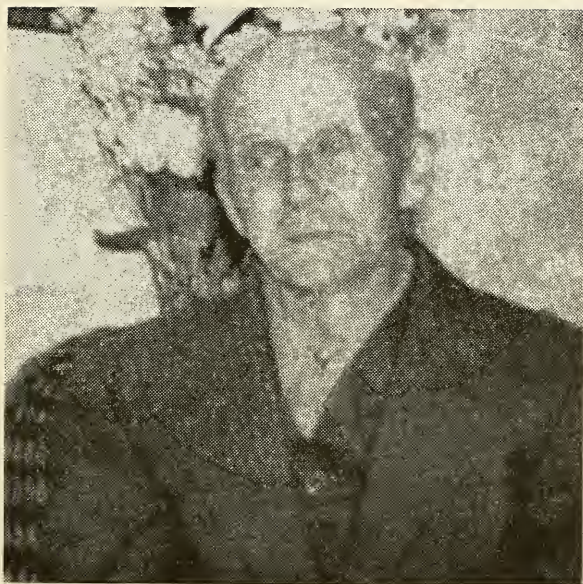

Selectmen's Summary and Recommendations*Roads—*

Our Town roads have suffered somewhat this year because of the shortage of help and the six weeks the Road Agent spent on construction of the T. R. A. road. We would like to see the town roads smoothed oftener. Also the oiling was not accomplished on account of lack of time, too much work for too few men. We recommend that this be done as soon as possible in the spring of 1956, and a heavier coat is planned for the Hunkins Road it being a school bus route as well as a main connection across the town.

A dozer blade for the grader and a snow plow were purchased out of maintenance money which added to the efficiency of the Highway equipment.

The T. R. A. money was expended to finish the construction of the Woodman Road and we recommend the surfacing of same this year and the balance of the T. R. A. money to put on the Calef Hill Road.

Dump—

We have operated the dump for a somewhat longer period this year it being open Saturdays each week. We recommend that it be open Mondays for 1956 if possible.

Sanbornton Bay Association—

The Selectmen met with a committee from the Sanbornton Bay Association. The subject of camp roads was discussed. It was agreed that if their association would secure embankment releases from individual owners of property the town would plan gradual improvement of said roads.

Smelting—

Everyone concerned reports that the problems connected with the smelting season are growing less bothersome to all concerned and we feel that the protection of the campers' property is a town problem and a justifiable expense of tax money.

Town Hall—

The Selectmen planned redecoration of the Town Hall in 1955 but found we had insufficient money so changed the plan to build a much needed woodshed using the lumber from the Town shed on Pound Hill which was largely taken down by the Sanbornton Historical Society. As the proposed shed was to be attached to the Grange kitchen and Town Hall we were unable to complete it before December 31, as the kitchen reconstruction had not progressed far enough to permit, thus the balance unexpended on the Town Hall appropriation. We recommend an appropriation to cover redecorating, build wood shed, install emergency lights as required by law and the insulation of the heat conduit pipe.

Insurance—

The Selectmen have combined all the insurance carried by the Town under one agency, have increased the amount carried on the Town Hall and added extended coverage to same also on the Fire Station. We have also put liability insurance on all road vehicles and increased limits of liability on those vehicles already covered, and the amount to be received by firemen if injured.

We recommend the auditing of the Town accounts by the Municipal Accounting Division of the State Tax Commission.

We urge all taxpayers to study the financial reports of the officers of the Town.

The present board of Selectmen wish to express their appreciation to Ellwood Bennett for his cooperation and helpfulness since his enforced resignation.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE (Tentative)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sanbornton in the County of Belknap and State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Sanbornton on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to employ the Municipal Accounting Divisions of the New Hampshire State Tax Commission to audit the accounts of the Town. (The cost provided for in officers' expenses).
4. To see what action the Town will take upon the Budget as recommended by the Budget Committee.
5. To see what action the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums and amounts of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges in anticipation of Taxes.
6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000): six thousand dollars (\$6,000) for the Summer maintenance and eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) for Winter maintenance and equipment.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the purpose of oiling black top roads.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate one hundred seventy-five dollars (\$175) for general highway expenses.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept, raise and appropriate also the sum of nine hundred seventeen dollars and fifty-eight cents (\$917.58) for Town Rural Aid T. R. A., State share (\$6,117.19).
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) for the Sanbornton Fire Department to be used for maintenance and the purchase of one and one-half inch hose.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700) for the Winnisquam Fire Department for the purpose of maintenance and operation of the Department.
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25) for Memorial Day.
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise money and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) for the purchase of a supply of booklets containing the names and information of all Sanbornton Veterans of World War II.
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25) as a contribution toward a Marine Memorial to be erected at Hampton Beach and containing the names of service men of all wars who were lost at sea.
16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) for the repair of the cemetery located on Tower Hill with the Runnels lot receiving first consideration. (By request of the Sanbornton Historical Society).
17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) for Old Home Day.
18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred band concerts.
19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600) and make the same available for the use of the Library Trustees.
20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) for the Laconia Hospital.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) for the Franklin Hospital.
22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty-three dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$153.38) which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town for the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicising and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other Towns in the Lakes Region.
23. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on the Utility pole 209 situated across the road from Stone's Store, formerly Clark's Store, in the Chapel section of the Town and raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25) for the same.
24. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of title 11 of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivors Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes annotated amended by Chapter 301 and 302 of the laws of 1955, and to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.
25. To see if the Town wishes to exclude classes of positions filled by popular election.
26. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services many classes of position the compensation for which is on a fee basis.
27. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate five hundred dollars (\$500) for the maintenance of the Dump.

29. To see if the Town will vote to keep the Dump open twelve months of the year and hire a custodian at a yearly salary to maintain said Dump two days a week. (Requested by petition).
30. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Smelt patrol so-called, and advise the Director of Fish and Game that henceforth their duties will fall on the State of New Hampshire. (Requested by Petition).
31. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in reserve which the Town received from the sale of the Leavitt Lot.
32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to be used on Lake Winnisquam camp roads which belong to the Town.
33. To see if the Town will vote to accept the zoning taken whereunder the position of Road Agent was made an elective office, and authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Town Road Agent, to take effect at the annual Town Meeting of the year 1957. (By request)
34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty dollars (\$60) for the improvement of the Town Forest.
35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate ordinance as recommended by the Planning Board.
36. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) for necessary expenses of the Planning Board.
37. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

FOREST FIRE REPORT*Be A Good Citizen — Cooperate*

Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 per cent of the forest fires occurring in the state of New Hampshire in 1955 — 235 fires out of a total of 463 originated from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 percent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical, sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 per cent. This is inexcusable.

Everything possible is being done officially to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. Local wardens issued 3864 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of permits. The records show only 2 permit fires got out of control. This proves several things — while wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accommodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following closely directives outlining overall policy governing the issuance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibility in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Results? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of the smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were careless or thoughtless in disposing

of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them. The crushing out of a cigar, cigarette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated.

REMEMBER

1. Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. The law requires it.
2. Make certain they are dead out before leaving them.
3. Become a safe smoker by extinguishing smoking material and matches before discarding them.

Report of the Sanbornton Public Library

For the Year Ending December 31, 1955

The total book circulation from the Sanbornton Public Library during 1955 was 5,073. 486 books were loaned to adults and 4, 587 to children and youth. 122 new books have been added, 54 for children and 68 for adults. 69 of these were gifts.

The Women's Union of the Congregational Church gave a book *Wild Flowers of America* by H. W. Rickett for the Library Memorial book shelf in memory of Mrs. Edith M. Prouty.

There is great need for more books for the youth. When one realizes that approximately 70 children of that age group are loaned books each week it becomes evident that an increased supply of good reading matter for them is very important.

Our Library staff together with others throughout the state regret the retirement of Miss Catherine Pratt, Assistant State Librarian. Miss Pratt has been instrumental in promoting and improving library services in the state. Her methods and suggestions to small town libraries like our own have contributed much to their successful operations.

Mr. Gardner Soule, extension librarian, spent a day last Fall at our library going through the shelves of fiction and removing those books no longer being read.

Mrs. Eleanor H. Morse is continuing to give excellent service as our librarian, and each child who visits the library benefits from her helpful suggestions as they chose their books.

The appearance of the Library building was improved last summer with a coat of paint. We hope to make the library room more attractive during the coming year.

Annual Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens

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of the Sanbornton School Districts

I here with submit my second annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

Personnel Changes

Mrs. Dorothy Metcalf of Tilton, was employed as teacher of Remedial reading, replacing Mrs. Joanne Katz. This position was established last year to remove the load from the crowded rooms. Mrs. Metcalf is teaching reading groups from the lower grades.

It became evident during the summer that an additional teacher would be needed to properly educate the children at the Sanbornton Central School. A last-minute check of the expected enrollment indicated that about 145 children could be expected when school opened in September. At budget-making time in January, 1955 as indicated in my annual report last year, we expected 132 pupils. Because of this increase, the Superintendent recommended and the Board voted to hire an additional teacher and to establish a new room in the corridor at the front entrance. The following equipment was purchased: 1 teacher's desk, 1 teacher's chair, 21 pupil desks, and chairs, a blackboard, a bulletin board, window curtains, a waste basket, 6 fluorescent lights, and one folding door.

Mrs. Winifred Yordy who was employed as the additional teacher, found it necessary to leave in November. Mrs. Lois Sabino of Laconia, was employed to replace Mrs. Yordy. Mrs. Sabino is a graduate of Youngstown College, Ohio. She has had three years teaching experience in Ohio and in New Hampshire.

The assignment of grades to the various teachers will be found in the directory in the beginning of the School District Report.

The report of the Planning Committee appointed last year, recommended construction of three finished rooms and two unfinished room and the employment of one additional teacher. If the plan of the Planning Committee is adopted, three of the rooms will be occupied. The two additional rooms would be required in about three years. This plan will enable the 8th grade to be removed from the present room in the corridor, and will enable the 6th and 7th grades to be placed in a regular classroom instead of the auditorium. The auditorium can be used for physical education, music, dramatics, folk dancing, etc. The room in the corridor may serve as a remedial reading room, health room, library, etc.

The census figures indicate that we may soon expect from 20-25 in each grade. The enrollment of the Sanborn-ton Central School may be expected to reach 175 by 1960.

SANBORNTON CENTRAL SCHOOL

Report of the Principal

During the past year the enrollment of the Central School has continued to grow. Again necessary adjustments have temporarily been made to care for the increase. With a classroom in the corridor and the teachers' room converted into a remedial rearing classroom all classes have been successfully conducted. The stage has also been utilized as a health room for the school nurse.

Although we cannot really maintain a physical education program, Mr. Clarence Brazil gave his time and coached basketball for both girls and boys of the seventh and eighth grades. Miss Gomo coached both girls and boys in softball. Square dancing has also been conducted for grades six, seven and eight.

The World Insurance Policy has again been made available to the students of the Central School. About 80 per cent of the pupils carry individual insurance policies for accidents on route to and from school, at school, and while engaged in school athletics and activities.

The school lunch program has continued to grow in popularity. As many as 139 have been served at one time. Each month a birthday party is held for those having a birthday during the month. Special parties at Christmas and Thanksgiving are also held.

Two other events worthy of mention are the exhibits of school work at Plymouth Fair and our musical program last May, supervised by Mrs. Nordholm.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the members of the P. T. A., School Board, Superintendent, parents and fellow-workers for the thoughtfulness and cooperation throughout the year. Because of your help and understanding it has been possible to attain those high standards which every community strives to attain.

Report of the School Nurse

The school health program aims to help the pupils improve and maintain their own health and to assume their share of responsibility for the health of others. It encourages parents to have their children visit their family physicians and dentists. It assists the families in the use of community resources for the correction of defects. It promotes and maintains a safe and healthy school environment.

School health programs were originally instigated for the control of communicable diseases. As the years went by, it was found that more efforts should be placed upon the correction of defects. Today, we are concerned not only with these two areas of physical health, but also with the development of the whole child — his physical, emotional, mental and spiritual well being.

Despite many years of battle against the treacherous and insidious tubercle bacillus, the age old fight against the dread scourge of tuberculosis is still a desperate one. It is estimated that five million persons throughout the world die each year from tuberculosis. There is still a great need to continue our strong national campaign to control this infectious disease. For this reason, a Tuberculin Skin Test clinic is held annually in our schools. In February 1955, all new children attending the Central School were given the Tuberculin Skin Test.

A child's vision should not be taken for granted. It is a precious gift and hence should be guarded carefully. Good vision and good health are closely related. It has long been recognized that the state of health of the body as a whole is related to the health of the eyes. By the same token, the state of visual health in an individual is often reflected in his general physical condition. Visual testing is therefore, an important precaution and, for this reason, is done an-

nually in our schools. This year, 154 vision tests were administered with the Massachusetts Vision Testing Instrument. As a result, two new pairs of glasses were purchased and four pairs of glasses changed during the year.

In spite of the great progress that has been made in dentistry in recent years, the average child today has more cavities, or what are technically known as caries, than the child of twenty years ago. Children should be encouraged to visit their dentist regularly. In addition, they should be encouraged in developing such health habits as dental cleanliness through proper brushing and the partaking of such tooth building foods as, milk, vegetables, eggs, meat, whole grain cereals and bread. During the past year, seventy-five children visited their dentist.

Hearing is the principal stimulus for speech. A child learns to talk by imitating the sounds he hears. If his hearing is defective his speech may not only be delayed but also impaired. In fact, a good sense of hearing is vital to the development of good communication and the child's hearing should, without doubt, be tested early in life. To this effect, each year hearing tests are administered to the children of the Central School. The instrument used is the Puretone Audiometer. During the year 1955, the total number of such tests given was 142.

Diphtheria immunization is taking its place with vaccination as a routine health measure. The first seven years of the child's life are those in which he is most susceptible to diphtheria. Hence the importance of immunization during this period. In November seven children attended the Toxoid clinic held for this purpose.

We are all aware of the increase in the number of cases of Poliomyelitis which occurred in the United States this past year. The State Board of Health in corporation with the State Board of Education sponsored Poliomyelitis

Clinics throughout the state. In May, forty-four children received the first inoculation of the Polio vaccine. The second inoculation was given in October. At this time forty-eight children were inoculated.

The importance of the detection of physical defects in the child's incipient stage cannot be over-emphasized. To this effect, physical examinations were given to 129 school children by the school nurse. The most common defects found were: poor posture, decayed teeth, enlarged glands, defective tonsils and adenoids, and poor nutrition.

A pre-school clinic was held in May, with seven children attending. At this time the children's vision and hearing were tested and a general inspection was given.

It is encouraging to see how many children are receiving the benefit of a well balanced hot lunch, which is served in the Sanbornton Central School.

During the year 1955, the school nurse made 122 visits to the Central School.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the Sanbornton School Board, Mr. Martin, the teachers, parents, and pupils for their interest and cooperation during the past year.

L *The State of New Hampshire*

To the inhabitants of the School district in the town of Sanbornton qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Sanbornton Central School in said district on the 10th day of March 1956 at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see what action the district wishes to take regarding the establishment of a position of a Helping teacher in Supervisory Union #18 beginning July 1, 1957.
10. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing year.
11. To see if the District will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
12. To see if the District will vote to pay tuition to high schools in excess of the State Average.
13. To see if the district will vote to build an addition to the Central School consisting of three finished rooms and two unfinished rooms and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$70,000.00 for the purpose of acquiring the necessary land, furnishings and furniture therefor and grading and leveling the grounds surrounding the same; the sum raised to be borrowed under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act as amended, by the issuance of serial notes or bonds, the date, maturities, denominations, interest or discount rate, form and provisions for the sale of same to be determined by the School Board.
14. To see if the district will vote to build an addition to the Central School consisting of two finished rooms and one unfinished room and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$50,000.00 for the purpose of acquiring the necessary land, furnishings and furniture therefor and grading and leveling the grounds surrounding the same; the sum raised to be borrowed under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act as amended, by the issuance of serial notes or bonds, the date, maturities, denomination, interest or discount rate, form and provisions for the sale of same to be determined by the School Board.

15. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,800.00 to cover the estimated deficiency for the school year 1955-1956.
16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SANBORNTON SCHOOL DISTRICT

According to the posted notice the Sanbornton School District meeting was called to order on the 26th day of March, 1955 at 8:07 o'clock in the P. M. by Moderator Carl Hanson.

The Warrant was Read

1. Carl Hanson was elected Moderator. The vote was: Joseph Bodwell 2, Carl Hanson 28, Robert Wiggin 2, Stanley Skeats 3, Luther Straw 2.
2. Virginia Braley was elected Clerk. The vote was, Virginia Braley 30, Alice Joslyn 2, Lillian Wright 4.
3. Evelyn Prescott was elected to the School Board for 3 years. The vote was; Evelyn Prescott 42, Edward Paul 1, Malcolm Gilman 1.
4. Catherine Currier was elected Treasurer. The vote was Catherine Currier 40.
5. It was voted to dismiss this article. (To determine and appoint the salaries of the school Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.)
6. This article was passed to be taken up later. (To see if the district will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.)
7. It was voted to petition the State Tax commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expenses of such audit (School Budget).

8. It was voted to pay tuition to high schools in excess of the state coverage.
9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 to cover the estimated deficiency for the school year 1954-55.
10. This article was dismissed. (To see of the district will vote to raise and appropriate 2 per cent of the total school budget for the purpose of a contingency fund.)
11. It was voted to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the school district the benefits of title II of the Federal Security Act (old age and survivors insurance) as authorized by chapter 234 of the laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$62.00 to defray the school districts share of the cost thereof.
12. It was voted to authorize the school board to execute on behalf of the school district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to designate the school district treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
13. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to employ the services of an architect for the purpose of designing a two-room addition to the Central School after a short recess had been called by the Moderator during which he appointed the Selectmen of the Town and the School Board Members to confer and bring in a committee of 4 citizens to work with the School Board on this.

The Committee named was: James Dodge, Phillip Shacklette, Robert Wright and Malcolm Gilman.

14. It was voted to authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district, such advances grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government and/or State agencies.

Back to #6. It was voted to adopt the School Budget as recommended by the Budget Committee with the changes as here noted plus \$100.00 to be added to the teachers salaries and voting that there had been a \$91.00 error in transportation to be subtracted.

15. It was voted to adjourn the meeting at 10:40 P. M.
