OWNER OR KEEPER OF A DOG:

Extracts from Chapter 60 of the act of N. H. legislature, passed January session, 1891.

SECTION 1. Each owner or keeper of a dog, three months old or over, shall annually, on or before the thirtieth day of April, cause it to be registered, numbered, described, and licensed for one year from the first day of the ensuing May, in the office of the clerk of the city or town within which said dog is kept, and shall cause it to wear around its neck a collar and registered number.

SECTION 2. An owner of a dog may at any time have it licensed until the first day of the ensuing May; and a person becoming the owner or keeper of a dog after the first day of May, not duly licensed shall cause it to be registered, numbered, described, and licensed, as provided in the preceding section.

SECTION 3. The fee for every license for a year shall be two dollars for a male dog, five dollars for a female dog and two dollars for spayed females (proportionate rates during the year).

SECTION 8. Whoever keeps a dog contrary to the provisions of this chapter shall forfeit fifteen dollars.

Officers, duly appointed, are required, to kill, or cause to be killed, all dogs within the town, not licensed under the law, and also to enter complaint against the owners or keepers thereof.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyme in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Church Hall in said Lyme on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as prepared by the Budget Committee.
- 4. To see what compensation the Town will allow its various officers the ensuing year. Also what price per day will be paid for Labor, Trucks and Tractors on Town Highways the ensuing year.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to allow Bank discount on all Taxes paid on or before Nov. 1st, 1944.
- 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes the ensuing year.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one one hundredth of one per cent of its 1943 valuation for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for Blister Rust Control the ensuing year.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Tax Collector to deed all property where tax deeds are due.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$353.27 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$1413.07.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Non Partisan Ballot System for the election of Town Officials as provided in the Revised Laws of New Hampshire.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to instruct the Governor of the State of New Hampshire to send a request to the Congress of the United States, a plea that they pass an adequate bill for Soldier voting that will enable every person in the armed forces to vote for Federal Officers at the next Federal election.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for snow fence.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to construct a water hole south of Lyme Common.
- 17. To see what action if any the Town will take to procure land for a bathing beach at Post Pond and to raise and appropriate money therefor.
- 18. To see what action if any the Town will take in regard to Postwar projects or to raise and appropriate money for any war emergency.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to have an electric light placed at the top of the hill near the residence of Allen L. Cole.
- 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Board of Selectmen Lyme, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

An audit and examination of the accounts and records of the Town of Lyme has been made by this Division, in accordance with a vote taken at your annual town meeting in March 1943. Submitted herewith is our report covering the fiscal year ended January 31, 1943, and the current year from February 1st to October 19, 1943. The Schedules A to J are included as part of this report.

Scope of Audit

We examined the accounts of the Board of Selectmen, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent, and the Trustees of Trust Funds. The audit included the examination of vouchers, cancelled checks and other supporting data.

Finances

Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes: (Schedule A)

A substantial increase in the assessed valuation of property was made in the current year (1943), which resulted in a decrease in the local tax rate from \$3.35, in 1942, to \$3.05. The average tax rate for the State in the same years was \$3.23 and \$3.03, respectively.

The Net Debt was decreased by \$4.341.10, during the fiscal year ended January 31, 1943. Bonded indebtedness was reduced by \$3,000 in the same period. Appropriations and Expenditures

Estimated and Actual Revenues-1942:

(Schedules C and D)

It may be noted that actual revenues exceeded the budget estimates by \$1,761.89 during the fiscal year (Schedule D). Unexpended balances of appropriations

were \$1,343.94 and appropriation overdrafts amounted to \$1,330.29, leaving a net unexpended balance of appropriations in the amount of \$13.65 (Schedule C). A net budget surplus for the year of \$1,775.54, resulted from operations as herein described.

Accounts of Selectmen and Treasurer

(Schedules E, E-1, E-2 and E-3)

Vouchers issued by the Selectmen during the year ended January 31, 1943 and the current period February 1st to October 19, 1943, were examined and found to be in agreement with the Treasurer's accounts.

Receipts of the Selectmen and Treasurer were checked to their source, insofar as possible. Totals of receipts and expenditures were verified. All cancelled checks were examined in detail and proofs of the Treasurer's cash balances (Schedules E-1 and E-3) were made and found to be in agreement with cash book balances.

We noted that the Treasurer, in accordance with our previous suggestion, has made a distribution of all cash disbursements, such record being in excellent condition.

Tax Collector

Tax Warrants covering the levies of 1941, 1942 and 1943 were examined as of October 19, 1943. Summaries of these warrants setting forth the activity are shown in Schedules F, F-1 and F-2.

Statement of Unredeemed Taxes as of October 19, 1943 is set forth in Schedule G. We note that this account runs back to the year 1930. It would seem advisable that most of these accounts be passed on to Tax Deeded Property as soon as it can be done.

For the purpose of clarification relative to Tax Sales, in all cases where property is bought at a tax sale by the Town or by an individual, redemptions should always be made through the Tax Collector. In cases where the tax sale is made to an individual and the property subsequently redeemed, the Collector's Tax Sale Record Book should indicate the date of redemption and also the date of payment of the redemption funds over to the

purchaser. For his own protection the Collector should take a receipt for money thus turned over.

Town Clerk

We examined motor vehicle permits and dog licenses issued by the Town Clerk during the period of All monies received therefor less fees for the issuance of dog licenses, were properly accounted for. A summary of this account is set forth in Schedules H and H-1.

Road Agent

We examined vouchers, cancelled checks and other supporting data presented by the Road Agent. The bank account was examined and reconciled with the bank statement secured from the depository as of October 19, 1943.

In connection with this account we suggest that more care be exercised when numbering checks. checks should be numbered consecutively and care should be taken not to duplicate any numbers. A summary of this account is set forth in Schedules I and I-1.

Trust Funds

The records of the Trustees of Trust Funds were examined. The following is a summary of this account (Schedule J):

Total on Deposit, October 19, 1943 Cash on Deposit in the Dartmouth Savings Bank amounted to \$10.839.13, while Cash on Deposit in Dartmouth National Bank amounted to \$5.71.

General Comments

Commendable progress has been made in the improvement of the financial condition of the town since January 31, 1941. The town indebtedness has been funded and, as of the date of audit October 19, 1943, \$6,000 of the funded debt had been retired. A reduction in Net Debt from \$27,134.02 to \$22,488.03, was made between January 31, 1941 and January 31, 1943. This reduction was accomplished in spite of the conversion, during this period, of a substantial amount of "unredeemed taxes" to "property acquired by tax deeds" which automatically eliminated such "unredeemed taxes" from the assets as reported in the balance sheet. It is furthermore to be noted that the improved financial condition of the town has been brought about without an increase in the tax rate, the 1943 rate being \$3.05, as compared to a rate of \$3.06 in 1940.

During the year sales of Town Property acquired by Tax Deeds amounted to:

This reflects the effort being made to dispose of property acquired by the town. A continuation of this policy is strongly urged.

The accounts and records of all town officials were found to be in good condition and with exceptions as herein noted conformed to the standard procedure prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included

in its entirety but the inclusion of schedules is optional.

We extend our thanks to all town officials for their time given during the course of the audit.

Each one can do his part more effectively by securing the required permit before attempting to burn and by complying fully with permit requirements and by giving the needed assistance in extinguishing fires when the Fire Warden needs help. To do so is to meet one real test of citizenship.

THE DARTMOUTH-LAKE SUNAPEE REGION

The Legislature of 1937 authorized the establishment of six Regions, each composing a group of towns suggested by the State Planning and Development Commission. The Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region comprises this town and 37 others in this section of the state. The Region is incorporated as a non-profit corporation and its affairs are supervised by a group of officers chosen annually. The Region employs a full time secretary who is paid by the state (not by the towns). Thus your Region is a set-up established by law and the matter of whether or not it has sufficient financial support to render real service to your community rests with the voters of the towns. During its existance the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region can point to the following accomplishments. Through the publicity it has issued it has brought visitors to every town, some have established summer homes and others have become permanent residents. It has been instrumental in bringing industries to several towns. It has inaugurated plans that have saved historic landmarks. It has sponsored paying summer attractions. It has been active in bringing about a survey of our mineral resources that has resulted in revenue to many towns and has conducted studies of new agricultural products.

By an appropriation not exceeding 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation the Region now asks the suport of your town in continuing the program that has brought about the aforementioned results and to institute the following three projects which if carried through must result in added income to each of the 38 towns of the Region. (1) A research of the possibilities of establishing industries that will use as raw materials, minerals within our area and make a study of the feasibility of the production, processing and sale of several agricultural products that in the past have received but little attention. (2) To cooperate with each of the towns in preparing descriptive pamphlets showing the attractions, natural advantages and resources of the community with the idea of eventually incorporating such material into a book descriptive of the whole Region. (3) To establish a system of Recreation Trails following back highways and little used roads leading to scenic areas and desirable locations in each of the 38 towns in the Region. As it is not deemed proper to devote more space in your Town Report to this subject, details have been omitted, however, letters of inquiry regarding any matter here mentioned will be welcome and given careful reply. REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of the School District of Lyme:

The Superintendent of Schools presents his 16th annual report. School Boards for a long period of years have presented to the citizens a report concerning the financial affairs of the District and concerning the needs of the schools. This makes the 25th report presented by a Superintendent of Schools.

Introductory. It is perhaps difficult to realize that it will not be more than four years before boys and girls who are now fourteen years of age will be called upon to do men's and women's work in our communities. It is for that reason that our school system must put forth every effort to maintain as strong an educational program as is within our capacity. Generally speaking, teachers are aware of the responsibilities placed on their shoulders. Citizens know only too well what this means in their own families. It is therefore necessary for all of us, not only to recognize the needs, but to do something about it. The very least we can do is to make available such financial assistance as to provide the best environmental conditions within our limited means. Lyme has always been willing to do this and continues to be counted upon to render such services as are within her power.

School Work. The educational work of the year has been carried on as in the past in accordance with the State Program of Studies. There have been few, if any, marked changes in the program. Our pupils attain a creditable standing as measured by standard tests. They have also acquitted themselves with credit, in most instances, in their attendance upon the several High Schools in which they have enrolled. All of this means that the foundation laid in the first eight grades of the educational program has been of enduring value to the boys and girls. It also means that there has been a constant endeavor on the part of the teachers and the Superintendent to keep to the forefront the need for a reasonable degree of scholastic achievement. The emphasis this year has been somewhat in the field of better acquaintance with the people and areas of land in other countries and other continents than that on which we live. While most of us formerly recognized the dots on the map in the South Pacific area as islands, we little realized how valuable these islands might become if we were to preserve the ideals of democracy and wholesome living. I am pleased also to report that each school room in the town now has a table or bookcase devoted entirely to library purposes. The State Book Mobile makes regular visits and teachers, pupils and community are profiting by this as well as by the use of books from our own town library.

Pupil Activities. The pupils of the Lyme Schools have continued in their efforts to assist in the war effort. While not everything has been done that has been demanded, a great deal has been done by the pupils themselves in assisting. Through the Junior Red Cross it has again been possible for them to provide favours for those in the community who are not able to get about. This has made an excellent project. The pupils in all of the schools have saved their pennies and contributed as generously as possible toward the purchase of War Stamps. The pupils at the Lyme Plain School have been awarded a citation for the stamps purchased and were told their purchase of stamps was sufficient to enable the government to build a motor scooter and a Life Boat for the soldiers. While this is not intended to supersede the regular classroom program, it is definitely intended to assist the boys and girls of these ages in realizing that after all they are a part of the present conflict and may be able to do something to help our soldiers at the front and more than that, even though their savings and contributions may be small, they can each render a service both to their families and their community by such activities.

Whipple School. This year is was decided that, due to the decreasing number of pupils in the Whipple School, it was more economical to close that building than to keep it in operation. It was decided by the School Board that it was of educational advantage to the boys and girls attending that school to receive the benefit of a fewer number of grades in a room. These combined reasons actuated the School Board in taking the steps of closing the school and providing transportation to the Plain School. Evidences are already arising which show the desirability of that action. Since it has been the poli-

cy of the School District to dispose of unused buildings an article has been placed in the warrant to grant the School Board authority to sell the Whipple School before it has further chance to deteriorate.

The major repair for the year was that of providing a new furnace for the Plain School. While this has not worked out as satisfactorily as had been expected, it has nevertheless eliminated the hazards of coal gas released through definite cracks in the other furnace which had been in constant use for thirty years or more. Other repairs were of a minor nature and mainly for the purpose of avoiding undue wear and tear during this period of scarcity of material and labor. At sometime it will become necessary to provide an additional source of water supply for the Plain Schol. The present driven well gives a constant supply, but that supply is not sufficiently large to provide all of the water needed at that building. The district will need to decide whether it will be better to drive an additional well or to make other arrangements for a supplementary supply. Some minor repairs will need to be made during the coming summer, particularly painting, but these can be taken care of through the regular appropriation for minor repairs. To place before the voters the need for additional water, an article has been inserted in the warrant for district action.

In spite of the fact that the School Budget request is somewhat larger than that of last year, the net amount to be raised is only \$75 more than was requested one year ago. The contemplated increases in salaries of the teachers makes the request for that amount for the six teachers the same as that last year. The other two items calling for increases are janitors' salaries and transportation. The reason for these increases are that these two items in the budget have been somewhat overdrawn for several years and together with two additional transportation routes account for the additional request. It is expected that with this budget it will be entirely possible to operate the schools in accordance with the law and at the same time close the books at the end of the vear 1945 with a reasonable balance. The amount requested to be raised by taxation is about \$120 less than that requested in the budget for the year ending June 30, 1943. The above statements substantiate the fact that the School Board of Lyme is conscious of the tax burden upon the School Community and is very willing to make as much saving as possible in the expenditures in order to avoid any great increase in the request for money to be raised by taxation. It should also be noted that this is possible because the State Aid has increased from about \$2800 in 1928 to more than \$5000 for the current year. Part of this increase is due to the fact that the legislature of 1942-43 appropriated the full amount of the demands of the various School Districts in the state. This is the first time that this has happened for a number of years.

It is fitting that your teachers and Superintendent again acknowledge their appreciation of the general helpfulness shown throughout the community. The boys and girls, as well as the teachers, are very eager to make certain that everything has been done that can be done by them toward building up a better school atmosphere. Everyone is putting forth his best efforts to make it known to the community that he recognizes the advantages which he is enjoying.
