AUDITOR'S OPINION

I have audited the financial statements of the Town of Franconia for the year ended December 31, 1991, as listed in the table of contents, except for the Chamber of Commerce and Recreation Program Report. These latter mentioned reports are provided as supplemental information. My audit was made in accordance with the New Hampshire code of Administration Rules 501.09 and generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly, include such tests of the accounting records as I considered necessary in the circumstances. An audit includes examining on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principals used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

In 1991, a significant change in the reporting of the Balance Sheet, Summary and Detail of Revenues and Expenditures, Budget of the Town of Franconia and all Special Revenue Funds was made. The accounting method went from a cash basis to a modified accrual basis. Audit steps were performed to accommodate this change.

In my opinion, these financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Town of Franconia at December 31, 1991 and the result of its operations and changes in financial position for the year ended, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

In accordance with RSA 21-J:19 and 21, which requires inclusion of the auditor's findings in the annual town report, I present the following recommendations:

- 1. If possible, a line of credit arrangement instead of the present lump sum borrowing in anticipation of taxes, should be made with the bank to reduce the amount of interest paid.
- 2. The Board of Selectmen, Tax Collector and Town Clerk should reconcile their books with the Treasurer's books at least on a quarterly basis.
- 3. Yield taxes invoices should be sent to the loggers on a semi-annual basis.
- 4. Payroll data should be maintained on a computerized payroll system to facilitate the preparation of quarterly and annual tax reporting.
- 5. Deposits to banks totalling \$500 or more are to be made weekly in accordance with State requirements.
- 6. Bad checks are not dealt with in a timely manner.
- 7. A proof of taxes receivable and water fees receivable should be performed monthly by the Tax Collector and Water Department Clerk respectively. This will capture any errors that occur and then be corrected in a timely manner. I consider this a major problem area and should be implemented immediately.
- 8. The Library Trustee must maintain a ledger showing investments, maturity, interest earned and the disposition of the principle and interest.

FRANCONIA AND FRANCONIA/MITTERSILL WATER DEPARTMENTS

During the last year a new lockable gate was installed at the Franconia Water Supply. Stock and tools were organized and inventoried. Assistance was provided in EPA Satellite Mapping of all our water sources. An initial survey to determine projected water meter installation cost was undertaken.

A serious (unnecessary) water leak in the Inn at Mittersill caused the loss of a great deal of water, time and money. The apparent lack of reserve supply at Mittersill resulted in a partial water use ban in town and we thank all of you for your cooperation. Our Franconia supply was and is in good condition.

The Commissioners met with the State of New Hampshire and discussed relocation of the main electrical supply to the Mittersill deep wells, including burying all cable and improving pump control boxes.

In 1992, we will try to operate more as a business should - meaning if you don't pay the very little that water costs - you will find yourself with very little water!

Our new truck committee has met with numerous manufacturers' representatives and has decided on the best piece of equipment to suit Franconia's needs for the next 20 years.

We are presently working with the insurance service office to obtain a better rating for Franconia's commercial properties which will reflect the improvements made in the fire department over the last 10 years.

We continue our inspection efforts of commercial properties and appreciate the cooperation we have received from numerous property owners in bringing their properties up to code.

Our education efforts have continued with Fire Prevention Programs in the schools and CPR courses for community members.

We wish to thank all our residents who support our efforts.

PLANNING BOARD

Up-date on Items in 1990 Report

Village at Lovett's - Lafayette Mountain Development Corp., Inc. - Lafayette Mountain Development Corp. has withdrawn its PUD subdivision application for 93 lots on 148 acres. Lafayette is in the process of submitting a new subdivision application for approximately 40 lots on the 148 acres.

Zoning Revision - The fifteen amendments presented to the voters in March 1991 were all approved. The Aquifer and Wetland ordinances were the most significant changes.

Subdivision Revisions - A completely new subdivision section was presented at a Public Hearing on January 7, 1992. The proposed regulations are an update to conform with state law and are editorial and procedural rather than substantive changes.

Master Plan Up-Date - As of the date of writing this report, January 14th, the first draft of the final Master Plan is about complete and will shortly be presented to the Master Plan Commission. Upon their approval it will be presented to the Planning Board and then adopted or amended by a majority vote of the Planning Board after appropriate Public Hearings.

New Developments in 1991

The continuing recession resulted in no subdivision applications that could have any measurable impact on our town.

Sand and Gravel Regulations - In 1989, the New Hampshire Legislature made significant changes in RSA 155E requiring towns to provide "reasonable opportunities for excavation" within their boundaries. The Planning Board presented a Sand and Gravel Regulation at a Public Hearing on January 7, 1992.

In 1991, the New Hampshire Legislature passed several other laws relevant to Planning and Zoning, including the following:

Impact Fees - Ch 283 (HB 391) permits the adoption of impact fees as part of a zoning ordinance. The statute defines impact fees and the capital improvements for which it may be assessed. The Planning Board will be considering the adoption of a Franconia ordinance based on this new legislation.

Developments with Regional Impact - Ch 315D (HB 248) requires a local land use board, whenever it gets an application for development which it decides might have regional impact, to treat all affected municipalities and the regional commission as "abutters" for purposes of notice and testimony.

On April 1, 1991, Bruce Bunker replaced Ron Hunt as Selectmen representative on the Planning Board. We thank Ron for his input and dedicated service to the Board.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment, upon application, reviews and decides on alleged errors in administrative finding, and grants variances to the zoning ordinance to provide relief from hardship. The Board also has the authority to grant an exception for use in keeping with certain provisions of the Ordinance.

The Board does not interpret or revise the town's zoning ordinance. Rather, it is charged with a straightforward application of the ordinance provisions to the problems brought before it. A special exception or variance may be granted, on a case-by-case basis, when such is appropriate, warranted, and consistent with the letter and spirit of the ordinance.

In the cases brought before it in 1991, the Board:

- Voted to grant an exception to Pike Industries, Inc. to operate a temporary portable asphalt plant and sand screen on the property of the Profile Club;
- Voted to grant the appeal of Franconia Auto Service Center for a variance to construct an addition with possibly less than the required sideline setback;
- And voted to grant the appeal of Paul Grillo for a variance to subdivide the former Nancy Miller property on Lafayette Drive from a larger parcel with less than the required road frontage.

We feel this can be largely attributed to the exceptional groundskeeping efforts throughout our town by Ed Phillips. His dedication is augmented by donations of plantings, beautification efforts, and many man hours by several much appreciated community members. All of the property owners who have contributed to the unique rural character of our downtown area may be unaware that they too have made our town's eligibility possible. We thank all these people and the volunteers of the Conservation Commission for their continued commitment.

In receiving this beautification award, Franconia has come to the attention of Mary Reynolds, an urban forester working with D.R.E.D. in Concord. She has met with a representative of our commission and has asked the town to participate in the statewide "Tree City Program". Franconia has qualified for this recognition this year and we will continue to work toward remaining in the program in the future.

The Conservation Commission will also continue to offer input in the restoration of green space and plantings in coordination with the state's replacement of the bridge in the center of town.

Although the economy has slowed there will be expansion and changes occurring in our area (there are approximately 300 building sites currently approved for development). We urge residents to be accurately informed and involved in the decisions being made for the future of our town. Conservation and preservation will determine the quality of growth in Franconia.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE REPORT

The Franconia-Sugar Hill-Easton Chamber of Commerce has had a fantastic year! It's been exciting to see the growth and unity that has come out of these difficult economic times. With tourism struggling in this trying economy it is most evident that we must join forces to stretch the value of each dollar spent. We have done that and it has worked!

This year we received a Matching Grant from the State in the amount of \$2725.00. This money enabled us to not only print a new, up-dated local brochure for the area, but to see that it got distributed out of state. We printed and distributed all 30,000 brochures.

The booth attendants did a particularly good job of keeping people in the area. They directed tourists to local services and business facilities and helped them find lodging in our tri-town area. They mailed out information in response to both letters and phone calls. This coming year we have a new 800 phone number and we anticipate at least doubling those inquiries. We expanded the booth attendants' job by manning the Tram Building at Cannon 3 days a week. That was possible primarily because we did have Martin Johnston volunteer one day and a paid employee the other two. We really need to have more coverage in that location, but we felt it important to stay within our budget and be assured of having proper coverage at Peabody Base Lodge for the winter season.

The Chamber sponsored the July 4th Pollyanna Days Parade, B.B.Q. and Hot Air Balloon rides. Participated in the Annual Hayseed festival, co-sponsored a Kruise Night at the Dairy Bar and sponsored the largest Craft and Quilt Show in the show's history. We continue to work with other area chambers to coordinate events, work on cooperative projects and serve our communities. This year we are working on a Co-operative 4-color, 20-page magazine brochure with 3 other chambers (Lincoln-Woodstock, Twin and Gateway). We will print and distribute 300,000 brochures. This is an \$84,000.00 project made possible by Matching Grants . . . it received the highest score ever given a grant! We will also reproduce an updated version of last year's brochure to distribute locally, at Cannon and in the State rest areas.

In an effort to promote the tri-town area and get our 800 number in the hands of the tourists the Chamber coordinated a two page ad in Yankee Travel Guide, placed an ad in AAA and the State Hospitality Guide.

The Community Calendar is in place and more and more organizations are utilizing it to promote their event. We send monthly Calendar of Events to over 40 different outlets for free publication.

We look forward to 1992 bringing about an upward trend in the economy and a banner year for all of us. We hope to sponsor or help promote more events in each of the tri-towns. It is our goal to promote a community spirit of UNITY, STRENGTH, and PROSPERITY. Our motto this year was "A Chamber that works together . . . works!" We proved it in 1991 and will expand it in 1992!

We thank you for your help and the support that helps us to make it work.

THE FROST PLACE

In 1991, the Frost Place completed its fifteenth season. It began in May with the arrival of Rosita Boland of Dublin, Ireland, as the ninth Irish Exchange Poet-in-Residence. Poet Cynthia Huntington of Dartmouth College traveled to the Guthrie Centre of Ireland as the Frost Fellow. Ms. Boland gave a reading at Dartmouth College as part of her month-long stay in Franconia.

Unfortunately, due to severe economic difficulties in Ireland, the Guthie Centre has regretfully ended this almost decade-long exchange of poets. The Board of Trustees especially wishes to thank Karl and Ruth Kelley for their generous help these nine years with our Irish visitors.

On July 7th, the thirteenth annual Robert Frost Day in New Hampshire was celebrated. Mr. Stanley Plumly, the 1991 Resident Poet, gave a reading of his poems to an audience of some 80 persons, while Mr. John Barr of New York City, poet and businessman, gave a talk on poetry and the public.

From July 28 to August 3, the thirteenth annual Festival of Poetry took place. Besides Mr. Plumly, five other nationally prominent poets served as Guest Faculty: Hayden Carruth, Jane Kenyon, Marilyn Nelson Waniek, Hettie Jones, and John Engels (the 1988 Resident Poet and the 1989 Frost Fellow to Ireland).

Almost 4000 persons visited during 1991, including many media representatives. A Canadian film crew spent a day preparing a video for Canadian national broadcast.

A new 25 minute video was developed for the Frost Place daily visitors by Mr. Benjamin Huddle, a Dartmouth College student, working under the Dartmouth film-studies department. Mr. Huddle, significantly enough, is a great-grandson of Robert Frost. The summer visitors found especially beautiful the family portraits Mr. Huddle used in his video.

Also from Dartmouth was the second summer work-study intern, Mr. Li-Chen Zhang. Mr. Zhang learned arts management and museum operations from the Director and other Board members. The internship was very successful, and Dartmouth wishes to continue the internship.

Finally, on the Board's behalf, I extend our sincerest thanks to the Town of Franconia, her selectmen, administrators and citizens, for loyal and good support in 1991.
