RESULTS OF THE 1985 LITTLETON WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton in said State qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the twelfth day of March, 1985, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M. and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:00 P.M.), to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1. To choose one Selectman for theterm of three years, one Park Commissioner for a three-year term, a Town Treasurer for a one-year term, three members of the Board of Trustees of the public library for three-year terms, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a threeyear term. (Ballot vote.)

The following Town Officers were elected:

Selectman - Lyle E. Bulis Treasurer - Lillian Sylvestre Park Commissioner - Pierre P. Lafitte Trustee of Trust Funds - Robert L. Reynells, Jr. Library Trustees- Marcia K. Bellmore, Robert J. Pavlick, Moseley W. Tallman

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the planning board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot Vote)

To add to section 2.01: The zoning map, which shall be kept in the office of the Town Clerk shall carry the Town seal and the certification of the Board of Selectmen.

This article was voted 758 yes to 200 no. Passed.

ARTICLE 3. Are you im favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the planning board for town zoning ordinance as follows: (Ballot Vote)

To add new section 2.02 : that amendments shall be entered promptly after approval on the zoning map, and a record noted on the map.

This article was voted 750 yes to 181 no. Passed.

ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the planning board for town zoning ordinance as follows: (Ballot Vote)

To change Auto Sales from a use permitted by right, to a use allowed by special exception in the Commercial zones. This article was voted 468 yes to 429 no. Passed.

ARTICLE 5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the planning board for town zoning ordinance as follows: (Ballot Vote)

To change the minimum lot size required in Industrial zones from the present $2\frac{1}{2}$ acres to 1 acre.

This article was voted 474 yes to 457 no. Passed.

ARTICLE 6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the planning board for town zoning ordinance as follows: (Ballot Vote)

To adopt this definition of Sign and include it in the definitions, Article XIV: Sign is any medium, including its structure and component parts, which is used or intended to be used to attract attention to the subject matter for advertising purposes.

This article was voted 565 yes to 340 no. Passed.

ARTICLE 7. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the planning board for town zoning ordinance as follows: (Ballot Vote)

To include in Article VIII, Sign Regulations, this statement of purpose. Purpose. The regulation and control of the location, size, type, and the number of signs permitted shall be governed by the provisions of this article. The purpose of this article shall be to safeguard and enhance property values; to protect public and private investment in buildings and open spaces; to preserve and improve the appearance of the community as a place in which to live and to work; to attract non-residents who come to visit or trade; to encourage sound signing practices as an aid to business and public information; and to promote the public health, safety and general welfare.

This article was voted 540 yes to 373 no. Passed.

ARTICLE 8. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the planning board for town zoning ordinance as follows: (Ballot Vote)

To allow temporary signs of all types in any district by deleting the words "conducted for educational, charitable, non-profit or political purposes" from existing section 8.04.

To allow a free standing direction sign in Industrial districts as follows: One per business entity. Size may not exceed 4 square feet in each of 2 sides. Number of directional signs limited ton number of major entrances to industrial area. The sign must not be within 5 feet of any public right-of-way. The location of the sign must not hinder public safety. This article was voted 592 yes to 326 no. Passed. ARTICLE 9. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 8 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot Vote)

To bring the ordinance into conformity with State law by deleting section 12.03 of the current ordinance which reads "In cases where a permit has been denied or revoked the applicant may appeal to the Board of Selectmen who shall inform the applicant of their decision within 10 days."

This article was voted 663 yes to 233 no. Passed.

ARTICLE 10. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 9 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot Vote)

To change section 12.04 to "Any person who violates any provision of the Littleton Zoning Ordinance may be made punishable by a fine or not more than \$100 for each day that such violation continues after the conviction date; provided, however, that the total fines imposed for any single violation shall not exceed \$500."

This article was voted 497 yes to 416 no. Passed.

ARTICLE 11. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.10 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot Vote)

To include Day Care Services in the Table of Use, Article III, and allow it to occur in all zones by Special Exception.

To adopt this definition of day care services and include it in the definitions, Article XIV: Babysitting or child care services provided for 7 or more non-resident children at one time.

This article was voted 556 yes to 355 no. Passed

ARTICLE 12. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.11 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot Vote)

To add Group Care Facilities to the Table ofUse, and that such facilities may be allowed in all zones except Industrial by Special Exception.

To adopt this definition of Gromp Care Facilities and include it in the definitions, Article XIV:

Therapeutic residences that provide a sheltered or transitional environment for persons as an alternative to drug treatment centers, mental or penal institutions.

This article was voted 481 yes to 418 no. Passed.

ARTICLE 13. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.12 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot Vote) To adopt this definition of Condominium: The legal arrangement in which a dwelling unit in an apartment building or residential development is individually owned but in which the common areas are owned, controlled, and maintained through an organization consisting of all the individual owners.

This article was voted 617 yes to 253 no. Passed.

ARTICLE 14. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.13 as proposed by the planning board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot Vote)

To adopt the proposed "Reorganization Package" for the entire Ordinance. This re-orders the Articles and some sections in order to make the Ordinance more easy to understand and apply; this reorganization does not make any change in the text of the Articles or sections. Where new Articles or sections are approved by the town at Town Meeting in 1985, they will be so included within the structure of the reorganization.

This article was voted 619 yes to 221 no. Passed.

ARTICLE 15. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.14 as proposed by the planning board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot Vote)

To add the following Article regulating Home Occupations. To delete from Table of Use: Home Tradesmen, Home Industry, and Home Shop. This article was voted 599 yes to 307 no. Passed.

ARTICLE 16. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 15 as proposed by the planning board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot Vote)

Add definition of Manufacturing, Table of Use Regulation, Manufacturing Use Performance Standards.

This article was voted 658 yes to 228 no. Passed.

ARTICLE 17. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No.16 as proposed by petition of the voters of this Town? (Ballot Vote)

To extend the Residential I Zone on the westerly side of the Gilmanton Hill Road, so-called, at/or near the Littleton-Bethlehem Town line so as to extend the Residential I Zone to include a 28 acre parcel of land now owned by Bocash, said land to become part of the Residential I Zone, instead of being part of the Rural Zone in said Town.

This article was voted 691 yes to 282 no. Passed

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$196,900.00 for the purpose of making repairs to the Town's bridges on Redington and Beacon Streets, such sums to be raised by the issuance of serial notes and/or bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and/or bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale anddelivery of such notes and/or bonds as shall be in the best interests of the Town. Results of Article 18.

An amendment was made to this article = "To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$50,000.00 for the purpose of making repairs to the Town's bridges on Redington and Beacon Streets." The amendment was voted on and approved, then the original article, with the amendment was voted in the affirmative. The amount was thus reduced from \$196,900.00 to \$50,000.00 - the money to be raised by taxation, not bond issue.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$225,000.00 for the purpose of replacing the bridge at Bridge Street and for improvements related thereto, such sums to be raised by the issuance of serial notes and/or bonds in a sum not to exceed \$225,000.00 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and/or bonds as needed and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes and/or bonds as shall be in the best interests of the Town. The total estimated cost of the project is \$2,225,000.00, 80% of which shall be paid for by the federal government, 10% of which shall be paid for by the State of New Hampshire, and 10% of which shall be paid for by the Town.

The polls were opened for one hour to vote by ballot on this article. A two-thirds vote is required to pass. There were 364 votes cast - results were - yes- 244 - no- 120. The article was passed by four votes.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to satisfy the purposes specified in the budget as posted.

A motion was made that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,812,672.00 to satisfy the purposes specified in the Budget as posted.

A motion was made to increase the Parks and Playground budget from \$57,000.00 to \$62,372.00 (an increase of \$5372.00). This was approved by voice vote.

A motion to raise an additional \$15,000.00 for the treatment plant budget was defeated 90 to 35 vote.

The total budget for \$1,818.044.00 was approved by voice vote.

ARTICLE 21. The Town voted to appropriate \$20,814.00 for the purpose of making final payment on the headworks project of the Town's sewage treatment plant and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 22. The Town voted to appropriate \$7,000.00 for the purpose of codifying all of the Town's ordinances, by-laws, rules, and regulations and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund. ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$20,000.00 for the purpose of implementing a computer system for the Town and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

This article was passed by standing vote - 50 yes 35 no.

ARTICLE 24. The Town voted to appropriate \$7,000.00 for the purpose of making repairs to the Town Building and authorized the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 25. The Town voted to appropriate \$60,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing one dump truck and two pickup trucks and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 26. The Town voted to appropriate \$43,914.00 for the purpose of replacing the curbing on Main Street and authorized the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$100,000.00 for the purpose of closing out the Town's landfill.

This article was passed by standing vote- yes-60 and nO-29.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$6,500.00 for the purpose of making repairs to the library roof.

This article was passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to modify previous town votes and policies to require individual property owners to pump and clean their own sewage or waste disposal systems at their own cost; provided, however, that the Town shall continue to construct said sewage or waste disposal systems in accordance with the current policy.

This article was defeated by standing vote- yes- 43 no-45.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$50,000.00 for the purpose of completing preliminary engineering on a proposed access road to South Street.

This article was approved by voice vote.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a town road the road recently constructed through the Industrial Park to Mt.Eustis Road, so-called, thereby connecting previously accepted portions of said road running from South Street, so-called.

This article was approved by voice vote.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to reconvey the real estate known as Tuck Lane, which was mistanenly conveyed by Roger M. Strain by deed dated December 17,1984 and recorded in the Grafton County Registry of Deeds, Book 1531, Page 957.

This article was approved by voice vote.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey the property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deeds, the sale to be by public auction or by advertised sealed bids.

This article was approved by voice vote.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1985 and to be paid therefrom.

This article was approved by voice vote.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit, or a private source or bequest which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with the procedure set forth in RSA 31: 95-b.

This article was approved by voice vote,

ARTICLE 36. To transact any other business that may legally come before the Meeting.

LITTLETON WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton in said State qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the eleventh day of March, 1986, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M. and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:00 P.M.), to act upon the following:

ARTICLES 1. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, one Town Clerk for a three year term, one Park Commissioner for a three year term, a Town Treasurer for a one year term, three members of the Board of Trustees of the public library for three year terms, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for a three year term, one moderator for a two year term, one Supervisor of Check List for a six year term. (Ballot vote)

ARTICLE 2. "Shall we adopt the provisions of R.S.A. 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In additions, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000 and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence." (By petition - Ballot vote)

ARTICLE 3. "Shall we adopt the provisions of R.S.A. 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from property tax? This his statue provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year from the property tax on a residence to the value of \$15,000.00." (By petition - Ballot vote)

ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot vote)

To change the definition of frontage to allow private streets that are approved by the Planning Board in a subdivision to provide lot frontage.

ARTICLE 5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for town zoning as follows? (Ballot vote) To change the definition of Multi-Family Housing to include examples of multi-family housing types, "such as, but not limited to, condominiums, apartments or other common wall or row-type housing units."

ARTICLE 6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot vote)

To establish the boundary between the R-l and Rural Zones on Mann's Hill Road as a point which represents the boundary between the Armstrong and Allison properties (now or formerly).

ARTICLE 7. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot vote)

To extend the R-1 Zone to encompass an area known as "Greenwood Acres" located off of Elm Street.

ARTICLE 8. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot vote)

To extend the R-1 Zone to an area between the Gilmanton Hill Road and Cyr Road and from the Mount Eustis Road to the Bethlehem Town Line, excluding the present R-II areas.

ARTICLE 9. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the Planning Board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot vote)

To establish a procedure for questions about the application of district regulations to lots which fall into more then one zone through a special exception from the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

ARTICLE 10. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the Planning Board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot vote)

From ARTICLE IV, Section 4.02 Table of Use Regulations, delete the category of "expressly prohibited uses" and delete the symbol (-) from the table and add a sentence: "All uses not listed as permitted or special exception uses are not allowed."

ARTICLE 11. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 8 as proposed by the Planning Board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot vote)

From ARTICLE IV, Sectiion 4.02 Table of Use Regulations, delete the phrase "(involving substantial trucking)" which presently follows the use "warehouses" in order to allow warehouses which do not involve trucking. ARTICLE 12. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 9 as proposed by the Planning Board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot vote)

From ARTICLE IV, Section 4.02 Table of Use Regulations, delete the phrase "(bakery and food processing plants)" which presently follows the use "wholesale" in order to allow other types of wholesale uses.

ARTICLE 13. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment NO. 10 as proposed by the Planning Board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot vote)

To amend Section 6.01 on fence regulations to allow a fence surrounding an outdoor swimming pool to be no less than four feet and not more than six feet in height, without a special exception from the Zoning Board of Adjustment, to require that fences, screens, and retaining walls along or in the vicinity of property lines not become unsafe and unsightly and in the case of a finished fence, a finished surface must face the abutting properties.

ARTICLE 14. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 11 as proposed by the Planning Board for town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot vote)

For Multi-Family Housing and Cluster Single -Family developments as currently allowed in Town, to establish requirements for density, set-backs, public services, and other features.

ARTICLE 15. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 12 as proposed by the Planning Board for Town zoning ordinance as follows? (Ballot vote)

To combine ARTICLE XI (Administration - Zoning Officer) and ARTICLE XIV (Enforcement and Penalties) and clarify that the Zoning Officer administers and enforces the Zoning Ordinance, clarify when an application for a zoning permit must be submitted, the responsibility of the Zoning Officer in reviewing permit applications and in insuring compliance once approved, and in terms of a fine in the event of a violation of the ordinance, a limit on the amount of fine is removed, and the date from which the fine can be assessed is changed to be either the convictioin date or the date of written notice. ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$3,550,000 for construction of a secondary treatment plant and related costs. Of this amount, \$2,662,500 will be provided from federal sources; \$887,500 will be raised by the issuance of municipal serial notes and/or bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, with \$710,000 reimbursed by the State of New Hampshire. This article further authorizes the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and/or bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes and/or bonds as shall be in the best interests of the Town. (2/3 Ballot vote required)

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to satisfy the purposes specified in the budget as posted.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund for closure of the municipal landfill, and to appropriate \$100,000 to that fund, and name the Board of Selectmen as the agents of that fund as required by R.S.A. 35:15.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$60,000 for necessary repairs to the Town Building.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$3,000 to evaluate the feasibility of a municipal building at the site of the former Beaton property on W. Main Street.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$11,555 to be used to fund a portion of a proposed regional study of solid waste disposal alternatives.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$143,000.00 for the purpose of making improvements to the library to provide safe and reasonable accessibility to the library for the elderly and the handicapped. (By petition)

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to transfer ownership of the remaining unsold copies of the 1984 edition of the Littleton Town History, to the permanent endowment fund of the Littleton Area Historical Society upon payment of \$3,000 by the Society to the Town. \$3,000 represents the outstanding balance of the \$35,000 appropriated by the 1981 Town Meeting for the project.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to adopt welfare guidelines as proposed by the Board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to modify previous Town votes and policies to cease installation of new septic systems. Provided, however, that septic systems in place at the time of this vote will continue to be maintained and pumped at Town cost, but systems installed after this vote will not be maintained or pumped at Town cost.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to abolish Site Plan Review authority given to the Planning Board in accordance with R.S.A. 674:43. (By petition)

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to oppose the burial, storage, transportation and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of Littleton and State of New Hampshire; and to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into the feasibility and prudence of the US Department of Energy's (DOE's) present plan to dispose of radioactive waste and into the DOE's competence to carry out such a plan. (By petition)

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1986 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit, or a private source or bequest which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with the procedure set forth in R.S.A. 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed, and to further authorize the Selectmen to sell any other personal property owned by the Town which is no longer used for municipal purposes. In every instance, sale shall be by public auction, or advertised sealed bids.

ARTICLE 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before the Meeting.





TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

It is nothing new to read in a town report that the past year was an active one. 1985 saw its share of activity by the Town Manager in negotiating with the Police Department bargaining unit; creation of job descriptions, a pay and classification plan, and a new personnel policy for town employees; selection of a town computer system; institution of a revised budget review process; a comprehensive insurance coverage review; and development of new policies of auditorium use and septage treatment designed to enhance revenues.

Many important undertakings were not fully implemented in 1985, but the work conducted during the year will yield significant benefits when these long term projects are completed. Among these projects are design of a secondary treatment plant; selection of an engineering firm to conduct a landfill closure study; establishment of a plan to offer a regional solution to the solid waste problem in Northern New Hampshire; efforts to create a water park on Rte. 18; organization of a centralized dispatching center to allow adoption of 911 emergency phone service in 1986; and completion of the Mill Street grant application.

Without question, the biggest issue of 1985 was the revaluation of the town by United Appraisal Company. While town employees did not conduct the revaluation, the demand on their time during the review, and especially afterward, was staggering. This project will continue to require a great deal of staff attention in the early stages of 1986.

As a conclusion to this report, I would like to thank all of the people who participated and supported town government projects in 1985. I think it is important to recognize the dedication and public spirit of those citizens who serve on the various town boards, committees, and study groups. Too often their dilligence is rewarded with criticism that is not constructive in nature. I extend an invitation to all of you to participate in your town government during 1986. We will all benefit from your involvement. A final thought in this report is to express personal gratitude to one person who was involved for many years, and who I had the privilege of working with only briefly. Thank you **Bill Bedor**.

LITTLETON PUBLIC WORKS & HIGHWAYS DEPARTMENT



Major road projects for 1985 included sealing and patching of Hilltop Road, Gary's Drive, Stevens Road and the cemetery roads. The department also hot topped East Street, Pine Hill corner, West Street, Kilburn Street, the Town Building parking lot and sidewalks. 700 yards of oil-sand mix was made and used in grader patching Stevens Road, Hilltop Road, the upper end of Cyr Road and a portion of Rock Strain Drive.

In addition to resurfacing of the Town Hall sidewalk, many other walkways were repaired, and more are planned for the coming year.

Maintenance work for 1985 included a program of widening and reinforcing shoulders on many of our back roads; brush cutting; culvert replacement; cold patching; removal of obstructions in culverts and sewer lines; cold patching of roads; and repair of 28 catch basins.

1,700 feet of new sewer line was installed on Rte. 18 from the Brickyard Road to the George Quigg residence. 256 feet of new line was placed on Rte. 116 to replace a failed septic system, and 294 feet of new line on East Street was also installed. The department installed ten new septic systems and repaired nine existing systems. Continued changes by the State Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission make this an increasingly expensive undertaking.

We have hauled roughly 5,000 yards of fill to the dump to use for cover. Most of this came from our Mt. Eustis area. We also built a new loading dock at the dump to use for loading cardboard into the back of the trailers.

The department worked with the Water & Light Department on a number of water leaks and the changing of the waterline on Rte. 18 by the new Interstate bridges. Also, a new waterline on East Street was installed.

The heavy snow fall experienced in December kept the deaprtment very active. We have tried to use more sand and less salt to keep our roads passable and to try to hold down the cost.

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LITTLETON POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Littleton Police Department has just completed one of its busiest years in recent history. There were a total of 13,079 calls logged at our dispatch center. We made 350 motor vehicle arrests, which included 54 for driving while intoxicated, 23 felony arrests, 193 criminal arrests and 25 juvenile arrests. We investigated two felonious sexual assaults, 17 simple assaults, one drowning, 29 burglaries and 120 thefts. Our homicide which took place in May is still under investigation by several area police departments along with the Major Crime Unit of the New Hampshire State Police. We also covered 253 motor vehicle accidents, three of which were fatalities.

In an effort to better ourselves as law enforcement professionals and be able to better serve the needs of our community the following officers attended specialized training programs in various locations throughout New England. Sergeant Fred Gilbert attended a two week armorers school at the Smith and Wesson Academy in Springfield, Massachusetts. Officer Ralph Brooks attended a program on Interviews and Interrogations as well as advanced investigative techniques. Officer Herbert Lloyd attended a two week session on traffic accident reconstruction. Officer Mikel Dyne became certified as an Intoximeter operator. These programs were held at our training academy in Concord. Officer Donald Marsh attended a street survival seminar in Burlington, Vermont. Officer Michael Devine was certified as a defensive tactics instructor. This was a two week program at Smith and Wesson Academy in Springfield, Massachusetts. He also attended a week long program at the Maine Police Academy on the proper use of Kubatons and flashlights. Special Officer and Meter Maid Mary Ann Duranty attended a seminar on rape victims.

Our in service training sessions dealt with firearms qualifications, stress management and driver improvement. We wish to extend our thanks to Mr. Donald Gilpin, A.C.S.W. and Mr. Gary Mason for their informative sessions.

During the months of January, February and March our department sponsored a 78 hour special officers training school for 23 area part-time police officers. This program was organized by Officer Ralph Brooks and I might mention that he did an excellent job with this assignment.

Sergeant Fred Gilbert held a handgun course for area women and Officer Michael Devine offered several self-defense programs for area women as well. Both of these events were well received. We would like to have your input as to what types of programs you would like offered in 1986.

We wish to welcome Officer Donald Winget, formerly of the Carroll Police Department, to Littleton. We feel he will be a valuable asset to this department. Sergeant and Juvenile Officer Larry Blaisdell resigned from his position to accept a job with the New Hampshire Probation Department. We wish him the best of luck in his new profession. A special thanks to all those who helped make 1985 a successful one; our local firefighters and highway department, area law enforcement agencies and the Major Crime Unit of the New Hampshire State Police.

Our thanks also go out to radio stations WLTN and WMTK along with the Littleton Courier and Caledonian Record for allowing us to air and publish our public safety messages in an effort to make our holidays accident free.

In closing we'd like to leave you with these following safety tips:

When getting out of your vehicle make certain to remove the keys from the ignition and lock all doors. Do not leave young children unattended in motor vehicles. If you're going to drink don't drive. When leaving your home make sure that all doors and windows are locked. If you're going to be gone on vacation be sure to give us a call so that we can watch your home until your return.

If everyone can do their part in the fight against crime we'll be able to continue to make our community a healthy and safe environment.

LITTLETON FIRE DEPARTMENT

During the 1985 calendar year the Fire Department responded to 137 emergency calls and 160 non-emergency calls. These non-emergency calls consisted mainly of tanker work in conjunction with other departments. The firemen responded to 7 calls for mutual aid to the towns of Bethlehem and Whitefield.

Again this year we completed business fire inspections of 94 proprietors and industries. The chimney and wood stoves inspections have revealed the intense concern for installation, as well as, operational safety. This concern shows our townspeople urge for safety oriented lifestyles.

Firefighter David M. Carbonneau attended the New Hampshire Fire Standards and Training School in Concord. This 7 week course familiarizes the students with all phases of fire suppression as well as fire prevention. Dave successfully graduated as a career level Certified Firefighter. Firefighter Richard Whitney will be attending the same school this April to obtain the Career Level Certification as well.

The department underwent an internal facelift with the stripping and repainting of the living quarters. Along with this painting, a major repair was made to the apparatus room floor. This repair was necessitated due to the age and excessive traffic this area experiences. These repairs were completed by both on-duty, as well as, off duty firemen.

During the past year the firemen were asked to do an additional 21 hours a week of Police Department dispatch, bringing the total to 90 hours per week. The firemen are now on duty as dispatchers at 11:00 p.m. during the week, and 24 hours a day on weekends. The dispatching is now being done completely from the Police Department Dispatch Center on the main floor of the Town Building instead of the Fire Department as in the past. This has brought the Fire and Police Departments in to a closer working unit.

Another major change instituted by the Town Manager is the policy of both firefighters awake at all times. This is in conjunction with the schedule change from 24 hours shifts to split shifts of 10 and 14 hours each. These new shifts figure to an average work week of 48 hours.

In closing, we would like to remind our townspeople the firemen are on-duty 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. These dedicated men whose main concern is saving lives are ready to respond, anytime, day or night, to any situation no matter how small. We would like to thank you for your heartfelt support during the past year. We would also like to wish you a fire safe year in 1986.

1985 marked a milestone for the Littleton Planning Board and the town. This year marked the first year the board had a regular staff, thanks to your support at the 1984 Town Meeting.

The part-time circuit rider position created last year gave the town 13 hours a week of professional planning expertise. In the first 7 months the benefit has been twofold:

1. We now provide regular office hours for the public, to assist with applications every Monday from 2-6 PM.

2. The staff person has organized the Planning Board's efforts to handle an ever increasing workload, as well as providing planning expertise.

The effect on the board since April 1985 has been to allow us to concentrate on important revisions to our Site Plan Review Regulations, and Zoning Ordinance changes, the latter which will be proposed to the town voters on the ballot this Town Meeting March 11, 1986.

A more important and significant result of this new position in the future will be to lessen the time demands on the volunteer members. This will encourage members to remain their entire 3 years as productive contributors and help promote continuity in the board actions. This will also make it easer to serve as a member, which will assist in locating future new members. More time will be requested in this year's budget for this vital position.

Our board has been marked in 1985 by steady member attendance at its meetings, and a genuine team effort to serve the town of Littleton in this important task.

The Littleton Planning Board greatly appreciates the continued support, encouragement and co-operation given by the citizens of Littleton, the town department heads, the Town Manager, the Zoning Officer, the Zoning Board of Adjustment, the North Country Council, and especially the Selectmen who have been most supportive. We look to your continued help in 1986 as we tackle the important goal setting stage of the Master Plan.

To the citizens of Littleton:

Several projects were started during 1985 that when completed, will contribute to our community growth and attractiveness.

The Bridge Street bridge replacement project, which is in a preliminary engineering phase, includes a new bridge, Meadow Street improvements and a design plan for an Industrial Park access road. Implementation should improve traffic flow and business opportunities in that part of town.

The selectmen have signed a facilities operations and management agreement covering Littleton's primary waste water treatment plant with YWC Incorporated. The town retains ownership of the plant, but the operation of the plant is now the responsibility of this private firm. The arrangement has worked out very well, and it is the board's intent to continue with it.

The secondary sewage treatment facilities engineering plan is well underway with construction scheduled to start (assuming federal and state financial share fullment) in 1987.

The Mill Street Revitalization Committee has submitted a grant application for federal funding of an economic improvements package for downtown Littleton. If awarded, this grant will enhance our community's business activity and bring Mill Street to completion.

We now have a working computer system and an orderly time table of assimilation into the operation of the town. We have started with payroll, finance and word processing applications.

The town also took on a new mapping and revaluation program. Hindsight tells us that we should have separated these projects by one year.

Lying ahead are two community challenging projects: the closure of our existing landfill and in tandem with that, how to deal with the solid waste that is generated on a daily basis. In addition to regular responsibilities, Selectman Joseph Wiggett has served as board representative to the Littleton Planning Board for a second year. His commitment to this dual role has been beneficial to both boards.

Selectman Richard Hill represented the board at daytime meetings and a trip to Concord. His red convertible was also pressed into service on several occasions.

In addition to working on many of the mentioned projects, Town Manager Thomas Landry is applying organization and followthrough to the administration of town affairs. Our municipal administrative requirements are greater than ever, and we must maintain progress in this area.

During the past year town employees have risen to meet many departmental work challenges. All of us, including the other various boards and commissions that serve Littleton are striving for a higher level of efficiency.

The continued construction and building renovation within Littleton has heightened awareness of the zoning ordinance and it's application. As citizens, we need to take an interest in this subject and actively promote the orderly growth of our community.

LITTLETON WATER AND LIGHT DEPARTMENT REPORT

1985 was an interesting and busy year for the Department. Over 365,000,000 gallons of water was delivered while some 43,000,000 kilowatt hours of electricity flowed through the distribution network to Littleton businesses and homes. In order to provide those utilities, Department personnel conducted the day-to-day work and the not-so-routine work as well. The statistics below reflect work from both categories, the more significant activities being amplified in the paragraphs that follow:

SIGNIFICANT ACTIVITIES, 1985:

WATER SYSTEM-

Extensions or replacement of old, undersized water mains include: 1200 feet of new 6" line which tied School Street and Pleasant Street mains together permitting an increased volume capability while providing better service to residents of East Street; replacement of 1700 feet of 6" with new 8" on Route 18 as a result of I-93 bridge construction requiring line relocation.

Other line extensions include a combined 2100 feet of new 8" to development areas at Tuck Lane and Spring Valley Road. Two fire hydrants were also installed, one at each location.

Of the six water line breaks, two were major: One resulted from hydrostatic testing following the installation of a new section on the 12" main near the new Treatment Plant in Bethlehem, the other resulted from a stress fracture of the 6" line on Crawford Street. Each break constituted an isolated incident, no further problems are expected.

The Department cleaned and flushed two large water facilities this year, the one million gallon Apthorp Reservoir and the one million gallon settling basin at the Gale River intake in Bethlehem.

ELECTRIC SYSTEM-

A major system extension was completed in November, a 12470/7200 volt, 3 phase power line from the Partridge Lake Substation to the Poulsen Lumber Company four miles away. The extension was accomplished on a joint effort basis with the lumber company to provide a less expensive alternative to diesel fuel for sawing. The Department, in turn, gained the opportunity to provide 3 phase power in a new service area.

At two substations, Lafayette and South Street, major upgrade efforts were made. At Lafayette, cooling fans were installed on each power transformer increasing station capacity at minimum expense. At South Street, a single 3750 KVA power transformer was installed to replace three aging and ailing transformers of less total capacity. The new transformer permits a growth capability while unloading the Lafayette Substation. Lafayette, accordingly, realizes an extended service life and even more capacity for distribution system growth.

1500 feet of 12470/7200 volt powerline was re-routed for I-93 bridge construction over Route 18. 3300 feet of new service line was constructed to individual residences and development areas, a major effort opening new service availability for further expansion as well.

1300 feet of conduit and cable were replaced on Main Street for the street lighting system. This job was necessitated due to the installation of new street curbing.

1986 FORECAST OF MAJOR EVENTS:

The Department has quite a number of projects and several major studies to conduct. The work will be accomplished under a new Superintendent, but without Al Wright, a fourteen year lineman 1st class, who has undertaken a new career. He will be missed.

PROJECTS AND STUDIES:

WATER SYSTEM-

Replace 1300 feet of old, undersized 4" water pipe on Pleasant Street. 8" pipe will be installed to increase system capacity while removing a flow restriction. Implement a Corrosion Control program as required by the Safe Drinking Water Act and as mandated by the State of New Hampshire. The program will include the installation of chemical injection equipment to chemically treat the water in order to decrease natural acidity level to new, acceptable standards.

The Department will install a new 8" line across the Cottage Street bridge when that bridge is renovated in the fall. The present 6" line will be removed.

Automation of the Brickyard well as controlled by Oak Hill Reservoir volume is to be studied. For the investment, Littleton residents would realize a maximum volume and pressure availability as the well would be turned on to supplement flow and to prevent reservoir over-depletion during periods of high demand.

ELECTRIC SYSTEM-

A study of a new Main Street lighting option will be undertaken. High pressure sodium lights versus the present fluorescent system will be evaluated in terms of economic pay-out and installation costs. Perhaps a phased changeout program will best serve the Town.

The Department will also evaluate the costs and benefits of relocating approximately 1500 feet of Pleasant Street power line now on poles too close to traffic. If this study warrants 1986 action, the job would be accomplished with the water line replacement referred to earlier.

The Department will install nineteen highway lights at Exits 43 and 44 on I-93, a job for which the State of New Hampshire will provide the funds.

Further work to enhance substation capacity and efficiency will be a priority item. With new dual voltage regulators at South Street, the Department will be able to handle major expansion projects while preparing for an eventual voltage change-over requirement from 4160 to 12470 volts.

The Mill Street project will be started in the summer if the State approves the grant application submitted by the Selectmen on January 27, 1986. The Department has committed up to \$100,000.00 to improve and relocate existing utilities on Mill Street - underground service is a strong possibility. The total investment is to be returned over a 5 year period at a 9½ per cent interest rate.

LITTLETON PUBLIC LIBRARY

The library had an exciting year as a co-sponsor (with The White Mountain School) of Brad Smith's North Country Historical Project. He presented five separate programs throughout the area -- "Lost Places," on abandoned communities; "Summer Folks," on the old hotels; "A Living From Logs," on the logging industry; "Ski Troops: The 10th Mountain Division," and "From Georgian to Gingerbread," on local architectural styles. During the year, Brad spoke to 70 groups with a total attendance of 3,286.

Littleton was also part of the state-wide Mill on Main Street Program. With state funding, Robert Duncan from Connecticut wrote a brochure and presented a slide/lecture on the Kilburn Brothers.

In April, nine of our Edward Hill oil paintings were part of an exhibit on his work at Plymouth State College. Because we were a major contributor, there was a "Littleton Night" at the gallery.

The Littleton Public Library was also prominently displayed as part of an exhibit on Carnegie Libraries at the Cooper-Hewitt Museum, The Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of Design in New York.

We had some excellent children's programs this year. There were 89 Story Hours throughout the year, serving 4, 570 children, and 50 film programs, serving 4, 220 children. The Norton Pike Company funded the Summer Reading Program, and the Littleton Area Arts Project sponsored a six-week puppet workshop. The children made their own hand-held puppets, and then put on a show for friends and relatives. Over 80 people attended; it was more than we could accommodate in the Children's Room.

Thank you to Ellen, Jean, Gwen, Pam, Pat, Lauren , Charo and Harold for making the library a friendly corner of town for everybody.

LITTLETON HOSPITAL REPORT

1985 proved to be a challenging year for us organizationally, financially, and most importantly service-wise to our patient population. Significant shifts occurred in lower inpatient census, shorter average stay, and lower operating room activities. Outpatient services, however, have expanded reflecting the regulatory efforts to curtail national health care expenditures. Our plans are to emphasize improved facilities and services for outpatients - particularly in the surgical area.

The purchase of the Elmwood property will enable us to use less costly space for various support services. Long range planning has approved further initiatives in home health services to our service areas. Special events have been successful again this year with the added value of improving the image of the hospital along the lines of fitness, prevention of disease and health education.

One of our major priorities is to improve the relationship between medical staff, trustees and administration so that our collective energies and talents will best meet the needs of the community we serve. Professional liability insurance, the freeze on fees, prior approvals for admissions and procedures have caused tremendous pressures on the providers of care. Nonetheless, we must use our collective wisdom to cope with these realities and to move forward in a positive fashion. Each has a professional role to play. We are very proud of the accomplishments of the medical staff and the hospital employees. New programs have been launched, e.g. CT scanning, new anesthesia methods, "Medi-Mate" communication systems for the elderly, a higher level of intensive care and improvements in emergency services and training are just a few worthy of comment.

An innovative relationship has been formed with the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital in Colebrook. Littleton Hospital will be offering management services in July of 1986, and we are already sharing pharmacy and quality assurance services which represent major cost savings to both hospitals. By avoiding expensive duplication and by centralizing specialized services our resources will be used more effectively. The small rural hospital will find it difficult to compete and to survive unless such linkages are vigorously pursued and cultivated.

Patient statistics for the past year were: 2,567 admissions, 230 births, 8,964 emergency room visits, and \$406,969.67 in free or uncompensated care to area residents provided by the hospital.

Finally, our thanks to you for supporting Littleton Hospital and for helping to create the environment where excellence in health care can flourish. As we turn over a new leaf at Littleton Hospital Association, may you enjoy good health and continued happiness in caring for others!

WHITE MOUNTAIN MENTAL HEALTH AND DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES

1985 Director's Report

The following services have been provided during the calendar year 1985. We are proud of the range of programs offered through our agency. Your town's contribution helps us to make these services available to those in need.

DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES

- Early Intervention. The screening, diagnosis and treatment of children ages 0-3 who have a "developmental delay". A "developmental delay" is defined as a physical or mental handicap which slows down the normal development of a child. This service is offered to the children and their families in their homes. Last year, we provided:
 - . 1500 hours of service
 - . 322 hours of speech therapy

 - . service to over 40 families . 18,000 miles of travel to provide home service
 - . physical therapy services.
- Competitive Employment. This service includes vocational training and remunerative work. We serve an average of 20 people a day who have either emotional or developmental handicaps. This year, we have expanded to offer clients an opportunity to work in actual (real) work situations. We have positions available at Weeks Memorial Hospital, the White Mountain School, and the Littleton Courier. A sample of our service includes:
 - . open 240 days
 - . over \$18,000 paid to clients for their work
 - . subcontract work for local industry
 - . over 700 hours of vocational training.
- Supported Employment. Supported Employment is directed at teaching essential life skills and supervised work experiences.
 - . over 300 hours of community experiences
 - . over 960 hours of instruction
 - . remunerative work
 - . speech therapy
- Day Habilitation Services. Instruction and training for our most severely impaired population. We currently serve eight multiply handicapped adults who were all former residents of Laconia State School. The services are a combination of educational and vocational training. This year, we have been able to start offering paid work experiences.
- Residential Services. We do not ask for town support of our residential services becuase they are adequately funded through a combination of state support and third party payment.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

We provide a comprehensive array of services to our 22 town catchment area. The fact that we operate four service sites (Lancaster, Lincoln, Littleton and Woodsville) helps us to extend mental health services to people throughout our service area. The types of service we provide include: emergency service, individual, family and group therapy, case management, alcohol counseling, and a psychiatric day program. The following information may help to describe the work we have been engaged in during this past year.

- . Partial Hospitalization 250 days of service
- . Emergency service 7 days a week, 24 hours a day coverage
- . Over 12,000 hours of therapy
- . VietNam Era Vets Rap Group
- . Weekly alcohol counseling group

I hope this brief outline will help to describe some of the work we have accomplished during 1985. We have had a busy year serving the citizens of Coos and Grafton Counties. We ask for your support to help us pay for services which exceed the funding we secure from the Division of Mental Health and Developmental Services (state) and the amount we can collect from fees for service. We value your contribution financially and, as importantly, for its statement of support for the work we do in your community.

The Agency provides in-home services for the <u>treatment</u> of diseases, and public health activities for prevention of disease.

In-home services include nursing, physical therapy, speech therapy, Homemaker/Home Health Aide care, under the direction of a physician, to homebound patients.

The Family Assistant program works with parents to strengthen parenting skills and help families with problems.

Five blood pressure screenings for town employees throughout the area were held during 1985.

North Country Home Health Agency serves residents of Bath, Benton, Landaff, Littleton, Lyman, Littleton, Haverhill, Monroe, Bethlehem, Franconia, Sugar Hill, Easton, Twin Mountain, Lincoln, and Woodstock.

Services to residents of Littleton include: 1234 Nursing visits, 222 Physical Therapy visits, 39 Speech Therapy, 2037 Home Health Aide hours and 1058 Homemaker hours. There were 89 Health Promotion visits to assess and evaluate problems.

LITTLETON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Kilburn Craqs were the focus of much attention this year. The goals of past years are well on their way to being accomplished, with the help of many volunteers. A larger viewing area on the summit was cut by Bill Nichols after many hours of work. Bill said it was well worth it when you step back and admire the view. In his efforts to become an Eagle Scout, Bill Stafford, along with a team of his friends, spent many hours clearing brush from the ground in trail to the summit. J.A. McDonald, a contractor who is doing work on I-93, agreed to help construct a parking area off of route 18. The work included installing a pipe and placing gravel. Just over \$250 from the trust fund was used to pay for this. Now that directional signs have been placed along the trail, efforts, will be made to place a sign at the parking area in the spring. We hope that more people will take a short walk up the trail to see the fantastic view of Littleton with the Presidental Range in the distance.

The Dells area has shown an increased use and interest by many people. The two bridges in the Dells area are in need of repair and hopefully more volunteer help can be utilized so as not to burden the taxpayers. Jeff Wallner wrote a report on the problems and possible solutions in the Dells. This report will undoubtfully be a valuable tool in deciding what should be done. Jeff stated that "The pond is filling in at a relatively rapid pace, but more from the action of wildlife and vegetation than at the hand of man..." His suggestion of a monitoring plan should be put into action this summer.

The Dells and Crags have a policy of not allowing motor vehicles, **PLEASE** abide by this. These areas have been set aside for non-motorized use to insure a peaceful setting and to protect the area from excessive wear.

We are a local agency to oversee dredge & fill permits. We assist the state wetlands board in trying to prevent violations and educate those who are unaware of regulations. These regulations are present to protect such valuable resources as clean water, fertile soil, and ourselves. If you have any questions or wish more information about when a permit is needed please contact us. Remember violators may now be fined in local courts.

LITTLETON COMMUNITY CENTER REPORT

The Community Center has once more had a very busy year with thousands of people using both the House and Annex. Over 54 organizations make use of the facilities including the Chamber of Commerce with its office in the building and the Information Booth on the front lawn. The School of Life Long Learning, under the University system of New Hampshire, has moved to a larger room on the second floor which they use 5 days a week plus other rooms as needed throughout the week when available.

This year, two hard wood floors were refurbished including the Chamber Room and the University Room. Major remodeling and repairs have also been done by the Host to the upstairs apartment plus many other improvements in both buildings. The Christmas decorations at the Center added much to Littleton Main Street.

Income from a small endowment and emergency trust fund, donations from organizations and people using the facilities supplement the main financial support provided by Town Meeting vote of the people for the upkeep of the center. Due to the rising cost of keeping the center running, we are this year asking the Town in their budget and those that use the Center for additional financial aid in order to keep up the center as we have in the past. The high cost and increase in the insurance rates have cut deeply into our funds.


We also wish to thank all who have contributed either by donations, gifts or their time to help us make this your "Community Home".

LITTLETON AREA HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Littleton Area Historical Society was founded in 1967 and is a nonprofit organization. It continues as the Town's chief repository for artifacts, photographs, memorabilia and historical collections.

The Museum in the Library is open on Wednesday and Friday afternoons and by appointment. Visitors have noticed the variety of displays. The curators and volunteers answer many inquiries about genealogical connections, find pertinent photographs and data for businesses and individuals, and work on cataloging and preserving items. A sale of Society-owned "Courier" copies printed before 1950 was held this year, coinciding with the Library's Book Sale. These brittle and yellowed editions were of much interest and netted the Society \$118. Later editions may be obtained on request.

Linda McShane's monthly column, The Museum Log, in "The Courier" is the result of her research on Littleton topics.

The eight stated meetings of the Society included a public one at the Opera House when the MJM Productions video of all 106 entries in the Bicentennial Parade was shown on equipment loaned by Tabbut's and with commentary by John H. Hall, Jr. and the Parade Committee.

Other programs included: "Paper Collectibles"; Founders' Day at the site of the first Meeting House in Littleton at the Reynells home on the Old Waterford Road; Bradford Smith, Historian-in-Residence, who summarized his summer slide shows about North Country history; Story and Tour of the 100-year-old Norton Company; Show and Tell by 15 of the Society members who described antique objects; and professional advice on genealogical work. The latter has been useful in a Society project of identifying and correcting data on lots at Glenwood Cemetery. About 140 lots have been researched by five volunteers. Many more helpers are needed because the records need clarifying as to relationships and actual names of families owning lots and who has used them. This project will continue as will the sale of the postcards of views of Littleton, provided by the Society.

Memberships and contributions come from local people and from many other states. Dues remain the same: Individual, \$3; Family, \$10; Contribu-

ting, \$10 and Sustaining, \$25. The Permanent Endowment Fund has increased to \$3097 through various memorial and other gifts.

Guests are always welcome at meetings but a firm financial support is necessary for the Society's various contributions to the Community House and the Library; for dues to Historical associations and fees as well as preservation costs and those of worthwhile projects.

The Society appreciates the fine cooperation of the Library staff and the Trustees, and the facilities of the Community House are invaluable.

The New Hampshire Council on the Humanities was generous in sponsoring the work of Bradford Smith and special workshops for preservation. Through the Northern New Hampshire Foundation (a division of the Council), a grant of \$250 will be given to the Society for restoration of the priceless Apthorp Charter of 1770 and the Legislative Act of 1784. This restoration is being done at Andover, Mass. and the grant is given on a dollar for dollar basis.

Gratitude is also extended to the media and especially to Society officers, committees and volunteers for the year 1985.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT

Calendar year 1985 was a busy and productive year for the North Country Council as it continued to provide a wide range of assistance to towns and cities in the North Country.

The Council is a regional non-profit, public agency chartered under NH RSA 36:45 and is responsible for providing its member communities assistance in local community planning, economic development, solid waste, transportation and various other community services. Besides the direct assistance the Council provides each member community, it is an advocate for all North Country towns in legislative and funding issues at the state and federal governments.

In Littleton we assisted the Community in developing and preparing several grant applications including a housing rental demonstration program funded for \$71,000, an economic development marketing project, a bridge engineering analysis, and a downtown business development and Mill Street improvement project. Also provided on-going circuit-rider planning assistance to the planning board including revision of the master plan. Provided technical assistance to town officials on solid waste planning and regulation issues. Coordinated negotiations between Boston & Maine Railroad and Town officials over proposed right-of-way usage.

Economic development is an important part of the Council's overall agency mission. This year the Council produced a video promoting the North Country as "The Sensible Place to do Business." The video was developed to be a marketing tool to assist local development organizations publicize to southern New Hampshire businesses why the North Country is a logical choice of location. In October, the Council cohosted with Governor John Sununu a development forum in Manchester to discuss with southern New Hampshire business executives the advantages of expanding to the North Country. Over 85 businesses participated in this affair and the response from the business community was very positive. The Council is now developing follow-up contact with interested businesses through the State Office of Industrial Development.

The Council again provided information and guidance to several towns on federal and state grant and loan programs. This past year saw well over \$2.0 million in Community Development Block Grant funds come to the region for such activities as housing rehabilitation, downtown revitalization, business revolving loan funds, and housing rehabilitation feasibility studies. Community planning assistance has emphasized master planning and improvement in local land use controls. New state mandates and commercial and residential growth in several towns have created busy work loads for planning boards. The Council's assistance takes many forms: regional workshops, newsletters, regulation review and update, and assistance on a regular or one-time basis for subdivision and site plan applications.

The Council again co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture series with the NH Municipal Association. The Law Lecture this year covered such topics as local planning board procedures, administration and enforcement of ordinances and review of recent court cases and state law changes regarding local land use planning. The Council also sponsored a separate Coos County Land Use Control Workship which provided additional assistance to those local officials in the county.

Overall, the Council's major objective is to work with North Country towns in solving local and regional problems. We rely on and appreciate the involvement of your town officials and residents and look forward to assisting your town this coming year.

LITTLETON AREA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

The year 1985 has been an active and successful one for the Littleton Area Chamber of Commerce. The program of work completed has included:

The popular After-Bite Trout Tournament that saw 938 participants from all over New England competing to bring in the big one. Two big "tagged" trout were caught worth \$15,000 and \$10,000 to the lucky winners. The success of this tournament enabled proceeds of \$5,000 to go to Northern New Hampshire Charitable Trust and \$1,000 each to the New Hampshire and Vermont Fish and Game Departments. Our thanks to New England Power for their cooperation in promoting northern New Hampshire's great natural resource - Moore Lake Dam.

The Chamber, in a show of support for the Regatta hydroplane boat races, turned over all the Chamber equipment to the newly-formed Yankee International Boating Federation of America for the sum of one dollar.

The 16th annual Art Show and Sale brought many talented artists to Littleton in September in spite of Hurricane "Gloria" who also chose to visit New England.

The influx of Fall Foliage visitors was a busy time for the Chamber and information booth with accommodations found for all. Over 6,000 visitors stopped at our booth and brochures and business directories were distributed throughout the year.

A major contribution to the Town occured when the Retail Division chose to brighten the holidays with new town decorations. Balsam wreaths with white lights turned Littleton into the "village of wreaths". The cost of \$1,700 was made possible through contributions and the spirit of the entire community. In keeping with the holidays the Chamber made certain Santa Claus arrived in Littleton to brighten the lives of our children.

Office renovations have created a new and welcome look for the Chamber and the community is encouraged to use the resource of information housed in the office. The Chamber serves as an information center year 'round, referring inquiries to appropriate local and state agencies, averaging over 100 local inquiries monthly.

This year the position of Town Manager became an ex officio member of the Chamber Board of Directors in an effort to strengthen the relationship between town government and community involvement. It has been an exciting time working together on the Mill St./Phase II project which will simultaneously improve employment opportunities, increase tax revenues, boost our economy and promote our area. The efforts and accomplishments of the Littleton Area Chamber of Commerce are the result of contributions and support of a community working together to maintain our quality of life, enhance the economy, promote our area and plan together for our future.

We express our appreciation to the Town of Littleton for their assistance, to the Chamber Board of Directors for their willingness to give time and energy for their community, to our members and the local media for helping us make Northern New Hampshire a special place.

WHITEFIELD REGIONAL AIRPORT

1985 was a very active year for the Whitefield Regional Airport and its Commissioners. New Commissioners are Ms. Beverly Kennedy, Mr. David Kennedy, and Ms. Cynthia Fellows-White. Mr. Joe Elgosin left the Commission and we will miss his enthusiasm and dedication. Following is a brief summary of events for 1985.

March 29th. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) commissioned the newly installed instrument landing system. This bad weather approach makes the airport safer. The Local share of the \$140,000 project was raised through donations from users of the airport.

May 30th. Mr. Gary Sanborn, the fix base operator selling fuel and aircraft services, moved out of the area and the Airport Commission took over the operation.

June 16th. Governor John H. Sununu was the main speaker for the dedication of the instrument approach. Also speaking were Governor's Council Representative Mr. Raymond Burton, State Representative Kay Ward and Ned Densmore, and Mr. Otto Olsen.

August. Whitefield Airport Flying Service, Inc. took over the fix base operation at the Airport. Besides offering the above mentioned service they also offer flight instruction and scenic rides. B & B Aircraft still provides aircraft maintenance.

September. F.A.A. approved release of excess airport land to the Whitefield Industrial Park.

October. The F.A.A. selected the Whitefield Regional Airport as a site for a Direction Finding Facility which will be used to locate lost aircraft. Construction is to start this spring and will be funded completely by the F.A.A.

The Whitefield Regional Airport Commission closes the year with a very ambitious program for 1986. As required by law we will be reclearing some brush areas. We also intend to complete the rehabilitation of the original hangar. The aircraft parking area is fast deteriorating and the Commission will try to have the surface repaired. The Commission also expects to receive an environmental assessment grant to study a runway extension. The North Country Council will be doing the work.

With public support by its surrounding towns, the regional airport will enhance the area's ability to support and foster economic development of northern New Hampshire. Again, thank you for supporting the Whitefield Regional Airport.

GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

We appreciate the opportunity to submit the following report in our continuing effort to directly communicate with our constituents.

Because of current favorable cash status and appreciable fund balance, Grafton County maintained a level tax requirement this fiscal year, actually reducing the tax requirement by \$200, and we anticipate an even better tax climate in the next fiscal year. However, due to the apportionment process of tax assessment by equalized valuation, some towns did see a slight increase in the county portion of taxes for 1985, though the majority of towns realized a decrease. The unusual fund balance is due to a combination of factors, including unused surplus in the previous budget, conscientious budget management by all departments, transfer of court expenses to the State, increased Nursing Home reimbursements, favorable returns on investments, increased Register of Deeds revenues and continued Revenue Sharing.

Along with saving the County approximately \$300,000 in expenditures with the shift of liability for court activities to the State, we also anticipate receiving \$100,000+ annually in rent on space occupied by the court system.

Grafton County is experiencing the same problems as your local government in the insurance market. Costs are rising dramatically & in some cases insurance coverage is unobtainable. We have retained a consultant to review county insurance needs & available coverage with the hopes of procuring one total package. Because of the current unstable insurance market, we do not yet have any report or recommendation.

In cooperation with your local government and the State, we are striving for a smooth transition to the new system of welfare service delivery under Senate Bill 1. Settlement for assistance determination has been eliminated & towns & cities are now liable for all general assistance to needy persons in their towns, including transients. However, liability for expenses of all juvenile services & for persons assisted under the categorical grant programs will now be shared by the State and counties, removing town liability. Under Senate Bill 1 & the ensuing partnership between counties and the state Dept. of Children & Youth Services, the Commissioners note a new direction for juveniles, including the development of new alternative programs to out of home placements.

Energy conservation programs at the nursing home and courthouse have realized a considerable savings with the decrease in fuel & electric consumption, cutting consumption & dollar cost in half for courthouse fuel alone.

In our letter to you in 1983 we noted litigation in a retirement buyback suit where a negative decision would result in cost of \$70,000 plus legal fees with a potential domino effect on local governments. We are pleased to note that the County prevailed in this issue.

The Commissioners have changed weekly meetings to Wednesdays. We encourage public attendance at all meetings. The county budget recommendations are processed in May & June. We welcome input and strongly recommend public attendance at the public hearings usually held in June.

LITTLETON INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION REPORT JANUARY, 1986

The Littleton Industrial Development Corporation is a non-profit organization, established in 1974 through the efforts of the Littleton Chamber of Commerce, the Town Selectmen, and approximately 150 other interested area citizens as an entity to own and develop the Littleton Industrial Park and to accept the responsibility to lead the Town's effort to attract new and desirable industrial employers.

1985 saw the completion of all the paperwork related to the \$777,000 Phase II construction program. The program was financed with \$500,000 from EDA, \$100,000 from the Town of Littleton, and the balance by borrowing from Northern Community Investment Corporation. At the March, 1985 Town Meeting, the Bridge Street Bridge replacement proposal was adopted and the Town Meeting then unanimously approved funding \$50,000 for engineering a proposed access road from the new bridge into the Industrial Park. Some preliminary survey work has been completed by the State of New Hampshire in regards to the Bridge Street Bridge replacement and the proposed access road.

Burndy Corporation, Tender Corporation, and Hitchiner Manufacturing continue to provide stable, quality employment opportunities. The primary efforts of the Directors of LIDC have been devoted to expanding our marketing of Littleton and the Industrial Park to other prospects for relocation or expansion of existing businesses. We participated in a special dinner hosted by Governor Sununu in Manchester in October, 1985, at which 38 southern New Hampshire companies were in attendance and viewed a new 12-minute VHS video entitled "New Hampshire's Northern View" which was produced and completed in September, 1985. The video tape describes many of the reasons why businesses should consider Northern New Hampshire for relocation and expansion. LIDC is participating in a multi-faceted advertising program with 10 other growth centers in Northern New Hampshire which include brochures with economic fact sheets for each of the ten growth centers, a direct mail program to selected southern New Hampshire and New England businesses, a computer base compilation of up to date economic data for Northern New Hampshire and participation in a special New England Business Magazine New Hampshire supplement scheduled for issuance in March, 1986.

With the completion of Interstate 93 and the continued pressures of growth moving northward, we fully expect to see increased activity for industrial development along with the increased activity in the commercial sector. We have a solid foundation with many enviable attributes and we must continue to work together to take full advantage as the future of industrial development unfolds here in Northern New Hampshire.

LITTLETON SELF-HELP CLINIC

Now in its fifth year, The Littleton Self-Help Clinic exists to meet two problems: how to most effectively assist victims of family violence and how to best assist victims of sexual assault.

The goal of the Self-Help Clinic is to provide services to the victims of family violence and rape in such a way that the victims can avoid future violence, seek legal redress for crimes commited against them, and recover from their physical and psychological wounding.

In situations of violence and rape, the objectives of the Self-Help Clinic are:

l. to provide immediate physical, psychological, and legal aid to the victim;

2. to carry through the counseling process for the victim, including private and group therapy;

3. to assist in carrying through the process of legal restraint and redress; and

4. to assist in helping the victim to establish new or radically changed living status.

The achievement of these objectives is documented by reports from both volunteers and paid counselors who work directly with the victims, and court decisions in which the trained staff act as volunteer advocates for the victim.

The Self-Help Clinic operates 24 hours/seven days a week throughout the year.

The Self-Help Clinic is a voting member of the New Hampshire Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence. Our funding sources include the Domestic Violence Grant Program, United Way, and private donations as well as the funds from the town of Littleton.

We also operate the Purple Unicorn thrift store,which is a community resource. We take any donations and sell them at low prices to help offset our cost of services. We also will give necessary items to needy people

The Town of Littleton has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets, and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial statements.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the omission of a statement of fixed assets, and the omission of the statements of the Littleton Water and Light Department as discussed in the preceding paragraphs, these financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Town of Littleton at December 31, 1985, and the results of its operations and changes in financial position for the year then ended, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with the preceding year.

The accompanying supplemental information is not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements, but is presented as additional analytical data. This information has been subjected to the tests and other auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements mentioned above, and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 1985

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies of the Town of Littleton conform to generally accepted accounting principles applicable to governmental units, except as indicated hereinafter. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies.

Basis of Accounting - The accrual basis of accounting is followed by the Trust and Agency Funds. The General Fund and Special Revenue Funds utilize the modified accrual basis of accounting whereby revenues are recorded when measurable and available and expenditures are recorded when the liability is incurred.

General Fixed Assets - As is the usual practice in the state of New Hampshire, fixed assets are not capitalized in the accounting records when acquired. Funds used to acquire general fixed assets and/or make the debt service payments on borrowings in connection therewith are accounted for as expenditures in the year payments are made. Generally accepted accounting principles require that general fixed assets be capitalized and accounted for in a separate fixed assets group of accounts.

<u>Continued Appropriations</u> - Appropriations for certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year end are carried forward as continued appropriations to the new year in which they supplement the appropriations of that year. At the year end, the continued appropriations are reported as a component of the fund balances and are detailed as follows:

Investments - Investments in marketable securities are carried at cost.

Taxes Collected for Others - The Town collects taxes for Littleton School District and Grafton County which are remitted to them as required by law. These funds are accounted for in the general fund.

Inter-Fund Transactions - During the course of normal operations, the Town has numerous transactions between funds including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services, construct assets and service debt. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary funds financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

Retirement System - Members of the Police Department and Fire Department are automatically members of the New Hampshire Retirement System. Membership is voluntary to members of the Highway Department and Town Offices. Under this plan, participants contribute annually a percentage of compensation which is fixed by law and dependent upon age when contribution begins. The Town's contribution rate for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the state plan. In addition, the Town is contributing to the Special Legislative Annuity being paid monthly to retired employees in accordance with RSA 100-A. The amount, if any, of the excess of vested benefits over pension fund assets for the Town of Littleton is not available since all employers contributing to the New Hampshire Retirement System are treated in the aggregate.

The Town has no past service cost obligation. The total pension cost to the Town for the year was 46,301. This includes payments made to a separate pension plan made on behalf of the Town Manager.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 1985

NOTE A - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

<u>Property Taxes</u> - As prescribed by law, the Tax Collector sells at tax sale, all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due, where applicable. The purchaser at the tax sale has a priority tax lien on these properties and accrues interest at 18% per annum. Delinquent taxpayers must redeem property from tax sale purchasers. Property is sold to the party who will accept a lien for the least undivided interest in the property for payment of taxes and related cost due. If property is not redeemed within the two-year redemption period, the property is tax deeded to the lienholder.

NOTE B - PURPOSE OF FUNDS AND ACCOUNT GROUPS

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of the funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of selfbalancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purpose for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the Town.

Governmental Funds

General Fund - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges, and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

<u>Special Revenue Funds</u> - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of Specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action.

<u>Capital Projects Funds</u> - Transactions related to resources obtained and used for the acquisition, construction or improvement of capital facilities are accounted for in the Capital Projects Funds. Such resources are derived principally from proceeds of long term notes or bonds and from federal grants.

<u>Debt Service Funds</u> - This fund accounts for the accumulation of resources for, and payment of, general long term debt principal and interest.

NOTE C - PRIOR PERIOD ADJUSTMENT, GENERAL FUND BALANCE

In connection with the 1985 year end audit, improper classifications in the Highway Block Grant Aid Program were discovered. The effect of this was to understate the 1984 General Fund Balance by \$42,065 and overstate the Special Revenues Fund Balance by \$42,065. The balance sheet items have been restated from amounts previously reported to give retroactive recognition to the effect of this adjustment.

NOTE D - BONDS AUTHORIZED, UNISSUED

The Town voted, at the 1985 Town Meeting, to raise a sum not to exceed \$225,000 by the issuance of serial notes and/or bonds for the purpose of replacing the bridge at Bridge Street and for improvements related thereto. To date, no action has been made by the Town to issue such bonds.


