1955 TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Goffstown, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Goffstown Village on Tuesday, the Eighth Day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Polls for voting for Town Offices to open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and close at six thirty o'clock in the afternoon.

The business meeting to open at seven o'clock P.M. to act on articles in the Warrant.

- 1. To choose all Town Officers and Agents for the ensuing year, including a member of the Board of Selectmen for three years.
- 2. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Goffstown Public Library.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance and improvement in our cemeteries.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow at times such sums of money in anticipation of taxes as may be needed to meet the necessary running expenses of the Town.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the improvement and maintenance of Barnard Playground, Pinardville Playground, and the care of Commons.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by Town through Tax Collector's Deed or by gift.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars for the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for improvement of Class Five Roads and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Hundred Twenty three and 96/100 (\$1,323.96) Dollars, the State to contribute Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty six and 41/100 (\$8,826.-11) Dollars.
- 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to have the shade trees on our streets and highways sprayed and to raise and to appropriate the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for the same.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Fire Wardens to purchase a three-way radio system to be installed in the Fire Trucks and Fire Station, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) as the Town's share of the cost, provided the Civil Defense will provide their share of the cost.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a piece of land from the Glen Lake Campers' Association ten feet (10) wide from Mast Road to the River for the purpose of a surface drain, and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars for the same.
- To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed Two Hundred and Sixty Five Thousand Dollars (\$265,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing land, constructing and equipping a new sewage disposal plant, and for making extensions to the present sewer system within the Town of Goffstown, such sum to be raised through the issuance of not exceeding Two Hundred and Sixty five Thousand Dollars (\$265,000.00) in serial bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 72 of the Revised Laws as amended by Chapter 258 of the Session Laws of 1953) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds, and to determine the rate of interest thereon and the time and place of payment and conditions of sale thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale, and delivery of such bonds, as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Goffstown.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to lay out and accept McGuigan Road. Inserted by petition.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to lay out and accept Marion Street. Inserted by petition.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to lay out and accept Danis Park Road. Inserted by petition.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to improve & tar via Petain Street. Inserted by petition.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to lay out and accept Upton Lane from the so-called Back Road to the land of Benjamin Dyke. Inserted by petition.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept a gift, by deed, of Maude A. Hoyt of a strip of land thirty feet in width extending in a northerly direction from North Mast Street for a distance of about five hundred and fifty feet and bounded on the west by the new Goffstown Cemetery and land of Robert and Glenna Burnham and on the east by land of said Hoyt, and lay out and accept the same as a street to be known as Autumn Street. Inserted by petition.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to lay out, accept and improve First Avenue so called according to a plan filed with the Selectmen on August 12, 1954, and approved by them. Inserted by petition.
- 21. To see if it is the sense of this meeting that the Selectmen, except in a case of a rabies epidemic, be requested to hold a public hearing as provided in Chapter 61 of the Revised Laws prior to invoking the provisions of Section 33 of Chapter 180 of the Revised Laws in regard to restraining dogs. Inserted by petition.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission for an audit of the accounts of the Town and make an appropriation for the same. Inserted by petition.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law, and establish a Budget Committee consisting of twelve members at large and such other members as by statute provided and to authorize and instruct the Moderator to appoint twelve members at large to the Budget Committee, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law. Inserted by petition.

- 24. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Part 22, Chapter 188, of the Laws of 1945, as amended, to establish a Board of Sewer Commissioners, consisting of three members and to elect by ballot three sewer commissioners, to hold office for three years, two years, and one year respectively. Inserted by petition.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$10,000 for the purpose of securing surveys, plans and estimates, and purchasing land for the construction of a sewage disposal plant. Inserted by petition.
- 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor, construction and maintenance of highways and bridges and all other necessary Town expenses for the ensuing year, including the amount for Memorial Day.
- 27. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Kenneth Hambleton it was voted that Polls now be opened for voting that the balance of the Warrant be read and Articles Two to Twenty-eight (2-28) be acted upon at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, that polls close at 6:30 o'clock and that our next Town Meeting be opened at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon.

1:30 P. M. Business meeting opened.

An extensive report of the Budget Committee was given by Charles Parsons, Chairman, and a Minority Budget Committee report was given in detail by Mr. Parsons. He then took each article of the Warrant given the recommendation of the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 2. Voted to raise and appropriate Twenty-five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars for the Goffstown Public Library.

ARTICLE 3. Voted to raise and appropriate Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars for the maintenance and improvement of our cemeteries.

ARTICLE 4. Voted to dismiss this article regarding the White Pine Blister Rust.

ARTICLE 5. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow at times such sums of money in anticipation of taxes as may be needed to meet the necessary running expenses of the Town.

ARTICLE 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars for the improvement and maintenance of Barnard Playground, Pinardville Playground and the care of the Commons.

ARTICLE 7. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by Town through Tax Collector's Deed or by gift.

ARTICLE 8. Voted to raise and apropriate the sum of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars for the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

ARTICLE 9. Voted to accept State Aid for improvement of Class Five (5) Roads and raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Hundred Sixteen and 46/100 (\$1,316.46) Dollars, the State to contribute Eight Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy-Six and 38/100 (\$8,776.38) Dollars.

ARTICLE 10. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to have the shade trees on our streets and highways sprayed and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for the same.

ARTICLE 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Nineteen Thousand Two Hundred Sixty (\$19,260.00) Dollars for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

ARTICLE 12. Voted to authorize its Board of Fire Wardens to purchase a new Ladder Truck for the Fire Department and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Seven Thousand Five Hundred (\$7,500.00) Dollars for the payment of the same.

ARTICLE 13. Article regarding building a Sewer Disposal Plant was voted by ballot using the Check List. Result of Ballot

ARTICLE 14. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell a piece of land on Depot Street adjoining land of Stephen Karanikas.

ARTICLES 15-16 Voted to combine articles 15 and 16 and authorize the Selectmen to purchase Hough Payloader for use of Highway Department.

ARTICLE 17. Voted to dismiss this Article regarding adopting a Curfew Regulation.

ARTICLES 18-19-20. Voted to combine Articles 18-19 and 20 and leave to the discretion of the Selectmen regarding the repair and improvement of these streets.

ARTICLE 21. Voted to dismiss this Article regarding Planning Board.

ARTICLE 22. Voted to accept this Article and change the time of the Annual Town Meeting from 1:30 P.M. to 7:00 P.M.

ARTICLE 23. Voted to dismiss this article regarding appropriation limits for each Department.

ARTICLE 24. Voted to dismiss this article regarding establishing a Board of Sewer Commissioners.

ARTICLES 25. Voted to instruct the Selectmen to use any unencumbered cash balance available at the close of the fiscal year, less the amount necessary to carry out the vote under Item 15, as an income item in computing the 1954 Tax Rate in order that the amount to be raised by property taxation be kept at a minimum. And vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Eight Thousand Six Hundred Seventy One -46/100 (\$158,671.46) Dollars, plus County Tax, for the support of the poor, construction and maintenance of highways and bridges and all other necessary Town expenses, for the ensuing year, including Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 26. Voted to accept the Town Reports as printed and reports of all Committees.

ARTICLE 27. Motion made by A. Kenneth Hambleton that the Selectmen be requested to print in the next Annual Report a list of the Property taxpayers, the property assessed and the valuation.

Motion lost.

Resolution made by William Parker:

Resolved that the Town Meeting vote to instruct the Selectmen to obtain from the voters in Town Meeting assembled before any plans are put into effect that necessitate taking land from the Goffstown Memorial Library for widening of the street or streets.

Motion carried and Resolution adopted.

Voted to accept the following:

Report of the Back Road Water system submitted by Carl B. Pattee.

The matter of securing water and installing a system on the Back Road in Goffstown is still a problem. Your Committee met with Mr. Riehl

and Mrs. Myers attending the meeting. Your Committee fully realizes that the property owners on this road should have a water system. It would make their property more valuable and would also open up more property for building purposes, as with a water supply and the nearness to Manchester, this location would be excellent for residential purpose.

The Manchester Water Works would gladly furnish the water for this system if some means can be found for financing the same. At the present time Manchester Water Works says we must go to the end of their pipe line if we want water. This means an extra distance of 960 feet to go at a cost of approximately \$5,000.00.

A survey has been made by a reliable concern and the figures they gave are as follows:

From the Town Line to the end of Manchester pipe line — 960 feet at cost of \$4,820.00

From Town Line to residence of Mr. Weston, 7,390 ft. 43,692.00

It is also estimated that there is 800 feet of ledge which will make this cost considerably larger.

The above figures given include all the cost including 8 hydrants, fitting and copper pipe laid to the street line so that all property owners can connect to the system.

There are 22 property owners at present that are anxious to get the water -14 of them have already signed up to pay \$60.00 per year and two for \$100.00 per year.

This part of our town has already been set off as a Water Precinct by the Selectmen but the valuation of it is not enough to warrant a bank to loan it money enough to install this system, and the only way it can be done is by being financed by the Town. The residents of this Precinct realize this situation and they also agree that if a system is installed in this precinct that some form of agreement must be set up whereby it (the precinct) may pay back to the town in yearly amounts, such sums with interest, as will in time pay off this debt. It is mainly now a problem of financing the installation of the system.

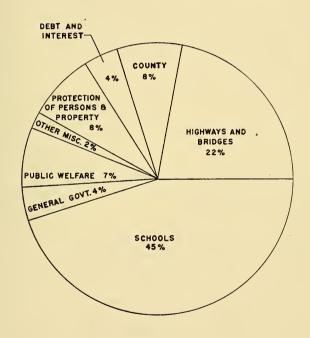

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

To the Citizens of the Town of Goffstown:

It has been our privilege during the past year to carry out to the best of our ability the desires expressed by a majority of the voters at Town Meeting, as well as endeavoring to solve your individual town problems.

A BALANCED BUDGET

In many levels of our Government a balanced budget is something that is talked about but rarely attained. We are pleased to inform you again this year that the total expenditures not only kept within the appropriations made at last Town Meeting, but we are able to show a balance of \$1,084.32. Each Department should be commended for their excellent management.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

In the Police Department, as well as in many other departments, it is impossible to foresee twelve months ahead the emergencies which may arise. This past year your Police Department was confronted with a wave of vandalism, which necessitated the hiring of extra police on various occasions. This will explain the small overdraft in the Police budget, and which we believe was justified. Your Police have submitted an excellent report of their duties, which we are pleased to pass on to you.

Our two regular Policemen work an eight hour day, and are on call the other sixteen hours. During the year they answered 282 calls, and put in 724 hours in addition to their eight hour day. They are paid for mileage on the basis of 50 miles a day for each of the two cars. They report that it was necessary to travel an additional 3,805 miles in

order to carry out their duties. This report will again bring to your attention the ever increasing demands for the services of this department.

HIGHWAYS

Hurricanes Carol and Edna were unforeseen emergencies which faced the Highway Department this past year, and cost the Town about \$2,000.00 It was hoped that the State emergency funds would give us some assistance, but after filing our reports, we were informed that Goffstown did not qualify. In spite of this obstacle the highways in Goffstown were kept in an excellent manner. Several streets were extended and improved, and a balanced budget maintained.

Last year a Payloader was added to our road equipment, and we believe you will be interested to know what this investment is doing for us. After eight months of service, the work meter reads 1,100 hours, which means that this equipment was in actual operation about 3/4 of the total working hours, travel and waiting excluded. It has made possible the widening of many of our back roads, and it has proved most satisfactory in loading gravel and sand. It was only used once for snow removal, and its performance was excellent. Your Road Agent, Horace L. Shirley, regards this new equipment a most valuable addition to the department equipment, and an investment that is paying off for the taxpayer.

NEW CONSTRUCTION

From all indications Goffstown will continue to grow for many years to come. Each year we think we have reached our peak of new construction only to find that more permits were issued than the previous year: 112 were granted this year compared with 65 in 1953. This added tax revenue cannot be regarded as much help in reducing the tax rate for a number of years. Most of the new houses require services such as streets and sewers. A large percentage of the new owners are veterans, who are entitled to a tax exemption, and many have children of school age, who increase the enrollment in several schools.

PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

Our plans for the future expansion of Goffstown must include new streets and improving our present ones. Sewer and water systems must be extended; in fact every department must continue to grow and plan for the future. At the present time many extensions in our present sewerage system in Goffstown Village are badly needed. This cannot be accomplished under the present restrictions laid down by the State Pollution Board.

Money is being accumulated for a new highway on High Street, which will also include a sewage system and the replacement of the present water pipe. The time of this construction hinges on what step we take in the development of our sewage disposal plant.

Our continual growth calls for more and more police protection. In the not too distant future at least one more full time policeman should be added to the force.

For a number of years we have brought to your attention the need for zoning measures for the more thickly settled areas. We believe more serious thought should be given to this problem while the Town is still in its early stages of growth.

DISPOSAL PLANT

Each year since 1950 we have endeavored to acquaint you with the problem of sewage disposal in the Goffstown Village. Several hearings in Town, as well as in the Legislature, reports and lengthy discussions at Town Meetings we find have not resulted in furnishing all the information you desire regarding this problem.

You will find enclosed with your Town Report a detailed outline of the proposed disposal plant, as well as necessary changes and additions to our present sewer system. Estimated costs and a program of financing are also included.

TAXES AND TAX RATES

Your Selectmen are concerned, as we know you are, regarding this problem. Is the present rate of \$6.20 out of line with the present cost of living? A study of the figures of the past ten years in comparison with those of your present report bring to light some interesting facts.

There is at the present time a bill before our Legislature changing the valuation basis from full value to 50% of true value. If this bill becomes a law, it means that we shall be required to revalue all the property in our Town, which will lower the tax rate, but increase each valuation. The fact remains, however, that the amount of money voted by the people at Town and School Meetings will still reflect in our tax bills.

Report of Pinardville Playground Trustees

The 1954 season of the Pinardville Playground was again a banner season for the children of the community. Our thanks go to the people of Pinardville and Goffstown, to the Board of Selectmen, and the Pinardville Lions' Club, who have combined their efforts in making it possible for the children of Pinardville to spend their leisure moments of the summer in the playground under proper and direct supervision.

Mr. Jean Savoie, a student at St. Anselm's College, and Miss Jeanine Mailhot, a student at Villa Augustina, were hired as supervisor and assistant supervisor, respectively. The playground was very well attended by the boys and girls of the community. Programs were organized and volleyball, tennis, horseshoe pitching, badminton and table games, in addition to the standard equipment were enjoyed by all. The tennis court was repainted at the start of the season.

The Pinardville Lions' Club again cooperated with the town officials in sponsoring the playground. The second annual Lions' tennis tournament was again held during the season. Marked improvement was noticed in the quality of play. The boys and girls were divided into two classes, senior and junior divisions. At the end of the season trophies were awarded by the Lions' Club to the winners of the single and double matches in each division.

Saturday night dances were conducted by the Lions' Club throughout the summer and proved very successful. Approximately \$300.00 profit was realized from these dances. This money is to be applied to the construction of a building within the playground for the use of the boys and girls. The construction was started by the Pinardville Lions' Club, but was curtailed due to the shortage of cement. We now have the cement on hand and the building should be completed by the start of the playground season. It is estimated the cost of this building will be in the vicinity of \$1,000.00 to be paid by the Lions' Club.

Due to the pressure of business, Mr. Ralph Pellerin resigned from the Board of Trustees, and Mr. Edward Collins was appointed in his place.

The following is suggested information to be enclosed with your own record in the Annual Report of your town:

In looking over the records I find that over one-third of the fires in District One in 1954 were from incinerators and burning without first securing a permit from the forest fire warden of the town where fire occurred. As all these thirty-three fires were in violation of the law, all of us citizens who own homes or rent property should try to the best of our ability to cooperate with the forest fire warden and fire chief in the town or city in which we live.

After the snow leaves the ground and the spring season arrives we all like to get out of doors and start to clean up the grounds and back sheds so before we start to burn, let's contact the forest fire warden of the town in which we live and get his view and permit.

- 35. Permits. (b) No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or shall burn of cause to be burned any material, and no city or town shall kindle or maintain a fire or a public dump, in or near woodlands, pasture, brush, sprout, waste, or cut-over land, or where fire may be communicated to such land, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written permit from the forest fire warden of the town where the burning is to be done unless the same is in the presence of the warden or his agent.
- 36. Liability for Fires Without Permit. Any person causing or kindling a fire without permit of the forest fire warden, when such permit is required, and any person by whose negligence or the negligence of his agents any fire shall be caused, shall be liable in a civil action for the payment to the town, or the state or both, of the expenses incurred by the forest fire warden or deputy warden in attending or extinguishing such fire.

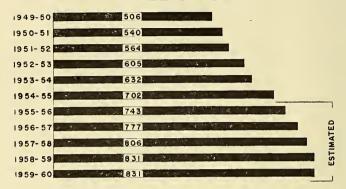

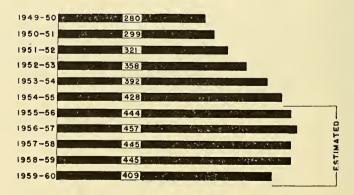

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Goffstown:

The solution to the problem of finding adequate class-room space is the most difficult one facing the Board. If one reviews the various school reports printed in the last few years, it will be noted that this has been a continuing problem. Back in the spring of 1952 when it was decided to renovate the White Building, there was little doubt that many felt this would take care of our needs for sometime to come. The School Board thought it would suffice for four years. The building is being occupied this school year for the third year, and it is now clear that three years is the limit.

This inability to forecast needs accurately is due chiefly to one factor — namely children moving into town. It is comparatively easy to take census figures, count the children living in town and place them in the proper school and proper grade whether they are two years old or ten. The thing we can't see accurately is the number of children

who will move in over the intervening years.

A good illustration of this problem may be had by looking at the graph on page 80 in last year's town report. Opposite the year 1954-55 is an estimated enrollment projected ahead from known figures of a year ago. Now that we are in the year 1954-55 those figures are no longer estimates but facts. The estimated enrollment in the high school increased slightly to 147 but the junior high figure of 78 has actually become 98. It is this factor that places, very much on the conservative side, any projected enrollments and class room needs as set up by the Superintendent and the School Board.

We have asked the Superintendent to include in his report more detailed information about future enrollments and needs and we will not include those facts here.

The School Board does not as yet, know how the pupils will be housed coming next September. They do know, however, that additional space must be provided and recommend that the District give careful consideration to the erection at once of a grade school building to provide additional class room space. Considering future enrollments, crowded conditions now existing, construction costs, and factors affecting financial problems, it is our belief that we should plan a building that will provide eight new class rooms at present, and also lend itself to future expansion.

Unless this space can be available next September, the Board has a serious problem in housing. It has considered two temporary solutions to the dilemna both of which will add to the expense of operation and be unsatisfactory as well. The first is to house pupils in any space that can be found, wherever it can be found. The second is to have a two-session day in the lower grades.

The School Board appreciates the interest and support

of the District in the solution of school problems.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the Citizens of Goffstown:

I hereby submit my annual report as Superintendent of the Schools of Goffstown.

Teaching Staff

Our present staff is composed of 29 full-time teachers and three part-time teachers. The full-time teachers are assigned as follows: Junior-Senior High School 13, Village Elementary 9, Grasmere 3, and Bartlett 4. One additional teacher was employed last fall in order to provide three teachers on

the junior high level at the village.

We had but two changes on our staff during the summer months. Mrs. Elsie Bowler accepted a position in Peterborough, and Mrs. Pearl Lambert, who had taught the fifth grade for the past few years, was moved to the high school staff. Mrs. Lambert's experience and training had been largely on the upper level. At the Bartlett School, the School Board authorized the appointment of Mrs. Jane Campbell to replace Mrs. Helenjane Doyle Hanson in Grades 3 and 4.

As provided by district action of last March, Mr. Charles Abramson of Amherst, Mass., a graduate of Springfield College, was secured to organize and administer the Physical Education program in our three schools. Although the program has been in operation but five months, I feel that real progress has been made in formulating an effective program for the students.

School Plants and Property

As voted at the annual meeting in March, 1954, the Board purchased a parcel of land on the south side of the village playground, and the steel fence was moved to the new boundary.

The sidewalk at the high school was relayed and extended along the front of the main entrance to the high school auditorium, an improvement which has long been

needed.

The Board also authorized the construction of cement steps from the high school level to the school bus stop on Mill Street. The old path down the banking was far from adequate to meet our needs, and in addition the traffic hazards on Parker Street have been removed.

ice. This additional transportation allowed transportation for certain 14-16 year old pupils, not covered by our existing bus routes, and also for the overflow from Bartlett and Grasmere.

As intimated above our problem next fall will be even more acute, and in order to take care of our overflow from other sections of the town, as well as the high school pupils from the northeast section of the town, a third bus will be required. The cost of the third bus will be partially offset by the amounts now being paid to the Public Service Company and for taxi service.

Classroom Needs

At the present time we are making maximum use of our classroom facilities. In the village elementary school we are now operating nine rooms for the first six grades. Several of these groups are too large for effective instruction, and should be divided. On the junior high school level, grades 7 and 8 at the village, we now have 98 pupils. Because no additional rooms are available, we have 45 pupils as a unit.

Next fall we anticipate that our senior high school will be increased by some 35 or 40 pupils. At the present time classes are being taught in areas not intended for nor condusive to adequate teaching.

In estimating our classroom needs for September 1955, we should have five more classrooms at the village in order to correct over-crowded rooms on the elementary level, to provide adequate high school teaching space, and to accomplete the profiler form Company and Portlett.

odate the overflow from Grasmere and Bartlett.

The School Board has devoted considerable time and study to the development of the property purchased two years ago. Preliminary plans have been prepared, and it is the opinion of the architect that the tract of land, some six or seven acres in size, is an adequate site for the proposed school. The building has been planned in such a manner that at any future time, additions can be made with a minimum of expense. If we are in need of four or five rooms this next fall, it would seem that we would think in terms of a base unit of eight rooms, all of which will undoubtedly be needed within three or four years.

At the present time we are retiring the High School Bonds at the rate of \$9,000 per year, and the White School Notes at \$7,500 per year. The last payment on the latter notes is due in the school year 1956-57. The statutes provide that the first payment on a bond issue may be two

years after date of issue. If we were to take advantage of this provision, we could float the new issue in such a manner as to have the first payment follow the last payment on the White School Notes, with no significant increase in the

amount now required for the payment of bonds.

In considering our present and future classroom needs, I should like to repeat what I have stated in prior school reports. With the passing of each year conditions continue to verify my prophesy that by 1960 our senior high school (Grades 9-12) will need the entire use of the present high school building — that by 1960 the White Building will need to be used for Grades 7 and 8, and grades 1 thru 6 will require 12 rooms at the village, together with the facilities at Grasmere for Grades 1-3, and at Bartlett for Grades 1-6.

The warrant for this year's school meeting requests an appropriation to repair and waterproof the west wall of the Bartlett School. At the present time the rains run into and through the west wall and the condition should be corrected as soon as possible. The Board has received an estimate of \$1,200 to relay the cap stones on the roof level, to point up all brickwork, and to apply water proofing to the entire west wall.

The warrant also contains an article to provide for a new roof on the White Building. The present roof has given trouble for the past ten years to my knowledge, and the roof has been repeatedly patched to the point where there is no further answer except to relay the entire roof.

Enrollments

The current school year opened with some 703 pupils in our three schools. This number exceeded the number anticipated a year ago by 53 pupils. A year ago our school enrollment together with our pre-school census led us to believe that we would have 650 in attendance last September. As has been the case in recent years the actual enrollments each fall exceed the anticipated by some 8%.

This past fall it was necessary to transport some 28 pupils from the Grasmere and Bartlett areas to the village in order to relieve over-crowding in those schools. Next fall an even greater number will have to be moved to the village, requiring additional classroom space as well as increased

transportation.

Transportation

It is the opinion of the School Board and the Superintendent that it will be necessary to add another school bus, and the budget item for this service has been adjusted

accordingly.

The 1953 session of the state legislature raised the compulsory attendance age from 14 to 16 years. Although no mention was made relative to requiring districts to provide transportation through 16 years of age, it implies that if children are required to attend to the age of 16, the district does have an obligation to provide such transportation. It will undoubtedly be "legally" required by legislation now proposed in the 1955 session of the General Court.

During the current year the Board increased transportation services over and above the budget item by use of the buses of the Public Service Company and a local taxi serv-

- 8. - 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200 to re-roof the White School.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200 to repair the west wall of the Bartlett School.
 - 11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropri-

ate the sum of \$400 to continue the paving of the high school driveway.

- 12. To see if the district will vote to construct and equip an elementary school building on land purchased in November of 1953 from the Codman estate, said land located off Elm Street and Maple Avenue in Goffstown Village.
- 13. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction and equipment of a new elementary school, including architectural and engineering services and other expenses incident to the project, and in order to furnish said funds, to authorize the issue of the sale of bonds or notes of the School District, therefore under and pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act of 1953 and any other authority thereto enabling.
- 14. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary, proper, and advisable to carry out the action taken in Articles #11, #12, and #13 of this warrant.
- 15. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to dispose of the house purchased from the Codman Estate, the method of disposal to be determined by the School Board.

Record of Annual School District Meeting Held at High School Auditorium

Meeting called to order by Moderator Gordon F. Burns at 2:05 o'clock in the afternoon.

The call for the meeting was read by the Moderator.

Voted to dispense with the reading of the Warrant.

ARTICLE 1—Gordon F. Burns was elected Moderator and took Oath of Office.

ARTICLE 2—Carl B. Pattee was elected Clerk and took Oath of Office.

ARTICLE 3—Armand Florand and Marjorie S. Harden were elected members of the School Board for three (3) years.

ARTICLE 4—Marjorie L. Corning was elected Treasurer.

ARTICLE 5—Voted that the salaries of the Officers remain the same as at present with the exception of the Auditors whose salaries shall be \$8.00 per year.

ARTICLE 6—Voted to accept the reports of the District Officers as printed in the Town Report.

ARTICLE 7—Voted that the Town Auditors serve as Auditors of the School District.

ARTICLE 8—Voted to pass over this article until the balance of the Articles have been taken up.

ARTICLE 9—Voted that the Chairman of the Sub-committee on Schools of the Town Budget Committee give the report on the School Budget for 1954 and 1955. This report was given by Roland Barnard. Voted to accept this Article and to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) to defray the expense.

ARTICLE 10—Voted to accept this article and to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) to defray the expense.

ARTICLE 11—Voted that this Article be dismissed. Motion was made by Mr. George of the Board of Selectmen after he had explained the situation regarding the Article.

ARTICLE 12—Mr. Dustin explained this Article for the School Board and presented the following motion:

Move that the District appropriate such revolving funds as expected to be received and expended during the current school year for current expenses, such sums not to exceed \$19,000.00.

ARTICLE 13—Voted to adopt this Article.

ARTICLE 14—Motion made that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500.00 to employ a Physical Education Instructor for the Goffstown Schools. This article was explained by Mr. Phelps, a member of the School Board and by Head Master, Mr. Bishop. After some discussion by several of those present, the question was called for and the vote was in the affirmative, and the motion was carried. 71 Yes and 56 No.

Returned to ARTICLE 8—Mr. Dustin, Chairman of the School Board, explained the figures in the Budget and then presented the following motion:

That the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$184,909.34 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State equalization fund together with other income; the school Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

ARTICLE 15-Voted to adjourn.

Annual School Health Report-September 1953-June 1954

Dear Superintendent Foote:

I am submitting my third Annual Report of the Health Service given in the Goffstown Schools for the period 1953-1954.

During this time Dr. Richard Backus or Dr. Albert Snay examined all children in Grades one, two, four, seven, ten, all new children, and any pupils going out for Competitive Sports.

Notices were sent to parents of those children who had any condition which deviated from the normal. Parents were encouraged to take their children to their own family physician when possible.

I feel we are very fortunate in having the services of a school physician as it helped detect physical defects in those children that might not otherwise have been found. Both Dr. Backus and Dr. Snay have been most helpful during those periods when I needed professional advice on school health matters.

All pupils were weighed, measured, and given a vision and hearing test.

318 children were given the Patch Test and three showed positive reactions. The three reactors had chest X-rays.

78 home visits were made during the year and 144 First Aids given.

Registration Day was held May 3rd for all children who were to enter school the following September. 44 children attended and all were weighed, measured and given a vision and hearing test. A Dental Hygienist was present to examine their teeth.

The above program has proven to be worth while as it gives the parents an opportunity to have any defects corrected by their family physician or dentist during the summer.

Transportation was provided for four children to Dr. Backus' office, one child to the hospital for X-ray, and one child to Dr. Provost's office for examination.

One child was under care at the Children's Medical Center, Boston, Mass.

I wish to express my thanks to the Superintendent, Parents, Teachers, School Board and Custodians for their cooperation.

The Selectmen herein transmit to you our report on the proposed construction of new sewers and a sewage treatment plant.

The estimated costs listed next to each item of work have been prepared by Hayden, Harding & Buchanan, Consulting Engineers, of Boston, and we trust you will be interested in studying this presentation.
