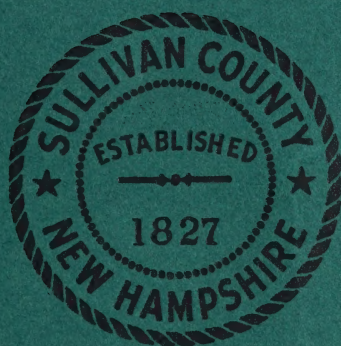

Mr. Vaughan, Chairman of the Finance Committee, called the meeting of the members to order at 7:30 P. M., February 4, 1957 in the Town Hall.

Mr. Stanley Colby, County Agent, explained the Extension Service part of the county budget. Detailed budget copies were passed the committee members. Mr. Sullivan, acting as spokesman for the county commissioners who were also present, explained the proposed changes. He answered many questions about the changes at the County Farm and the proposed method of paying the sheriff. Mr. McCusker, County Sheriff, discussed the new budget for his department and the suggested changes. He feels that the County could save money if he were placed on a salary and expense money basis with the County furnishing the car. He would make no charge for meals within the state.

Mr. Vaughan announced that the committee would meet soon to study the budget more carefully. The motion to adjourn was made, seconded and carried.

Concord, N. H.

Mr. George Angus called the meeting of the Sullivan County delegates to order at 10:30 A. M., February 19, 1957. The meeting was held in Room 317, State House.

Mr. Vaughan, chairman of a special committee to study the advisability of putting the sheriff on a salary, reported that the committee does not recommend the change at this time. He estimates that the proposed change would cost the county considerably more than the present method of financing the sheriff's department.

Sims moved that the proposed bill about the sheriff's position be killed. The motion was seconded by Frizzell and carried by the group.

Mr. Healey from the Water Pollution and Health Dept. explained why it is urgent that the delegation approve of the proposed classification of the Little Sugar River. He brought out the following facts:

1. N. H. is member of the Pollution Compact of New England. The group has approved of cleaning up the Connecticut River. Mass. and Vt. has already done a lot toward that goal.
2. Commission has the power to recommend proposed classification to the legislature. It studies the situation carefully before doing so.
3. There are Federal funds available to pay 30% of the cost-
 - A. Filter system
 - B. Chemical system (about \$6000.00)

1. Yearly cost of about \$1000.00 for chemicals to be paid by the County.

He hopes that counties will cooperate with the state.

Frizzell — Are you planning to clean up other situations on the Little Sugar River?

Healey — Yes.

Angus — Would it be possible to get an extension of time?

Healey — Not advisable as Federal funds are now available.

Vaughan — Will this act be apt to force Claremont and Newport to expand or build new disposal plants?

Healey — No. Commissioners are considerate of town and city situations.

Frizzell took samples of water. River just below farm was heavily contaminated.

Desnoyer — We will eventually have to do this so we might as well put in the plant now.

Bloomfield moved that the delegation include the money for a chlorination plant at the County Farm in the county budget. The motion was seconded by Desnoyer and carried by the group.

Angus announced that the public hearing of the budget would be Monday, Feb. 25 at 1:30 P. M., in Probate Court Room, Claremont.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:05 A. M.

Executive Session of the Finance Committee

March 11, 1957 at County Farm

The meeting was called to order by the chairman, Mr. Vaughan. Mr. Sullivan, chairman of the County Commissioners, told the committee members that he had felt for some time that the amount of insurance on the county property was far too low. He stated that since making out the first budget he had contacted insurance companies and acquired their rates for higher insurance protection. He said that he urged the delegation to raise the estimated expenditure for insurance from \$4500.00 to \$5000.00.

Mr. Vaughan asked Mr. Sullivan if he thought that \$1000.00 could be taken off from the item "Support of Poor off the Farm." Mr. Sullivan

said that he did not think that it was advisable at this time because many were being laid off from the mills in this area. Mr. Sullivan stated that he did not favor the bill in the legislature which would give the state the power to set minimum rate to pay foster homes for board of children on the county. He urged the committee members to study it carefully.

Mr. Riley made the motion that \$500.00 be added to the insurance budget. Mr. Desnoyer seconded the motion and it was voted by the members.

Mrs. Rency moved that the "Support of Poor Off the Farm" be budgeted at \$21,500.00. The motion was seconded by Mr. Desnoyer and carried.

Mr. Davis moved that the meeting adjourn. The motion was seconded and carried.

Sullivan County Delegation Meeting County Farm — March 11, 1957

The Sullivan County Delegation met at the County Farm to adopt the 1957 budget. The Delegation members inspected the County buildings at the farm, discussed the many and varied problems of County Government with the county officials present. At 12:30 Mr. and Mrs. Ahern and the Commissioners were hosts at a delicious dinner. The rising vote of thanks to our hosts was made by the Delegation.

At 1:30 P. M. the business meeting was called to order by the Chairman, Mr. Angus. After a brief discussion, the visitors and Commissioners were asked to leave the meeting. Mr. Vaughan, chairman of the Finance Committee, explained the feeling of Commissioners and the members of the Finance Committee about each item in the proposed budget.

Mrs. Frizzell raised the questions about the size of the herd, selling of cattle, and the use of an Angus bull with a Holstein herd. Mr. Davis explained that the Commissioners had reduced the herd so that milk for only the farm and hospital use would be produced and none for sale. He also stated that the Angus bull was used for breeding beef cattle. He suggested that she ask the Commissioners about the sale of the cattle.

Mr. Willet, Sullivan County Civil Defense Director, spoke to the group about the great need for a radio communicator for county defense work. He asked for \$200.00 to pay for one half of the cost of the necessary equipment. Mr. Willet left the meeting after a brief discussion.

After further discussion about the suggested changes in the proposed budget, the following action was taken by the delegation:

On motion of Mr. Desnoyer, seconded by Mr. Russell, voted that \$9000.00 be the amount of estimated revenue from the County Farm.

On motion of Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. Desnoyer, voted that \$53,000.00 be the amount of estimated revenue from the County Hospital.

On motion of Mrs. DeLude, seconded by Mrs. Frizzell, voted that \$50.90 be the estimated revenue from Interest on Deposits.

On motion of Mr. Russell, seconded by Mr. Bradbury, voted that \$300.00 be the amount of estimated revenue from Direct Relief.

On motion of Mrs. Frizzell, seconded by Mrs. DeLude, voted that \$1,000.00 be the amount of estimated revenue from Care and Board of Children.

On motion of Mrs. DeLude, seconded by Mrs. Frizzell, voted to include \$28,556.10 in revenue and use it to reduce taxation.

On motion of Mr. Desnoyer, seconded by Mr. Russell, voted to accept the amount of \$91,907.00 as the total amount of anticipated revenue for 1957.

On motion of Mr. Bascom, seconded by Mr. Bradbury, voted that \$3,600.00 be raised for salary of the Commissioners.

On motion of Mr. Nahil, seconded by Mr. Bradbury, voted that \$500.00 be raised for salary of the Treasurer.

On motion of Mr. Wirkkala, seconded by Mr. Nahil, voted that \$200.00 be raised for salary of the Auditors.

On motion of Mrs. DeLude, seconded by Mr. Brown, voted that \$1,500.00 be raised for salary of the Solicitor.

On motion of Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Monblo, voted that \$450.00 be raised for salary of the Medical Referee.

On motion of Mrs. Frizzell, seconded by Mr. Karr, voted that \$800.00 be raised for salary of the Sheriff.

On motion of Mrs. DeLude, seconded by Mr. Desnoyer, voted that \$3,700.00 be raised for Expenses of Above Officers-Except Sheriff.

On motion of Mr. Riley, seconded by Mr. Wirkkala, voted that \$1,350.00 be raised for expenses of Register of Deeds.

On motion of Mrs. DeLude, seconded by Mr. Bascom, voted that \$2,850.00 be raised for expenses of the Register of Probate.

On motion of Mr. Nahil, seconded by Mr. Bradbury, voted that \$5,000.00 be raised for Care and Supplies for the Court House and Records Building.

On motion of Mr. Russell, seconded by Mr. Riley, voted that \$2,500.00 be raised for the Jury Payroll.

On motion of Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Nelson, voted that \$1,000.00 be raised for "State vs:-" Payrolls.

On motion of Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. Nahil, voted that \$50.00 be raised for Referee and Masters.

On motion of Mr. Nelson, seconded by Mr. Chivers, voted that \$850.00 be raised for Counsel Fees.

On motion of Mr. Bradbury, seconded by Mr. D'Amante, voted that \$2,500.00 be raised for Court Stenographer, etc.

On motion of Mr. Chivers, seconded by Mr. Merrifield, voted that \$7,600.00 be raised for Clerk of Superior Court.

On motion of Mr. Philbrick, seconded by Mr. Nelson, voted that \$16,000.00 be raised for Sheriff and Deputies, with \$2,500.00 be earmarked for a sheriff's stenographer.

On motion of Mr. Karr, seconded by Mr. Nelson, voted that \$120,300.00 be raised for expenses of the County Farm.

On motion of Mr. Bradbury, seconded by Mr. Desnoyer, voted that \$21,500.00 be raised for Support of Poor Off the Farm.

On motion of Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Monblo, voted that \$10,000.00 be raised for Old Age Assistance.

On motion of Mr. Desnoyer, seconded by Mr. Riley, voted that \$21,500.00 be raised for Board and Care of Children.

On motion of Mrs. DeLude, seconded by Mr. Smith, voted that \$8,000.00 be raised for Soldiers' Aid.

On motion of Mr. D'Amante, seconded by Mr. Wirkkala, voted that \$9,000.00 be raised for Welfare Administration Expense.

On motion of Mrs. DeLude, seconded by Mr. Karr, voted that \$3,250.00 be raised to pay the interest on temporary loans.

On motion of Mr. Bascom, seconded by Mr. Davis, voted that \$1,125.00 be raised for payment of bonds interest.

On motion of Mr. Bradbury, seconded by Mr. Smith, voted that \$1,000.00 be raised for Outlay on the Court House.

On motion of Mr. Merrifield, seconded by Mr. Davis, voted that \$8,000.00 be raised for Outlay at the County Farm.

On motion of Mr. Desnoyer, seconded by Mr. Monblo, voted that \$7,050.00 be raised for equipment and chlorination plant at the County Hospital.

On motion of Mr. Wirkkala, seconded by Mr. Bascom, voted to raise \$5,000.00 to pay on Bond Indebtedness.

On motion of Mr. Bradbury, seconded by Mr. Smith, voted that \$1,200.00 be raised for All Other Payments.

On motion of Mr. Desnoyer, seconded by Mr. Nahil, voted that \$11,000.00 be raised for County Extension Service.

On motion of Mr. Bradbury, seconded by Mr. Davis, voted that \$5,000.00 be raised for Insurance.

On motion of Mr. Philbrick, seconded by Mr. Smith, voted that \$3,200.00 be raised for Employees' Retirement and Social Security.

On motion of Mr. Riley, seconded by Mr. Bradbury, voted that \$200.00 be raised for Civil Defense, with the equipment being subject to the approval of Mr. Willet.

On motion of Mr. Bradbury, seconded by Mr. Nahil, voted that the total budget of \$289,275.00 be accepted and that the amount of \$197,368.00 be raised by taxation.

Mr. Davis spoke on the reconstruction of Old Fort #4 and stressed the economic value of such a project to this area. He asked for a resolution in favor of this project and spoke about the public hearing on the bill in Concord. Mrs. Frizzell explained what had already been done by the Old Fort #4 Associates and expressed the desire of state-wide support.

On the motion of Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. Bradbury, the delegation voted to send a resolution favoring the Old Fort #4 project to the Associates. The vote was unanimous and the resolution was sent by the clerk.

Mr. Vaughan turned the meeting back to Mr. Angus. The Commissioners were asked to return to the meeting. The Commissioners registered protest because they had not been allowed the opportunity of presenting the budget to the delegation as a whole before the delegation took action on the budget. Mr. Angus and Mr. Vaughan explained that the Commissioners had met with the Finance Committee once, had held a Public Hearing on the budget and that the Chairman of the Commissioners had met with the Finance Committee once. Both Mr. Angus and Mr. Vaughan stated that they felt that the Commissioners had had ample opportunity to be heard but they would entertain a motion for the budget to be reconsidered, giving the Commissioners an opportunity to discuss the items in the budget.

On the motion of Mr. Bradbury, seconded by Mr. Desnoyer, the delegation voted to reconsider the vote whereby it passed the adoption of the total budget for 1957. Mr. Angus then called on Mr. Sullivan to explain the budget. A discussion ensued.

Mr. Vaughan explained the County Extension Service item by stating that the delegation wanted \$2,000.00 from the surplus to be used rather than allowing it to accumulate to a larger amount. Mr. Colby, County Agent, stated that he approved of this proposal since he did not need a surplus if appropriations were not held up.

Mr. Pierce asked about the water tests that had been taken. Mrs. Frizzell explained about the results of the tests and stated that she felt the county should cooperate with the State in an effort to clean up the streams and rivers. She felt that it would be difficult to force individuals to do their part under the water pollution program if local governments opposed the clean-up programs which are not interstate.

The Commissioners and visitors were asked to leave the meeting. On motion of Mr. Bradbury, seconded by Mr. Desnoyer, the delegation voted that \$21,500.00 be raised for Support of Poor off the Farm.

On motion of Mr. D'Amante, seconded by Mr. Desnoyer, the delegation voted that \$24,000.00 be raised for Board and Care of Children.

On motion of Mr. Bradbury, seconded by Mr. Nahil, the delegation voted that the total budget of \$289,275.00 be accepted and that the amount of \$197,368.00 be raised by taxation.

The Commissioners were asked to return to the meeting and Mr.

Angus presented them with the budget as voted, explained the changes-likewise expressed the feelings of the delegation that the Commissioners had done a commendable job of keeping within their budget during 1956.

Upon being asked, the Commissioners tried to explain how many cattle had been sold, how much money was received for them, and who were the purchasers. Since the Commissioners did not have their farm account book with them, they had difficulty giving exact answers but did state that 20 head were in terrible shape and that the cattle were sold through bids. The notice for bids were mailed to individual cattle dealers. Mr. Pierce stated that 21 pigs were sold during the past year.

On motion of Mr. Riley, seconded by Mrs. Frizzell, the delegation voted to adjourn at 3:45 P. M.

Executive Session of the Sullivan County Delegation
Room 100, State House — July 31, 1957

Mr. George Angus, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 12:00 noon. Mr. Samuel Hoitt, Acting Director of N. H. Extension Service, explained that due to an order from the Federal Government the Extension Service was being separated from the Farm Bureau. He said that a plan had been worked out whereby the counties would set up Counsels which would act as guidance bodies (See attached article and memorandum).

After considerable discussion, on motion of Mr. Vaughan, seconded by Mrs. Reney, the delegation voted to establish a County Extension Service Counsel according to recommendations. On motion of Mr. Russell, seconded by Mr. Desnoyer, the members voted to have Mr. Vaughan serve as delegate for one year beginning January 1, 1958. On motion of Mr. Desnoyer, seconded by Mr. Bradbury, the members voted to establish the Counsel as of January 1, 1958.

Mr. Vaughan, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that he had examined the county finance records and that all departments seemed to be within their budgets.

The meeting adjourned at 12:35 P. M.

Developments Leading to the Establishment of County Extension Service Councils

In 1915 when Federal funds were first made available for Extension work, the policy was adopted in New Hampshire that a county sponsoring committee should be established in any county before an agent would be placed in the county. Since 1925, County Farm Bureau Boards have sponsored and guided Extension work with credit both to the Farm Bureau and to the growth of the service. This cooperative sponsorship has been guided by a "Memorandum of Understanding" defining the responsibilities of the Bureaus in supervising Extension work into three general categories: (1) the employing of agents; (2) the formulating and appraising of programs; and (3) the developing and supporting of a budget for County funds for Extension work within the county.

This relationship now must be discontinued in accordance with U. S. Secretary of Agriculture's Memorandum No. 1368 which provides that the Extension Service will not be intimately associated with any one or any restricted number of general or specialized organizations of farmers.

The University administration and the Cooperative Extension Service believe in the soundness of continuing to seek the guidance and counsel of local people so that Extension's educational programs will be in the best interests of the people. This belief is amplified by a letter from the Administrator of the Federal Extension Service which reads in part as follows:

"It should be emphasized that it is not the purpose of Memorandum 1368 to limit the opportunity for local people to share in the active development and carrying out of county extension programs. It is recognized that such participation contributes immeasurably to the strength and uniqueness of cooperative extension work."

The Administrator further indicates that the provisions of Memorandum No. 1368 "will be met when the local sponsorship of county extension work occurs under the guidance and counsel of county committees, bodies or groups, whose members are widely representative of the county people, the members of such groups being selected upon the basis of their interest in the development and carrying out of a sound extension program".

It is understood that the proposed plan for establishment of County Councils will meet the provisions of the Secretary's Memorandum.

Very briefly, the plan consists of having the Board of Trustees of the University of New Hampshire and each County Convention enter into a "Memorandum of Understanding" mutually agreeing to the establishment of a County Extension Service Council to sponsor Extension work. (See "Memorandum of Understanding.")

The Memorandum states that "the duties and responsibilities of the Council will be to sponsor, promote and guide Extension work in accord-

ance with a Statement of Operating Procedures to be filed with the County Convention and with the University of New Hampshire”.

This statement outlines the basis of cooperation between the Council and the Extension Service and defines the responsibilities of each with respect to employment of agents, programs and finance.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

between the
University of New Hampshire
and the

_____ County Convention

Whereas, The Cooperative Extension Service of the University of New Hampshire has been charged by proper State and Federal authorities with the organization and maintenance of Extension work in agriculture and home economics and subjects related thereto in accordance with the provision of the Federal Smith-Lever Law, and with the administration of public funds appropriated for such purposes; and

Whereas, The _____ County Convention appropriates county funds to supplement state and federal funds for this purpose; and

Whereas, The Cooperative Extension Service has always sought the guidance and counsel of local county people in the conduct of its educational programs;

Therefore, Be it resolved that with a view to continuing the policy of local guidance, the Board of Trustees of the University of New Hampshire and the _____ County Convention do hereby enter into an agreement to recognize the _____ County Extension Service Council as the sponsor of Extension work in said county and further recognize a Finance Committee of the Council, as outlined below, to deal directly with the County Convention.

Plan of Organization and Function

Name: The Council shall be known as the _____ County Cooperative Extension Service Council, hereinafter called the “Council”.

Organization: A Council of 13 persons will be established as follows:

Each of the four county Extension advisory groups (4-H Advisory Council, Home Demonstration Advisory Council, Forestry Advisory Committee, and the major Agricultural Advisory Committees) will select three persons to serve on the Council:

The term of one to expire December 31, 1960.

The term of another to expire December 31, 1959.

The term of a third to expire December 31, 1958.

In general, all subsequent selections of persons to serve on the Council made by Extension advisory groups shall be for three-year terms. A person may serve only two three-year terms consecutively. In case of a vacancy, the Council will request the advisory group which selected the person causing the vacancy to select a person to fill the unexpired term.

In addition to the 12 persons thus selected, the County Convention will select one of its members to serve on the Council for a one- or two-year period. Persons thus selected may not serve more than six years consecutively.

Finance Committee: The Council will name a Finance Committee of five. Four will represent the four Extension groups and one will be the representative of the County Convention.

Function: The duties and responsibilities of the Council will be to sponsor, promote and guide Extension work in accordance with a **Statement of Operating Procedures** to be filed with the County Convention and with the University of New Hampshire.

This Memorandum of Understanding may be revised or cancelled by either party to the agreement on at least sixty days' written notice to the other party.

This Memorandum of Understanding shall be effective on and after a date agreed upon by both parties as indicated.

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 71, Section 27, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, the biennial examination and audit of the accounts of Sullivan County has been made by this Division. The audit covered the fiscal years ended December 31, 1955 and December 31, 1956.

Submitted herewith is the report of this audit including Exhibits as hereafter listed. The report consists of three sections as follows:

Section I -Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1955.

Section II -Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1956.

Section III-Ten Year Statement of County Taxes Assessed, Net Debt and Bonded Debt.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of County Commissioners, County Treasurer, Clerk of the Superior Court and Superintendent of the County Home.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibits A-1 & A-2)

Comparative Balance Sheets for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1954 - 1955 and December 31, 1955 - 1956, are presented in Exhibits A-1 and A-2, respectively. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$19,327.88 in 1955 and \$17,684.45 in 1956.

A revenue Surplus of \$18,043.86, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$10,512.24, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$28,556.10 in the fiscal year ended December 31, 1956.

ACCOUNTS OF COMMISSIONERS AND TREASURER

An examination was made of all orders issued by the Commissioners and Clerk of Superior Court during the periods under review. Supporting invoices and payrolls were likewise examined and the classification of expenditures noted. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1956, as indicated in Exhibit F-2.

CLERK OF SUPERIOR COURT

The financial accounts and records of the Clerk of Superior Court

of Sullivan County were examined. Court receipts were checked by source, insofar as possible, and found to be properly recorded. Court orders issued by the Clerk were supported by invoices, vouchers and payrolls bearing the approval of a Superior Court Justice.

COUNTY HOME

The accounts and records of the Superintendent of the County Home were examined. Receipts of the Home were checked by source through the triplicate receipt forms. All receipts, as recorded in the cash book, were properly accounted for by the Superintendent through remittances made to the County Treasurer.

Classified summaries of receipts and expenditures of the County Institution for the years 1955 and 1956 are presented in Exhibits G-1 and G-2, respectively.

Conclusion:

In accordance with the provision of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, a copy of this report or a summary of its findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) should be published in the next annual report of the County. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the publication of Exhibits is optional.

The appreciation and thanks of this Division is hereby expressed to the officials of Sullivan County and their office staffs for the assistance rendered during the course of the audit.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

In accordance with the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire, the annual report of the Sullivan County Commissioners on the business and financial condition of the affairs of the County is hereby submitted. A report by the respective County Officers for the year ending December 31, 1957 is included.

Before delving into the affairs of the County, we wish to express our appreciation and good wishes to Mr. William F. Sullivan, Chairman of the Board who is convalescing from a serious illness. To know and associate with him is to truly appreciate his dedication to duty, his fine judgment, and exceptional ability. We wish him God speed in regaining his health. Attorney Richard C. Duncan of Newport has accepted an appointment by the Court as Commissioner to perform the duties of County Commissioner for District #2.

During the past year a great many improvements have been made at the County Home. There have been major repairs and improvements to the buildings. The largest single item was the extra cost in maintenance of the Hospital. Also, a new building had to be constructed over the root cellar to save the potatoes, other vegetables and fruit. Additional insurance was placed on the buildings which we found were not adequately covered for present day value, and finally the completion of the new barn to replace the one that burned in May, 1956. We feel it is a decided asset to the institution and that the citizens of Sullivan County should be very proud of it.

The installation of a chlorination plant at the County Home, which

was authorized by the delegation, is finally beginning to take shape. After months of drafting plans and meeting Government specifications, the contract has been awarded to Trumbull-Nelson of Hanover, New Hampshire for \$6,826.00 plus \$710.00 engineering costs and \$680.00 for contingencies, all of which the Federal Government will pay one third.

Included in the budget for 1958 will be major repairs on the heating plant or the installation of a new heating unit, topping of the smoke stack, painting of the building and some new equipment in the hospital.

The Commissioners wish to extend their appreciation to the Delegation, and especially to the finance committee for cooperating with us so well in solving the many problems above mentioned, and to all of the County and Town Officials, and the State Welfare Department.

The Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Omer Ahern, have worked hard and very conscientiously with the problems at the County Home, and have done an outstanding job. The County is very fortunate to be able to secure their services, as well as those of all other employees.

We respectfully invite all residents of the County to visit the County Home and inspect all departments of the Institution.

Report of Superintendent of County Home:

To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners:

Gentlemen: -

Our first year as Superintendent and Matron of the County Home has been busy, enjoyable, challenging and rewarding. Our infirmary has been filled to capacity and has maintained a waiting list. Our nursing staff is to be commended for the fine work and the excellent care given to all the patients. Due to the increase of patients we hope to enlarge our diet kitchen during the coming year to better meet our needs. A great deal of painting has been done to make the rooms more cheerful and homelike. We hope to continue until all the rooms have been completed.

Throughout the year, churches, individuals, organizations, and clubs too numerous to mention, have contributed a great deal to the happiness of our patients, boarders, inmates, etc. As a result of their generosity the patients can now watch television in their sun porches and in the chapel.

We were fortunate in raising an exceptionally good garden, so it was necessary to rebuild the root cellar and thus have a suitable place to store our vegetables. This project was carried on almost entirely with help from our House of Correction.

Some of the outside buildings in need of repairs were also taken care of by the inmates.

Our Dairy Barn has been completed. Though it is some what smaller than our previous barn it is adequate to meet our needs. Our Dairy Herd has been reduced but is sufficient for our present demands. Some progress has been made in getting the herd registered.

The Milk Room has been completed. Additions to it include an aerator, a bottle filler and capper, which make for a more sanitary means of distributing milk in our institution.

For sometime there has been a need for a women's dormitory and a room for Juveniles in the House of Correction. To take care of this, storage rooms were made over and are now used for these purposes.

At this time we would like to express our thanks to Mr. William Sullivan for his counsel and guidance during the time he served as Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners and we wish to congratulate Mr. Richard Duncan on his appointment to the Board.

Much has been accomplished during the year due to the splendid cooperation and assistance of our County Commissioners.

We would like to thank the members of the Clergy of various faiths for their spiritual guidance—Dr. Stearns for his excellent services—Sheriff

McCusker for his help and cooperation—Miss Marion Davis for her helpful suggestions—our County Agent, Stanley Colby for his advice—and the many organizations, clubs, and individuals who have contributed so much to making the Home a happy place for all. We especially want to express our thanks to our fine working staff for their loyal cooperation.

REPORT OF COUNTY SOLICITOR

January 28, 1958

The Commissioners of Sullivan County

Newport, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my report as County Solicitor for the year 1957.

I believe that we can generalize by saying that 1957 was an ordinary year with the usual amount of activity. Turning first to prosecutions in the Superior Court, we find that the Grand Jury returned four indictments on the cases which were presented to it, and that eighteen persons who were arrested and charged with the commission of felonies availed themselves of our statute permitting the waiving of indictment by the Grand Jury in order to expedite disposition of the cases in our Superior Court. The felonies involved included breaking, entering and larceny, statutory rape, commission of an unnatural act, aggravated assault, desertion, reckless driving resulting in death, and other serious breaches of our laws. In addition there were seven appeals to the Superior Court from the decisions of the Municipal Courts of our County. Each year the Municipal Courts handle many hundreds of cases where the charge involved is a misdemeanor. In those cases in the Municipal Courts where the defendant entered a plea of not guilty and was represented by counsel, the Solicitor conducted the prosecution in behalf of the State.

A function of the Solicitor's office which becomes more and more time consuming each year is that of compelling a recalcitrant husband, ex-husband or father to support his wife, ex-wife or children. When the person responsible for support is within the geographical limits of our State and has the ability to support, we succeed usually without much trouble in obtaining the desirable result. However, frequently the man whom we seek to have render support is outside the jurisdiction and we must bring proceedings under the so-called Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act. In this type of proceeding, testimony is taken from the wife, ex-wife or mother in this State, and, in recorded form, is sent to the state having jurisdiction over the man involved, there to be used against him in a hearing held for the purpose of determining whether he is of sufficient ability to support. The state having jurisdiction over him determines his ability to make support payment and makes an order against him, thus compelling support. As might be expected, New Hampshire is the responding state in many of these Reciprocal Enforcement of Support proceedings in which cases the recorded testimony is sent to us by the courts of another state and we then apprehend the respondent, if he can be found in Sullivan County, and your Solicitor conducts the proceedings in our Su-

perior Court. The number of cases wherein we are the initiating state and responding state are increasing each year, as this non-support problem is becoming more and more acute throughout the country.

As in the past I want once again to express my deep gratitude to our Sheriff, James F. McCusker, and his deputies for the full cooperation rendered to me in all criminal matters. I am indebted also to the members of the local Police Departments, the State Troopers, Probation Officers, and representatives of the Motor Vehicle Department assigned to Sullivan County for their devoted assistance. I attribute our success in the law enforcement field to the teamwork of all engaged in police work in the County.

The County, of course, is a political entity, and as such transacts a great deal of business. As in all businesses today, a great variety of legal problems arise, and these are referred to and discussed with the Solicitor who is the attorney for the County. The County Commissioners and the personnel of their office have been most considerate and helpful in resolving the problems which we have encountered. I wish to thank them all.
