



Grafton County Delegation

Concord, N. H. January 9, 1957

The Grafton County Delegation met in Room 306, State House at 2 P. M. for organization.

Thirty-one representatives and seven delegates were present as follows: Stevenson of Bethlehem; Bucklin of Bridgewater; Plumer of Bristol; Graham of Canaan; Sanborn of Enfield; Peabody of Franconia; Williams of Grafton; Nettleton of Groton; Bradley, Duke, Hayward and Monahan of Hanover; Haskins of Lyme; Barney of Rumney; Anderson of Warren; Larty of Haverhill; Mc-Meekin of Haverhill; Morse of Hebron; Adams, Cole, Jones, Townsend and Whipple of Lebanon; McGee of Lincoln; Collyer of Lisbon; Armstrong, Kelley and Martin of Littleton; Bell and Loizeaux of Plymouth, and Sawyer of Woodstock: Delegates, Chamberlin of Bath; Avery of Ellsworth; Snell of Landaff; Frazer of Monroe; Howard of Piermont; Woodward of Waterville, and McLaughlin of Wentworth.

The meeting was called to order by Mrs. Hayward of Hanover, Vice-Chairman.

The chair called for nominations for Chairman. Mc-Meekin of Haverhill placed in nomination Forrest Cole of Lebanon as Chairman. Seconded by Graham of Canaan, Sanborn of Enfield, and Kelley of Littleton. As there were no further nominations, Larty of Haverhill moved the nominations be closed and that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Mr. Cole of Lebanon. Motion seconded by Mr. Graham of Canaan, and Mr. Cole was declared elected Chairman of the Grafton County Delegation.

The name of Elizabeth Hayward of Hanover as Vice-Chairman was placed in nomination by Miss Loizeaux of Plymouth and seconded by Mr. Plumer of Bristol and Mr. Kelley of Littleton. Mr. Plumer moved that nominations be closed and that the Clerk cast one ballot for Mrs. Hayward for Vice-Chairman and Mrs. Hayward was declared elected Vice-Chairman.

Mr. Townsend of Lebanon placed in nomination the name of Mrs. Eda Martin of Littleton for Clerk and the nomination was seconded by Mr. Adams of Lebanon. Mr. Kelley of Littleton moved that the nominations be closed and one vote cast for Mrs. Martin and Mrs. Martin was declared Clerk of the Delegation.

Chairman Cole asked the delegation to vote on the number of members to be on the Executive Committee. McMeekin of Haverhill moved that the Executive Committee should consist of three members with the Chairman and Clerk serving ex-officio. Seconded by Loizeaux of Plymouth and voted unanimously, and the Chair called for nominations.

McMeekin of Haverhill nominated Horner of Thornton and seconded by Adams of Lebanon and Bucklin of Bridgewater; Adams of Lebanon nominated Larty of Haverhill, seconded by Haskins of Lyme; Collyer of Lisbon nominated McGee of Lincoln, seconded by Monahan of Hanover

On motion of Stevenson of Bethlehem the nominations were declared closed and the clerk instructed to cast one ballot for the above named member to serve on the Executive Committee.

On motion of Mr. McMeekin of Haverhill it was voted that the Chairman appoint a committee of three to investigate the retirement status of Grafton County Employees. Seconded by Armstrong of Littleton and voted unanimously. The Chairman announced as members of this committee: McMeekin of Haverhill, Bell of Plymouth and Plumer of Bristol.

Delegate Woodward asked about the tie delegate vote and Mr. Plumer said he thought that would be taken care of before the next meeting.

Chairman Cole spoke briefly thanking the members of the Delegation and about the setting up of the budget.

Meeting adjourned at 3:10 P. M.

Woodsville, N. H. March 4, 1957

Members of the Grafton County Convention met at the Grafton County Farm March 4, 1957 for a public meeting to consider the budget. A bountiful dinner was served by the Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Erville Aldrich.

The County commissioners escorted the members on an inspection tour of the institution and property.

The following members were present: Pryor of Ashland, Stevenson of Bethlehem, Bucklin of Bridgewater, Plumer of Bristol, Willey of Campton, Graham of Canaan, Sanborn of Enfield, Peabody of Franconia, Williams of Grafton, Nettleton of Groton, Duke of Hanover, Hayward of Hanover, Larty of Woodsville, McMeekin of Woodsville, Morse of Hebron. Chamberlain of Holderness, Adams of Lebanon, Cole of Lebanon, Jones of Lebanon, Townsend of Lebanon, McGee of Lincoln, Kelley of Littleton, Martin of Littleton, Haskins of Lyme, Bell of Plymouth and Porter of Lebanon.

Delegates: Sargent of Alexandria; Chamberlin of Bath; Wolff of Easton; Avery of Ellsworth; Snell of Landaff; Howard of Piermont; McLaughlin of Wentworth.

County Commissioners Jones and Clement, County Agent Rutherford, and Sheriff Ash were present.

County Commissioner Bell explained each item in the budget and told of why there were increases in some items. The budget, estimated to be \$362,260.00 for each of the years 1957 and 1958, is an increase of \$14,655.42, of this amount \$9,000.00 is for board and care of children, \$3,000.00 for welfare administration, \$2,200.00 for painting at the County Farm.

Willey of Campton suggested that the Executive committee look over the Plymouth Court House and report the repairs needed. Bell spoke of repairing the roof at Plymouth and to paint the court room. Repairs to Plymouth Court House the last few years has included the addition which cost around \$10,000.00, Probation room upstairs, the Police department moved down to the basement, front of the building painted. Cells were removed from the room upstairs, new men's toilet installed. The Judge's office was done over. Some people have said the Plymouth heating plant is over-loaded - the janitor says it works O.K.

Stevenson of Bethlehem suggested that per diem be paid to all members listed by the clerk as present at the Convention meetings. Plumer of Bristol suggested it be put in the budget as a separate item - not to be in the miscellaneous account as at present.

Barry Mines of Holderness, Executive Director of the New Hampshire Tax Payer Federation, was present and spoke briefly regarding the revenue received from the farm as having been set up as \$75,000.00 when the exact revenue for 1956 was \$86,510.69. He believed it should be budgeted at \$86,000.00.

Sheriff Ash spoke briefly of his department.

County Agent Rutherford spoke of his department and said his increases are due mostly to mileage, telephone, and his increase in wages for the Secretary.

No further discussion. It was moved and voted to adjourn at 3:10 P. M.

The Grafton County Delegation met in Room 317, State House, at 3 P. M. The following representatives were present: Pryor of Ashland, Bucklin of Bridgewater, Plumer of Bristol, Willey of Campton, Graham of Canaan, Sanborn of Enfield, Williams of Grafton, Nettleton of Groton, Duke and Hayward of Hanover, Larty and McMeekin of Haverhill, Haskins of Lyme, Morse of Hebron, Chamberlain of Holderness; Adams, Cole, Jones, Porter, Townsend, Whipple of Lebanon; McGee of Lincoln; Armstrong, Kelley, Martin of Littleton; Bell and Loizeaux of Plymouth. The following delegates were present: Sargent of Alexandria, Avery of Ellsworth, Woodward of Waterville, Wolff of Easton, Horner of Thornton, McLaughlin of Wentworth.

The budget was examined, discussed at length, and the following changes were made. The first sixteen items are set by statutes, so no changes could be made at this time.

The item of Sheriff and Deputies had to be increased due to a bill passed by the legislature increasing the Sheriff's pay \$5.00 per day. Sheriff Ash was present and stated this increase would amount to \$2,500.00. Pryor of Ashland moved, seconded by Willey, that an additional

sum of \$2,500.00 be raised for 1957, and the sum of \$2,500.00 be raised for 1958 for the Sheriff, providing the raise of \$5.00 per day for Sheriffs becomes a law. The vote was 22 yes and 5 no.

Kelley of Littleton moved, seconded by Armstrong of Littleton and Plumer of Bristol, that the Welfare budget (poor off farm, old age assistance, aid to disabled, board and care of children, soldiers' aid, and welfare administration) be approved. Thirty members voted yes and none were opposed.

New construction and equipment of Court House was changed as follows: Willey moved, seconded by Townsend, that the sum of \$7,500.00 be raised and appropriated for the following repairs to the Plymouth Court House:

To make repairs to roof of Plymouth Court House as needed.

To install a new boiler and make what changes are found needed in other parts of the heating system. (Probably zoning of same.)

To install a new ceiling and lights.

To install new chairs in Jury box.

If this amount is insufficient, that the Commission shall call on the Executive Committee who shall authorize them to either use funds not otherwise expended or borrow the money on notes of the County.

This motion of Willey's was amended by Kelley of Littleton, seconded by Hayward of Hanover, to read \$9,000.00 for Plymouth Court House and \$3,000.00 for Woodsville Court House for 1957 and \$2,000.00 for both Court Houses for 1958. This was voted in the affirmative with no one in opposition. The money appropriated for Woodsville is to be used to rewire the building and black top the drive and parking area in back of the Court House.

Kelley moved, Plumer seconded, that the County Extension, Employees' Retirement, Social Security and Miscellaneous be accepted. This was voted in the affirmative, none opposed. Plumer of Bristol moved, seconded by Jones of Lebanon, that the Surplus be reduced and the anticipated revenue be increased so that the net tax remain the same as last year. The budget was changed, and the estimated Revenue from the farm was increased to \$85,000.00 for each of the two years.

McMeekin of Haverhill reported for the Committee appointed at the last delegation meeting consisting of Bell of Plymouth and Plumer of Bristol. See attached report.

McMeekin of Haverhill moved, seconded by Kelley of Littleton, "I move that the County Convention rescind the action taken at its meeting of May 11, 1956, whereby it revoked its election to have its officers and employees participate in the State Retirement System." This was voted in the affirmative with none in opposition.

Willey of Campton spoke of the death of former Grafton County Treasurer Huckins, and suggested a resolution be brought into the House by County members consisting of Plumer of Bristol, Chairman Cole, and Clerk Martin. Chairman Cole asked Rep. Willey to have the Resolution made out for the committee's signatures.

Representative McGee of Lincoln suggested the Clerk of Court be present at these meetings to defend and answer questions on his items in the budget.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 5:30 P. M.

Report of County Commissioners

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

In accordance with the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Grafton County herewith present the annual report of the Commissioners, Treasurer, Auditors, Superintendent of the County Farm, Jailer, Clerk of Court, Solicitor, Sheriff, Chaplain, Physician and County Extension Service.

On December 31, 1957, the County had a cash balance of \$25,528.89, and bills receivable of \$6,063.88, making total assets of \$31,892.77. This is due mainly to the increase of income from the County Farm. There were no liabilities and the County operated within its budget for the year.

The County Delegation voted an appropriation of \$12,000.00 for improvements to the Plymouth and Woodsville Court Houses. The slate roof at the Plymouth Court House was removed and replaced with asphalt shingles at a cost of \$2,420.72. Other improvements were a new acoustic ceiling in the court room, \$1,480.00, heating system overhauled, \$2,964.00, and electrical changes made, \$609.84.

At Woodsville, paving of the parking lot at the rear of the Court House was completed. New wiring was installed to relieve the overload and inside painting was done at both Court Houses. Total improvements amounted to \$11,256.83.

At the County Farm, the main barn, the trim on the County Home and the three houses were painted two coats. New wiring was installed in the barn.

During the year the Commissioners increased the rate of board of children to \$40.00 per month.

We wish to express our appreciation to our staff of employees, the County Delegation, the various county and town officials and the State Welfare Department for their cooperation with the Commissioners.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

December 18, 1957

Board of County Commissioners Grafton County Woodsville, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 71, Section 27, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, the biennial examination and audit of the accounts of Grafton County has been made by this Division. The audit covered the fiscal years ended December 31, 1955 and December 31, 1956. Submitted herewith is the report of this audit including Exhibits as hereafter listed. The report consists of three sections as follows:

Section I Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1955 Section II Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1956 Section III Ten Year Statement of County Taxes Assessed, Net Debt and Bonded Debt

Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of County Commissioners, County Treasurer, Clerk of the Superior Court and Superintendent of the County Farm.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibits A & J)

Comparative Balance Sheets for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1954 - 1955 and December 31, 1955 - 1956, are presented in Exhibits A and J, respectively. As indi-

cated therein, the Surplus decreased by \$13,698.94 in 1955, and increased by \$605.57 in 1956.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition:

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1955 (Exhibit B) Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1956 (Exhibit K)

Statements presenting an analysis of the factors which caused the change in financial condition of the County during the fiscal years ended December 31, 1955 and December 31, 1956, are included in Exhibits B and K, respectively.

The decrease in Surplus during the year 1955 amounted to \$13,698.94. The factors which caused this were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues:

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1955 (Exhibits C & D) Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1956 (Exhibits L & M)

In the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, a revenue surplus of \$2,343.71, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$16,074.79, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$18,418.50.

A revenue surplus of \$15,457.58, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$2,947.03, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$18,404.61 in the fiscal year ended December 31, 1956.

Summaries of Receipts and Expenditures:

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1955 (Exhibit E) Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1956 (Exhibit N)

Summary statements of the receipts and expenditures of the County, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1955 and December 31, 1956, are presented in Exhibits E and N, respectively.

ACCOUNTS OF COMMISSIONERS AND TREASURER

An examination was made of all orders issued by the Commissioners and Clerk of the Superior Court during the periods under review. Supporting invoices and payrolls were likewise examined and the classification of expenditures noted. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1956, is indicated in Exhibit O.

CLERK OF THE SUPERIOR COURT

The financial accounts and records of the Clerk of Court of Grafton County were examined. Court receipts were checked by source, insofar as possible, and found to be properly recorded. Court orders issued by the Clerk were supported by invoices, vouchers and payrolls bearing the approval of a Superior Court Justice.

COUNTY FARM

The accounts and records of the Superintendent of the County Farm were examined. Receipts of the Farm were checked by source through the triplicate receipt forms. All receipts, as recorded in the cash book, were properly accounted for by the Superintendent through deposits to the credit of the County Treasurer's account in the Woodsville National Bank.

Classified summaries of receipts and expenditures of the County Farm for the years 1955 and 1956 are presented in Exhibits G and P, respectively.

Conclusion:

Grafton County Extension Service is made up of four separate lines of educational work, which are: Agriculture, Home Economics, 4-H Club Work, and Forestry.

The Grafton County Farm Bureau Executive Committee has been the governing body for Cooperative Extension Work since the work started over 40 years ago. Effective September 1, 1957 a special 13 member Extension Service Council was organized. This Council will have the job of guiding the Extension Program and Agents. Chairman of this Council is J. L. Pearson of Rumney, N. H.

Extension Agents are available to work with anyone in the County. Agricultural Agents spend most of their time with commercial farmers, but this is not a requirement. Other agents spend a larger percentage of their time with rural non-farm and urban groups and individuals. Present Agents are:

I hereby submit my report for the year 1957.

Despite the high hospital usage of 1956 there has been an increase in 1957. Daily bed average is up 1.5 patients, patient days are up nearly 600 and out-patient visits have increased over 50% above those of 1956. This indicates, again, the strain on facilities, both physical and personal, of carrying a peak load most of the time.

We have been very fortunate in having excellent personnel during 1957 and having available the services of Dr. L. E. McKinlay during my absence.

I feel that the hospital has very well served Grafton County and I am proud of the efficiency and morale of the personnel.
