#### COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

To the Citizens of Belknap County:

In compliance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire, the commissioners of Belknap County herewith present the annual report of the County Commissioners, Treasurer, Superintendent of the Farm and House of Correction, Clerk of Superior Court, Sheriff, Solicitor, Farm Physician, Chaplain and Auditors for the year ending, December 31, 1927.

Many improvements have been made at the farm: lightning rods have been placed on the buildings; fire-escapes constructed on the living quarters of the men and women inmates, and help; a fire alarm box, connected with the municipal fire alarm system, placed in front of the main building; a new high pressure boiler installed; two large refrigerators bought, one for kitchen use and the other for dairy products and large quantities of meat, enabling the commissioners to buy at wholesale, as well as to furnish refrigeration for animals slaughtered at the farm during warm weather; an additional toilet and bathroom equipped, and a greater part of the interior of the buildings painted.

Jail and house of correction prisoners have cleared a number of acres of almost worthless sprout land. (By an act of the last legislature, the commissioners are allowed to put all jail prisoners serving sentences to work.)

On account of the crowded conditions of the

vaults at the court house, it has been necessary to purchase additional steel filing cases for the offices of the registers of deeds and probate.

The cost of caring for the poor outside the county farm is \$2181.07 less than for 1926, and that of caring for dependent children in \$571.97 more than for last year

The excess of cash liabilities over assets (net debt) is \$8,629.78 as compared with \$20,322.23 one year ago.

The commissioners hereby express their appreciation to all persons and organizations who have provided amusements and gifts for the inmates of the county farm, and especially to ex-Mayor and Mrs. J. A. Mitchell for the contribution of a phonograph and records.

The gift of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Mitchell of an excellent victrola with accompanying records has been a real contribution to the pleasure and profit of the people of the Farm.

The Chaplain would call attention to the need for a musical instrument in the Assembly Room. The gift of a piano would be most acceptable. Gifts of pictures of the right kind and character would be welcome.

During the year 1927 the Gale Memorial Library has begun most excellent service in furnishing suit<sup>1</sup> able reading matter.

Special events have been observed. Thanksgiving week the Laconia Kiwanis Club furnished an inter-

esting and much enjoyed program. The usual Christmas tree with gifts for all was arranged by Superintendent and Mrs. Magill. The Juniors of the Congregational Church led by Mr. Mooney and **under Mrs.** Roundy's direction furnished a program of Christmas carols and hymns. Miss Emily Thompson and Janice Muzzey gave recitations.

The personal interest and care given to the people in the County Farm by Superintendent and Mrs. Magill and their associates is something that should be recognized with the greatest satisfaction by the citizens of the county.

The meeting of the Belknap Delegation was opened in the Commissioners' rooms at the County Court House at 9 o'clock with the following members present:

Oe Varney, Henry H. Thompson, William I. Harris, John F. Beede, Alfred L. Guay, Irwin E. Young, Thomas P. Cheney, Mrs. Addie G. Hill, Clarence L. Follansbee, Charles H. Corliss, John G. Quimby, W. H. L. Page, Wm. Henry Trickey, Ralph H. Smith, Oscar J. Garland, E. M. Sanders, Leon W. Schultz. Howard W. Sanborn, Alfred W. Simoneau, George A. Simpson.

The following county and city officers were present: Charles F. Locke, A. C. S. Randlett, Fred H. Smith, Fire Chief Arthur W. Spring, Harry Rogers, Mrs. Andrew Felker, Elmer Perkins. Edith Hilliker, County Agent Horne, Supt. Joseph G. Magill.

Mr. Harry Rogers appeared in behalf of the County Farm Bureau, asking for an appropriation of \$1 800.00 with which to hire another Club Leader, Mrs. Andrew Felker. Elmer Perkins and Mr. Kendall from the State University outlined the benefits derived from Club work through club leaders. Arthur C. S. Randlett, County Commissioner, discussed the yearly budget and outlined the needs of the County

Farm as follows: At present the wood supply on the farm is exhausted and asked for appropriations of \$1,500.00 to purchase a woodlot to supply the needs of the Farm and poor, as the amount of wood used annually is 150 cords. Mr. Randlett considered it economy to purchase a lot and cut it as had been done in the past with prison help then to buy it locally or have it imported. Motion was made by Thomas P. Cheney that the chairman appoint a committee to look over prospective woodlots to ascertain the actual value of the same and that the expense of the committee be paid by the county. Motion was seconded by Irvin E. Young and the following cimmittee appointed. Oe Varney of Alton. William I. Harris of Gilford and Howard Sanborn of Sanbornton, Clarence L. Follansbee moved that the County Commissioners be authorized to sell their woodlot in Meredith. The motion was seconded by Irvin E. Young and the vote was carried. Chief A. W. Spring gave a talk on the possible fire hazards and made several recommendations. He suggested a sprinkler system as a prevention. Motion was made by Thomas P. Cheney that the chairman appoint a committee to ascertain the needs of Fire escapes and the expense of installing the same. The motion was seconded by Charles H. Corliss and the vote was carried. An appropriation of \$1,000.00 was asked for a new upright boiler to replace the old one which was found to be unfit and unsafe as it has been patched three times and is beyond further repair.

The chairman appointed the following committee

to investigate the fire hazards: Edward M. Sanders-Alfred L. Guay, Irvin E. Young.

Meeting adjourned at 4.45 p.m.

Concord, N. H., February 15. 1927.

The Belknap County Delegation, all members present in executive session met in Room 300 after session to transact the afternoon county business and took up the budget of the County Commissioners. The motion was made by W. H. L. Page, seconded by Oe Varney and it was voted to grant the appropriation of \$67,000.00 which the Buc get called for. Oe Varney, chairman of the committee appointed to investigate the woodlots in Laconia reported as follows: One lot of 50 acres with an estimated 600 cords of wood and 150 thousand feet of lumber which could be bought for \$1,500 and another lot adjoining consisting of 150 acres with an estimated 250 to 300 thousand feet of lumber which could be bought for \$2.000. The latter lot has adequate pasturing facilities which if bought would eliminate an expense of \$50 per year now being paid for outside pasturing.

Both lots as reported by the committee have valuable shore property which could be sold in lots at a good price.

Motion was made by John G. Quimby. seconded by Oscar J. Garland and it was voted to appropriate \$3 600.00 to buy the two lots.

Motion was made by John G. Quimby. seconded

by Howard W. Sanborn and it was voted to authorize the County Commissioners to sell the lumber and shore lots and the money received be applied to the county debt. Motion was made by Thomas P. Cheney, seconded by John G. Quimby and it was voted to appropriate \$5000 for the year of 1928 to be applied to the county note. Motion was made by John G. Quimby, seconded by W. H. L. Page and it was voted that \$500 be appropriated for fixtures in the Register of Deeds and Probate offices Motion was made by Maurice H. Gordon and seconded by John G. Quimby and it was voted to appropriate \$200 for book covers and bindings for the books in the Register of Deeds office. Edward M. Sanders. chairman of committee appointed on fire hazards at the County Farm Building made the following recommendations: That there is great need of Fire Escapes on the north and south sides of the house that several doors should be changed to open outward and that platforms should be built leading to the fire escapes. The estimated costs of Fire Escapes was \$447 and the cost of doors and platforms at \$300. Motion was made by Thomas Cheney seconded by Addie G. Hill and it was voted to appropriate \$750 for the purchase and erection of Fire Escapes and to build the necessary platforms and change the doors.

Motion was made by Irvin E. Young seconded by Edward M. Sanders and it was voted to appropriate \$700 for the installation of new lightning rods to replace the ones now useless on the County Farm Buildings. Motion was made by John F. Beede and seconded by Oe Varney and it was voted that all money left over from the special appropriation be applied to the county debt. Motion was made by Thomas P. Cheney, seconded by Irvin E. Young that the usual amount of \$3,600 be appropriated for each year of 1927 and 1928 for the County Farm Bureau. A rising vote was taken and the vote stands as follows 11 in favor, 7 opposed. The majority ruled.
