# TOWN WARRANT

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## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To bring forth your ballots for Town Officers for the ensuing year, and the ensuing three years. Polls are to open at 10 A. M. and are not to close before 6 P. M. At 8 P. M. action will be taken on the following Articles in the Warrant:

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for same:

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of the poor; \$3,000.00 for the assistance of the aged; and \$1,000.00 for aid to soldiers and their families.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550.00 to purchase two police radios, in cooperation with the Department of Civil Defense.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes up to the sum of \$25,000.00 if needed and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for interest thereon.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500.00 for summer maintenance of highways and bridges.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the library.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for care of the clock on the Church.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$944.04 for construction of Class V Highways, the State to contribute \$6,626.91.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for the tarring of Class V highways, under the direction of the Selectmen.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day and patriotic purposes.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 as a contribution to the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 for the purchase of a Heavy Duty Tractor equipped for loading gravel, digging ditches and plowing snow.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the care of the New Cemetery; \$25.00 for pumping water for same; \$100.00 for care of the Joppa Cemetery; \$50.00 for the care of the Old Cemetery on the Back River Road; and \$25.00 for the care of the Beals Cemetery.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the maintenance and replacement of power equipment used in the Town Cemeteries.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the care of the Town Dump.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to gravel Class V Highways.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for spraying elm trees.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for damages and legal expenses, including dog damage.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Civil Defense.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to hard surface the lower road in the Bedford Center Cemetery.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the care of the Memorial Plot in front of Town Hall.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$224.64 for the installation of street lights: one at the corner of Worthley Road and Constance Street; one at the corner of Seabee and Whittemore Streets; one at the corner of Bedford and Whittemore Streets; one at the corner of Wayside Drive and Seabee Street; one at the corner of Wayside Drive and Palomino Lane; and one on Savoie Street.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the installation of a fire hydrant at the corner of Wayside Drive and Palomino Lane.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the Planning Board.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500.00 for a street leading in a northerly direction from Boynton Street to Old Bedford Road in the vicinity of the new school in accordance with article No. 37 of the 1954 Town Warrant, taking whatever land may be necessary by Right of Eminent Domain.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to set up a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a Grader.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Non-Partisan Ballot System according to the provisions of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, Chapter 34, sections 112 to 120.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to have the members of the Budget Committee elected by the voters of the Town, at the regular Town election when such Town Officers as are required by statute to be elected, are elected.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote on a petition of Alfred Gelinas and ten (10) other legal voters in the Town of Bedford, to amend the Zoning Ordinance adopted December 8th, 1953 by the following, "General Residence"—beginning at a point 1,000 feet from the shore line of Sebbins Pond and continuing completely around Sebbins Pond.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote on a petition of Ralph Mattfield and ten (10) other legal voters of the Town of Bedford to change the name of Public Street to Woodbury Lane.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept Palomino Lane an additional 220 feet by 30 feet up to Wayside Drive.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept Seabee Street an additional 475 feet by 30 feet up to Wayside Drive.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept Wayside Drive from Boynton Street to Palomino Lane a distance of 365 feet by 50 feet.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept Bedford Street a distance of 321 feet by 30 feet between Whittemore Street and Mack Street.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept Mack Street a distance of 505 feet by 50 feet between Hersey Street and Palomino Lane.

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to accept Seabee Street east of Plummer Road distance of 1120 feet by 30 feet.

Article 39. To see if the Town will vote to accept Palomino Lane east of Plummer Road a distance of 1120 feet by 30 feet.

Article 40. To see what action the Town will take regarding the playing of Beano under the Provisions of Chapter 171A of the revised laws as inserted in Chapter 292 of the Laws of 1949.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING FIRES

In looking over the records I find that over one-third of the fires in District One in 1954 were from incinerators and burning without first securing a permit from the forest fire warden of the town where fire occurred. As all these thirty-three fires were in violation of the law, all of us citizens who own homes or rent property should try to the best of our ability to cooperate with the forest fire warden and fire chief in the town or city in which we live.

After the snow leaves the ground and the spring season arrives we all like to get out of doors and start to clean up the grounds and back sheds so before we start to burn, let's contact the forest fire warden of the town in which we live and get his view and permit.

**35. Permits.** (b) No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or shall burn or cause to be burned any material, and no city or town shall kindle or maintain a fire or a public dump, in or near woodlands, pasture, brush, sprout, waste, or cut-over land, or where fire may be communicated to such land, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written permit from the forest fire warden of the town where the burning is to be done unless the same is in the presence of the warden or his agent.

**36. Liability for Fires Without Permit.** Any person causing or kindling a fire without permit of the forest fire warden, when such permit is required, and any person by whose negligence or the negligence of his agents any fire shall be caused, shall be liable in a civil

action for the payment to the town, or the state or both, of the expenses incurred by the forest fire warden or deputy warden in attending or extinguishing such fire

## REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENSE

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Bedford, New Hampshire,  
January 13, 1955

The Selectmen of Bedford,  
The Town Hall, Bedford, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:—

The announcement, during the past year, of the successful development of the hydrogen bomb has added immeasurably to the already large list of possibilities facing this community in case of enemy attack. The considered opinion, previously held, that our main problems centered around refugee reception and care clearly must be modified now. The tremendous extent of territory affected by the violence of this new weapon makes it probable that we will receive at least fringe effects from explosions destined for targets far removed. No adequate answer to this additional threat has been evolved yet: in fact, it does not now appear that there ever will be an adequate answer. The best that can be hoped for is the development of measures providing means of personnel protection aimed toward reducing casualties. Such development can only come from research conducted on the highest governmental levels.

Locally, we are still making some progress. Frankly, however, this progress is by no means as rapid or sure as we could wish and can only be considered as satisfactory in comparison with the almost total lack of results achieved in other communities. Much of what we lack in completeness of plan must await prior action on the part of our State and National governments but the tremendous scope of the problem and the apathy of our citizens are even greater hindrances.

During the past year, matching funds of not to exceed \$1436.50 were secured from the Federal government for a warning system that will reach most of the town's area. It will be extremely effective not only as a device for notifying us of the approach of enemy aircraft but as a fire alarm. A limited amount of equipment has been secured for our First Aid Station and a few of the personnel placed upon call for minor as well as major emergencies. Such a step not only fills a growing peacetime need in this community but more certainly insures fuller preparation for the meeting of those serious situations for which it was basically organized. A study of our water supplies has been made to ascertain what effect the loss of electricity and the lack of fuel could have on them. The conclusions arrived at have been pleasantly surprising for they state that cooking and drinking water would still be readily obtainable at least. This is in direct contrast to the prospects of most communities.

It had been hoped that a study of self sufficiency in food, for a period of at least one month after the outbreak of hostilities, would be ready at this time for inclusion in our Civil Defense Plan but it is not yet completed. Several less comprehensive additions have, however, been made and distributed to enrollees this year. Copies are enclosed herewith.

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First of all, the School Board wishes to thank all the Townspeople who made it possible to have our new School Building. At a Special School District Meeting held on September 15, 1954 the necessary two-thirds vote was obtained, paving the way for the construction of the new School Building. Again, we say thanks to you all!

When School opened in September of this year, due to the large number of pupils in the first and second grades, it was necessary to hold double sessions for a few weeks, but after the Special School District Meeting was held and having obtained the necessary two-thirds vote, the School Board, with permission of the State Board of Education, converted the basement of the Stevens-Buswell School into two temporary classrooms. As soon as these two rooms were completed, the children were put back on single sessions, much to the relief of the School Board and Townspeople.

We are most fortunate in Bedford to have such a fine staff of Teachers, School Cooks, Janitors and School Nurse. The School Nurse, Mrs. Gladys Smend, also supervises the wonderful hot lunch program that we are so fortunate in having in Bedford. Parents and friends are most welcome to visit our Schools at any time and the School Board is always pleased to see parents at their monthly School Board Meetings.

The Bedford School Board has always made a practice of going along with the Manchester School System, therefore, beginning this year, children who are to enter first grade must be six years of age on or before December 1st.

The School Board wishes to thank Mr. Hastings for the fine cooperation and all of the extra time and assistance he has given us in the past year. We are sorry that he is leaving us, but want to wish him every success in his new undertaking as Superintendent of Schools in Orange, Massachusetts.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Bedford School Board:

I herewith submit my Sixth Annual Report as your superintendent of schools. Once again it is my distinct privilege to report nothing but the greatest cooperation between the schools and the citizens of Bedford. My admiration and respect for the School Board for the time and effort it has been willing to unselfishly expend that the pupils in the Bedford Schools might have equal educational opportunities with the pupils in other communities, has reached a new high.

There are two problems that seemingly will be with us for some time to come. The first is the continually rising school enrollment and the second is a direct outgrowth of this nation wide trend. It is a very serious and critical shortage of the type of teachers we would like to have teach our children.

A study of the census cards shows that there will be fifty-five (55) children who will be six years of age on or before December 1, 1955 and thus eligible to attend first grade next year. Fortunately, housing should be available but the question of financing the cost of increasing enrollments will continue to be with us.

The only way in which New Hampshire can keep a full staff of qualified teachers is to keep pace with rising salaries that are being paid in neighboring states. It is a definite responsibility of every District to face the situation realistically, see the picture as it actually is, and finally resign itself to the fact that if it wants to have and to keep good teachers it must pay as much or more than those who are competing for these same people. Bedford has been very fortunate in the calibre of teachers it has been able to employ. Every possible step should be taken to make working conditions as desirable as possible so that we may keep the fine teachers we have and to give the Board an opportunity to hire people of the same cal-

ibre for unavoidable replacements and additional positions.

In this, my final report, I want to thank the Board members, both past and present, who have so faithfully fulfilled the trust put in them and who have, in every way, tried to make my work as rewarding and pleasant as was humanly possible. My sincere thanks also go to the teachers of this District who have been willing to use every bit of their skill and knowledge that someone else's child might have the same educational opportunities they might wish for their own children. I shall sincerely miss all the fine people of Bedford with whom it has been my privilege to work these past six years.
