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MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING
LINCOLN, N. H.

The Town Meeting was held in the Lin-Wood High School Auditorium in Lincoln on Tuesday, March 10, 1964.

The meeting was called to order by Moderator James Maguire at 9:00 A. M.

Before the start of the meeting the following rules were read and it was stated that they would be enforced.

1. Personalities brought into discussion will not be tolerated or allowed.

2. No discussion will be allowed on any article until the article has been acted upon by a motion and seconded.

3. Everyone who wishes to speak shall announce if they are speaking for or against the motion. They shall be allowed to speak five (5) minutes on the motion at a time, and nobody will be allowed to speak the second time until everyone who wishes to speak has spoken once.

4. No one shall speak over twice on a motion unless otherwise so voted from the floor.

5. All motions or amendments shall be presented in writing or stated clearly so that the Clerk may be able to transcribe it and read it back to the body.

6. All discussions should be subject matter on the article being presented.

Any person refusing to abide by the above rules will be out of order and if after due warning they refuse to follow the above rules, they shall be put in custody of the Police upon request of the Moderator.

The Town Warrant was read by Moderator James Maguire.

The following articles were acted upon :

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Motion by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the polls be open.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended the sum of \$7,400.

Motion by James MacDonald and seconded by George McGee to accept the Budget Committee's recommendation of \$7,400.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3. How much money will be raised for the Police Department.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$7,000.

Motion by George McGee and seconded by Leslie Sargent that the sum of \$7,000 be accepted as recommended.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 4. How much money will be raised for the Fire Department.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$3,500.

Motion by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald to accept the sum of \$3,500 as recommended.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 5. How much money will be raised for the Public Health Department.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$4,250.

Motion by James MacDonald and seconded by George McGee to accept the recommendation of \$4,250.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 6. How much money will be raised for Town Maintenance.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$18,000.

Motion by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald to accept the recommendation of \$18,000.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. How much money will be raised for Street Lighting.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$5,000.

Motion by James MacDonald and seconded by George McGee to accept the recommendation of \$5,000.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 8. How much money will be raised for Cemeteries.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$1,000.

Motion by Murray Clark and seconded by George McGee to accept the recommendation of \$1,000.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 9. How much money will be raised for Public Library.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$2,200.

Motion by Lawrence Woodward and seconded by George McGee to accept the recommendation of \$2,200.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 10. How much money will be raised for Support of Town Poor.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$5,000.

Motion by James MacDonald and seconded by Roger Thompson to accept the recommendation of \$5,000.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 11. How much money will be raised for Old Age Assistance.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$2,000.

Motion by Leslie Sargent and seconded by George McGee to accept the recommendation of \$2,000.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 12. How much money will be raised for Maintenance of Water Department.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$4,500.

Motion by Kenneth McInnis and seconded by Roger Thompson to accept the recommendation of \$4,500.

Edward Clark offered the following amendment and moved its adoption. MOTION: I move that the Town recind its action whereby a Board of Water Commissioners was duly elected at the Town Meeting held March 13, 1928. This was seconded by George McGee.

Vote on the amendment was Yes 54, No 1. A vote in the affirmative.

A vote in the affirmative on the motion as amended.

ARTICLE 13. How much money will be raised for White Mts. Region Association.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$556.90.

Motion by Murry Clark and seconded by Jean Hogan to accept the recommendation of \$556.90.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 14. How much money will be raised for a 4th of July Celebration.

Motion by Roland Bourassa and seconded by Jean Hogan to pass over this article until 1965.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000 and interest to take up Water Bonds due July 1, 1964.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$1,000 plus interest.

Motion by James MacDonald and seconded by Maurice LaBrecque to accept the recommendation of \$1,000 plus interest.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$800 and interest to take up Town Road Aid note due June 1, 1964.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$800 plus interest.

Motion by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald to accept the recommendation of \$800 plus interest.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,200 and interest to take up Fire Truck note due March 1, 1965.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee

recommended \$1,200 plus interest.

Motion by Maurice LaBrecque and seconded by George McGee to accept the recommendation of \$1,200 plus interest.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,400 and interest to take up Pay-loader note due March 1, 1965.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$2,400 plus interest.

Motion by Maurice LaBrecque and seconded by James MacDonald to accept the recommendation of \$2,400 plus interest.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Motion by Robert Russell and seconded by Leslie Sargent to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 20. To see how much money will be raised for Civil Defense.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$650.

Motion by James MacDonald and seconded by Maurice LaBrecque to accept the recommendation of \$650.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 21. To see how much money will be raised for Parks and Playgrounds.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$2,500.

Motion by Roland Bourassa and seconded by Leslie Sargent to accept the recommendation of \$2,500.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 22. To see how much money will be raised for the Lincoln-Woodstock Chamber of Commerce.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$400.

Motion by Lawrence Woodward and seconded by George Hooker that the sum of \$800. be raised.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$85.21, the State to contribute \$568.07 for T. R. A.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$85.21.

Motion by George McGee and seconded by Maurice LaBrecque to raise \$85.21 as recommended.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$900 for Social Security Taxes.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$900.

Motion by Robert Russell and seconded by James MacDonald to accept the recommendation of \$900.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000 for rent of the Lincoln Garage Building.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$3,000.

Motion by Leslie Sargent and seconded by James MacDonald to accept the recommendation of \$3,000.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 26. To see how much money will be raised for the Town Dump.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$1,200.

Motion by Leslie Sargent and seconded by Maurice LaBrecque to accept the recommendation of \$1,200.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500 for the Bicentennial celebration this year.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$2,500 be raised.

Motion by Robert Russell and seconded by Roger Thompson to accept the recommendation of \$2,500.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to use from Surplus \$2,000 to be set aside in a Capital Reserve fund for the purchase of a new truck when needed.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$2,000.

Motion by Maurice LaBrecque and seconded by George McGee to accept the recommendation of \$2,000.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to use from Surplus \$8,000 to be applied against the 1964 Tax Rate.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended the sum of \$8,000.

Motion by Leslie Sargent and seconded by James MacDonald to accept the recommendation of \$8,000.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$5,500 for Water Works Construction on the Hanson Farm Road and the Roland Bourassa Road.

Henry Waldo stated that the Budget Committee recommended \$5,500.

Motion by Mrs. Leo Therriault and seconded by Roland Bourassa to accept the recommendation of \$5,500.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600,000 for the purpose of financing and constructing a municipal sewage disposal system, including sewerage, interceptors, pumping stations, treatment works, and such other related facilities inclusive of land acquisition easements and rights of way as are required, such sums to be raised by the issuance of not exceeding \$1,600,000 in Serial Bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds, as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Lincoln, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Motion by George McGee and seconded by Henry Waldo to pass over this article and meet June 24, 1964, at this hall at 9:30 A. M. to take up this article at that time.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 32. To see what action the Town will take with respect to adopting a resolution concerning the Livermore Falls Project as proposed by the United States Army Corps of Engineers and to see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in connection with such resolution.

The following resolution was read by George McGee.

RESOLUTION:

WHEREAS, the Town of Lincoln is a one industry town and is taking steps to abate river pollution and is paying a municipal indebtedness for a new co-operative school, both projects involving substantial cost to the taxpayers, and

WHEREAS, the United States Army Corps of Engineers is proposing to construct a dam at Livermore Falls which may result in a loss to the Town of its only industry, a \$3,000,000 annual payroll, 618 jobs, and unlimited delays in constructing of Interstate Route 93.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town of Lincoln go on record as opposing the Army Corps of Engineers' project and favoring the construction of small dams on the tributaries and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded by the Town Clerk to the Office of the Governor of the State of New Hampshire and to the members of the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and the sum of \$200 hereby appropriated.

Motion by George McGee and seconded by Henry Waldo to accept the above resolution.

A vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 33. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Lincoln High School property.

Leslie Sargent proposed the following motion: I move that the Lincoln High School Building remain closed and in the custody of the Selectmen and that a five member study committee, to include 2 members of the Board of Selectmen and 3 at large, be appointed by the Moderator to report back to the recessed Town Meeting at 9:30 A.M. on June 24, 1964, as to recommendations for use of the property at that time. Seconded by Henry Waldo.

Sherman Adams offered the following amendment: Provided that the Selectmen shall have the authority during the interim to make such other arrangements for the use of said building as in their judgment is

in the best interest of the town. Seconded by Henry Waldo.

A vote in the affirmative on the amendment.

A vote in the affirmative on the motion as amended.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$25,000 on a 10 year note for Town Road Construction.

Motion by James MacDonald and seconded by George McGee to borrow \$25,000 on a 10 year note for Town Road Construction.

Mrs. Lena Bouchard offered the following amendment: to increase the amount by \$3,500 to include Bog Road in the construction making the total to be borrowed \$28,500. Seconded by Alex Bouchard.

Sherman Adams offered the following amendment to the amendment: Funds under this resolution shall be spent only after consultation with a citizens committee consisting of not less than five nor more than nine persons to be appointed by the Moderator to consider the plans for highway improvement and thereafter a public hearing be held if the Selectmen shall deem it to be in the best interests of the Town.

A vote in the affirmative on the amendment to the amendment.

A vote in the affirmative on the amendment.

A unanimous vote of 46 in the affirmative on the motion as amended

ARTICLE 35. To see what action the Town will take to authorize the Selectmen to sell or accept such parcels of land as may be in the best interest of the Town.

Moved by George McGee and seconded by Henry Waldo that a sum of \$2,000 be appropriated under this article, and that the Selectmen be authorized to acquire land for this purpose.

A unanimous vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to acquire from the State of New Hampshire the land and rights to the Lincoln Airport and make it a municipal field.

Moved by Roger Legasse that the Town authorize the Selectmen to acquire from the State of New Hampshire the land and rights to the Lincoln Airport and make it a municipal field. Seconded by John LaBrecque.

A unanimous vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 37. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The Moderator appointed Fred Johnson to fill a vacancy on The Recreation Committee.

The Moderator appointed the Following people to serve on the Road Study Committee: George Strickland, George Hooker, Sherman Adams, Patrick Rearden, George McGee, Edward Clark, Edward Fournier.

Moderator James Maguire asked for nominations from the floor to fill vacancies on the Budget Committee.

The following people were nominated from the floor for a three year term: Leslie Sargent, George Parker, Robert Russell, May Tardiff.

Dan Boyle was nominated for a one year term.

Moderator James Maguire declared that the above people were elected to the Budget Committee.

The Moderator appointed the following people to the High School Study Committee: John Patterson, Sherman Adams, Robert Russell.

James MacDonald moved that the meeting be recessed until six o'clock. Seconded by George McGee.

Moved by George McGee and seconded by Karl Norcott that the polls be closed—6:00 P.M.

Of this number 30 were to communicable diseases and suspects, to medical and injury cases — 371, chronically ill — 295, prenatals — 12, new mothers — 17, infants under one month — 22, over one month and preschoolers — 30, crippled children services — 27, unclassified visits, i. e. those not taken under care, welfare service, clinic connected, etc., — 289. Preschoolers to diagnostic clinics — 3, Therapy — 1. Conferences with State and County case workers — 29, Professional and Medical Meetings attended — 8.

School visits in the District — 263. Athletic physicals were done on all Junior and Senior High School pupils by Dr. Ralph Parker. Nurse's examinations were carried out in the Elementary grades. The Heaf test for the detection of T. B. was done on grades 1 and 4 in the Elementary Schools, junior high grade 8, senior high grade 3. Chest X-rays were taken if the results of the test warranted such. This program is conducted through the New Hampshire T. B. and Health Association.

The Red Cross Blood Mobile came in October. Forty-five pints of blood were collected. Our thanks go to those who gave blood, and the women who worked at the Blood Bank or helped in any way.

Through the help of the students of Lin-Wood High School, Knights of Columbus, Lincoln-Woodstock Chamber of Commerce, Littleton Elks, toys, clothing and food were distributed. The Sisters of the Atonement remembered the "shut-ins" with Christmas favors.

For all cooperation during the year, we extend our thanks.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy — both industrial and recreational — is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area — 4,350,000 acres — is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

**PROGRAM OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION
1964**

The White Mountains Region Association this year has published and distributed 136,000 promotional folders and cooperated with the five other Region Associations in publishing 400,000 copies of the New Hampshire Accommodations Booklet.

We received a total of 7,500 individual inquiries about the Region which were answered with a package of folders and with personal letters. Because we are closely associated with the State of New Hampshire promotional effort, we receive in our office inquiries which are generated by the State. The Region Association's address is listed in one and one-half million individual pieces of literature published by the State.

In addition to maintaining an active and effective mailing office, the Association has encouraged and promoted many important developmental projects for the region. Such projects include Northern Ventures, a venture capital corporation to assist people who have ideas for industry; Temple Monorail System at Twin Mountain; the Kilkenny project in Lancaster; Mt. Agassiz Development in Bethlehem and Big Bear Ski area at Bartlett.

Through our Industrial Council we have changed the emphasis of industrial development of the State of New Hampshire so that it includes the northern three counties and also encourage a "do it yourself" attitude with industrial development groups.

Last year we assisted in promoting an appropriation of \$65,000 for the construction of the Whitefield Regional Airport and went on record opposing the Livermore Falls Dam in the Pemigewasset Valley.

Presently we are planning to establish an active Historical Sites Committee who will encourage the

development of major historical sites in the region, an asset which we have which has not been developed to its full potential.

The work of the Association is continually hampered by a lack of adequate funds. In order to do the work necessary to raise our economy, the full support of all towns in the region is needed.

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1963 and December 31, 1964, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$6,576.87 in 1964.

(Exhibit A-2)**

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$2,-358.09, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$233.54, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$2,591.63.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1964, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1964, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit G)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1964, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting

invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$3,023.13, from \$13,788.65 to \$16,811.78 in 1964 as shown herewith.
