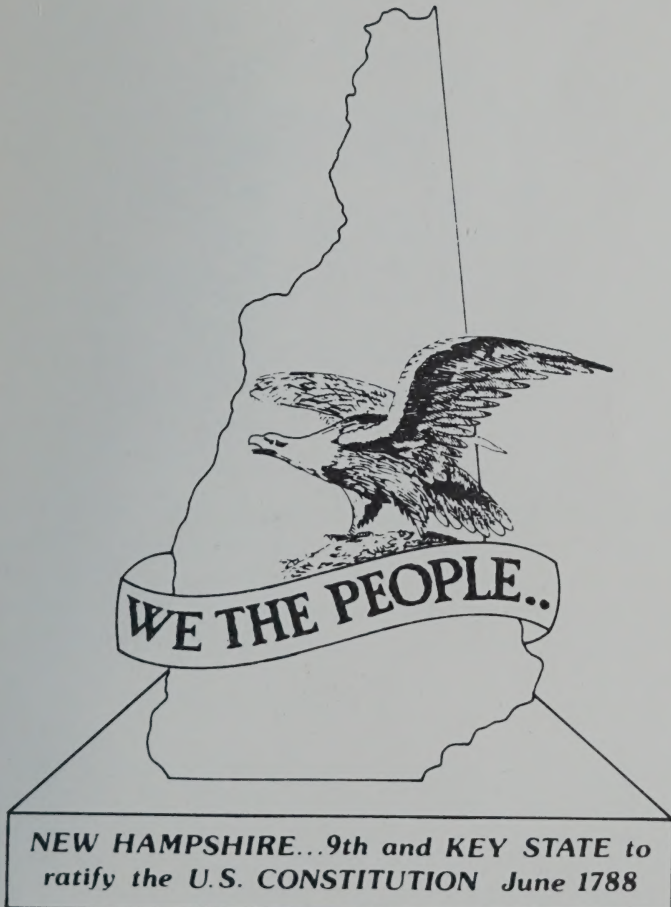


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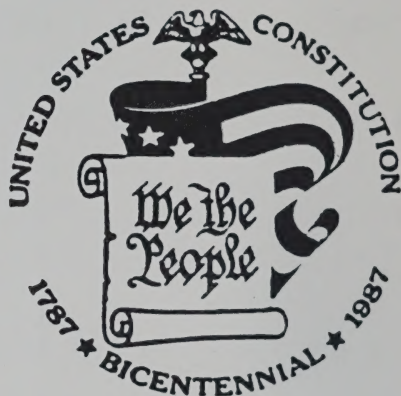

ARTICLE No. 52. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to purchase a new highway plow. Funds to be removed from federal revenue sharing funds.

ARTICLE No. 53. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to remove from the capital reserve fund, all monies and accrued interest to date, for the purpose of installing a new furnace in the Cook Memorial Library.

ARTICLE No. 54. To authorize the Trustees of the Trust Funds to spend monies from their reserves to purchase land for cemetery purposes.

ARTICLE No. 55. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend funds from the State, Federal, or any other governmental unit, or any private source

which might become available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95b.

ARTICLE No. 56. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property acquired by Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE No. 57. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

ARTICLE No. 58. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Finance Committee held four meetings in which every warrant article involving a proposed appropriation was reviewed. Proponents of petitioned articles and representatives of organizations were given opportunities to present reasons for their requests and answered questions from members of the Committee on any point needing clarification. After all requests were discussed, the Committee voted on all articles concerning money. The results of these votes are recorded with the article.

The following is a brief explanation of the Committee's voting on certain articles and recommendations on others.

Article No. 14: Damages & Legal Expenses(\$3,000.00)

The Committee suggested that serious consideration be given to increasing the amount greatly in lieu of zoning plans which are now being considered in Tamworth.

Article No. 27: Tamworth Constitutional Bicentennial Commission Fireworks (\$2,000.00)

The Committee was led to understand that the fireworks "setting-off" would be the responsibility of the Tamworth Constitutional Bicentennial Commission and not the Tamworth Fire Department, because of insurance legalities.

Article No. 29: Animal Pound Kennels (\$1,100.00)

The Committee felt the plans that were shown to them, would not necessarily solve this problem and be very unhealthy for the animals.

Article No. 33: Tamworth Outing Club-Little League Program (\$1,800.00)

The Committee asked the Tamworth Outing Club to submit a detailed budget request, which they did not do by the appointed time. We believe a discussion with the Treasurer of the Tamworth Outing Club at Town Meeting will help clarify this matter.

Article No.34: Water Safety Program-Mt. Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross (\$3,460.00)

The Committee made the suggestion that the other towns whose children actively participate in this program, be contacted for an

appropriation to help defray the cost of Tamworth solely sponsoring the water safety program at White Lake State Park.

Article No. 36: Lakes Region Planning Commission (\$1,683.00)

As in the past, the Committee felt Tamworth Planning Board should request this amount and not the Lakes Region Planning Commission.

Article No. 43: Center of Hope, Inc. (\$500.00)

The Committee requested more information from the Center of Hope and did not receive it. Basically, because the Center has not made a "donation in lieu of taxes" on the property in Chocorua, this request was inappropriate.

We would like to thank the people who came to the Finance Committee meetings to answer the questions and clarify some other points of interest. As usual, the Finance Committee is always looking for new members. If you would like to become a member, please contact the Chairman or the Selectmen.

Between July 1985 and June 1986, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The two leading causes of forest fires were again children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with **your** help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT FOR 1986

PRIME WETLANDS. The proposal to designate eight wetlands as "prime" was not put to vote last March as the Planning Board, which had the final decision, was concerned about boundaries. The Conservation Commission approved the proposal and it will be put to vote in 1987, by petition to the Planning Board to put it on the ballot.

A public hearing was held on December 8. Bruce Robinson, Planning Board chairman, stated again the Board's concern over accuracy of the wetland boundaries, although he said the Board approved of the concept of a Prime Wetlands Ordinance. He said the effort spent to call in professionals to settle boundary disputes was too time-consuming for the Board. A complete survey of the boundaries would be too expensive. And, too, the Board is concerned as to possible litigation. One person at the hearing pointed out that it would make no difference to the Planning Board as the Town already has a wetland ordinance covering all wetlands. It was also said that since under the prime wetlands proposal the State Wetlands Board would be required to hold a hearing on any dredge and fill applications, the Planning Board would be helped by the input from professionals, landowners and abutters.

At present a person proposing to dredge or fill in any wetland must make application to the State Wetlands Board, the Conservation Commission checks the situation and makes recommendations to the State Board which decides whether or not to grant a permit. A prime wetlands ordinance, by law, affects only the procedures by which dredge and fill applications are handled by the Wetlands Board. If such an ordinance is passed by Tamworth it would mandate that the State Wetlands Board hold a public hearing for any dredge and fill application for a "prime" wetland, and that the State could not grant the permit unless it could prove from evidence at the hearing that there would be no damage to the wetland. Other than this the dredge and fill application would be handled in the same way as for any wetland.

DREDGE AND FILL. There have been five applications for dredge and fill in wetlands. The Commission has had field trips to these and, for those involving sub-divisions, trips were in conjunction with the Planning Board. On four of these there was to be little disturbance to wetlands, the Commission notified the Wetlands Board that it approved, provided work was done as planned, and

the Wetlands Board granted permits. Decision on the fifth is pending results of a public hearing. In two of these cases applications for dredge and fill were only made after complaints to the Conservation Commission that work was being done without permit. In one case there was no violation and the owner, at the Commission's request, applied for a permit, which was granted. The other case, involving serious violation, is being handled by the State Wetlands Board, to which the Commission reported the violation; it is this case which is still pending.

TRAILS. The bridge over Swift River on the Big Pines Trail has been waterproofed. All trails have been cleared of fallen logs. New trail brochures and new guides to Big Pines Trail have been printed and distributed, and more brochures on trails at White Lake and Black Spruce Ponds, in the Pitch Pine National Natural Area, have been ordered and received from the State.

COMMISSION MEMBERS. Peg King and Betty Steele were re-appointed by the Selectmen, and Tom Willgoose came back on the Commission, by appointment, to fill an unexpired term.

REMICK NATURAL AREA. The State has taken, by eminent domain, land along the road in conjunction with its work on Route 113, and has paid \$200 for it. The Commission doesn't feel this is enough and is appealing. Decision on this is still pending.

LAND AT WHITTIER. The boundary dispute on this small piece of land along the Bearcamp river, donated by Charles Thompson, has been settled in favor of the Commission, pins have been put in to mark corners and trailers parked on this town land have been removed.

RICKER JUNK YARD. Commission chairman, Peg King, attended a public hearing at the Town Hall and presented a statement citing the potential health hazard, and deterioration of surrounding property values. A field trip was held here to see if wetlands were involved. The Wetlands Board made an on-site inspection and determined that the actual area of the junk yard itself was not on wetlands. At question is the renewal of a junk yard license by the State. One has not yet been issued, but the Department of Transportation informed the Commission that one will be if buffer zones are cleared of junk satisfactorily.

OTHER ACTIVITIES. Scenic roads ordinance - a variance had been applied for. The Commission held a field trip in conjunction with the Planning Board, which requested Commission advice, found the proposed cutting was minor and not detrimental aesthetically. The Planning Board has granted the variance.

N.H. Association of Conservatin Commissions. Two members of the Commission attended the annual meeting of the Association and served on a panel to describe work done through the years on inventorying of natural resources. The Tamworth Commission has progressed further with this than any other commission in the state.

The Commission has again contributed, in co-operation with the Tamworth/Sandwich Garden Club, toward a scholarship for a student at the Forestry Society's Conservation Camp.

MEETINGS, CONFERENCES AND WORKSHOPS

Monthly network meetings of the Carroll County Community Professionals continued to be held at Mountain View Nursing

Home in Ossipee. This provides an excellent opportunity for this vast county to come together and discuss topics concerning health and community projects and concerns. Some of the guests we hosted this past year were: Kevin McManus from New England Non-Profit Housing who spoke on a new PLAN for elderly housing; Carolyn Lucette from the Family Health Services, formerly Family Planning who spoke on their expanding and much needed health services; Lee Cram, the Vista Volunteer for Community Action Program and their Literacy Movement; and Fred Creed from State Council on Aging who reviewed Safety for the Elderly.

May 21 - Attended Cardiac Care workshop presented by the American Heart Association.

June 21 - Health Fair at Huggins Hospital. Assisted in health screening - blood pressure, heart assessment and healthy living instructions for adults.

July 29 - Attended inservice at Lakes Region General Hospital on Outpatient Care of the Colostomy Patient. Some of the problems faced by these patients and new products were discussed.

October 3 - Attended the 4th Annual Alzheimer's Conference at Loon Mountain. Donna Cohen, author of "A Loss of Self" and noted authority on this dehumanizing and dreaded disease spoke on Aging, stressing the need of this country to address this subject before we can answer questions to the Long Term Care of our elderly. It was a very supportive day for those of us who work with the elderly.

December 11 - Attended V.A./V.N.A. day at the Veterans Administration in White River Junction, Vermont. Visiting Nurses learned that Veterans Administration, too, has been hit with budget cuts and this means more work for the nurse treating patients at home. More skill is being required for this care, also, such as patients going home with intravenous therapy or respirators. All in all, the home health nurse is going to be handling a more involved caseload in the near future.

COMMUNITY PROJECTS

Meals on Wheels continues to serve a very important function in this town. This is their 8th year in Tamworth. During 1986 between 8 and 13 clients received hot meals served in convenient packs to their door. Once again, a big round of applause and thanks goes out to Charlotte Remick, Coordinator and to the volunteer drivers. Congregate meals are served every Tuesday in

Moultonboro, where many Tamworth seniors are transported to the site for a hot meal and socialization.

Our monthly Blood Pressure Clinic is still held the last Wednesday of each month at 12:00 noon at the nurse's office. Feel free, no matter what age, to come and have your blood pressure checked. Take advantage of this free service.

In October, we sponsored a CPR course for professionals to be recertified. Many of the town's nurses and rescue squad members participated. Thank you to David Hughes, our inspirational instructor and the Red Cross for the use of their equipment.

The yearly children's dental program supported the dental care of 23 children from Kenneth Brett School. Once again, Dr. Michael Glick, DMD, in Ossipee provided this service for us.

Once again, St. Andrew's Church and Food Pantry prepared Thanksgiving baskets for Tamworth Community Nurse Association to deliver to needy Tamworth residents. Eight baskets were delivered. Our deep appreciation and thanks goes to those who helped.

There was a report that Santa Claus and his helper were seen using the nurse's car to deliver gifts and food to 77 individuals and 9 families on December 23. Many thanks to the townspeople, the Lion's Club, the TCNA Board of Directors for donating valuable funds, gifts and time. Oh, and thanks to Santa and his helper. They told me everyone enjoyed their visit and bounty.

It's been a wonderful year for me, both as a professional serving this town and personally, as my husband and I had our first child, our beautiful daughter, Sydra, on January 30. Special thanks go to the nurses who many of you met while I was on maternity leave. Minda Streeter, Barbara Cleveland and Ingrid Albee relieved me, without a worry, during this time. Carol Lovely, RN, has been serving as associate nurse since August. I thoroughly enjoy working with her and patient feedback has been very positive. I would like to extend a sincere thank-you to June Donovan, our wonderful secretary and Carol. Remember, this town is so lucky to have this free service, but we need and appreciate your donations. Feel free to call or come in and see us.

ANIMAL CONTROL 1986

In response to 62 complaints, 44 dogs were impounded at the Tamworth Dog Holding Facility. Of these, most were claimed by their owners after obtaining a license from the Town Clerk and a rabies shot when necessary. I was able to place 6 dogs with new owners, the Humane Society accepted 5 dogs and only one dog had to be euthanized. I was also called to check on possible cruel treatment to horses, cows in the middle of Route 16, a bat in a kitchen sink drain (very soggy but able to be released) and two skunks who were trapped in window wells but could be scooped up in a net and freed. 894 miles travelled.

I issued 8 court complaints and 7 of these required a hearing at Ossipee District Court. A Rabies Clinic was held on 5 April 1986. Dr. Tevis Kraft was the attending veterinarian and again Barry Wade volunteered his time to help with the paper work. 40 rabies shots were given and 51 dogs were licensed at the Clinic. Another Rabies Clinic will be held in early April of 1987. Exact date and time will be advertised on WBNC and in the Carroll County Independent. **ALL DOGS MUST HAVE A RABIES SHOT AND MUST BE LICENSED BY 1 MAY 1987.** Licenses will again be available at the Rabies Clinic as well as at the Office of the Town Clerk.

As in past years, most of the complaints I receive continue to be the nuisance of dogs who are not restricted to their home boundaries. **THERE IS A TOWN LEASH LAW.** It is "unlawful for any dog to run at large, i.e. off the premises of the owner or keeper and not under control by means of personal presence and attention." "Any authorized person may seize, impound or restrain any dog in violation of the above and deliver said dog to the Tamworth Holding Facility." Please cooperate with the Town Leash Law. It is not fair for you to allow your dog to run at large. Your dog then causes problems with other dogs who are restrained on their property. It is never the dog who is at fault; it is you, the owner who is negligent.

I try to respond as soon as possible to all the complaints that I receive. Since I have other job obligations it is not always possible for me to respond immediately. Nor is it always possible for you to reach me immediately. When not available by telephone I can be reached through the Sheriff's Office or Troop E on my police radio. It is also possible for you to bring a dog found running at large to the Town Facility and place him in a pen provided you

leave information as to where the dog was found and what the problem is. Your complaints about dogs who are causing problems are CONFIDENTIAL. Your identity does not need to be revealed unless you are willing to come to court to validate your complaint. If you give me your name, I will respect that confidentiality. If you bring a dog to the Facility you must let me know who you are; otherwise wait for me to come to you. You may NOT remove a dog from the Facility without my authorization to do so.

I continue to very much enjoy my job as your Animal Control Officer and I do try to do my best to serve you to the best of my ability. It is, however, not possible for me to do a good job without your cooperation. If you have complaints about dogs please make me aware of them. I cannot attempt to solve a problem unless I know there is one. This is only a part-time job and I am only able to do what I can during the hours that are possible. Your cooperation and assistance are what make the job successful. Thank you for your help.

Thank you to the Selectmen, the Police, the Town Clerk, Troop E and the Carroll County Sherrif's Office for their help and cooperation which add greatly to the efficiency and success of this job.

COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY

Increased attendance figures for 1986 indicate the continued growth in our community as well as the growth in our library membership and patronage. There were 6,258 visits by library users who borrowed a total of 8,572 books, records, tapes and other materials. Pre-School classes visited the library each week for a story and to take out books.

We purchased or were given 483 books. We received 169 books on Inter-Library loan at the request of individual patrons. Films were borrowed from the State Library for 104 showings for Day Care and we offer this service to any community group.

The Library may be used for meetings. In 1986 21 different groups held 95 meetings. Cook Memorial Library serves as a storage center for the town movie projector (a charge of \$1.00 for maintenance fee), speakers and screen as well as cassette players and oral history tapes.

We thank those who made donations in memory of Ruth Flacus, Dale Tripp, John Hoag, Edna Mason, Albert & Horace Fortier, Charlotte Hammond and Ed French (Bear Paw Memorial Funds). Books were purchased and inscribed as a lasting memorial. Also this past year we bought many fine children's books with the interest of the Gregg Children's Fund.

In April the Trustees held a celebration honoring our many volunteers, Friends of the Library and the donors who matched the Mellon Grant for the purchase of the Library of America. Last Fall the Trustees decided to offer programs which would be of interest to the local community. The first one was a musical program for the Pattisons. There will be more in 1987.

I wish to thank Vern Dyer, the Keeper of the clock, and Bertha Eastwick, Sally Zink, Martha Sylvia, Isabel Hoag and Bernie Ulitz who help each week with the carding and shelving of books. The enormous task of creating a shelf list of all our books (as required by the State Library by the year 1988) is nearing completion thanks to Yvonne Hills, Sally Zink, Jean Greene, Betty Perkins, Ellen Eldridge and Bertha Eastwick. We all appreciate the beauty of our window boxes in all seasons through the efforts of the Garden Club and Martha Sylvia in particular.

Friends of the Library meets at 1:30 on the 4th Tuesday of the month (except in the winter) under the leadership of President Barbara Fromm. New members are always welcome. The Friends group sponsors the summer story hour (directed so ably

by Louise Wrobleski), decorated the library at Christmas and purchases much needed items for the library. This year they purchased the very large and useful bulletin board in the front hall and the wonderful electronic typewriter (which I particularly appreciate).

The Tamworth Historical Society through the efforts of Marian Nickerson and Sylvia Newsom presented the library with a genealogical card file of Tamworth vital statistics and a typed alphabetically arranged binder of genealogical family records compiled by Helen Hidden years ago. Both will give patrons and researchers readily accessible historical and genealogical information. Also Lil McGrew and Muriel Bradford - on behalf of the Historical Society - gave the library on permanent loan the remaining volumes of the Tamworth Social Library — a library founded by Parson Samuel Hidden in 1796. Our library is honored to house these historic gifts.

The Library Board of Trustees meets on the 2nd Monday of each month at 4:00 at the library and the public is always welcome. Tamworth residents have the privilege of using both libraries and the hours for both follows:

**TAMWORTH RED CROSS
WATER SAFETY PROGRAM
1986**

The 1986 Tamworth Red Cross Water Safety Program had another busy and productive season. Held annually during the month of July at White Lake State Park, classes meet Monday - Friday for 20 days. This year's program experienced a 25% increase in enrollment over last year with 206 individuals attending a variety of swim classes endorsed by the American Red Cross.

Advanced Beginner, Intermediate, and Swimmer courses were held in the morning. Noontime classes were for the very young beginner; infant, toddler and preschooler. The toddler classes which are always well attended had 69 enrollees. The acquisition of preliminary swimming skills at a young age enable these students to progress quite rapidly and successfully through the beginner and advanced beginner classes. Also offered were Basic Rescue, Advancing Life Saving, and classes for adults of varying abilities.

The success of the program is due to the combined talent and cooperation of many people. Many thanks to all of our dedicated and competent teachers who make learning the fundamentals of swimming both challenging and fun. Judith Conway, the head instructor, and Martha Chandler, our part-time instructor, have provided a combined total of over 25 years of instruction with the swim program. The stability, support, and fine teaching that they have given to this program is invaluable. They were ably joined by Susan Spinney, a teacher for two years with our program, and David Sauer, a former graduate of our swim program, who recently completed his Water Safety Instructor training.

Thanks also to the following people who have provided assistance, expertise and support: Don McGarrity of the Tamworth Rescue Squad for his presentation on Artificial Respiration and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation; to Mike Johnson, Manager at White Lake for his support in the use of the Lakes' facilities; and finally many thanks to Maureen Walker, Executive Director of the Mount Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross for all her cooperation and for her time and assistance in supplying our program with books, video tapes, and kickboards.

Another segment of our program where we would welcome more participants is our Swim and Stay Fit sessions. In this fitness program individuals swim at their own pace and log their

distances in 440 yard segments on both an individual record card and on a program record sheet. Swimmers are eligible for their first certificate at the completion of 10 miles and additional certificates at 20, 30, 40, and at 50 miles a certificate, pin, and emblem. This program for both adults and children has no time limit for completion and distances can be logged for lap time at other swimming facilities.

We would like to extend an invitation for more people to join this healthy exercise program. For more details about the Swim and Stay Fit Program, please contact the Director of the Tamworth Red Cross Water Safety Program.
