## JEFFERSON TOWN WARRANT 1990

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 12:00 NOON TO 8:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Jefferson in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Jefferson on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March next, at 7:30 of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.  
\*To be voted on by ballot while the Polls are open.
2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt Amendment #1 (Floodplain Development Ordinance) to the Town Land Use Plan Ordinance, the contents of such amendment being required for continuation of coverage by the National Floodplain Insurance Program administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The amendment is on file in the Town Office and by reference is incorporated herein.  
\*To be voted on by ballot while the Polls are open.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to take the necessary steps to join the Androscoggin Valley Solid Waste District. Action on this article is contingent upon the actual formation of such district.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500) as the Town's share for the purpose of joining the Androscoggin Valley Solid Waste District. Action on this article is contingent upon an affirmative vote on Article #4.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-one Thousand Dollars (\$21,000) for the purpose of revaluation of the Town to be completed in this year of 1990, such sum being the final amount necessary to be raised, and to authorize the withdrawal of Thirty Thousand One Hundred Seventy-five and 10/100 Dollars (\$30,175.10) plus any interest accrued therein from Capital Reserve Fund #2 which was established at the 1987 Town Meeting for this purpose.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) to be added to the existing Capital Reserve Fund #1 for road equipment.

8. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of closure of the Town Dump and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars to be placed in this fund and to designate the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500) for the purpose of purchasing gravel from R. S. Audley, Inc.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000) for the purpose of repairing Stag Hollow Rd.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-two Thousand Dollars (\$22,000) for the purpose of purchasing a trash compactor, site preparation and installation of single phase electrical service to the site.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000) for the solid waste disposal operating budget and to authorize the withdrawal of Twenty-two Thousand Dollars (\$22,000) from the Dump Fund (Expendable Trust) established at the 1987 Town Meeting for this purpose. The balance of Twenty-three Thousand Dollars (\$23,000) to be raised by taxation.
13. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Conservation Commission under the provisions of RSA 36-A for the promotion and development of the natural resources of the Town and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150) for this purpose. Furthermore, any balance remaining at year-end may be transferred to a conservation fund account in hands of the Town Treasurer (RSA 41:29).
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Eighty-six Dollars (\$486) for the purpose of supporting the Lancaster District Court Juvenile Diversion Program.
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Two Hundred Eighty-nine and 86/100 Dollars (\$3,289.86) for a contribution to Weeks Home Health Services, Inc.
16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred Five and 26/100 Dollars (\$1,305.26) for a contribution to White Mountain Mental Health & Developmental Services.
17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) to help pay the insurance premium on the Jefferson Historical Building, such sum to be given to the Historical Society Treasurer by August 25, 1990. (By petition)

18. To see if the Town will vote to participate in the celebration of Earth Day 1990 on April 22, 1990 as designated by the U. S. Congress to promote the preservation of our global environment. (By petition)
19. To see if the Town will vote to enter into an agreement with the NH Governor's Recycling Grants Program; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to pay for a town recycling facility and equipment. Furthermore, said construction and purchase to be contingent upon receipt of a grant from the NH Governor's Recycling Grants Program in the amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) which represents 50 percent of costs and the balance of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to be raised from taxation.
20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year. (RSA 31:95b)
21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to administer and dispose of any real estate, acquired by Tax Collector's deed at public or private sale, as the Selectmen in their sole discretion, deem equitable and just. (RSA 80:42 [I] and [III])
22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
23. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of taxes.
24. To transact any other business that may come before this meeting.

## FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

During 1989 the Jefferson Fire Dept. responded to 25 firecalls, of which a large portion were mutual aid. Firecalls in Town remained low due greatly to our townspeople.

We purchased a 1975 100 gallon per minute pumper/attack truck this year. Many thanks to the people of Jefferson, the Jefferson Fireman's Asso., and the many donations we received from other fire departments, area businesses and individuals who made this purchase possible. It will be a valuable asset to us and the Town for many years.

Our goal is more and better training. This past year three of our members have become State certified in firefighting, and three more are presently going to school for State Certification. We also have three members taking an Advanced Firefighter course. Also this spring a State Certification for self-contained breathing apparatus course will be available to our members.

Within the next two years we hope to be on a complete paging system. This will allow all members to be alerted at the same time thus saving valuable time responding to calls.

During 1989, the North Pact (Mutual Aid), of which Jefferson is a member, became the Northern New Hampshire Fire Mutual Aid. There are now 14 area town fire departments in New Hampshire and Vermont as members, making this one of the largest mutual aid systems in New Hampshire. Meetings are held once a month at different town fire stations to work on training and improving operations. It is an excellent method of sharing resources greatly helping out each town with needed equipment and support. The mutual aid dues are \$100 per year for each town. The money goes back into the system to assist with needed improvements.

The Jefferson Fire Dept. strongly recommends the installation of smoke and fire alarms in all living areas. Battery powered alarms should be changed two times a year. Also checking of chimneys and stove pipes weekly during the woodburning season and cleaning as necessary are high on the list for fire prevention and fire safety.

Thank you to all members, the Red Net phone operators and the people of Jefferson for continued support.

## PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The members of the Jefferson Planning Board are appointed by the Selectmen. Present members are John G. Miller, Chairman, Earl Brooks, Vice-chairman, Vernard Bronson, James Brady, Jr., Marjorie Doan, Ernest Angelicola, and Theodore Clukay, Selectmen's representative. Alternates are John Marshall, Gordon Winsor and Rita Cloutier. Secretary is Ruth C. Lowe.

The Planning Board met on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month in the Selectmen's Office. All meetings were open to the public.

The Board held twenty-eight (28) preliminary hearings and approved twenty-three (23) subdivisions - four (4) being major subdivisions; approved three (3) boundary line adjustments; and held several consultations and discussions. Out of these twenty-three (23) approved subdivisions, forty-seven (47) new lots were created.

The Planning Board held a public hearing to consider accepting the R. S. Audley Inc. "Pit Agreement."

The Board members attended several special out-of-town meetings and workshops sponsored by the NH Municipal Association, NH Land Conservation Investment Program and Inherit New Hampshire.

Henry Whittemore, Trust for NH Lands, met with the Board to inform and discuss the easement program for the NH Land Conservation Investment Program.

R. S. Audley, Inc. and Midway Excavation met to present their proposals for excavations for road gravel to be used in the Route 115 reconstruction.

The Board used the services of the North Country Council, Inc., the NH Municipal Association and private consultants. These services are an important part of the Board's decision-making process. The Board spent considerable time in these sessions, with their consultants and others, in preparation for hearings on revisions to the Land Use Plan Ordinance and the Master Plan General Statement. In addition, the Board uses a professional engineer as a consultant on subdivision road matters.

## REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During calendar year 1989, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, children and debris burning fires that escaped control. All these causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27b), "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 and the other burning laws of the state are misdemeanors punishable of fines up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail, and you are also liable for paying all fire suppression cost.

The State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1989, including several large fires in Alton, Allenstown, Concord, and Chesterfield areas, as well as the 100 acre fire on Mt. Belknap in Gilford.

In order to eliminate false alarms, it is advisable to notify your local fire department whenever you intend to do any outdoor burning.

Weeks Home Health Services is a not for profit subsidiary of Weeks Memorial Hospital serving six towns - Dalton, Groveton, Jefferson, Lancaster, Whitefield and Stark. The services provided are Skilled Nursing, Home Health Aides, Homemaking, Physical and Occupational Therapy and Speech Pathology within a person's home. Other services provided are community screening and influenza vaccine clinics. No one is denied service because of their inability to pay.

## WHITE MOUNTAIN MENTAL HEALTH & DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES

The 1990's will usher in a different type of service delivery system in Mental Health and Developmental Service. The system will be more comprehensive in its ability to care for the most impaired individuals in our communities. The transition of individuals from the institutions (New Hampshire Hospital and Laconia State School) has almost been completed. The institutions have been reduced in size and there are limits on who can now be admitted. The focus of care has been shifted to the community.

We have accommodated this change with an expansion of our housing and community support (case management, respite and supported housing) services. The growth of Agency has tripled in the last five years. Most of the growth has been in the area of supports for the formerly institutionalized population. The other services we offer have not experienced this kind of growth or change. The demand remains high for these services and the supports have not kept pace. One example is our outpatient Mental Health program. We see more people for more visits in this program than any other. However, we have not received increases in state or federal support which match the demand for service. Forty-two percent of the people we see do not have insurance and are responsible for their own fee. We approach you to assist us in our efforts to continue to help us to provide these services. Thank you for your past support and for your continuing concern.

The following information will summarize some of our work during this past year.

Mental Health Services - We operate one full-time and three part-time offices. The full-time office is located in Littleton at 16 Maple Street. The part-time offices are located in Woodsville Clinic, in Lincoln at the Lin-Wood Medical Center, and in Lancaster at Weeks Memorial Hospital.

- . Last year, we saw over 800 individuals for 4,115 outpatient visits.
- . 400 visits were of an emergency nature
- . 21% of our service involves children
- . 14% of our service involves the elderly
- . 65% of our service involves adults.
- . Our Partial Hospitalization Program offered over 6,000 hours of service.

We offer a comprehensive array of services including: 24 hour emergency, drug and alcohol, case management, inpatient, and partial hospitalization.

### Developmental Services

. Early Intervention - Home-based service for 0-3 year old children who are delayed in their development. Services include: screening, assessment, treatment, and referral. Last year, we began to provide clinics throughout our region to increase our ability to serve more children.

. Day Habilitation Program - Provides instruction to our most severely impaired adult population. The program works in conjunction with their residential programming as well as providing training and instruction in self care skills, pre-vocational skills, paid work, and other therapeutic services such as speech therapy and physical therapy. This program has been primarily used by former Laconia State School residents; however, we have had community clients who have been referred by the local school systems. Last year, we served 12 clients in two locations (Littleton and Pike).

. Supported Employment - Provides training, instruction, and work adjustment for mentally ill and mentally retarded individuals. Paid work opportunities for the individuals can take place either in the community or in the Workshop itself. We currently operate three active job sites directly in the community. We recently turned over one of our job crews directly to an employer. We have also completed over twenty individual job placements.

We are grateful for your past support of our programs and look forward to continuing to serve you in the future.

## NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC.

The year 1989 marked the North Country Council's seventeenth year of successful operation. As chartered under NH RSA 36:45, the Council provides non-profit local and regional planning assistance to member municipalities. In addition to general planning services, the Council offers its constituents specialty services in cultural resource conservation, economic development, housing, natural resource management, solid waste management and transportation. The four standing Council committees, Economic Development, Housing, Land Use and Transportation, actively direct the Council's policies in these areas.

In Jefferson, the Council assisted the Planning Board in reviewing a number of subdivision applications and provided the Board with information concerning excavation regulations. The Council also assisted in the preparation of a solid waste management plan and conducted a local educational workshop on recycling.

Community planning challenges dominated the Council's 1989 agenda. Changing state mandates and furthered residential and commercial growth busied local planning and zoning boards throughout the year. The Council assisted these boards in preparing for the challenges through regional workshops, technical bulletins and newsletters and as-needed assistance on technical and specific issues. The Council co-sponsored the popular Municipal Law Lecture Series which addressed new case law, grandfathering and the revised excavation statute. The Council also assisted numerous towns in revising zoning ordinances, subdivision regulations and site plan review regulations, thereby updating these regulations to better meet and manage the new challenges.

The Council's 1989 work program continued to promote community development projects, as well. Managing close to two million dollars in Community Development Block Grant monies, the Council administers program in ten North Country communities. Many are housing improvement programs, yet others support sewer projects, day care development, and municipal water supply projects.

In summary, it is important to understand that the Council is organized to provide these valuable services for the benefit of our local town governments. The Council's continued success in meeting the ever-changing demands of the North Country is dependent upon the active participation of our members. We rely upon and enjoy your involvement as town officials and concerned citizens, and look forward to assisting you in this coming year.

## JEFFERSON HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The year 1989 found the Society keeping the Museum open Sunday afternoons from 7 to 5 p.m. with members volunteering. During the week the Museum was open by appointment. This schedule will continue in 1990.

Last year there were a number of significant donations presented to the Society. The Enman family donated antique buttermaking equipment as well as a collection of other items in memory of Charles and Dorothy Enman.

Following the closing of the Meadows Post Office Mrs. Ardeane Saucier donated the post office which had served the Meadows area for over 100 years.

Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth P. Kenyon presented the Society with Benjamin Plaisted's desk which he used for a post office in the early days. Also given were a set of six copper measures used by Mr. Plaisted to validate sets used by tavernkeepers in selling alcohol.

The special album of school pictures, programs and other activities continues to be a major undertaking and many visitors have enjoyed finding themselves or friends in the many pictures or programs. Additions to this project would be welcome. Also needed are family and house histories as well as pictures.

About 50 people stopped by last year with states represented being Maine, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Ohio and Florida.

The Society appreciates the assistance given by the townspeople and it is hoped that more residents will take time to come in and see the results of your Society's efforts to preserve memorabilia pertaining to Jefferson's history. Families with children and school classes are especially welcome to visit and learn about the tools and equipment used by their ancestors.
