# TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 11th of March next, at nine-thirty in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years and all other necessary town officers.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for snow removal and sanding.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing town highways and bridges.

Article 5. To see if the town will accept state aid for Construction of Class 5 roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$314.82.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of snow removal equipment.

Article 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting. Article 9. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes, excepting poll taxes, paid before dates to be designated at this meeting and the selectmen to extend the dates if the adjournment of Legislature necessitates, and all poll taxes shall be collected on or before July 1, 1941.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the fire department.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be set aside as a sinking fund, to pay for the water bonds at maturity.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the water system.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of employing a district nurse.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for observance of Memorial Day.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to allow the American Legion to use the town hall one Friday night each month without pay.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) in addition to the amount required by law for public library. Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the purpose of advertising the resources and natural advantages of the town, said sum to be expended under the direction of the selectmen, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### **REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

To the School Board and Citizens of Troy:

I herein submit my seventh annual report as superintendent of schools.

Education today faces a crisis in history and civilization. If we are to maintain the ideals of democracy, we must not forget the boys and girls in our public schools who are soon to be the men and women that have to carry on in a changed world. They will have to cope against far reaching questions and pay enormous Therefore, it is fitting that we scrutinize carefully our debts. objectives and clarify our methods of procedure. Indeed, in our final analysis we must regard our boys and girls in the public schools as our first and last line of defense. All isms and philosophies that are poisonous to democracy and the American Way of life must be banished from our public schools and colleges. We believe our methods of procedure must follow along three lines of thought, viz. (1) an invigorated drill and practice in fundamentals. the efficiency of the "Three R's" can not be overlooked, the purity of the English language must be maintained, the intellectual activity and vision of life extended.

(2) The pupils must be imbued with a deeper feeling for, sense of appreciation of and a higher respect for the home, the school and the community. (3) Every child must be brought into contact with some situation of life that may give him control of himself, give him the power of decision between right and wrong. The boys and girls of today are looking not only onward but also upward. Let our training be such that they will see more above them than airplanes but will grasp the fundamental ideas of a Divinity that rules the Universe.

With the coordination and correlation of the above mentioned lines of thought, we may be able to make our objective, viz., the true Christian American citizen, to whom we may delegate with safety the welfare of the American Way of life, the Constitution and the highest ideals of democracy.

# REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF TROY HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my report as headmaster of Troy High School.

#### SENIOR HIGH

No special consideration need be given to the above table—the size of the individual classes as well as the total enrollment remaining about the same as that of the past year.

We have been exceedingly fortunate in securing as members of our faculty men and women of successful experience, skilled as teachers and enthusiastic and loyal in their work in the school. For the first time in the history of Troy High School (as a fouryear high school) each teacher of the staff holds a bachelor's degree. In addition, two of the teachers of the staff hold the degree of Master of Arts, and the younger members are showing a keen interest in improving themselves professionally through the facilities and offerings of summer schools. The co-operation among the teachers of the whole school is on a very high level.

During the past few years the high school curriculum has been departmentalized to a considerable extent in an effort to improve the class instruction, the efficiency of the staff, and the administration of the school. Departments of English, mathematics, social science, domestic arts, practical arts, and music are now definitely established and headed by individual members of the staff. Courses in the physical sciences and foreign languages are not as yet centralized under any one teacher.

For some time we have attempted to provide more physical education-not necessarily for the development of our pupils alone, nor for the production of championship teams, but more specifically for the development in our children of such essentials in character and citizenship as honesty, courtesy, service, humility, alertness to surroundings, willingness to do more than the assigned job, and a keener sense of moral obligation. For learning cooperation we feel that there is no better place than in those games in which team play is a basic principle. Here we feel that we have made enormous gains—gains that have resulted in a very definite improvement, among the members of our student body, in such desirable qualities as self-control, good sportsmanship, obedience, and adherence to rules and regulations, punctuality, persistence in spite of failure, an improved school spirit. The accomplishments of our teams for the past three years certainly speak for themselves and are excellent indicators of the success we are attaining in this branch of endeavor.

During the past summer over two hundred desks in the school were resurfaced, obliterating forever marks and engravings, that in some instances have existed for over thirty years. This was a much needed repair and one for which both the teachers and pupils are extremely grateful. During the same period the ceilings and walls of two class rooms and the central basement room were redecorated. A small partition was also erected near the boys' basement stairs which added sufficient room to the existing shop for a bench accommodating three boys at a time engaged in metal work.

New equipment added to the general shop consisted primarily of metal-working tools and machinery, the most important and instructive being a bench model machine lathe with all attachments. A portable sanding machine, added to the wood-working machinery, is proving a most useful tool in the finishing of projects.

In fulfilling the needs of the program outline in the courses in home economics, considerable equipment had to be added and installed during the summer. Two cabinet sinks, an electric refrigerator, and sufficient pots, pans, and dishes for food classes were purchased outright with funds received from the federal government under the George-Dean Act. The Derry Electric Company very generously replaced the stove, which they loaned us last year, with a new and better model, and the Geddes Oil Company of Keene has kindly allowed us the use of one of their lastest "Pyrofax" gas stoves for an indefinite period. The home economics department is very rapidly attaining equipment sufficient to meet all state and federal requirements for continued aid.

Evening classes in English and United States Constitutional History are being taught twice a week at the school. These classes are the result of a request on the part of several adults who wish to improve their written and spoken English and their knowledge of United States History for the purpose of gaining citizenship in this country. Miss Iva Handy and Mr. Alder Hatch are conducting these classes.

I should like to take this opportunity to call to the attention of the parents and interested citizens of Troy, the extreme danger of serious accidents which exists in the Town Hall as it is used now for basketball. If we are to continue this fine school activity, and if we do not find it expedient at this time to provide a more suitable gymnasium, we should certainly make an earnest and conscientious effort to correct some of the glaring hazards to safety that may be found in the hall at present. The fact that no one has been hurt to date is remarkable, but this does not excuse neglect in the future. I urgently recommend that a safety committee be appointed to study these hazards and to see that adequate steps are taken to correct them. To put this matter off is to invite serious injury which may well cripple one of our boys or girls for life.

If we are to make progress in our musical work at the school, more time will have to be devoted to that phase of study by a competent teacher. I recommend, therefore, that our music supervisor be engaged for one full day each week rather than for one day every other week. I also recommend that Mr. Winfield Farr of Keene, who is now instructing many of our pupils in the rudiments of instrumental music, be employed for one period per week for the purpose of teaching and leading a large group of our musically talented pupils in orchestral work.

The student body and faculty implore parents and citizens

to visit school more frequently in order to see first hand the methods and practices involved in the local learning process. Your opinions and criticisms are earnestly solicited, and every effort will be made to give all practical ideas and suggestions careful consideration with a view to improving the school through their adoption.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the superintendent of schools, teachers, pupils, and citizens of Troy for their loyal support and co-operation during the past year.

### **REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC**

I am happy to report that the past year has shown progress in the Music Department of the Troy schools. Progress is not to be measured only by what is seen and heard in public,—routine, theoretical work must go on. However, I wish to mention some activities aside from routine.

All grades from Five through Junior High have listened to the N. B. C. music appreciation programs, using the work sheets prescribed for the courses.

The Troy school orchestra made several public appearances last year, one very gratifying result being the interest shown in forming new classes for instrumental study.

Nearly 150 pupils of the grades and Junior High school in April presented an attractive and entertaining operetta, "The Magic Piper." Two performances were given and enthusiastically received. The Jaffrey Junior High Glee Club sang a group of selections between acts and the Troy school orchestra entertained before and between acts.

Again Troy High school was represented in the New Hampshire High School Music Festival held in Laconia with Dorothy Haskins and Eleanor Masse as members of the All-State Chorus of 200 voices. Troy, Jaffrey and Fitzwilliam singers engaged in weekly rehearsals with their supervisor and on Féstival week presented to the School Board, Junior High and High School pupils of the three towns represented, the entire chorus program from memory.

Rehearsals will soon be started for this season's festival, also plans are under way for an operetta to be given by grade and Junior High children.

It is with real gratitude that I write this report, for School Board, Superintendent, and teachers have been most cooperative.
