THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Marlow in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Jones Hall in said Marlow on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next at seven of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor.
- 4. To see if the Town will apply for class five money known as TRA and raise the sum of \$399.56 required by the State. The State will contribute \$2,663.70.
- 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Library.
- 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repairs of Highways and Bridges.
- 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for the temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
 - 9. To authorize the Tax Collector to give two percent

cash discount on all property and personal taxes for the payment made within thirty days after the date of the tax bill, and empower the Collector to appoint a deputy Collector.

- 10. To see if the Town will raise such sums of money as may be necessary to improve Town Cemeteries.
- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-nine dollars (\$39.00) for the Monadnock Region Association. (1/100 of 1% of the valuation of the Town).
- 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell or administer all real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector deeds.
- 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$218.00 as its fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital.
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be matched by the State for brush removal on back roads.
- 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 as a subsidy for a resident physician in this area, provided that the neighboring towns take similar action and assume a proportionate share in the project, and to empower the Selectmen to carry out the provisions of this article, according to their best judgment.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a non-partisan system for the election of officers.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a section of the old highway—route 123—beginning 50 feet south of Henri Pletzner's residence, ending at relocation of route 123.
- 18. To see what action the Town will take in regard to those items in the Town budget not covered in the preceding articles.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Trust Funds.
- 20. To hear reports of officers, agents and committees, heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district of the town of Marlow qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Jones Hall, in said district on the 13th day of March, 1961 at 7:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer, and fix compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or other officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, auditors, committees, or other officers in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the

estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the purpose of engaging the services of the firm of educational consultants, Engelhardt, Engelhardt, and Leggett to make a complete study of the Marlow school system.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept and use in the name of the district such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States government or any department or agency thereof, or any state or private agency.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF AUDIT

Marlow School District Fiscal Year July 1, 1959—June 30, 1960

According to the Superintendent's Office, there are no controls available (such as invoices, covering letters or receipt stubs) against which total income received may be proved, except for relatively minor items such as Highway Toll Refunds of \$27.38.

An examination of the physical inventory of text-books purchased during the year was not permitted, on the grounds that (a) some of the inventory might be missing, and (b) such an examination would be un-necessary.

In the opinion of the Auditor, the vouchering of manifests is inadequate. Tuition bills totalling over \$3,000 were typed on a plain sheet of paper, with no signature, letterhead or other indication of source; gasoline bills were paid in the absence of slips or signatures; unsigned office memos with inadequate information were used.

Of the 28 payroll and vendor-voucher manifests issued during the fiscal year, only 7 were signed by the Superintendent. On all 28 manifests, the dollar-amount portion of the order to the Treasurer was left blank—thus the School Board in fact issued no orders to the Treasurer during the year, although the blanks could be filled in any amount. On all of the vendor-voucher manifests, payees were listed at random rather than alphabetically as instructed.

Treasurer's Monthly Report of December 31, 1959 indicates a book overdraft of \$317.60, which was made up the following month by a deposit of \$8,000.00. It is under-

stood that in signing the manifest which caused the overdraft, the School Board was not advised by the Superintendent of the available balance, and that contrary to instructions the Superintendent's Office has been receiving the Treasurer's Monthly Report which shows the cash balance.

The total earnings of the School Principal exceeded her contract with the District by a moderate amount. The difference was charged to the same account as her salary.

Notes to Summary

- (1) The publication "Financial Procedure for New Hampshire School Districts", issued by New Hampshire State Board of Education in 1950, instructs districts not to include tuition rebates among receipts, but to make the correction on the payment side of the record to thereby reduce the tuition expense item. Thus, in the above item, Received from Tuitions, \$180.00 has been removed and the corresponding adjustment made in School Board Orders Paid.
- (2) Merchandise Refunds—\$14.05—includes a check for \$4.90 received by the Superintendent's Office in March, 1960 and deposited by the Treasurer on March 25, 1960. Since no record of this transaction was made in the cash book or in the ledger in the Superintendent's Office, it accounts for the difference in closing balances.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Marlow:

I herewith submit my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

The average cost per elementary pupil in average daily membership for the school year 1959-60 was \$192.93 which is \$16.94 less than the previous year. The decrease is principally due to the increased enrollment. The state average is \$265.00.

The budget request for the school year 1961-62 is 5.6% greater than for the previous year, however, the estimated increased income from State Foundation Aid this year and a larger estimated balance makes it possible to estimate a decrease of \$4,493.00 in the amount to be raised by taxation as compared to the current budget.

Matching funds received under the National Defense Education Act program have allowed the purchase of a number of teaching aids and also a considerable increase in our reference library for the science and mathematics areas.

Major repairs accomplished this past year were the painting of one half the building that was in greater need and the installation of electric wiring that meets the need of the electricity used in the building.

Marlow teachers plan to take part in a workshop to be held next August 30, 31 and September 1st at the Walpole High School. It is planned to study methods of improving teaching techniques in Science, Arithmetic and Reading with the help of outstanding consultants in each field. The 3 day workshop is in addition to the 180 day school year for pupils, as is the day allowed in the schedule for the annual teacher convention in October.

During the 1959-60 school year there were several joint meetings of the school boards of Alstead, Acworth, Marlow, Langdon, Walpole and Westmoreland for the purpose of discussing the possibilities of forming a cooperative district. This year the school boards of Gilsum and Surry have also attended the meetings.

Interest last year was directed toward the formation of a Grades 7-12 cooperative. However, information presented by Superintendent Keach and Mr. Russell, from the State Department of Education, indicated that a Grades 1-12 cooperative would be more beneficial than the 7-12 cooperative.

Considerably more study is needed to gather factual material that is needed by the school boards of each community in order that they may have information to aid them in making their recommendations and also to aid the citizens of each district in their decision as to what is the best educational pattern to follow.

Each board is planning to include an article in the school district warrant that gives the opportunity for the district to decide whether or not to take part in an educational survey.

An educational survey will cover every major aspect of the school situation in each town including an analysis of existing facilities, forecasts of future enrollments, study of the educational needs, suggested curriculum offerings, a review of the advantages of establishing a cooperative school district and an analysis of the financial problems and tax implications of a cooperative system versus continuing as a separate unit.

Three of the school districts mentioned above send their high school pupils to Keene as tuition pupils. It would appear that these communities should have available alternate plans in the event that Keene decides to discontinue their present policy of taking tuition pupils from surrounding communities.

I strongly recommend that each district vote to take part in this educational survey. A district may decide not to follow the recommendations, however, the decision can be made on the basis of factual information.

Sharing of a part-time music teacher was seriously considered by the school board as a worthwhile addition to the education program. The Marlow School Board members agreed with the school board members of the two other interested districts that the education survey would be a more valuable expenditure of funds this year.

At the request of the school district auditor the complete auditor's report omitted from last year's school district report was mimeographed and distributed to citizens of Marlow who were listed on the town check list.

Mrs. Dorothy Wilson replaced Mrs. Helen Lynch as teacher of Grades five, six, seven and eight.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE FOR MARLOW

The following is my report for the year ending June 30, 1960.

- 64 pupils had vision tests given by the school nurse
- 37 pupils had hearing tests given by the school nurse
- 63 pupils were given inspections by the school nurse
- 30 pupils were found in need of dental care
- 71 pupils were weighed and measured by the school nurse
- 61 pupils attended polio clinics
 - 6 pupils attended pre-registration clinic
 - 7 pupils were checked and necessary follow-up done for smallpox vaccination
- 63 pupils were instructed in dental education

Within our school health program we attempt to attain health improvement of each individual within the group. No two children are exactly alike, each child has distinctive characteristics and special needs. Today we have better understanding of nutrition, new methods of instruction, materials for instruction are more plentiful, interest in mental health has a deserved prominence, school environment is improving in most areas, and with continued coperation and interest a child's total development will benefit from the school health program.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank you all for cooperating with the school nurse, Mrs. Damon, during my leave of absence.

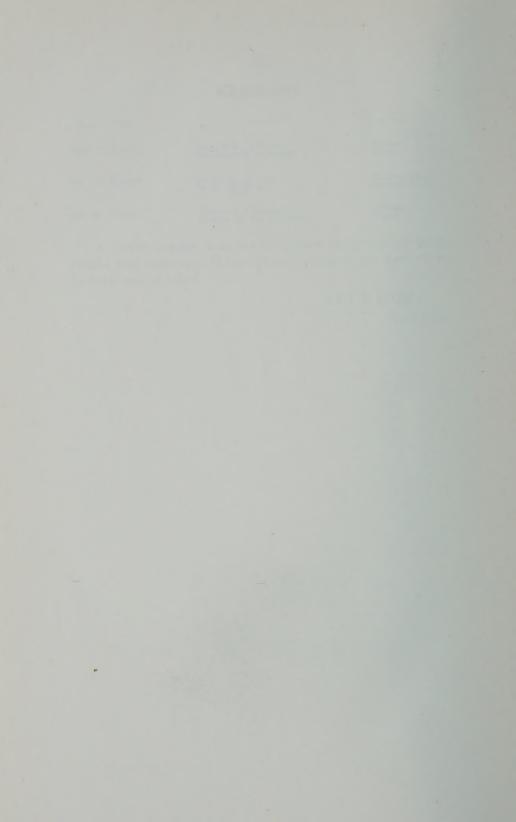
