

TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bath qualified to vote in town affairs. You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in Bath on Tuesday, March 10, 1970 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, a Treasurer, an Auditor, a Highway Agent, and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of officers and agents heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Officers' salaries and expenses for repairs, maintenance and construction of highways and bridges, for the support of the poor, Town Library, for old age assistance, for the protection of the public and all other necessary town charges and expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of class 5 roads and to raise and appropriate or set aside the sum of \$1,063.01 and the State to contribute \$7,086.75 for the same.

Article 5. To see what action the Town will take on the following question: Shall the provision of the laws relative to the playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town?

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to ad-

minister or dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's deed.

Article 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 9. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan service any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such service is less than \$50.00.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five (or seven) members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15 Chapter 36 N.H. revised Statutes Annotated 1955, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board shall consist of one Selectman and four (or six) other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Chapter 36, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated 1955.

Article 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Given under our hands and seals this February 5, 1970.

This is a temporary warrant. The legal warrant may have other articles if legally requested by the citizens of the Town.

As an affiliated library we were again the recipient of the \$100.00 grant from the State Library with the stipulation that it be spent for reference books. These yearly checks have enabled us to increase our collection considerably, especially in history and the sciences. We were also allotted ten sight-saving volumes by the State Library to help those readers who need very large print. For the second year RCA gave to the library fifty recordings, ranging in type from popular music to classical.

As in the past, we have been very fortunate to have so many books, two magazine subscriptions, and hundreds of back copies of magazines given to us. Many of the elementary school pupils make use of these for their oral and written projects. In the gift collection of books were many duplicates, making it possible to send 109, sixteen of which were duplicates, to the Swiftwater branch collection.

During July and August Linda Lamarre conducted

seven highly successful story hour sessions for children up to the age of ten. Attendance averaged sixteen. Linda has also put up seasonal window displays for the holidays, Valentine's, Easter, etc. The trustees and I deeply appreciate her loyal cooperation.

We have attended several of the cooperative bookbuying meetings. Mrs. Bess Reed attended the State Library Development Meeting held at Waterville Valley in the fall, and she is currently serving as chairman of the North Country District Council.

We are fortunate to have the new heating system which makes the library comfortable even in sub-zero weather, and the heat in the room back of the library now makes it useful as a place for study or conference.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1969 fire season was a quiet one in this area. Frequent rains kept the danger to a minimum and there were few violations. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follows:

Fire Permit

A Fire Permit is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be prior to 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m.

Exceptions

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

Penalties

1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.

2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.

3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it, the same penalties as in (1) above.

4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland, maximum fine of \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970. Fires reported—State 453 Fires reported—District 6

A new roll up door was also installed during the summer to replace a door that was badly rotted. This new door is the type recommended by the Fire Insurance Underwriters.

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bath qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Bath, New Hampshire on the 11th day of March, polls to be open for the election of District Officers at 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon and to close not earlier than 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, with action on the remaining articles in this warrant to be taken commencing at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

- Article 1. To choose, by non-partisan ballot, a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To choose, by non-partisan ballot, a School District Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To choose, by non-partisan ballot, a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To choose, by non-partisan ballot, an Auditor for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To choose, by non-partisan ballot, one School Board Member for a term of three years.
- Article 6. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- Article 7. To hear any reports of the School Board, Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foun-

dation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- Article 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.
- Article 10. To see if the voters of the Bath School District will vote to close the Village School and tuition their children to the Haverhill Cooperative School District or the Lisbon Public School for those children living in the Pettyboro Area.
- Article 11. To see if the voters of the Bath School District will vote to create a committee to study the feasibility of establishing a kindergarten class in the school district and to vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 to equip, maintain and staff the program.
- Article 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Also, two grades per teacher at the Bath Elementary School has significantly improved the teaching and learning situation within the classroom. High School students attending Woodsville High School have had the opportunity to attend a fully comprehensive high school with all the curricular and extra-curricular opportunities any youngster may want.

Tuition is the major item in our school budget that seems to provoke the most discussion when one studies our budget carefully. To alleviate any thought that tuition charges in this area are out of line, a list of district tuition charges follows:

This year's budget indicates a terrific increase in many areas but especially in tuition. Added costs and more children are the answer. In other areas teachers' salaries are increased along with the employment of a music teacher.

Equally important to the legal voters of Bath is the use of the non-partisan ballot in all school elections.

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The polls must be open for five hours, all officers must file with the School District Clerk, all ballots must be printed. These are only a few highlights of the law that was recently passed by the New Hampshire Legislature.

May I take this opportunity to thank the Bath School Board, Teachers and taxpayers for their fine support during the past year.

SUPERVISORY UNION #23 REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent.

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union #23, during 1969-1970, will receive a salary of \$16,000.00, which is made up as follows: \$3,000.00 to be paid by the State Department of Education and \$13,000.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1,500.00 for travel within the Union is also prorated as stated above.

In Sept. 1968 a lazy eye clinic sponsored by the N. H. Division of Health and the Woodsville Cohase Lions Club was held at the Woodsville Elementary School. Pre-school children were tested for lazy eye blindness (amblopia) and when symptoms were found they were referred to their eye doctor for follow-up testing. In order to correct this condition, it is important to find it and treat it as early as possible. In May 1969 nineteen pupils were screened for Speech and Hearing problems by the staff from the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center.

June 3, 1969 was registration for pupils entering the first grade in Sept. 1969.

A measles Susceptibility Survey was done in grades 1-6. This was done to find how many children had had neither measles nor the measles vaccine. In Bath we found that there were five pupils in this category.

All routine vision and hearing screening tests were completed. Referrals were made when defects were found.

Several meetings were attended during the year. Especially helpful were the conferences held at the White Mountain Community Services Center in Littleton.

Dr. Anthonisen met with the school nurses and discussed problems such as school phobias, the drug issue and many topics as requested by the group. The staff, Mr. Froburg and Miss Page, were most helpful with counseling school staff and parents when needed.

During the first semester I attended a course given at Laconia. Dr. Margaret Riggs lectured on "Special Educational Problems and Techniques".

I have enjoyed working in the Bath School and want to thank Mr. Mullen, Mr. Savoy and his staff, the parents and pupils for their continued support of the school health program.
