

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

Nov. 5, '09 an alarm for a chimney fire at the house of Benjamin G. Hall.

Dec. 23, '09 an alarm for fire in the blacksmith shop of Cyrus Kinsman. Cause of fire, overturned stove. Damage \$10.00.



## REPORT OF HEALTH BOARD.



The Health Board beg leave to submit the following report.

There has been no serious outbreak of any infectious or contagious diseases.

In the Fall the board were notified of seven cases of Scarlet Fever, six in one family and one in another, all of them mild, which were duly quarantined and after recovery the premises thoroughly disinfected.

Later in the winter three cases of Diphtheria were reported, all in one family, with one death, and due precautionary measures were used to prevent the spread of the disease.

Unsanitary conditions have been investigated when brought to the attention of the board, and proper measures taken for their remedy. With no public system of sewerage much depends upon the individual interest to keep our community in a good sanitary condition and in nearly all cases such interests have been manifested and the Board feel to thank all who have so willingly acted upon their suggestions and advice when it has been given.

It is also gratifying to report to him that the Library has been prosperous the last year in doing good and blessing its many patrons."

### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the President and Trustees of Frost Free Library, the librarian presents the following report:

During the 104 times the Library has been opened there has been about the usual attendance and the circulation of books has been slightly in excess of last year. 6305 books have been distributed and 2278 magazines have been issued, making a weekly average of 121 books and 44 magazines

issued. The the circulation this year has been several hundred less than three years ago, due in part to the small number of new books added, and also the loss by death and removal of some of the most constant patrons of the Library. There has recently been added 37 new books, and these with the gift of several others comprise the entire addition for the year, which is unusually small. Thanks are due the daughters of the late Gov. Bell, for the books "Bench and Bar of New Hampshire," and the History of Exeter, N. H.; to Mrs. Charles Talmage for the "Life of Alice Freeman Palmer"; to O. C. Stockwell, for "The Lure of the Labrador Wild" and to the publishers for "The Lyon Campaign" and "Milton, on the Son of God." Rev. A. W. Frye has contributed Zions Herald, the W. C. T. U. presented two copies of The Crusade Monthly and Rev. Mr. Rossiter gave several Magazines during his summer residence here.

Several interesting articles have been added to the collection by S. E. Patridge, and some excellent fossil remains from Texas were presented by Mabel Frost Upham, of Boston. The beautiful case presented by Mrs. E. B. Chandler proves most useful and attractive, and shows the collection to much better advantage.

There has been no malicious injury to books during this year but the Librarian would urge that every one interested in the Library would use their influence to have the borrowers feel a more personal interest in the workings of the Library. Occasionally a borrower assumes the idea that because it is a *Free Library*, they are quite at liberty to do exactly as they choose with books and magazines, regardless of the rights of others.

During the year the furnace has been added and the appearance of the room is improved by the removal of the large stove. The books belonging to the town have been brought to the Library but as no case was furnished and we are already cramped for shelf-room, they are not easily accessible to the public.

The sum of \$20 48, was received for the sale of magazines and the collection of fines, the disbursements were as follows:



## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD



*To the Citizens of the town of Marlboro', Greeting:*

“'Tis education forms the common mind  
Just as the twig is bent the tree's inclined.”

*Pope*

Our fathers builded this republic on the broad basis of an educated manhood and womanhood and they builded better than they knew.

What is a school? It is an institution that exists to help the home and society in developing the body and mind of the child. The school exists for and because of the children. The teacher, the school board and the citizens co-operate that the children of to-day may be the intelligent and progressive men and women of to-morrow. The child is our problem, what shall we do for him? How can we best do it?

In the first we must know the child,—know him individually; consider him as he is, and see before us what he is to be, we must recognize his limitations, his needs, and possibilities. This can only be brought about by intelligent and sympathetic co-operation of teacher and school board. If our schools are to fit our boys and girls to fill an honored place in this community, they must be as far as possible a community in miniature. The school really represents the life of the community. It is our Junior Republic. Our large problem is to make it ideal in its functions and government.

## SURPLUS.

Last year through persistent effort on the part of teachers, school board and truant officer, our schools maintained a splendid average attendance. This effort was made without any thought of pecuniary reward that might be in store for our well doing. The last legislature passed a law whereby the smaller towns receive a certain sum based largely on good average attendance.

In December last the town received \$425 as its share of this Equalization Fund. This accounts for the large surplus in the hands of the treasurer. This money is given to the small towns that they may improve their schools and not that they may raise less money for school purposes. It is the opinion of the present school board that this money should be expended in raising the standard of our High school.

## TEACHERS.

Every teacher is subject to her own environment and therefore does her work in her own way. Recognizing this, as far as possible we allow our teachers to work for results in their own way, demanding only that they get results. Many of the finer qualities of a teacher's work, her peculiar power in certain directions, her motives and ideals do not reveal themselves to the casual observer. They can only be known as we see her before the children day after day, and become thoroughly acquainted with and in sympathy with her work. During the past year there has been the most cordial and hearty co-operation between the school board and the teachers and this close relationship has revealed faithful and conscientious service on the part of the teachers of Marlborough.

It must needs be that changes come in our corps of teachers. Miss Etta Sawyer who has served the town faithfully and well for many years resigned at the beginning of the year on account of ill health. Her work is an abiding testimonial to her worth. She has taught the fathers and mothers and the children of the town, and her work will be remembered with respect and gratitude.

Miss E. Josephine Martin resigned at the Christmas vacation to accept a responsible position at Berlin. Miss Martin was a superior instructor and universally popular. We feel that the town was the loser by her being called to a larger field.

Miss Lilla M. Robinson's resignation takes effect at the end of the winter term. Her work in the High and Grammar Schools has been of the highest order. She has spared neither time nor effort in preparation for her classes and the Board regrets that she is to sever her connection with the school.

## SUMMER INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL

During the summer months an industrial school was made possible in our midst by the liberality of Edward H. Kidder, Esq. The school was in charge of two experienced teachers from Pratt Institute, Brooklyn, and the instruction was of a high order. The children who attended made commendable progress and enjoyed the work. At the close of the school, a very fine exhibition of the work of the school was given, at which time Mr. Kidder presented a beautiful and valuable flag to school-house No. II.

## TEXT BOOKS

During the past year new Chemistries, Cæsars, and High School Arithmetics have been placed in the High School. Physiologies have been purchased for the Grammar School, and Arithmetics for the lower grades. \$30.00 have been expended for physical and chemical apparatus and twenty-seven dollars (\$27.00) for History reference books required by the state.

## REPAIRS

New floors have been laid in the high school room and the second primary. New black-boards have been placed in the high school room. Heat has been put into the book room at the head of the stairs.

The Marlborough High School is poorly equipped as regards a laboratory. The room that is being used is entirely too small to be of any practical use. A science room could be fitted up in the third story at a very moderate cost. It is hoped that the town will see fit to do a part of this work this year.

## CHILDREN

Marlborough may well be proud of her coming men and women. We have no vicious nor persistently disobedient pupils in the school. With but few exceptions they have made commendable progress during the past year. Fifty seven children began their school life during the past year. This is a large and encouraging per cent. of the total number of pupils enrolled. With so many little children in our midst to educate and uplift, the Marlborough schools have a great work before them.


## PARENTS





13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town.

14. To hear reports of town agents or committees or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.

15. To act upon other business that may legally come before this meeting.
