

#### LIBRARY REPORT

I would like to thank the trustees, Mrs. Robert Kimball Mrs. Arthur Averill, and Mr. Richard F. Sanborn, for their interest and services. Several friends of the library also deserve our appreciation for donating books, time and interest: mothers who have attended the children's film programs so that they will run more smoothly with that supervision, and other friends who have assisted in clerical work, such as rearranging books misplaced on the shelves, or in typing.

Another way in which users of the library can help it is by returning or renewing books promptly so that others have the opportunity to read them, and to avoid the expense in time and postage of sending out overdue notices. Books lost or damaged should be paid for promptly, both so that replacements for them may be bought and the expense for these will not have to be added to library costs.

Help is always needed in many parts of a library's activities, and, to suggest ways in which you can best give such assistance, some explanation of how books are made ready for use may be pertinent. First, naturally, comes choosing enjoyable reading material. To do this a librarian should read books or book reviews, and, by talking with patrons, find what they are interested in reading. Then she should attend area book meetings and visit libraries and book stores where she may examine a variety of books. When choices have been made, book orders to send to publishers must be typed, or trips made to book stores for buying directly. The next step requires separating the books received into two groups. fiction and non-fiction. Non-fiction books must be examined to find what their subject is, and then to look up in a reference book the correct Dewey decimal number to indicate to a user the subject of the book. Catalog cards must then by typed with the book's title, author, and other pertinent information about it, so that such cards may be placed in the card catalog drawers for the patron's use. The book, already labelled with its Dewey decimal number if nonfiction, and with our library's book plate and pocket glued in place, is ready for a protective jacket put on it, and a circulation card typed, with the book's author and title, put into the pocket in the book. The book is then ready for circulation, but how will readers know that such a book is at the library? The name of the book and its author, and perhaps a brief summary of its contents, should be written and placed where members of the community will see it, perhaps in a local newspaper or the bulletin board of a school.

When a patron comes into the library, he may require a little help in finding the book he wants, or he may ask for assistance in getting the material he needs. Depending on the kind and extent of information needed, this may take more or less of the librarian's time, but her goal is always to assist the patron in getting the reading material he wants. And at the end of each day that the library is open, the books returned must be replaced correctly on the shelves, and a circulation record made of the number and types of books lent that day.

In addition to the routine work of a librarian come such extra activities as, in our library, film programs. To make these possible our library is among one those fortunate enough to have a projector, screen, and a room where films may be shown. From a catalog sent to us by the State Library, films suitable for the interested group must be ordered, and publicity about such programs sent to newspapers, schools, or interested groups.

During this past year I have taken three more courses at U.N.H. in Library Science: two in choosing and evaluating books for children and adults, and one about the use of reference books. Mrs. Richard F. Sanborn, our library consultant, taught this course and made it most interesting and helpful.

Since our high school now has a library, the circulation of books among patrons of that age has diminished somewhat, but we hope, with your cooperation, to extend the library's usefulness to the community as a whole. Our trustees, library consultant, and several frineds of the library, as well as your assistant librarian, Mrs. Chandler, and I have given many hours of service as a gift to the town. This is because we are

convinced that a library is one of a community's most valuable possessions. Our town is growing, and information and viewpoints that can make it a good community are available from its library books. Let us serve an increasing number of you in the coming year.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1972 has been a year of continuing progress in our Town. Our sewer is in full operation and is functioning as designed.

The construction of new homes is continuing at an accelerated rate.

We welcome the New Hampshire Public Service Company to our Town. Their new Regional Office and Service Center on Route 125 is under construction.

The first Fair in Epping was held at the Star Speedway. This event was originated and sponsored by Charles Elliott. We are hopeful that it will become an annual affair.

Your Selectmen successfully defended our Town in three law suits:

The first case was by Mr. Robert Dodge. He requested the Town to give up the Right-of-Way of French Road from his home to Blake Road. The Court denied his request and issued a Court Order to remove all obstruction that he placed in the Right-of-Way.

The second case was by Mr. Wilfred Cloutier who was asking the Superior Court to grant him a sewer connection for his Mobile Home Park. This was denied by the Court. The Selectmen pointed out that the sewer was constructed at the request of the Federal Government and the State of New Hampshire to eliminate the pollution of the Lamprey River. The sewer capacity was designed to correct this condition with enough additional capacity to handle only normal

building (on Vacant Land) in the sewered district. Our Sewer System is at approximately 85% capacity at the present time.

The third case was by Mr. Jean Bellefeuille who requested the Court to change the method used by the Selectmen is assissing Mobile Homes. The Court refused to hear the case.

There is one case still outstanding by Mr. Wilfred Cloutier who is requesting the Court to reduce the tax assessment for his Mobil Home Park.

The Selectmen regret the necessity of spending of Town monies for the above purposes.

Storm windows have been installed on some of the windows at the Town Hall. We expect this will help to reduce the cost of heating this building.

The additional sewer system Bond of \$124,000.00 authorized by the Town to complete the Sewer System has been reduced to \$120,000.00

Our new Fire Station in West Epping is now complete. Our Fire Department is now operating this new unit.

We wish to thank all of our Departments, Boards and Commissions for their hard work in the past year. Keep up the good work.

#### PLANNING BOARD REPORT

It is nearly impossible to detail in the short amount of space alloted to this report, the accurate summary of the detailed work of the Planning Board during the past year. The numerous phone calls, the requests for information, special meetings at odd hours and days, to accomodate townspeople with special problems; these, together with informational hearing to inform the people of Epping, all have been undertaken. Altogether, it has been a busy year.

The year 1972 was the first full year of operation of the Land Sub-division Law of the State of New Hampshire, known as Chap. 36. This alone probably doubled the workload of the Planning Board. At times, it probably seemed to the members to be the only thing they were involved in. Nearly 90 Uniform Land Use Forms of the Planning Board were taken out by people involved. Most of these were approved, with a few notable exceptions.

The Planning Board tried to keep a tight rein on the appropriation allotted to it in the budget. We ended the year with an unexpended sum of slightly over \$30.00.

Public Hearings were held on Regulations for the Industrial Park. This was finalized and adopted by the Board. Hearings were also held on proposed establishment of Commercial Zones and Regulation of Multi-family dwellings. These latter two will be finalized and presented in the near future.

A reorganization of the Board took place on March. The term of Patrick Jackson expired in November and he was replaced shortly thereafter by George Graves. At that time Roger Vogler was appointed Associate Member. The Board would like at this time to express thanks and gratitude to Patrick Jackson for his years of service to the Town and the Board. His knowledge and expertise will be sorely missed.

The Board thanks the citizens of Epping for their support and asks for their continued cooperation in the year ahead.



#### WATER & SEWER COMMISSION REPORT

During 1972 the Water & Sewer departments in Epping experienced a very quiet year in relation to 1971. The Commission met every other Wednesday night from 7 to 9 p.m. and had a minimal number of visitors registering complaints or requesting assistance.

To date, we have issued 268 sewer permits including those that were issued in 1971. There are over thirty residents who have not yet applied for permits, and we remind them to do so in order to comply with the state laws.

Mr. Edgar Sewall, the Superintendent of the Commission, resigned during the year, and the Board of Selectmen appointed Mr. Charles P. Sanborn to fulfill Mr. Sewall's unexpired term.

During the year we had four new building connections. Three were residential for both water and sewer connections, and one was residential/commercial for a sewer connection only.

The Layne Co. was contracted for the water search project and initial contact and survey was conducted, but as of this writing the Layne Co. has not fulfilled their obligation.

The Water and Sewer departments have operated throughout the year without major problems and we have gained valuable experience in the operation of the sewer system. We hope that everyone in the Town has been properly served and if not, they may take issue with the Commission at one of their regular meetings. We plan to continue these meetings on a regular basis and have posted the dates for 1973 on the Town bulletin board.

# RECREATION COMMISSION REPORT

What is a Recreation Commission?

A Recreation Commission is a group of appointed townspeople who believe that there are many things that can be done, recreation wise for young and old, that will bring everyone together. Your Recreation Commission believes as such and is striving to develop programs that will bring everyone together.

At the March 1972 Town Meeting the newly founded Recreation Commission was handed the job of developing a swimming area at the Mary E. Folsom Blair Park. \$3,000.00 was appropriated for this task. The first of this development was to have the park area surveyed in order to ascertain absolute boundries. This was accomplished and the land registered for \$657.00. After considerable time and investigation the Recreation Commission was very disappointed to reach the conclusion that a swimming area within the park was economically unfeasable, therefore \$2,325.00 is being returned to the Town as an unexpended balance.

With that conclusion the Recreation Commission then turned its energies to developing programs and events for the year 1973. One activity that the Commission strongly endorses is that of a Summer Program for the school children of town. The Commission is requesting an appropriation of \$1,000.00 for the summer of 73 to be used for a six to eight week youth activities program.

Other programs and events will be forthcoming during the year and these activities will be self-supporting or have voluntary supervision. Supervision over activities and town property used for recreational purposes is very important and without proper supervision many recreational programs cannot be realized. The Commission needs your voluntary help and ideas so please let us hear from you.

# REPORT OF EXETER AREA VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association provides skilled nursing and physical therapy services under the direction of the patient's physician. This may include home visits to administer injections, change surgical dressings, supervise medications and diet, record vital signs, draw blood, irrigate catheters, administer enemas, assist or teach the patient's family in regard to personal care, skin care, and cast care. Many visits are made to newborns and mothers for health and diet teaching and care of mother and infant. Patient's physically able to leave the home may receive injections at the VNA office. The physical therapist is available to patient's in establishing a home exercise program, teaching family exercise pattern and daily routine and evaluating need for any equipment necessary to rehabilitate a patient to his fullest potential as a contributing member of society.

Through our Well Child Clinic many children are receiving immunizations and physical examinations, vision and hearing screening, dental hygiene instruction, and diet teaching, who previously may not have because of financial problems or lack of follow-up in updating health care necessities.

Visits are also made to crippled children, tuberculosis patients, mental health and Veterans Administration referrals. Assistance is also given to patients in understanding Medicare, Blue Cross-Blue Shield, and eligibility for these benefits.

Through the VNA hospital based Home Health Coordinator, patients are now receiving continuity of care after hospital discharge to the home.

The above services are provided to everyone in the community—the young, old, aged, pregnant mothers, and all economic groups for the purpose of promoting, maintaining or restoring health, or minimizing the effects of illness and disability. Better health care knowledge prevents accidents, illness, and disease, and saves many health dollars.

There are many ways to get home health care: (1) The patient's physician may contact the VNA office, (2) The patient can contact the VNA office directly, (3) A spouse, relative, friend may contact the VNA office, or (4) Another agency or referral source may refer a patient for home health care.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Epping for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972.

# SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library, Water and Sewer Commission accounts, Water Department, Trust Funds, Municipal Court and Sewer Projects.

# FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Balance Sheet as of December 31, 1972 is presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Liabilities exceed the Assets, thereby creating a Net Debt of \$272,548.52. Comparative Statement of Appropriations and Expenditures (Exhibit A-2) shows a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,252.68. The statement of Estimated and Actual Revenues and Budget Summary (Exhibit A-3) shows a net increase of actual revenue of \$14,131.22, showing a net budget surplus of \$12,878.54.

# DEPARTMENTS

Each official's records are shown in Exhibit B-1 through J-2.

# AUDIT PROCEDURE

The Accounts and Records of all town officials charged with the custody receipt and disbursement of Public Funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accrodingly include such tests of the accounting recrods and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices of delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's Records. The amounts of uncollected taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any change which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

# GENERAL COMMENTS

All uncollected taxes in Exhibit C-3 for the year 1969 have been either abated or deeded to the town, inasmuch as the statutory two year redemption period provided by R.S.A. 80:32 has expired on these tax liens. In auditing the Water & Sewer Department, the keeping of separate records was found to be incomplete and it is recommended that the Water & Sewer Department be consolidated with the general account, thereby doing away with the special checking account.

I want to extend my thanks to the officials of the Town of Epping for their assistance during the course of the audit.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Whereas our newly elected governor has pledged to change many of the existing educational laws in New Hampshire, especially those affecting local school autonomy, it becomes essestial that all citizens of the Epping School District understand more fully the overall management and control of their schools.

Basic to local educational control in New Hampshire is the legal responsibility of the school boards—a responsibility and authority far greater than delegated to their counterparts in many other states in this country.

The following should clearly illustrate this fact. By state law:

- "1. The school board must provide standard schools for at least 180 days and "give to all pupils within the district as nearly equal advantages as are practicable". A standard school is one with:
  - a. a suitable and sanitary building;
  - b. furniture, books, maps and other necessary appliances;
  - a staff composed of certified teachers, directed and supervised by principal and superintendent; and
  - d. suitable provision for the care of the health and physical welfare of all pupils
- 2. Transportation shall be provided all pupils below the ninth grade who live two miles or more from school. Pupils entitled to transportation may be required to walk one mile to a bus stop or one and one-half miles to a stop approved by the state. Transportation may be furnished to pupils above grade eight and any others living less than two miles from school when this is found desirable.
- **3.** The school board employs teachers for the district and may dismiss any teacher found to be immoral or incompetent, except that no teacher may be dismissed prior to the end of the contract year without being notified of the cause and being granted a hearing. The school board may fail to reelect a teacher for another school year providing notice of this is given to the teacher in writing prior to March 15. A teacher who has taught in the district for three or more years must be granted a hearing if one is requested and the subsequent decision of the board is subject to review by the state board.
- **4.** The school board may, unless otherwise provided by statute or state board regulations, prescribe all rules for the management and organization of the schools within ghe district.
  - 5. Other responsibilities of the school board include the following:
    - a. purchase of textbooks, supplies and insurance
    - b. appointment of truant officers
    - c. the taking of a school census
    - d. making repairs to buildings
    - e. accepting federal funds, and
    - f. nominating a superintendent of schools

- **6.** The school board shall see that the studies prescribed by the state board are thoroughly taught. Specifically mentioned in the statute are "physiology and hygiene in so far as it relates to the effect of alcohol and narcotics on the human system" and the teaching of courses "in all public and private schools in the state.....the constitutions of the United States and of this state and also in the Declaration of Independence."
- 7. A school district shall establish programs for handicapped children. If the district does not provide a suitable program it must pay tuition to one operated by another district or a private organization. The district of residence is liable for the state average tuition payment for pupils educated in other schools. Suitable transportation is to be provided for handicapped children. The liability for transportation is an amount equal to the state average tuition charge per pupil. A handicapped child is one whose physical, intellectual or emotional problems make him unable to profit from the regular school program.
- 8. A school board may provide health services, appoint a school physician, a school nurse, a dental hygienist, and other school health aides. Each child must have a medical examination prior to or upon first entry into the public school system. All school personnel must have a physical examination prior to employment. Periodic medical exams may be required following employment. School boards must develop written policies relative to emergency care for students and school personnel injured or becoming ill during school hours or scheduled activities.

In addition to the above legal powers and responsibilities, the State Board of Education has conferred the following regulations upon the local school boards:

- 1. The determination of salaries and terms of employment for all teachers and other employees.
- **2.** The preparation of a budget for local school expenditures and the keeping of school accounts.
- **3.** The determination, upon recommendation of the superintendent and in accordance with the regulations of the State Board, of the subjects of instruction and the school time to be devoted to each subject.
- 4. The holding of a school board meeting at least once every two months.
- **5.** The nomination of a superintendent of schools for employment by the State Board of Education.
- **6.** The exercise of all powers and the performance of all duties vested in and imposed upon the school board which are not committed to the superintendent or expressly delegated to him."

While the above duties and responsibilities were being formulated it became apparent to the lawmakers of the state that it was impractical to expect part-time school board members who, for the most part were untrained in educational management, to continue to operate, efficiently, their public schools. Therefore, the position of Superintendent of Schools was created in the year 1850. It took another 70 some odd years for the state to officially define his duties.

Since 1919 those duties have been officially, as well as unofficially, up-dated many times.

Today the Superintendent of Schools must:

"Serve as the executive head of the public schools. He shall be responsible for planning and administering their affairs subject to statutory requirements, the regulations of the State Board of Education, and the policies of the local districts. The position shall develop and maintain a system of public schools, capably staffed to provide quality education and supportive services. The Superintendent shall provide, develop and implement the procedures to achieve educational objectives within his administrative unit.

In performance of those duties, he shall be directly responsible to the State Board of Education through its commissioner, and the Board of Boards of the Supervisory Union.

The Superintendent may be supported by one or more assistants such as assistant superintendents, business administrators and teacher consultants. He shall delegate such of his duties as is necessary and desirable for the efficient completion of the requirements of the position.

- 1. The Superintendent shall nominate all professional central office personnel.
- **2.** The Superintendent shall direct and supervise the work of all employees of the district and shall have all powers necessary to make such direction effective. While the Superintendent has ultimate responsibility, he may delegate powers and duties to other personnel.
- **3.** He shall nominate all certificated staff and appoint other employees in accordance with the laws, regulations of the State Board of Education, and school board policies.
- **4.** He shall be responsible for the selection and purchase of text-books and all other scholastic apparatus and supplies in accordance with the regulations of the school board and the State Board and see that the same are suitable distributed to the school, accurately accounted for and economically used.
- **5.** He shall be responsible for developing and recommending to the school board the annual budget for the support of the educational program and for the operation and maintenance of schools, in accordance with School Board policy.
- **6.** He shall be responsible for an accounting system and financial reporting procedure in order that all funds will be accounted for in accordance with local school board plicy, and local and state law.

- **7.** He shall be responsible for the development of an educational plan for the district or districts and for recommending a program of studies suitable to the needs of the pupils and the community in accordance with local school board policies, state statutes and State Board Regulations.
- **8.** The Superintendent may, for cause, remove a teacher or other employee of the District in accordance with state statutes.
- **9.** He shall recommend the dismissal of certified staff to the Board, recognizing its authority to dismiss according to the statutes.
- **10.** He shall provide for temporary vacancies and shall have the authority to secure supplies immediately needed for the operation of the schools.
- 11. He shall be responsible for maintaining records and making reports as required by the State Board of Education and the local school boards.
- 12. He shall admit pupils to school attendance in accordance with the laws of the state and the regulations of the State Board and policies of the focal board. He shall assign them to such classes and grades as he finds their needs warrant.
- 13. He shall provide for the alleviation of hazardous conditions of an emergency nature that affect the health and welfare of pupils.
- **14.** He shall be responsible for the evaluation of personnel and programs in accordance with local school board policies.
- 15. He shall be responsible, after notice, for the implementation of the policies and regulations of the State Board of Education. He is expected to participate in the development and evaluation of said policies and regulations as requested by the Commissioner of Education."

### March 11, 1972

The Moderator opened the meeting by reading the election results and the school warrant.

**Article 1.** To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district. It was voted to take up article 1 under article 8.

**Article 2.** To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. It was voted to accept reports as printed in the school district report.

**Article 3.** To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. It was voted to accept Article 3 as read.

Article 4. To see if the District will vote to accept programs, services, and activities under the provisions of the vocational amendments of 1968 and to expend an amount, as may be made available to the district, not to exceed \$12,000.00, under said federal act, to such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. It was voted to table this article, since federal funds would not be available.

Article 5. To see if the District will authorize the school board to convey to the Town of Epping the right-of-way located between Main Street and the Carrie Odiorne Junior High School. It was voted to convey to the Town of Epping the right-of-way located between Main St. and the Carrie Odiorne Jr. High School.

Article 6. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,000.00 to purchase and install carpeting in four classrooms on the second floor at the Central School. The article was amended to read "and that the contract be submitted to public bid". A vote was taken on the article as amended and it passed.

Article 7. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purpose of paying unanticipated FICA and Sewage Installation for the 1971—72 fiscal year, which sum is a deficit appropriation. It was moved and seconded to accept the article as read. The motion was put to a vote and it carried.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district. Frank Lavoie moved that the district vote to raise and appropriate \$579,852.00 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials, and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. Ann Burtt seconded the motion.

Clara Montgomery moved to amend the motion to deduct \$7,000.00 from the budget for one of the teachers' salaries. Mr. Restuccia seconded the motion. The vote was taken; 50 in favor and 35 opposed. The amendment carried.

After a discussion of the flag pole (under capital outlay-equipment) Dan Hackett moved to amend the motion to strike \$500.00 from the budget allocated for a new flag pole until the school board can get more information on the size and type we will need. Peter Carr seconded the motion and it was put to a vote and carried.

Donald Young made the motion that we reduce the amended budget figure appropriated by a sum equal to 25%

of the school board's proposed 1972 school budget increase. This would work out to a figure of \$18,106.00. This was seconded by Mr. Gatchell.

Mr. Chamberlain moved to amend Mr. Young's amendment to reduce the budget by \$32,000.00. Mrs. Montgomery seconded the motion. A vote was taken after much heated discussion and the results were 31 in favor and 77 against. The motion was defeated.

A vote was taken on Mr. Young's motion and the results were 64 in favor and 42 against. The motion carried.

The budget at \$562,246.00 as amended was accepted after a motion was made by John Hackett and seconded by Edward Castle.

The meeting adjourned at 11:24 p.m.
