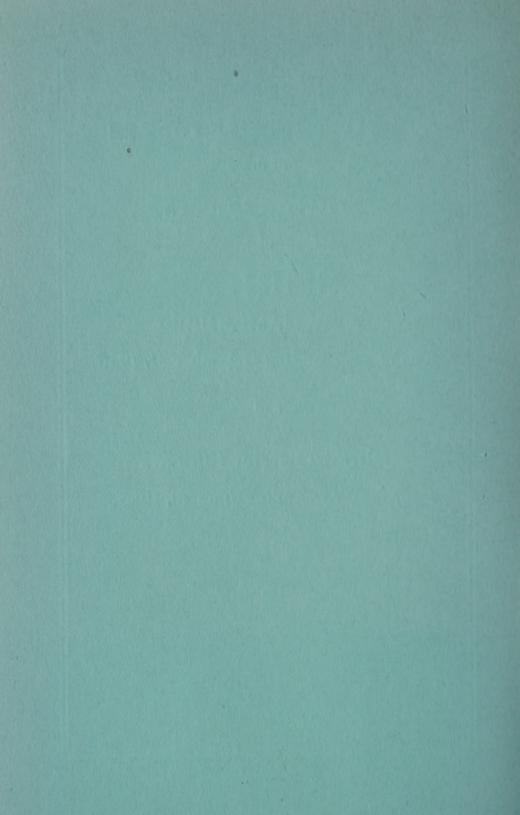

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Surry in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Surry on Tuesday the twelfth day of March, next at eight of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to make any changes in the amount to be raised and appropriated as presented by the Budget Committee in the annual budget.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the continuance of the Fire Department, or take any action in relation thereto.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the Elliot Community Hospital or take any action in relation thereto.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$37.00 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action in relation thereto.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Old Age Assistance, or take any action in relation thereto.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be used by heavy equipment for improve-

ment on the Joslin Hill Road, commencing at the Keene-Alstead Road to the junction in the road beyond the Swan Homestead.

- 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 10. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to the U. S. Government "G" Bond that has matured and to appropriate the money of the same, or take any action in relation thereto.
- 11. To see if the town wishes to place liability insurance on the Town Hall and adjoining buildings and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to accept the building for a fire station erected on the land accepted by the town at the annual town meeting of March 1955, or take any action relation thereto.
- 13. To see what action the town wishes to take on setting new rates of rental for the town hall, or take any action in relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of \$200.00 for the installation of automatic heat and other necessary improvements in the Reed Free Library. Said sums to be immediately turned over to the Library Trustees.
- 15. "To see if the town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act. (Old Age and Survivors Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and raise and appropriate such sums of money to defray the town's share of the cost thereof."
- 16. "If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreements with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the town will designate the (officer) as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan."

- 17. To see what action the Town wishes to take on the recommendations, changes and proposed amendments presented by the Town Planning Board, of our Zoning Ordinance adopted at the Town Meeting of March 1951, or take any action in relation thereto.
- 18. To see whether the town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance by adding thereto the following provisions relating to Trailers, Mobile Homes, Trailer Parks and Mobile Home Developments, in pursuant to the authority conferred by the Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire, or take any action in relation thereto.
  - 19. To hear the reports of the Town Officers.
  - 20. To allow accounts.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### REED FREE LIBRARY

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

There are now about 6,198 books on the shelves of the Library of which some 1,700 were in circulation during the past year. Our aim is to greatly increase this circulation during the coming year.

The main project this year has been the start of an expanded juvenile section. This will be continued into 1957.

Mr. Maurer of the State Library Extension Service assisted in the weeding out of some old books and the choice of new.

Application was made for State Library Aid and \$100.00 was granted Reed Free Library for new books. These were chosen from the State approved list for junior and senior High

School groups. The list covers a wide range of reference, study, fiction and non-fiction books. When received and catalogued, the list will be published.

On Community Day in August, the Library was open to the public. Exhibits of art and craft work by Surry residents as well as a display of pictures of Old Time Surry were shown.

In February, 1956 the hours of opening were changed from Saturday to Friday. This change was on trial and as the town grows it may be necessary to change the hours again or increase the hours of opening during the week.

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

### SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district of the Town of Surry qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall of said district on the Fifth day of March, 1957, at 8:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board, and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or other officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation, of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to establish a capital reserve fund for the financing of all or part of the construction and equipping of an addition to the present elementary school together with any alterations or renovations necessary in con-

nection with this new construction, such reserve to be created in accordance with R. S. A., Chapter 35 and any amendments thereto.

- 10. If article (9) is adopted, to see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to transfer to the capital reserve fund a sum not to exceed \$2,000.00 or its unencumbered surplus funds remaining on hand at the end of the school year 1956-1957.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the district the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivors' Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 to defray the district's share of the cost thereof.
- 12. To see if the district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.
- 13. To see if the district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.
- 14. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the district will authorize the school board to execute on behalf of the district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the district will designate the School District Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- 15. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to receive and use in the name of the district, such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States government or any department or agency thereof, or any state or private agency.
- 16. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to negotiate a tuition contract with the Keene School District.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Surry:

I herewith submit my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

The estimated balance was \$300.00 at the time the budget was adopted last year; the actual balance at the end of the year was \$456.43. The difference of \$156.43 was used to lower the amount of money to be raised by taxation. An additional \$200.00 was received from the state as building aid. This made a total of \$356.43 to reduce taxes.

Arrangements to transport pupils that live on Route 12 near the Westmoreland line to the Surry School has meant an increase in transportation cost. However, the saving in tuition cost results in a net saving of \$400.00. The saving will be about \$500.00 this coming year.

Our expected balance this year is such that a reduction of more than \$2,000.00 can be made in the amount to be raised by taxation. This balance is the result of less money having to be spent for tuition and additional income from tuition resulting from the operation of a new state law requiring school districts to pay for children who are now their responsibility to educate.

There was one teacher change this year. Mr. George Rollins replaced Mr. Walter Goodnow as Principal and teacher of grades seven and eight.

All the teachers of Supervisory Union No. 60 are participating in a program of professional growth and development this year. Monthly teachers' meetings are planned by the principals who meet with the superintendent a week in advance of the date of the teachers' meeting. Topics that have been considered to date are: Planning for Better Teaching; Getting the Most Out of Our Teaching Resources; and Science Education.

The Charlestown and Walpole Supervisory Unions held a joint teachers' meeting at Charlestown in October for the pur-

pose of discussing ways and means of improving the teaching of handwriting. Miss Kittle, a nationally recognized authority in the field of handwriting, was obtained as a consultant for this meeting.

The results of achievement tests given in April each year show that Surry compares favorably with national and area averages.

I again want to express my gratitude to the Parents Club for their financial assistance in the school lunch program and their help in obtaining visual aid materials.

A census of children, ages 0-18, is taken each year in September. The following enrollment chart is the result of information taken from the census cards. The chart shows that 1960 is the critical year as far as we know from information as to children now living in Surry. However, if we had an increase of one in either grade 7 or 8 next year the small room would be unable to cope with the situation.

  - 5. To help prevent and control disease.
- 6. Provide necessary emergency service for injury or sudden illness.

These school health services are aims that can be reached through the cooperation of a community. We are fortunate to have this cooperation in Surry.
