TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

The Polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Ipswich in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Mascenic Regional School in said New Ipswich on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

*1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The budget for the ensuing year is \$396,618.00

*By Ballot:

Question 1. "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? Thes statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a N.H. resident for at least 5 year; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or if married a combined net income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, exclusing the value of the person's residence."

Question 2. In conformity with Chapter 406 of the laws of 1981 (now RSA:118 and RSA 31:119)

I. Subject to compliance with all ordinances, restrictions and requirements pertaining to buildings in the Town of New Ipswich, modular, unitized or prefabricated housing, not including mobile homes and trailers, shall be allowed in all districts; II. Subject to compliance with all ordinances, restrictions and requirements pertaining to buildings in the Town of New Ipswich, mobile homes and trailers, which are intended to be used as a permanent dwelling unit, must be placed on a foundation and tied into all conventional and necessary utility systems and shall be allowed to be located on individual lots in all districts of the Town of New Ipswich with the exception of lots who access is on the following roads where mobile homes and trailers are prohibited.

A. From the intersection of 123A, Smithville Road and Ashby Road (known as Jones Corner or Thayers Corner), East along 123A and then North along 123A (Main Street) to the intersection of King Road, Tricnit Road and Turnpike Road, West along King Road ending at County Road (also known as Country Road); from the intersection of King Road, Turnpike Road, Tricnit Road, West along Turnpike Road to the location where Karnis's garage once stood, which is 2,316 ft. from the intersection of Turnpike Road and Main Street.

B. This ordinance will not apply to any mobile home or trailer established within the prohibited area described in II and II-A prior to the approval of this ordinance, however, any such mobile home or trailer once destroyed or removed shall not be replaced.

*The Town Meeting will be adjourned until Wednesday, the tenth day of March 1982, at seven of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the remaining articles.

Article 3.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money, when necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate by public auction which has been acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed.

Article 5.

To hear reports of any Official or Committee and take any action relating thereto.

Article 6.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize to the Selectmen to apply for and accept any Federal and or State Grants as they see fit or take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by the Selectmen)

Article 7.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by the Selectmen)

Article 8.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 (thirty thousand dollars) to be used this year to rebuild a town road or roads. This would be the fifth part of a second five year plan to rebuild all roads needing such work in town or take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by the Road Committee)

Article 9.

To see if the Town will vote to continue the investment of the \$125,000.00 (one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars) from the sale of the New Ipswich Electric Light Department, the interest on which will continue to be used each year to reduce taxes, or take any action relating thereto. (Submitted by the Selectmen)

Article 10.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,600.00 (three thousand six hundred dollars) to contract with a qualified independent public accountant to perform the audit of the town as required by the State to receive Revenue Sharing Funds. (Submitted by the Selectmen)

Article 11.

To see if the Town will vote to purchase the Professional Building, owned by William Thayer, to use as a Town Building, said purchase price to be \$88,000.00 (eighty-eight thousand dollars). This amount to be financed over a ten year period at a rate of $11\frac{1}{2}$ %, an interest payment of \$5,610.00 (five thousand six hundred ten dollars). The total yearly payment will be \$14,410.00 (fourteen thousand four hundred ten dollars) to take any action relating thereto. (Submited by the Professional Building Study Committee; Greg Wood, James Coffey, George Lawrence, and Laurance Ackerson).

Article 12.

To see if the Town will vote to accept Gibbs Avenue and Ken Street as approved Class V roads, or take any other action that would alleviate the danger that presently exists for the ten families living on these roads. (Submitted by petition)

Article 13.

"Shall the citizens of New Ipswich ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U. S. Congress to: "Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries." (Submitted by petition)

Article 14.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum, not to exceed \$2,700.00 (two thousand seven hundred dollars) for a suspended ceiling in the Fire House, to conserve oil consumption by heating less area, or take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by the Fire Department)

Article 15.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,300.00 (four thousand three hundred dollars) to be used to purchase equipment for the Fire Department. (Submitted by the Fire Department)

Article 16.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to expend funds from the Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund Program for the Memorial Field, said funds to be spent in advance with reimbursement from the Federal Government after submission of bills. (Submitted by the Recreation Committee)

Article 17.

To see if the Town will vote to amend Article #13 of the 1976 Town Warrant and authorize the Selectmen to appoint a seven member Recreation Committee to oversee the recreation programs and facilities of the town. (Submitted by the Recreation Committee)

Article 18.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 (two thousand dollars) to replace the apron around the pool with concrete or take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by the Recreation Committee)

Article 19.

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for five years, for the Recreation Department, in the amount of \$3,000.00 (three thousand dollars) per year for the purpose of replacing capital equipment at the pool or take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by the Recreation Committee)

Article 20.

To see if the Town will vote to spend the sum of \$325.00 (three hundred twenty-five dollars) to cover the cost of an engraved stone dedicating the Rowland Conservation Land on Whittemore Hill. (Submitted by the Conservation Commission)

Article 21.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to turn over for management by the Conservation Commission any wetland areas (as defined by Soil Conservation Service map) which the town acquires through default of taxes. (Submitted by the Conservation Commission)

Article 22.

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,156.00 (two thousand one hundred fifty-six dollars) as its share of the operating costs of the Southwest Region Planning Commission or take any action relating thereto. (Submitted by the Planning Board)

Article 23.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,238.00 (ten thousand two hundred thirty-eight dollars) to support the services of the Souhegan Valley Ambulance District Service or take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by the Selectmen)

Article 24.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,649.98 (six thousand six hundred forty-nine dollars and ninty-eight cents) to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. This is based on a \$2.74 per capita formula. (Submitted by the Selectmen)

Article 25.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 1,213.50 (one thousand two hundred thirteen dollars and fifty cents) to support the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service. This sum is based on a 50¢ per capita formula. (Submitted by the Selectmen)

Article 26.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 (one hundred fifty dollars) for the support of the Monadnock Region Association or take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by the Selectmen)

Article 27.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,495.00 (one thousand four hundred ninty-five dollars) for the purpose of purchasing a new copy machine for the Town Office or take any other action relating thereto. (Submitted by Dorothy Baker, Secretary)

We were glad to welcome George Lawrence back on the "Board" after a five year recess.

This year will be one of many improvements expected to the recreation field. Due to hard work from the Recreation Department and especially Mary Jane Grasy and Carol Russell the town has received the first payment of 22,000.00 of the total 62,000.00 federal grant coming as a result of Mrs. Rowland's 90 +acres of land which she gave to the Town.

We were happy to announce a slight surplus in our budget again this year. From the information we have at this time, we are anticipating drastic cuts from state revenue, for this reason we asked each department head to submit a budget that was 2% less than last year. As you can see by the increase of only 1.80% in the proposed 1982 Town Budget, all departments came through.

We wish to thank all department heads, town employees, and especially all board and committee members who have donated their time so freely.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The New Ispwich Police Department answered 1,587 complaints in 1981. The number of telephone messages and complaints handled by the Communication Center was 7,952 also, 7,464 radio messages were answered by the Center. There were 55 accidents involving personal injury and property damage, 37 burglaries and 36 larcenies reported during the year. We received 100 motor vehicle complaints throughout 1981.

This year 168 cases were brought before the Peterborough District Court. These cases were of various offenses: DWI, Speeding, Narcotics, Theft, just to mention a few.

This past year we had two officers complete the Police Standard and Training Certification School for part-time officers in the State of New Hampshire. This is now required by the State, and the officers completing the training were Sgt. Stanley and Officer Salmonson. Both officers are now certified part-time police officers in the State of New Hampshire. In 1982, two additional officers will attend this school.

The Police Department is not asking for a new cruiser this year, as we and the Selectmen feel the present cruiser will last one more year. Also, by the next year our Capital Reserve Fund will have more funds available for a new cruiser.

This years budget submitted by Chief Brodley and approved by the Board of Selectmen is approximately the same as 1981, the budget is workable and should not reflect on service to the town. But as we all know, we cannot predict what the year will bring. It has forced us to discontinue the Saturday and Sunday "day" patrol and cut the two man cruiser to one man for most of the year.

The dog officers job was taken over by the Police Department, this has been in effect for the past six months. It is difficult to do the job, first of all we have no place to keep the dogs and to care for them properly. Dogs that are picked up and the owner is not known are usually given away and the cost to feed that dog while we have it, comes out of the Chief's pocket. We do not charge for a dog given away, our concern is to find a good home for all the dogs. Most of the dogs picked up are not licensed and it is hard to find the owner and usually means keeping the dog until the owner calls the department to report it missing. It would be a great help to the department to have the Selectmen appoint a good dog officer and take the burden off of us. Chief Brodley and the Police Department would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, all Town Departments, and neighboring Police Departments for their assistance in time of need and to the residents of New Ipswich for their cooperation and assistance during the past year.

REPORT OF THE DUMP COMMITTEE

During the past year we experienced a change in membership. Al Jenks resigned from the Committee for personal reasons. Our thanks to Al for a job well done. The Selectmen appointed George Somero as member to fill the vacated position.

The Committee, (and also the townspeople), experienced the loss, through death, of Paul Tetreault, who worked as operator for Butch Somero. For some of us, death has claimed a friend, but it has left behind memories that yet live. Grover Labelle was hired to replace Paul, and is doing a fine job.

The Committee found it again necessary to direct some attention to the stump dump. A meeting on the site attended by the dump operator, the committee members and the Selectmen generated some ideas, but no real long-term solutions were agreed upon. For the present, the stump dump was cleaned up with a D8 bulldozer. (Our thanks again to Martin Seppala for donating the use of his machine.) George Somero donated his time to operate the machine.

The Selectmen are currently looking into the pros and cons of the town taking over the dump.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Every now and then it is good to look back to see from whence we came, and in so doing, we find our town of New Ipswich was settled back in 1738 and incorporated in 1762. Since that time, the town has maintained its original borders for over two centuries. Though the boundaries have not changed, the town's growth in 1981 has resulted in increased activity in the issuance of building permits, 49 in total: 26 for dwellings, 18 for outer buildings and additions, 1 commercial, 1 swimming pool and 3 trailer permits, according to our building permit officer.

Among the various reports studied this year: "Existing Land Use Report", "Citizens Advisory Report", "Preliminary Population Report", Zoning Ordinance, and, of course, the new Legislation on manufactured housing. Scheduled for future study are: "Open Space & Recreation" and "Traffic & Transportation". By July of this year we will be involved in the evaluation of all the problems picked up in the basic studies, policies and objectives. In August, we will tackle "Future Land Use" so that by October, our program should be completed and our Master Plan pretty much finalized.

There were 15 subdivisions granted, 13 public hearings and 27 planning board meetings this year.

We cannot let Mary Jane Grasty leave our town and State without saying how much we have appreciated all of her many and varied efforts to make this town a better place. She has been the most dedicated planning board associate, and it is to Mary Jane that we give all credit for whatever accomplishments have been made on the many maps for the Master Plan. Her work as a Commissioner on the Southwest Region Planning Commission has afforded us first-hand accurate information which has been so beneficial to the Board many times. Her close ties with the Conservation Commission has made all of us aware of the true value of our wetlands. Although Mary Jane is a relatively new member of our town, it didn't take her long to see where our needs were - she was right there with her verve and knowledge. She will be sorely missed. We also regret the loss of Glen Hipple's advice, former member of the SWRPC and one who was a tremendous help to the planning board. However, we are most fortunate in having Catherine Larson of the SWRPC who is working closely with us this year. In closing this report, we would like to mention that we will soon be forming our Citizens Advisory Board, and will be requesting the townspeople of all ages to get involved in their community. So when you are approached, please be willing to give of your time so that we may get a well-rounded viewpoint of the needs and wishes of all the people. Come and join us at our meetings: 2nd Friday and 4th Wednesday at the town office at 7:30 PM. We would all greatly benefit from your input.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

Much of our time in 1981, was spent ensuring the renovation of Memorial Field playground. The projects planned for the field were chosen by the Recreation Committee and approved by the Selectmen. The funding provided by the Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service as a matching grant against the Rowland Conservation Land gift has been the responsibility of the Conservation Commission. The projects include a new Little League field, fencing and backstops; new playground equipment; new basketball stands; double tennis courts and a regulation size football field. Contributions of material and labor are also eligible for matching funds and anyone wishing to contribute should contact a member of this Commission or a member of the Recreation Committee.

Goals and Regulations for the use of the Rowland Conservation and Recreation Land have been established through consultation with interested citizens and organizations to promote the best use of the area at this time. Signs listing the regulations will be posted at the entrances.

Last Town Meeting the Town accepted our Article 18, banning the disposal of hazardous wastes within the Town. We have been attending hazardous waste seminars and keeping informed about changes in State laws. If you suspect a hazardous waste condition, you may call the following emergency numbers:

Our members have been active in the Squannacook and the Millers Rivers Association to clean up the banks of these rivers and raise the quality of the water. Even though these rivers are located in Massachusetts, a portion of their watersheds are in New Ipswich.

We have sponsored the Wapack Trail Association and worked with The Appalachian Mountain Club toward the preservation and restoration of the Trail. We have worked with the Planning Board to develop wetlands ordinances for the protection of the wetlands and residents of the Town. We hope that when these ordinances are presented for your approval you will vote in favor of them because once a wetland is destroyed it can never be restored. Its value to the eco-system is lost forever.

Town Report - Year Closing 1981

The Souhegan Valley Ambulance Service, Inc. continues to provide excellent emergency medical care to those who live in Temple, New Ipswich, Greenville and Mason, at the lowest possible cost.

The high standards of our medical are and the efficiency of our oganization are due primarily to the dedication of our Driver/Attendants. In addition to the nearly 100 hours training required to become an Emergency Medical Technician, our Driver/Attendants continually devote extra time to gain additional skills. On September 26, 1981 many attended a seminar that described the proper procedure for treating the mass casualties that result in a large scale disaster. In October Driver/Attendants took advantage of an EMT refresher course. Plans have been approved by the Board of Directors for all Driver/Attendants to advance to a yet higher stage of emergency medical care. These new life saving skills that will be learned within the next year will move the standards of our Service up another notch beyond the average.

In addition to training and providing ambulance coverage, the Driver/ Attendants have been involved in community activities. On the first and third Tuesdays of each month they take blood pressure readings for the residents of the Greenville Falls Elderly Housing. On June 6, 1981 they provided standby coverage during the Bikathon in Greenville that raised money for St. Jude's Childrens' Hospital.

The above are token examples of the dedication and enthusiasm of our Driver/Attendants. How are we able to deliver such expert medical care at so low a cost? We are able to do this because the Driver/Attendants are all strictly volunteers. Added to the training and community involvement are countless hours of responding to medical emergencies, the main reason for our existence. For all this service, they volunteer their time and talents.

We have held our projected expenses for 1982 to the same amount as for 1981, with the exception of insurance. All items of insurance coverage rose an average of 10% which accounts for an increase of 600.00 in that budget item. However, our per/capita rate stays at \$4.18. We thank you for giving us the opportunity to serve you. As the Board of Directors, we thank our Driver/Attendants for enabling us to be so positive in our report to you this year.

Charlotte Pollock, so well known as a visiting nurse in the Wilton area, decided to withdraw from full-time home visit service in July. She is now working part-time as clinic coordinator in the child health program. As far as the staff is concerned, "she never left," but her patients at home have mourned her loss.

Chris Kelly, a certified homemaker/home health aide, left active duty in April. She is still available to help us in a crisis. She too has been missed by patients, but welcomed back by her family.

Liza Hill, R.N., from Francestown, joined the staff, full-time in April. She is covering New Boston, Francestown, Wilton, Lyndeboro and Greenfield. Nancy Lord, R.N., a resident of West Chesterfield, is covering Harrisville, Hancock, Atrim, Bennington, and Peterborough. Nancy joined the staff, full-time, in August.

HOME VISITS

Statistics show that the number of patients served has increased from 855 to 1,050, on an increase of 22.8%. Total visits for the year is 7,737, an increase of about 26%. Our homemaker/aide service showed the greatest increase, because the service has been in existance for the entire year, as compared to only six months last year. Nursing visits increased slightly; physical and occupational therapy visits were down slightly.

Our homemaker/home health aide service has been funded through Title IIIB for patients 60 and over. This service has been vital and necessary to the area. It has enabled many of the elderly to remain at home, because the aide has provided personnel care, homemaking, light housekeeping, shopping, laundry chores, and meals for persons unable to perform these duties.

CHILD HEALTH MAINTENANCE SERVICES

Janet Lastovica, an advanced registered nurse practitioner, left our program June 30, 1981. She had been the only person doing physical examinations in the program, with consultation and back-up from Dr. Owen D. Mattewson. Dr. W. Randal Ball and Elizabeth Hill are now doing the

physical examsn.

This program has been and is one of screening for problems, providing immunizations, health education, and guidance for children from infants to school age. The number currently registered is 143 children from most of our nineteen towns.

HYPERTENSION SCREENING CLINICS

Hypertension screening clincs continue on a weekly basis. Some come for continued monitoring, because they have problems under medical care; some come from screening; some to help the physician in reinforcing or eliminating doubts about a persons blood pressure. For the latter, we can provide a "non-threatening site" for screening, for those people who are particularly nervous about having blood pressure taken, or fearful of the results.

Attendance is usually excellent.

Services to the Monadnock Community Day Care Center, the Coordinator's Program at the Monadnock Community Hospital, participation by this agency in the Monadnock Adult Education's homemaker/home health aide program, and in the baccalaurate program for registered nurses at UNH continues.

Board members and staff have been very busy. Our new building and the organization changes which are upcoming have been exciting, and sobering too. The Warreen Haskell Memorial Building will be finished next year, and we bless our benefactress Elizabeth Haskell daily.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMISSION

1981 was probably the most active year for the New Ipswich Recreation Committee in many years. As with any committee, there were changes and additions to our board. Members Whitey Belanger and Donny Wilcox resigned and will be missed as they each contributed in their own special way. Roland Rivard, Bob Evon and Bob Haavisto joined us in 1981.

In January, February and March of 1981, we capped off a very successful basketball program, run by the directorship of Donny and Claudia Wilcox. For the 1981-82 season, Linda and Bill Kivela took over the directorship of the program and we know it will be as successful as it was under Donny and Claudia. Each year, the season commences with a clinic for coaches and referees given by visiting coach, John Somero. This clinic explains new procedures and drills to use with boys and girls to improve their abilities in basketball.

As basketball came to an end, softball season was just around the corner. Linda Kivela was coordinator for this program which included 30 girls. Kathy Gauvin, Janice Brockelbank, Pat Murray and Kim Maki were the coaches of the teams which played games against each other, as well as other towns. The Recreation Committee is once again deeply indebted to Mrs. Cooper for providing funds for girls softball.

During 1981, we encountered cases of vandalism in the evening hours, such as the destruction of swings, see-saw and diving board. In order to protect our property, the Recreation Committee went to the selectmen in May to request an ordinance and curfew be established for Memorial Field. The result was the apprehension and prosecution of individuals who violated this ordinance.

At the end of May our Annual Olympic Weekend was held with over 600 participants. As usual, the weekend provided an opportunity for people of all ages to compete in sporting events. Not only is it a weekend for athletes, but also a time for people to get together as a community. Once again, Tom Saari, Donny Wilcox and Lynn Castonguay did a fantastic job in organizing this weekend.

As May ended, the summer recreation and swimming program began at Memorial Field. It was truly a season of magic moments under the direction of Lynn Castonguay, assisted by Stephanie Emma and Mike Riley. The American Red Cross programs from Beginner I through Senior Lifesaving were offered with the addition of basic aquatic safety, junior lifesaving, toddler swim, adult swim and marathon swimmers. REPORT FROM THE SOUTHWEST REGION PLANNING COMMISSIONERS

New Ipswich, as a member of the Southwest Region Planning Commission, is one of a growing number of communities which have recognized and support the benefits of regionalism in their areas. As evidence of this growth in recent years, in 1974, 142 of the 234 local governments in the state were members of regional planning commissions, while today 201 can be counted as member towns.

As membership in regional planning commissions has grown, so have the areas of involvement and responsibility. Regional planning commissions provide a diversity of services to local governments which is not, has not, and can not be provided by any other agency, or array of agencies-federal, state, or local - at comparable cost. These services are basically "one on one" at the local/grassroots level and have had the advantage of fostering trust and credibility within the arena of local home rule. Historically, the regional planning commission has responded to the needs, desires, and problems of local governments both on an individual and regional basis.

The Southwest Region Planning Commission's relationship with its member communities is enhanced by Commissioners who are a representative cross section of lay personnel (City Council-members, Selectmen, State Representatives; together with members of local boards and commissions and citizens at large, appointed by and accountable to their Boards of Selectmen or the Keene City Council).

The Southwest Region Planning Commission is an "in place" agency, familiar with its area, with a proven and demonstrated capability for assessment and implementation of local and regional policies, programs and plans as they affect local governments.

This report is traditionally written to cover the preceding school year. Since assumed office in August 1981 a report from me on the 1980-81 school year is not possible thus this report will focus on the present and future of the Mascenic Regional School District and School Administrative Unit No. 63.

The schools of the Mascenic Regional School District continue to serve the educational needs of approximately 600 elementary and 425 secondary school students.

The strength of the regional school district manifests itself in the dedication and competence of the professional staff and the corporation, support, and involvement of the communities.

The obvious need for a computer program in the schools is being addressed by the staff.

Several energy projects in the various school buildings during the pass few years have resulted in permanent improvement and efficient use of resources.

School Administrative Unit No. 63 is undergoing extensive evaluation in an effort to bring the central office closer to dealing with the needs of the students and teachers who serve them. In order to improve communication groups have been established. These Groups are:

MANAGEMENT TEAM

Purposes:

1. To seek and find opportunities for cooperation, exchange ideas, and instructional articulation between and among the schools, their staffs, and their programs.

2. To involve the school principals in the development and implementation of policies and procedures within the School Administrative Unit.

Membership: School Principals

TEACHER ADVISORY COUNCIL

Purposes:

1. To represent the various school staffs in the development of School Administrative Unit policies and procedures that effect the teacher.

2. To improve communication and increase understanding on all educational issues.

3. To encourage the exchange of ideas and expertise among the various school staffs at all levels.

Membership: Nine teachers elected by faculty of which they are a member in accordance with the following representation:

- 3 Mascenic Secondary
- 2 Mascenic Elementary
- 2 Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative
- 1 Wilton Elementary
- 1 Lyndeborough Elementary

STUDENT ADVISORY COUNCIL

Purposes:

1. To represent the student body in the development of policies and procedures that will affect students and their education.

2. To provide the Superintendent with direct student input and advise on secondary school matters.

Membership: Six students from each secondary school, two seniors, two juniors and two sophomores nominated by the respective class officers, and recommended by their principal.

In addition the SAU office has greatly enhanced and modernized its bookkeeping and financial accounting with the addition of a Cado Computer. The computer has a word processing capacity which we hope to utilize in the near future.

The SAU's present office location is being closely studied and a cost effective solution to the housing of the central office staff is being sought.

My initial experience with the communities, teachers, students, and School Boards whom I serve gives me much reason to hope that by working together we can make the best use of the resources provided for the good of the young people we serve.
