the year from 7 a. m. to 12 m., and from 1 to 5 p. m., with a man constantly in charge. The house is open during the summer months from 7 a. m. to 5 p. m.

All material collected from infected premises has been destroyed under the personal supervision of the executive officer.

## CLEAN-UP CAMPAIGN

The May clean-up week has become an annual event, and is constantly growing in popular favor. A fall clean-up week was inaugurated last October, which met with even greater favor than the spring campaign. A total of 317 loads of material was collected in the spring campaign, and 331 loads in the October clean-up.

#### TUBERCULOSIS CLINIC

The tuberculosis clinic held during the past year shows that much has been accomplished toward combatting the progress of the white scourge. The clinics have been held under the immediate direction of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association and the local board of health. The staff consists of Robert B. Kerr, M. D., of Manchester, N. H., examining

physician, Elona M. Crough, field nurse, and Merle R. Lord, county and district nurse. Patients have been examined from Milton, Milton Mills, Strafford Bow Lake, Farmington, Somersworth, Durham, Rollinsford and Dover.

The clinic continues to do good work, quietly, without unnecessary publicity. Diseases requiring the particular treatment vouchsafed by this clinic are not easily cured, but the general opinion is that even if there is repeated new infection, the spread of the disease is controlled and the public correspondingly protected.

Fewer cases of a migratory type have been treated than heretofore. Excellent work has also been done in the treatment of children whose eyesight had become seriously affected. If for no other reason, the clinic has justified its existence in the care and treatment of these juvenile victims of parental selfindulgence.

The general public should appreciate this protection, and in every way, through co-operation and an understanding attitude, aid the workers to make the clinic still more effective and far-reaching in its ministrations.

In requiring physicians to report diseases of this class coming under their observation, the law does not impose a corresponding obligation to make such information public. In fact, the regulations suggest that officials charged with the care and supervision of persons thus afflicted, should observe a discreet silence as to the name of the beneficiary and the nature of the disease.

A municipality has not effectively equipped itself for the attack upon venereal diseases until it has acquired some available place for the isolation and treatment of potential carriers.

# "SAM"

The roan gelding purchased in the spring of 1911 for use in the department died early in the summer and was replaced, by authority of the city councils, by a horse purchased of Edwin L. Corson.

Each year develops new obligations and new problems, yet with rational investigation and broadened experience we approach these problems with renewed confidence, and, we trust, with resultant benefits to the public, whose interests it is our duty and our pleasure to anticipate and to protect.

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit herewith the annual report of the city marshal, police department, Dover, N. H., for the year ending December 31st, 1922.

During the year just past there have been some changes in the personnel of the department, Patrolmen Edward S. Young and Edgar Caverly having resigned, Reserve Officer Edward McDonough was promoted to regular officer, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Officer Young, and Reserve Officer Everett L. Towle to fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of Officer Caverly.

The department has installed a gong at the corner of Central avenue and Orchard street and one at the intersection of Central avenue and Broadway. These gongs are connected with the fire houses, to be blown when the department is called into service, as a warning to the public of the approach of the fire apparatus. We believe this addition will prove of great benefit to the public.

The debt is now \$70,000.00. The notes representing this indebtedness, call for the payment of \$15,000.00 per year for the years 1923 to 1926 inclusive, leaving \$10,000.00 to be paid in the year 1927, when the water debt will have been liquidated.

#### FILTER BEDS AND RECEIVING BASIN

During the year both filter beds have been filled with clean sand, besides the periodical scrapings and cleaning of the top of the beds. The receiving basin has been emptied and given a thorough cleaning.

We are planning to cement the bottom, which is at present of an earthy substance and difficult to clean, thus obviating the aquatic growth which is more or less injurious to the water. We also contemplate replacing the fence around the receiving basin with a new one.

#### HYDRANTS

We have purchased a steam thawing device for hydrants, and it has been installed on the steam fire pump.

Eight four and one-half steamer connection hydrant barrels have been purchased to replace those with only two and one-half inch hose nozzels located largely in the outlying district.

A liquid chlorine apparatus has been ordered through the advice of the State board of health and the consent of the city councils. We expect it will be received and installed in the near future, and will serve as an additional safeguard should the water supply become contaminated.

#### **EXTENSIONS**

Extensions to our mains have been made at Gage's corner, also on Florence, Merry and Cocheco streets.

#### WATER SUPPLY

On December 31, 1922, the height of the water in Willand pond measured fifty-five and three-quarters inches above the so-called zero point.

The Buick truck, purchased at the beginning of the year, has proved a valuable asset for the department, as compared with the slow going horse-drawn equipment used in former years.

A detailed statement of the work done this year,

the changes and improvements made, the receipts, expenditures, and the amount of uncollected rates, may be found in the superintendent's report, which is annexed to and made a part of this report.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS:

Herewith is presented the thirty-fifth annual report of the superintendent, showing the present condition of the department, the extensions and improvements made, with a statement, in detail, of the receipts and expenditures, abatements and uncollected water rates, for the year 1922.

The pumping units at the high pressure station are both in good condition. Except for a few minor repairs nothing was needed at this station. At the low pressure station the motor-driven centrifugal pump in well No. 1 has run constantly during the year. I would renew my recommendation of last year that the motor-driven eight hundred gallon pump, in well No. 2, be replaced with a pulley-driven five hundred gallon pump to be connected with the kerosene engine. This substitution would, in my opinion, result in the saving of the cost of the new pump in a few years, and place this station in better condition to meet any emergency that may arise.

We were favored this year with an abundant supply of water. The level of the water in Willand pond reached its highest point in August, sixty-six inches above the zero point. At the close of the year it was fifty-five and three-quarters inches above, or twenty-three and three-quarters inches higher than last year at the same time.

An analysis of five samples of water by the State chemist in December last, shows it free from the trace of bacteria with which we were troubled during the summer months, and which the State board of health attributed to what they described as the weak spot in our system, Willand pond, from contamination incident to the parks and cottages on the shores, and from nuisances committed by the considerable number of people who roam along its shores. Steps should be taken, so far as possible, to eliminate this condition.

Our distributing system has been extended two hundred feet at Gage's hill section, and one hydrant added. Four hundred and twenty-eight feet of sixinch cast-iron pipe were laid on the old Rochester road, connection being made with the Central avenue line. The prospect is favorable for the erection of several houses on what is known as "Gilman Heights." Connection was made with Central avenue main, and two hundred and forty-six feet of sixinch cast-iron pipe laid to supply this section with water when needed. A part of what is known as the "Hill field." between Hill and Oak streets, has been laid out into house lots and three houses built. Connection was made with the Florence street pipe and seventy-eight feet of four-inch pipe laid. Four hundred and sixty-eight feet of four-inch cast-iron pipe were laid on Watson street to supply the new cemetery with water.

The following laterals were laid: One hundred and fifteen feet of one and one-half inch, five hundred and thirteen feet of one and one-quarter inch, and two hundred and twenty-five feet of one-inch wrought-iron pipe on Pearl and Cocheco streets, and old Rochester road.

It was the intention of the department this year

to replace the barrels of several of the hydrants on th outskirts of the city with those fitted with steamer nozzels. Eight of these barrels have been delivered, but owing to the failure to ship the necessary caps, we were compelled to postpone the work to another season. This arrangement will furnish the Ahrens-Fox steam pumping engine with an abundant supply of water for practically every emergency. The water department purchased a steam hydrant-thawing device, which has been installed on the Ahrens-Fox steam pumping engine.

The sand in both filter beds has been renewed at a cost of about \$1,000.00.

A start has been made to raise a number of our hydrants to conform to the change in grade of the streets, which has resulted in a much needed improvement.

On February 28, 1922, the department purchased a one and one-half ton Reo truck, to take the place of the horse and wagon formerly in use. The cost of up-keep for the remaining ten months of the year was \$209.62, or at the rate of sixty-eight and five-tenths cents per day. This cost included several accessories, such as horn, curtains for the cab, etc. The total distance traveled was 4,725 miles. The stable account for our horse and wagon for the same period of time in 1921, was \$441.50; for shoeing horse, repairs to wagon, harness, etc., \$96.65; for veterinary service, \$30.50; making a total cost of \$568.65, or a rate of \$1.85 per day.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

#### GENTLEMEN OF THE CITY COUNCILS:

We have the honor to submit herewith the seventeenth annual report of the board of trustees of the Wentworth hospital, for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1922.

In order that any hospital may properly function. it must be prepared at all times to meet the demands made upon it. As it will be seen from an examination of the foregoing table, substantially twentyfive per cent. of the patients admitted come under the classification of either accident, emergency or ambulance cases. There is no time within the twenty-four hours of the day, when patients of these classes are debarred from admission. Every facility of the hospital is at their service day or night. meet the exactions of these cases, trained attendants are absolutely essential. The needs of the patient will not permit delay in securing such attendants: they must be ready to meet the patient upon his arrival. To maintain a competent staff of assistants to meet the varied requirements of the institution. without unnecessarily increasing the payroll, is one of the many complex problems the management is called upon to solve.

# The Reflex of Industrial Conditions in Hospital Management.

The attraction of vocational work in practically every line of endeavor, makes it more and more difficult to secure pupil nurses, as well as employes in other branches of hospital work, and correspondingly affects the operating costs of the institution.

#### Free Service.

The number of days of free and partially free service rendered and the number of days' service for which established rates have been charged, during the seventeen years the hospital has been in operation, are presented in the following table.

During the seventeen years the hospital has been established, it has rendered the equivalent of four hundred thirty-four years, eight months and seven day of actual service to patients, of which ninety-three years, two months and eight days have been rendered absolutely free. Reduced to percentages, it is in evidence that twenty-one and five-tenths of this service has been rendered "without fee or reward," and it can also be seen by reference to the foregoing table, that practically twenty per cent. of the remainder only paid a fractional part of the established rates.

The value of this free service to the community cannot be computed. It is a fair assumption that a person whose circumstances are such as to render him unable to assume the nominal charge of hospital service, would also be unable to secure elsewhere that professional care and attention so vitally essential to his needs.

We have no desire to exploit the charitable work of this institution, but have incorporated the above facts in this report, in order that the public might have some definite evidence that its contribution toward the maintenance of the Wentworth Hospital was not without its reward.

#### GLADYS ROLLINS MEMORIAL BUILDING

The Gladys Rollins Memorial Home for Nurses, a building made possible through the benevolence of Mr. Edward W. Rollins, was completed early in the summer of 1922, and formally dedicated with appropriate ceremonies.

The completed structure is not only ideal in its arrangement and location, but perfect in its appointments and forms an important addition to Dover's public buildings.

To those who contributed so generously to the furnishings and equipment of the Home, the thanks of the entire community are due. The superintendent, in her annual report to the board of trustees, hereto annexed, submits a complete list of the contributors, whose names are thus placed upon perpetual record.

The total cost of the building was \$85,064.90; subdivided as follows: General contractor, \$62,-037.98; plumbing, \$7,409.50; heating, \$6,061.00; electrical work and fixtures, \$3,149.58; screens, \$725.00; weather stripping, \$60.00; architect's fees, \$3,900.00; insurance, \$158.15; retaining wall and grading of grounds, \$1,563.69.

#### GENERAL

The rooms in the administration building vacated by the nurses who are now domiciled in the Memorial building, have been converted into and properly equipped for general hospital uses, thus correspondingly enlarging the professional scope of the institution.

The enlargement of the obstetric ward, also made possible by the segregation of the nurses in a separate building, meets the steadily growing needs of this class of patients, and adds materially to the requirements of the hospital and the convenience and comfort of those who seek its ministrations.

In the death of George P. Morgan, M. D., which occurred on the eighth day of November last, the dean of the surgical staff passed to his reward. Connected with the Wentworth hospital since its opening, his rare surgical skill and broadened knowledge of therapeutics contributed in no small measure to the high technical standing of the institution in which he ever manifested a deep professional interest.

For details of administration, professional and financial, you are respectfully referred to the reports of the superintendent and treasurer, which are hereto attached and made a part of this report.

The year 1922 was a busy and eventful one in the history of the hospital. The completion of the Gladys Rollins Memorial Home, with the resultant enlargement of the bed capacity of the hospital, made many changes necessary.

The old maternity department, consisting originally of five beds, was transferred to the wing formerly occupied by the nurses, giving a four bed ward and twelve private rooms, with two nurseries and two delivery rooms for the care of this class of patients, and those of us who have struggled with lack of proper accommodations in years past, are very appreciative of the change. This building had to be thoroughly renovated and a call system installed. This system, the Holzer Cabot, is one of the most efficient call systems, and is so designed that the up-keep is reduced to a minimum.

The old maternity department was in sad need of paint, as it had been too constantly occupied to permit the giving up of any space for repair work. Walls, ceilings and woodwork were done over and linoleum laid on the floors, and we now have a very good children's department, with a capacity of fourteen beds, furnished through the generosity of four of our citizens. This enlargement has been long desired by the hospital, which, of course, has cared for children, but has never been properly equipped in regard to rooms. The children were domiciled in adult wards or private rooms, frequently to the annoyance of other patients.

We have had a thorough overhauling of our high and low pressure boilers, and the high pressure boiler had to have some very extensive, as well as expensive, work done. The boiler furnishes steam for the laundry and sterilizers and heats the water for all service. It is in constant use summer and winter, day and night.

Our laundry equipment, after sixteen years' service, is inadequate for our requirements, and additional equipment is needed. It is difficult to secure laundry help, and experienced laundry people do not want to work with out antiquated equipment.

The intercommunicating telephone system has become so worn out that it cannot be repaired, and a new system is very much needed. We find it difficult to get on without this telephone in proper working order. The plugs used for bed bells and extension lights are no longer manufactured, and a new call system, similar to that in the maternity department, would save both time and money.

The private rooms in the administration building need painting, and the walls in many places are cracked and unsightly.

The Gladys Rollins Memorial Home has made it possible for us to take care of more patients, and the overcrowded conditions have disappeared. nurses in the training school have complete freedom and relaxation now when off duty, and can indulge in the pleasures of a home, where their amusements will not annoy the sick. There has been much to do, and there still remain readjustments, but we have done the best we could do with the time and help we could secure. The tablets to mark the rooms named by the donors have not yet been secured, but this can be done now. The laboratory has to be equipped, and one or two important additions made to operating room equipment I wish to thank the board for all co-operation and courtesies extended, and I hope the year 1923 will, under our changed conditions, be our most successful hospital year.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

TO THE CITY COUNCILS OF THE CITY OF DOVER:

The board of trustees of the Dover public library respectfully report that they have performed their duties for the year 1922 and have carefully considered needs and scrutinized expenses. The bill for repairs on the building is larger than for several years, as considerable work had to be done on the roof, which had been injured by snow and ice. New fencing has also been put up, and new steel shelves added to provide for growth in the circulating department. During the coming year new shelving will be needed in the Historical Room, and the floors and walls of the building, now worn and dingy from fifteen years' use, should be cleaned and re-treated.

The trustees record with deep sorrow the death of one member of their board, Mr. Elisha R. Brown, who died December 25, after long illness. He had been a trustee for fifteen years, and notwithstanding many demands upon his time, was unfailing in his active service to the library and interest in its progressive development. He made valuable gifts to it, and his judgment and advice in all matters were highly esteemed by his associates.

The event of outstanding importance in the year's growth was the purchase in the spring of 150 new steel shelves for the book stacks. The old stacks had long been overcrowded, and the new shelves were a great relief. They had to be distributed through the different classes of books, and this made necessary the moving up and rearrangement of about 20,000 volumes and led to the discarding of a large number of worn out and unused bound magazines and books. All this was a process of some time and labor, but once accomplished has been of great convenience to all users of the library.

#### THE YEAR'S WORK

The circulation for the year has been 75.355 volumes, of which 58,834 were from the main library and 16,521 from the children's room. This is an increase of 2562 over that of last year and is a very creditable increase, considering the fact that the population of the city has suffered loss, owing to the removal from town of many families during the long continued mill strike. The increase in numbers, however, bears little proportion to the great increase in work each year. Demands on the time of the assistants are larger, requests for individual help are more insistent and of wider range, and reference work for high school pupils steadily claims more skill and patience. To meet these increasing demands, while caring for the average daily circulation of about 250 volumes, the assistants have responded ably and willingly, but have often been severely taxed in time and strength.

One large exhibition has been held during the year, that of a display of gladioli from the gardens of Herbert E. Meader. The flowers were of great beauty as well as technical interest, there being nearly a hundred labeled varieties. The show attracted many garden lovers and brought unaccustomed visitors to the library. In November was observed the annual children's book week, with its exhibit of charmingly illustrated children's books. This called in many parents as well as children, who made lists for Christmas giving.

In midsummer the library entertained, as it had for several years, the class studying library science at the summer school held at New Hampshire College. It comprised librarians and assistants from different libraries in the State who desired to become more familiar with modern methods and principles of administration, in order to raise the standard of library service in their home communities. They studied attentively the working of this library in all its details, showing especial interest in book selection and picture work. Refreshments were served and the class returned to their homes with, they said, renewed confidence in the possibilities of library work and leaving here pleasant memories of their interest and appreciation.

#### A LOOK FORWARD

As the important event of the city during the coming year will be the celebration of the 300th anniversary of its settlement, it is fitting that the library should prepare for the demands upon its historical material sure to be made, and that even now are beginning to come. In the Historical room already may be found a full set of the city publications, its reports beginning with the first town report, dated 1835, a set of directories, the first dated 1830, a full file of the Dover Enquirer, the first dated 1828, and many volumes of the Dover Sun, one of the earliest newspapers of the State, the first one dated 1796, many volumes of Foster's Democrat; also the Dover Gazette, the Dover Republican and other newspapers no longer published. The different departments and interests of the city are also well represented. are school reports dating back to 1850, accounts of early schools, as the landing school, the old high school, and Franklin Academy; also material relating to the early fire companies, military organizations, secret societies, charitable institutions, clubs and societies, and church history. All this material. which has been steadily collected ever since the

Historical room was established, is carefully catalogued and kept ready for reference; but during the coming year especial attention should be given to this work; existing gaps should be filled and another bookcase placed in the room to relieve the present congested condition of the shelves. It is the purpose of the library to make, at the time of the celebration in August, an exhibition of pictures and maps and documents relating to the historical development of the city from the time of the early settlers to the present: of especial interest will be a collection of photographs of Dover citizens past and present. This collection has been made by keeping cuts from printed articles, by personal solicitation, and especially by gifts from two local photographers who have gone out of business. It now numbers over 1500 portraits, and will be increased. These pictures never fail to interest old citizens, and especially returning sons and daughters of the town.

Much of the contents of the Historical room, which besides Dover matter contains New Hampshire and genealogical material, has been obtained without the expenditure of money, it being the result of care in collecting and of gifts from persons interested in the preservation of books or pamphlets they owned, but had no further use for.

But each year the library has made some one or two purchases for the room that should be of permanent value. That the money thus expended has been wisely used is evident from the present value of the collection, for if the contents of the room were put on the market today they would bring thousands of dollars. As instances of the increasing value of some of the works, the following examples may be cited: Savage's Genealogical Dictionary in four volumes; the library paid twenty dollars for the set some years ago. It is now listed in sales cata-

logues at seventy-five dollars. Other examples are the Historical and Genealogical Register, for which the library paid \$110 for the first 50 volumes and has since kept the file complete; it now lists at \$400; and the complete collection of New Hampshire law reports, the first 30 volumes of which came as a gift from the estate of Frank Hobbs. It is now almost unobtainable at any price, but at private sale some time ago brought \$750. Many single volumes have also increased in value. One New Hampshire town history purchased for six dollars now brings thirty. A volume of Massachusetts history that came to us a gift now lists at forty dollars. Town histories are more likely to increase in value than to depreciate. for the editions are usually small and they eagerly sought by libraries and collectors. own collection of New Hampshire town histories is nearly complete and is the largest in the State, with the possible exception of the collections in the New Hampshire Historical Library and the State Library at Concord. In addition to the people in town and out of town who consult the room in person, many inquiries come by mail to be answered from material found here. Within the past few weeks letters seeking information have been received from persons living in Connecticut, New Jersey, Georgia and California. It is certain that any historical exhibition that the library can make will be of great interest to a large number of people.

To the assistants, Miss Jenkins in charge of the circulation, Miss Parker in charge of the children's room, Miss Morrill in charge of cataloging and Miss Devin in charge of reference work, public acknowledgment is due for the excellence and efficiency of their work; and to the trustees the librarian desires to express her appreciation of the friendly relations that have existed year after year, and to express the

hope that the work of the library may increase and expand until every person in the community may feel its influence and realize its value.

#### ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

#### SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

#### TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE:

We have had the same teachers for a long term of years, and no innovations or experiments have been attempted. Under such conditions the classroom work tends to reach a fairly high degree of excellence and remain so from year to year, so long as teachers read and study the literature of their profession, keep their minds open to suggested improvements, and, day by day, develop a greater love for children and a broader conception of their call-Under a graded salary schedule, and tenure of office, with no financial stimulus to excel, there is some danger that teachers may fall into a rut and grind out work in treadmill fashion. Unfortunately, there is a growing tendency in these days among teachers to regard their calling more as a trade than as a profession, to render service measured by the dollar, rather than to be willing to give their time and their talent freely, beyond any possible pecuniary reward. We should be loth to blame them for this, when we reflect how exacting the public has been in its unreasonable demands upon the teachers. and how pitifully inadequate has been the teacher's pay. We have every reason to hope that a better day has come. The teacher's work is beginning to be recognized at something like its true value and a corresponding appreciation shown in financial terms.

#### PROFESSIONAL ORGANIZATIONS

About half a dozen of our teachers belong to the National Educational Association. This number is not as large as it ought to be. There are many advantages to be gained by the teacher from membership in this organization. The magazine published by it is well worth the two dollars required as annual dues for membership. It is doubtful if a teacher will acquire, in any other way than by reading this publication, a proper conception of what education means viewed from a national standpoint, and she certainly will be ignorant of many important movements going on in other States unless she reads it. Not to belong to this body of teachers savors strongly of provincialism, narrow views, limited usefulness.

We are all enrolled, 100 per cent. strong, in the New Hampshire State Teachers' Association. This organization holds a meeting each year, in October, alternately, in the cities of Manchester and Concord. This meeting is full of inspiration, and furnishes specific instruction as well in the teaching of all subjects. It is hardly possible to overestimate the good which we bring home from this annual gathering in the fall.

The Strafford County Teachers' Association is composed principally of the teachers of Dover, Rochester and Somersworth. It holds two meetings each year. All of our teachers belong and practically all attend the meetings, which are of much the same character as the State Teachers' meeting, only on a smaller scale.

Our local Dover Teachers' Association, comprising all the teachers of the city, has been under the very successful leadership of Mrs. Ella M. Folsom for two years. It has been the means within the year of bringing to our city two educators of national reputation: Mr. Angelo Patri of New York and Mr. Alfred E. Stearns, principal of Andover Academy, Andover, Mass. Certainly the cause of education within our city profited much from the words of these two gifted men.

At other meetings of the Association I have talked to the teachers upon the many details connected with the class room work and have suggested many necessary improvements. The Association holds, each fall, a reception, to the new teachers, at which we all get together for an evening of social pleasure and entertainment. This organization deserves, and has enjoyed, the loyal support of all our teachers.

#### PHYSICAL TRAINING

The question of physical education in our schools is one to which I have called attention in previous reports, recommending the employment of a director of physical training. I do not mean by this merely a coach for the athletic teams in the high school: I mean more than that. The boys and girls in all the grades need physical training, need playgrounds, need a director for their plays and games, need playground equipment of which we have so little. The little people need as much attention directed toward their proper physical development as the high school pupils do. And the high school pupils who are not on the athletic teams need as much attention as those who play on the teams. In other words, all the children in the schools should have this side of their education taken care of. people of the next generation will wonder what we are thinking of to neglect so important a part of the education of our children. Our schools should give more than the three "R's." The chairman of the school committee has recommended that action be

taken along this line. Thinking people believe it a wise and necessary step to take. It would cost very little money and would mean a healthier and happier generation in the years to come.

#### TRANSPORTATION

There is ample room for improvement to be made in our educational system in this respect. Many of our young children must ride long distances to and from school every day in cold and stormy weather. Their parents have a right to expect that they be properly protected. They are not so protected at present. They never have been and they never will be until the city purchases the necessary conveyances.

#### THE CO-OPERATION OF THE SCHOOLS

We are assailed each year by a host of agents representing publishing houses, lyceum bureaus, photographers, and many other mercantile establishments. They all desire "the co-operation of the schools." It would be a very desirable thing to grant it in some cases which are deserving and worthy. The committee rules, however, allow no discrimination to be made, and forbid the taking of any collection in the schools or the sale of any article. This is a wise rule and, in my judgment, any exception to it should rarely, if ever, be made.

#### THE HIGH SCHOOL

I am glad to report that the work of this department of our educational system continues to function with an unbroken record of success. I do not mean that the school is without a flaw; I mean that a headmaster of tireless industry, and a corps of competent teachers, have made it an institution to be proud of, and one of which many good things may be said and about which there is little to criticize. The school is larger now than it ever was before, and

is hampered by lack of rooms for some of the classes. I have pointed out in previous reports the remarkable growth of the mechanic arts department. Five years ago there were enrolled in this department only 25 pupils and the equipment was meagre. There was one teacher. Today we have about 75 pupils, good equipment, and three teachers. have added to the equipment this year, among other things, two lathes, a power hack saw, a dividing head, a band saw, and a jointer. A fine radio outfit has been acquired also. We are quite seriously handicapped in this department because we have not been able to set up the six new forges which we purchased some time ago. The difficulty is over the question as to whether the draft of the heating plant would be seriously interfered with by piping these forges into the chimney. Some way out of the difficulty should be found soon. We are still working in this department under the Smith-Hughes act. This type of education seems to be popular, and great credit is due the three instructors for the success they have achieved.

It is a very great pleasure to express to the school committee my very sincere appreciation of their support, which has been given me in a manly and unwavering fashion during the five years I have been superintendent. No man could ask to work under a more competent and fair-minded board. Free from petty bickerings and strife, the companionship and the work have been a pleasure. The result has been that the schools are at present in what may fairly be termed "the pink of condition."

SIR:—I herewith submit my fifth annual report of the Dover high school.

The large attendance, in the past year, has justified the increase in the teaching corps. During the summer months a careful survey of the probable attendance in the high school for the year of 1922 and 1923, was made, and the pupils were so distributed in the classs that the smallest possible number might be registered with the different teachers. This arrangement has greatly relieved congestion, and has improved the character and quality of the class room work. Individual attention cannot be given, in most cases, to students in a class period of forty-four minutes. The divisions are too large for this kind of work. However, all teachers have kindly volunteered to return in the afternoon, at

stated times, to assist pupils in their school work. Many of the young people have availed themselves of this opportunity for self help. Generally, parents have co-operated with the teachers in their endeavors to improve the class work of the students. The boys and girls through teachers, parents and interested friends, should be made to realize that the present age demands men and women of thought and action. The secondary school, supported at public expense, should give a training in the varied fields of activity which will prepare the youth to enter life, after graduation, ready for usefulness in the world. This city has sensed the situation and has appropriated money to purchase material, and to retain teachers of experience and technical training to carry on the work of the class room.

The result of such action, on the part of the citizens, is reflected in the large number of our graduates who have entered institutions of collegiate grade. According to statistics of recent date, Dover has more students in New Hampshire College, with possibly one exception, than any other high school in the State. This should prove conclusively to the public that the graduates of the high school are anxious to fit themselves for service.

This table will show that over ninety and onefourth per cent. of the 1922 graduates entered the high school in September. The attendance has increased over the average of that of former years. However, the public should not feel satisfied, until nearly all of the grammar graduates enter some department of the secondary school.

Reference has been made elsewhere in this report to the money which has been raised by taxation, that the young might obtain a liberal education. Parents should make even greater sacrifices to keep their children in school. Education, under normal conditions, is the open door to success in life.

#### MECHANIC ARTS PROGRAM

The work in this department has been under the supervision of Mr. Dustin, the sub-master, subject to the approval of the headmaster and the superintendent of schools.

Mr. Pierce, supervisor of trades and industries, a member of the State educational staff, has visited and inspected this section of our school curricula. at two different times during the fall term, and has reported, in part, as follows:

#### ADMINISTRATION

"The time conforms to the Smith-Hughes requirements, the boys coming back four afternoons per week for two hours each to make up extra time. The new schedule for mechanical drawing has been adopted this year.

#### PUPILS

"I observed the pupils were doing good work, were industrious, and were subject to improved discipline.

#### CONCLUSION

"The general condition of the school, together with the equipment, is much better than that of last year. In conference with Superintendent Wignot, he said that the lacks in the equipment would soon be supplied. Headmaster Wallace said that the schedule could be so arranged that senior and junior classes would be divided, making smaller classes where they now come together for the fourth period in machine shop practice. He said that the change would be made at once."

#### SHOP PROJECTS

The list below will give shop projects:

#### WOODWORK

Suit hangers, necktie racks, meat boards, cake boards, broom holders, nail boxes, towel racks, knife and fork boxes, paper knives, camp stools, picture frames, tool boxes, flasks, fork racks, book cases, stationery holders, sleds, cabinets, T-squares, medicine cabinets, hall lamps, sewing screens, serving trays, foot stools, umbrella stands, victrola stands, telephone stands, magazine tables, library tables, piano benches, flower boxes, step ladder, plant stands, sleds, typewriting tables, etc.

#### WOODTURNING

Candle sticks, smoking stands, trays, handles, towel rollers, chair rounds, roters and forms for radio equipment.

#### MACHINE SHOP PRACTICE

Spur and cup centers for lathes, arbors for milling machine, jacks, parallels, repairing parts for planer, construction of radio equipment, repair parts for mitre boxes, and vise screws.

#### VISITATION NIGHT

On the evening of October 29, the parents and friends of the pupils were invited to visit the various departments of the high school, and to meet the teachers. The visitors were especially urged to in-

spect the work of the mechanic arts department. Doubtless the visit will be of mutual benefit to parents and teachers. This phase of school work is expensive, and will call for larger appropriations in the future, but, under proper management, it should give technical training to boys of mechanical tendencies. The pupils have made many useful articles for the home. The only expense to the parent or pupil in the manufacture of the finished product is the bare cost of the material used. Through co-operation, satisfactory results should be obtained from the training in this department.

#### DOMESTIC ARTS PROGRAM

### Pupils:

Seniors 5 or approximately 6.6% of the class. Juniors 3 or approximately 3% of the class. Sophomores 8 or approximately 8% of the class. Freshmen 15 or approximately 10% of the class.

The number of students in this curriculum is small as compared with that in the other courses of study. Every encouragement, from time to time, has been given to the young women to elect this program, but they have preferred either the classical or commercial departments. The teacher in this branch of study is a graduate of New Hampshire College, and, through experience and training, is especially well qualified to do excellent work with the pupils. Young women should be trained to supervise and manage a well regulated home.

#### COURSES OF STUDY

Under this topic, the words of my last annual report will give all the data, required for a complete understanding of the school program.

There are six courses of study in the high school curricula, so outlined that they give the pupils an excellent opportunity to choose those subjects which will, in their judgment, best prepare them for active service or post-graduate work in some technical institution. Pupils who attain a standing of 85 per cent. in their subjects, may enter any one of the colleges on the New England Certificate Board by a certificate, signed by the headmaster. All pupils, graduates of secondary schools in this State, may, by law, pursue a course in New Hampshire College. In former reports, much has been said about choice of courses, home study, promotion, absences and examinations. The school report of 1920 will give, somewhat in detail, all the information necessary to meet the requirements of the program of the school.

#### PRIZES

The trophy for excellence in scholastic ability was again won by the class of 1922.

Through the will of Hosea B. Perkins, the annual income of \$1000 is used to purchase a gold medal which must be presented to that pupil of the Dover high school showing the greatest excellence in oratory. The judges of the contest, which was held on Friday evening, May 19, 1922, awarded the first prize to John Hamilton Minnick, and the second prize to Louise Jaques Raymond.

At the annual graduation in June, a medal is awarded to that student in the graduating class who submits to the proper committee the best original essay on "The Principles of the American Revolution." The medal this year was presented to Helen Winifred McEwan.

#### OTHER SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

The year, 1922, has proved to be a banner one in several instances. In March, the seniors gave Shakespeare's comedy, "As You Like It," in the city opera house.

The following newspaper notice shows that their efforts were greatly appreciated by the public:

"Every member of the cast did his or her part extremely well, and the play from beginning to end passed off with a smoothness and an artistic finish that aroused the admiration of the spectators. Great credit for this demonstration of amateur excellence is due Miss Eleanor Burwell, D. H. S. '18, who for the past eight weeks had been giving the cast the benefit of her training in dramatic art as coach."

The basket ball team was unusually successful, and was honored in the inter-scholastic meet with other schools in the State. This was one of the three teams of New Hampshire selected for the tryout at Tufts College. Through the assistance of the Chamber of Commerce, the boys were enabled to accept the challenge.

The following may be of interest:

"The letter was received today by Secretary Moffitt of the Chamber of Commerce from Milton G. Galucia, manager of the Dover high school basket ball team, acknowledging the gift of \$50 from the Dover Chamber of Commerce to defray the expenses of the team on the trip to Tufts College. It is dated March 16, and reads:

"Harold C. Moffitt, Secretary, Dover Chamber of Commerce, Dover, N. H.

"Dear Sir:

"Please express to the directors of the Dover Chamber of Commerce our gratitude for the check of fifty dollars, presented to the basket ball team on March 14, 1922. We realize that the Chamber of Commerce is interested in us and we shall try to merit its approval at the Tufts' Tournament, and in all other contests.

The record of the team was especially gratifying to the high school. In all athletic contests, the coach, A. F. Anderson, and the boys "have worked together as one in everything." His services have been of priceless value to the young people of Dover. One has said that such a record ought to make every citizen of Dover proud. It reflects great credit on our high school and on the management.

As I have stated in one of my former reports, parents and citizens should give this feature of our educational system greater consideration, that money may be provided for the various forms of athletics which, under proper management, tend to contribute so much to the health of pupils in the high school. Students need diversion, and although the majority of them are not represented on the various teams, yet, through an interest in the contests, they, by attendance at the games, have an opportunity to share in good, healthful exercise.

The citizens should realize the necessity of funds to carry on this work, and, through their officials, should raise a reasonable amount of money each year for athletics. Under present conditions, the headmaster is obliged to give an unreasonable amount of time to this phase of school activity, which should be used for the scholastic welfare of the students.

#### DECORATION

The class of 1922, at graduation, presented to the history department in the high school an especially fine bust of Ulysses S. Grant. Each class, on leaving the high school, should consider it a privilege to adorn the walls of the building with some appropriate architectural masterpiece.

#### TEACHERS

During the past year there has been a decided improvement in the character and quality of the work of the teaching force. All of the teachers

have been anxious to render assistance to those pupils requiring help in their studies. Under city regulations the teachers are expected to return to the building for "make up" work with the students, once, at least, each week. Since September 5, the teachers have been present in the school building a large portion of the time each afternoon, and have invited all pupils needing assistance in their work to return for help. Many of the student body have taken advantage of this opportunity to raise the standard of their work. The headmaster has co-operated with the teachers and parents in a desire to improve the discipline and scholarship of the school. Teachers usually take an interest in the welfare of the pupils, and welcome every opportunity to encourage and assist them in their daily work. However, very little can be accomplished without the co-operation of the parents. The public has generously taxed itself for funds to train the rising generation to meet the ever changing conditions in our national life. All loval citizens should encourage every effort put forth to improve the public school system.

#### DEFICIENCIES

In accordance with the requirements of the school committee, deficiencies have been mailed to parents every two or three weeks. Should pupils fail to receive promotion in June, a comprehensive examination for deficiencies will be given on Saturday, at 8 A. M., before the school opens in September. The headmaster and teachers will be in the school building, at that time, to give these examinations to pupils desirous of promotion. Parents will also have an opportunity to consult the headmaster, concerning the course of study best adapted to the needs of the individual. Changes in the curriculum should not be made after the first month of the school year.

#### POST GRADUATE WORK

Pupils should, at the earliest opportunity, communicate with the headmaster in regard to their plans for further study, in order that a wise selection of subjects may be made to meet the requirements of the higher institutions which they expect to attend.

In conclusion, I wish to express my gratitude to the school committee, the superintendent of schools, and the teaching force, and all others who, in any way, have aided me in the management and control of the high school.

The classical curriculum fits for an academic course at college and for normal schools. It should be chosen by those who wish to be lawyers, physicians, clergymen, teachers and the like.

The scientific curriculum fits for a scientific course at college. It should be taken by boys who wish to become civil, mechanical and electrical engineers or to do other similar work.

The commerce curriculum fits for their work clerks, cashiers, bookkeepers and stenographers. It is the curriculum for those who wish to engage in any form of mercantile or clerical work.

The mechanic arts curriculum trains artisans. It is for those boys who are to do skilled mechanical work. Under this head come plumbing, steam fitting, drafting and mechanical and electrical work.

The domestic arts curriculum trains for the work of the home and for normal schools. It is for the election of girls who wish to become nurses, dressmakers, milliners and teachers, and for those who desire a thorough knowledge of the activities of the home.

The modern language curriculum offers a larger

choice of subjects than do the other curricula and is open to pupils whose aim is a high school education rather than a training for any particular object.

Pupils admitted to the high school, with the approval of their parents, must elect one of the above curricula and take for graduation all the subjects therein. Changes from one curriculum to another may be made only by making up all branches included in the chosen curriculum. The work of any curriculum may be completed in four or more years, and extra studies may be taken only with the principal's consent, approved by the superintendent.

Tuberculosis—13 of the children are under supervision of the tuberculosis clinic; of that number 10 are negative, 3 are suspicious, at a certain stage a little extra care is all that is needed to prevent tuberculosis.

If children have no organic disease, no eye strain, no adenoids or diseased tonsils, no carious teeth, and have good health habits, they will have 100 per cent. good health, and that is what we want for each one of them. In an average hundred people, about ten are really ill and know it and need something done for them; about ten are well and living so that they are likely to be better. The rest, the eighty, think they are well, but really have all sorts of little, unnecessary ailments, which could be eliminated by good health habits. We have gone beyong the point where we blame Providence for our ill health, we know that it is largely our own fault if we do not have positive good health.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES:

Not only has the routine work of the department, such as general care of the grounds, avenues and cross-walks, the trimming of trees and shrubs, the suppression of gypsy moths and other tree pests, etc., been given careful attention, but all lots under perpetual care have been placed in uniformly excellent condition. These lots have been graded and reseeded, monuments and headstones cleaned and straightened, and foundations relaid where necessary.

The chapel, green-house, stable and summer houses have been given three coats of paint, such repairs as seemed necessary properly attended to, and the surrounding of and approaches to the buildings made as attractive as possible.

The extension of the water main from its former terminal to the new addition has been carried to completion during the past season. This extension not only supplies a long felt need, but will result in no inconsiderable saving both in time and money. Seven hundred feet of three-inch pipe were required to make the necessary connections.

Twenty lots in the new grounds have been properly graded agreeably to the general development plan, and the avenues thereto made ready for travel.

Seventy headstones and fifteen monuments were

erected in the grounds during the year, the foundations of which were laid by the regular attaches of the department.

There have been a larger number of lots placed under perpetual care during the past year than for any similar period since the passage of the law permitting towns and cities to accept funds in trust for such purpose.


