We received and accepted with regret the resignation of Oma Fox as Library Trustee. Mrs. Dawn Auten was appointed to fill the vacancy.

The T.R.A. money was spent on the Jackson road. We hope to complete this road in 1966. At this time we would like to thank Paul Tewksbury for the land which made it possible to straighten this road at one point.

The Class V money was spent on the short road leading to the Ralph Train place.

A culvert was lengthened on the Burr road.

The surface and drainage from Leavitt Hill to the end of the Brooksie Howe road was improved. We hope to continue to improve this type of road which is not eligible for T.R.A. money as fast as possible.

DeCato Motors was low bidder for the new truck, which was voted in 1965. It is giving very satisfactory service.

In the past two years we have cleaned up several unsightly areas, and will continue to remove others in 1966.

Our thanks to the Town Planning Board, who has put in many hours on a new building code for the town.

We wish to thank all town officers for their fine cooperation in the past year.

 3. To see if the Town will vote to buy 1000 feet of 1½
- inch, Dacron-Cotton piled, with heavy bronze rocker Lug couplings, fire hose, and raise and appropriate \$800.00 for same.
- 4. By request: To see if the town will vote to pay the highway employees six paid holidays and six days' sick leave per year.
- 5. To see if the town of Cornish will vote to have the town reappraised, and to raise and appropriate the necessary amount.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise the town officers' salaries to one dollar and fifty cents per hour.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$403.89 to pay the 1964 police bill.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to help defray the expenses of the Lebanon Regional Airport Authority.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to build an addition onto the town hall and raise and appropriate the necessary amount.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to elect next year two auditors, one for a two-year term, and one for a one-year term; and to elect one auditor for a two-year term thereafter.
- 11. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to make application for and to receive, in the name of the town, such funds as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government, and appropriate a sum of money to match federal funds on a 10-90 per cent basis, the 10% being the town's share. And also to permit the selectmen to select the eligible projects and spend the money on them.
- 12. By request: To see if the Town will accept the gift of the dam and resulting pool on property belonging to Irene C., Clyde E., and Arthur A. LaClair, and accept responsibility for repairing and maintaining same.

BY REQUEST:

- 13. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the old Creamery Road, located off route 120; the land to revert to the adjoining landowners.
- 14. By request: To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, not to exceed \$600.00 for two SurvivAir self-contained breathing Apparatus for the Fire Dept., to use for rescue work.
- 15. By request: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$500.00 for a tank truck for civilian defense.
- 16. By request: To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed \$1400.00 for $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch, Double Jacket treated fire hose, to replace the old hose that is over 24 years old and was second hand when the town of Cornish bought it.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell, or otherwise administer, property acquired through Tax Sales and Liens.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money, if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.
- 19. To see if the Town will elect a Committee for a Memorial Day program.
- 20. To hear the Reports of Officers, Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The polls will remain open until Seven (7:00) p. m.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year, but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

- 1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
- To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or or while walking through fields or woods.

- To safely dispose of rubbish, preferably at the town dump.
 If you must burn rubbish or brush
 - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
 - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 p.m.
 - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

Town Planning Board

The Town Planning Board was reactivated this year after it became evident that there seemed to be a need for some regulations rgarding mobile home parks, camping areas, and trailers

It is also well to review the existing ordinance periodically with an idea to up-date its contents.

The main reason for the foregoing studies is to make an effort at orderly and planned growth of our town. Most surrounding towns have such ordinances and it seems logical to assume that a similar plan here will help to prevent an influx of the type of growth that has been prohibited in these surrounding areas.

Therefore we have held frequent meetings to study the situation and feel that we have developed a fair set of rgulations for Mobile Home Parks, Camping Areas and Trailers.

By law a planning board must held at least 2 public hearings on such new ordinances and these were held. There are several minor changs which seem necessary at this time, that have been made in the original ordinance.

In addition we have discussed the feasibility of a study by the Board aimed at a logical and easily understood zoning ordinance for the town, some time in the future.

IN CASE OF ATTACK

Tune Your AM Radio Dial to E B S Station for Official Information

WHAT IS EBS?

- 1. EBS is short for a communication system officially entitled, "Emergency Broadcast System". It is a special system of AM standard radio broadcasting devised by the broadcasting industry and the Government, working together, to bring official information in time of emergency. It consists of broadcast stations holding Federal Communications Commission (FCC), National Defense Emergency Authorizations (NDEA), the facilities and personnel of networks, and other groups engaged n communications, as well as appropriate Government agencies.
- 2. The Emergency Broadcast System (EBS) replaced CONELRAD on August 5, 1963, placing into effect a basic change in the Nation's system to provide official information and directions to the public in event of a civil defense emergency. This change means that in an emergency AM stations that are part of EBS will not switch to 640 or 1240 kilocycles, but will continue to broadcast on normal frequencies at normal power AM stations that are not a part of EBS, and FM and television stations, would go off the air. Some of these facilities will be incorporated into future refinements and extensions of EBS. Who Gives the Signal for EBS to Start and Stop?

The EBS is activated by the Emergency Action Notification System (EANS.). The special control system interconnecting and capable of seizing AP and UPI news networks extending to approximately 4,500 standard, FM and TV broadcast stations will be used for this purpose. The responsibility for EANS is assigned to the Director, Office of Civil Defense (OCD). Activation of EANS will be by the OCD under the same tactical conditions that a warning is disseminated over the National Warning System (NAWAS) unless previous implementation is ordered by the President or delegated authority. Why Should You Tune to Your EBS AM Standard Radio Station?

Because from it you will receive authoritative civil defense information. The EBS provides the capability to disseminate civil defense information to the general public in the event of attack. Under the EBS you will be able to receive radio programs from three different sources: Local, State, and national. Programs originating locally

will be broadcast direct. Program line connections are arranged for programs on a State or regional basis. By using the existing network structures, and program line connections between stations, Federal level programs can be broadcast which will reach the entire country except in areas where existing broadcast stations are not normally heard. How Will You Know When the Emergency System of Radio Broadcasting Is Going Into Effect?

In an emergency, AM stations that are part of EBS will continue to broadcast on normal frequencies at normal power with the following announcement (AM stations that are not a part of EBS, and FM and television stations, would go off the air after appropriate announcement).

ANNOUNCER:

We have interrupted our normal program to in security and civil defense measures as requested by the U.S. Government. This is the Emergency Broadcast System. Normal broadcasting has been discontinued for an indefinite period. This station will remain on the air to broadcast news, official informaton and instructions for this area. If you do not live in this area tune your radio to a station broadcasting information for your area. The station can be located easily because repeated announcements will be made identifying the area for which information is being broadcast. To repeat—This station will remain on the air to broadcast news, official information and instructions for this area. If you do not live in the area, tune your radio to a station furnishing information for your locality. You are tuned to the Emergency Broadcast System. Only broadcast stations which have been ilssued a National Defense Emergency Authorization by the Federal Communications Commission are now operating. Keep your radio on and stay tuned for further announcement which will be made over the Emergency Broadcast System. Do not use your telephone. It is important that you listen carefully to announcements and information for your area.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Cornish qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said district, on the fifth day of March, 1966, at ten o'clock in the morning to act on Article 1; the meeting to be recessed and opened again at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the remaining articles in the Warrant:

- 1. To choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Auditors for the ensuing year and a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 2. To determine and fix the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 5. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 6. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U.S. Government and/or state agencies. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

- 7. To see if the district will authorize the school board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts and any other receipts from miscellaneous sources in addition to the original appropriation for 1966-67, for the lunch program, general expenses, equipment and improvements.
- 8. To see if the school district will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,693.00, this money to be used for completing the re-roofing of the school building.
- 9. To see if the school district will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,050.00 to be used for partial renovation of the lighting system in the school building.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Title I, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Title III, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.
- 12. To see if the district will approve the District Financial Book-keeping be kept by the Supervisory Union Office. This will take effect July 1, 1966.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Report of the School Board

Complying with the request of the 1965 School District Meeting, we invite your attention to this 1966 report, which, in text, concerns our present stepped-up curriculum as a beneficial factor to our graduates.

Of necessity, this report must be incomplete. We need more time in which to draw some firm conclusions. We need more data for comparisons. We need a graduating class which has felt the full impact of the accelerated program. It is impossible to expect all students and all teachers to accept new courses, new texts, new ideas, or to discard the old ways completely within a year or two.

The Board recognizes they must start somewhere towards collecting pertinent data to use as guide-lines for the future. The only way comparisons can be made is to have some concrete figures on paper as to where we are now, and continue adding to these records, year by year.

In the past, about the only records we have had of any kind, were the marks of our students submitted to us from the high-schools at the mid-year and final marking periods. These marks only gave us a clue as to what the Cornish students were doing, and were not of any particular help specifically to the problem of our own curriculum. Requirements for entrance to the high-schools were not very valuable either. Mostly we received the assurance that our students were doing as well as the Claremont and Windsor elementary students.

Parents were becoming concerned. The numbers of drop-outs' was increasing, or, at least, not diminishing. To help us, one year, a group of interested and concerned parents took the trouble to get the lists of required reading for the ninth grades, and made an effort to see that these books were obtained, and placed on a special shelf in the library. This was and is a valuable aid in helping to up-grade our curriculum. Unfortunately, the Cornish library facilities are not conductive to regular visitations. Interested and truly concerned parents will find a library wherever they are, and create the habit of taking their children to them. Many other parents encourage the reading habit, but only if the source is within a mile or so of their homes, and access to the shelves is available at all times. Unfortunately this is not possible in Cornish at present. We earnestly urge all residents of Cornish to work with the Trustees to help them find the solution to this pressing problem.

We would, at this time, like to add the thanks of the Board to these Trustees. They have been most co-operative with our teachers and individual students in the past, and they stand ready to continue to help in any way they can.

Anotherr aid which has been available as a guide-line to the Board have been the National Achievement Tests. These would have been invaluable if the records and summations had been kept in Cornish, and added-to from year to year—student by student. Under the past set-up of teacher-principal, this would have been an Herculean task. Now, this is possible, due to the fore-sightedness of the District in allowing your Board to institute the office of the non-teaching principal. Now we can go on. Now we will collect and file all data necessary to make comparisons. Now, it will be possible to follow-up each student, and their records will aid your Board, your Principal, and your Superintendents in setting up challenging, scholastic goals for the future.

In order to institute a beginning for later comparisons as to whether or not our stepped-up curriculum, with its accompanying greater investment of money, is proving beneficial to our students, we offer figures taken from the graduating classes of 1965, under a rather limited number of catagories, which will be enlarged as further data is collected.

Mr. Bent performed some rather extensive research for the Board on the 'drop-out' situation, since he was able to obtain professional information which would not have been so readily available to us. This study covered a period of six years, from 1958-1964. The total number of 'drop-outs' was thirty. Though this does not seem too enormous, these thirty young people are as important as the other 120 (approximately) who finished.

Ten of these thirty, picked at random, were studied quite thoroughly, through their scholastic records; interviews with guidance teachers; their teachers; and their principals. Of these, two were

mentally retarded, and perhaps should not have been exposed to high-school at all; five came from homes indicating a definite need of more emphasis on a school curriculum of greater cultural opportunities; and eight had difficulties due to parental laxity. It has become almost a necessity these days for a school system to exert great influence on each student to continue his/her education to completion of high-school. In other words, some of these latter students could have done high-school work if they had had some stimulation and encouragement from a colser co-operation between the parents and the school. Unfortunately for this group of young people, there was no one at that time to help establish such a relationship. These are the heart-breaking facts picked up too late to help. Cornish is making some noticeable strides in this area as evidenced by a marked decrease in the number of 'drop-outs' within these past two years.

On the subject of an enriched program in the cultural fields, the lack of this program in Cornish was evidenced by the phrase: "Lack of cultural background." This statement simply means an exposure to, and an active participation in, such areas as music, art, an appreciation of each, good literature, poetry, and drama.

Cornish made a brave beginning along some of these lines with the introduction of a music supervisor. Without this, many students would never have known the joy of singing, nor listened to some of our great masterpieces of our time. Your Board regretted the necessity which forced them to discontinue this activity, but there seemed to be no alternative, due to the drastic cut in State Aid Funds, and the change of Unions, making a part-time teacher unavilable.

An art course, and its accompanying appreciation of art, has been one of the uppermost items on your Board's lists of "musts" for a long time, but these teachers are expensive. Our conclusions to date are to try to undertake a co-operative venture with towns around Cornish. The question now arises, "Can we afford <u>not</u> to include these activities in our curriculum?" Certainly the facts of this study indicate conclusively, that we can no longer disregard them.

As to the other arts, i.e. good literature, poetry, drama, etc., much of this can be done within our own classrooms, and by our own faculty, providing they are given reasonably good material. A start in this direction has already been made, by the study of some of the classics in paper-backed editions in the upper grades, and the adoption of the Open Court Reading Series in the Primary grades. The latter series contain many old and proven childhood favorites, including also excellent literature, poetry, and plays, besides some pertinent and factual stories. They introduce our very young

students to people who have made great impact on our civilization, and whom they will meet again as old friends as they progress through the upper grades. The time has come when we must and now can discard the trivia and the confusing texts, subjecting our students instead to materials which will give them a firm foundation in true ideals.

Again, it is you, the parents, who will make the final decision, by the future support of your school and your Board, as you have done so well in the past.

The Board wishes to state once more, its goals for the Cornish School curriculum:

We desire to see our Cornish graduates so well prepared in the fundamentals of the proverbial three R.s, that they will possess sufficient self-reliance and confidence in their abilities, to be able to reach into high-school and beyond, easily and capably, with the skilled tools of a firm, unswerving knowledge of these fundamentals. Your Board feels very emphatically, that another year of another child's life must not be wasted. We feel that the National Norm is not something to be attained, but to be exceeded by a year or more.

With you continued help; with the guidance of the principal, the superintendents; with the efforts of the teachers and other personnel, this will become a reality.

Superintendent's Report

To the Cornish School Board and Citizens of the Town, I herewith submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

TEACHING STAFF

Three new teachers were welcomed into the Cornish School when classrooms reopened this past September.

Mr. George T. Bond

Mr. Bond was named to teach history and geography at the sixth, seventh and eighth grade levels. He succeeded Mrs. Marion Stone, who moved to the fifth grade level to replace Miss Doris Williams, retired. A native of Windsor, Vt., he attended public schools in Whitefield, N. H., and was graduated from high school there in 1960. Mr. Bond received his Bachelor of Education degree in 1965 from Plymouth State College where he majored in social science.

Mrs. Frances W. Kelsey

Mrs. Kelsey was appointed to teach English in grades 6, 7 and 8, succeeding Daniel Budd, who went to Claremont to teach. A graduate of Bates College in 1946 with a B.A. degree, she did graduate work at Plymouth State College in 1964-65.

Mrs. Beverly Ann McKenzie

Mrs. McKenzie was named to teach third grade, replacing Mrs. Lillian Symons, who retired. A graduate of Stevens High School in Claremont, N. H., in 1958, she received a Bachelor of Education degree from Keene State College in 1962. Her teaching experience includes three months at North Street School in Claremont in the fall of 1962 and a year in 1964 as teacher's aid in first grade at the Cornish Elementary School.

CURRICULUM

One of the first responsibilities a new administration must assume is to become familiar with the school's program of studies.

Cornish students have been exposed to the new math in the first two grades, as well as the last three. To establish a sequential learning pattern, the middle three grades should also teach this program. Books and materials for this purpose will be available for the next school year.

The new Open Court reading series taught in the early grades has proved to be popular with teachers and students. This is a demanding program; children are truly challenged in reading skills,

vocabulary, and content of the material. More of these materials are needed to make them available to all the students in the primary grades. Consideration must soon be given to updating the Scott Foresman texts in grades 2 and 3. These have been rewritten with higher standards expected of those using them.

The use of "paperbacks" in the upper grades is sound and an economical way to expose students to good literature.

Two areas that need to be studied soon by the Cornish teachers and principal are spelling and social studies. Presently, spelling doesn't begin on a formal basis until grade 3. Teaching material in this subject for grades 3 through 5 is outdated in presentation and content. Grade 6 has a new program, but the 7th and 8th grades need to be brought up to current expectations.

The social studies program also needs to undergo a thorough evaluation. Some of the content is appropriate; however, new material is needed in some of the grades. Are we offering a balanced program of geography and history, and are they being properly integrated? It is in this direction that the study should orientate itself—and only then will we have the answer.

Efforts are now under way to bolster the junior high science curriculum. Music instruction is also lacking. Trained personnel is presently unavailable, but additional efforts will be made to this end again next year.

ENROLLMENT

School census reports show we should have at least 25 first graders next year. With no other change in school population, this would mean a 230-student enrollment in the Cornish School for 1966-67. School enrollments, of course, never have that stability. Should new industry locate in the area, it could well mean additional children for the citizens of Cornish to educate. This is the unpredictable element which we must confront, yet for which we cannot readily plan.

PUBLIC LAW 89-10

This administration has a feeling of gratitude to the voters of Cornish who were able to attend the Special School District meeting held in January. Your acceptance of Title I funds will enable the School Board to provide services and teaching materials to the students and teachers which otherwise they probably never would be able to profit from. We will undoubtedly have the opportunity to reap other benefits from this program next year. School districts sign no contract in connection with these funds; therefore, the school administration, at this time, sees no reason to fear federal control.

No community action was necessary to participate under Title II of this same act. From these funds, Cornish students will have available many library and reference texts. These books are on loan only, and will also be available to Unity and Claremont schools. Title II is administered on a School Union basis, Title I individually with each school district.

OTHER

The roof of the north wing of the school building will require immediate attention. Consideration must also be given to painting the outside of the structure. The roof repair will have to be accomplished by a contractor while the outside painting could be performed by the custodian when time permits.

The above maintenance problems, if accomplished this year, should not demand much time, effort, or dollars for the next few years.

The interior of the building also needs a complete renovation of the lighting system. The State Department of Health has suggested this for the past few years. This item is expensive to complete in one year. I suggest the District accomplish this over a three to four-year period.

IN CONCLUSION

During this initial year of administering the Cornish schools, working relationships with all have been in the spirit of cooperation and for the betterment of the school. The teachers and principal have been receptive to visitations and suggestions. The School Board has demonstrated insight concerning school needs and educational trends, but always in proportion to what Cornish can reasonably afford to spend. The parents and citizens have been warm and congenial at P.T.A.'s, the special District Meeting, and in other situations where we have met. This first year has been a very pleasant one, and I want to thank all who have helped to make it that way.

Principal's Report

CORNISH ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CORNISH, N. H.

To the Cornish School Board and the people of Cornish I submit $m_{\rm V}$ second annual report.

At the September opening of school the enrollment was 233 students. With the exception of third grade the student population of the primary grades continues to be very high. As the years go by, this high enrollment will be felt in the upper grades. As it appears now each new first grade will continue to number above 30.

There are three additions to our faculty this year: Mrs. Beverly McKenzie, a graduate of Keene State College in third grade, Mrs. Frances Kelsey, a graduate of Bates College teaching English in grades six through eight, and Mr. George Bond teaching history and geography in grades six through eight.

As noted in the teaching assignments, the departmentalized structure has been extended to include the sixth grade. In reality, grades six through eight constitute a junior high in miniature. For the first time a distinct class in geography is beng taught in grades six through eight. In this course it is our aim to eradicate a weakness that has prevailed in our curriculum for some time. The new math is now an integral part of the mathematics course of study, yet we have not forsaken that factual knowledge which is so necessary to a firm mathematical background.

In grades 1, 2 and 3 the new reading program is being installed. When school begins in September the installation will be complete. Those students now taking part in the new program are far more enthusiastic and are reading with better ability and more confidence. We are looking hopefully to the day when the program will be extended to grades 4 and 5. This, however, must wait for the publication of textbooks. In addition to the new reading program we have introduced the new math into grades I and 2. When, in September, grades 3 and 4 and 5 undertake the new math program the entire school will be involved in a math curriculum preparing students for the demands of this technological age.

In October the Cornish School was host to the area teachers for a reading workshop. Mr. Richard Smith of the Open Court Publishing Company spoke to nearly 60 educators from Cornish and surrounding communities.

In early December the entire faculty of the Cornish School took part in a visiting day. From the many classes we visited in Claremont schools, we carried away new techniques, methods and innovations which can be utilized in our classrooms.

As the year 1965 came to a close, the children and teachers of the Cornish School performed their annual Christmas program. Nearly 180 parents and friends attended the programs. Although we currently do not have a music instructor, music continues to be an important part of the curriculum.

During the coming months the faculty and administration will undertake a survey of the history and geography curriculum to determine its strengths and weaknesses. The strong points will be maintained, the weak areas strengthened to encourage a better understanding of the world in which we live.

In January a questionnaire was sent to last year's graduates. Each graduate was asked how the Cornish School could have better prepared him for high school. Though the results are yet incomplete, it appears we must strengthen the instruction in English grammar. We had, however, suspected this last year, and consequently study of grammar has already been considerably strengthened.

The building and maintaining of a superior curriculum and teaching staff is a never-ending task. Let us hope we never become satisfied with what we have, for it is then that a school no longer continues to grow in excellence.

Report of the School Nurse

To the School Board and Citizens of Cornish I herewith submit my annual report as school nurse.

During this past school year our usual testing programs were carried out and any problems reported to parents for follow-up.

Two hundred and forty eight vision tests were done, followed by twenty seven rechecks. Eleven defects were found and all corrected.

Two hundred and forty one hearing tests were done, followed by eleven audiograms (full scale hearing tests). Two children with impaired hearing were found and medical treatment was instituted. Two hundred and forty four children were weighed and measured and checked for noticeable abnormalities. Dental health continues to be one of our most serious health problems. Twenty five children attended the Dental Clinic which was sponsored by the P.T.A. with the assistance of the New Hampshire State Department of Health. Dr. Houlihan in Claremont conducted the Clinics.

Tuberculin testing with the Heaf test being used was carried out in grades one, four and eight, as well as the adult members of the school. Three persons reacted to the test and chest x-rays were done. The x-rays proved negative.

A series of three Immunization Clinics was started in September. Sabin Polio Vaccine, Triple Toxoid (Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus) and Small Pox Vaccinations were made available. There will be one more Clinic during the winter to complete the series. More than two hundred treatments were given at the September Clinic. The New Hampshire State Department of Health sponsors and provided the material for these Clinics at no cost to the pupil. Sabin Vaccine was also available at no extra charge to adulte desiring it.

Publicity and a great deal of pre-school contacts were made by a group of Peace Corps Workers from the Experiment in International Living in Putney, Vermont. This group particularly wanted this experience preparatory to work they will be doing in India. It was quite an experience working with these very enthusiastic people. This group has since arrived in India for a two year period. Several mothers and nurses in the community gave a great deal of their time. For this I am very grateful and without this volunteer help Clinics of this size could not be managed.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for your interest in the School Health Program.
