### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and to vote to see if Beano shall be legalized in Hancock.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Monadnock Region Association or take any other action relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight hundred and eighteen dollars and forty-nine cents (\$818.49) for our share of the T.R.A. Old Antrim Road, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate five hundred dollars (\$500.00) toward the fund for publication of the Hancock Town History or take any other action relating thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for the town's share of repairs to the structure in the Belfry, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 7. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to the balance of the appropriation raised to change the inlet to Norway Pond.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town wishes to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the bathing beach or take any other action relating thereto.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day or take any other action relating thereto.

- 10. To see what sum of money the Town wishes to raise and appropriate for Old Home Week, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 11. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to painting the horsesheds, raise and appropriate money for same, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town wishes to buy a new loader for the Highway Department, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for continuation of the wall along Hillside Cemetery or take any other action relating thereto.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the extension of the water main on the Peterborough road, (not over 300 feet) or take any other action relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the fire hose reserve fund, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Fire Truck Reserve Fund, raise and appropriate a sum of money toward same or take any other action relating thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) to match the State share for clearing of roads and fire trails or take any other action relating thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will allow a discount of 1% on property taxes if paid within 30 days after date of bill, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the town road from Arthur Daniels, to the first corner toward Elmwood because of the new 202 by-pass, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to change the purpose of the Savings Bank Fund from; maintenance of the High School Building to: general school purposes, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to use the interest accumulated in the Anna M. B. Foster High School Fund or take any other action relating thereto.

- 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes or take any other action relating thereto.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the use of the town or take any other action relating thereto.
- 25. To hear the reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen or take any other action relating thereto.
- 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### REPORT OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MARCH 11, 1958

- Article 1. All necessary officers chosen.
- Article 2. Town voted to appropriate the budget, estimated revenues be deducted and the balance to be raised by taxation.
- Article 3. Raised and appropriated \$130.00 for the Monadnock Region Association.
- Article 4. Raised and appropriated \$841.80 for our share of T.R.A. program.
- Article 5. Appropriated and authorized town to borrow \$6,453.77 for improvements on Old Antrim Road on accelerated program.
- Article 6. Raised and appropriated \$700.00 for the bathing beach, amount to include the purchase of a boat.
- Article 7. Raised and appropriated \$150.00 for Memorial Day.
- Article 8. Raised and appropriated \$400.00 for Old Home Week.
- Article 9. Raised and appropriated \$500.00 for Town History Committee.
- Article 10. Raised and appropriated \$600.00 for purchase and preparation of a new dump.
- Article 11. Raised and appropriated \$850.00 to install two Rest Rooms in the Town Hall, flush type toilets, wash basins, necessary septic tank, drain well, all piping and carpentry work involved also suitable provision for heating during winter months to prevent freezing.
- Article 12. Rescinded action taken at a previous town meeting fixing hydrant rate at \$10.00 and interest rate on new extentions at 3%. A new motion voted to raise hydrant rate to \$40.00 per hydrant and interest rate on new extentions be raised to 5%.
- Article 13. No action on water line extension from Engstroms to Nelson Gays.
- Article 14. Raised and appropriated \$3,500.00 to change the inlet to Norway Pond.
- Article 15. Voted to adopt rules and regulations for Hillside Cemetery (rules on page 12) and to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 toward building a wall on the road side of the cemetery.

Article 16. Raised and appropriated \$100.00 toward Fire Hose Reserve Fund.

Article 17. Voted to allow a 1% discount on property taxes paid on or before 30 days from date of bill.

Article 18. The sum of \$650.00 appropriated for the purchase of a York Rake for the Highway Department.

Article 19. Raised and appropriated \$50.00 for the Planning Board.

Article 20. No action on the Visiting Nurse Association.

Article 21. Authorized the selectmen to borrow a sum not exceeding \$25,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

Article 22. The selectmen were authorized to accept the former Hancock High School land and building from the Hancock School District.

Article 23. The road leading from Route 137 near Cashion Farm, so-called, to Kings Highway on the Sargent Camp Road to be discontinued subject to gates and bars to relieve the town of its responsibility for damages.

Article 24. Motion lost to sell a strip of High School land to Errol Simonds.

Article 25. Motion lost to discontinue town plowing private driveways. Voted that road agent send bills for additional charges for plowing driveways at end of season. (Bills to be sent out by May first).

Article 26. Accepted Gifts and Legacies — Davis School Fund, Fogg School Fund, John W. Coolidge Cemetery Fund, George and Florence Davis Cemetery Fund.

Article 27. Accepted reports of town officers.

Article 28. Unexpended balances voted back into general funds. Town voted favorably for the selectmen to accept the deed to the road in the Wilder Development on Norway Hill.

### RULES AND REGULATIONS ADOPTED FOR THE HILLSIDE CEMETERY

The sexton shall have charge of all interments in said cemetery and shall make and give to the Town Clerk within three days of said interment, a certificate setting forth the name of the person buried designating the number of the lot in which buried, and stating whether person was a resident of the town, a removal from another cemetery and any other pertinent facts.

The sexton shall act as agent in the selling of lots in the cemetery under the following conditions.

Price of all lots to be \$25.00 and at sale the sum of \$200.00 must be deposited with the selectmen as a trust fund the interest from same to be used for perpetual care of said lot, and said transaction to take place before burial can be made. The selectmen shall give the person so purchasing, a certificate covering sale, and agreement covering perpetual care, setting forth the number of the lot. The certificate and agreement shall be signed by the selectmen and the town clerk and be recorded by the latter. The selectmen shall draw up the forms necessary.

One monument permitted in center of lot. Markers must be of standard size (to be decided by committee) and laid flush with the ground. The natural grade must not be changed.

A block of lots to be designated by the committee from time to time, may be sold for \$25.00 per lot without the \$200.00 deposit for the trust fund, other regulations to be the same.

Proceeds from the sale of said lots are to be kept in a general cemetery improvement fund, part of said fund to be used for upkeep, beautification and general improvement of cemetery.

#### FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning—brush, paper, leaves, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores, brush, etc., cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you—personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

- 1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
  - 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
  - 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty. Use your town dump.

#### PROGRESS REPORT OF NEW HISTORY

The history of the Historical Society has been brought up to date and finished as has the Grange, Telephone Co. and Fire Department. Material gathered in years past on the many small organizations which flourished for a comparatively few years, such as the Ladies' Charitable Society, Mother's Club, Christian Endeavor, Pansy Club, New Idea Class, etc., has been sorted out and histories of each written. The history of the Library building and those connected with the work of the library is well along toward completion. The data concerning the Association for the Blind has been compiled, written and ready for final copy. So many new facts relative to the church building and the various ministers have been found, it seems best to separate one from the other in the new history. Working along these lines it is planned to have a section devoted to each, combining things already in the present history, with many additions, to bring both parts up to date. Preliminary work has been done and is now ready for first writing.

A gift of early Peterborough Transcripts has been received, Hancock news clipped and put into note books for easier reference. These have proved of great value. A gift of large loose leaf note books has been put to good use.

New material as it is found either in print or by word of mouth has been added to that already in the file. Mrs. Charles Upton has worked on the genealogies many hours and tried where possible to keep them up to date. Hancock people have been most cooperative and helpful. There is still much reading and research to be done to fill the gap between the original Town History and the new one.

#### REPORT OF THE PLANNING AND ZONING BOARD

The revision of the basic map issued by the State Planning Board has constituted the major part of our work this year.

This map, now more complete than any map the town has had, indicates all new roads, including the new 202 by-pass; the abandonment of certain roads; whether old roads are passable or subject to gates and bars; whether gravel or black top; all lakes, brooks, ponds, and streams; also old and new cemeteries. This detailing has revealed that there are many roads unnamed and the Board proposes to remedy this by either restoring a forgotten name or giving a new one.

A recent study of this general area has shown that Hancock has increased the number of its residents a little more than 10%. This trend to a growing population is being given much thought by the Board and with the help of this map we hope to make suggestions for areas which might be zoned:

- 1. As residential properties—suited to the development of new homes, which help to expand our total valuation and permit spreading our town costs over a broader base. This will help to maintain our relatively low tax rate.
  - 2. As business areas, also possible industrial areas.
  - 3. As agricultural lands.

All these zones are to be influenced by accessibility to main roads, town facilities and other factors governing the particular zone. In this way we hope to attract new residents and help our growing population, yet still maintain and control existing places of business and homes without detriment to the charm and beauty of Hancock.

We hope to have tentative plans available for public hearings this coming year.

#### CIVIL DEFENSE

Civil Defense is organized at this time to provide the best protection possible for our people in the case of enemy attack or natural disaster.

The Town Siren will be used to alert you to the danger.

The "Fire Signal" is 9 short blasts, also we hear three short blasts for noon on Saturday and the single short blast at 6:30 p. m. the first Tuesday of each month for Fire Drill. Do not confuse these signals with ONE LONG STEADY BLAST.

If you hear ONE LONG STEADY BLAST on the Siren, followed by a SHORT BLAST, it will mean a TEST, and you may go about your business.

BUT—If you hear ONE LONG STEADY BLAST **ONLY**, take shelter at once, for it will mean THE REAL THING.

Should radio or telephone use words RED ALERT, we are attacked and Hancock is in danger. Take shelter until you hear ALL CLEAR.

The ALL CLEAR signal will be TWO LONG STEADY BLASTS on the Town Siren.

Recently, twenty-four members of this community attended a course in Radiological Defense provided by the State Civil Defense Agency. The town now has received radiological equipment to be used by monitoring teams under the direction of Radiological Officer, Richard Amidon as a precaution against Radioactive Fallout.

The Medical and Nursing Staffs are organized with Dr. Frederick Ceres as Chief Medical Officer. Mrs. Margaret H. Lang as Welfare Officer has compiled an inventory of housing facilities in the town and has arranged for mass feeding and registration procedures. Chief of Police R. Ronald Perry is in charge the C-D Police Service.

It is only with the splendid cooperation of Hancock residents that we have been able to build our local Civil Defense Plan and we ask for your continued efforts in this important community work.

#### HANCOCK, 1958

Did we write a few years back the weather was getting milder in these parts? Maybe 1958 was an exception. In February and particularly March snow piled up until road crews didn't know where to push it—about one foot more and we really would have had trouble getting about even on main roads. For those interested in keeping records, the three really big downfalls of snow were on February 16th and March 14th and 21st, each well over a foot. According to Clarence Higgins, in March the squirrels were halfway up the trees before they started to climb. Come December and the coldest weather on record Jim Eva and others who couldn't go South took to scanning ads for Florida resorts. In the good old days of our ancestors it was never colder in December or snowier in February. There was talk by Nelson Gay of forming a snowshoe club.

It's all attributable to the jet stream so meteorologists tell us but they don't know yet why this upper air movement shifts its course. Scientific as we are becoming since the Russians and ourselves began probing outer space with missiles our children still have a challenge. Ernie Adams says he will take a modest bet that we don't land a man on the moon—alive, he hedges—for the next two years. He says this with the experience gained from a total of 200 years of overlapping service as a Town Officer.

To the pleasant surprise of many, business which slumped during the first part of the year rebounded sharply the latter part. Our Hancock Tool Company was sold by Phil Engstrom to Carter Corp. of Connecticut. John Hill, Checklist Supervisor, became local manager. Our retired citizens and others not out of harness saw their stocks, but not their bonds, reach an all time high. Every resident of the Town benefits—the interest and dividends tax which comes back to the Town, you know. In this way Hancock which doesn't have smoke belching from factory chimneys is, nevertheless attuned to the ups and downs of National prosperity modified by the skill of its citizens in keeping their investments in prosperous, growing industries wherever they happen to be located.

Which brings us logically to Town Meetings where we count our receipts and try not to spend ourselves into a higher tax on real estate. The Warrant covered 28 special articles in addition to regular budget items. Modest sums were approved for rest rooms in the Town Hall and for a wall for the new cemetery. No controversies arose—no one went home disgruntled in the bright sunshine. This harmonious approval of town business was just a mirror of the School Meeting which preceded it. The proposal to send the students of the 7th and 8th grades to Peterborough was defeated 2 to 1.

In May, Dr. Billings who for nine years had been our preacher resigned. A large reception in his honor attended by more than two hundred took place in early June at the Vestry. Dr. and Mrs. Billings will stay on in Hancock. A pulpit committee of eleven headed by Ray Hudson actively assisted by Clint Cowen found Frank Thurston, a young man of sincerity and ability, to take Sunday worship.

And speaking of our church, it could be interesting for future generations to note that we in Hancock go in several directions of a Sunday. About 100 Catholics including children go to Bennington pretty regularly, the Episcopal Church in Peterborough has over 40 Hancock members of whom it is said an average of 20 attend. We have a dozen Christian Scientists. Our beautiful white church with its floodlit spire has 150 members and some 60 show up pretty regularly including some not carried on the rolls. A free and easy guess would be that except for special occasions you could find at home, on an average Sunday morning, or possibly they would be traveling,—more than half of our adult population.

On the whole our voters do a bit better but if they are not particularly interested they may not appear in great numbers. At the Primary held this year (a non-Presidential year) 183 of 460 appeared to cast 127 votes for Gregg as Governor and 26 for Powell. In November, 316 citizens voted 223 for Powell and a surprising 83 for the Democratic candidate. Congressman Bass, State Senator English and Representative Pickering were easily reelected. The November vote might have been smaller than it was but for a surge of interest as to whether the Town would permit Arthur's store to sell beer. For years we have voted dry—a long, long time ago the Inn had proved a too noisy spot—but the wets with hubbub a dim memory won by a margin of eight.

One other vote during the year of considerable interest to the Town should be recorded. By a 2 to 1 majority of the special Commission, Otter Lake in Greenfield was selected as the new State Park in the Monadnock Region. The 160 acre pond is located off the road from Hancock to Greenfield and will be a major summer attraction for swimming and camping in this area. The Commission will request the Legislature to purchase for the State the so-called island in Nubanusit for future development, which may or may not be approved.

Last summer, in addition to Old Home Day, annually held in August and always a favorite, was inaugurated on July 19th Founder's Day as a major event. The Inspiration for Founder's Day came out of the discussion by various Town organizations to pick dates for separate events for their fund raising activities. Bill and Helen Brown, Margaret Eustis and Margaret Lang were among those who advanced the idea of a joint program

sponsored by all organizations. Bob Fish was Chairman. The event was a success from every point of view. Seven hundred dollars was raised and divided. Next year it will be held again, Dick Amidon is Chairman. Visits to some of Hancock's charming homes plus an old time bazaar in the Square and Vestry are on the tentative program.

And here are some varied tidbits of Hancock in 1958: Connie Rollins who until recently lived in Venezuela with her oil searching husband returned to win prizes in Ohio for shooting a .45 calibre automatic. Dorothy Laylin who spent more than a year in and about Persia, Turkey and Syria came back with some excellent picture slides and interesting stories. Mrs. Alexander Smith showed her collection of more than 2500 dolls to the Granite State Doll Club. Mrs. Fred Johnson is our champion mitten knitter and Lilla Upton reigns supreme with shawls. One mere man will be mentioned—Earl Hamilton for his work with stained glass and for marrying Kay Birch when no one in Town ever guessed what he was up to.

Finally, here are the expected 1958 nature notes: the moles in spring were active and marked up many a lawn as never before and in summer mushroom hunters had a field day; no one was reported poisoned.

### D. Report of District Clerk

The Moderator, Robert English, called the meeting to order and read the warrant.

A motion was passed that the polls remain open until 8 o'clock at which time the polls close to permit consideration of Articles 5 through 13.

Voting for Moderator, Clerk, Member of School Board for three years, and Treasurer proceeded until 8:10 P. M.

Mrs. Bessie Hanson and Mrs. Alice M. Brown acted as ballot clerks.

At 8:10 P. M. the Moderator called the meeting to order.

Under Article 5 the following motion was passed.

Moved: That the salaries of the district officers for the ensuing year be as follows: chairman of the school board \$75.00, each other member \$50.00, treasurer \$40.00, clerk \$15.00, moderator \$10.00, ballot clerks \$1.00 per hour each, auditors \$1.00 per hour each.

Under Article 6 a motion was passed "that the reports as printed be accepted and placed on file with the clerk."

Article 7: It was moved by Mr. Bradley that Nelson Gay and Aubrey Gould act as auditors for the year. This motion passed.

Article 8: The following motion by Otis Wilder passed:

Moved: That we pass over Articles 8 and 9 and take up Article 10.

Article 10: Mrs. Ruth Sheriff made the following motion: Moved: That the school board be authorized to enter into a contract with the Peterborough school district for a period not in excess of three years for the education of pupils in Grades 7 and 8.

There was considerable discussion of this motion. At the conclusion of the discussion, Otis Wilder moved that the vote on Mrs. Sheriff's motion be by ballot. This met with approval and 94 persons turned in ballots. The vote was 30 in favor and 64 opposed and the motion, therefore, failed to pass.

Under Article 8 the School Board presented the following:

Moved: That the school district raise and appropriate \$41,838.00 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply

against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the school board exclusive of state aid, and upon the determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes.

This motion passed without discussion.

Article 9: Another motion presented by the School Board:

Moved: That the district raise and appropriate in addition to the original appropriation for 1957-58, a sum of \$1,014.00 to be made available to the school district prior to July 1, 1958 in order to meet unanticipated tuition obligations.

It was explained that this additional amount is needed because of new pupils in the village.

The motion passed with very little discussion.

Article 11: Mr. Wilder made the following motion for the school board:

Moved: That the school board be authorized to enter into a contract with the Peterborough school district for a period not in excess of three years for the education of such high school students as are desirous of attending Peterborough Consolidated School.

The vote was in the affirmative.

Article 12: Mrs. Elizabeth Strombeck made the following motion:

Moved: That the school district adopt as its school checklist the Town checklist, as provided in RSA 197; 12a, as inserted by laws of 1957, chapter 57, this provision to be effective for the 1959 and subsequent annual district meetings.

The motion passed.

Under Article 13 the following motion by C. Stuart Bradley passed without discussion:

Moved: That the school board be authorized to reconvey the former Hancock High School Buildings and land to the Town of Hancock.

The meeting was then recessed to permit counting of the ballots.

The Moderator asked Mr. Dillon to report for the committee studying the Mt. Crotched Cooperative School plan while the votes were being counted. The results of the voting for School District Officers was as follows:

For Moderator: Robert English, 53 votes

For Clerk: Adella C. Eva, 97 votes

School board member for three years: Arthur A. Tremblay, 85 votes

For Treasurer: William W. Brown, 94 votes

A motion was passed that a committee be appointed to carry on the study of the Mt. Crotched Cooperative School plan.

It was moved that the same committee continue this study. The motion passed.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Hancock qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 7th day of March, 1959, at 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate to be used in conjunction with monies available under the National Defense Education Act of 1958 in certain areas of instruction.

The teaching staff remains the same as last year except for Mr. John Gallagher, who replaced Mrs. Mavis Rutledge as Principal and teacher of Grades 7 and 8. Mr. Gallagher is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and has attended Boston University. Mr. Ormsby J. Buck replaced Mr. Frank Petronzio as Art Supervisor. Mr. Buck is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and attended Alfred University.

### B. School Program

Besides the new people on the instructional staff associated with the Hancock Elementary School this year are Mr. Ronald P. Scott, Helping Teacher, who replaced Mr. Robert Filbin and Mr. Lewis F. Foote, Superintendent of Schools, who replaced Mr. Lester B. Badger, retired. We, the new people, have not had the opportunity to meet all the parents and residents of the town, but anticipate the pleasure in order that we may more adequately serve the school in the future.

Aside from the daily routine of class instruction, several weekly events were observed this year. In order to cultivate better reading habits and a greater desire to seek knowledge through appropriate reading experiences, weekly trips were made to the Town Library by each class. The pupils and teachers wish to express their appreciation to Mrs. Richardson

for her assistance and cooperation during these visits.

In addition to the daily and weekly music instruction by the teachers and Music Supervisor, the pupils of grades five, six, seven, and eight are grouped together to form a chorus under the direction of Mr. Neil Bartlett and Mrs. Edna Howard. This was done to give the students the benefit of two and three-part singing, a feature often ignored in small schools. The teachers feel this has been a successful endeavor.

In conjunction with their study of Early American History, the pupils of the fifth and eighth grades were shown a series of slides presented to the Peterborough Elementary School by the American Legion Post. Films which are directly related to the course of study are shown to the students each week. Most of

these films are sent free of charge by the University of New Hampshire as a service to the schools of the state. The teachers feel the pupils acquire a great deal of knowledge from these visual aids.

In October the pupils of grades three through eight were given the nationally standardized Iowa Achievement Test in an effort to scholastically appraise each student's ability. As a result of this test, which covered eleven areas of study, all the grade averages, with one exception, exceeded the national and regional average in all areas. Since these tests are used extensively throughout New England and the nation, these exceptional results indicate our faculty is doing an excellent job teaching our children.

Last spring the sixth grade spent a week at Sargent Camp. Plans are under way to send the present sixth grade this spring. We are fortunate to have such facilities available in our town where the youngsters are given an opportunity to study science and wood-lore in its natural habitat. The learning experiences at Sargent are closely allied with the curriculum ordinarily covered in the science text books. It is felt that this program is a valuable educational tool.

The members of the school staff have made a conscientious effort this year to keep up with the rapid changes being made in education. Three members attended a Boston University Extension course in Language Arts during the fall semester. Our teachers feel the courses have assisted them in making their teaching methods more effective and up-to-date.

Observance of Halloween and Christmas were made by the entire school in their traditional manner. The Horribles parade and room parties were enjoyed by the lower grades, while grades seven and eight held an evening party at which games and dancing were the activities. The Christmas program was a highlight of the year with the entire student body participating. Under the supervision of Mrs. Edna Howard, an orchestra was organized and played several selections at the affair.

# PART VI. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES AND SPECIAL REPORTS

### A. Health

During the months of September and October the school doctor examined 64 pupils and such defects as teeth, tonsils, wax in the ears, skin conditions of the face and body, posture, overweight and underweight, hernia and heart murmur were found, and the parents were notified by card or by visit of the school nurse. More than half of the defects have been corrected by the parents with the family physician, dentist or the school

dental clinic.

The dental clinic in April and May of last year was most successful—eight children attended once, for 12 fillings, 3 extractions and 4 cleanings; 5 children attended twice for 24 fillings and 5 extractions. Many thanks are due the Hancock P.T.A. for matching the \$30.00 given by the Bureau of Dental Public Health to make the dental clinic possible, and for giving an additional \$18.75 for dental work which was thought necessary to complete the program. Thirteen children from 7 families are grateful and the parents have expressed their gratitude to me personnally.

Many of the 24 home visits which I made were in connection with securing parental permission and making arrangements for transportation to the dental clinic. Other visits were made to

discuss special health problems.

The cooperation of the Hancock Elementary School parents is greatly appreciated and has made my work more effective. Not only have most of the parents followed up recommendations for their children but they have helped with transportation to the dental clinic, and in escorting younger pupils from the

school to the Town Hall for the hearing test.

Because the parents were willing to help and the town was willing that the Town Hall should be used, I believe the hearing tests were more accurate and therefore more valuable than if we had given the tests in the school building. The main objective in using the Pure-Tone Audiometer is to determine whether the pupil is hearing vowels and consonants as clearly as he should. We have no pupils with major loss of hearing and those with temporary difficulty due to colds, wax in the ears, etc., have been cleared up. Some will be retested in the spring.

Vision testing will be conducted in the near future. I did retest 11 children last January and found no referrals necessary.

In May of 1958 the school doctor held a pre-school clinic, which consisted of a general physical for seven pre-school children. They were found to be in good physical condition.

May I again express my appreciation to all who have helped

me make my work effective.
