## SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1ST, 1885.

### DISTRICT NO. 1.

No school.

### DISTRICT NO. 2.

Prudential Committee, A. J. SMITH.

Three terms. The Grammar school for the entire year was taught by Miss Clara A. Smith, and the Primary department by Miss Agnes B. Lauder. The school in both departments has been a success. Miss Lauder has taught several terms in this school before this year and seems in every way fitted for the position.

### DISTRICT NO. 3.

Prudential Committee, J. S. WOOD

Three terms. Teacher for the summer term, Miss Florence Wood. For the fall term, Miss Kate Olds, and for the winter term, Miss Ada Hall. Miss Olds proved herself a very valuable teacher. It seems poor policy to change teachers so often. Fewer weeks of school with a good teacher are more desirable than more with an ordinary teacher.

### DISTRICT NO. 4.

Prudential Committee, A. P. WOOD.

One term taught by Herbert H. Estabrook. The school though very small was profitable to those who did attend.



## DISTRICT NO. 5.

Prudential Committee, S. P. WOOD.

Three terms. All taught by Miss Achsa E. Wood, with excellent success.

## DISTRICT NO. 6.

Prudential Committee, GEORGE W. FOSTER, JR.

Two terms. The summer term was taught by Miss M. E. Towle. The fall term was under the care of Miss Minnie G. Freeman. Both schools were profitable to the small number of scholars.

## DISTRICT NO. 7.

Prudential Committee, E. C. BARDEN.

Two terms. The first term was taught by Miss Ellen Barden, and the second by Miss Mary E. Towle.

## DISTRICT NO. 8.

Prudential Committee, HENRY HOUGH.

Three terms. Miss Helen F. Baker taught during the summer and fall terms. Mr. N. P. Sargent had charge of the winter school. This is a pleasant school, and has done good work for the year.

## DISTRICT NO. 9.

Prudential Committee, WARREN LOWE.

Three terms. Miss Grace L. Baker was teacher in this school for the entire year. Teacher and scholars seem to have worked harmoniously and profitably.

## DISTRICT NO. 10.

Prudential Committee, EDMUND EASTMAN.

Two terms. The first taught by Miss Minnie G. Freeman. The winter term was under the direction of Mr. Josiah Davis. The energy and vivacity of this school seems to have been directed into proper channels, and as a result, under the direction of competent teachers, is one of our best schools.

## DISTRICT NO. 11.

Prudential Committee. GEO. M. SANBORN.

Two terms. Teachers, Grace Darling and Mary E. Towle. School small, scholars orderly and studious.

## DISTRICT NO. 12.

Prudential Committee, EVERINGTON FERSON.

Three terms. Miss Ollie Hatch has been teacher for the school year. This school demands much of a teacher. The school-room is too small to accommodate the large number of pupils usually present. Examinations at close of year were creditable to teacher and scholars.

## DISTRICT NO. 13.

Prudential Committee, CHARLES H. GERRISH.

Three terms. Teachers, O. A. Johnson and O. W. Burnap. The school is too large for the most profitable work. The large number of classes limits the time devoted to each. Teachers were faithful, worked daily more than the required hours, and the school has made progress. Mr. Johnson taught for two terms, Mr. Burnap during the winter.

## DISTRICT NO. 16.

Prudential Committee, WALDEN F. THOMPSON.

Two terms. Miss Jennie A. Hutchins, teacher, Classes always appeared well.

## REMARKS.

In submitting our report concerning the schools of Lebanon for the year past, we have little to say more than our predecessors have stated. Our schools have been considerably varied in character. Some are too large, some too small. In several instances they would be improved by the consolidation

of districts, it not by the adoption of the town system, at least by an arrangement provided for by the laws of the State, so that any district having less than 12 scholars to attend any term of school, may provide for the attendance of such pupils at the schools of adjoining districts.

Our school-houses are almost entirely destitute of requisite apparatus for the school-room, with the exception of a few maps. One small globe, only, is found in our school-rooms. In most of the school-rooms the maps are worn beyond use, and new ones ought to be substituted. A somewhat liberal outlay for the admirable charts now published, for dictionaries, an increased supply of blackboards, maps, globes, and other apparatus, would give new life to the schools. A teacher who does not know how to use these, ought to be allowed to go over into another state to practice her art. This deficiency may be gradually remedied, and we would recommend to our successors that they use all the power put into their hands by the law of the state to secure an improvement, viz. : "The Superintending School Committee and Selectmen are empowered to expend, at their discretion, for the use of the schools, one-fifth part of the literary fund, which may annually be assigned any city or town, in the purchase or repair of blackboards, maps, charts, globes, dictionaries, or any other apparatus which in their judgment, will advance the educational interests of said schools," etc.

The prudential committee of each district may also make repairs of school-house and furniture, using therefor, not more than 5 per cent. of the school money of the district. We would emphasize this need of our schools and encourage the use of all means to remedy the present condition of our school-rooms.

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
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
